Bob Herendeen finished third in world aerobatic competition last week in Magdeburg, East Germany. The American team also finished third.

Two Warsaw police squad cars and a stolen Cadillac were wrecked Thursday night in a highspeed chase that ended with the Knapp, 19, Warsaw. Miss Knapp, apprehension of Marsha Lynn who had been released from the Indiana State Women's Prison on August 8 after serving a 180-day sentence for vehicle taking and who had served a 90-day term in 1967 on a similar charge, was taken into custody after the stolen car crashed into two Warsaw police cars on SR 19 in Mentone

The chase began in Warsaw after it was reported that a Cadillac belonging to Victor D. Kelly, R 1. Eaton, had been stolen from the American Legion parking lot

Brown, Snyder and Deputy Sheriff Gerald Oswalt pursued the car west on the Crystal Lake Road at speeds that at times reached 90 miles per hour

Mentone Marshall Gene Norton, notified of the chase by radio, drove the Mentone police car across the road north of the intersection of 900 West and SR 25 in an attempt to block the stolen car, but Miss Knapp managed to maneuver the Cadillac past ton that lodged in the stolen car.

Miller Marker Will Be Installed

Peterson Says People Will Pay For Good Roads

State Sen. Robt. E. Peterson, Rochester, chm. of the Indiana Highway of the Indiana night Needs Study Committee, said this week, "We feel that the people are will-ing to pay the money if they know they are gor-ing to get safe roads to drive on." Peterson's statement was part of a final re-port given at a press conference.

He said further, "Our committee is confronted with the fact that we're recommending tax increalegislative committees do, at least before an election. But we felt this was necessary. We had to recognize that we have highway needs in Indiana that have to be, net.

These new taxes will "These new taxes will amount to about \$2 per month per motorist, or approximately \$50 a year for each registered ve-hicle in Indiana. This is about the price of an automatic shift, and certainly far less than the cost of air condit-ioning a car. We be-lieve the people are ioning a car. lieve the pe lieve the people are willing to pay a little more money if we can do something about the something about the killing of hundreds of people on our roads and streets every year."

Peterson went ahead to point out that Indiana's motor fuel tax has been raised only once since 1929, and that truck registration fees have been virtual-ly unchanged since 1949. "And, at the present time, highway users are paying 85 percent of our total road and street costs, he explained.

"The committe recommends that the user pays 74 per cent, and the general public 26 percent."

Cotton Decoupage:

New Version Of An Old Craft

If you haven't tried decou-page yet, now's the time. It may sound like a new kind of dance or a fancy dessert, but decoupage is just a big word for a simple handicraft that has taken the fancy of millions of women of women

of women. The word itself (phoneti-cally pronounced "day-coo-pahge") is from the Prench and means the art of decorat-ing surfaces with applied paper cutouts.

ing surfaces with applied paper cutouts. However, there's more to it than that. The cutout design and the surface to which it is glued must be covered with coats of a special varnish. This gives the item-which might be a decorative box, wall plaque, or piece of furniture-a distinctive finish that re-sembles lacquer. Several years ago, doit-your-self versions of this age-old craft sprang up with the "old board" school of art. Materials were found by scavening lum

board" school of art. Materials were found by scavenging lum-ber yards for odd pieces of wood suitable for making into wall plaques. Magazines and art periodicals yielded prints for pasted-on designs. To make the wood look even more antique and weather-beaten, devotees burned it, hammered it, even sawed off edges.

Today, arts and crafts shops offer unfinished wooden items for decoupage purposes. They include ready-cut plaques, boxes of all sizes, and waste

include ready-cut plaques, boxes of all sizes, and waste-baskets. And now, there's a rich new source for decoupage designs. Motifs cut from cotton cloth, either decorator or plecegoods fabrics, provide imaginative finished items a three-dimen-sional look and are easier to work with than paper cutouts. They also enable you to co-ordinate decoupage items with the rest of the room decor. To fabric decoupage, choose a closely woven cotton print with large, clearly defined mo-tifs. These could be big flow-ers, country landscapes, circus saminals, or Early American de-signs. To coordinate them with room decor, plan to make cur-tains, a tablecloth, or a bed-spread with the same fabric. Look for unfinished wooden item at an arts and crafts shop. Sand down the item and, if you like the weather-beaten bourn edges.

Stain with any wood stain you like until you get the shade desired. Or give it an antique colored finish with spray paint. After paint dries, paste on fabric cutout with white household glue. When this is dry, give the entire item several coats of special decoupage varnish, available at hardware and paint stores. You can get flat, semigloss, or high gloss var-nish in liquid or spray form. Sand lightly between coats.

The Bible Speaks

All responsible people must be converted to the Lord, or be lost. With-out conversion, one canenter the kingdom eaven. Jesus said: not heaven. of of heaven. Jesus Sald: "Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew of heaven." (Matthew 18:3) Although people generally believe in the necessity of conversion, many misunderstand what it is, how it is accom-plished, and when and where it takes place. when and where it takes place. To answer these questions we must turn to the Bible, which makes the process of conversion clear.

Primarily. word the "convert" means to change to turn. For exam-, wood is converted or ple, wood is converted into paper; ore, into iron; skins of animals, into leather; and leat er, into shoes. Thore, "conversion" Thereis fore. fore, "conversion" is a spiritual change, the process of turning to God (Acts 15:3). Paul said the Thessalonians, their conversion to stianity, "turned in their conversion to Christianity, "turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God" (1 Thessolon-ians 1:9). It is the turning of man from the love and practice of sin to the love and practice in to the love and practice righteousness. In conversion, the direct-ion of life is changed; the powers and faculties formerly devoted to sin purified and turned to God to be used in his holy service. Thus one becomes a new being and enters a new state. and enters a new state. Conversion is the pro-cess which takes the sinner out of the king-dom of Satan and tran-slates him into the kindom of Christ, which is the church. It is, therefore, the whole is the charge therefore, the whole gospel process by which a sinner becomes a Christian. Hence, the person is a converted person changed individual.

Conversion is not syn onymous with pardon, yet pardon follows conver-. The apostle Pe-said: "Repent ye sion. ter therefore, and be con-verted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord" (Acts 3:19). The prophet Isaiah cried: "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrightman his thoughts; eous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord, and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon" (Is-aiah 55:7).

aiah 55:7). Hence, people must turn to God that their sins may be forgiven. Pardon takes place in the mind of God, and not within the heart of the sinner. Man obeys Cod's law and turns to God's law and turns to the Lord; God, then for-gives his sins (Mark 2:7; Hebrews 8:12). Thus turning to the Lord is something the sinner does, and pardoning of his sins is something that God does for him."
