

# Isn't It **Amazing**

Some things never tail to amaze me. Have you noticed the number of flies making their way into your home toward the fall months? The fly swatter has become a permanent part of our family room and would you believe the minute the swatter is raised, the flies disappear? Some friends of ours have cattle, and the flies are having a hayday at their house, too. Doug waved his hand repeatedly the other night shooing a fly from his arm only to have the fly return again and again. Now, if the fly knew it was going to be shooed away each time, why land in the same spot? Being driven to distraction with the flies, I decided I needed to get my mind on something else. Then it happened. While driving to work, a church in Warsaw had the following saying out front: "If Noah would have been wise, he would have swatted those two flies.

Hurray! Someone else was battling the flies besides myself.

In the past couple of days, before taking a nap or laying down to watch television, we first rid the household of the pesky flies. We know from past experience the minute a person settles himself for a rest that at least one fly appears from nowhere to land on your nose. A person begins by being patient, swatting the fly several times. But, as the fly returns again and again, patience wears thin. Before long, you find yourself jumping from the couch, grabbing the nearest paper, rolling it into a wand and swatting at the fly no matter where it lands. Unfortunately, you miss most of the time. (What's this? You thought you heard a tiny, shrill laugh as the fly buzzed by?)

There's a method to catching these fast and cagey insects. You just have to perfect it. Here are a few things we have tried:

(1) Toy with the fly. Let him know you're someone to be reckoned with! Follow him through the house for awhile and see how he likes it.

(2) Catch the fly by hand! This can be done, Doug does it all the time. You wait until the fly has landed, sneak up behind him so all those eyes can't see you, bring your arm back as if you were going to slap someone, cup your hand, and with lightening speed, scoop up the fly in your hand, closing your fingers tightly and quickly. You'd be surprised how fast they will escape through your fingers. Next, shake your hand up and down like shaking dice, stand with your feet apart, and with great force throw the fly on the ground. The fly will fly in circles, dizzy, long enough to allow you to get the fly swatter and finish the job.

(3) Put the fly in solitary confinement! I have been known to sneak up behind a fly, placing a paper cup over him. This allowed him time to think about what he had done. However, later when I removed the cup, no fly was there. I guess he had spent time around Houdini and perfected a disappearing act.

(4) Last, but not least, is to perfect your aim with the swatter. We all know flies are notoriously fast buzzing in a door when you close it as fast as you can, but as long as you keep the fly swatter behind your back where the fly can't see it until the last minute, and you sneak up on his blind side (behind him), and he is on a flat surface, you should be suc-

(5) If all else fails, sleep under mosquito netting!!

Public Service Indiana is requesting regulatory approval to make long-term wholesale power sales at negotiated

The company filed its proposal with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which regulates utility wholesale power

"We're one of the first electric utilities to ask FERC for the authority to sell wholesale power at negotiated prices," said James E. Rogers Jr., PSI chairman. 'Our company faces a number of financial challenges during the next decade to comply with environmental regulations, keep our power plants running and continue to provide customers with safe and reliable ower. Our current weakened financial condition makes raising the capital to meet these needs difficult. We see selling our power at market prices to other utilias a way to rebuild our financial health and mitigate future rate increases.

Because of the demand for power in various regions of the United States, PSI believes there's an emerging market where utilities are willing to buy electricity on a long-term basis and at market

i. .ible pricing of long-term power sales would be beneficial to all parties involved, Rogers said. The utility buying the power can avoid the cost of building costly new base-load generating capacity to meet customer demand. For PSI, the assured sales at market prices will help the company run its electrical system more efficiently and will bring additional revenues. Would help reduce or stabilize customer rates.

"In exchange for increase pricing flexibility from FERC, we will also agree to allow utility and non-utility power generators greater access to our transmission system," Rogers said. "This will help meet regional power needs and make better use of everyone's power resources."

In its FERC petition, PSI also said that departure from traditional regulation would advance te goals of the goals of the Federal Power Act and te Department of Energy Organization Act in "promoting an abundant supply of electric energy at just and reasonable rates, increasing the efficient utilization of electric generating resources and fostering competition among parties engages in the supply of

PSI has up to 450 megawatts of baseload generating capacity available for long-term contracts. It hopes to have FERC authority to sell its power at market





With interest in hybrid corn steadily mounting throughout the Corn Belt, farmers in the county are expected to pay particular attention during the harvest season to the yield percounty are expected to pay particular attention during the narvest season to the yield per-formance of locally popular hybrid varieties in hopes of learning which will be best for them to plant in 1940. Leroy Norris of Mentone has gone one step farther and adopted scientific experiment station methods to prove to himself and other local corn growers just what the various highly publicized hybrid varieties will do on Kosciusko county farms. Last spring he planted more than a dozen different varieties in a 5-acre proving field near here and now farmers have an opportunity to see the difference in the varieties as they grow side by side under the same conditions of soil and weather. He reports that local farmers are showing a great deal of interest in the test plot and several are going through the field every day. From the wide variety selection, they are able to find corn that meets all of their many needs, including many types of kernels and ears ranging from the smooth and shiny to the soft and rough and stalk heights from very tall down to almost sweet corn height. Plans are under way to hold a public husking bee and visitors will be welcomed to see the varieties husked out and the final yields compared.

