representative of the county cancer detection unit.

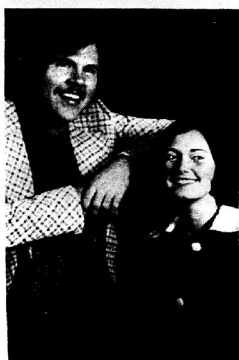
All leaders, workers and newcomers are urged to attend. Tom Hill, chairman, said a goal

Mr. and Mrs. Dale Thomason, Anderson, left Saturday morning for Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, where both will teach in an international school affiliated with Aramco Oil Co.

Dale, son of the Rev. and Mrs. J.D. Thomason, Akron, and his wife, the former Melinda Wyant, Vincennes, are both graduates of Anderson College. The school in which they will teach has about 1,600 students in grades K-9 who represent 29 nationalities. However, English is the spoken language.

## Mentone citizens petition to retain Pelkey

A petition was presented and angry words exchanged at Monday night's Mentone town board meeting, but unless members change their minds within the next ten days, Saturday, October 15, will be Glenn Pelkey's last day as marshal.

The petition was presented to the board by Roy Jeffers, an auto parts dealer who described himself as having been as closely associated with Pelkey since his appointment in June as anyone else in town. The petition bearing signatures of 198 of the town's residents read: "We, the undersigned, citizens living in the town of Mentone, do hereby petition the Mentone Town Board to retain Glenn Earl Pelkey as our town marshal for the following reasons: 1. Officer Pelkey has performed the duties of a police officer in an exemplary and

courteous manner, treating all citizens fairly. 2. There has been no breaking and entering during Officer Pelkey's tenure due primarily to his attendance of duty within the Town of Mentone. 3. Officer Pelkey has a B.A. degree in criminal justice administration and also practices good public relations in and for the town of Mentone."

Board members, however, cited Pelkey's relationship with Jeffers as the basis for many of their complaints with the law officer's work. After hearing a number of comments, some on Pelkey's behalf and some on behalf of the board, board president Frank Hardesty, with Pelkey's permission, read some of the charges.

Included were: 1. Does not operate police department on a business-like basis. A deck of cards was found on the floor with a young man playing solitaire.

Unauthorized people allowed to hear radio discussion of proposed drug raid. 2. Unauthorized people operating radio and office. 3. In the case of a recent hit-run accident, the owner of the damaged car got the other vehicle's license number and the name of the driver, but Pelkey didn't investigate because he did not feel well. 4. Pelkey had been seen at the sheriff's department at night in Jeffers' van. 5. Pelkey sometimes left town before 2 a.m., the hour at which his shift ends. 6. Pelkey maintained his portable radio was stolen from the

locked police car and that whoever stole it unlocked the car, took the radio and re-locked the vehicle. The radio was later found at the mobile home court in which he lives. "I think you have been careless with police equipment," Hardesty said. 7. Another county department reported Pelkey was chasing a truck with Jeffers' van, which was never authorized and which put the board in jeopardy. 8. Pelkey's personal vehicles still bear California plates. "Does the fact you can't get Indiana plates

## Mentone Christian Fellowship

Articles of Faith and Practice

### SECTION 4. Salvation

Since all men are sinners and guilty before God and are dead in trespasses and sins, and therefore unable to save themselves, God has out of His infinite love given His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, to become man's Saviour.

a. Repentance. We believe that genuine repentance is a necessary attitude and act of man that makes it possible for a holy and just God to forgive man's sins. As an attitude it involves a knowledge of, a change of mind toward, and a godly sorrow for sin; a proper reverence for God's holiness; and a surrender to God. As an act it means confessing and forsaking sin. Repentance is man's appropriate response to the grace of God in conviction. As a fruit of repentance, insofar as possible where sin has been committed against man, restitution should be made.

b. Faith. Faith must follow repentance and is the act of the will whereby man embraces the promises of God and appropriates to himself personally the provisions of God's grace. It is resting in the completeness and adequacy of the atoning merit of Christ's sacrifice as the sole ground and hope of salvation. Faith must be active throughout the life of the believer and must manifest itself in obedience and good works.

make it legal to drive an illegal vehicle?" Hardesty asked. "How can you enforce the law when you don't obey it?"

As Hardesty read each of the points, Pelkey or one of his supporters refuted the charges. At the last item, an angry exchange resulted when a member of the audience complained that the police car had been illegal since January because of a non-functioning turn signal.

Exasperated, board members complained the meeting was getting nowhere. "I'm sick of this," Wayne Tombaugh said as he accused Pelkey of having lied to him. At one point in the exchange, Gerald Romine had slammed his fist to the table and shouted, "That's enough! The meeting is over." However, clerk-treasurer Kate Whetstone said, "There is still other business to be discussed."

"There's no sense continuing," Hardesty said. "It's getting too argumentative."

Board members agreed to study the petition at a special executive session tonight (Thursday). Since no decisions can be reached during such a session, another meeting will have to be called for the actual vote. Hardesty said he did not know when this would be, but he said it would be announced with ample time to make the meeting legal, citing the state's new "Sunshine Law" that stipulates 48-hour notice must be given of all public meetings.

