THE FRACTURED TOOTH

Every year thousands of people have accidents that cause damage to face and mouth, sometimes resulting in a fractured tooth. It may be caused by an auto accident or sports or an accidental fall at home. Whatever the cause, a fractured tooth presents a serious problem and should be treated by the dentist immediately to prevent infection and loss of the tooth.

if the fracture hasn't penetrated to the pulp of the tooth, the dentist will apply medication to ease the pain and place a temporary cap over the tooth to protect it. Later the tooth will be crowned to restore its appearance.

If the pulp has been exposed by the fracture, the tooth must be treated within 24 hours to prevent infection and other complica-tions. Any pulp that becomes infected will have to be removed to save the tooth. Eventually the pulp will heal when the dentin or inner wall of the tooth knits back together.

Mentone Town Board vacates streets and alley near SR 19

Richard Dickerhoff and owners of property in the Robert Reed Subdivision were present at the Mentone Town Board meeting to request that the town vacate one alley and three streets in that area. Attorney Bradley Tandy explained to the board that with the vacating of the areas each property owner would deed half of the roadway to the property owner across from him. They would in turn grant an easement to the Town of Mentone for any areas that would contain water mains.

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The reason for the vacation is so that Richard Dickerhoff can maintain and use an access to his property where he plans to build a new house. The board approved the vacating of the three streets that are unnamed.

and the alley in the Robert Reed Subdivision. The board agreed to the vacation as long as they are given easement rights to repair any water lines. This involves 17 feet in the alley and 20 feet in one of the streets. At the present time the streets and allev are covered with grass and are not used. The subdivision was plotted in 1952 but has never needed the streets or alley used. Each property owner will gain one half of the street or alley next to him when the legal papers are finished.

The board discussed the need to have a person certi-



Akron, Mentone and Burket Schools will participate in the

The intent of the campaign is to show that there are many enjoyable alternatives to watching television. According to Chubb, there is reason to be concerned about excessive television viewing. According to A.C. Neilson and Co., the national average of family viewing time in 1983 was 7.02 hours per day. Newsweek Magazine reported back in 1977 that average kindergarten student has already seen more than 5,000 hours of television in his young life-time. That is more time than it takes to obtain a college bachelor's degree.

Another point that teachers regret is that the television industry estimates that 2 million children under the age of 11 are still watching TV at midnight each night.

When a child is not getting sufficient sleep, schoolwork suffers.

The focus of the campaign is that as the number of television viewing hours increases, the hours left for reading, playing, family and church activities, homework and hobbies decreases. If participants can go one week without television, they may become more selective in their future television viewing.

Chubb is careful to point out that it is not the intent of this campaign to evoke a negative view of television. On the contrary, the television medium plays an important role in our lives. News

coverage is essential and there are many TV specials and documentaries that most people would agree are worth watching. A number of programs are of educational value as well, and are pertinent to classroom discussions.

Students will be given the opportunity to sign pledges at school. Adults may come in or phone and the pledge card will be given to you. The pledge period will cover Tuesday, Nov. 12 through Sunday, Nov. 17.

TVSC tax rate established

faxpayers in the Tippeanne Valley School system will pay more money next year following approval of a 46.01 cent tax rate hike during the first of a three-day budget hearing conducted Monday, Nov. 4, by the State Board of Tax Commissioners in the Kosciusko County Justice Building in downlown Warsaw.

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The Valley School Board advertised its proposed 1986 tax rate at \$4.529 per \$100 assessed valuation, which was slashed to 4.3071. However, this year's tax rate of \$3.847 will be increased by 46.01 cents to the new 1986 tax rate of \$4.3071.

As a result of the increased lax rate and minor adjustments in the school corporation's financial statement, no budget cuts are anticipated for the next year.

The large increase in the tax rate can be attributed to the hike in the cumulative building fund rate from 35 cents to \$1. The \$1 cumulative building fund rate has been approved by the state for the next three years. This fund will raise tax dollars to pay for a \$1 million expansion project at the Mentone and Burket Schools. The school

board proposed to raise the tax dollars first to pay for the expansion project to avoid a bond issue

However, a bond issue will be needed to construct a new \$3.2 million building to replace the 1912 building at Akron. A Bond Hearing wil be held in February.

The Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation will have an additional \$216,000 in state support next year. The state legislature passed a law last year that now gives an equalized share of funds to school corporations that receive under \$1,900 per pupil.

In the past TVSC received under \$1,900 per student in state support, which means local taxpayers previously paid a greater proportion of student expenses compared to other school districts

Wrap it right

anne Billman has half a dozen "dos" and "don'ts" for customers who want to be sure their holiday parcels get delivered.

