"There must be basic changes within the system itself. The first step is renewed emphasis on the basic skills of reading, writing and arithmetic. This means changes in classroom instruction instead of the constant lip service we get from school administrators." She continued, "Without the ability to read and write, no child is going to make use of the educational opportunity being offered him. Instead of going off on scatterchanges within the system itself. The first of going off on scatter-brained experimental tangents, educators all over the country must devote more classroom time and money to giving students the basic elestudents the basic ele-ments they need. No building contractor would think of attempt-ing to build a house without a sound founda-tion. Educators are not totally responsible for the decline in edu-cational standards; there have been outside pressures. Judges have forced their own ideas on schools, federal bur-eaucrats have superim-posed their ideas withposed their ideas with-out concern for the ed-ucational welfare of students. Public insis-tence is the only force to use to guide the school systems back to the basics. Let's teach our children to read, write and figure first; after that, we can add all the frills."

Pesticide certification outlined

Dear Editor:

The County Extension Service recently mailed information on Pesticide Certification to farmers refullication to farmers in Fulton Co. The ASCS mailing list was used. Anyone who did not receive the information can request it at 223-3397.

Under new federal and state laws, some (but not all) chemicals will be classified as restricted-use pesticides requiring that a person be certified in order to buy, use or supervise their use. No one knows which pesticides will be classified as re-stricted use ones, but the EPA will do this classification based on the chemical's potential for harming men, animals and the environment.

One can become certified by participating in four to five hours of training and successfully completing a worksheet (not a test). Upon receiving the worksheet, a record of participation and a \$5 check from the applicant, the Indiana State Chemist will send a Chemist will send a three-year permit to buy use restricted-use esticides after Oct.



TVSC teachers protest 'Teacher's Institute' lack

"Regardless of what "Regardless of what is said to the contrary, the ISTA is now a union organization," TVSC superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell said Monday evening in replying to ning in replying to teachers who questioned the school board's fail-ure to place the Indiana State Teachers Associa-tion Conference on Instruction on the school calendar. "ISTA negotiates. It authorizes strikes. Its meetings are closed to anyone except members. It can only be termed a labor only be termed a labor union. We can gain more benefits by using the time and money that would be spent on this program in studying a situation peculiar to our own system, such as the in-service days we have already had."

Harrell's comment came during his reply to Tip-

during his reply to Tip-pecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association president Bernadean president Bernadean Scott who had asked why TVSC isn't observing October 28 and 29 as Teacher's Institute and professional leave requests had been turn-ed down for all but a few of the teachers who wanted to attend.

"Anyone who wants to attend can use personal leave time to attend union organization meet-

ings," Harrell said.
Mrs. Scott questioned
the validity of a system
that permits some teachers to attend the sess-ions with pay but forces others, such as herself, to lose \$30 by attend-

ing.
Phyllis Gearhart, Akron elementary school teacher, asked board teacher, asked board member Don Snipes to distribute copies of "The Echo," a teacher publication (see excerpt on page 2) thar protested the fact local teachers will be unable to attend the Oct. 29 session at Manchester Col-

Harrell told teachers he doubted there was nough money to meet all the requests under restrictions placed on him in the policy manual and said the calendar had been adopted in March and could not be chang-ed now without having students go to school the two days following Memorial Day."

Mrs. Scott said all other school corpora-tions in the state were observing Teacher's In-stitute, but Harrell said, "I doubt that."

said, "I doubt that."

After giving teachers time to have their say, board president Fred Kindig chided them for not "going through channels." "This is not a matter for the board," he said, a reply that met with hostility from some of the teachers. some of the teachers.

The meeting, a short session that adjourned at 9 p.m., was attended by both Harrell and busby both Harrell and bus-iness manager Robert Forbes, who were injur-ed in a car-train acci-dent shortly after the last meeting. Harrell expressed their grati-tude to the central office employees and prin-cipals for carrying on cipals their absence.

He came out to talk to me and we and vacation were going to go in to see Harrell and Forbes together. They were out to lunch together and did not return until my classes ... ed. My husband went after after my classes had started. My husband went to see Dr. Harrell when he returned. He was told that it would do

told that it would do no good to go to the board, that's just the way things were.

Well, we did go to the board members. Before my husband left he told Dr. Harrell that if it were him, he'd be quitting, but if I was, I would hand in my written would hand in my written resignation by the end of the week. I did not do this. I

I did not do this. I went to board members; they talked to Forbes about me. I was told to go through channels and by the time I got to Dr. Harrell's office he told me, "I assumed you were quitting and to Dr. Harrell's office he told me, "I assumed you were quitting, and I've committed the job to someone else and I don't know how I can get out of it." My husband had asked Dr. Harrell to go and talk to me and he said he had nothing to say to me.

