seventh and eighth grade students in addition to a second gymnasium. That report met objections from Richard Day and other Akron citizens who felt the present system with junior highs in both Akron and Mentone should be maintained. According to Ms. Boling the group has not yet discussed buildings.

A second gym is being considered because the present facility is in use from 6 a.m. until 10 p.m. Board president Fred McSherry stated that was "too early and too late." He felt that a gym should be considered rather than to cut programs. "I'd rather build a gym than put kids on the street," he said, and added that enrollment figures seemed to point to the need for more space.

Board members Jeff Tilden and Joe Crill both expressed the opinion that more information was needed before any decision was made.

In other action the board:

*Heard a three-year curriculum plan presented by Karen Boling. Training and cooperative learning, assertive discipline and the Quest program were three of the focal points. Those on the committee who prepared the report were: Joe Crill, Brett Boggs, Oliver England, Wayne Cumberland, Elaine Fugate, Dan Kramer, Ed LaMar, Pam McFarland, Rick Ralston, Marilyn Ruberg, Ivan Schuler, Jean Smith and Deb Whistler.

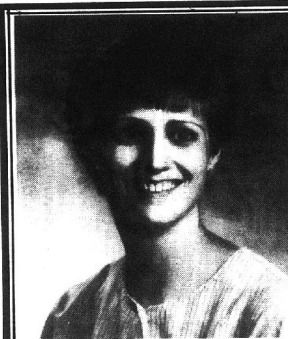
*Heard that the corporation's enrollment as of September 13 was 2,092. This is 26 more students than last year. Superintendent Baxter Paige noted that there is a slight decline in high school enrollment at the present time but that would be changing in the next few years. There are 130 seniors this year but there are 190 third graders. Total enrollment in the high school is 555. Akron School has 710 students enrolled in kindergarten through grade eight, while Mentone has 630, also K-8. Burket Elementary, which is for pupils in kindergarten through grade five, has 120 students enrolled.

The remainder of the enrollment is composed of students in co-op and AIMS programs or those who are home- or private-schooled.

*Granted approval for Lisa Myers, FFA chapter advisor, to take a group of students to a judging contest and dairy show in Madison, WI and an FFA meeting in Kansas City, MO. The FFA chapter will be paying its own expenses.

*Approved a contract for Dr. Francisco Negreros to serve as corporation physician.

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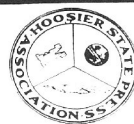

It Happened In Mentone

IT HAPPENED IN MENTONE
TAKEN FROM THE NORTHERN INDIANA CO-OP NEWS
OCTOBER 1, 1941
50 YEARS AGO

Wm. Earl Rush writes from Iceland Marine Base-WM. Ray Rush, of Mentone, who is stationed in Iceland with the U.S. Marines, recently wrote the following letter to his parents:

Sunday, August 17, 1941
Iceland

Dear Mother, Dad, and all:

Well I expect that it is about time that I am sounding off and as the mail goes in a few days I want to get this in it. We have been here five weeks now and I am beginning to get used to it. The customs here are strange; so are the language and money.

I am a long way from home but I am getting to see a lot of places that I had never dreamed of seeing. The country here is very mountainous and of volcanic origin. There are several geysers and hot springs.

There is one hot spring about one-fourth mile from camp which has been piped to a large artificial pool. The water in this stays around 70 or 75 degrees the year around. It costs the equivalent of about 10c to go swimming there. Suits and towels are furnished by the people who own the pool.

We are only about one mile from the capital city so you can see that we are very well situated. The main town is about the size of Warsaw but it is a lot older. The people in it are friendly enough but the different language makes it at times rather difficult to get along. Most of the younger Icelanders speak and understand English as in the past few years they have been teaching it in their schools. Their language is not very hard to learn and already I have mastered quite a few words and phrases.

It wasn't at all hard to learn the value of their money as it was divided almost like ours. Their Kromer is similar to our dollar and their Aurur is similar to our penny-100 Aurur equal one Kromer. The rate of exchange is 6 1/2 Kromer for \$1.00. The price of things is about the same if not a little higher. Cigarettes and things of that sort are the same price as in the States in as much as we get all the things like that through the Marine Post Exchange.

When we first came here it seemed quite cold due to the fact that we had experienced such hot weather in the Canal Zone; but after getting used to it it isn't bad at all. Today and yesterday have been two of the nicest days we have had. It seems just like a warm spring day now. When we first arrived it was light all the time but now there is about 3 1/2 hours of darkness each night.

There is only one paved road in all Iceland, the rest wouldn't even compare with our poorest country roads. Their most popular means of travel are bicycle and ponies. If there is a full grown horse in all of Iceland, I haven't seen it yet.

By the way, the First Sergeant told me that I was to receive my warrant for Corporal some time today. It is supposed to be dated the 7th of August but for some reason they weren't sent her immediately. As you can probably guess I am very happy about it all and intend to do my best to hold it. There is also a very nice raise in pay that should help considerably. I was getting \$36 per month and now I will get \$54 per month.

I guess that as I have written about all that I can think of now is a good time to close.

New display at Akron Library

Mrs. Bill (Margel) Craig has a lovely display of some of her needle work in the display case at the Akron Public Library.

Among the pieces in counted needlepoint is a tray sample which illustrates ten traditional quilt patterns worked on linen canvas with silk embroidery floss.

There is a pillow sampler with eighteen needlepoint stitches worked on mono canvans with silk embroidery floss.

There are two pieces of Hardanger which is named for the Hardanger District on the west coast of Norway where the technique as we know it today developed and prospered.

There are samples of crewel embroidery of wool yarn on linen; Battenburg lace and Mountmellick embroidery which originated in Ireland.

Among the articles is a pillow with Blackwork and Holbein embroidery and one with Brazilian embroidery. A picture is also in the case done with blackwork embroidery.

There are also some pictures using silk and metal floss on congress cloth, and some

pulled canvas, sometimes called pulled thread work.

Come in and see this beautiful display and if you are interested in learning how to make some of these things, mention it to the Librarian.

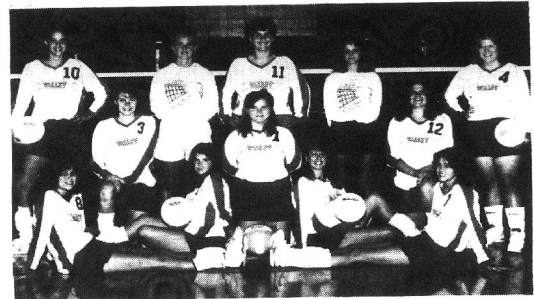

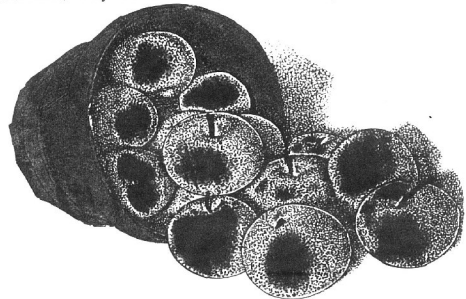

North Central Cooperative, Inc.