Don't box yourself in - use the right container. Boxes must be adequate in size for the items being mailed and provide enough space for cushioning material. They must also be strong enough to hold the weight of their contents. If the box has for an adequate space address (cross out confusing information), it is not necessary to wrap it in paper. If you use paper, however, be sure it is equivalent to the kind used in grocery bags (60-pound weight). Fiberboard tubes and similar long packages are acceptable if their length does not exceed 10 times their girth.

Give yourself some cushion. Cushioning absorbs and distributes shock and vibration. Examples of good cushioning materials are foamed plastics, corrugated cardboard and loose fill material such as polystyrene, popcorn or shredded newspaper. Loose fill material should completely cover the items being

Close parcels up right. Use tape, not string or rope, to close packages. Cellophane and masking tape should not be used. Pressure sensitive. filament-reinforced tape is recommended and should be wrapped around the parcel at twice.

Addresses are important. You can spend a fortune on wrapping, but your package

will never reach its destination if it is not addressed right. Print or type the address clearly on one side of the parcel only. It is also a good idea to put the name and address inside the package in case the address becomes illegible in transit. It's best to write the address right on the package, rather than use an address label.

Don't mail your pet elephant. Packages must not exceed 70 pounds. They must also be at least 31/2 inches wide and 5 inches long, and total length and cannot exceed 108 inches.

Don't overinsure. If your parcel is valuable, you might want to insure it, but insure it only for its actual value. The Postal Service pays claims based on the actual value of lost or damaged items and not a higher insured amount.

Following these six sug-gestions will help the Posta' Service get your package where it's going on time, in good shape.

Tippecanoe Valley School Board accepts bids for new school buses

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board met on November 11 for their reguschool board meeting. Bus bids were accepted and Kerlin Bus Sales of Silver Lake was awarded the bid for three new 1986 buses. They offered a combination bid for and chassis at \$25,617.07 per unit or a total of \$76,851.21. Kerlin added a deduction of \$500 if the units were paid for within ten days of the delivery. Even with the deduction Kerlin's bid was not the lowest. Imperial Enterprises of Lafavette offered a combined bid of \$25,348.37 per bus with a \$550 deduction for payment on delivery.

It was in agreement that the board would have the busec checked out and that they met the needs of the school before paying for the final product. The board made the final decision based on the fact that repairs would be easier with a local company, and the school also has parts in stock that will fit the Kerlin bus as well as the old buses. Imperial's Bluebird line would cause the corporation to start an additional line of parts.

Other companies that offered for bodies came from Leonard Supply, Lee School Supplies, and Merchanthouse Transportation Sales. Chassis bids came from

Boardman Chevrolet, McCormick Motors, Louderback Motors, and Tom Wood Pontiac

A report was given by Superintendent Baxter Paige on the 1986 budget hearing with the state tax board. The tax rate was set at \$4.3071 which was cut from the \$4.529 per \$100 assessed valuation. With the cut there still is a 46 cent increase on the rate from this year. The increase is from the appro-val, from the state, to raise the cumulative building fund from 35 cents to the maximum \$1 for a period of three years. The additional funds are needed to pay for_the \$4.2 million building projects at the elementary schools. The tax rate will raise \$2,293,279 for the corpora-

Superintendent Paige also reported on the asbestos that was removed during the October 31 and November 1 teacher's institute. After the removal the air was tested and was reported to be at a safe level. Paige stated that this could have been a hazardous situation, but all is under control now.

The board voted to accept bids for temporary loans to help finance costs until tax money is received. The estimation recommended by Superintendent Paige was \$481,800 for the general fund, \$123,000 for the debt service fund, and \$99,300 for the transportation fund. Bids will be accepted until

December 9 when they will be opened at the regular monthly board meeting.

The board voted to accept a donation made by the Tippe-canoe Valley Band Boosters for 70 new band uniforms for the high school band. The board also noted that many hours of hard work had been done to accomplish this goal for the band. The band was noted also for their nice appearance in the new uniforms at the recent football games and competitions.

The board also voted to accept a donation from Pike Lumber Company. Akron, for a Burroughs Computer System, B-700. The appreciation was also mentioned by the board for Pike Lumber Company's support given to the school in this manner.

Maternity leave was granted for Shelly Walgamuth until December 6. Mrs. Walgamuth teaches English at the high school.

Cynthia Caswell was hired to fill the position of the Gifted and Talented Resource Person. She is a licensed teacher who will be spending approximately ten hours per week with the program.

George Welch was given permission to serve on the North Central Association evaluation team for Kouts junior and senior high school from Dec. 3-6, 1985.

