Fulton County Health Department Notice

The incidence rate for AIDS cases, and for those infected with the HIV virus continues to rise at an alarming rate worldwide, and Fulton County is no exception. There is a great need for education about AIDS, and also for services to those persons and their families who are experiencing this illness on a personal basis. The time is near when everyone will be touched by AIDS, through a family member, friend, co-worker or loved one.

Many communities, even smaller rural ones, are establishing Task Forces to help with public education about AIDS, and to help provide services to those in need. Several concerned

citizens in the Fulton County area have expressed a desire to form a Fulton County AIDS Task Force to function as a central organization to help with the education and service needs within Fulton County.

An organizational meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 19, 1991 at the Rochester Community Library Meeting Room. The meeting will start promptly at 7:30 p.m., and should last no more than 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Anyone in the community who is willing to help in meeting the enormous challenges ahead is encouraged to attend. I will be glad to get settled at one place for a change. It took us 20 hours to come from Camp Lee to Fort Benning, Georgia. We were on the convoy for 2 days to come to Chester, S.C.

I am a truck driver at last, but anybody can drive a truck. Tell everyone I said Hello. I hope to see you all at Christmas or New Years.

As the guests arrived they were presented with lovely corsages with an announcement card telling of the marriage of Peg and Ken on Nov. 4, 1940.

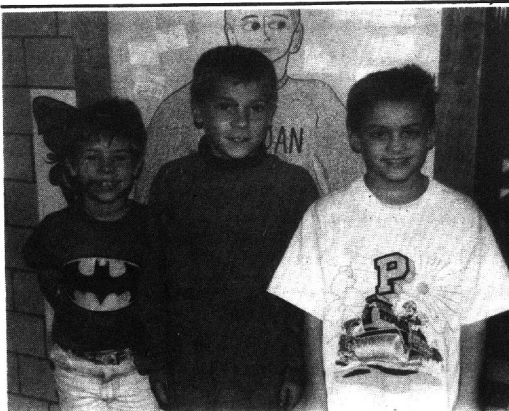

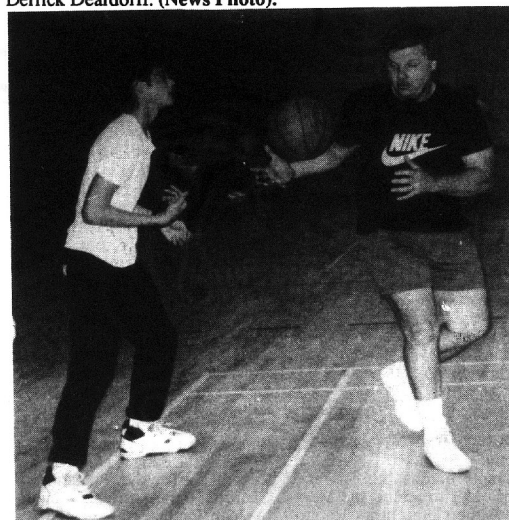
Today's Election Draws Full Slate-Although some neighboring towns have no contests slated this fall, Mentone will have a full slate of candidates for each party in Tuesday's town election. Jim Tibbets, Republican, the incumbent clerk-treasurer, will be challenged by Dean Myers, Democrat, in seeking his second four-year term. The clerk-treasurer's responsibilities include keeping financial records for the corporation, making a secretary's report of the meetings, and issuing and collecting water bills. The salary is set at \$1200.

Regardless of the outcome of the election, the town board will have at least two new members on it as present board members Jim Gates and Loren Tridle, both Republicans, did not enter the campaign. Bill Rathbun, present Republican board member, Jim Whetstone and Kenneth Bush comprise the Republican town board slate. They will be opposed by Gerald Romine, Dick Webb, and Frank Hardesty, Democrats. Town board members each receive \$150 per year.

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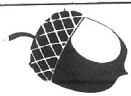
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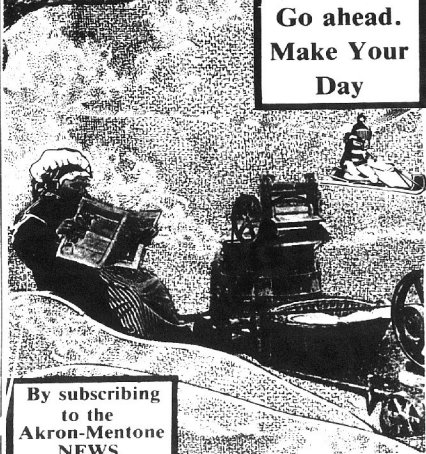
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Scenes Around Town

Darrell and Mary Ann King recently returned from a weekend with son Phil and his wife, Kendra, where they watched Phil sing at the State Theater in downtown Cleveland's newly renovated Playhouse Square Center.

Phil's appearance in the chorus of two one-act operas, *Cavalleria Rusticana* and *Pagliacci* marked the first of four appearances he will make this season with the opera company. In December he will sing in Rossini's *Barber of Seville*, in February Mozart's *The Abduction of Seraglio* and in April he will sing in Moore's *The Ballad of Baby Doe*. The opera is accompanied by the Ohio Chamber Orchestra, which is in its twentieth season.

Phil's singing career began, of course, right here in Mentone, where he sang as a child all over Indiana with the King Family Singers and, later, starred in high school productions. He had training at Bluffton College and when he went to some special lessons at Akron University, the teacher there complimented his Bluffton training. At that time, he tried out and sang twice with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra. Many will remember his show stopping rendition of a German "lieder" in the Mentone Days Variety Show two years ago.

A member of the Blossom Time Chorus that makes two presentations a year with the Cleveland Symphony, it was from colleagues there that Phil got the idea to try out for the opera. It was quite an honor to receive four contracts from his first try-out.