The North Central Cooperative, run by newly appointed Plant Manager Phil Runkle, serves Mentone area farmers. "My goal," says Phil, "is to promote the use of agricultural chemicals and fertilizers in the safest way possible to protect and improve the environment, so future generations can continue to prosper."

The North Central Farm Bureau Co-op resulted from the 1987 merger of the Wabash County Farm Bureau Co-op, founded in 1927 and the Kosciusko County Farm Bureau Co-op, founded about the same time. The intent of the merger was to provide a more efficient operation for both counties.

The company's main office is in Wabash, with twelve locations in the two counties, headed up by Dee Byerly, President. Owned by its members, its governing body is a nine-member board; the local representative is Mike Nelson, of Burket.

The Burket facility, officially called the Burket Crop Center, located on Railroad Street, handles a full line of anhydrous ammonia, crop protection chemicals and seeds.

They are a service center for Ciba-Geigy Pharmaceutical Company and distributors of Funk's G Hybrid Seeds. Phil says, "Our trade area includes Mentone, Akron, Claypool and Burket--primarily within a ten-mile radius."

Four full time employees at Burket help farm customers to a hands-on tailoring of products to meet their individual needs. Various grades and analyses of fertilizer are blended to the customers' specific agronomic requests.

Facilities include a dry warehouse with 13,000 tons of dry storage, 800 tons of liquid storage and 65 tons of ammonia storage.

"Environmental issues have taken priority for us," Phil says, because they will be so important in the '90's.

"Three or four years ago," he continues, "there was a lot of farmer interest in no-till farm practices. Because of customer demand, we have specialized in that area, devoting a lot of time and research to conservation-tillage production methods and have become the leading authority on no-till in the area. I don't see anything but growth in this area in the future," he adds.

Another new feature of the business is a newly created Risk

Management Department with a licensed staff member who can remove underground tanks and help farmers with any problems they might have with government regulations pertaining to storage of fertilizers, chemicals or petroleum. "It's a service we're proud of," Phil says, "because, within a year or two, there will be a demand for it."

"There has been a lot of adverse publicity about chemicals," Phil says. Although we sell chemicals, we are very concerned about them. We keep up with current university research and our co-op organization has access to a national network of research facilities."

Citing chemical runoff into streams and ditches as a source of previous problems, Phil says, "We advocate methods today that will minimize chemical runoff, keeping the chemicals where they belong, rather than in our drinking water."

Another improvement involves contact herbicides. He says, "They hit pests we want to control instead of getting into the soil. We believe the contact herbicides market will continue to grow."

Mentioning a product that was widely used a few years ago to kill broadleaf weeds, Phil says the use of many such products has been discontinued because of research, increased environmental awareness and the adoption of safer methods and products.

In his seventh year at the Burket facility, Phil earned a degree from Purdue University in 1976. He has been in farming and agribusiness ever since.

Dee Byerly says, "Phil was chosen as the new manager because of his expertise and technical knowledge, his local knowledge of people and his enthusiasm for his job. Our customers appreciate his sincerity and helpfulness," he adds.

Phil replaces former plant manager Harold Dittman, who retired recently after spending a lifetime in agribusiness. Phil credits Harold with "teaching me everything about the fertilizer business I know."

A native of Akron and a 1973 graduate of Akron High School, Phil is married to the former Jill Haney of Mentone. They have two sons, Tyson, eight and Cole, six.

About his business, Phil says, "In the years of working at Burket, I have developed a great admiration and respect for the people I work with. I see them as my extended family."

Reiterating his concern for the environment, Phil says, "I really do care. We and our kids have to eat the same food and drink the same water that everyone else does. I want it to be safe too."

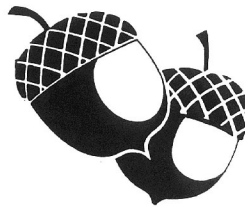

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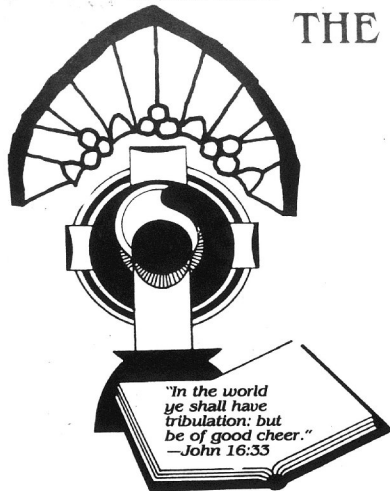
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THE ONLY REAL HANDICAP IS NOT TRUSTING GOD'S WISDOM

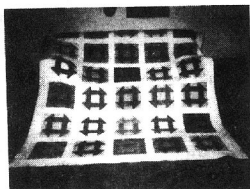

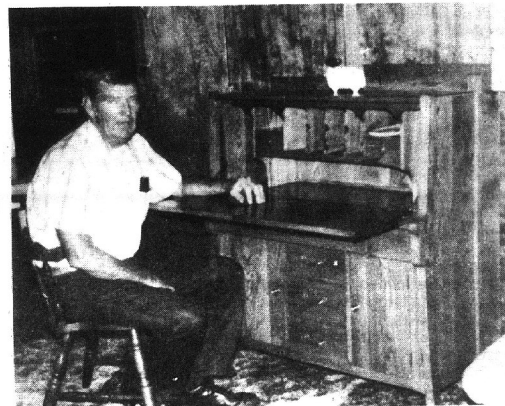

Arnold VanLue-Woodworker Extraordinaire

Arnold VanLue is best known to area residents as an auctioneer and raiser of Suffolk sheep, but he is destined to be known to future generations as one of Indiana's finest furniture makers. His meticulously detailed antique reproduction furniture has won him many distinguished awards and is far better crafted than anything available in furniture stores today.

This August, as in past years, Arnold was awarded the Indiana Artist Craftsman/Talbot Street Art Fair Award at the Indiana State Fair. The project, a white oak drop-front secretary, complete with several cubby holes and antique brass drawer pulls, also won First Place in the Professional Woodworking Division. The judges were impressed, not only with Arnold's fine workmanship, but also with the fact that he, himself, had cut the tree and dried the lumber used to build the piece. According to Arnold, when this was mentioned at the awards ceremony, "Some smart aleck son of a gun sitting in the back said, 'I suppose he planted the tree, too!'"

