Red Ribbon week celebrated at Akron School

The students and staff at Akron School celebrated National Red Ribbon Week during the week of October 22-29. The Red Ribbon Campaign originated in 1985 when a federal agent was murdered by drug traffickers. The red ribbon became the symbol to reduce the demand for drugs, just as the yellow ribbon symbolized the hostages in Iran.



He's A Meatcutter... Not A Butcher

After Doug and I married, people would ask, "What does your husband do for a living?" I would reply, "He's a meatcutter." Inevitably they would say, "Oh, a butcher,"

Believe me there's a difference. After giving serious thought to exactly how we became confused into believing a butcher and a meatcutter

were the same, I came up with a logical explanation. (You have to remember, I wouldn't know where to begin carving - somewhere before the tail and after the horns!)

Many years ago, when people would visit the butcher shop for their meat, the person behind the counter would be the butcher and meatcutter. However, as the years have passed, the job has become more divided. The butcher is the person who kills the animal and then prepares it for shipping to stores in halves and quarters for the meatcutters to break down into the cuts of meat sold in packages as we know it. With the exception of locker plants where the butcher also cuts the meat, the two professions are usually separate. Hence, the

I believe the first thing taught in school to each of the meatcutters-to-be is "You are not a butcher." The first time I made the mistake of introducing Doug as a butcher when we were engaged, he came up for air and promptly explained the difference to me. And, rightly so. I can't say I envy either profession, but I certainly have a lot of respect for them both. Just think about it.

The next time you're driving down the road and you see a cow standing in the pasture grazing, see if you can decide where the T-bone steak would come from. How would you decide what is made up into hamburger? Do you realize in order to have one cut of meat you have to ruin another so sometimes you must make a choice between the two? There also is to be a certain amount of fat left on the meat, but not too much. Do you know the difference? The list goes on and on and on. Like I say, I wouldn't have any idea where to begin, although I figured the horns were where you started and the tail was where you stopped. Some tell me even this isn't the limit!

Meatcutting isn't only limited to beef, it includes hogs, poultry, lamb, etc. An occasional deer has been cut by many a person which would be along the same lines as a beef, I would imagine, but have you noticed the saws and knives in a meat department? There are several steps in getting the meat ready for us to take home and it's amazing to watch these people do their jobs.

Yes, there is a definite advantage to being married to a meatcutter. He knows a good cut of meat so I don't have to worry about choosing my own like most people. He also can make a special cut, if notified ahead of time and takes note of other meat counters if we stop in at another store to pick up an item. Besides, I'm convinced the best meatcutter is a person who enjoys eating meat...they can see the meat they are cutting as the end product being taken from the oven.



The Cooks Shine At Thanksgiving

All my memories of Thanksgivings past include the bountiful meals at home and since being married. My mother made Thanksgiving dinner an event, not only with a 25 lb. turkey which she basted periodically in the wee hours of the morning, but with the trimmings and rich, luscious desserts.

I have made Thanksgiving dinner for us a few times but most of the time we are at Doug's mother's. She also has made Thanksgiving dinner special. Her dressing is beyond comparison, as well as the rest of the meal. Although the desserts aren't the most important at Jenny's, her dressing is my dessert! However, she gave me the best recipe for pumpkin pie I've ever tasted. Sharing her recipes has been most appreciated which has prompted me to share some of mine with you.

Date Nut Pudding

1 Cup Granulated Suger

2 Tsp. Baking Powder 1 Cup Dates or Raisins, Cut Fine 1/2 Cup Pecans, Chopped

1 Cup Milk

Mix together the above ingredients and pour into large baking dish.

2 Cups Brown Sugar, packed

4 T. Butter Pour this mixture over the batter already in the baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Don't let the looks deceive you, this is a rich and tasty dessert served with whipped



LIVING WILL UPDATE: Many of you have written about the advisability of having a Living Will in place before a crisis strikes that forces family members to deal with crucial decisions such as disconnecting life support systems or refusing surgery for an already terminally ill

Thank you to those who have sent in suggestions on etting up a Living Will. The following reflects a consensus of your advice:

of your advice:

1. Make sure your state recognizes Living Wills as legal.

2. Have your Living Will witnessed by at least two people.

3. Determine what it is you want done. For example, (if this is what you want) have the documents state clearly that if you are found to be terminally ill, or are in a coma, that you do not want to be put on life support systems

4. Also state (if this is what you want) that your chart carries a note: "Do Not Resuscitate" if you are in a terminal situation and have lapsed into a coma.