Music is keeping Phil very busy these days. A full-time high school teacher, he is directing a production there, with practice after school, then goes to opera practice at night.

Mary Ann says the Playhouse Square Center is elegant, with crystal chandeliers and ornate gold embellishments. It houses three theaters which sometimes all present productions at the same time. The State Theater seats 1,400 people. The Palace Theater is about the same size, but the Ohio Theater is smaller for more intimate programs.

The stated purpose of the theaters, supported by donations from many companies and organizations, is to "incubate, produce and present musical theater, Broadway shows and popular music." A touring company takes opera, including children's opera, on tour. Their mini-residency program gives serious opera aspirants an opportunity for experience.

Mary Ann and Darrell weren't sure how they would respond to opera, but she says, "We like it if it's done well and this was excellent. We had a good time."

She says Phil and Kendra are really excited about him being in live opera. He told them, "You can't imagine being up there singing on the stage with people shouting 'Bravo, bravo.'"

It's a long way from singing in Mentone to appearing in live opera in Cleveland, Ohio. We must add to Cleveland's audience our own "Bravo, bravo, Phil!"

When Democrats failed to challenge Republicans many felt the election was over. Lack of campaigning on Mr. Hammond's part left many voters confused as to the write-in candidate was.

Many surrounding towns, such as Mentone, did not hold an election due to no opposition.

Valley teachers fail to ratify contract

In a vote taken October 29, teachers for the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation failed to ratify the latest contract offer from the school board. The vote was said to have been fairly close but an exact count was not available to the News.

Bernadean Howard, spokesperson for the teachers' negotiating team, said that while there are other small problems, provisions concerning insurance were the main stumbling blocks.

Under terms of the proposed contract insurance benefits would be reduced and the premiums paid by the teachers would increase. Mrs. Howard said the 3% raise the board has offered the teachers would not offset their increased insurance costs.

Contract talks between the teachers and the board first began in February, with negotiations conducted in earnest through the summer months. Valley teachers have been working without a contract since August when their previous contract expired. They are not alone in this situation. According to recent AP reports, teachers in half of Indiana's public school systems have not resolved their contracts.

Mrs. Howard said the mediation process between the teachers and the board is continuing, however, she was unable to predict when another proposal would be made or vote taken.

Valley patrons disagree on jr. high needs

Between 25 and 30 patrons of the Tippecanoe Schools were present November 4 to hear the long awaited report by the committee studying junior high needs.

Assistant superintendent Karen Boling, who chaired the 14 member committee, presented the group's findings on curriculum and program goals and concluded by saying the current facilities are totally inappropriate and inadequate for those goals.

Although the committee made no recommendations concerning buildings, Mrs. Boling said the group favored a 7th and 8th grade junior high rather than the 6th, 7th and 8th grade facility recommended in an earlier study.

Goals recommended for the junior high program included:

- * Integrating math applications, communication skills and career exploration throughout the curriculum.

- * Expanding the media center to provide resources for research skills and exploring fine arts experiences.

- * Developing decision making and higher level thinking skills, utilizing group work and interpersonal relationships and effective interaction with role models.

- * Providing an opportunity for special programming, developmental counseling and student participation in social activities.

- * Developing a closer relationship between teachers and students, with teachers responding to a variety of learning styles.

- * Developing an evaluation system that is appropriate for adolescents and allows students to achieve success on a daily basis.

The patrons questioned several aspects of the report.

Akron resident Charles Miller said universities didn't care if students had effective interaction with role models and he felt it was not practical to spend \$10 million for a school based on such "nebulous things."

Many of those present felt the money would be better spent making improvements to the current buildings, especially the Mentone School.

Carol Ellenwood asked if the committee has discussed remodeling the two buildings and was told the goals could only be met at a low level in those facilities.

Both Jim Saner, Akron, and Dennis Burch, from near Burket, criticized the lack of air conditioning at Mentone and Akron.

Some patrons were concerned about having junior high and high school students at the same site and others suggested more money be spent on raising teachers' salaries.

Randall Shafer questioned the current teacher/student ratios.

Others voicing concerns about buildings, curriculum or tax rates included Dick Day, Randall Leininger, Barry Peterson, Terry Randall, Joe Day, Phil Runkle and Polly Finney.

Mrs. Boling reminded those present that the committee had simply decided it was time to discuss options. Board president Fred McSherry reminded patrons that the high school would be paid off in 1994 and if the corporation decided to build, taxes would simply remain the same rather than decrease. Superintendent Baxter Paige reassured the group that any building plan would have to be approved by the state.

One thing most of those present seemed to agree on was the need to build a second gym. Problems with the current facility include not enough dressing rooms, lack of gym time for those not involved in competitive sports and the use of the facility by two or more classes or activities at the same time. The current gym is in constant use from 6 a.m. until 10 p.m. almost every day.

The proposed gym was described as being auxiliary in nature and more of a physical education facility than for competition. Paige stated that time would probably become available for community activities as well.

Terry Randall who coaches wrestling, said that he hoped the gym would have space for a weight room and a place for the wrestling team to practice. At the present time the wrestlers work out in the commons and are frequently distracted by other programs and cheerleader practice. Gene Hughes, Mentone, stated that the gym should contain a training room.