Terry Randall was approved as the high school assistant wrestling coach.

A GED certificate was signed for Steven McFarren.

The board heard principal reports on grandparents week at the different schools. Burket school announced that their open house would be the 18th of November. Akron reported that their Campbell's soup label drive has started to help the children obtain free material for their classrooms. Book Week was announced to be observed in all the schools with different activities at each one.

High School principal John Hill announced that the fall play "Harvey" is to be presented November 19-21, and the band is to participate in the Great American Band Contest at the Hoosier Dome.

The board will have special meetings for the next two months. On November 19, construction bids for the Mentone, Akron and Burket building projects are to be opened. November 25 at 7:30 p.m. the board will review and accept construction bids. On December 2 at 7:30 p.m. the board will review the budget on the building project. December 9 will be the regular scheduled monthly meeting.

AN OLD-TIMEY WOODEN TOP

Amidst the gadgetry and gimcrackery of modern toys, a plain old-fashioned plaything can provide refreshingly straightforward fun. And it would be hard to imagine a more old-timey (or more entertaining) toy than a homemade wooden top.

The little spinner can be built by even the most casual woodworker. Construction requires a coping saw, a drill (with 1/8", 3/8", and 7/16" bits), some sandpaper, a small roundhead finishing brad, carpenter's glue, a 3-1/2" length of 3/8" dowel, a 2" section of 1" dowel, an old shoestring, a piece of scrap wood that measures about 3/4" X 5" X" and a hour or so of your time.

of 1" dowel, an old snoest-ring, a piece of star working material. The patterns shown must be redrawn on 1/2" squares and then traced onto the lumber. Be sure to retain the center-point mark on the circular piece when you do so, and place the pattern on the wood so that the wood grain runs the length of the handle.

Cut the wood to size, and then carefully drill a pilot hole through the handle and cope

out the round opening that serves as the top's string housing. With that done, bore two 7/16" holes, one centered above, and the other below, the large hole. Then carefully drill a straight 3/8" hole exactly through the midpoint of the flywheel to serve as the

Now take the piece of 1" dowel, find the center of one end, and drill a 3/8" hole about Now take the piece of 1" dowel, find the center of one end, and drill a 3/8" hole about 1/4" deep. Using a coarse piece of sandpaper, fashion the opposite end of the peg into a point and tap the brad right into the tip. To complete the gyro part of the top, lightly coat one end of the 3/8" dowel with glue and push it through the wooden disc until a 1/4" nub protrudes. Cover the nub and a small area around it with adhesive, and fasten the state of the state 1/4" nub protrudes. Cover the nub and a small area around it with adhesive, and fasten the metal-tipped peg to the flywheel and its saile. Then temporarily slip the shaft through the handle's two holes, and drill a 1/8" bore through the rod to serve as a catch for the string. Finally, sand the entire toy to a smooth finish, round the edges, and stain it adding a coat of polyurethane, if desired.
To set the gyro spinning, alide it into the handle, thread one end of the cord through the axle hole, carefully wind the remaining string around the shaft, and pull it smartly. The whirling top will drop from the handle and dance merrily along any hard, smooth surface.

CIA Failure William Casey Origins-The Future

WASHINGTON, D.C. understand the troubles at the Central Intelligence Agency one must understand the agency's back-ground. The United States is a newcomer in the game of espionage and intelligence.

As late as this century, between the two world wars, Secretary of War Henry Stimson set the tone with his adminition that "gentlemen don't read others' mail." That high-flying philosophy lasted only until the eve of World War II.

Then the late "Wild" Bill Donovan, an Irish-American but an Anglophile, was given the responsibility by President Roosevelt to build a U.S. Intelligence Service. It was, of necessity, a rush job.

Some fine accomplishments

followed in the war years but many blunders, wasted lives and far-out projects also followed. Lives were recklessly wasted in the final months of World War II dropping agents into Germany when the war was obviously won-agents seeking to perform unrealistic tasks.

The record of the CIA since World War II has been spotted. Its per-formance during the long Vietnam war is generally rated poor.
From the original CIA steward-

ship of Allen Dulles--an agent in

-- To Switzerland in World War Il--the performance of directors has also been at best varied

William Casey, the present chief, is not popular in Congress. He had trouble winning confirmation in Congress. There have, however, under Casey, been some unquestioned ac-complishments. And he is considered pros as better than average.

What handicaps the CIA is the difference between the stereotype of typical American and Europeans and Russians. The average American, thus the average CIA agent, probably doesn't realize the shock foreigners feel when let loose in a wide-open media-dominated society America.

