#### rate 27 cents School board cuts

A standing room only crowd attended Thursday night's budget meeting, and heard members of the Tippecanoe Valley School oard of trustees cut 7 cents from the adver-ised 1972 tax rate of \$5.17.



was probably work that needed to be done at Mentone of which he was unaware and Philip Lash, said anyone who had been the shower rooms at either school would be ashamed of them.

Tuesday was the first full day of school for 2,113 students enrolled in the Tippecanoe Valley

School Corporation.
This figure is 34 students from is down same date last year, the second consecutive year the TVSC enrollment has declined. Last year's enrollment was 73 less than the previous year, making a total decline of 107 pupils in the past two years.

Superintendent Schools Robert Forbes said this is the smallest enrollment Tippecan-oe Valley has had since 1967.

Enrollment at the var-Enrollment at the various schools is: Talma, 276 with 73 in the sixth grade, 111 in the seventh grade and 92 in the eighth grade. Burket school had a total enrollment of 177, 30 in kindergarten, 29 in first grade, 24 in second grade. 27 in third in kindergarten, 29 in first grade, 24 in second grade, 27 in third grade, 31 in fourth grade and 36 in fifth grade. Mentone reported 653 students with 56 in kindergarten, 57 in first, 57 in second, 46 in third, 60 in fourth, 57 in fifth, 22 in sixth grade, 91 in ninth grade and 68 in the tenth grade, 70 in eleventh grade, and 69 seniors. grade, 91 in ninth grade and 68 in the tenth grade, 70 in eleventh grade and 69 seniors. Akron elementary had 594 pupils with 70 in kindergarten, 81 in the first grade, 98 in second; 96 in third, 90 in fourth, 74 in fifth, 85 in sixth. n sixth.

Jointly, the three school corporations have employed Jack Cripe to assist in developing a comprehensive special comprehensive special reducation program that will eventually make available special programs and/or services to all exceptional children residing within the three school systems. This school year Mr. Cripe will concentrate on developing and up-dating records, will compile all necessary state reports, will pro-vide psychological and consultative services special and regular teachers, and he class will conduct necessary surveys for projecting future program needs for special education.

ecial education.
There are approximate11,000 school age
hildren within the children three school corporations, and according to average projections 1200-1300 of these children will need special service from some facet of the special education

program.

urrently, special education programs exist for mentally handicapped for mentally handicapped and speech disordered children. Eventually, as state laws are fulfilled, special programs and services will be provided for all eligible handicapped children. Most of the children will be served through special programs. through special programs and services jointly financed by the three school corporations. However, in selected disability areas (physdisability areas (physically handicapped, blind, deaf, and miltiply handicapped) where there will not be enough students to permit the development of a comprehensive special education program for them, it will be necessary to connerte with nearby cooperate with nearby education prospecial rams, such as those cated in Elkhart County, Starke-Marshall count-ies, Fort Wayne and So. 



T.V.S.C. today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for Akron, Burket, Talma and Mentone school children unable to pay the full price.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hard-ships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provid-ed on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purposes of de-termining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy the Principal will review applications and determine

eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Robert Forbes, whose address is Supt. office, Mentone has been designated as the Heardesignated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined

in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a pay t lunch.

Hall and asks that the hearing be continued and and ing be continued and that a plan be develop-ed to "bring about a unified effort to unite the community, using (not discarding) the existing hospital facil-ities to produce the one hospital concept."

that a plan be develop-ed to employ an indepen-dent firm to conduct a cost study of the Murphy proposal and one to construct a new facility advanced by Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc.

#### Public Service Indiana Asks For Rate Review

Public Service Indiana Public Service Indiana asked Friday for a regulatory review of its electric rate structure and approval of its first increase in residential, commercial and industrial rates in 10

industrial rates in 10 years.

The electric company, serving 450,000 customers in 69 counties, is asking the Public Service Commission of Indiana for approval to increase revenues by \$18.4 million a year.
Carroll H. Blanchar, chairman of the electric company, said the pro-

posed rate increases average 11 per Until specific tariffs for all cent. rate rate tariffs for all customer classes are filed within 30 days, however, it will not be possible to determine the impact of the request on individual bills.

Rate reductions during Rate reductions during the past 10 years have resulted in annual sav-ings of three million to residential, commer-cial and industrial customers of Public Service Indiana.

Blanchar said the re-

quest is being made be-cause of the utility's urgent need for capital to continue its con-struction program to keep ahead of growing energy demands of the area and because the regulatory process re-quires many months.

He said the action done sald the action do-es not conflict with the President's 90-day wage-price freeze since nei-ther hearings nor any rate change could take

effect before next year.
"With energy demands
doubling every ten years
we expect that our peak

system demand will reach 3.8 million kilowatts by 1976. We simply will need more generating capacity to keep up with our customer's needs," our cust he said.