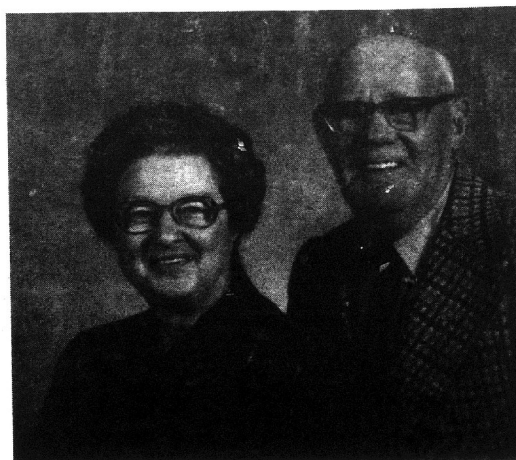

In Memory of Army Veteran Mentone resident Luke Hiers

"Luke thought the new cemetery was so beautiful," Emma Lou Hiers says, "like a big meadow. He wanted to be buried there." Luke's grave is close to the cannon and the flagpole which were erected in his memory.

If you haven't seen the new gates and flagpole by the cannon, off Pearl Street, in the new part of the cemetery, you really should make a point to drive back and investigate.

The flagpole was erected in memory of U.S. Army veteran and long-time Mentone resident Luke Hiers. It was purchased with donations from Luke's many friends and relatives, both in Mentone and Peru, and his co-workers at Midwest Spring.

Emma Lou says, "Luke always said the cannon didn't look like a United States cannon because it didn't have an American flag beside it. And Luke wanted to be buried near the cannon." Emma Lou appreciated so much the seven Mentone legioniers, whose post is no longer active, that came together to form the Color Guard for his funeral. "Taps," she says, "echoed from the trees and seemed to come from everywhere."

The majestic iron gates, secured between brick pillars, were recently built by the Cemetery Board, providing an inviting entrance to the tranquil resting place.

Up, Up and Away

Most of us can remember the excitement we felt on our first airplane ride. After the first few takeoffs and landings, however, the novelty began to wear off, and what was once fascinating became routine.

Flying was anything but routine more than 200 years ago, when two Frenchmen began experiments that today are considered to be the precursors of the entire science of aviation and flight. Every November, we celebrate the contributions of Joseph and Jacques Montgolfier during Aviation History Month.

The Montgolfier brothers began their aeronautical experiments in November 1782, filling paper and fabric bags with smoke and hot air. Seven months later, they succeeded in launching the first hot-air balloon flight. Spectators watched the balloon rise approximately 1,500 feet and travel about 7,500 feet before landing. This 10-minute demonstration was the first sustained untethered flight

of any object achieved by man.

It wasn't until 1903 that another pair of brothers, Orville and Wilbur Wright, built and flew the first airplane near Kitty Hawk, N.C. Aviation has come a long way since then. Commercial aviation took off after World War I, and today, airlines carry more than 465 million passengers every year.



Reading educators question advertising of "Hooked on Phonics"

Many parents are asking if a teacher thinks that ordering the "Hooked on Phonics" program would be good for their children. While this is a personal decision, buyers should be careful about what and why they are buying.

The International Reading Association is voicing concern about the marketing of "Hooked on Phonics". Prominent reading educators have warned that the company's ads make unreasonable promises that no single reading instruction program can keep. The ads suggest that this program can successfully teach reading to adult learners, young children, students of English as a second language, and virtually anyone else with any reading problem.

"Hooked on Phonics" contains eight 20-minute cassette tapes; nine decks of flash cards depicting letters, letter sequences, and words; four books of word lists corresponding to phonic features in the card decks; and one book of sentences that correspond with the word lists. The program sells for \$179.95 plus shipping.

Additional reviews are available. One main criticism of the program is that educators agree that decoding (word recognition) and meaning are necessary, but this program concentrates on only the decoding. It is felt by many that this program fails completely in engaging the learner, and that is what reading is all about. Simply being able to pronounce words does not make a person an interested reader.

One of the best suggestions that teachers of reading can give to parents and others who work with children, is to read aloud to them. Have them sit by you and read a variety of types of stories and books. Another tip is to let your children see you reading. Turn the television off and "just read". Soviet Sales

Although last year's shortage of cigarettes in Russia caused problems for the Soviet government, it helped the U.S. tobacco industry set new records.

With U.S. cigarette exports to the Soviet Union up 7,200 percent, the U.S. tobacco industry finished the first half of 1991 with a trade surplus of \$2.7 billion—an increase of \$247 million over the same period last year, according to the Tobacco Merchants Association of the United States (TMA). During the first six months of this year, U.S. cigarette manufacturers exported 88 billion cigarettes, valued at more than \$2.36 billion.

"The U.S. tobacco system can't seem to produce enough of the high quality U.S. tobacco that is in excess demand the world over," said Farrell Delman, president of the TMA, the nation's oldest tobacco trade association.

According to the U.S. Commerce Department, U.S. tobacco exports to the Soviet Union were worth more than \$60 million in the first half of 1991, compared with only \$869,167 in the first six months of 1990. This increase in exports to the Soviet Union is a result of a 1990 agreement that enabled U.S. cigarette manufacturers to sell billions of cigarettes to the Russian republic. The agreement followed a massive cigarette shortage in Russia, which led to street demonstrations and unrest.