In other business, board members:

— Heard Hardesty report water superintendent Harry Sullivan has looked at a new backhoe and will make a recommendation later.

— Heard a request by Tippecanoe Valley school superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell asking that a larger water line be extended to the area in the east end of town where school building trades classes are erecting the fourth new

house in as many years. The area in question has been annexed by the town but is supplied by only a three-quarter inch water line. "There's just not enough pressure there," he said. Tombaugh said the possibility of extending a two-inch line was being investigated and noted there had been requests for fire hydrants and street lights in the area.

— Approved an \$8,000 per year salary for Robert Heckman, an assistant in the water department.

— Voted to grant General Telephone Co. permission to bury a cable on East Jackson St. extension.

— Noted that the speed limit sign at the east end of town lets vehicles reach 55 mph before getting out of town.

— Heard requests from members of the audience that stop or yield signs are needed at some streets and alleys.

— Granted permission to park board president Bob Whetstone to apply for a federal grant for park improvement. Whetstone said the request had been turned down twice in recent years and suggesting paring this year's request.

— Told Joanne Poquette the main threat of persons riding bicycles on downtown streets was to senior citizens. She said it was equally dangerous to ride in the street and face being struck by a car backing from a parking space. Board members said the law states all bikes shall flow with traffic.

— Adopted Halloween curfew hours and asked that leaves not be burned on blacktopped streets. Bob Whetstone asked that this be amended further to include not allowing grass clippings to clog sewer lines.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Don Decker, a former police officer who had earlier asked the board if Pelkey were being charged with conduct unbecoming an officer and if it did not be fairer to both him and residents of the town to give reasons for his termination, thanked the board for the discussion. "It's not as dark now as it was," he said.

"I'll second that," said Salley Smithson, and those persons who had not left after the discussion concerning Pelkey ended, registered their approval with a round of applause.

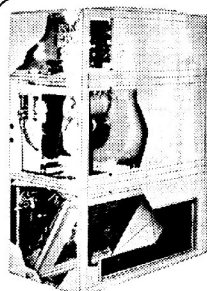

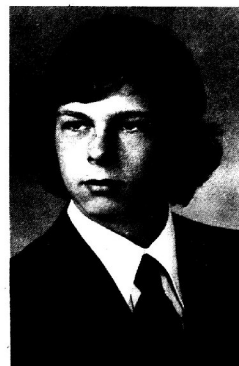
Meals will be prepared at Prairie View Rest Home, Warsaw, and transported to Mentone for

## Community Service drive in progress

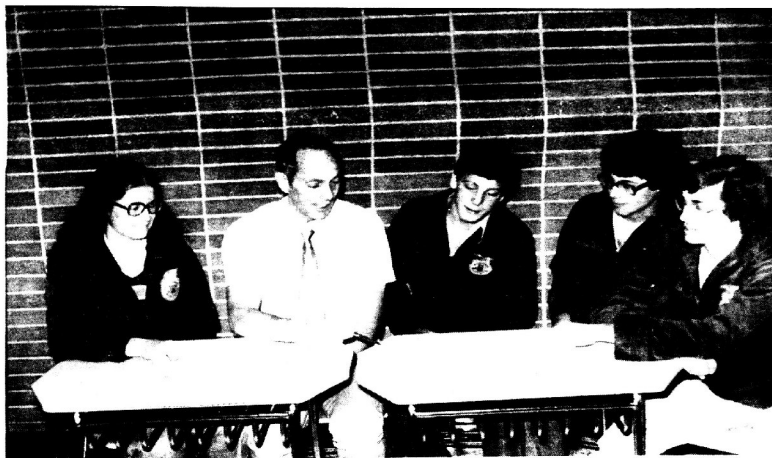
The 1977 Henry Township Community Service drive is now in full swing, according to chairman Tom Hill. He said workers have

# What They Don't Know Won't Hurt Them

The hour was late; the streets were dark and empty. A night watchman made his rounds from door to door of the downtown businesses. Most people had been home for hours, many of them already in bed asleep. But the lights still shone brightly in the newspaper office and the old manual typewriter clickety clacked away as the editor recorded what action had been taken at city council meeting that night.

Soon, thousands of people would read that story and learn what city council had done to perhaps change their lifestyle, alter their business routine or lower their insurance rates. They would learn how each councilman voted on an issue and who they should contact if they disagreed with the position a councilman took. The people wanted this information and knew they could find it in their newspaper.

That's why the lights burned late in the newspaper office, because an editor was dedicated to giving his subscribers a detailed accounting of just what transpired at that council meeting. The next night it would be a school board meeting; the next a civic club dinner, then a meeting of the planning and zoning commission and on and on. The newspaper would be represented at each of these. Stories would be written and published so the people would be informed of what was going on in their community.

"Congress shall make no law . . . abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press" the First Amendment to the Constitution states — the cornerstone of our democracy. Without

this, all of our liberties would be insecure.

Yet these freedoms are being threatened by representatives in government who assume the attitude that it is better for the people to not know what is going on, what action they are considering or have already taken. "What they don't know won't hurt them," they boast. But what they really mean is that if they transact their business under a cloak of secrecy, no one will know what they are doing and they can run the government as they darn well please.