Like many of the other pieces Arnold has built, this desk is a copy of an antique he auctioned off at a sale. In this case, he actually auctioned the original desk twice. About 20 years ago, Hugh Wildermuth bought the desk at a sale Arnold conducted for John Gill. Then last fall, he again sold the desk at the Wildermuth sale. This time several photos were taken of the piece and working from those, Arnold built an almost exact reproduction.

Blueprints are something Arnold never uses. "I've made a couple of pieces about half-way from blueprints," he says. "But I always come to a point where it says 'Do it this way' and I think, 'Why would I want to do it that way, it'd work better this way!' So I don't use blueprint, I just make 'em."

"My very first woodworking project was making hickory shear pins for a horse drawn cultivator for my dad when I was just a boy," Arnold reminisces. Then during the seventh grade at Akron School, Arnold took Al Mathiesen's shop class. His first assignment was to make a sanding block. "Well, I thought, 'There's nothing to this,'" Arnold draws. "I just cut me off a piece of wood about four inches square and cut in a 45 degree angle to hold the sandpaper and thought I was done." Mr. Mathiesen had other ideas and quickly rejected the project.

sending Arnold back to work on it. "I'll never forget that and I still laugh about it," he says. "It must have taken me a month to get everything square!"

Arnold still remembers something Al Mathiesen told him concerning his woodworking skills just after he got out of school. "He said to me, 'Arnold, I think you'll do pretty good building hog houses and things around the farm, but I don't think you'll ever get much past that.'" Through the years, Arnold has certainly proven him wrong.

After building an old-fashioned looking poplar counter for Kerlin Tractor Sales several years ago, Arnold began noticing the antique furniture, particularly the dry sinks, he was selling at auctions. "I got to thinking, 'Why couldn't I make one of them?'" He did and he's been building furniture ever since.

In 1978, he took a lady's roll top desk to the State Fair. That year he won first place in the Non-Professional Division. The following year, his oak bookcase secretary won all the awards possible in the Non-Professional Division, so in 1980 he moved up to the Professional Division and has now won that category four times, in addition to placing several times and receiving numerous honorable mentions, including one this year with a three leg red elm table.

Several of Arnold's pieces contain glass made specifically to Arnold's specifications by a glassworker from Hartford City. There are panes built to follow the graceful curve of the wood, leaded glass, stained glass with wooden framework and one piece, another Indiana Artist Craftsman Award winner, with special bubbled ovals in the doors. This beautiful six foot tall piece is an excellent example of Arnold's ability to combine different elements in a single piece. Pointing to the legs, the doors similar to roll top only sideways, the scroll work at the top, and finally, the breathtaking doors, Arnold says, "This is Queen Anne, this is that other guy, this is Early American and this is VanLue!"

While Arnold enjoys building the highly ornate Victorian style antique reproductions, his personal preference runs to the simpler lines of the Shaker style. He has built several benches and a clothes hamper in the practical, functional Shaker design.

Arnold also appreciates the texture and character of salvage lumber. One secretary in his home is built from maple from North Miami's first gym floor, poplar from a grainery and has mahogany legs made from a John Deere shipping crate.

The hours he spends on the finish alone show how meticulous Arnold is. After staining the piece, two coats of Minwax tongue oil is applied, then sanded and steel woolled before applying up to three more coats. Then the entire piece is gone over with a special rubbing compound and steel wool. After drying four or five days, paste wax is applied and buffed to bring out the beauty of the wood.

Besides all the furniture, including pie safes, night stands, coat racks, plant stands, trunks, dry sinks, buffets, baker's racks and even a chair, Arnold has also made oak split baskets, lamps and mosaic pictures from wood. He took a course in stained glass and now also does his own glass work.

Arnold and his wife, Roma, who works for the Akron-Mentone News and the Shopping Guide News in addition to helping with the auction business, have been married 38 years. They live southeast of Gilead in a home designed by Roma and built by Arnold.

Although he does occasionally sell a piece, most of Arnold's furniture is given to family members, including his daughter, Lila and son, Roland and his grandchildren.

Also somewhat of an inventor, Arnold has designed and built several pieces of the equipment housed in his well supplied workshop behind the VanLue home.

Through the years, Arnold has shared his knowledge of woodworking with numerous young men and has helped many 4-H members with their projects.

It is impossible to do justice to the beauty of his woodworking, but by sharing his skills with others and with the incredible furniture itself, Arnold is building a legacy that will stand for many generations to come.

But, the most important activity of the day was comparing our many wonderful memories of the times we laughed and cried, ached and rejoiced together at IPFW. So many memories—a lunch at Fort Wayne's exclusive French restaurant (none of us could afford to go in the evening), other lunches in chic little spots around campus, parties at all of our homes (almost any occasion called for a party for our Composition bunch), and the hilarity of one of our group singing a song from a Chinese opera on the Circle steps at midnight during an ITW Conference in Indianapolis.

One of my most vivid memories answers the classic question, "where were you when...?" Just as Joan, Karen and I returned to campus from lunch January 28, 1986, we heard on Joan's car radio that the space shuttle *Challenger* had exploded, carrying teacher Christa McAuliffe, along with the entire crew, to her death. I remember I went straight to my classroom, where my students were in a state resembling shock. I scrapped whatever subject I had planned that day for in-class writing and assigned, instead, "How I Feel About the *Challenger* Disaster." Those were among the best in-class essays I ever received.

We've all gone on about our business in one way or another since those halcyon days, but will never forget the many friends we made, some of whom are now scattered from Pennsylvania, to Georgia, Nevada, California, and as far away as Malaysia.

For Bud and me both, as well as my friends and a surprised Alan Welch, last Wednesday at Purdue University, nostalgia reigned supreme!

Night Call by Pat Myers-The doorbell pierced my deep slumber and I awoke with a start. Gathering my woolen robe about me, I hastened to the hall, and upon opening the massive oak doors, was surprised to see Edgar Foley, coughing and sputtering into his heavy overcoat sleeve. He informed me of his daughter's sickness and said: "Please hurry Doc, ca'se she's dyin fast."

I climbed into my woolens and coat, snatched my grip and followed the old man into the dark, windy night. The horse started with less trouble than I expected and soon we were bucking the tremendous wind and stinging rain. My temples were throbbing from the icy pressure and my hands and arms were completely numb with the intense cold.