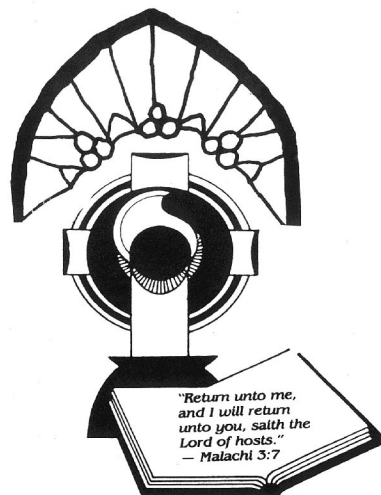

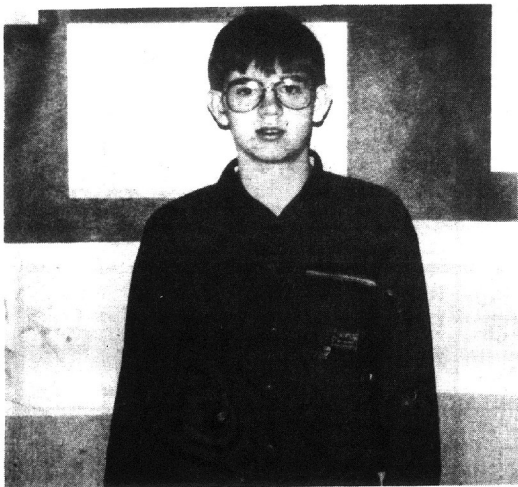

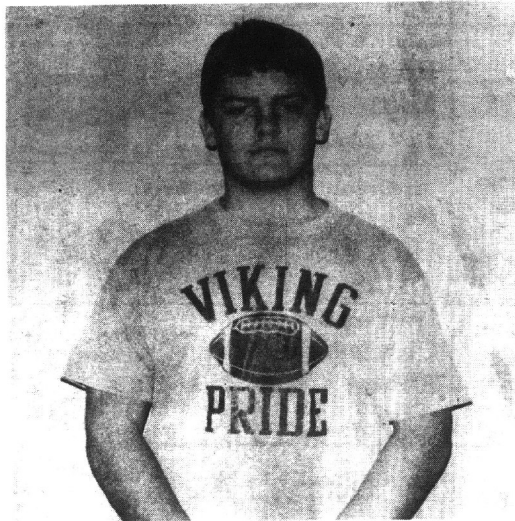
Wes Mappin, son of Phyllis Clark and Russell Clark, Akron, has been chosen as Academic Student of the Week.

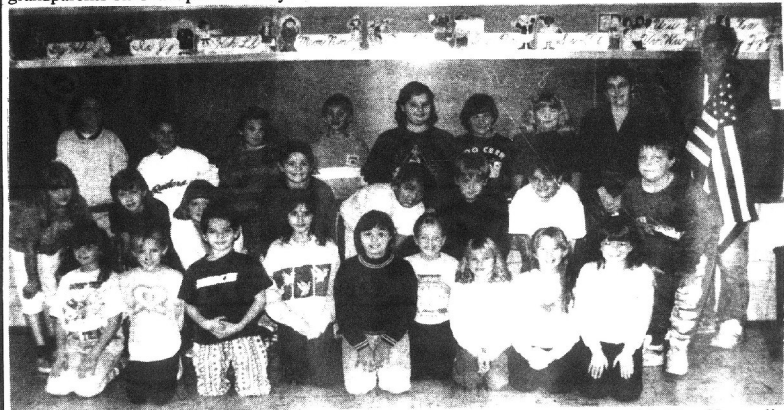

National Children's Book Week at Akron Library

National Children's Book Week, November 11-17, 1991 will be observed at the Akron Carnegie Public Library. During the week there will be special programs for the children.

Why not have the family visit the library during this week and discover the many things that are available for the entire family?

Be A Book Buccaneer is the theme for Children's Book Week this year. Books for the entire family are available as are video tapes, magazines, records and cassettes.

Anyone living in Akron, Henry Township, or Fulton County has free library service. Reciprocal cards are also available free of charge. This means you can borrow at almost any library in the state of Indiana. The Akron Library is also a member of the Wabash Valley ALSA, which means they can get almost any book that you may want even if it is not on the shelves.

The library cannot give free library service to people who live in Lake, Franklin, and Seward Townships in Kosciusko County or Perry and Allen Townships in Miami County. A family card for one year of service is available for \$40. In 1962 petitions were circulated in Lake Township, Kosciusko County and Perry Township, Miami County and in 1989 in Seward Township, Kosciusko County requesting permanent and tax supported library service in the township. Opponents of library service also passed petitions against

the merger. At that time, more people signed saying they were against, than people signed in support of the library. The law allows petitions to be passed every 12 months. It is possible for your township to receive library service, but only if you let those in governmental offices responsible for these decisions know your feelings. In the townships the elected officials are the Trustee and Advisory Board.

Please, do not express your anger at the library. The library understands your frustrations at being denied a library card, and shares in that frustration. If anything their not understanding of how this situation can continue is greater than yours. The staff at the Akron Carnegie Public Library believes in good library service and in what the library has to offer the community. Unfortunately, it is not in the library's power to choose who receives library service. THE IMPETUS TO CHANGE THE BOUNDARIES OF THE LIBRARY SERVICE DISTRICT MUST COME FROM THE RESIDENTS OF THE TOWNSHIP WITHOUT LIBRARY SERVICE.

This is a local issue and must be dealt with on a local level. The State Legislature has repeatedly refused to deal with the issue of unserved townships in the state of Indiana.

Let your appropriate local government official know your opinion. Don't be afraid to call, remember most changes in this country have come as a result of someone being angry about current

conditions.

Get involved with positive changes in your community.

November 15-Bring a favorite stuffed animal.