How many times in recent years has it been noted in stories that a school board, city council, fiscal court or some other governing body has gone into executive session to discuss a problem, a situation that possibly would be embarrassing? All too many! If it is public business they are discussing, then rarely should it be conducted behind closed doors.

When you pick up a newspaper today you have freedom in your hands, but will you still have that freedom of information tomorrow if governmental bodies are allowed to go unchanged into one secret executive session after another?

The threat, the challenge rests in the hands of the people and if they — you and I — don't speak up and tell our representatives how we feel, personally or through editorials and letters to the editor, then we may soon find ourselves without a right to know . . . unable to hold freedom in our hands.

Then there will be no need for the lights to burn into the wee hours of the night in the newspaper office, no need for the typewriter to clickety clack. In fact, there will be no need for the night watchman to make his rounds.

My brother has diabetes. That's why I decided to ride in the Diabetes Bike-A-Thon Saturday morning, October 2.

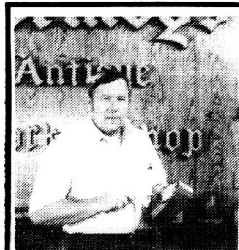

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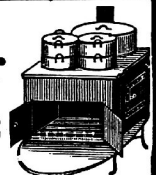

## State police issue monthly report

A report issued October 6 by Indiana State Police shows that troopers worked 579½ hours in September in Fulton Co., patrolling 10,683 miles, investigating 13 accidents and making 121 arrests. They also issued 135 warnings, 17 notices to have vehicles repaired, assisted two motorists and filed 24 interrogation reports.

According to F-Sgt. John D. Gaylor, district commander, three troopers assigned to the county were responsible for the work along with 37 total personnel who work District 23, which includes Cass, Fulton, Howard, Miami and Wabash counties. District officers conducted 51 criminal investigations that resulted in the arrest of eight persons.

In addition, district personnel worked 7,336 hours, patrolled 107,435 miles, investigated 75 accidents, made 758 arrests and issued 1,197 warnings. They issued 605 notices to have vehicles repaired, assisted 264 motorists and filed 59 interrogation reports.

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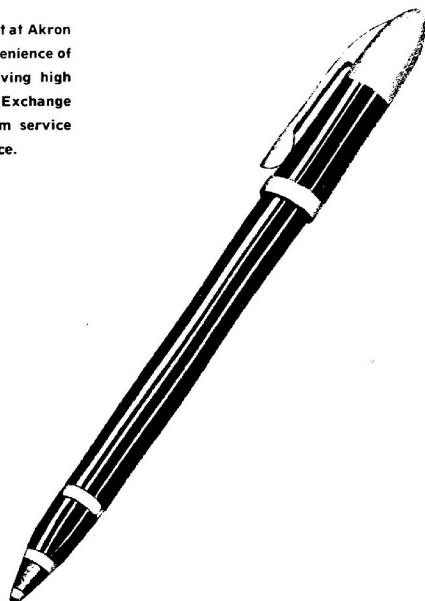

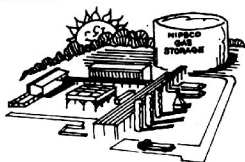

## READY FOR WINTER

Like it or not, he's coming—Old Man Winter, that is. And according to several long-range forecasts, he's going to be another cold one. Hopefully, not as cold as last winter—a real record breaker.

In any event, we have been getting ready for this winter for some months now. Because of the warmer than usual spring we experienced this year, we were able to replenish our storage reserves early and expect to have all storage facilities completely filled by the beginning of the winter heating season, including our underground storage field near Royal Center, our liquefied natural gas plant near LaPorte and our contracted storage fields elsewhere. At present, our storage reserves are in excess of 25 billion cubic feet.



And even though our daily flow gas is being curtailed under plans approved by the Federal Power Commission, we expect to receive almost 700 million cubic feet of gas a day this winter from our five pipeline suppliers.

We have also recently purchased two billion additional cubic feet of natural gas for wintertime delivery from the Michigan Consolidated Gas Company. So barring any unforeseen and unanticipated curtailments by our suppliers or diversions by the federal government, we expect to be able to meet all of our firm natural gas commitments for all residential, commercial and industrial customers this winter.

- Make storm doors and storm windows fit tightly.
- Weatherstrip doors.
- Caulk joints between wood and masonry and around windows and doors.
- Turn your thermostat down to 65 degrees in the daytime and lower at night. Every degree you turn your thermostat down saves about 3 per cent in energy costs.
- Furnace filters should be clean. Check them often and clean or change when necessary.
- Have your furnace checked by a qualified reputable heating contractor to keep it running efficiently.

#### Natural gas costing more, but still cheapest fuel

Natural gas is going to cost you more this winter than it did last winter. This is because the natural gas delivered to us by pipeline suppliers is costing us more. So far this year our gas supply costs have gone up more than \$45 million. However, natural gas is still the cheapest fuel you can buy to heat your home and we believe it will continue to be so for years to come.

NIPSCO has completed engineering studies and is presently determining the exact location of a new liquefied natural gas storage plant, similar to the one now operating near LaPorte. This new facility will also store more than 2 billion cubic feet of natural gas in liquefied form for use during peak demand situations.

