# Board discusses withdrawl from area planning commission

The Mentone Town Board met in regular session on October 2, at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Hall, with all members present. Minutes of the September 11 and 20 meetings read by Clerk-Treasurer Catherine Whetstone were approved as read by trustees Frank Hardesty, Gerald Romine, and Wayne Tombaugh. Attorney Lee Bazini was also present.

Discussion of withdrawal from the Kosciusko Area Planning Commission was the first business of the evening. The trustees have discussed at previous meetings their reasons for wishing to withdraw, and trustee Romine commented that he "was for it two years ago..."

Board president Hardesty suggested that the Board review all of the present town ordinances and revamp and update them.

Trustee Tombaugh made a motion to withdraw, but no second was forthcoming.

Attorney Bazini suggested that the Board hold a public hearing to find the feelings of the citizens of Mentone, although it isn't necessary. He also explained that the Board must pass an ordinance to withdraw. He will look into the proper channels for withdrawal and get back to the Board.

Trustee Tombaugh withdraw his motion, and the matter was tabled for further discussion. Town Marshal Earl Beattie

Town Marshal Earl Beattie reported to the Board that CETA has contacted him in reference to the employment of full time deputy Mike Trent.

CETA funds for salary and

insurance will be forthcoming but for the present time, CETA has asked that the Town of Mentone pay Trent, with reimbursement to come within a month.

After some discussion of funds available; the Board approved the measure, and Trent will be kept on as a deputy.

Extensive remodeling was done to the original building in 1973, additional to the control of the contr ing batch bins, new mixer, and traveling eye-beams. Akron Concrete Products Co. started with part time help and has now ex-panded to serving 50 funeral homes in a 55 mile radius with ven full time employees and two part time.

Terry joined his father in the business in 1959 on a full time basis although he had worked summers for several years. Terry's son, Pat, has grown up with the business and works on weekends and during the summer, making the third generation in the busi-

## Accident injures three area teens

A two vehicle accident that occurred last Friday, Septem-ber 29, was blamed on faulty brakes according to Mentone Marshal Earl Beattie.

The mishap occurred on St. Rd. 19 south at the intersection of County Road 500 South at 8:35 a.m., when a pickup truck, operated by Cynthia J. Norris, age 16, of R. 1, Mentone, failed to stop at the intersection when she

Norris apparently swerved to the far left lane to attempt the turn south onto 19, and collid-ed with an auto driven by Ti-mothy Creighton, 17, of R. 5, Warsaw, as she entered the in-tersection.

According to Beattie, the Creighton auto, a 1972 Ford Pinto, was forced off the road upon impact and hit a cement corner post. The Norris truck

went on through a fence, and stopped in a corn field owned by Joe Boggs of Mentone. Norris and Creighton, along with Jenny Scott of Burket, a passenger in the Norris vehicle, were taken to Kosciusko Community Hospital in Warsaw, where Creighton was admitted for treatment. Norris and Scott were both treated and released.

Estimated repair to the Norris vehicle, a 1969 Dodge pickup truck, owned by Lee E. Norris, was set at \$600. The Creighton auto, owned by Louise Creighton, was totaled, and estimated damage was \$2000. Property damage to the fence and field owned by Boggs was set at \$50.

Miss Norris was cited for running a stop sign, according to Beattie.

Robert Taylor, Vice President and Agricultural Representative of the Akron Exchange State Bank, announces that a \$250 scholarship will be offered by the bank locally to aid a young person to attend the 1979 eight-week Purdue Agricultural Short Course.

This course is usually attended by young people who for one reason or another do not plan to take a four-year college course in Agriculture but who want to make agriculture their life's vocation

Modern agriculture with its increasing complexity of farm op-eration involves more mechanization: financial planning; greater management skills; use of improv-ed grain and pasture crops; conservation of soil fertility; use of improved feeding practices; and control of livestock and plant disease and pests. Current information covering these subjects is emphasized in the eight-week winter courses. The courses are taught by the regular staff mem-bers of the School of Agriculture and are designed to be highly practical in their application.

The Akron Exchange State Bank, as well as many other banks who belong to the Indiana Bankers Association, sponsors the scholarship each year. Last year over 250 young people participated in the winter short course. The schooling has nationwide acclaim. Students from many other surrounding states even attend.

To qualify for such a scholarship, one must be at least 18

years of age. Those interested are asked to secure an applica-tion form from the Akron Bank and return the completed form to Mr. Taylor by October 30. As only one \$250 scholarship

will be offered, there will have to be a selection made if more than one applicant qualifies. The

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



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# Former News publisher writes history book

A former Akron News publisher has written a history of the 100year old Indiana Republican Editorial Association.

The book, a 104-page paperback is in the Akron Carnegie Library. Claude Billings, past IREA president, wrote the history at the request of the officers to commemorate the Association's cen-tennial, which was celebrated Sept. 30 at the Columbia Club in Indianapolis.

