TVSC budget adopted without protest

A budget calling for a \$4.55 tax rate was adopted without protest

Thursday night by members of the Tippecanoe Valley school board. Meeting in special session to hear comments from taxpayers. board members found an audience of two newspaper reporters, only one of whom is a corporation resident. Neither spoke. The budget, which was ad-

vertised in the July 28 and August 4 issues of the NEWS, calls for a total of \$1,247,542.20 to be raised. Superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrell said the base levy is up \$135,000 because the corporation opened a new school—Tippecanoe Valley High School— since the tax rate was frozen in 1973.

Of the amount to be raised, \$992,550.06 will go into the general

fund and \$254,992.14 will be placed in debt service. Respective levies for the funds are \$3.62 and \$.93.

The vote to adopt the budget was unanimous. Board president Fred Kindig was absent. Present were Vernon Meredith, Everett Besson, Don Snipes and vice-president Con Shewman, who conducted the meeting in Kindig's absence.

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

September 1.
The law requires all meetings of governmental units to be open to governmenta units to be open to the general public. It applies to executive and legislative boards, departments and agencies, local governments and advisory com-missions.

Under provisions of the law, which was enacted by the 1977 General Assembly, secret ballots are forbidden, minutes of meetings must be available for public examination and a 48-hour public examination and a 48-hour public notice for meetings is required. Exceptions include executive sessions to discuss strategy in regard to collective bargaining, litigation, purchase of property or to discuss an individual's employment status or alleged misconduct. 





In describing the project, she said, "I used the idea at a learning station to help some of my third graders become more competent in structuring a sentence. I cut out many white circles and wrote sentences using one circle for each word. The circles were laminated and a hole was punched in each at and a note was punction in each at the top. Each group of circles that made a sentence was placed in an envelope. On the outside of the envelope I attached a laminated piece of paper—on the front was

On September 17, 1787 our Constitution was approved unanimously by the delegates. It has undergone few changes through the years. Many have attested to the perfectability of the Federal Constitution. While it is not perfect, it has proved to be more adequate and less erratic than most of the products of human beings. The relatively few amendments are testimony to the excellent job which the founding fathers did in providing a frame-work of government. It has en-dured a long time with few changes and has been comprehensive and flexible enough to meet the needs of a relatively small group of young Americans into a group numbering in the millions.

The framers of our Constitution believed that all powers of sovereignty should forever reside sovereignty should forever reside in the people and that the government they were about to establish should be a limited government subject always to the will of the people. They sought to create a government which also would incorporate such checks and balances as would insure that all public officials should forever remain subservient to the will of the people. the people.

The personal rights op-portunities, and freedom of the individual were foremost in the minds of the founders of our nation as they set out to build a structure of lasting government. Their im-mortal work was brought forth mortal work was brought forth after long debates. This marvelous document was built around three main concepts of freedom; namely, religious, political, and economic— a Constitutional Republic guaranteeing the political concept. A free enterprise profit—motive system based on profit—motive system, based on private ownership of property constituted the economic concept.

We must fearlessly and per-sistently protect the concepts and precepts of the American way as the founding fathers envisioned and established them. Although attacked by many for our loyalty, we must not falter in our support of we must not falter in our support of the fundamental principles which made and kept us a nation.

If the trend away from the Constitution and the American tradition is to be reversed, clearly the remedy is to return to the Constitution and to see that it is observed and enforced. The trend can be reversed only if alert citizens keep reminding their representatives at all levels of government of their proper areas of power. We must preserve the lost art of American patriotism. CONSTITUTION WEEK

States of America was adopted September 17, 1787, ratified June 21, 1788, in effect March 4, 1789. Op January 5, 1956, Senator William F Knowland introduced the following Senate Joint Resolution 105:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, That the President of the United States is President of the United States is authorized and requested to designate the period beginning September 17 and ending Sep-tember 23 of each year as Con-stitution Week, and to issue annually a proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe such week in schools, churches and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies and activities."
This Resolution was adopted

July 23, 1956, and signed into law (Public Law No. 915), August 2,

WHEREAS, September 17, 1977, marks the one hundred ninetieth anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States of America by the Constitutional Convention; and WHEREAS, To accord official





What's Cooking?