Defectors are thrown into this goldfish bowl, their revelations, confessions, etc., leaking into print almost as fast as they make them. They worry about family at home. If they have no family here, the American way of life can suddenly seem quite commercial, impersonal and materialistic.

Two recent Russian defectors who chose to return suffered such experiences, and one also lost his lover. Congress and the administration are therefore currently restudying the psychology, protection, and general handling of defectors.

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
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

Fire hazard

Homeowners and mobile home residents who rely on electric heat tapes or pipe heating cables to protect exposed water and drain pipe from freezing are being urged by government safety experts to inspect the tapes or cables now for possible fire hazards before the onset of winter.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, over 500 reported home fires are believed to have been caused by heat tapes or pipe heating cables over the last seven years. In many cases, improperly stalled tapes and cables trip? gered the fires.

CPSC said heat tapes and cables are commonly used in crawl spaces and in the substructure of mobile homes. beach houses, mountain cabins, cottages and other parttime dwellings where exposed pipes could freeze during the winter. Some heat tapes are plugged in the yearround and are activated by a thermostat when the outdoor temperature approaches freezing. In other situations, homeowners plug in the approved for use on the tapes in the fall and unplug specific pipe used in the them in the spring.

CPSC said homeowners or licensed electricians should make annual inspections of heat tapes or pipe heating cables to detect any latent fire hazards. If cracks are found in the plastic insulation or bare wires are exposed, the tape or cable should be replaced immediately.

Inspect tapes to make sure they were installed according the manufacturer's in structions. Of 35 home fires involving heat tapes which were investigated by CPSC the agency learned that 40 percent of the heat tapes were believed to be "over-wrapped;" the tape was lapped over itself when it was installed around the

Homeowners buying new or replacement heat tapes should use the proper tape for the proper pipe. Know the diameter of the pipe and the length of pipe to be protected when you shop for the heat tape. Since there are many kinds of pipes permitted by local building codes (copper, galvanized steel, plastic, etc.), make certain the heat tape you buy is

How to cook your turkey

Even though turkey is available all year round in many forms, November is the month we think about Thanksgiving turkey for dinner. If turkey and all the trimmings are in your plans for Thanksgiving, you need to plan ahead for a successful dinner.

You can usually buy a turkey in any size you want. Some turkeys are as small as pounds, and big birds weigh 25 pounds or more. In some areas, turkey halves and quarters available. Do you know what size to buy? Allow 1/2 to 3/4 pound per serving for turkeys 17 pounds or over. For birds under 12 pounds, buy 3/4 to 1 pound per serving. In most cases, large turkeys are more economical that smaller birds. Also, left over turkey is great to use in future meals.

Buy a turkey that has a clean, waxy skin without feathers. You should look for a plump breast and legs with plenty of fat under the skin. A short turkey with a broad breast gives more meat than a long, narrow bird of the same weight.

To preserve the quality and safety of the turkey, store it properly after the purchase. Store in the refrigerator or freezer, depending on the form purchased and how soon the bird will be roasted. Refrigerated storebought birds can be safely stored in the refrigerator 3-4 days before roasting. Frozen store-bought birds should be kept frozen or immediately defrosted and roasted

Frozen turkeys must be thawed before following Either of the thawing methods may be used. The method will depend on the amount of time and the space available. Thaw in refrigerator. Thaw bird in it's original wrapping on a tray in the refrigerator. A small turkey thaws in 2-3 days. Larger turkeys take 3-4 days. The other method of thawing is in cold water. Place frozen turkey (in its original wrapping if water tight) in sink and cover with cold water. Change water frequently to speed up

thawing.
A small bird will take 1-3 hours to thaw and a large bird, 6-8 hours. Do not keep turkey in water thawing. Refrigerate or cook immediately. Once the bird has been

thawed, it should be roasted. Place turkey, breast side up, on a rack in a low pan. A rack keeps the bird out of the juices and permits heat to circulate freely to allow even cooking. Insert a meat thermometer in the center of the inside thigh muscle. Be sure the thermometer does not touch the bone. Roast at 325 degrees or until the thermometer registers 180-190 degrees F. The exact time will vary with the size of the bird, temperature of bird at beginning of cooking, size of oven, covered or uncovered, stuffed unstuffed.

If you're not using a thermometer, allow 15 to 20 minutes per pound. To test for doneness, press the thick part of the drumstick between your fingers. Be sure to protect your fingers with a paper towel. Meat should feel soft. Move drumstick up and down. It should move easily or twist out of joint.