Senator Richard Lugar and Gov. Otis R. Bowen were the principal speakers. State and congressional candidates were guests at a recep-tion preceding the banquet. The book lists names of presi-

dents for the past 100 years, names of newspapers belonging to the IREA in 1905 and 1977, significant events in which editors were involved, messages from republican governors and senators, and pictures of people and events. The chapter on women's activities was written by Mrs. Billings.

The IREA was organized by George Langsdale in 1878, then editor of the Greencastle Banner, at the Remy Hotel in Indianapolis. Other Republican editors present at the 1878 meeting were: John G. Bain, Martinsville Republican; T.H.B. McCain, Crawfordsville Journal; A. C. Beeson, Winchester Journal; Charles E. Wilson, Lebanon Patriot; W. H. Elliott New Castle Courier: M. C. son, Lebanon Patriot; W. H. El-liott, New Castle Courier; M. C. Garber, Sr., Madison Courier; I. M. Browb, Columbus Republican; George I. Reed, Peru Republican; Gil Stormont, Princeton Clarion; and M. W. Pershing, Tipton Advo-

It hasn't been that long ago that I can't remember what it was like to be looking forward to a special date or evening, wanting to look my best, and having a pimple break out in the middle of my forehead.

Sounds silly now, but when I was 16 or 17, it wasn't anything to laugh about. Young people are usually very selfconcious, and a few pimples on their face can bring their selfconfidence down to zero spoiling many looked-forward-

What causes acne? Why do some adolescents suffer terribly from it, and others barely at all?

According to a pamphlet released by the Dept. of Health, Education, and Welfare, acne is caused by the rise of male hormones in boys and girls during adolescence, bringing about an increase in the size and activity of oil glands throughout the body. The oily secretion of these glands is an intense irritant if it remains below the skin, and pimples and cysts usually result.

That is why cleanliness is so important; to remove the oils before the pimples occur. However, washing with soap and water after the acne has erupted will probably not do much good. It is advised that your doctor recommend a special cleaner or treatment, and if the acne is severe, that a dermatologist be sought.

Watching your diet is also advised - chocolate, ice cream, cheese, and nuts seem to be related to flare-ups of acne, and through experience, I found that eliminating colas from my diet helped a lot.

Eliminating fatty foods, such as whole milk, eggs, and butter, or highly spiced or fried foods may also help in some cases. Experiment to see what helps you.

It also seemed that when I was nervous or excited I'd always get pimples. So perhaps trying to remain calm before special events will help.

Anyway, acne is a problem that should not be ignored. It may happen to all of us, but it should be treated properly. The emotional problems it can lead to can be severe, and physically, the scarring results can be terrible. Don't pick or pinch pimples! The results will be worse than a pimple untouched.

### State threatens law

Tippecanoe Valley School Board members tabled further discussion on paying mileage for extra-curricular activities for teachers or coaches until their next meeting in November when they will ask for legal counsel to be present to advise them.

counsel to be present to advise them.
At their regular scheduled meeting on Monday, October 16, the
Board was advised by Superintendent, Dr. Lloyd Harrell, that he had
received a phone call from the State Board of Accounts suggesting
that the Board change a decision they had made last month regarding

mileage.

In a state audit, completed in July, auditors found that mileage for extra-curricular activities for coaches and teachers was being paid with taxpayers money from the general fund. The State Board advised the Valley Board that this was illegal and that they should immediately discontinue the practice of paying from the general fund. The School Board, however, felt that these extra-curricular activi-

ties are a part of the education of the whole person, and upon re-commendation from Dr. Harrell and attorney Fred Rakestraw, the Board decided to continue payment from the general fund, knowing full well it could lead to a court test case.

Dr. Harrell explained Monday evening that no other school in the state pays mileage from general funds. Most school corporations have Athletic Boosters and Band Boosters, for example, who raise

have Athletic Boosters and Band Boosters, for example, who raise the extra money required for these activities through money raising projects such as chill suppers, and such.

He went on to explain that if the Board continued to pay mileage from the general fund, the State Board of Accounts would advise the state attorney-general, and a law suit would most likely be filed against Tippecanoe Valley's treasurer, Judy Hively. Hively would not be personally subject to the suit, however, as she is bonded against personal less. personal loss.

Dr. Harrell went on to state that he thinks "this (policy) needs to be challenged", and added that he "thinks they (State Board of Accounts) are afraid they will lose ... so they want to talk you out

Board member Everett Besson asked "how much money is involved?", and Harrell replied about \$6000 from the athletic fund and some from other funds

some from other funds.

In discussion that followed, the Board members, including president
Con Shewman, Don Snipes, Besson, Vernon Meredith, and Lee Norris, semmed to be at a loss as to what they should do. There was discussion favoring a court case, but not wholeheartedly.

