## Rick Doud Killed In One-Vehicle Crash

Richard E. (Rick)
Doud, 24, R. 5, Rochester, was pronounced dead
on arrival at Parkview
hospital at Plymouth
early Sunday morning hospital at lymbating early Sunday morning following a one-vehicle crash, 2½ miles west of Mentone. The accident occurred at 3:05 a.m.

Doud was alone in a pick-up truck that failed to stop at an intersection and hurtled out of control into the lawn of the Frank Nellans residence.
According to Marshall

County Policeman Jess Hartung, the investigat-ing officer, Doud's pick up was traveling north on Fulton County Road 900. Doud failed to stop at the intersection in time, applied his brakes, but it was too late. The truck went through the intersect-ion, struck some shrub-bery at the Nellans resbery at the Nellans residence and turned over. The 1964 pickup truck hit another grouping of shrubbery and flipped once again, throwing the victim from the vehicle.

The truck came to rest in an upright position, approximately 200 feet from the intersection. Doud died of a broken neck, crushed chest, multiple lacerations to

If your child feels that he can try new things without always being successful or do-ing a great job, he will feel much freer to do creative and attempt new tasks. The child who must always do a perfect job, be better than the rest or always finish everything he starts is handicapped

starts is handicapped from the beginning. Your child needs to know he is loved and accepted for himself--not for his grades or ball playing ability. If he learns through threats or parental pro-

tection that you don't want him to fail at any-thing, he will develop some doubts about himsome doubts about him-self and be more cautious about what he tries. He won't feel he can he can risk doing anything if there is a possibility of failing.

of failing.
Encourage him to do things with the understanding that sometimes we all fail to achieve as much as we'd like. He needs to learn that failing is a natural part of life, points out Mrs. Wilms. It does not mean that he is an inferior person. If he doesn't have to prove he is worthwhile with every activity, he will be betterable to accept an occasional flop, and go on to try again. The growing child needs the freedom to fail as well as to succeed if he is to explore and discover all his abilities and limitations.

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



### Fish Are Dying By Thousands In Tippecanoe River

The massive kill of fish in the Tippecance River from a polluting slug originating from accidental leak of chicken manure from a poultry farm near Mentone is apparently almost over, according to John Winters, stream biologist for the State Board of Health. He said reports Tuesday morning from the vicinity of Leiters Ford, where the slug passed the previous night, said no fish were dying. The slug reportedly was killing an estimated 95 percent of all fish Monday. massive kill of ated 95 percent of fish Monday.

The killing slug originated at the poultry farm when 127,000 gallons of chicken droppings were accidently leaked from a storage tank into a field some the riverse of the storage tank into a field some the riverse from the rivers 500 yards from the river. It is thought bulldozing work in the area cracked the foundation of the collecting pit

of the collecting pit for the manure. The chicken droppings in the storage tank were highly concentrated and "terrifically potant", according to a conser-vation spokesman.

The polluting slug is several miles long and takes an estimated two to three hours for the sludge to move through sludge to move through an area. As good water comes down the river behind the slug, there

should be a of water purity, the conservation officers said.

Fish were reportedly found Monday gasping for breath and turning "bel-ly up" as they submitt-ed to the pollutant and floated down the river.

flatheaded catfish.







## A Modern Red Riding Hood

It happended that a wolf was lurking in the bushes and overheard the conversation. He decided to take a short-cut to the grandmother's house and get the goodies for himself. The wolf killed the grandmother, then dressed in her nightgown and jumped into bed to await the little girl.

When she arrived, he made several nasty suggestions and then tried to grab her. But by this time, the child was very frightened and ran screaming from the cottage.

A woodcutter, working nearby, heard her cries and rushed to the rescue. He killed the wolf with his ax, thereby saving Red Riding Hood's life. All the townspeople hurried to the scene and proclaimed the woodcutter a hero.

But at the inquest, several facts emerged: (1) The wolf had never been advised of his rights.

(2) The woodcutter had made no warning swings before striking the fatal blow.

(3) The Civil Liberties Union stressed the point that, although the act of eating Grandma may have been in bad taste, the wolf was only "doing his thing" and thus didn't deserve the death penalty.

(4) The SDS contended that the killing of the grandmother should be considered self-defense since she was over 30 and, therefore, couldn't be taken seriously because the wolf was trying to make love, not war.