At one time or another you have probably heard that the basis of a probably heard that the basis of a nutritious diet is a variety of foods-not vitamin pills. But do you really believe it? Many people don't. In fact, 86 percent of the Americans questioned in a survey knew that they could get all the nutrients they need from ordinary foods. However, 52 percent bought vitamin pills at least occasionally just to be sure.

It is possible to take too many vitamins. The fat soluble vitamins which include A, D, E, and K are stored in the body. They can build up to toxic levels if excess amounts are consumed over a period of

Water soluble vitamins which include B and C, are not stored in the body. Excessive amounts are excreated from the body. It is recommened that adults receive 55 to 60 milligrams of vitamin C daily. One cup of orange juice provides 20 mg of Vitamin C. If vitamin pills provide additional Vitamin C it is excreted. Thus, you are actually wasting your money on vitamin

One nutrient that is almost impossible to get sufficient quantities of is iron. For women during the child bearing years, the recommendatin is 18 mg daily. An egg is considered a good source of iron, containing 1.1 mg. Liver is the best source of iron containing 5 mg m a 2 oz serving

The best way to get the nutrients that you need is with a well balanced diet. But if that is not possible a multiple vitamin can be taken.

CARAMEL ROLLS 2 loaves frozen bread, ½ cup butter or margarine, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 large package vanilla pudding mix (not instant) 2 T. milk, cinnamon (not instant) 2 1. milk, cinnamon to taste. Thaw, but do not permit to raise, 2 loaves of frozen bread dough. Break 1 loaf up in bottom of greased 9x13" pan. Melt butter, add brown sugar, pudding mix, milk and cinnamon. 



"For a beginner, did you ever see anyone with so many books on the subject?"

Now retired after an active career in construction that took him to jobs in 17 states and resulted nim to loos in 19 states and resulted in a total of 54 broken bones and the distinction of being the first man in the United States to suc-cessfully have a severed arm restored, Carl Davis doesn't care restored, Carl Davis doesn't care for herbs in cooking, and he dislikes tea. But he agrees that many plants and herbs have medicinal qualities and are edible. A confirmed coffee drinker appalled at the high prices of his favorite brew, he experimented this spring with dandelion roots. "If I'd dried them in the oven, I't hink I couldn've gotten a pretty decent cup of gotten a pretty decent cup of coffee," he says. Carl Davis' favorite of his wife's

remedies is the one for stomach flu: red peppers. "I noticed when I lived in Texas that the Mexicans lived in Texas that the Mexicans had little of the stomach upset we have, and someone told me it was because of the hot peppers they eat," Ruth Davis says. A large jar of dried peppers is kept on hand in case of illness, but while she makes hers into tea, he prefers to eat his as is. "They're good," he says, popping a bit of dried pepper into his mouth. After successfully warding off another operation with his mouth. After successfully warding off another operation with massive doses of vitamin C, the couple is firmly convinced of the vitamin's therapeutic and preventive qualities. "But you have to have the real thing," he cautions. "None of that drugstore stuff will work." The family become another source of stuff will work. The faining freezer contains another source of vitamin C, large rosehips, which Mrs. Davis says are 50 to 90 per-cent higher in vitamin content than citrus fruits.

"But cautions Mrs. Davis, "they must grow quickly and lush in an area that hasn't been sprayed or where cattle have been fed supplements.

They prefer their weeds untainted by sprays and additives, and they raise much of their own food in an organic garden dotted with compost piles. A special section of the lawn is given over to a bed of wild flowers, including at least one—bloodroot—that is on the endangered species list, and a young orchard contains several hives of bees.

"We think nature has many wonderful things to offer," Ruth Davis says. It is a statement that includes good food, medicine and tea, and, although she doesn't profess to be an herb doctor, she plans to keep right on studying.

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

Motorized bike laws revised

Indiana Laws regarding motorized bicycles havs been amended to state: Motorized bicycles may NOT be operated by any person under the age of 15 years, and may not be operated on the Interstate defense network of

highways or on sidewalks.

Motorized bicycles are described

Motorized bicycles are described as bicycles with operable pedals which may be propelled by human power or by an internal compustion engine, or a battery powered motor or by both.