Turkey should be cooked thoroughly. Never partially cook it and finish it later. Bacteria can survive partially cooked poultry. To prevent overbrowning and drying out, cover the bird partly with aluminum foil placed lightly over legs and breast, when thermometer reaches 150 degrees F. or gets too brown. Brush the turkey occassionally with pan

drippings or fat.

Carbon monoxide hazard

The possibility of carbon monoxide poisoning has prompted a warning from government safety experts that home heating systems converted from oil or coal to natural gas should be inspected by a professional chimney cleaner or furnace technician before the start of the winter heating season to correct any health hazards to

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the accumulation of soot deposits on the inner chimney wall from years of oil or coal heating contributes to the possible


After the heating system is converted from oil or coal to gas, soot deposits tend to loosen from the chimney wall and drop to the base of the chimney. If enough debris falls, it may block the exhaust from the gas furnace and could cause a buildup of carbon monoxide fumes in the house.

The safety agency said people exposed to carbon monoxide often experience symptoms associated with 'having the flu," including fatigue, dizziness, nausea, headaches, irregular breathing and loss consciousness.

CPSC said homes which continue to be heated with oil or coal do not experience this problem.

The safety agency urged homeowners who have converted to gas heating, or who are considering change, should have the chimney inspected now by professional or certified cleaners who are familiar with soot buildup in chinmeys. If there is any accumulation of soot at the base of the chimney, it should be cleaned before activating, the system.

Annual checks should be made until no soot deposits are found in the chimney.



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

The situation was tabled until a proposal could be made to the school board.

The board proposed that the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation pay one-half of the expense of re-routing. Clerk Sara Jane Sutton reported that Public Service stated the school corporation would have to pay charges of rerouting in the situation similar in their business.

Social Security checks will have a new look

Over 500 Social Security checks delivered to the Akron area, will have a new on December 3, according to Thomas Potratz, manager of the South Bend Social Security office.

The familiar green punchcard checks that Security beneficiaries have been receiving since 1940 will be replaced with a new, more counterfeit-resistant and cost-effective paper check. Taxpayers will save \$6 million per year in paper costs and storage space. More than a dozen security features, three times more than the old check, are contained in the paper, the design and even the ink.

The new check features a full-length reproduction of the Statue of Liberty on the left, and a muted close-up of the Statue's head and torch on the right, over a multicolored background ranging from light blue to pale peach.

The letters "USA" create a background pattern on the front and back of the check.

New law to help **Selective Service**

Under a new law signed by President Reagan, appointment to Federal jobs will be denied to men who have not registered with Selective Service. The new law, effective immediately, applies to students seeking temporary summer employment, as well as men searching for permanent employment with a Federal agency or depart-

Commenting on this new requirement, Selective Service Director, Thomas K. Turnage stated, "I am pleased and very reassured by the continuing Congressional support of the registration requirement. Not only does this law encourage compliance with the law among eligible young men, it also increases public awareness of the requirement. As always, our primary intent is to register men not prosecute

Offered by Senator Strom Thurmond (R-SC), and known as the Thurmond Amendment to the Defense

Authorization Bill, the amendment was co-sponsored by Senators Mattingly Nickles. Denton, East. Gramm, Helms, Humphrey Warner, Johnson, Wilson, Hollings, Symms and Murkowski. Rep. Sonny Mont-gomery (D-MS) had introduced similar language in the House of Representa-

Men of registration age must be registered to receive Federal student aid and job training benefits. Additionally, registration is a requirement in some states for various employment opportunities, such as law enforcement agencies and permission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 and later years are required to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Registration takes only five minutes at any post office. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years imprisonment.

In a mental hospital the past doesn't intrude on the daily routine unless it is bidden by some external stimulus.

Mollie took her picture out of her dress pocket and smoothed the edges before she gazed intently at the familiar faces. It was hard to recall why she was smiling but she remembered the warm feeling of the moment. Although she had never said so, it could be that the picture had become precious to her, not because she was smiling, but because the other face in the picture was looking at her with understanding and affection, like a

real friend, a friend she had met and known for only one brief hour before Christmas but a friend who had told her by her presence that she cared that Mollie was alone at this season and that she had not only a gift to share, but her time and herself as

Mollie slipped the picture back in its familiar place in her pocket. How long till next

Christmas she wondered. Not long! "Next" Christmas is coming fast and there is a great need for gifts for Mollie and the others who share her isolation from the season's activities. There is also a need for people to take

the gifts to the parties. You can smile for Mollie by selecting a special gift and placing it in the collection box at your local Hook's Drug Store or by calling your local Mental Health Association and offering to bring a gift or to serve at the local Christmas party in the state hospital, community mental health center or nursing home. 