5 Be specific about the type of treatment you do not want the staff to provide, ie., surgery, tubal feedings, transfusions.

transfusions.

One reader made a very important point: "My cousin's wife learned, to her shock, that despite the living will my cousin signed, and which we thought was foolproof, the hospital refused to withdraw feeding and hydration from him until his wife got a court order. He endured several days of existence — I can't say life — in that time (And) I don't want to sound hard hearted, but my cousin's family also had extra expenses as a result of their keeping him alive without any hope of recovery."

Appropos of this comment, it's a good idea to check with the hospital caring for the patient to determine if, and how much of, the stated intentions in the living will they will honor.

Ms. Millie's reception reminds us that there are programs permitting animal shelters to bring dogs and cats into nursing homes for an always welcome round of holding and cuddling.

DNR ask hunters to obey regulations


The Indiana Department of Natural Resources is asking Hoosier hunters to ex-ercise caution and obey regulations during deer season. Deer season opened November 11, and already three people have been killed and several people have been hurt in hunting accidents

"This has been a tragic start to the deer season in Indiana," said Paul Greenwalt, DNR Deputy Director for Law Enforce-ment and Administration. "All of the accidents investigated by conservation of-ficers this season could have been prevented. Hunters need to obey the laws and just be careful out there.

Since last Saturday hunting accidents have claimed the lives of a four-year-old boy in Poscy County, a 21-year-old man in Adams County and a 29-year-old man in Grant County.

The DNR is urging people to make sure they are wearing orange clothing when they hunt. Hunters should also be very cautious when hunting from tree stands. Four of the hunting accidents which have taken place this season involved people hunting in tree stands.

The DNR offers a free hunter education course which covers several topics includ-ing the proper handling of firearms. During discussions with other people, I've been surprised at what people remember from their childhood. I've often wondered what my kids will remember from theirs.

We just tried to nap a while. The problem arose when we tried to get out! We turned, squeezed, scooted and maneuvered our way around and found ourselves stuck! I'm sure if we hadn't been laughing so hard, it would have been easier to get out...but we had the most fun! We laughed years later about it.

Whether the boys will remember it or not, I certainly will remember the first and only time Doug was snowed out away from home. Collin was little and Chris just eight or so. Doug had called and was staying with a friend in Warsaw, so I wasn't worried about his safety. However, Chris was concerned why his daddy wasn't home. I tried to explain and then decided playing games would help. The Monopoly game was chosen, and we played for most of the evening until bedtime. I remember checking the doors an extra time that night and being very relieved when Doug arrived home the next afternoon.

Even though winter is nasty, it can make some nice memories if we can turn bad times into good. While my folks worried about being snowed in, we kids would play in the snow and go in for hot cocoa. Our boys and Doug have braved snowstorms carrying in wood for a cozy fire, and after the awful job of digging the drive out after a storm, the boys would play in tunnels in the drifts. One thing seems to offset the other, I guess. Before you think the winter is so bad, you might think about what good things you all will remember. You might be surprised. Afterall, I remember being stuck in the bathtub with my mother!

> THE **POST CROWN**



If you have a tooth that is so badly broken that it is fractured right down to the gum line, your dentist may recommend root canal therapy (to save the tooth) followed by the post-crown procedure. In this procedure, a post is used to provide added support to the crown. The post he uses is a metal rod with a core at the end of it. After root canal therapy, he will fit the metal post directly into the tooth's canal and cement it into place with the core extended out to receive the crown. This is the first stage. A crown will then be prepared to fit over the core so the tooth will be restored to proper function and appearance. The crown will be shaped to match the natural contours of your teeth and a natural-looking color selected.

Often times a tooth will become so badly damaged and decayed that your first thought might be to have it extracted. Any natural tooth is worth saving because no artificial tooth can fully replace its function and chewing efficiency.

U.S. Marshals Turn 200

This year marks the bicentennial of the U.S. Marshals Service, the nation's oldest federal law enforcement office. For most Americans, the image of a U.S. marshal is a "wild West" law enforcement officer with a white cowboy hat and a star on his chest. But by the time U.S. marshals were enforcing laws out West, they already had an impressive history And their legacy of law enforcement is as vital today as ever.