Suddenly the horses reared and abruptly stopped. I tried in vain to urge them further, but it seemed impossible. Finally old Edgar slowly climbed out to find what the trouble was. Upon his return I was surprised to see him white and shaky. He shouted at the top of his lungs, yet his voice barely reached me. It seemed that the Dolson bridge was washed out and the river was rising fast. We retraced our course, traveling another road to Edgar's farm, and arrived on hour later, cold and wet, but safe. His daughter had unknowingly swallowed some poison and an immediate antidote was required. My first night call in the country had been extremely exciting.

Tonia Stavedahl, daughter of Rick and Jean Stavedahl, Mentone, has been selected as Academic Student of the Week.

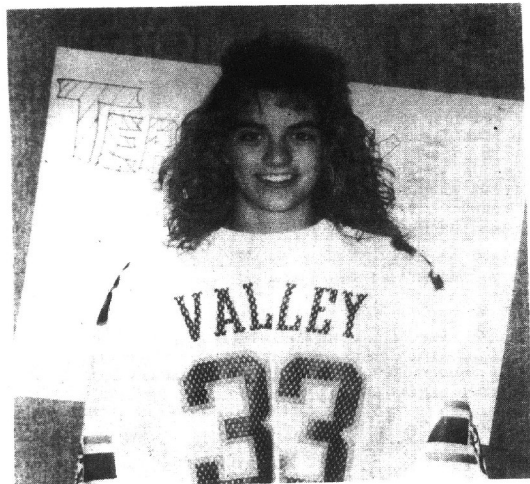

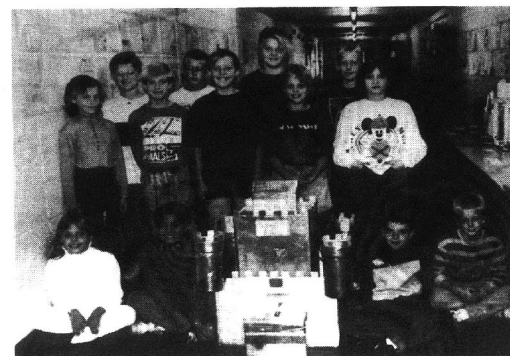

The State Election Board ruled on September 11, 1991 that towns without contested races do not have to conduct elections. The election board's advisory ruling is based on interpretation of a two-year old state law, and is considered binding by law, said Lori Hershberger, an administrative assistant for the State Election Board.

That status would change, however, if anyone in those towns file as a write-in candidate by the October 25, 1991 deadline.

The state board took action on the issue after candidates, clerks and others inquired about the law. Two years ago, the General Assembly passed a law allowing towns to cancel elections if candidates were unopposed.

By not having an election, towns can save the expense of paying people to supervise polls and help tabulate votes. Akron Clerk-Treasurer Jean Conner reported the county wanted \$2000.00 up front to conduct the election here plus a fee for use of voting booths. The Town Council declined because the amount is over budget. There is only \$1000.000 to carry out the process of which \$600.00 has already been committed.

Town elections include races for Town Council seats and the Clerk-Treasurer position. Since there is already one person who has filed as a write-in candidate for the Town Council there will be an Election in Akron on November 5, 1991 at the Town Hall. This is for registered-Akron City-voters only. Pole will be open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m.

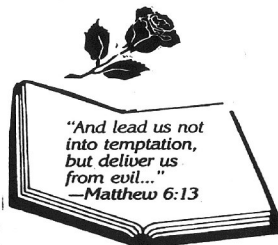

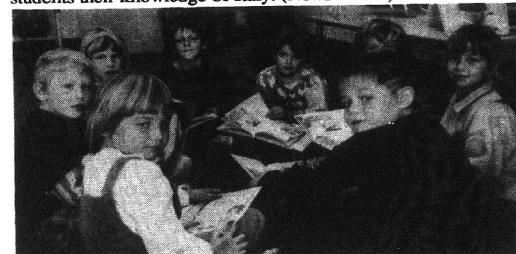

Who's Who In Mentone

Kenneth Romine

Mentone's former Postmaster of 38 years, Kenneth Romine, and wife Mary Esther are enjoying retirement in Mentone, just as they've always enjoyed living here.

Both natives of Mentone, Kenny grew up on a farm north of town and "Esther," whose father, Muffy Smith, raised chickens, lived in town.

Kenny played trombone in the high school band, and basketball. He laughs about the basketball now. "We only had nine boys," he says. "Everybody played." Esther was a high school cheerleader one year.

But it was their after school jobs that brought them together. Esther started working as a soda jerk at the drugstore, where the Pillbox is today, at age thirteen. When Wayne Bowser, who worked at Clark's Store across the street, has an appendectomy, Kenny filled in for him.

"Near the end of the day when it was slow," Esther remembers, "I would stand at the door and look out, and I noticed Kenny over there." She confided to Wayne and her friend Phyllis (now Wayne's wife) that she "wouldn't mind dating Kenny." So Wayne and Phyllis "fixed it up." "I was too bashful in those days to ask her myself," Kenny laughs.

Kenny and Esther graduated in 1942 into a world at war. Esther soon took a job in the Northern Indiana Co-op office, then, with two school friends, Mary Jean Kallenbach and Betty Doran, took a job in Gary and moved there. Although Kenny was able to spend some time helping his dad, Monroe Romine, on the farm, and working part-time at Clark's Store, in June, 1944, he joined the U.S. Army. He took basic training at Fort Hood, Texas.

Kenny and Esther had become engaged in December of 1943, but the turmoil of the times caused much uncertainty and fearfulness for the future. Weighed by these concerns, as were many parents at that time, Esther's father opposed their marriage. But, with the classic optimism of youth, in spite of their chaotic world, when Kenny came home from Basic on a 10-day delay-en-route, they slipped away and were secretly married. Their marriage remained a secret in Mentone until a newspaper release detailing a wound Kenny received mentioned the address of his wife, Esther.

Kenny was attached to the Infantry, Tenth Army Division, Continued on page 6

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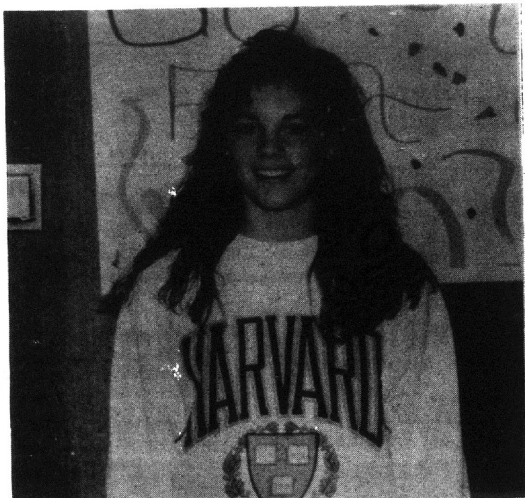

Lichelle Paxton, daughter of Phil and Joyce Paxton, Silver Lake, has been chosen as Academic Student of the Week.

