TVSC building plans down to two options

At last Monday's meeting of the TVSC board, board members narrowed the choices for a building program from four options to two. The board members were un-decided between the two choices, but they hope to come to a decision by the November 19 meeting.

The two possible building plans

are as follows: Plan B - Akron - The 1912-1926 building of the Junior High would be replaced with a new building for grades six through eight with major remodeling of the gymnasium, 12 new classrooms, new library, general science and home economics. Administrative and Support Areas Services would also be constructed. Grades K-8 at Mentone would be maintained with classrooms to accomodate Prime time, and Burket would receive a new library, multi-purpose room (art, music and cafeteria) and Support Areas Services space. Estimated cost: \$3,290,895.

Plan D - All elementary schools would be K-5 with first, second and third grades at Akron and Burket redistricted to allow for Primetime. Mentone would receive no new space, but would accept students from Akron and Burket to allow for Primetime. Burket would receive a new multi-purpose room and Support Areas Services space. Akron's gymnasium would be remodeled for elementary physical education, would receive a new library and the stage would be remodeled for art and music. Some Support Areas Services would also built. A new Middle School for grades six to eight would be constructed near the High School. Estimated cost: \$3,993,000.

Architects Lee Brockway and Doug Wickstrom of Howev Associates, Michigan City, discussed these plans with the board and will meet in another work session with trustees Wednesday, Nov. 7 (tonight).

The last few days have taken a toll on many of our local young .. students at the high school and Mentone have had to cope with the death of 17 year old Ryan Russell, and students at Akron have had the more difficult task of trying to understand the death of 14 year old Robert Dale

A young friend of mine at Tippecanoe Valley tried to speak to about it last week, and she finally ended her struggle with the words, "It just isn't fair."

She's right-death at times seems to be extremely harsh and misplaced, and in these cases there's no question death came too early. The real tragedy when a young person dies is that it's not only the loss of a life, but the loss of a future. And it's especially difficult for other young people to come face to face with mortality in

such a cruel manner as our children

This isn't an easy article to write, and I gave up trying to be wise or profound on about the tenth try. I'm writing mostly for our young people, because I think they need a lot of moral support right now. from as many quarters as possible

Please, kids, don't lose sight of the fact that there are always people who care and who will do anything they can to help you through difficult passages in your lives. It doesn't necessarily have to be a parent or guardian or relabut can just as easily be another trusted adult, like teacher, counselor, minister or just a friend. You never have to go through rough times alone, and there are times when you shouldn't even try to deal with things alone. Don't ever be afraid to ask for help. Some of us are always here for you.

Claypool awards trash contract

The town of Claypool has a new owner of its mobile home park and will soon have a new trash

Stafford and Sons, Warsaw was warded the contract with a bid of \$4,950, which was the second-low bidder among the four that put in their hids.

Other bids were \$4,734 from Clevenger Disposal, St. 848 from Lakeland Sanitation, North Webster; and \$5,760 from Borden Waste-A-Way, Goshen. Lakeland has the present contract with the town now.

Stafford's contract will start January 1 and the company will pick up trash on Wednesdays between 10 and 11 a.m.

Mobile home park owner, Richard Monk spoke to the board about his purchase of the mobile home park on Graceland Avenue in the south part of town. He had received approval from the county and state. The previous owner was Robert Warner.

Some plans mentioned included renovation of the park and putting in streets and gutters. If that is the

case, the town then would have to run new water lines in that area. Extra revenue could be generated for the town and water company.

Monk currently owns and lives in a mobile home park in Burket.

It was also reported that the back hoe was repaired by A.H. Choitz and Company Inc., South Bend, and returned to the town. The total cost of \$2,502 was only a fraction off the estimated expense of \$2,500

The town currently has another back hoe it has been leasing so they will sell the back hoe that they just had repaired.

A proposed ordinance is being prepared for the start of Claypool's Plan Commission. Don Richard, Area Plan Director will check with the state and county code books to make certain the Claypool ordinance is not in violation of any laws. If any adjustments are made, they will be taken to the new town planning members for study before the ordinance is approved and published.

The next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 21, at 7 p.m. in the town barn.