Our first Congress created the position of U.S. marshal with the Judiciary Act of 1789, which established the federal judicial system. The president was authorized to appoint, with the consent of the Senate, a marshal to serve in each of the nation's judicial districts for a four-year, $renewable \ term. \ George \ Washington \ appointed \ the \ first \ U.S. \ marshals.$

The U.S. marshals became the federal authority in those districts, supporting federal courts; carrying out orders issued by judges, Congress and the president; and even taking the census every 10 years until 1870.

The popular image of the U.S. marshal was forged as our nation expanded westward. Although the "wild West" era spanned only about the last quarter of the 19th century, this is the period most closely associated with the U.S. marshals. Men like Deputy Marshal Bat Masterson, sheriff of Dodge City, Kan., and Deputy Marshal Wyatt Earp, a hero of the "Battle of the O.K. Corral," became national figures while enforcing federal laws in the new territories. It was, however, a dangerous time to be a marshal, as more than 100 met their fate at the hands of outlaws

Today, the major focus of the approximately 2,600 U.S. marshals, 500 sworn deputies and 1,000 special assistants is ensuring the safe conduct of federal court proceedings. They provide security at federal criminal court proceedings and manage the Federal Witness Security Program, which protects witnesses who testify against major criminals such as organized crime figures and drug traffickers. The Marshals Service ensures that the witnesses are given a new identity and are secure in a new life. And reminiscent of its "wild West" image, the Marshals Service also is charged with bringing fugitives from the federal court to justice Only these days, the fugitives are more likely to be part of a drug ring than a cattle-poaching ring

To commemorate the bicentennial of the U.S. Marshals Service, a museum exhibit, "America's Star: U.S. Marshals 1789-1989" is touring the country until May 1991. The exhibit schedule includes stops in major cities in Oklahoma, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Washington, Colorado, Louisiana, Missouri, Texas, California and New York before returning to Washington, D.C. Further information on the exhibit is available through the U.S. Marshals Foundation, McLean, Va. Also, a memorial to the approximately 400 U.S. marshals killed in the line of duty is being constructed in Oklahoma City, Okla.

After 200 years, U.S. marshals still are appointed by the president of the United States. And they still proudly wear on their chests the star that symbolizes their motto: "Justice, Integrity, Service." lil

Art Shell, Head Coach

Congratulations to Art Shell. He has succeeded in becoming the first black head coach in modern National Football League history. I'm very happy for him and very happy that it finally has happened.

Al Davis feels that Art Shell has what it takes to restore his Raiders to their glory years of the 1970s and early 1980s, when Shell was an offensive lineman with the team. Shell won his first ball game as a head coach, and now he has a long road ahead of him. Not because he is black, but because the Raiders just don't have the players to be a winning team.

I hope that Davis gives Shell more of a chance to succeed than he gave the man Shell replaced, Mike Shanahan. Shanahan had proven himself a talented assistant coach with the Denver Broncos, but Davis gave him only a season and four games to prove himself as a head coach. Every NFL head coach deserves more time than that.

Shell was elevated to head coach from his position as the Raiders' offensive line coach. He has spent a total of 22 years with the team as a player and coach, but I'm convinced he won't be there much longer if he can't somehow make the Raiders a winner.

Aside from wondering if Shell can bring success to the Raiders, the big question is why did it take so long for a black man to be offered a head coaching spot? The fact is that there are many black NFL assistant coaches and college head coaches who are even more qualified than Shell to be head coaches. There have been for years, with men like Willie Wood, who was a head coach in the short-lived World Football League. When will their time come? Certainly a qualified black coach deserves as much of a chance to succeed or fail as a qualified white coach does.


Probably the biggest reason it took so long for this to happen in my opinion was the reluctance of NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle to address the lack of black head coaches as a real issue. He simply did nothing about it. It's no wonder that Al Davis, a man often at odds with Rozelle over the years, is the one who finally made the move to hire a black head coach.

Frankly, as a well-qualified person who tried to make it into the man agement side of NFL tootball and got nowhere. I didn't think I would see a black head coach for another 10 or 15 years. I am hopeful this break in the so called "color barrier" will mean everyone who is qualified to be a head coach in the NFL will be considered when the positions become available.