Blanchar said the company will need to spend \$621 million on new construction through 1976. This is more than the utility spent for capital expansion over the past 15 years.

ed electric companies in the state have now filed or received a rate increase within the past





Freezing is one of the simplest and least time consuming ways to pre-serve foods at home. It keeps the natural color, fresh flavor and nutri-tive values of most fruand vegetables very

Some varieties of ve-etables freeze better getables than others. Vegetables with high water content not freeze well. This would include to-matoes, potatoes, lett-uce, and celery. Cabbage

freeze in slaw if will you follow a recipe spe-cifically for freezing. (See recipe included in this column).

important step in An preparing vegetables for freezing is heating or "blanching" before packing. Practically every vegetable, except grevegetanie, except gre-en pepper, maintains better quality in froz-en storage if heated before packing. The re-ason for heating vegemaintains tables before freezing is that it slows down the action of the en-zymes. If vegetables zymes. are not heated enough, the enzymes continue to active and the vegetables may develop offflavors, discolor or toughen. A good exper-iment to prove this point is to freeze a package of fresh green beans with no heat treatment and a package



## NIPSCO Revises Gas Rate Schedules The NIPSCO adjustments, which would not become effective until the 90-day wage-price freeze is over, will result in an increase to the average residential non-space heating customer in the supersymmetry.




The publication "The American Rifleman" warns that present signs indicate that early action on the gun control issue will be forthcoming in Congress. It outlines the main provisions of one measure that include a requirement for the registration of all firearms, including rifles and shotguns, the gradual outlawing of individual private ownership of handguns entirely and the placing of rifle and shotgun ammunition sales back under the 1968 Gun Control Act, which specified all ammunition sales must be registered.

In gun controls, as in many other areas of government regulation that have been steadily narrowing the liberties of American citizens, it will be found that one control calls for another. This year, the drive is on against handguns. Next year, "loopholes" in the law will call for stiffer

controls over all firearms. Eventually, the goal will become total firearm prohibition. Meanwhile, the criminal mind will be working on new and ingenious ways to prey on a defenseless citizenery. The result will be tragic if the criminal is ever freed of the fear of meeting an armed citizen who has a gun and knows how to use it.

As "The American Rif-

As "The American Rifleman" observes editorially, "What needs controlling is not guns
but criminals, a point
that some antigun lawmakers persistently
miss. And stiffer sentences for gunmen and
ambushers seem like the
very thing to take them
out of circulation."
Also, as The Rifleman

to register his gun
first." Laws that destroy basic rights always boomerang. Outlawing gun ownership would

Obscene Calls Require Special Handling

The obscene telephone call is becoming a common occurance. It is a subject many people have knowledge of yet few know how to react to such a situation.

Obscene calls are usually attempts by the caller to fulfill certain of his emotional needs. (The people are nearly always male rather than female.) By startling someone he is gaining a sort of power over her. It is gained, however, at a distance and there is no personal involvement. This, personal involvement is very likely what he fears most.

A sexual motivation can also prompt such a call. By hearing the victim gasp on hearing his obscene words or messages he may gain some sexual excitement. The silent or heavy breather is also considered an obscene caller.

the callers attempt to gain power over his intended victim.

ing.
3. State, without hesitation to the caller,
"you're sick, you'd better get to a hospital,
you need help," and then
hang up.

Always remember that
it takes two to carry

If the caller will not stop, the next step is to call the sheriff or police who in turn will work with the telephone company to identify the culprit and prosecute him.

Homemakers and future homemakers see food prices climbing higher and higher. Are food prices really out of prices really out of line? Actually food is not expensive in comparison to other goods and services you buy. Most items in the family living budget are fixed. The grocery bill is flexible.

We are living in a fabulous wonderland of food. Supermarkets stock some 10,000 different food products - most of which were non-existant which were non-existant ten years ago. We have asked for convenience and we have it. And in many cases the conven-ience food is cheaper. Frozen orange juice, costs only about half as much as that squeezas much as that squeez-ed at home from fresh oranges. We want fresh lettuce in February and get it. Our food doll-ar can be divided into two parts - the farmer and the marketing agency. When we spend a dollar for food, less than 40 cents goes to the farmer for the raw

Are food prices really igher? Lets take a ook. In 1951 we spent 3% of our disposable higher? income on food, in 1969 we spent only 16.5% on food.

Perhaps we need to amine our shopping examine

skills to see if we are shopping wisely. About one-fifth of most peop-le's grocery bill is not le's grocery bill is not groceries at all. If we examine the contents of our grocery carts, we find paper towels, cigarettes, dog food, magazines and detergent, none of which are edible.

To those who remember when a loaf of bread cost a nickel, a quart of milk 10 cents and sirloin steak was 59¢ a pound—it may seem strange to call today's fodone of the consumer's od one of the consumer's best values. Food pric-es have gone up. But es have gone up. But wages have gone up too, more than food costs. Is food a bargain?

When we consider what function it serves for us and the aesthetic value food serves; we do get much for our money. But food prices, much like the weather, are pieces of convergood sation. Most people know intuitively that food prices are too high at any time or place.