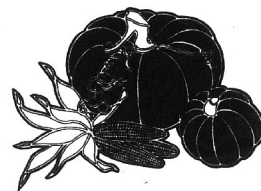

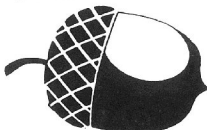

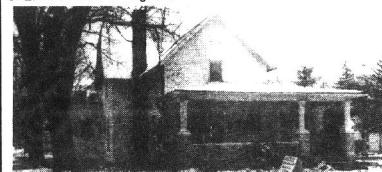

Aya Morishima spends school year with Murphy family

When 16 year old Japanese exchange student Aya Morishima arrived in Indiana on August 17, she was very concerned that her host parents, Maurice and Jane Murphy, would be able to find her in the airport. Accustomed to the huge crowds at the airport in her home city of Tokyo, she was amazed when she got off the plane at Fort Wayne's Baer Field and found herself to be one of only about fourteen people, and the only Japanese girl, in the lobby. "It was so small!" she says. "I worried for nothing!"

Used to the hustle and bustle and crowded conditions in Tokyo, Aya was surprised by the spaciousness and the size of the lawns in Akron. "In Japan the houses are very close," she says. "And here there are so many trees!" Seeing stars in the nighttime sky was a new experience for Aya. "I never saw stars before," she says.

Because she hopes to be an English teacher or a travel conductor, Aya saw being an exchange student as a chance to perfect her English. In Japan, English, which Aya has studied for four years, is taught only through grammar and writing. They do not learn the spoken language. Although it was a bit of a problem at first, the Murphys say Aya is even beginning to pick up American slang now. "And the week she spent in California before coming to Akron helped a lot," said Maurice.

Arrangements for her school year at Tippecanoe Valley were made through ASPECT, a non-profit student exchange program. The Murphys were very surprised when ASPECT called and asked if they'd host an exchange student. "We had never even considered it," says Jane. "But we'd both recently lost our mothers, and we thought maybe this would be a way to take our minds off our loss. And then we got really excited about what we could share."

Maurice, who works at Pike Lumber, and Jane, who works at Lake City Bank, selected Aya from a catalog containing photos, profiles, and letters from the students. "We chose Aya because she seemed to be so energetic and sort of wild and crazy and that's how we are!" says Jane with a laugh. The vivacious and outgoing Aya has certainly not disappointed her hosts. There is obviously a great deal of affection and rapport between Aya and her host family, which also includes a 16 year old "brother" Justin, a student at Valley and a 20 year old "sister" Jana, who is attending the University of Kentucky.

Classes at Valley are much easier, according to Aya, than those in the private school she attends in Tokyo. "American school is more fun!" she says. "In Japan, we just study, study. And we do not change classes, the teachers do. Here you get to meet more people from other grades. Also, we do not get to choose our classes. Our teachers choose."

Her school in Tokyo is in a five story building and all the students wear uniforms with jackets and ties. Each girl even has to wear her hair braided in the same style. A school year lasts ten months with classes held six days a week. On Fridays and Saturdays school is dismissed at 1 p.m. instead of the usual 3 p.m. "But we don't have homework," she says. Like nearly all Japanese students, Aya plans to attend college after graduation. "You must go to college to get a good job," she explains.

Japanese workers put in very long hours. Aya's father, an engineer for an automobile company, works from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., six days a week. He has been with the same company for 25 years. When a Japanese man takes a job after college, he will remain with that company until he retires. "Men do not change jobs," she says. "It would be considered a failure or a disgrace for a man to change jobs. Women can change jobs, though."

Aya's mother is a nurse and she has a 21 year old brother, who is attending college. Her father coaches a soccer team in his "spare time". Like almost all Japanese teenagers, Aya had a part-time job. She worked in a restaurant where she wore a

traditional kimono. The family lives in a two-story house in the Tokyo suburb of Hachioji, which has a population of 400,000.

Like all other Japanese, Aya and her family always remove their shoes at the door when they enter their home, as do their guests. "It is traditional," she explains. "Also, we sit on the floor, so it needs to be very clean."

Aya has been very surprised at how inexpensive things are in America. A portable TV that costs \$200 at Wal-Mart would cost \$2,000 in Japan. However, workers there earn much more. A common laborer makes \$60,000 to \$70,000 a year with an educated worker earning considerably more.

Japanese writing is quite different from English. While we have only printing and cursive writing, the Japanese have three styles. Katakana is used for the translation of English, Hiragana is used by children and teenagers, and Kanji is used only by native Japanese. Even if a foreigner had learned the Japanese language and lived there for 30 years, it still would not be proper for them to use the Kanji style.

The Japanese language can also be written either from left to right or up and down. The up and down style is traditional and is used by most older people and in books and magazines. The left to right style is used to write letters and in school books. "I do not like to write down," Aya says. "It makes my hand dirty."

Hugging is one American habit that Aya finds very different but pleasant. The Japanese seldom kiss or hug and never do so in public. "I have never kissed my parents," she says. When greeting or bidding someone farewell, bowing is the favored gesture.

Aya has been somewhat puzzled by some of her American friends who have "two mothers". Since divorce is virtually unheard of in Japan, she is not accustomed to the extended families of step-mothers and step-fathers that have become so common here.

According to Aya most Japanese don't like cheese but she says her favorite American foods are macaroni and cheese and scalloped potatoes. "I like cheese!" she laughs. "But I do not like raw fish!" she says of the traditional Japanese delicacy.

Shopping has become her favorite pastime. "She likes to shop 'til she drops!" jokes Maurice. "She just loves Wal-Mart." Shopping is also a popular pastime with teenagers in Tokyo, but is done mostly in large multi-story department stores, rather than in the small specialty shops that fill our sprawling malls.

Aya was also surprised that there are so few trains and buses here. Public transportation is very popular in Japan. "I used the train every day," she says.

In Japan, you must be 18 to drive and Aya says it will cost her \$2,000 to get her drivers license. Japanese drivers drive on the left side of the road instead of the right.