When powered by an internal combustion engine must have a rating of no more than one and five-tenths (1.5) brake horse power and a cylinder capacity not exceeding 50 cubic centimeters, an automatic transmission and a automatic transmission and a maximum design speed of no more than 25 miles per hour on a flat

Many small cycles exceed these specifications and when they do it is required that they be registered, issued a license plate, and the operator must have a driver's

It is the purchaser's obligation to know the power and type of motorized bicycle he is getting so he can comply with the law.

What's Cooking?

Q. If tomato juice is packed hot in jars, does it still need to be processed?

A. Yes. All canned foods should be processed after packing in jars, whether it is packed hot or raw (cold). For tomato juice, processing should be done in the

boiling water bath.
Q. Why does garlic turn blue or purple in pickling?

purple in pickling?

A. Garlic contains a water soluble pigment which changes color very easily. With the acid condition in pickles, it turns blue or purple in color but is not harmful.

Q. Is it safe to use lumpy evaporated milk?

A. Lumps in evaporated milk are formed by the solids settling during storage. The lumps do not harm the milk. Cans of evaporated milk can be shaken or turned at intervals during storage to prevent lumping

Q. My canned tomatoes are all working like a bottle of soda. What

working like a bottle of sooa. What happened?

A. They were not completely processed properly if they continue to "work" after they are cooled. Check that you are following all directions of the property of the cooled. directions carefully. Proper processing in the boiling water bath for the recommended length of time is essential.

PICKLED CAULIFLOWER

Break one head of cauliflower into flower ettes. Cover with four tablespoons salt, one pint water and keep submerged under the water for 24 hours. Prepare brine of two pints malt or white vinegar, one and one-half teaspoons each of cinnamon sticks, whole cloves, whole allspice, mace. Simmer for 15 minutes. Drain cauliflower and place in jars. Cover with brine. Process in boiling water bath for 30 minutes.

Silver Lake telephone exchange reclassification asked

General Telephone Company of Indiana has filed a petition with the Public Service Commission of Indiana, seeking to reclassify the Silver Lake exchange, according to Dennis Pauwels, division manager. He said the Commission action was requested because the exchange had grown beyond its present allowable rate grouping.

"This reclassification is being sought in order to avoid discriminatory rate groupings between the Silver Lake exchange and other exchanges of similar size served by General Telephone Company of Indiana," Pauwels

He noted that rates for telephone service are determined for each exchange according to the number exchange according to the number of telephones accessible within the local calling area without the necessity of long distance calling charges. "Silver Lake has now grown beyond the upper limits of its former rate growing and accessing the statement of the stat its former rate grouping and customers in the area have been

able to call more telephones without paying a toll charge for six months or more," Pauwels said, "thus placing them in a higher rate class as defined by the Com-mission."

The Public Service Commission must approve the petition before General Telephone can implement the new rate structure and the reclassification.

The rates for telephone service (main stations as opposed to extentions) being sought under the classification are: Residential, One-party - \$8.35; two-party - \$7.00; four- and eight-party - \$6.15; Business, One-party - \$17.75.



"Where does the money come from?" Tippecanoe Valley school board members asked Monday night when faced with a group of night when taced with a group or Akron kindergarten parents requesting smaller classes for their children and when told by superintendent Dr. Lloyd Harrel that one of the boilers at Akron is operating at ten percent efficiency and will need repairs or replacement.

"Spring round-up showed there would be 65 students in the Akron kindergarten," Harrell said. "By June, the number had risen to 71. The history at Akron is that four or five eligible students don't attend and usually, after three or four weeks, the enrollment goes down. This year, when this didn't happen, we authorized the principal to hire a full-time aid. There are now 41 children in the morning session, 36 in the afterneen." in the afternoon.

Harrell said the classes were taught by Joyce Nichols with assistance from aid Donna Sorg. Later in the meeting, he read a list of goals Mrs. Nichols had set for the children and the areas in which she felt Mrs. Sorg could help.

The law continues, "A final action must be taken at a meeting open to the

Public notice of executive sessions must state their purpose or subject matter, but only the subject to be considered need be

public '

identified. Executive sessions cannot be conducted during a meeting except as otherwise permitted by applicable statute.