Trustee Norris stated, "I think you lose if you win...when you balance it all out, you would still be a loser." Apparently referring to
the cost of a lengthy court trial.

An estimated 20 mercury vapor lamp lights were destroyed at Tippecanoe Valley High School this past week when someone went on a shooting spree, according to Mentone Town Marshal Earl Beattie.

Using a 22 caliber pistol or rifle, 13 lights in the parking lot were shot out, the security light at the pump station was destroyed, the security lights over the gas pumps were shot out, and the lights over the northwest entrance to the school were blown out.

George Welch, assistant principal at TVHS, reported the vandalism to Beattie on Thursday, October 12, at 9:30 a.m. According to a custodian who ar-rived at work on October 11 at 10 p.m., the lights were all on and working when he went into the school.



No arrests have been made, but Beattie reported it is under investigation at this time.

# School libraries found lacking

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board met in regular session on Monday, October 16, at the TV HS lecture room with all members present. Minutes of the September 18 meeting were ap proved as read, and claims total-ing \$43,189.87 were paid. Gross payroll for September

Gross payroll for September 15-30 was paid, totaling \$75, 240.03 with net at \$56,085.16, and gross payroll for October 1-15 was paid, totaling \$72,907. 48 with net at \$54,856.13. In the monthly financial report,

given by Superintendent, Dr. Lloyd Harrell, it was learned that the corrected bank balance at the Akron Exchange State Bank is

\$43,865.94, and the balance at the Farmers State Bank is \$17, 014.16, giving a total of \$60,700. 10. Along with investments totaling \$600,000.00, this brings the entire total to \$660,700.10.

Dr. Harrell reported that Larry Lawmaster has been in contact with him, and that the school roof repairs will begin as soon as weather permits.

Ed LaMar, head of the media program for Tippecanoe School Corporation presented his findings on the library status of each school at Tippecance, and recommended the hiring of a full-time librarian and two full-time aides to work at the elementary

Volunteers from Mentone, present at the meeting, reported that they have been working six hour days to aide LaMar at Men-tone School.

The status of the elementary libraries is far below state re-commendations according to La Mar, even though he and the vol-unteers have been doing their best, especially at Mentone where a library is trying to be

The Board agreed to hire a full-time aide for Mentone, but because the budget has already been set, they could not hire a librarian this year. Volunteers present expressed their gratitude, as many complaints have been received regarding the library at Mentone School.



The Las Donas Club is very sorry that the Secrist's are upset over the scholarship. The rules have been set long ago - the club has never had any difficulties or problems with our scholarship in all the years it has been given.

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# They show horses don't they?

What do Crown Point, Argos, Plymouth, and Alexandria have in common besides being cities in Indiana?

Eight-year old Jamie Murfitt of Akron knows because she has first place blue ribbons she won in each of these cities, riding her horse "Doc's Tablet" in Quarter Horse "walk-trot" competition this year.

Jamie is the daughter of Larry and Judy Murfitt who life just northwest of Akron on a farm they call "Wind Mill Quarter Horse Farms". The Murfitts also have a four-year-old son, "T.J." Larry owns the Akron Insurance Agency.

Winning those first place ribbons is no easy task for a young girl, especially when she has to compete in her "10 and under" age class against several other youngsters 2-3 years older than her.

"The competition is really stiff" says Judy, who, along with Larry and T.J., travel as a family to several horse shows a season with Jamie.

There is a lot of hard work and long hours involved in raising and showing Quarter horses but the Murfitt's all agree they enjoy it. Larry feels "it's really a family hobby more than anything else". Jamie agrees, saying "it's lots of fun and we meet friends".

The family's interest in horses began as an extension of Larry's own lifetime love of horses, which began when he was growing up on a farm near Rochester.

Larry recalled that he has been interested in horse competition from the time, back in junior high, that "Tom Wilson and I talked 'Aunt' Helen Gaumer into driving us to our first horse show". Tom is now owner of Wilson Coal and Grain in Rochester.

Judy, who grew up in Gary, but 'wouldn't move back to a large

city for anything" became a horse enthusiast when she said "I do" at the time of her marriage to Larry. "I kind-of knew what I was getting into," she says today. She evidently did know, because this July she placed sixth in the Indiana State show in the English riding class of Quarter horse competition.

Even young T.J. is starting to get into the act. During a recent show he finished with a respectable second place ribbon in a "kiddy lead-in" competition riding the family pony, named "Cindy". Cindy is the same pony Jamie learned to ride solo on.

Doc's Tablet, the horse Jamie competes on today, is a four-year-old mare the Murfitt's purchased this summer from Sandy Utter also of Akron. "Tab", as the horse is called by her owners, is 15.2 "hands" tall. Larry explained that the "hands" method of measuring horses is a tradition because "old horse traders" used to alternate their hands up the side of a horse to find out how tall the horse was. A "hand" is equal to four inches, or the average width across a man's palm when pressed up against a horse.

up against a horse.