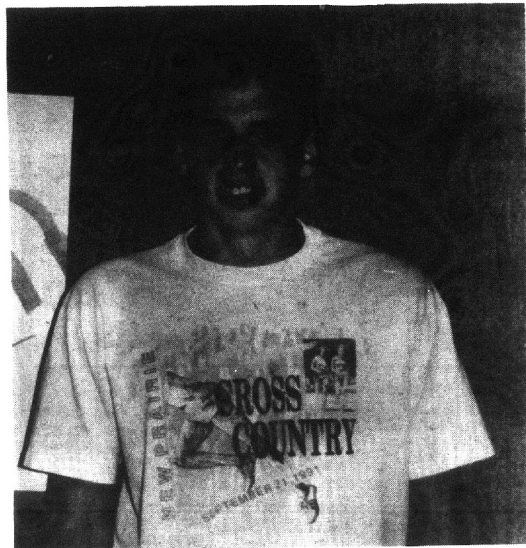

part of the Third Army. He downplays his wound. "I was only in a field hospital a week from shrapnel in my leg," he says. But he has never forgotten its emotional effect. "It made me believe in fate," he says. "My buddy and I were walking side-by-side down a narrow road. When we heard the shell coming, I dived one way and he went the other. The shell hit on his side. I've always wondered what made each of us choose the side we did. So many things happen in combat that can't be explained. You have to become hardened to it."

Kenny was in Bavaria, Southern Germany on D-Day. "We didn't know what was going on," he says. "We marched in a column into a small town and suddenly were told to cease fire. There had already been people killed there that day. It was two days and two nights before we knew the Germans had surrendered. When we finally knew, we couldn't celebrate. There was nothing to celebrate with."

Esther's memories of D-Day are low key, too. The husband of a friend from a large Italian family was home on leave. They were having a big celebration and insisted that Esther and her other friends attend. "She said we had to go or we'd hurt her parents' feelings."

Assigned to Division Headquarters in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, for a year after the war, Kenny says "It was great then. Garmisch was where the 1936 Olympics had been held, where Sonja Henie won her third gold medal for figure-skating, catapulting her into fame and a movie screen career. "I couldn't have lucked out any better after the dirt and filth of combat." Kenny credits his military experience for curing him of his shyness and enabling him to develop self-confidence. "The military was good for me although I didn't like it at the time."

Meantime, back in Mentone, Esther worked once more at the drug store for a short time, then helped Raymond and Marjorie Cooper stock shelves for their new department store. Accompanying her parents to Florida for the winter, they returned in the spring just before Kenny reached home in May, 1946.

Back home in Indiana, Kenny was helping his father farm when he heard a rural mail carrier job was open. He scored well on the exam, but another veteran, Barney Nellans, got the job.

Postmaster Lloyd Rickel, who was retiring, however, put him to work as acting postmaster, and when the exam for that job was announced six months later, Kenny took it and was appointed permanent postmaster in 1950. He held the position until his retirement, January, 1987.

"A lot of good things happened during those years," he says. Meeting and serving the public was good for me. When you work with the public, you should remember you are working for them."

The biggest change Kenny noticed during his postmaster years was the change in mail schedules. "Mail came in and went out five times a day in 1950," he says. "Now it's received and dispatched once a day."

Another change is in the building. Major renovations were done inside and out in 1962. "We used to freeze with a round oil heater. Now, it has central air."

Kenny and Esther have fond memories of wonderful trips they took to postmaster conventions in Puerto Rico, Boston, Hawaii and Las Vegas. "We always got to see the area and had wonderful entertainment and seminars," they say.

Esther worked 21 1/2 years as secretary at Mentone School, retiring in 1985. She says, "Working there was interesting. It was rewarding to feel I was helping the teachers and the students. I especially miss the students."

Kenny and Esther have three sons, Ken, John and Bob. Some of their happiest memories are of the time spent helping Glenn Secrist build their present home, starting in 1955. Esther says the boys still laugh about the picnics in the basement. "We'd put them down there to play so they'd be out of the way. We'd take the ladder out so they'd be stuck there until we let them up. But there was lots of sand--they liked it. All three sons graduated from Ball State University. Today, Ken is an international tax consultant for Masco in Northville, Michigan. John is a CPA in Carmel, Indiana and Bob manages a Social Security Office in Royal Oak, Michigan. The Romine's have four grandchildren.

Kenny and Esther enjoy retirement. Kenny has many interests, including reading, maintaining the Post Office building (which they own) and volunteer work. He's a member of the Lions, American Legion and Masonic Lodge. Esther keeps busy with cooking, knitting, crocheting and just being "free to go." They both enjoy trips to Florida. They attend the Mentone United Methodist Church.

Of Mentone, Kenny says, "I think we will continue to be a bedroom community, but, I can't think of a better place for it. We're fortunate that our Main Street hasn't deteriorated. It's a great place to live, work and retire!"

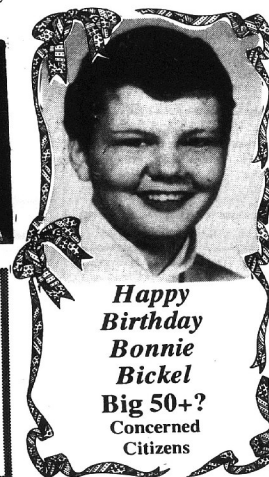

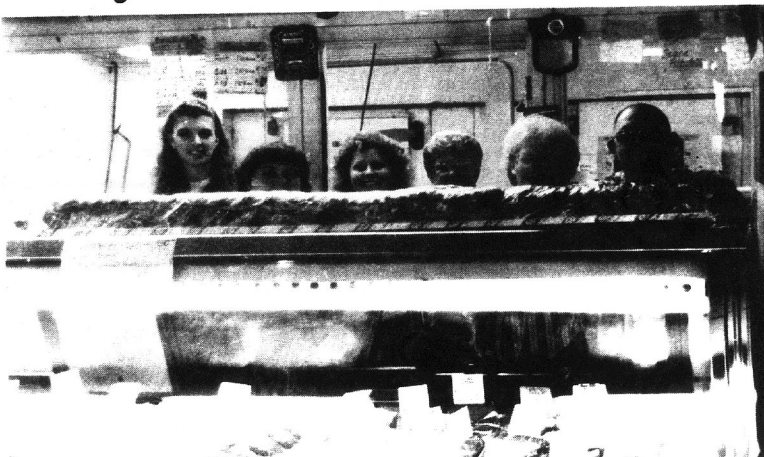

Everybody who writes anything has already touched on Clarence Thomas and Anita Hill. What's left for me to write? That the Judiciary Committee hearings were a travesty? Clarence Thomas himself has said that. That Anita Hill's story was not credible? Someone else has said that. That Clarence Thomas might be a better judge because of what he went through? It's already been said. That Clarence Thomas might be an embittered judge and deadly foe after this experience? Someone has already written that. That many of our senators are embarrassing idiots? Plenty of people have been writing that ever since the Iran Contra affair. That some members of the Judiciary Committee, sitting in judgement of Clarence Thomas, themselves probably being in prison? A prominent Washington journalist beat me to that.