Dr. Harrell told my husband that I was too sensitive. Maybe I am, but after averaging 45 hours a week for a year I didn't like to be called part time.
We all stand by and let the wool be pulled over our eyes. It could be that we are afraid of appearing ignorant

be that we of appearing of appearing ignorant or that we think that they must know what they doing since they supposed to be educated men...When I was told I couldn't receive holiday and vacation pay because I was considered part time, I told Dr. Harrell that my husband has 150 to 200 people working for him who are hourly and all receive holiday and vacation pay. 





Sprinkle Streusel Topping over braids. Let rise in warm place until doubled, about 45 minutes. Bake in preheated 350° oven 30 to 40 minutes, or until done.





Landolts report trip to Haiti

By Rev. Fred J. Landolt Pastor, Silver Creek Church

When the Mission Board contacted me to see if I would go as an evange-list and Bible hour leader to Haiti, I had mixed emotions. I wanted to go but felt inadequate to handle such a challenge, but knew God could supply. I wrote to Pastor Reser and asked what would be expected of me. He said they were only seking for one Church er to Haiti, I had mixed emotions. I wanted to He said they were only asking for one Church of God minister to be sent this year, as before two had gone in December each year. They were trying something different before the beginning of school by having meetings in September. So Sept. 19 through 26 was set for this and we made arrange. this and we made arrange-

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ments to go.

Also, at about this time God called us to be the pastor of the Silver Creek Church, so we were in the process of getting moved, meetor getting moved, meeting a new congregation, starting a building program here, and here Helen and I were packing for the trip to Haiti. The Silver Creek church paid our plane fare, and on Friday, Sept. 17, we were on our way to Ft. Wayne Airport, along with Lola Kantlehner, a member of the Mt. Carroll Church, who always had a desire to go to one of our Mission fields.

Have you ever been to Haiti? If not, and if you are planning on goyou are planning on go-ing sometime, prepare yourself (if possible) for the most unusual, fantastic, exciting ex-periences of a lifetime. As we arrived at the Port-au-Prince Airport at 3:30 in the after-noon, George, Jane, Ste-phanie, and Joan were there to meet us. What excitement with

What excitement the Haitian taxi-drivers and porters grabbing our luggage from us, and with arms full of medical supplies, etc. we had to almost pinch ourselves to make sure this was

You see, there are over five million people on this island. One of the most crowded places in the world. Needs, hunger, because and much pour beggers, and much poverty everywhere. We packed our things in the Mission car and headed for Port-au-Prince Plaza Hotel where we were welcomed with many hands to grab our luggage. The weather was very hot, and perspiration soon poured from us, so the air-conditioned room in The

the hotel was a pleasant relief. We ate supper with Joan and family on the Mountain, and on Sat-urday headed for Borel urday headed for B and the compound. and the compound. I could hardly believe the great improvement of the road which was almost like a freeway com-

most like a freeway compared to what it was 8 years ago when I was there with a work team. We saw a lot of different religious faiths that were being practiced, and many mission points along the way to Borel. Most of the Haitians are very friendly and enjoy life, although they have very little in material wealth.

After arriving back in Maimi, it was almost like coming from rags to riches, for you see both sides in Haiti, the rich and the poor, with 90% being the latter. Transportation there is exciting. We noticed more cars on the road and in Port-au-Prince they still drive mostly with their horns rather than brakes, and mostly on the wrong side of the road. The Cameo's haul large loads of people with their diesel motors, destine the second motors. large loads of people with their diesel motors, darting through multi-tudes of people and pov-erty. Yet in spite of all this Haiti is a very beautiful island.

We arrived at the Mis-We arrived at the Mission compound around 5:30 and supper was served to us by Mary Hershey and Lois Habecker. We had a wonderful time of fellowship in the Missionary's homes, eating and talking about different things.

erent things.
Well, before we hardly Well, before we hardly realized it, the week was almost over, with the coming of Sunday morning. Bells ringing, Haitians talking and many unusual sounds. Sunday School and Church lasted for over 3 hours, and I was beginning to and I was beginning to find out that God did want us there. Over delegates from our Mission Churches came in to stay at the compound for Bible Study and ser-vices all week.

The crowds were very good in each service, and Pastor Joseph and Pastor Chaplet did a marvelous job in translating what I was trying to say. Pastor Dusset, an O.M.S. pastor had also been invited to take part in the services. Pastor Dussett was a native of Haiti and has an orphange in St. Mark. Many responded

to each invitation and the people walked away, down many dark roads, each evening to return again the next evening

for services.
On Monday and Tuesday it was extremely hot but on Wednesday evening it rained. Usually it rained. Usually when it rains, or looks like it is going to, services are dismissed, but not this week. Announcement was made that there would be services each evening, rain or shine, and there were.