When competing, Jamie gets dressed up in a snappy western outfit hand made by Marion Hunter of Akron. The outfit is complete with cowboy "chaps", the leather leg protectors cowboys wore to guard their legs against rough brush and foliage while riding on trails. All the Murfitt's wear western boots everyday, just "because we always have I guess" Larry said.

October usually marks the end of most area outdoor competition in the American Quarter Horse Youth Association (AQHYA) of which Jamie is a member. Next year will be even tougher for her as she will enter competition with youngsters up to 13 years of age, but her mother feels Jamie will be ready for it. "Both Jamie and Tab are growing and maturing in their experiences together."

It's easy to see that both Jamie and T.J. have interited their parents love of horses. Jamie is looking forward to eventually competing in a class known as the "Hunt Seat" or "English Pleasure". In this class the horse is judged by the way it is handled on general commands a rider normally would give a horse on a ride for pleasure. It differs from "Western Pleasure", explains

Judy, because it is more "Prim and Proper". "It's my favorite" beamed Jamie.

Although the show season ends grooming and raising the horses goes on the year around. All the family pitches in, but Larry still handles most of the upkeep duties.

Yount T.J. is learning the hard way how and how not to help.

Larry recalled that he and T.J. were recently in the barn brushing Tab when all of a sudden T. J. was underneath the mare brushing her belly. Although a serious reaction by the horse could have happened, but fortunately didn't, T.J. got the message from Dad. He walked into the house and told Mom, "I'm not supposed to walk under horses". Mom got the message, also.

- 11/4 cups (about 25 cookies) fine gingersnap crumbs
- ¼ cup sugar
- ¼ cup butter or margarine melted
- 4 cups (2 pints) softened vanilla ice cream
- 1 cup cooked pumpkin
- ½ cup firmly packed brown sugar

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No Coupons Needed

- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. ground ginger
- ¼ tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. vanilla

(9 inch square) 8-10 servings

In a medium mixing bowl, combine the gingersnap crumbs, sugar and melted butter; mix well with a fork until well blended. Reserve ½ cup; press remaining crumbs into a 8 or 9 inch square pan. Set aside.

In a large mixer bowl, combine the remaining ingredients; beat just until well combined. Immediately pour over crumb crust, and sprinkle with the remaining crumb mixture. Freeze until firm; at least four hours

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# Canvas and tarps are Clayton's business

Since 1948 Clayton Holloway has had a business on the sidelines and today has developed it into a full time job.

His wife, Maxine, helps by holdi g and pulling the canvas as tlayton sews up tarps for boats, awnings and trucks, and tops for pontoons. He also does quite a bit of repair work for campers and other recreational vehicles.

"When first starting out, I worked during the war, and was in Washington, D.C. when the Atom bomb was dropped," said Clayton. Later, he was in charge of sewing at Mentone Mfg. Co., where army and navy stretchers were constructed during the war.

While working full time at Bendix Corp. in South Bend, Clayton kept up his part-time canvas work at home in his garage. Five years ago he retired and developed his canvas business into fulltime work.

"The first tarp I ever made was for a farm truck belonging to Fred Mallott Sr," says Clayton, and his first awning was made for Lena Igo.

The canvas he uses is ordered from Chicago and usually takes three days for delivery. Then, the measuring and fitting begins. "After sewing pieces together, I put the canvas on the boat, for example, and pull and stretch and tape it to fit snug, and sew again," explains Holloway.

For 20 years, he and Maxine have also made tents for the Walgamuth Vault Co. in Akron. "A lot of our business comes from the lake areas," he adds.

One of their customers even made the "Circus Hall of Fame" in Sarasota, Florida. We don't know how much credit the tarp had for this, but the Holloways did some big sewing for this man.

'A man working for the Cole Bros. Circus started taking four or five circus animals to schools," explains Clayton, and "for a show he needed a huge tarp for the act." So Maxine and Clayton made a house-call with their sewing machine. They went to the gym of a nearby school and sewed canvas pieces together forming a huge circle. They don't claim it was their tarp that made the man successful, but they are proud of the fact that they helped him out!

Next week, the Holloways will be celebrating 45 years of mar-riage and 42 years in the same home in Mentone.

Their sons, Robert and Max Holloway have helped them through the years, and their three grandchildren even pitch in once in awhile. (Make that four grandchildren as of Wednesday night.)

Being "the only business of it's kind in Kosciusko, Marshall, and Fulton Counties," the Holloway's have a unique business. They certainly make a happy team, and seem to enjoy their work.

Every December they go to Florida to enjoy the sunshine, but are always back by May 1st when their "tarp season" begins.