We are also expanding the capability of our huge underground storage field near Royal Center. This year we began development of a new storage zone which underlies our existing storage field. When completed in 1984, this new zone will increase usable storage from 4 billion cubic feet to 7 billion cubic feet.

### SECTION 4. Salvation

c. Justification and Regeneration. We believe that when the requirements of repentance and faith have been met, God justifies and regenerates the sinner. Justification is a judicial act absolving from guilt and punishment and restoring to divine favor. Justification has to do with the change of the sinner's standing before God. Regeneration has to do with the changing of the sinner's nature through the impartation of divine life. Regeneration is a spiritual quickening, a new birth. This experience is witnessed to by the Holy Spirit and produces in the heart a desire to do the will of God.

d. Sanctification and Reception of the Holy Spirit. We believe that sanctification is the work of God in making men holy. It is the will of God. It is provided in the atonement, and is experienced through faith by the operation of the Holy Spirit through the Word and the blood. While the divine work of making men holy begins in repentance and regeneration, yet through a subsequent crisis experience the believer is to die to self, to be cleansed from all sin, and to be filled with the Holy Spirit so that he may be separated wholly unto God to serve Him in righteousness and holiness. After the crisis experience, the believer is to be perfected in holiness and in the fear of God, deny self moment by moment and second by second, continue to experience a deeper death to self and to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

e. Divine Healing. Since all sickness is fundamentally the result of the fall of man, we believe that healing for the body is provided in the atonement of Christ. This benefit may be realized by God's children as they express faith and desire, and meet the conditions set forth in God's Word. We believe that God does not necessarily limit His healing to believers but may apply His healing stripes wheresoever He may choose.

## Loan deadline extended

The U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has extended to Dec. 2 the deadline for Indiana farmers to apply for farm emergency loans to cover losses caused by this year's drought and other natural disasters.

Fulton and Kosciusko counties were among 39 Indiana counties designated as disaster areas because of damages and losses caused by an abnormal accumulation of snow and ice during the series of blizzards and snowstorms from January 28 to February 4, 1977.

Farmers lacking other sources of necessary credit may apply to FmHA for loans to offset losses or revive farming operations. Under the schedule of interest rates as revised by PL 95-89, loans are made at a rate of three percent on the first \$250,000 borrowed against actual loss, five percent for additional amounts offsetting actual loss and eight percent for loans not based on loss but needed to continue farming or make major adjustments in farm operations.

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## 20 percent set-aside scheduled for wheat

"Announced farm program options for 1978 crop wheat will differ substantially from the old allotment programs," Sid Sadler of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said this week.

As background information, Sadler said this set-aside plans were announced at an August 29 White House briefing by Acting Secretary of Agriculture John White. White noted that although congressional action on the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977 is not complete, set-aside intentions were announced because farmers are beginning to plant their 1978 crop wheat.

A major feature of the new program is the elimination of outdated historical commodity allotments, according to Sadler. He said a normal crop acreage of specified crops will be established for each farm in lieu of individual commodity allotments. Normal crop acreages for individual farms

will be based on 1977 plantings of crops with provisions for adjustment for abnormal factors. Although the base will likely in-

clude major food, feed and oilseed crops, specific crops remain undesignated but will be announced later.

"Farmers will have flexibility within their based to plant the crops they want," Sadler said, "but farmer's plantings of designated uses plus diverted acrea cannot exceed the normal crop acreage."

Farms participating in the new program will be eligible for loan, disaster and deficiency payment programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

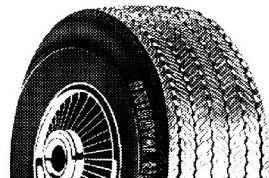

Today one in every three American wives works. Employed or not women are finding that they have less time to spend with meal preparation. So women are constantly looking for ways to prepare meals in thirty minutes. With planning, organization, and practice it's easy to have meals in minutes.

Planning is the key to a successful 30 Minute Meal. It is important to plan for quick meals in order to serve meals your family will enjoy to keep your family well nourished, and to save time and energy. It is best to set one day aside each week to engage in menu planning. Menu plans can then be used to compile a shopping list. By making a shopping list while planning meals, you can save time by doing all your shopping in one trip and you can save time in preparation; all the ingredients will be on hand for your meal plans.

One of the biggest problems in preparing quick meals is that we often find ourselves in a rut and our meals become monotonous. Statics reveal that five-sevenths of the average cook's cooking days are usually concerned with the throw-it-together and get-it-in-the-oven cooking. Thought should be given to what will be served to include a variety of foods in an appetizing way. Avoid monotony by having a selection of 20 quick recipes. This will aid you in preparing meals for one month, repeating only your favorites.

With time limited the cook must be organized. The kitchen should be orderly and efficient with cooking utensils in their proper place. Cooking ingredients should be on hand and in easy reach for quick preparation.

There are many kitchen appliances which are helpful in thirty minute preparation. Microwave ovens reduce cooking time significantly; blenders save precious minutes to crush, chop, blend and mix; electric beaters cut down hand mixing time; crock pots, pressure cookers, and electric fry pans also save time.