What did impress me during the political soap opera-circus weekend, that no one else has mentioned was the final blow in one of the saddest losses our country has suffered, the tragic and irrevocable loss of innocence.

I wonder how many people realize just how much we have lost in our decline from understood high moral values. In 1939, mothers objected to daughters seeing *Gone With the Wind* because Clark Gable clinched that great epic with the word "damn." That "damn" was the exception.

During my childhood and teen years, movies, glamorous by intent, were devoid of swearing, vulgarity and overt sex. Plot concepts were expressed in scintillating dialogue, or facial expressions and body language requiring superb acting ability rather than four letter words, delivered with mediocrity.

When the hero tenderly embraced the girl in the denouement, we saw on the screen not a distasteful bedroom scene, leaving nothing to the imagination, but a kiss that suggested genuine emotional love and great things for the future.

Formula fiction? Tame stuff? Perhaps, sometimes. But, it required artistic skill and, as with interpretive literature, left the viewer with something to consider.

In those same years, we didn't have sex education in school. Nor was it discussed in front of us by adults, or graphically in any publications available to us. Sex, boy-girl relationships, and marriage were all mysteries to us. And, oh! the allure of mystery! We grew up believing great wonders were ahead out there someplace waiting for us. And half the secret of attainment is in the believing.

I remember when my Mom banned *A Tree Grows In Brooklyn*, by Betty Smith, from my reading list. A neighbor lady, who was always full of fun and whose maiden name coincidentally was Betty Smith, smuggled it to me. I read it in the privacy of my bedroom, feeling very risqué.

Recently, I reread the beautiful story, *A Tree Grows In Brooklyn*. "What could Mom have possibly objected to?" I wondered. The suggestion that Johnny Nolan might have glimpsed, even laid his head against his sister-in-law, Cissy's breast while in a drunken stupor?

By today's standards, Betty Smith's book is poignantly innocent. But then, take a good look at today's magazines and prime-time TV shows--at the other weekend's circus, presented in living color by the United States Senate. The innocence of my childhood days is lost in the mists of time, robbing today's kids of the experience of those precious mysterious moments of life.

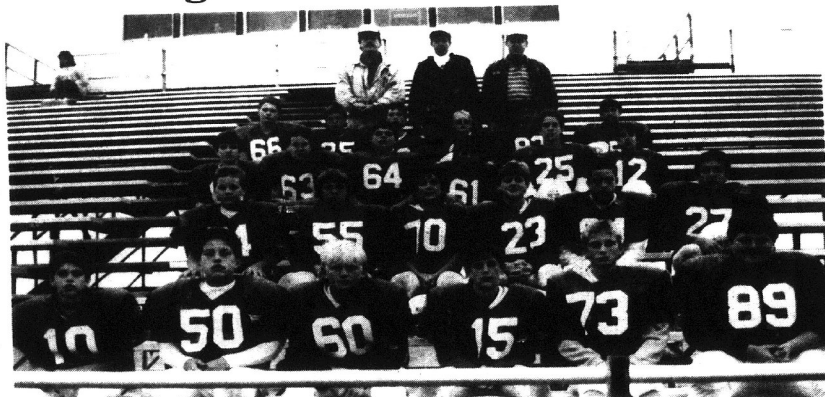

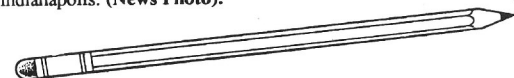

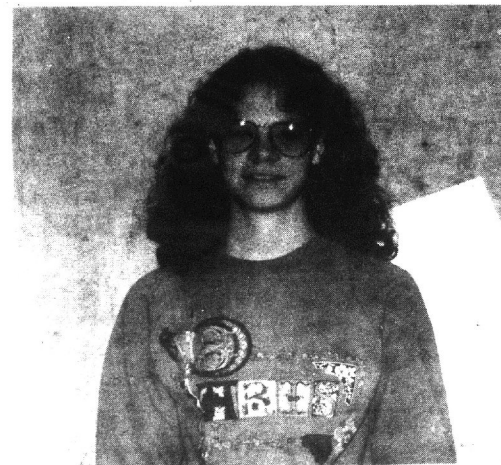

Brenda's K-9 Designs

Akron's newest business, Brenda's K-9 Designs, opened its doors at 109 South Mishawaka St. on October 1. Owner Brenda Ross offers professional dog grooming on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Mondays and Saturdays by appointment. An answering machine is available for messages when the shop is closed. Brenda also sells her attractive custom handmade oak and hickory reed baskets and other craft consignment items through the shop.

"I've always liked animals," Brenda says. "I used to take my dog to a groomer and I decided it was something I'd be interested in doing myself."

In order to learn the art of dog grooming, Brenda took an eight week "one-on-one" course from a private groomer in Goshen. In addition to working in her own shop, Brenda has also been providing the grooming services for a shop in Warsaw since the beginning of September. During the first week of October she attended the Pet Trade Show held in Chicago.

A complete range of grooming services, including bathing, nail trimming, clipping and flea treatments is available through Brenda's K-9 Designs. By mid-November, Brenda plans to stock sweatshirts, bandanas, personalized dog tags and other specialty clothing items for dogs, which will make excellent holiday gifts for pet owners. She will be also be holding a drawing for a homemade Christmas basket filled with dog goodies.

Depending on the breed, a dog should receive a complete grooming treatment every four to eight weeks. Brenda begins the process by thoroughly brushing the animal to remove any burrs or mats and then, using both electric clippers and scissors, she gives the dog a preliminary trim. The animals are then bathed and given a flea treatment in Brenda's waist-high tub and dried in special cage driers. The pet's nails are clipped and its fur is given a final precision trim before being brushed again. Then, depending on the pet owners wishes, bows or special accessories are put on the dog.