On Saturday evening we observed the ordinances of the Church. Some of the mountain people had never seen or taken part in these services, and what a service it was as they gathered was as they gathered in Church and had devotional period then walk-ed in single file across the road to the old Church where we sat in a circle and sang and shared God's blessing together. Many hearts rejoiced in seeing God's rejoiced in seeing God's people in complete harmony in hugging necks and greeting with a holy kiss. The service of Holy Communion followed with only Christians or Church members taking part. The two Haitian pastors stood by the table and blessed the elements and each one marched to the front where we broke bread and took the cup (grape pop) took the cup (grape pop) together, representing the blood of Christ for the remission of sin.

The last Sunday was something else. All Churches dismissed to attend the Borel Church. They came early, in fact, some walked 15 to 20 some walked 15 to 20 miles and started as early as 3 a.m. to get there on time. As they there on time. As they arrived they were seated in their groups. The Borel people on one side, because only the visitors were to be fed that day. Would you believe that over 650 people crowded into that service? There was much special singing, with the Borel Church Choir singing "The Hall-elujah Chorus". My, what voices!! Pastor Landolt brought the mes-

Mary gave us our tin pan and we shared rice and beans we shared rice and beans together. Too soon it was time for our departure. We told Mary and Lois, even the goodby kisses were worth the trip. We shall always remember the good times we shared and the experiences we had while witnessing the many needs in Hatti.







How UNICEF Helped Bank-roll Communist Vietnam

Takeover
"Last fall, when you gave the kids trick-or-treat money for UNICEF or ordered UNICEF Christmas cards, did it occur that you, and behind you, the U.S. govern-ment, were bankrolling the Communist takeover

of South Vietnam;
"Well, you were.
"In programs purportedly established 'to help children in Indochina,' the United Nations Children's Emer-Fund gave just gency Fund gave just short of two-thirds of its collections to North Vietnamese or to the 'Provisional Revolution-

'Provisional Revolution-ary Government of South Vietnam,' sometimes con-fused with the Vietcong. "The exact numbers, conceded by a UNICEF spokesman, run as foll-ows: UNICEF collected and disbursed a total of \$13,649,433 for its Indochina children's Indochina children's programs. While smidges of this came from abroad, the overwhelming amount came out of the pockets

of U.S. taxpayers.

"Of this eight-figure sum, \$8,975,587 went to Communist recipients: \$6,313,130 directly to Hanoi and \$1,975,587 more-via Haiphong and Hanoi, of course-to the Vietcong or PRG, as they are now styling them-selves in 'Ho Chi Minh selves City.'

"While Communists were "While Communists were thus getting 61 per cent of UNICEF'a largess, our ally, South Vietnam, got only \$5,360,707, or 39 per cent. "Unlike the South, where UNICEF and other

United Nations benefactions could be monitored, gifts to the Communists who, of course, would permit no observers, went unsupervised as to distribution. In the explanation of its spokesman, 'UNICEF has no way sman, 'UNICEF has no way to make sure the supp-lies to the Communists got to children. They were dropped

got to children. They were dropped off at the airports and docks, and we assume they were used as we intended.'







* Evidence exists to
support the action of the board since the five tenure teachers not re-ceiving raises were a-mong the lowest rated tenure teachers in the corporation and had been for the past three years.

* The evaluation system or rating system used by the school corpor-ation had been in existence for three or more years and the procedure relating to the rating

and evaluation of teachers was the same as had been used for at least three years.

* Three of four teachers placed on tenure beginning with the 1974-75 school year were TVCTA members. A number of members. A number of new teachers hired for the 1974-75 school year were known to be members of the Indiana State Teachers Association of which TVCTA is an affil-iate. Many of the teach-ers active in TVCTA were rated very high.

* The election to de-termine the exclusive representative in the school corporation oc-curred in May 1974, three months before the board action relating to rais-

es.

* The hearing examiner and IEERB found the school corporation, in making certain comments or remarks, had violated sections of PL 217 based on remarks by then Superintendent Robert Superintendent Robert Forbes in the spring of 1973 prior to the ef-fective date of PL 217, fective date of PL 217, remarks by Forbes in April of 1974, a memorandum sent to all teachers approximately two days prior to the election in response to an inaccurate memo sent to teachers by TVCTA and comments to Forbes to a TVCTA spokesman.