Nor was notice given of a meeting alluded to by town board president Frank Hardesty when he said, "The board last week asked Glenn to resign. He chose not to." If the treatment failed or if the boiler plate became badly pitted, a new bottom would cost approximately \$8,000, he said, making the total not much less than the estimated \$13,750 for a new boiler with a combination natural gas and oil burner. However, he estimated labor to set the new boiler, tanks and pumps at \$7,900. He suggested putting a new boiler on skids in the courtyard area adjoining the present boiler pit so that if the Akron school is replaced or remodeled within the next few years, the new boiler could be utilized. Shewman said, "If you're going to do it, you'd better do it right or forget it," in summarizing his feelings about putting the boiler in a temporary shelter.

Board members finally in-structed Harrell to get estimates structed Harrell to get estimates from several firms on all possible options for review, possibly at a special called meeting. "If we don't do something soon, we'll be getting hit with snowballs and it'll be too lete!" Showers be too late," Shewman predicted as Harrell acknowledged that, while the north boiler is in better condition than the one in question, it is not certain how long it can

Have they changed snoring frequencies? I listen intently. Wild animals-probably coons or possums-are battling in the neighbor's woods. I am not frightened. There is so much noise around me they would not dare come closer. Circuit riders had to ride through woods, I think. Do you suppose they saw fights like that

The battle continues, and my husband's snoring slackens. Do you suppose he is awake? Should I awaken him so he can hear the fight? Faced with indecision, I finally drift to sleep, but the night

What's Cooking?

A bumper crop of fresh apples will soon be reaching the market. Look for and examine the many varieties available to select the one which best suits your needs. Apple varieties to choose from include Jonathan, Rome Beauty, Winesap, and the Red and Golden Delicious.

All apple varieties are usually of good eating quality, but not all varieties lend themselves to the same cooking methods. The Jonathan is a deep red colored apple and is classified as an allpurpose apple. All-purpose varieties are those which are good when eaten raw, cooked or baked. The Golden Delicious is also an all-The Golden Delicious is also an ali-purpose apple. It is sweet and juicy, crisp and tender. When exposed to air, this apple holds its color without browning. Red Delicous are characterized by their deep red color and the five distinctive knobs on the blossom distinctive knobs on the blossom end. The flesh is sweet, creamy write and fine grained, crisp and juicy. This is the common eating apple. Rome Beauty variety is juicy, tart, and the skin is thick, tough and smooth. This apple is at its best when cooked or baked.

Apples are good for you. They supply energy, bulk, and additional nutritional value. Weight-watchers will be happy to know that a medium size apple contributes 80 calories.

It is important to store apples It is important to store applies properly to maintain their quality. They store well in a cool, dark place. If your orchard supplies you with an over-abundance, reserve them for later use. Pack them so can circulate around them.

Understanding food habits is an important factor to influencing change for better nutrition. everyone ate what was good for them rather than what they liked, there would be no malnutrition

However, eating is a personal matter. For many food is important for reasons other than growth, repair and energy. To some, food is a means of relieving worry or tension; to others food is a mean of relieving worry or tension; to others food is a way of compensating for lack of security or love.

Family members also influence

food, it will seldom be served. Studies reveal that food likes, of youngsters seem to be related to older family members, especially the father. If father likes a certain food, it is served more often and it becomes familiar to children.

Culture is still another factor that has a bearing on food habits. For example, some people like bread with their meals while others prefer tortillas. Although people of all ages should drink milk some think of it only as a suitable beverage for growing children.

These are only a few factors that influence eating habits. Habits are difficult to change as one does not readily change the eating habits of a lifetime. Yet the necessity of providing an adequate diet may lead to some households changing their established food habits.

About one in twenty people is believed to carry the recessive gene for CF.

The medical care now provided in over 100 CF centers in lengthening the lives of our CF children and, in many cases, relieving or curing the conditions of children suffering from severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and a condition sometimes called "childhood emphysema."

We are encouraged by this progress, and we thank our friends here in Mentone. At the same time, we ask everyone to renew their dedication to the continuation of this fight against lung-damaging diseases in our children.



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



BEEKEEPERS

The fall is the time for beekeepers to enable their bees to survive the winter according to Todd Harris, Purdue University Entomologist.

Various fall management

Various fall management practices are suggested. Each colony should check to make sure it has enough food to overwinter. This takes 40-60 pounds or 1-1½ supers of honey.