DRY SOCKET

Normally, following the extraction of a tooth, the wound in the jaw usually heals within a few days without complications however, in every life, there is allways an exception. One of those rare complications that can follow an extraction is known as a dry

As the name dry socketi implies, the clot that normally forms shortly after tooth removal, fails to develop or is tost. This leaves a bate and unprotected socket exposed to bacteria, saliva and footh debris. The lining of the socket is sensitive and when bared to this irritating environment, a great deat of pain can develop. About all that can be done is to keep the area as clean as possible and the patient as comfortable as possible with medication and place an anesthetic dressing into the open socket until nature develops a protective covering for the exposed socket. The reason why a dry socket forms is not fully known. Some believe it results from a rapid bacterial action, others because of a fault in the blood clotting mechanism.

Project SAFE begins

Both utilities and Community Action Agencies will begin accept-ing State Allowance for Energy (Project SAFE) applications Wednesday, November 7, according to Governor Robert D. Orr.

Those who are 59 years of age and under should apply at their local Community Action Agency. Those 60 years old and older should apply at their natural gas utility if this is the fuel with which they heat. Those who heat with any fuel other than natural gas, should make application at their electric utilities," states Jean Merritt, utilities," states Jean Merritt, executive director of the Indiana Department on Aging and Com-munity Services, the state agency which administers the program.

Annual income guidelines for the 1984-85 heating season are more liberal for those over 60 years of age than they are for those 59 and younger.

"One of the reasons older people receive special consideration is that their medical expenses are higher than the expenses of those who are younger," Mrs. Merritt remarks. "Those who are 60 and older often spend one-third of their incomes for medical services. This can leave them in a bind. They are often confronted with a choice--get needed medical care or pay fuel and electric bills."

When the head of household is

59 or younger, gross yearly household income cannot exceed the following figures if the household is to qualify for Project SAFE:

> Gross Yearly Number in Household \$6,225 8.400 10.575

If there are more than three people in a household, \$2,175 should be added for each additional person.

Those heads of household who are 60 years old or older will qualify for Project SAFE assistance pro vided they meet the following guidelines:

Number in Gross Yearly Income \$ 7,470 Household 10,080 12.690

additional For each member, \$2.610 should be added to arrive at gross yearly income.

Mrs. Merritt indicates that those who apply for Project SAFE as-sistance should bring with them proof of income and a copy of current heating and electric bills.







Akron to receive new middle school

Elementaries to be renovated

Before an audience of approximately 35 patrons, including a sizeable contingent of Akron businessmen, the Tippecanoe Valley School board Monday laid to rest the option of building a middle school-near the high school site.

Trustees John Mellott, Joe Crill, Jim Royer, Cecil Miller and Fred McSherry approved plan B from the four schemes originally proposed by architects from Fanning and Howey Associates, Inc. Under this plan, which as a total projected cost of 4,223,442, the old Akron High School will be demolished and a new middle school built on the north side of Rural Street. The present gymnasium in the old building, however, will be saved and renovated.

Burket and Mentone schools will also be renovated with a small amount of new construction to allow for expansion under Prime Time.

Breakdown of costs is \$2,721.715 at Akron, \$617,590 at Mentone, \$398,590 at Burket, and miscellaneous cost of \$485,547.

Abbey showed the type of dishwashing scrubber he uses with a water soluble or mineral oil stripper, and said a wire brush is usually necessary with open grain woods such as oak, ash or chestnut to remove all the dark stain that permeates the grain. Always sand with the grain, and hardwoods such as cherry and maple need very fine sandpaper to prevent scratching. Polyurathane is the most commonly used varnish today, but should be used up fairly soon after the can is opened. Mr. Abbey did not recommend steel wool except for perhaps the final polish. Be sure to use a good, clean brush, which can be cleaned with mineral spirits. Mr. Abbey showed many examples of his work, including chairs with rush seats and pieces made with veneer.







The parade was held in the gym with all students participating and cheering for their favorite book. A book was given to each room participating, and a special treat was won by the winning rooms.



ARE DENTAL X-RAYS SAFE?

Sometimes dentist wish they had the eyes of "Superman" but we don't. So we use X-rays. The X-ray is one of the dentist's nost useful diagnostic tools. Many defects of the teeth and the oone which surrounds them cannot be seen by the dentist's eye fhey are only visible on X-ray film. Before you ask let me answer dental X-rays are safe!

Millions of X-ray films have been taken by dentists without a factual report of injury to anyone. Exposures which used to take for 8 seconds are now made in a fraction of a second. Metal filters to keep back unwanted ratiation are standard on all new model X-ray machines. Older machines are equipped with filters and electronic timing devices to enable them to use high speed X-ray film for short exposure times.

The National Committee on Radiation Protection states. There is no scientific evidence that the proper use of modern X-ray equipment for dental diagnostic purposes will be harmful to the patient.