Your attitudes or purpose for quick meals has a great psychological effect upon you. Dreading to cook will make you more fatigued than the actual work itself. If it is less time you desire to use in cooking and still have nutritious, palatable meals, you need to practice efficiency

techniques. Take time to get organized for preparing quick meals.

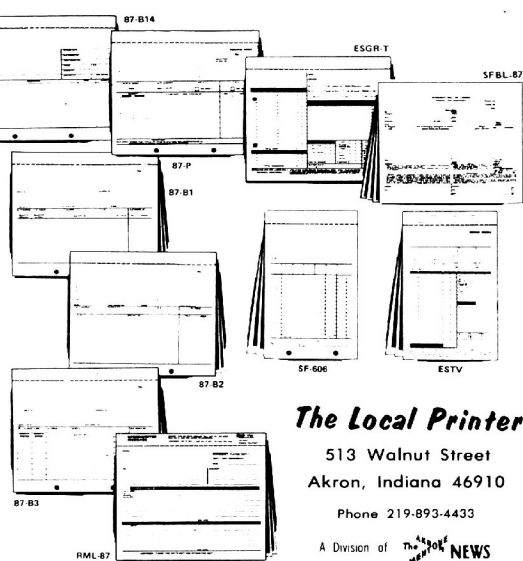
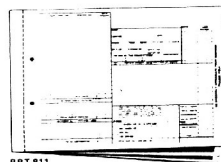

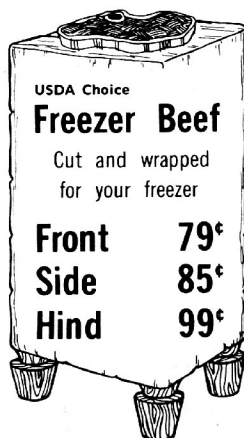

## School board to let teachers decide

Attempts by the Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association (TVCTA) and the Tippecanoe Valley Educators Association (TVEO) to be recognized as exclusive bargaining agent for corporation teachers went back to the drawing board Monday night. Board members voted to let the teachers make the first move after Con Shewman said, "We're not going to make any mistakes because we're not going to do anything."

The action came on the advice of attorney Frederick Rakestraw who outlined past experiences with TVCTA, an affiliate of the Indiana State Teachers Association. "Any group with the support of 20 percent of the teachers can ask for an election. You can let them decide who will be the bargaining agent."

Board members also approved the purchase of a new Burroughs B-80 mini-computer to be used in the central office. The machine will cost \$34,030, including a training program for the operator and necessary equipment. In addition, there will be a \$2,200 per year service contract. Burroughs allowed TVSC \$2,000 trade-in on a bookkeeping machine Harrell estimated to be 14 years old. The only other company submitting a bid was National Cash Register at \$22,966.10. However, Harrell said that bid did not meet specifications. Judy Hively and Eleanor Hoover, central office employees, were present and both expressed a preference for the Burroughs machine.

In other action, board members: —Approved an additional appropriation for the general fund, \$36,500 going for teacher salaries and \$10,000 for teaching materials and supplies.

—Heard a report by Harrell of the state tax board hearing in Warsaw he attended with Mrs. Hively and Mrs. Hoover. He said the board indicated the corporation's rate would be \$3.49 in Kosciusko Co., \$3.70 in Fulton Co. However, the board was mandated to cut \$135,000 in the base tax levy that had been added by TVSC since a new school (TVHS) was more expensive to operate than the one it replaced (Talma Jr. High.) Harrell said if that amount is restored, the levy would go to \$3.95 for Kosciusko Co. and \$4.17 for Fulton Co. as compared with \$3.82 and \$4 last year.

—Were told by Harrell that the overcrowded Akron kindergarten class had been divided and a new teacher hired.

—Gave Harrell permission to advertise for bids for a new boiler

at the Akron School in the event one is needed and also gave him permission to write to the Division of Schoolhouse Planning to get a survey on the long-range needs at the Akron junior high building. He said a member of the division told him it probably would be permissible to locate a new boiler in the court area at the Akron

school. This would enable it to be moved in the event the school is replaced or remodeled.

-Noted a change in a Hill Lake area bus route that will involve a turn-around on a dead-end road on which four or five students live.

-Heard the school nurse's report for September, which included ten visits to the high school, 20 to Akron, seven to Burket and 11 to Mentone in which she saw 284 students in addition to handling reports and correspondence.

-Noted the corporation's officials enrollment on Sept. 16 was 2,188 down 14 from last year.

-Granted permission to sell six used manual typewriters for \$25 each, \$5 over trade-in value.

-Elected James Romine, Charles Tucker and Tom Fites to the Agriculture Advisory Committee. They replace Jim Meredith, Dr. O. L. McFadden and Randall Leininger and will work with vocational agriculture teacher Forrest Kantner in developing programs.

-Discussed a letter from Everett I. Brown, architect of the high school, regarding a continuing electrical problem that causes frequent dim-outs or total outages. Brown suggested the problem is the result of single phasing since the school is eight miles from the REMC sub-station and at the end of the line. Protective devices were suggested at estimated cost of \$4,500 for the school, \$1,950 for poles on the football field and \$1,300 for sewage system motors. Board member Everett Besson wondered why Brown hadn't included the protective devices in the original plans. Harrell said other architects were reporting similar problems.

