

Pike Lumber and residents file suit

Fifteen people and two businesses annine land adjacent to the for the provide the second se

The people and the businesses filed a complaint against the State of Indiana on Sept. 12 in Fulton Circuit Court to get the land that the Chicago and Atlantic Railroad began using in mid-1882.

The plaintiffs in the case claim that their real estate titles granted the Chicgao and Atlantic Railroad and its successors easement to the land for railroad purposes. They contend the land is not being used for railroad purposes anymore and their titles should have the easement condition removed.

Filing the suit were Pike Lumber Co. Inc., Sonoco Products Co., Homer Sampsel, Douglas V. Sampsel, Stephen K. Hartzler and Kathryn I. Hartzler, Robert D. Merley and June Merley, Oren D. Norman and Ruth E. Norman, Homer L. Carr and Marianne Carr, Dick A. Miller and Trene Miller, James J. Fritts, and Morse M. Utter and Patricia I. Utter.

In Fulton County, L.B. Foster Co. bought about 14 miles of

Erie-Lackawanna single-track right-of-way, 100 feet wide, between the castern boundary near Disko and the intersection of the Erie-Lackawanna and the northsouth Norfolk and Western Railway on Erie Street at the north edge of Rochester. Similar suits have been filed by landowners in Porter County in northwest Indiana. That suit was yenued to Jasper County.

Rochester attorney Jesse Brown is representing the plaintiffs and he said the land in the case is not one continuous tract. The portions involve "hop and skips" between Rochester and the east end of Akron. "It seems like there are a million abandoned railroads around the country. It's an issue whose time has come," be said.

Ordinance Declaring The moval And Fixing Penalties Accumulation of Waste Material To Be Nulsances, Providing For Ita

Be it hereby ordained that the following two paragraphs be made additions to Akron Town Ordinance 28-73:


Section 2(a) it shall be further unlawful for any property owner, lessee, renter, or occupant of any property within the Corporate Limits of the Town of Akron to allow grass, brush, weeds, or other noncloss living plants to accumulate of said property or to grave to a height of over twelve (12) inches.

Section 4(a) in addition to the above penalty for violation of this Ordinance the Town of Akion may remove or cause to be removed any accumulation of waste material, trash, brush, weeds, atc. from the property with the spense of such removal being made a tien against the property in accordance with pertinent State Statutes.

Passed and adopted at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Akron, County of Fulton, State of Indiana this 18th day of September 1984.







"HIGH-SPEED" TO THE RESCUE

Tremendous improvements have been made in the efficiency of dental services. An example is the equipment used to prepare the teeth for fillings and crowns. For years dentists have used rotary tools (drills) for this purpose. These cutting instruments rotated at a top speed of 5,000 rpm's. Discomfort was often felt from the vibration, pressure and heat that developed in the use of these instruments.

These instruments. Today, improvements in the drill motors and the use of the turbine principle permit speeds of up to 300,000 revolutions per-minute. Only a very light touch is required to cut enamel and den-tin at these high speeds. The rotations are so rapid that the sense of vibration is eliminated. Of course heat is generated by such rapid cutting, but the instruments are devised so that a spray of water and air is directed at the area being prepared, keeping the temperature comfortable. The advent of the high speed drill and new types of superior cutting tools add up to loss drilling time and more comfort in den-tal procedures.



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

NorthWood ends Vikes playoff hopes

The Tippecanoe Valley varsity football team saw any chances of a Cluster 34 playoff fall by the wayside last Friday evening when visiting Northwood rolled over the Vikings 41-14.

Rampaging Northwood built a quick 21-0 lead against the Vikings - the Panthers' third touchdown coming while the field was darkened by a lighting failure - en route to a convincing triumph that sets up a Cluster 34 showdown in two weeks.

Northwood now leads the cluster with a 2-0 record but must beat Whitko at home on October 12 to earn a berth in the Class AA playoffs. Whitko fell to 1-1 in the cluster with a 24-21 loss to Rochester, also 1-1, but remains alive in the playoff setup. A Whitko win over Northwood

would give the Wildcats a tie for the cluster title, depending on the outcome of the Rochester-Valley game. Wins by both Whitko and Rochester in two weeks would create a three-way tie, which would be played off with the IHSAA overtime procedure. In case of a two-way tie, the team that wins the game between the tied schools advances to the playoffs.

Valley, 0-2 in the cluster, will not return to the playoffs. Coach Jim Andrews' Panthers ensured that, beating the Vikings with a balanced attack that featured the throwing of junior quarterback Scott Crist and the running of backs Jamie Lengacher and Thad Grove. Northwood gained 198 yards through the air and 192 on the ground.