To prevent chilling, bees must be able to move around in the winter so all queen excluders should be removed or placed above the inner cover. Also, empty supers directly above the winter brood should be removed so that bees don't have to keen it "heated".

Reduce all hive entrances to less than % inch but not less than ½ inch. This will keep mice out of the hive and still allow the bees to fly on warm days. An upper entrace hole about ¾ inch in diameter may be added in the upper super to allow air circulation and eliminate moisture condensation.

Combine or destroy all colonies of bees that are weak. Colonies with only a few frames of bees cannot keep the hive warm enough to survive the winter.







SMITH HOUSE, Mentone, dates from 1898 and was built by Albert Tucker, the man who laid out the town. The house is said to have nine gables but in reality there are no gables at all, but a series of sharply pointed dormers, one for each window on the second floor, and these give the house a distinctive look. The home has been extensively remodeled by Ray and Iris Smith who have furnished it with a fantastic collection of antiques including art glass lamps. Most of the lamps are handmade by Mr. Smith, who takes pride in having one in each window.



ONE OF FOUR SPINNING WHEELS is this beauty in the McSherry ONE OF FOUR SPINNING WHEELS is this beauty in the McSherry farm home near Palestine. The family originally settled the land in 1838 and has retained ownership since, making the farm the oldest in Kosciusko Co. for length of ownership by the same family. The present brick house was begun in 1881 and has been added to by later generations. The style is typical of the early 1880s with corbeled eaves and shallow curved window headings. Ceiling heights in upstairs rooms are said to be 1) feet. (Houses of this period often have higher ceilings in upstairs rooms than on the lower floor, possibly to offer better ven-tilation on summer nights.) Bricks for the house were made near Warsaw and taken to the site by horse and wagon. A hanging lamp in the parlor is an original fixture. Indians traveling from near Peru to the northwest often passed the farm. However, they were not around long because of the treaties of the 1830s that deprived them of their hunting




THE HAMMER HOUSE, a short distance off Road 25 west of Mentone, is one of the most carefully restored of the state's handsome old houses. Secluded at the end of a country lane on Fulton Co. But, along with the visual beauty and aestetic value of such areas, there are other important benefits, stresses John A. Wott, Purdue University extension home en-vironment horticulturist.

"Plants in the landscape contribute much toward producing a better environment," says the horticulturist. "Besides visual beauty, living plants assist in the removal of many undesirable products in the at-

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

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State police launch CB pilot program

Indiana State Police Superintendent John T. Shettle today announced that CB pilot program, designed to assist motorists in emergency situations, will soon be in effect here in Indiana.

The Indiana State Police has purchased twenty CB base stations and 123 mobile CB units. The base stations will be installed in the Indiana State Police posts throughout the state and the throughout the state and the mobile units in the trooper's patrol cars. Initially the program will provide assistance to motorists along I-65 from Chicago to Louisville; however, it will be expanded to cover the entire state as funds to purchase additional radios are received. radios are received.

Similar programs have been successfully implemented in other states and Superintendent Shettle stated that he has every reason to believe that it will be just as successful here in Indiana.

"CB owners have been ex-tremely helpful to our personnel by remeity neiprili to our personnei by reporting accidents, advising us of poor road conditions, reporting drunk drivers, reporting fires, assisting in manhunts for felons and many other situations. We are deeply grateful for their assistance we are now entering into our

Superintendent Shettle further stated that legitimate calls for help made by CB owners should be given on Channel 9, the channel set cride for experience, reported but aside for emergency reports, but the mobile units in our patrol cars will also monitor channel 19. Superintendent Shettle emphasized the term "legitimate calls" since giving a false report to a trooper is needlessly risking his life. We are attempting to provide a much needed service with this The much needed service with this cB program and any individual charged with making a false report will be dealt with most severely."

Superintendent Shettle pointed out that many of the troopers throughout the state presently have CB's in their patrol cars and these units have been purchased by these units have been purchased by the officers own personal funds simply because the Trooper wants to provide the best possible ser-vice, even at his own expense. The 123 mobile CB's will supplement the privately owned units and will probably be issued to those troopers who have been unable to afford buying them.
Superintendent Shettle stated

that as soon as the base and mobile units have been installed ap-

propiate roadside signs will be erected to advise motorists of the service that is available. In ad-dition, local CB React stations will be contacted and their assistance will be solicited.