Drinking and drugs are not problems among Japanese teenagers. To use them would dishonor your parents and that is simply not done. In Tokyo, there are vending machines, similar to our Coke and Pepsi machines, that dispense beer and wine. But it is against the law for teenagers to drink alcohol so they don't use them. "It would be wrong," Aya says.

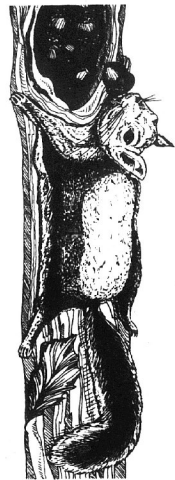
Jane was surprised to learn from Aya that in Japan all baking is done from scratch. They do not have cake or brownie mixes like we use. She has been sending Aya's mother packages of these quick and easy mixes and Aya's mother has been sending the Murphys Japanese snacks.

Because she has adapted so easily to the outspoken, forthright style of America, Aya is a little concerned about returning to Japan. "I worry that when I go back to Japan I might make my friends cry or be sad because I say such strong opinions. Here it is okay, but in Japan people are more gentle. They don't say things so strongly or openly. They don't say 'I hate this!' but now if I hate something, I just say 'I hate this!'"

Because she watched the American movie "Mississippi Burning" Aya was afraid Americans would be mean. She has been very pleasantly surprised. "The people are very kind. They are very friendly," she says. "Japanese people are not so friendly."

She also feels Americans have gotten the wrong impression of Japanese people from movies. "They make Japanese look stupid. Japanese are not stupid. 'Karate Kid is not true!' she says emphatically.

Life in the Murphy household is an example of the exchange student program at its best. There is so much for both sides to learn and share. "We've learned so much about their culture," says Jane. Aya agrees and adds, "I like Akron very much. I am very happy to be here."

Tippecanoe Valley School Board approves fund transfers

At its November 11 meeting the Tippecanoe Valley School Board passed the \$201,208 additional appropriation it had advertised earlier. A hearing on the matter will be held in the Kosciusko County Auditor's office.

The board decided to reduce the 1991 Capital Projects Fund by \$300,000 and reappropriate the money in 1992. The move was said to have been made to provide emergency protection for the school system.

They also approved a resolution to allow the borrowing of funds by the school corporation to meet expenses until the 1992 taxes are received. The temporary loan, which totals \$1,109,000, will be divided between the General, Debt Services and Transportation funds. Superintendent Baxter Paige explained that similar action has been taken in past years.

It was decided to begin seeking the services of architectural firms for the possible construction of a second gym and/or a centralized junior high building. The board will

interview several architects in executive session and present their choice at a public meeting.

In other matters, the board:

*Agreed to sponsor the Mentone Science Fair awards.

*Named Warren Steinbon to the position of Third Party Administrator for Valley's self-funded insurance claims.

*Approved a maternity leave for Akron elementary teacher Debra Lee.

*Heard reports from Akron, Mentone, Burket and TVHS principals. The elementary school students are preparing for Children's Book Week by writing books of their own. A first-person presentation by "Abe Lincoln" will also be part of the agenda. A program by Singing Wind is planned for Akron. The student council at Mentone is planning a food drive and the National Junior Honor Society will begin honoring a different seventh and eighth grade student each week. High school teachers are receiving computer training.

The board adjourned the public portion of the meeting early in order to meet in executive session to discuss personnel and teacher contract negotiations.

NOVEMBER 19, 1941
50 YEARS AGO

Locals-Word has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Herman Miller, Akron, of the injury of their son, Sp. 4 Robert A. Miller, in the fierce fighting in Tay Ninh Providence, South Viet Nam. Taking part in the army's operation sutteboro, Sp. 4 Miller had spent three days in the battle before he was struck by a fragment from a Claymore mine and received an injury to his right knee. Sp. 4 Miller has now been released for light duty at the base camp of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade, and may be sent back to the field if conditions warrant. The 196th has been in Viet Nam since August, and has been one of the units engaged in the battle of Tay Ninh, one of the fiercest battles of the war thus far.

50 YEARS AGO

Return From Canadian Trip With Two Deer-Dr. Davison and F.R. Burns returned Saturday after a two weeks big game hunting trip near Nipissing Lake, Ontario; which is nearly 300 miles north of Toronto. Each had a deer.

A five hour boat trip and a six-mile walk were necessary to reach the hunting camp where the Mentone men, twelve Elkhardt hunters, four guides and a cook spent two enjoyable weeks. "Doc" beat Burns slightly. He bagged a porcupine and also brought home a swell crop of whiskers.

24 YEARS AGO

Utter is cited for heroism-Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Utter, who live near Talma, received heroism medals presented posthumously to their son, Army Specialist Fourth Class James R. Utter, who was killed in ground action in Vietnam last April 15, in special ceremonies conducted Monday at Purdue University. Utter, 21 was cited for meritorious achievement in ground operation against hostile forces two Bronze Star medals and the Purple Heart decoration for wounds received in combat.

He was a member of the Ninth Infantry Division and had served in Vietnam since early last December. He would have been discharged this month.

His bronze stars, one of the highest decorations the Army grants its soldiers, came as the result of patrol action that resulted in his death. His heroic response to enemy fire is detailed by the Army in the following description that accompanied the medals.

"Specialist Four Utter distinguished himself by valorous actions while on a reconnaissance patrol with his unit near the town of An Nhut Tan, Vietnam, on April 15, 1967. "As the patrol was traversing a section of paddy they were ambushed by a large Viet Cong force. During the first 15 minutes of the ambush, the hostile fire was so intense that movement was virtually impossible. The friendly force was pinned behind a dike that ran parallel to the paddy. "Specialist Utter, heedless of the danger to himself, rose repeatedly to return enemy fire. The enemy fixed his position, due to the amount of fire he was providing for his fellow soldiers. However, he continued to suppress the enemy for five more minutes until he was finally hit and mortally wounded. "Specialist Four Utter's courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the Ninth Infantry Division and the United States Army."