-Noted that principals' reports will become part of each agenda. Harrell said Loran Skinner, TVHS principal, is now home from the hospital and recuperating after recent major surgery.

-Approved an adult basic education program that will be partially reimbursed by the state

and federal governments. Rick Ralston will develop the program, designed to help adult corporation residents earn high school diplomas.

-Made reservations for four board members to attend the November 2 Region II Indiana School Boards Association meeting at Fairfield.

-Signed a contract for Barbara Ward, the new Akron kindergarten teacher. A native of Kansas, Mrs. Ward is married to a student at Grace Seminary and has had one year of teaching experience.

-Granted maternity leave for Vicki Gearhart to begin October 17 and end approximately December 5.

-Approved art teacher Jan Mills as assistant girls' basketball coach.

-Named Roger Toy, a student at Grace College, as head wrestling coach, and Robert Igney as assistant. Igney, a TVHS teacher, will work as liaison between the school and Toy in addition to assisting with the program. Toy will receive two-thirds of the \$1,050 coach's salary while Igney will receive the other third.

-Recommended Don Kuhn be approved for a bus route when one becomes available in his area and heard a suggestion from Don Snipes that routes be re-assigned so that drivers work closer to their home area. He said one driver drives 15 miles before making a stop. He also said he had had complaints from bus drivers regarding extra-curricular activities and wondered who is in charge of discipline for such events, the teacher or driver. Harrell said the responsibility is the teacher's.

-Adjourned to go into executive session to discuss personnel and negotiations.

-All board members were present. They are Fred Kindig, Con Shewman, Everett Besson, Vernon Meredith and Don Snipes.

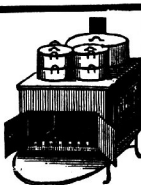

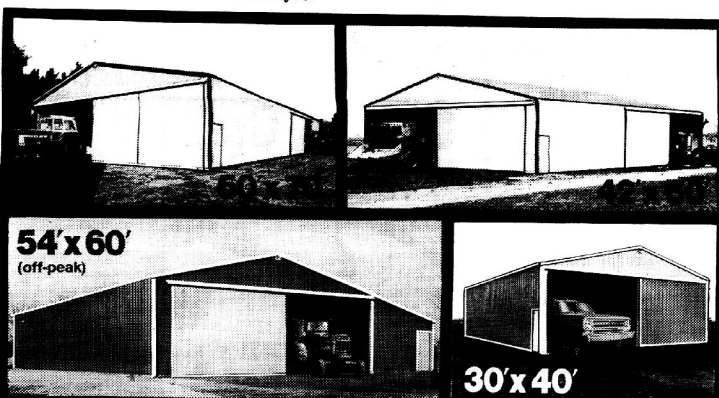

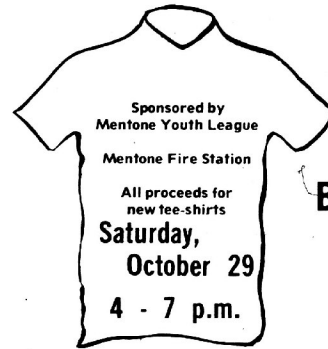

Mrs. William Cox, hostess regent, conducted the opening ritual and welcomed Mrs. Lewis Klinefelter, guest regent and

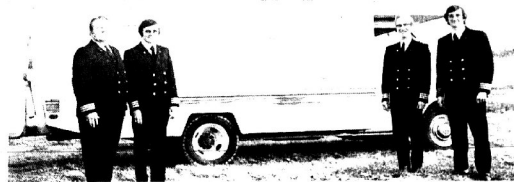
Tippecanoe River Chapter members.

## Mentone Christian Fellowship

Articles of Faith and Practice

### SECTION 5. The Church

The NEWS is a combination of two publications, the Akron News, established in 1889 by the late Sam Sheetz and the oldest continuous business in Akron, and the Mentone News, established in 1930 as the Northern Indiana Co-op by the former Northern Indiana Co-Operative Association. The Sheetzes purchased the Akron News for Claude and Ester Billings in 1962 and in 1964 purchased the Mentone News from Artley and Ruth Cullum. The papers were combined in 1968 with the conversion to offset printing.

The sale involves only the newspaper with the Sheetzes retaining ownership of the job shop now known as "The Local Printer." Both will continue to work out of the same office at Akron, and the Norlanders also plan to continue operating the Mentone office.

The Norlanders, both graduates of Central Michigan University Mt. Pleasant, Mich., previously were co-editors and publishers with his brother and sister-in-law of the Mille Lacs Messenger at Isle, Minnesota. They will move to the area after the first of the year.

For the past 15 years, readers of this column have followed the Sheetz family's daily lives, sharing with us our sorrows and joys, our appendectomies and tonsillectomies, our battles of the bulge and with life.

Mostly, however, they have followed the development of our sons. Todd, who was four when we purchased the NEWS and this column began, is 19 and has already moved to his own bachelor pad. Doug, who was yet a gleam in his father's eye, at 13 is taller than either of us. Both have taken a lot of teasing about the columns and each has threatened, "I'm going to write Odds and Ends myself and tell all about you."