On the basis of these considerations, it was decided there was no valid basis for charges against the wolf. Moreover, the woodcutter was indicted for unaggravated assault with a deadly weapon.





but there is no wood to store for. No "will it start?" question. No flying sparks to fear. No smoke to cloud the sky. No ashes to sweep and carry out.

doors are open to electric fireplaces that are closed to others. They may go into apartments, mobile homes and rooms where venting is a problem. There are styles to hang on the wall or set on the floor, to fit into a corner or stand in the middle of the room. They go modern in sleek, colorful metal or traditional in brick-like fiberglass

the heat they give is just as versatile. Flame only can be switched on-now there is a fireplace that's compatible with air conditioning! When the fan-forced heater is used (it's usually hidden behind a grid in the base of the fireplace), a thermostat knob may be turned to select the heat. For bigger heating jobs (say, taking the chill off a garage that has been converted into a party room), models calling for 240-volt installation are available.

you can go electric even if you have a built-in fireplace. Electric logs, with or without heaters, are made to be plugged into 120-volt

if you continue burning wood, check where you store it. If logs rest against a wall, or on the floor, of the house, termites are encouraged to find a way through that wall or floor. A metal rack is safer



#### Fires, robberies plague Akron businesses

Fires gutted the off-ices of two Akron businesses early Saturday morning, causing thous-ands of dollars worth

damage as firemen from Akron, Mentone and Rochester fought to save the rest of the busi-

clean-up work has continued this week at the Akron Foundry and Thompson's Feed and Grain but both businesses are op-

erating.
It is thought the fires were started by a thief or thieves who borke into the offices and took small amounts of change. However, it appeared at the elevator that the arsonist had or that the arsonist had intended the fire to spread to the rest of the building as a bag of grain was propped against the door between the office and mill, holding the door open and giving the fire free

reign.
The fires were only a block and a half apart and both businesses are located in the southern part of Akron.

The foundry fire was discovered by Walt Benring, night marshal, as he made his routine rounds. He reported the fire and the Akron de-partment rushed to the scene.

However, Jackie Stucker, by riding to the fire with her father, Jack, became the hero-ine of the evening when she noticed the fire at the elevator as they passed it enroute to the foundry. She final-ly convinced her father to turn around and see for himself, an action that is credited with saving the elevator from destruction. The Mentone and Rochester fire departments were t called to the scene.

Akron department called back to the elevator Saturday after-noon after the fire a-gain broke out.

The fire at the foun-dry was confined to the office area, completely destroying all the office machines, but it did not spread to the rest of the plant. The elevator offices

For the children it is an evening of great fun and adventure but for some it can turn for some it can turn into a night of tragedy sorrow.

Each year too many children are injured and killed Halloween Eve by motorists unable to see them as they dart unexpectedly into the stre-et. Still others are badly burned as their badly burned as their costumes are ignited by flames from lighted candles and lanterns. This does not have to be if parents will observe rules of good sense and safety, such as the following suggested by a national insurance company:

Use only bright costumes. A White sheeted ghost is much more eas-

ily seen by passing drivers than a black clad witch. But even a bri-ghtly clothes child may be hard to distinguish be hard to distinguish as the evening darkens so a florescent strip, which would make him even more visible, is sug-

Parents should not allow children to carry lighted candles or lanterns. Many have been burned in past years when their costumes, which are often made of extremely light, highly flammable material, have caught on fire. A flash-light would be easier to carry and would also make it safer when crossing streets.

Be sure to chaperone all children who would not normally be allowed outside alone at night. Younger children should be out only in the

early evening hours.

Halloween is children A major Halloween who have been poisoned. Be very careful that candy, gum or anything edible is securely wrap-

Keep a light on in front of the nouse of that there is no danger ed by walking into objects or holes they can not see in the dark. If there is a pet in the household, keep him away from the door.

Children enjoy putting on makeup as part of their costumes but be careful of what they use. Cheap makeup can in many instances cause in many instances cause complexion problems for youngsters or hurt their

Finally, when your child goes out for the evening, make sure you know where he or she is going and what time he or she should be back.

Halloween can be a real treat for everyone. One way to insure it is to follow these simple rules of safety. The result will be an enjoyable and safe evening for children and parents alike.