Profile of Leroy Norris

A banner adorned the Teel Restaurant's outside wall recently, proclaiming "Welcome Leroy Norris." Inside the surprised Leroy was greeted by forty Baptist Church friends who chose to honor him on the occasion of his retirement from teaching the Mizpah Sunday School Class after 44 years.

A farmer and devoted member of the Baptist Church for many years, Leroy also served his country in the military with distinction for many years.

Born on a farm in New Castle Township and raised on a nearby farm, Leroy played basketball for Talma High School, graduating from there in 1930.

One of his favorite boyhood memories is of a bad snow storm. "It was a heavy snowfall," he says. "Some other students and I were on a bus driven by Mel McGowen. We were snowed in between the homes of Everett Rathfon and Delbert Hunter. The girls went to one house to stay overnight and we boys went to the other. It was noon the next day before, by horses and bobsleds, we could get home."

Leroy's wife, the former Mabel Sarber, of west of Mentone, remembers that storm too. "I usually walked from the old schoolhouse home (Carl Whetstone's present home). That day it was badly drifted. Dad came to the corner (where Harold Lucht lives today) walking to meet me and we walked on home."

Leroy and Mabel met at a meeting in the Methodist Church. Mabel and her friend, Eileen Mollenhour Fenstermaker Koenig, were carrying chairs upstairs. Leroy say them and "I though I might as well help them."

Both Leroy and Mabel went to college. Leroy is an ROTC graduate of Purdue and Mabel graduated from Butler University. Mabel taught school two years before their marriage and Leroy went right into farming.

After their marriage in 1935, they "went to housekeeping in the little house on the hill," now the Rod Walters home, near their present home. "We paid \$5.00 a month rent," Leroy says-- "and no facilities."

Their daughter, Elener, was born in 1936 and, the day after Christmas, 1940, they moved to their present home, the former Tommy Nelson farm.

Very soon after, February 12, 1941, Leroy was called to active military service, beginning an odyssey of five years for the Norris family.

Leroy remembers December 7, 1941. "It was the last day I was in civilian clothes. I went to the orderly room that afternoon and heard that Pearl Harbor had been attacked. We all knew our "one year" was no longer, that we'd be in the military for the duration of the war."

During those first years of World War II, the three Norrises moved often. They were stationed in: Fort Sill, Oklahoma; Fort Robinson, Nebraska; Fort Frances E. Warren, Wyoming; Camp Crowder, Michigan; Fort Chaffe, Arkansas and in Memphis, Tennessee.

Through those years, Leroy fulfilled many duties. At Camp Chaffe, his mission was to organize a company with himself as Company Commander. As it was a bakery company, Leroy subsequently graduated from the American Institute of Baking in Chicago.

In Memphis, Leroy, by then a colonel, was Inspector of Troops. He was assigned to the General's staff. In July, 1944, with the 2nd Army, redesignated the 8th Army, Leroy received overseas orders. When he left the States, he went directly to New Guinea. Mabel and Elener returned to Mentone to spend the rest of the war. During those years, Mabel lived, first with Bertha Sarber, then in the brick home near the school now owned by Larry Sanders. She worked for Dr. Davis, in the Old Yocum building that houses Boggs and Nelson Insurance today, and taught school one more year.

In New Guinea, Leroy, Executive Officer of Transportation Headquarters, supervised 27 officers and 33 enlisted men in his

transportation section. He supervised the movement of troops and supplies all over the South Pacific. His duties included issuing Troop movement papers and Ship's Position Reports.

"We sent out lots of orders, all by radio coded messages. No proper names or numbers were used at the beginning or end of the coded message."

Leroy remembers one day when the phone rang. It was Jimmy Roosevelt, the President's son, calling for U.S. Army Supply Services. "We are sending supplies home," he said. "How much can you handle?" Leroy agreed to take five truckloads of refrigerated material. Their principal meat at that time was Australian shredded swordfish.

From New Guinea, Leroy went to Leyte in December, 1944. September 1, 1945, the day before Japan surrendered, "General Eichleberger went to General MacArthur and came back reporting "Something big is going to happen." Leroy and his colleagues sat down and outlined a plan to move troops into Japan. "By the next evening, we had a stack of papers 3/4" thick with lots of details and logistics. General Eichleberger delivered the papers. Our plan was used and, the day of Occupation, we didn't lose a man."

"We could see one of our fleets was laying at anchor between Leyte Beach and Leyte Gulf the day Japan surrendered. They put on the greatest fireworks display I have ever seen."

Leroy says when the bombs were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, "We were thankful for them. They ended the war."

When the war was over, Leroy was liaison between his staff and the Navy. On one occasion, he researched available facilities and treated the Naval officers from the ship they were passengers on to a "country club" south of Yokohama. He says, "The price was exorbitant, but the Navy men really enjoyed themselves."

Although he remained in the Army Reserves, Leroy was "tickled when he was able to return home and raise hogs." The family returned to their farm, which Earl Zent and Earl Sarber had taken care of in their absence. They subsequently totally remodeled their house, where their son, David, was born in 1947.

Successful in farming as in the military, Leroy was named Hampshire Swine Breeder of 1983. For that honor he was inducted into the Purdue Agriculture Hall of Fame, and his picture hangs in the Purdue Life Science Building. He also received the Distinguished Service Award and Meritorious Service Award, June 12, 1982, from the Hoosier Hampshire Breeders Association.

Leroy retired from the Army Reserves in 1965, as a full colonel and retired from farming at age 75.