The truth is, of course, that I've told very little about them. Parts of growing up are better left unchronicled, kept private and, sometimes, hopefully, forgotten.

Still, they have a point. I've told very little about what's been happening to the other two of us—the two who worked together on a high school paper. He was a farm boy with a flair for things mechanical; I was a farm girl who wanted to write. I helped edit the paper, and he, with his mechanical ability, mimeographed it. Sometimes he deemed me coordinated enough to slip sheet for him, and we visited.

"Printer's ink gets into your veins," I said.

"I don't know about that," he replied ruefully as he rubbed his shirt, "but it sure gets on your clothes."

When school was out, he turned to a job that was mechanical, and I went to work at a bank to earn enough money to go to college to learn to write.

College was cut short by marriage, and I installed a typewriter in the back bedroom and began a rejection slip collection that reflected only the best of the 50s. Like most beginners, I thought you had to start at the top and stay there.

I was again working at a bank when the draft interrupted our lives and the army sent my husband to Germany as a mechanic. I took my typewriter along and wrote hundreds of letters. And we had a baby.

The baby was four when we bought the Akron News. You don't have to guess what we were then doing—Loren was a mechanic and I worked at a bank. He plunged into the mechanics of printing while I continued at the bank, using my day off to help print the paper.

Eventually, I left the bank, and we bought the Mentone News. I made my entrance into that town by literally falling into the first meeting I attended. For a year I was known as the woman with the sore knee.

The years have flown. I have edited copy lying in the hospital after having a baby or propped in bed with an ailing back, and I've made up pages when I was so sick I couldn't see the type. Loren has worked more nights than either of us cares to remember and has shouted instructions to the rest of us while being wheeled off for emergency surgery. We've struggled with the elements, but, hold your breath, we've never missed an issue.

Neither of us is sure when it happened, but changes began to be noticed. For one thing, the man who loved things mechanical learned to love printing equally. Mechanics aside, he loves the smell and feel of the printer's ink that has permeated his veins. (And as keeper of his shirts, I'd have to say it's also soaked his clothes.)

And, in my own fashion, I've learned to write and, while the

rejection slips haven't stopped completely, there have been acceptances by a number of magazines. I've also learned you can lead a reporter to the arena but you can't make her like sports, and the lack of enthusiasm will show in her articles. I've learned, too, that I can write obituaries and police news of family and friends, but I don't like it. I guess what I'm saying is that I thrive on people, and I like reporting what they do—if what they do is a happy sort of thing. Still, if it hadn't been for the discipline of doing the kind of writing I dislike, I doubt I would have found the kind I do like.

And we also discovered that both the job printing and the NEWS had grown so much we were working seven days a week. The logical solution was to separate the NEWS and The Local Printer, and we prayed for guidance because we were concerned not only for ourselves but for an area we have come to respect very much.

A solution that enables Loren to continue with the job printing came three weeks ago when we sold the NEWS to Bob and Renee Norlander. Later that day I was offered a part-time job at a bank. And that night I slipped on some wet leaves and smashed my knee.

It's easy to see this is where we came in, and, while I will miss this column, it is without regret that I write "The End."

I am not against Mr. Regan nor am I all for President Carter, but I do believe Mr. Regan is showing signs of stubbornness on this matter. After all, it was Mr.

Reagan who just lately said he wouldn't take such a strong position on the treaty as he was going to because of the lives that may be lost in a battle to keep the Canal should the treaty be shot down by Congress.

## Walk to lose weight

Want to lose ten pounds in the next year?

One way you can do it is to walk an extra mile every day.

The American Medical Association points out that a walk of just an extra mile per day for 36 days in a simple, pleasant device for shedding an extra pound of fat. In a year this would mount up to about ten pounds. The extra mile means just that—a mile of walking in addition to the customary walking you now do each day. And walking at a brisk clip, not just sauntering along. And without increasing your present food intake.

Once regarded as a major factor in losing weight, physical activity was later accorded less importance. It was recalled that considerable effort was required to shed even one pound of extra tissue. Would-be reducers found comfort in some expert opinion that calories expended through exercise would be immediately replaced, due to automatic increase in appetite.

Fortunately for fitness as well as for fatness, exercise has been restored to grace and enjoys respectability. It still takes caloric control to keep weight under control permanently, but exercise helps expend calories; within the usual range of activity, it need not stimulate appetite excessively. The energy output required to offset a pound of fat is approximately 3,500 calories, but the weight need not be lost all at once.

Instead of the exhausting, often impossible, 36-mile hike within a span of hours, a walk of just one extra mile a day for 36 days will get rid of that extra pound. Weight gain usually is relatively slow, and the extra mile will—for most of us—help keep weight down to a reasonable figure.

To be effective for both weight reduction and for general physical conditioning, exercise must be a regular part of your way of life, and not something that is overdone spasmodically.

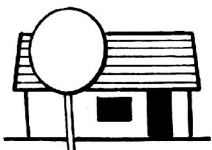

## READY FOR WINTER

Like it or not, he's coming—Old Man Winter, that is. And according to several long-range forecasts, he's going to be another cold one. Hopefully, not as cold as last winter—a real record breaker.