Again, the main problem now for Art Shell is winning lootball games. If he doesn't, he'll be gone like Mike Shanahan. That's the bot tom line, and the bottom line is colorblind. Id

Akron became aware of the need for a fire department in the early 1900's. In March of 1912, the town board make a trip to Indianpolis t inspect a fire engine, priced a \$700.00. Firms from Chicago and Logansport also came to see the boead with competitive prices. The board was very willing to start a Fire Department for the town, but said that the initial step would rest with the taxpayers. The people would have to express their wants and desires by petitions. At that time, however, Akorn did not have a water system.

In 1916, the board contacted the National Water Works Co. of South Bend for consultation. It was decided to locate the water works on a lot belonging to E.L. Scott. It is now called South Mishawaka Street. Two large wells were dug in August of 1916. THe Hammond brothers constructed the building which was finished in Oct. 1916, but the pipe lines took the rest of the year to complete.

Around the 27th of April, 1917, a full company had been organized with Earl Brad-

way as chief; Albert Scott, assistant chief; Karl B. Gast, secretary; Walter Haldman, Guy Walter Havey Arthur, Bert Bright, Earl Sausman and Jake Rufe, members.

In 1919, Dr. E.A. Whallon and Marshall VanLue were made new members.

In 1920, a motor driven fire truck, which cost \$2450.00 and had 500 feet of hose, was

purchased. A few years later a decision was made to build a new town hall that would

purchased. A few years rater a decision was made to build a new town hall that would also house the fire department. The building was completed in 1929.

In 1914, a complete—a fighting outfit for rural use in the township was purchased. A two ton Dodge truck was bought also with a hose and other equipment. The truck has a 500 gallon per minute capacity at 120 lb, pressure.

Fire Chief Harvoy Arter fall from the fire truck arrents to a fire and use faithful.

Fire Chief Harvey Arter fell from the fire truck enroute to a fire and was fatally injured in 1942. He was greatly missed by family and the community. The fire department was saddened and troubled over his loss.

A new truck obtained under lease-rental plan with American LaFrance Co., was delivered to Akron in January of 1964, to replace the older LaSalle model.

In 1979 the department had four trucks; a four wheel drive grass truck, one tanker, and

two pumpers. Three trucks were used for rural fires and one was strictly used for town

The volunteer fire department has been in service for 69 years. They are deeply appreciated by the town and surrounding areas for their dedication and courage.

In 1989 the fire department has came a long way with housing in the new Akron Town Building. Today the firefighters take classes to ensure better firefighting and to ensure their safety. Five of the firemen have had State Certification in basic firefighting; three have taken first class certification; four in master investigation and 1 in master tac-

tics in fire investigation. Eight are attending either the first or second class classifaction. The department is equipped with 2 pumpers, tanker, grass truck, pumper truck and

Knowing your interest in our environment, I knew you would be interested in an article published by the Indianapolis Star Sunday, November 19.

In this article, they point out the vital importance of trees to the residences in an area and the contribution to increased values.

More than a half century ago, in the depth of the great depression, a family of business people looking for a new location picked out the town of Akron. Their biggest impres-

sion, as recorded in their memoirs, was the beautiful trees.

That family happend to be the D. A. Pike family, forebears of our company. Since trees are our business, in operating tree farms, we are extremely interested in what is

happening to our trees and our forests.

Unfortunately, today, in our town, there is a continue disregard for and appreciation of and destruction of some of our most beautiful trees. If the leaves are a little bothersome or the location of trees doesn't match 100% the location of a proposed development,

It's no secret that real estate values in our town are dead in the water, evidenced by those properties which have had for sale signs on them far too long.

Not all of our people are opposed to trees, as was evidenced here by quite a project by Dr. Charles Miller and Dick Tilden who planted a good many trees and shrubs in town,

at no charge whatsoever to those requesting them.

The value of trees to residential construction is clear when you drive through the countryside and see, quite frequently, a woodland taken out of timber production and converted into a residential development.

As it is often with natural resources that are handed to us on a plate, they're taken for granted and fall into discard. Fortunately, a half century or more ago, our forefathers believed that the trees were a benefit and so they were planted to be left in the hands of those who wished to destroy them.

In some fashion or another, we seem to be able to come up with the money for projects in our community, some of which have put us in the highest tax bracket in the county, but we seem to be disinterested in appropriating the necessary part of our financial budget to this natural heritage of the preservation of trees. Hopefully, this can be reversed and, in the next half century, our natural resources restored.

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