# Final step in PSI's 'New Lower Rates'

Public Service Indiana customers will receive their second rate decrease in two

years, effective Oct. 1.

The 4.2 percent decrease wraps up PST's "New Lower Rates" program, which started in 1988, and brings rates down to 1988 levels. If the utility's rate case now, pending before the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commissions is approved, customer rats are expected to stay at these levels until 1993.

The effect of the Oct. 1 rate decrease on each customer's bill depends on electricity usage. An average residential customer who use 1,000 kilowatt-hours a

month would pay about \$3 less.
Under PSI's New Lower Rates program, last year customers received a 9 percent rate decrease in July and a \$50 million rebate in September.

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

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

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

# Deer & Deer Hunting

Deer whistles, safety devices mounted to the front of cars and trucks, may be a fraud. Air flow generated by an equipped vehicle in motion supposedly causes a deer whistle to emit ultrasonic sound which frightens deer away or inhibits them from jumping in front of oncoming

According a article published in the November 1989 issue of Deer & Deer Hunting Magazine, the ability of deer whistles to perform as advertised may be

a hoax. The article states two independent research teams determined at least one brand of deer whistle did not emit

ultrasonic sound under advertised conditions. The article further comments little is known about the auditory limits of deer.

In addition, if deer do hear ultrasound, it is unclear how they behavior is affected by it.

Over 200,000 deer-car-collisions occur every year. One hundred people die an-nually as a result. According to one Michigan study, the average property damage is \$730 per collision.

Public Service Indiana Chairman, James E. Rogers today told a congressional subcommittee his company is willing to pay its fair share to clean the air-but not more.

Rogers also said utilities which have already invested millions to reduce sulfur dioxide emissions should not be penalized for their efforts.

He testified before the Subcommittee on Energy and Power, chaired by Rep. Philip R. Sharp from Indiana, which is hearing testimony on H.R. 3030--President Bush's acid rain proposal. The subcommittee is under the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

"We recognize that large coal-fired utility plants contribute to the nation's inventory of sulfur dioxide," Rogers said. "But these plants are not the only source of SO2 and, therefore, should not have to bear the full cost of compliance. In addition, Indiana should not be required to make 11.8 percent of the nation's SO2 emission reductions when our state only contributed 7.5 percent."

PSI has cut its \$02 emission rate by 22 percent since 1980 and reduced its overall emissions by 110,000 tons per year. Regardless of congressional action on clean air legislation, Rogers said that PSI's \$02 emissions will be reduced even further because of state air-quality regulations.

If H.R. 3030 passes as proposed, PSI would be required to reduce current S02 emissions by more than two-thirds. To bring its power plants into compliance, the company would likely build five scrubbers, which could cost more than \$200 million each. Customer rates could also increase 25 percent by the year 2001. For a residential customer with a monthly bill of \$50, this could mean an increase of \$10 to \$12 a month.

"We are not suggesting we should escape from having to clean up our share of the emissions," Rogers told Sharp's subcommittee. "We ask only that we not be required to clean up for other utilities

unless they share in the cost...PSI also supports a mechanism for allocating a fair share of the S02 reduction costs to industrial sources of S02, which account for roughly one-quarter of S02 emissions nationwide."

Cost-sharing remedies that might be considered include an emission-based fee on all sources that are not now required to make \$02 emission reductions. Rogers said. Another solution could be a small fee for all electric customers mationwide, based on electrical usage. This fee could amount to 50 cents a month on a typical residential bill.

Proponents of cost sharing in pending clean air legislation are seeking fairness and adherance to a sound national energy policy. Rogers concluded in his testimony, not environmental concessions.



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

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

Thad Leininger, an eight-year 4-H member from Burket, received the Loren Michel Award for sportsmanship and mental attitude at the Indiana State Fair


Thad has shown sheep at the State Fair every year he has been in 4-H.


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# **Akron EMT's**

The Akron Unit of Fulton County Emergency Medical Service has operated the ambulance in our community since July 1977. It currently has 14 members. Included are seven Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians, two Basic Emergency Medical Technicians. nicians and five drivers. In the last few months the service has become an Advanced Life Support Ambulance. Advanced EMT's are first Basic EMT's who go through an addi-

tional 60 hours of training and may start IV's, defibrillate, or provide advanced airway management skills.

Advanced airway management allows for a more stable airway in the event a patient has stopped breathing. New equipment was added, including a heart-start monitor/defibrillator, used to monitor heart rythms and to attempt to restart the heart if it has stopped. The IV skill is helpful to replace fluids in the event of shock, and as an ave-


nue to administer drugs, once the patient has reached the hospital.

The unit is currently working with the fire department on the completion of their combined day room/meeting room in the new Akron Fire Station and Town Hall.

The unit is always looking for new people to volunteer as drivers or to become EMTs.