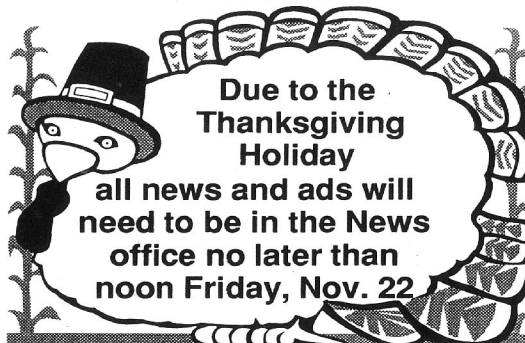
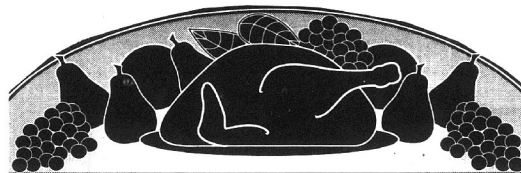

A total of \$22,806 in alternates was added to the original bid to arrive at the \$275,306 figure architect's fees will raise the total to \$291,267.36. The bids were all substantially less than previously estimated permitting a total of \$85,000 to be returned to the cumulative building fund. The question of bus drivers was discussed and the board voted to raise the pay of drivers for special trips. The previous stipends of \$5 for a short trip, \$10 for a half day trip, and \$20 for a full day trip were raised to \$7.50, \$12.50 and \$25 by a unanimous vote of the board. It was noted that Orville Burkett will move from the Corporation and will no longer be able to drive a bus, and possible replacements for him were discussed.

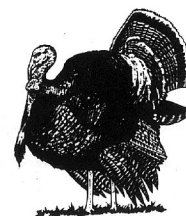
The Raders will travel to Indianapolis on December 18, to receive a certificate presented by Lieutenant Governor in the rotunda of the State Capitol.

The business, which offers the sale of video tapes as well as the rental of over 2,000 different titles, is open every day of the year, holidays included, for the convenience of movie aficionados. "A lot of people want to rent movies on holidays," says Ana. Regular business hours are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 12 to 8 on Sundays.

Akron Video features a 99¢ lifetime membership and on Wednesdays, all but the newest releases can be rented for only 99¢. Any video rented on Saturday is not due back until Monday. All the tapes are assigned a number to facilitate quicker location of specific titles and for the computerized check-out and return system.

The store offers VCR cleaning and machine rental and also rents Nintendo decks and the new, very popular, Super Nintendo. In addition to blank video tapes, they also sell movie posters and tape rewinders, which will help your VCR go longer between cleanings. Both the used rental VCR's and surplus copies of previously viewed videos are offered for sale at reduced prices.

A popular feature of the store during the hot summer months is the freezer containing Good Humor and other sumptuous ice cream bars.

The Villilons say they add six to nine new titles every week to their already large inventory, and are always open to their customers' suggestions for new films. "We try to keep the latest and most popular titles," says Ana. Ralph (as Rafael is commonly known) says, "You have to in this business to be competitive. We get the new releases in the same day they are released by the movie companies."

Ralph agrees with others in the video industry who feel sales will play a larger role in video store business in the future. He is stocking copies of "Home Alone" and "Fantasia," among other titles for the holiday gift giving season. "What we get in depends on our customers' wants and needs," he says.

The Villilons first opened their business two years ago in the building now occupied by Insurance 1. "Watching movies is our hobby," says Ana. "It got to the point where we were renting so many movies that we decided we'd be better off owning a video store than spending so much money renting every week. Since we always had to go all the way to Rochester to rent movies, we thought Akron needed a video store."

Priscilla says, "My dad had always wanted to own a business of his own, and we all thought it was a good idea," Ralph adds, "It's been a good way for the kids to work and learn about business and responsibility."

The Villilons moved the business to its present location a year and a half ago.

The family moved to Akron, from Chicago, nine years ago when Rafael was transferred here with Wen Products, for whom he still works.

"It was real hard at first," says Ana. "My whole family was in Chicago and I didn't know anyone here. So I went back to Chicago every weekend. I couldn't stand to stay away from my family."

"It was easier for me," Ralph says. "I had already worked here for seven or eight months before we actually moved. So just having my wife and kids here was enough for me. And I knew my fellow workers."

Having always lived in the city, the Villilons were accustomed to the brusque, impersonal, anonymous style of city life. They were amazed to walk down the street and have everybody say "hi." "In Chicago no one knows you're alive," Ralph says.

"I love it here now," says Ana. "It's so quiet and peaceful. There's no crime. To raise kids, this is the perfect place."

Rafael adds, "Our kids could never have had the freedom in

Chicago that they have here."

Ana, who works for H. & R. Block in Rochester, has volunteered to begin teaching Spanish to kindergarten students in Akron School.

The Villilon family speaks Spanish at home and Ana has noticed an increase in the Spanish speaking community in the Akron area. "When we first moved here, there were only two Spanish speaking families in town, now there are ten or more," she says. "We have several Spanish speaking customers who hardly speak any English. I see that they wait until one of us is in the store. For them it is a lot better to come in and rent movies from someone who speaks Spanish."

With their full-time jobs, the video store and accompanying their children to various school and sporting events, the Villilons have little time left for hobbies or other activities. They do, however, still enjoy watching movies.

"We want to thank the people of Akron for their kindness and friendliness," Ana says.

"The people here have been very supportive and we want to take this opportunity to tell them we really appreciate their business," says Ralph. "We hope that we can continue to serve their video needs. If anyone has any suggestions or requests for certain tapes just let us know and we'll try to get them."