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

From the time the first Strasbourg clock was built in 1352 with its figures of the Three Wise Men, the Virgin Mary and a rooster all carved from wood (the Magi bowing to the Virgin while the rooster flapped his wings and crowed as the clock was chimine). men clock was chiming), men have sought ways to re-cord time in unusual

Iowa lville, and there many clocks made by the brothers, some copies of older clocks and others of their own design, each intricate-ly hand-carved from from ly hand-carved from black walnut, butternut, hard maple, oak, cherry, mahogany, box wood or white holly. The clocks are housed in a building that was occupied by composer Antonin Dvorak his family during summer of 1893 and room of the museum contains memorabilia of interest to admirers of

the composer.
The Craigs brought back a booklet containing pictures of the clocks the Bily brothers have carved with simple, often home-made tools. Their craftsmanship is evident and is so pain-staking it often takes them four or five years to complete a clock. They were originally farmers and carpenters and carving was their hobby, one that their hobby, one that their father considered a waste of time. They have continued to carve clo-cks over the past 50 years and have estab-lished the museum with the stipulation the exhibit not be broken up after their deaths.

first clock the brothers built was eight feet high and weighed more than 500 pounds. Cherry and walnut, the design is a series of panels, representing scenes in American history. Indian villages, the Battle of Tippecan-oe, frontier settlers on the homestead, Washington being sworn in as president, a pioneer woman weaving and John Alden with Priscilla are some of the representa-tions on the huge clock. the space behind the Mayflower panel. Each of the other clocks contains intricate movements and many have chimes that play various songs. Such various songs. things as the wheel

dial hands and figures are made of wood but, with one exception, the clock works and chimes are factory made. The rest of the work is done by the brothers usdone by the brothers using veining tools, gounges and chisels. They also use a hat pin and needle for some of the finest work. The brothers have divided the work on the clocks with Joseph, 91, doing the designing, drawing of plans and joining of the woods and Frank, 87, doing nearly all the carving.

Clocks pictured in-lude a Roman Renaissclude ance clock, one depict-ing the struggle for ing the struggle for time, one showing the history of travel, a salute to Lindbergh, a violin clock in memory of Dvorak's visit to Spillville, and many, many other clocks, some with details so minute it seems unbelievable anyone could have carv-

anyone could have carved anything so fine.
Spillville is a century-old community whose residents are mostly of Bohemian stock. The Czeck tongue is still spoken there and a feeling of the Old World spoken there and a feel-ing of the Old World prevails. It is locat-ed near the little Brown Church and with it has become a tourist attrac-tion throughout the midwest because of its un-usual salute to the passing of time.

#### News Of Interest To Homemakers

The rainy damp days fall bring many problems to the blems to the home. The
dampness often causes
damage to fabrics, leather, wood, and books
in the form of mildew.
Mildew is a thin, often whitish growth produced on many surfaces
by molds. Molds are

imple plants belonging of the group known as ungi. Though always fungi. present in the air; molds that cause mildew need moisture and certain temperatures in order to grow.

Molds that cause milnotes that cause mil-dew grow on anything from which they can get enough food. In homes they develop most often on natural fabrics since many manmade fabers are resistant to mildew.

Molds that cause mil-dew flourish wherever its damp, warm, poor-ly aired, poorly light-ed - in cellars, ed - in cellars, in crawl spaces, in clos-ets, on draperies and rugs in basement recrespaces, in clos-on draperies and ation rooms and on shower curtains. These molds are also likely to grow in a newly built house because of the moisture in the building mater-

ials.
As the molds grow they cause considerable damage. They often leave a musty odor and discolor fabrics often caus-

or fabrics often causing rot.

To prevent mildew get rid of dampness. Soil on articles can supply sufficient food for mildew, so clean all clothing and household articles before storing.

Mildew should be removed as soon as it is discovered. The procedure varies with the type of surface covering. For further information, request a copy of "How To Prevent and Remove Milaw" from you leas! Form you leas! dew" from you local Ex-tension Office. COUNTRY-STYLE

#### Roberts Was Not In Fire

A set of X-rays found of last month has proven Clarence R. Roberts did not die in a garage fire at his home, State Police Superintendent Rob-ert Konkle said this

Roberts, who with his son Forest had once owned elevators in Akron, Mentone and Claypool, has not been seen since has not been seen since a fire destroyed a gar-age barn on his Nash-ville, Indiana property last November 18. A last November 18. A body was found at the fire, was believed to be Roberts but was later identified as "John Doe."

Konkle said X-rays of Roberts taken two years before the fire were found in a Bloomington hospital. When compar-ed with the skeleton of the corpse found in the the corpse found in the burned garage, there were major differences on nine crucial structural points.

Konkle said, "We feel we need to locate Mr. Roberts and attempt to determine from him the

determine from him the of his circumstances of disappearance an

disappearance and attempt to learn the identity of the victim."

He said in addition to the X-rays, blood type, hair and teeth of the corpse did not match Roberts'.

Derts'. He said a description of Roberts has been cir-culated in a nationwide attempt to locate him as a "missing person." He said no criminal charge has been filed.

Mrs. Roberts and her four sons have filed suits to recover \$1,173, 000 from insurance pol-000 from insurance pol-icies carried by Roberts.