The grooming is performed on a custom-made grooming table built by Brenda's father. Equipped with a lighted table top and grooming arm, the table is mounted on the hydraulic lift from a beauty shop chair to make it adjustable.

"I don't trim all dogs the same way. Each has its own pattern," Brenda says. "Each breed has its own lines. Like a cocker spaniel is trimmed down short to a certain point and then it has a long skirting along the bottom." According to Brenda, poodles' fur can be cut into over 100 different patterns including, the "Royal Dutch", "English Saddle", "Town and Country", "Sweetheart", "Continental" or the more popular "Puppy Clip". While she enjoys working with all dogs, poodles and the smaller breeds are her favorites.

Brenda feels professional grooming is vital for maintaining good health in your pet. The regular brushing and bathing keeps the dog's skin healthier, flea and tick treatments reduce the risk of disease and proper toenail clipping reduces the risk of painful foot problems which can make walking difficult for dogs.

She will also give flea treatments to cats, but dogs are her primary clients.

Brenda began making the baskets she sells through her shop seven years ago. Most of her baskets are made to order and can be customized to match different color schemes. A tote style basket with an antiqued flag motif has been very popular recently. She has taught basket making classes and is currently teaching classes through the adult education program at Tippecanoe Valley High School.

A 1984 graduate of TVHS, Brenda and her husband, Jim, an auto mechanic, have been married six years and live on Walnut St. in Akron. They are members of the Akron Church of God and Brenda is active with the Psi Kappa Chapter of Kappa Delta Phi Sorority.

In addition to having a dog of her own, Brenda also enjoys pleasure riding on a quarter horse which she keeps at the home of her parents, Harvey and Peg Arthur. Brenda's love of animals began at an early age. As a youngster she took the dog obedience course in 4-H which she says taught her a lot about handling dogs. So far she has not had any trouble managing any of the dogs she has groomed, but anytime you are working with a dog you do not know, in a situation that is new to it, you must use caution.

While she realizes this is a difficult time to begin a small business, Brenda feels there is a very real need for her grooming services in the community. She says, "I'm just getting started, but so far the response has been very encouraging."

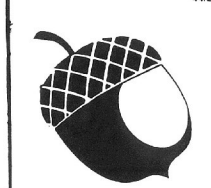

ORDINANCE NO. 91-1

AN ORDINANCE ADVANCING THE CURFEW TIME FOR MINORS IN THE TOWN OF AKRON UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF I.C. 31-6-4-2

WHEREAS, I.C. 31-6-4-2 authorizes a City, Town, or County to establish curfew hours for minors earlier than those specifically provided by said section. And,

WHEREAS, the Town Council for the Town of Akron has determined that the curfew times set by I.C. 31-6-4-2 are later than is reasonable for the public safety under the conditions existing in the Town of Akron, Fulton County, Indiana.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED BY the Town Council of the Town of Akron as follows:

Section 1: That it shall be a curfew violation for any child 17 years of age or younger to be in a public place between 12:01 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday, or to be in any public place after 10:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday.

Section 2: That it shall be a curfew violation for any child 15 years of age or younger to be in a public place after 10:00 p.m. and before 5:00 a.m. on any day.

Section 3: These curfews do not apply to any child who is:

(A) Accompanied by his parent, guardian or custodian;

(B) Accompanied by an adult specified by his parent, guardian or custodian, or

(C) Participating in, going to, or returning from:

1.) Lawful employment;

2.) A school sanctioned activity;

or

3.) A religious event in accordance with I.C. 31-6-4-2.

Section 4: The Town Marshal of the Town of Akron is further authorized to take into custody any minor found in violation of these curfew provisions until such time as the parents or other proper custodians can be contacted to take charge of said violators at which time they shall be released to such parent or other appropriate authority.

Section 5: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and the publication thereof in an appropriate newspaper.

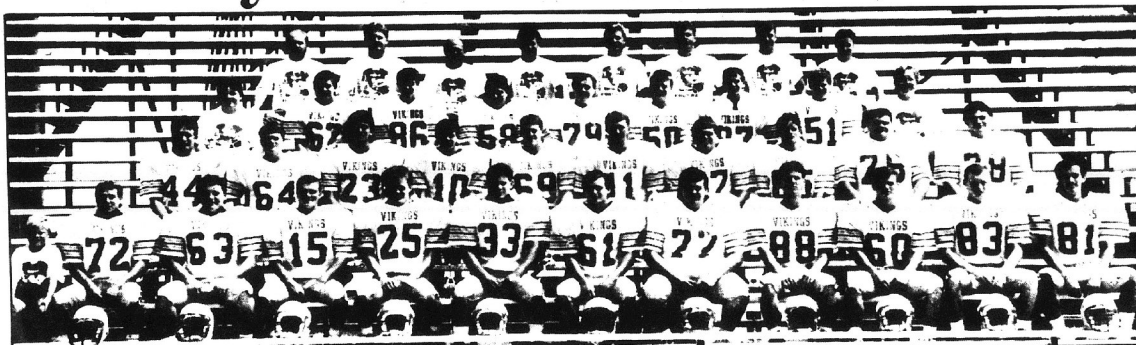

Valley Board plans \$201,208 fund transfer

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board voted to advertise a legal notice for a \$201,208 additional appropriation at its October 21 meeting.

The money will be transferred within the general fund from the working balance to support services-central according to treasurer Judy Hively and most likely will be used to pay for insurance. According to Superintendent Baxter Paige, the entire amount may not be needed at this time and any money not spent will become part of the corporation's cash balance.

The additional appropriation will be voted on at the board's November 11 meeting. Within 15 days of that meeting a hearing will be conducted at the Kosciusko County auditor's office.

During the principals' report portion of the meeting the board learned of activities planned for Red Ribbon Week, sponsored by the local Drug Free Schools and Communities advisory committee. Mentone students delivered red ribbons and posters to local businesses and Kids Conference 91 was held October 26. A Halloween Dance is being planned by Mentone students to highlight the benefits of staying drug free.

Akron students are planning for grandparents' day and Children's Book Week, which will include a Young Authors Conference and a first-person portrayal of Abraham Lincoln. A book will be written, bound and displayed by each student during the week. Akron principal Brett Boggs reported that the incentive reward program for citizenship, attendance and

academics is continuing.

A field trip to the Studebaker National Museum is planned for Burket fourth and fifth graders on Nov. 7. The school will hold its open house on Nov. 19.