### Slime Flux Hitting Shade Trees

Some shade trees are showing slime flux again this year, according to Lawrence L. Hoyle, Area Extension Agent in Land-scaping. This condition,

scaping. This condition, also known as wet wood, may be seen on a tree's trunk at various levels. A frothy, foul-smelling substance may be seen seeping through the bark and down the trunk. In older lesions the bark usually is rotted where the flux seeps over it.

Oak and elm appear to

over it.
Oak and elm appear to
be affected more often
but maple, poplar and
sycamore are also frequently affected. The
condition is caused by
sap pressure inside the
tree caused by fermentation of bacteria and
yeasts.
There is no ready cure

yeasts.

There is no ready cure or prevention for this condition, Hoyle explains. The best known method of stopping the condition or preventing damage to the bark is to drill holes into the infected area in order to relieve the internal

sap pressure. If possible, drill holes from six to 14 inches below the fluxing area and slant upward if necessary to within a few inches of the other side of the tree. You may not hit the pressure area on the first try ea on the first try
since the location is

After tapping, insert a short piece of pipe screwed into the hole to carry the toxic sap away from the tree bark. This will prevent decay of the bark due to the toxic stustance.



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

Goshert charged done. Goshert charged the four with conducting star chamber meetings, which they denied. When asked how they were in contact with each other, Dr. Donald VanGilder replied, "Mental telepathy." Goshert asked him if that was what he really meant, and he said he "guessed so" and noted that the portion noted that the portion of the policy manual on ethics which included one that said star chamber meetings were illegal had been dropped. Goshert replied, "That's right! Now you have no ethics!" He said he did not disapprove the actethics!" ethics!" He said he did not disapprove the action, only the manner in which it was carried out. The vote on the motion was four yes and one no, that of Dr. Van Gilder who remarked he thought "we have a good enough thing right now."







### Banks Largest Lenders To Indiana Farmers

Indiana banks were oviding farmers with providing farmers with more credit and other financial services than any other lenders at financial services than any other lenders at the beginning of this year, according to Har-old Groninger, President of the Akron Exchange of the Akron Exchange
State Bank, who represents the Indiana Bankers
Association as Fulton
County Key Banker. During 1970, the banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services.

Based on the 30th annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural

ary of the Agricultural and Rural Affairs Command Kural Affairs Committee of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Groninger reported that at the beginning Mr. Groninger reported that at the beginning of the year, Indiana banks were helping farmers with \$500 million in loans, 8 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$304 million in production loans and \$196 million in farm mortga-ges. At the same time, \$177 million in farm \$177 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies; \$284 million by the Federal Land Banks; \$176 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$15 million in nonreal estate loans, plus \$3.9 million in real estate loans by the \$3.9 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 61 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Indiana farmers came from banks.

Mr. Groninger said ne "bankers in Indiana the are conscious of the large capital investarge capital investments required in agriculture today and are, making a concerted effort through improved lending program to meet ort through improved lending program to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers."

The increased use of credit by farmers, according to Mr. Groninger, has been accompanied by a substantial gain by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm families. There-fore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers, contrary to farmers, contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm families have \$258 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 81 per cent of the total capital requirements of farmers. the total capital requirements of farmers.

Mr. Groninger stress-ed the importance of farmers and bankers farmers and bankers working closely togeth-er to improve farm financial arrangements. He reported that almost nine out of ten insured banks throughout the country had agricultural loans outstanding, with nearly 98 per cent of the banks in Indiana extending credit to farm people.





#### **News Of Interest To Homemakers**

"Let's clean up our environment" has become a national battle cry. One of the many areas of concern to homemakers is the matter of washing either with no phosphates with low phosphates detergents.

poses several s. What alter-are there to es? Should we This poses questions. phosphates? return to using soap products? Will nond e t ergents phosphate perform satisfactorily and safely?

The first alternative The first alternative is to wash with soap. Soap will give good results when used with soft water. And only one third of the American households have wa-ter softeners. There ter softeners. Here are water conditioning products but they con-tain phosphates, so if you switch to soap to eliminate phosphates you gain nothing by soften-ing your water with these packaged preparations.

The other alternative is to use a phosphate free detergent. Extensive testing needs to be done to see if these detergents affect the life of automatic wash-

ers. The products were put on the market so fast that adequate test-ing was not done. Also it has been found that these detergents do not clean as well as those containing phosphates. These detergents are more dangerous to small children and should be kept out of reach.

What is the answer then? Perhaps a better answer would be to im-prove our sewage disposal plants to remove phosphates from waste. Taxpayers of Kosciusko County should be espec-ially anxious to see adequate sewage treatment to protect our la-kes. Let's work to stop kes. Let's work to stop the dumping of raw sew-age into the lakes. Homemakers are in a age

want to do all we can
to help. In days gone
by, homemakers took the
clothes out of the water in conventional washers: now we take the ers; now we take the water out of the clothes in automatic washers. This is what causes the problems and the need for phasphate. If substitution for the phosphate is not an ideal or even practical solution at this point, the alt-ernative is to remove phosphates from the

waste water.