The offensive leader for Northwood was the 6-4, 190 pound Crist.

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He completed nine of 18 passes for 188 yards and a touchdown and ran for 41 yards. His 29-yard touchdown scamper and perfect, 56-yard touchdown toss to Robin Wenger in the first quarter set the tone for the game.

Although the final margin Valley's worst defeat matched ever, the Vikings were not punchiess. They rushed for 185 yards and scored a late first-half touchdown that kept their hopes alive through intermission

Following Northwood's first punt of the game, the Vikings drove 76 yards in 11 plays for their first touchdown. Reserve fullback Shane Picklesimer dived three yards for the score and quarterback Phil King passed to Kreg Warren for wo points after the Vikings faked a kick

Valley's second touchdown followed a fumble by Lengacher on a Valley punt. The Vikings' Andrew Wood recovered at the Panther 27 yard line on the final play of the third quarter. Six plays later, fullback Rob Dunnuck ran two vards for the touchdown. King was sacked attempting to pass for two points.

Tailback Dan Cave led the Viking offense with 68 yards on 14 carries Dunnuck, who set out much of the first half with a neck injury, rushed for 41 yards on nine carries.

The Vikings were unable to pass effectively against Northwood, which allowed only its second and third TDs of the season. King completed three of 10 passes for only 25 yards and two interceptions. Dunnuck also was inter-

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cepted on a fullback pass. Both teams were hurt by penalties, Northwood totaling 90 yards and Valley 65.

The Vikings suffered several injuries, the most serious a back injury to running back Jerry Cumberland, who was taken to Kosciusko Community Hospital. Tackle Craig Adams suffered a hand injury that required X-rays. Valley, now 4-2, returns to Three

Rivers Conference action at Oak Hill this Friday. In halftime ceremonies for the

Architects present report on feasibility study

At last Monday's meeting of the Valley school board, representatives from the Fanning and Howey Architectural Firm reported on their preliminary studies of the Burket, Akron and Mentone schools.

With schemes briefly outlining the costs of major, moderate and minor remodeling and the cost of new construction, the representatives presented estimates for all three schools and options which could include a junior high for grades six through eight or a junior high for only grades seven and eight.

Stating that the estimates were the highest costs the firm thought would be necessary to give the corporation facilities that were as good as new buildings, the architects reported they felt the figures could be reduced with more detailed planning. The ballpark figures disclosed in the report were: Akron - \$3,214,180; Mentone - \$3,499,325; and Burket -\$810.340. Board president Fred McSherry announced that he was "disappointed" to see the cost of remodeling was very close to the cost of new construction, adding his main interest in the study had been to compare costs.

Members of Panning/Howay will meet with trustees next Monday evening. Oct. 22 for a planning session to pinpoint what the board specifically wants changed, and a public meeting will be held the following Monday (Oct. 29) to report their findings.

Board members unanimously an proved recommendations by Superintendent Baxter Paige and TVHS principal John Hill to place the building trades program into the vocational program. Paige reported greater resources would be forth coming from the State Department, and there would be possibility of pre-sale of houses or buildings constructed by the class. Paige mentioned that in the event Warsaw High School dropped their building trades class, the Valley

program, as part of the county vocational program, would possibly have other students joining the class.

Trustees heard reports on Chapter II grant application and a Computer Grant, and they approved both. The Chapter II grant offers funding for elementary and secondary guidance and testing, supplies from the Northern Indiana Education Service Center and computer supplies and equipment. The Computer Grant, offered by the Indiana Consortium for Computers in Higher Education, earmarks monies to train educators in the use of computers. A committee, headed by vice-principal Mark Skiles, has worked on a schedule to train teachers in computer operation. The committee composed of Skiles, Ed LaMar, Wayne Cumberland, Jon Parker, Scot Collins, Ann Chubb, Marna Riedl and Jane Hunn.

In other business: Paige reported enrollment as of September 14 was 2039 corporation-wide.

Trustees adopted both the Board Policy Manual and the Bus Policy Manual. The only change to either manual from last year's manuals was a change that states parentteacher conferences will be set by trustees and made a part of the school calendar.

Board members accepted a recommendation from Sandy Carmichael to appoint Barbara Haines, Bev Thompson, Darla Shafer and Judy Egolf to the Home Economics Advisory Committee.