The high school drama club will present the Shakespeare play "A Midsummer Night's Dream" on Nov. 7, 9 and 10. The fall athletic banquet is scheduled for Nov. 14.

The board also heard that seven weeks of assertive discipline training was to begin Oct. 21 for 27 Valley teachers.

After learning that Mama Reidel's Burket fifth grade class had maintained a 99.95% attendance record for the first grading period, Superintendent Paige recommended a letter of praise be sent to the students.

* Approved a GED diploma for Pamela Wyrick.

* Tabled a recommendation to name Roger Monarity Mentone eighth grade boys basketball coach.

* Approved contracts for Eula Smith and Rick Phillips for Adult Basic Education.

* Approved a personal leave for bus driver Evelyn Schipper for Feb. 6 - 21, 1992.

The board then adjourned to executive session to discuss personnel and negotiations.

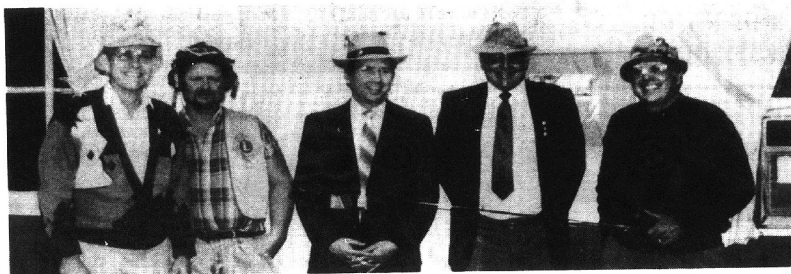

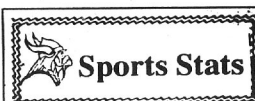

Mentone Business of the Week

Signs and Designs by Hudson

Although Jerry Hudson's sign shop, Signs and Designs by Hudson, has been in business only since August, 1990, signs produced by Jerry already hand up and down Main Street, at the Youth League Park, in Warsaw and some have traveled as far as California.

Using a computer, he cuts vinyl letters to make company names signs, magnetic signs, personalized license plates, banners and farm signs. He also hand-letters and paints signs when called for.

Born in Warsaw in the depths of the depression, Jerry's parents moved to a farm south of Mentone when he was very young and he attended Beaver Dam High School all twelve years. During high school, he ran track two years and played varsity basketball and softball all four years.

One of Jerry's most exiting memories from those years is of the sectional tourney his senior year. Syracuse required double overtime to defeat Beaver Dam in the semi-final game. Another time he remembers was a home game against Milford, who held the Silver Horseshoe. Milford was so sure of winning, they didn't bring the horseshoe to the game. Upon being beaten by Beaver Dam, some unlucky Milford soul had to return to Milford, get the horseshoe and bring it back to Beaver Dam yet that night.

Jerry brings a lifetime of experience to his new business. He says his artistic career began in fifth grade when he and Gene Butts drew a sequence of scenes on an extended length of white paper, rolled it on dowels, scroll fashion, and unrolled it continuous behind a frame, thus producing a "motion picture."

In high school, he studied three and one-half years of drafting and one-half year of architecture. While in high school student at Beaver Dam, Jerry painted a large "BD" on the gym wall that remained there until the building burned many years later.

Following graduation in 1949, Jerry worked for a short time as a truckdriver for Valentine Elevator. Feeling the draft "breathing down his neck" with the advent of the Korean war, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in December, 1950.

Jerry took basic training at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas and was subsequently stationed at several bases in New York State and New Hampshire. Given the opportunity for on-the-job training, he was a statistical draftsman throughout his military years. His duties included: drawing organizational and functional charts, mission maps, C.O.'s notebooks and painting and maintaining plotting boards for Radar Stations.

Having spotted a Sindy High School girl he liked, waitressing in Warsaw's Crystal Dairy Bar, Jerry met and, in 1952, married his wife, Lea. Following their wedding, she accompanied him to his base at Syracuse, New York. They were transferred to Grenier Air Force Base, Manchester, NH, in June, 1953, and in July their daughter, Honey was born at Portsmouth Naval Hospital, Portsmouth, NH. Jerry says, "We didn't know until six weeks later, when we received her birth certificate from Augusta, that she was actually born in Maine!"

Another transfer soon took them back to Shawnee Air Force

Base, Lockport, NY, where they lived over a year just twenty miles from Niagara Falls.

Jerry and Lea enjoyed living in the east. In Syracuse, they were close enough to Syracuse University to walk to campus. They attended pro basketball there, seeing Bob Cousery play for the Celtics, and seeing the Fort Wayne Zollner Pistons play a little slice of home. Manchester, NH had several historic museums to visit and lots of beautiful scenery. Many of the residents spoke French, some no English and living near the falls was especially enjoyable. A favorite sport there was Old Fort Niagara in all its historic glory. Watching the lock on the Erie Canal work was a favorite Sunday afternoon pastime.

During a leave home one month before his anticipated discharge from the service in December, 1954, Jerry applied to and was hired as an artist by the L.M. Berry Co. in Warsaw, then located above the Times-Union Building, starting in January,

1955. In April, 1955, Jerry was appointed Art Supervisor and in July, 1955, he received the title of Midwestern Division Art Director.

The Hudsons lived for two years near Piercetown, where their son, Jerry Jr. (Bud), was born New Year's Day, 1956. Moving to the south edge of Mentone in October, 1956, tow more sons joined them: Darrell in July 1958 and David, Christmas Eve, 1965. January 11, 1957, they moved to their present home on N. Tucker Street.

There were moves in store at L.M. Berry also. Early in his career, the Art Department moved into a suite in the old Hotel Hayes, the beautiful historic ivy-covered, colonnaded building that stood where Lake City Bank is now. Soon, the whole office forced moved into the remodeled former Crystal Dairy Bar, on S. Buffalo Street, where Jerry and Lea had met. Then, in 1976, a final move took them to their modern new building on Road 30 East.

During his years at the L.M. Berry Company, Jerry was, first, the youngest Art Director in the Company and finally, the Art Director with the longest tenure in that position. At one time, he had a twelve artist force. Many times, through the years, he was commended for his professional, efficient and outstanding Art Department.

In 1986 and 1987, the Berry Company ran employee contests for photographs to use on telephone covers. 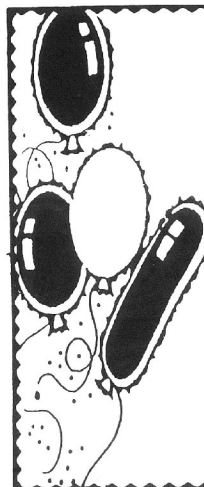