In any event, we have been getting ready for this winter for some months now. Because of the warmer than usual spring we experienced this year, we were able to replenish our storage reserves early and expect to have all storage facilities completely filled by the beginning of the winter heating season, including our underground storage field near Royal Center, our liquefied natural gas plant near LaPorte and our contracted storage fields elsewhere. At present, our storage reserves are in excess of 25 billion cubic feet.



And even though our daily flow gas is being curtailed under plans approved by the Federal Power Commission, we expect to receive almost 700 million cubic feet of gas a day this winter from our five pipeline suppliers.

We have also recently purchased two billion additional cubic feet of natural gas for wintertime delivery from the Michigan Consolidated Gas Company. So barring any unforeseen and unanticipated curtailments by our suppliers or diversions by the federal government, we expect to be able to meet all of our firm natural gas commitments for all residential, commercial and industrial customers this winter.

### What you can do

There are several ways to conserve energy and get the most out of your heating dollar this winter.

- Check your insulation. Does it meet new standards for your type of residence? NIPSCO has published a new booklet on basic information and guidelines to help you keep winter cold and summer heat out of your home. It's titled "Insulating & Weatherproofing Your Home." - Make storm doors and storm windows fit tightly.
- Weatherstrip doors.
- Caulk joints between wood and masonry and around windows and doors.
- Turn your thermostat down to 65 degrees in the daytime and lower at night. Every degree you turn your thermostat down saves about 3 per cent in energy costs.
- Furnace filters should be clean. Check them often and clean or change when necessary.
- Have your furnace checked by a qualified reputable heating contractor to keep it running efficiently.

### Natural gas costing more, but still cheapest fuel

Natural gas is going to cost you more this winter than it did last winter. This is because the natural gas delivered to us by pipeline suppliers is costing us more. So far this year our gas supply costs have gone up more than \$45 million. NIPSCO has completed engineering studies and is presently determining the exact location of a new liquefied natural gas storage plant, similar to the one now operating near LaPorte. This new facility will also store more than 2 billion cubic feet of natural gas in liquefied form for use during peak demand situations.

We are also expanding the capability of our huge underground storage field near Royal Center. This year we began development of a new storage zone which underlies our existing storage field. When completed in 1984, this new zone will increase usable storage from 4 billion cubic feet to 7 billion cubic feet.

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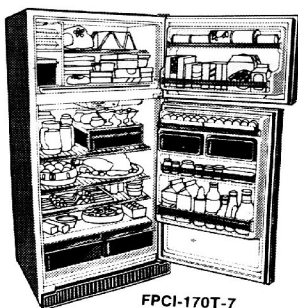
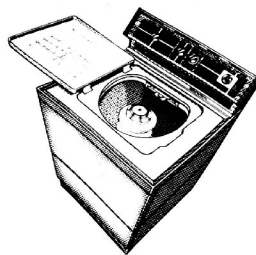


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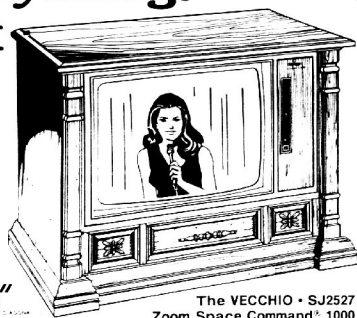

## What's Cooking?

According to USDA economists, consumers can look forward to relatively stable prices in the market place for the remainder of 1977. It will be a sharp contrast to the sharp price increase experienced the first seven months of the year.

For all of 1977, grocery store food prices appear to average around six percent above 1976. Away-from-home food prices may be up seven or eight percent for the year. The increase has been caused by higher prices for coffee and other imported foods.

The retail prices of meat are expected to hold relatively steady will moderate increases for beef off setting declines for pork. Poultry prices show a lower price due to a plentiful supply of broilers and a seasonally large turkey output.

Fresh vegetables should have a more normal level after last winter's freeze in Florida. The apple harvest is expected to be up and pear production down.

Processed fruit and vegetable prices are expected to continue to rise. Supplies of frozen concentrated orange juice remain tight due to demand and to the effects of last winter's freeze in Florida.

Coffee prices will gradually recede according to present

trends. In sugar and sweets category, consumers may see some increases later this year reflecting continued increases on chocolate products.

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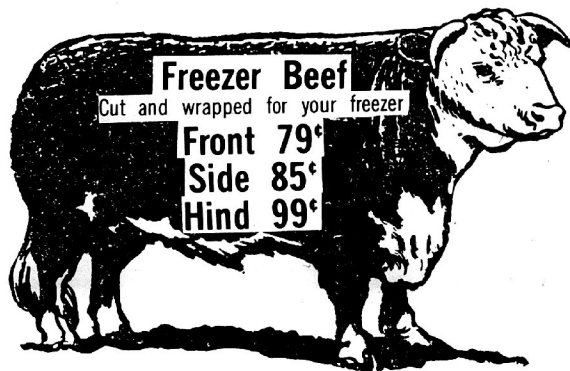