In personnel matters, trustees accepted the resignation, effective at the end of the 1984-85 school year, of LaDonna Rader. She is

retiring after 34 years of teaching, all but one of those years spent working for the Tippecanoe Valley Corporation. Since 1961, she has

Government free land information

The ad says: "FREE GOVERN-MENT LAND!" That sounds sounds intriguing. Then there is a list of questions and answers: What are the prospects for acquiring govern-ment land? "All you have to do is send \$15.00 for our list of thousands of pieces of government land." Is it free? "Much of this land is free." How difficult is it to buy? "All you need is our list to get the simple steps on how to become the owner of government land." However, these answers are not entirely accurate.

To help provide accurate infor-mation, the Bureau of Land of Land Management of the U.S. Department of the Interior has published a booklet called, Can I Really Get Free or Cheap Public Land? It tells what land is available, what kinds are not, and what you need to do to buy government land. For your copy, send \$2.25 to the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 170M, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

Many times the inaccurate information about public land comes from promoters who give the impression that they are part of the U.S. Government. They sell lists or brochures that are supposed to let you in on where you can find free or low-cost public lands. Each year, many citizens pay for these services on the assumption they are getting inside information. But, no matter what these ads say, no free public land is available to private individuals. Homesteading on public lands is a thing of the past.

What happened to homesteading? The Homesteading Act, passed in 1862 to encourage settlement of the nation, was repealed for all states except Alaska in 1976. Homesteading was

discontinued because all the good agricultural land had already been transferred out of federal ownership. The public land that is left is not suitable for farming. These remaining public lands are different from national parks, forests, wildlife refuges, monuments, wilderness areas. military reservations, or other lands administered by various federal agencies, and they are almost all located in the western states

The government does sell public land to private individuals (at fair market value). Land is usually sold auction through competitive bidding. The Bureau of Land Management is the official source for reliable information on public land sales. They can answer any questions concerning the cedure of buying land, the prohow payment is made, and your rights of ownership. Can I Really Get Free or Cheap Public Land? (\$2.25) lists the addresses for the regional offices as well as more information about public lands.

In addition to the public lands that are sold, the government regularly sells property that it no longer uses. The General Services Administration sells everythning from small lots and houses to office industrial complexes to buildings, generally at auction or by sealed bid. To learn more about

these sales, send for a free copy of Sales of Federal Surplus Real Estate (Item 576M). It is updated regularly and includes the specific properties that will be sold within the next few months.







Members of KOSCOCAP (Kosciusko County Child Abuse Prevention) met recently at Bowen Center with the Xi Epsilon lota chapter of Beta Sigma Phi to organize the first phase of its educational program, exual abuse protection. With sorority, funding from the KOSCOCAP will produce the play "Little Bear" to be presented to young school children in the county.

Delores Hearn, chairman of the child abuse program, focused on the aspect of sexual abuse by showing a video-tape of "Little Bear" as done by the Bridgework Players of Goshen, from whom KOSCOCAP has purchased the script. The play, using the characters of Big Bear, Little Bear, Big Moose and Little Moose, gives young children information and teaches them skills in dealing with the very sensitive and complicated subject of sexual abuse. The main messages that children receive from the twenty-minute drama are to say "no" to touches that make them feel uncomfortable and to tell a trusted adult when someone touches them in ways they don't like. The play, communicating its messages in a non-threatening way, also emphasizes that the child is not to blame in instances of sexual abuse.

that such abuse happens to as many as one out of ten children. The average age of children who are abused or neglected is seven and a half, and 66 percent of the children reported as maltreated are

Trick or treat dos and don'ts

Too many times, innocent children are harmed or seriously injured (sometimes fatally) during Halloween "Trick or Treat" time. If parents would give some attention to the following do's and don'ts, your children would be assured of making this Halloween a happy, safe time.

1. A responsible adult should always accompany very young children during their trick or treat rounds. Do not rely on young teenagers or a 10 or 11-year-old sister or brother.

2. Children should be instructed to confine their trick or treat visits to their own immediate neighborhood.

3. Children should be advised not to enter any home during their visits unless it is the home of a relative or a neighbor known to be friendly.

4. Children should be advised to beware of vicious pets in the neighborhood.

5. Children should be instructed not to damage property, such as flower beds and to be courteous and respectful.

6. Long Halloween costumes may be impractical - if the children will be climbing stairs, crossing streets, etc., they could trip and harm themselves.

 Masks, however colorful and exciting, can restrict vision and be dangerous. Facial makeup (eyeliner, eye shadow, lipstick and makeup bases) is preferable. If your child wears a mask, be sure he/she has an unobstructed vision.

Most importantly, urge your children to wait until they return bome before eating any of their "treats." You should thoroughly check the contents of their bags to see if any candy has been tampered with. Throw away unwrapped candy and wash all fruit.

 Preferably, children should wear light-colored costames (nonflammable) and either carry a lighted flashlight or other reflective material, if they are out after dark.
