

## Parents attend TVSC board meeting to voice complaints

Approximately 35 parents, many of them irate about the revised 1984-1985 bus routes, attended a special meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation last Thursday, August 30 to make their feelings known.

Superintendent Baxter Paige prefaced discussion of the bus routes by assuring the parents the administration had "been working on (students) bus routes and making changes during the past week. No one is leaving before 6:45, and most bus drivers are leaving about 7:00 a.m. or later. On first day of school, Evelyn Schipper started at 6:30 a.m., and now her first pickup is at 6:56."

Paige concluded his initial remarks by stating, "I feel we've high school students must spend

made quite a bit of progress since last week when we hadn't really tried it (routes). I think improvements may still be made.

Several parents identified themselves and addressed the board with specific questions and personal concerns. Board members and Paige listened to the patrons and agreed to check further into some of their problems. At one point, in answer to Jerry Hartzler's asking, You're closed to other solutions?" Paige stated the administration is open to any better solutions anyone can suggest.

Reason for the extensive re-routing of buses in the Akron area is due to State rulings which went into effect July 1 this year, whereby

six hours per day in actual classes if corporations are to receive state funding and accreditation. Lunch periods, pep sessions, passing period, and activity periods do not count toward the State-required time. For this reason, classes at Valley were rescheduled to begin at 8:10 a.m. and dismiss at 3:10 p.m. Elementary and Junior High schools remained on their old time schedules of an 8:30 a.m. start and a 3:30 p.m. dismissal.

Paige distributed copies reports that the bus drivers have been turning in daily since the August 23 opening school day. It compared mileage, first student pickup times and the number of students picked up daily. The chart showed daily changes for almost all the bus drivers in the numbers of

students picked up. Trustees finally agreed to con-tinue to monitor the routes and adjust as seems appropriate, al-though several of the parents weren't happy to end the discussion.

In a related move, trustees Fred McSherry, Cecil Miller, Jim Royer and Joe Crill voted to change starting and dismissal times at Akron and Mentone schools to save time children will be on buses. Children will now be able to enter the schools at 8:15 a.m. at both schools, with classes beginning at 8:25 and dismissing at 3:25 p.m.

In other business: The 1985 budget and tax rate of \$3.95.7 was approved.

Mileage and salaries for bus drivers was approved at \$25.60 per route per day plus 15 cents for each mile over 25 miles one way. Driver for the handicapped bus will receive \$27 per day. Trustees also approved a \$50 annual fee to imburse drivers for plugging in their buses in the winter months to keep engines warm, and one personal business day was also granted to drivers.

Contract for the new handicapped bus (24 passenger and two wheelchair capacity) was granted to Lee School Supplies, Terre Haute, who had low bid of \$25,451.

The next meeting of the board will be on Monday, Sept. 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

## Firemen battle barn fire



After last Thursday's meeting of the Valley school board, I decided it was time to dust off one of my favorite words and wave it around a bit. I hope it helps.

nomine and the situation about the bus routes The word is co screams for that solution. I absolutely hate to see two groups of well-meaning individuals who all want the same thing, squaring off for a fight from which no one will benefit.

l understand the problems of the parents with small children-I have a seven year old-who are upset because their children must leave home so early and ride the bus for so long. I also understand the school board members' hands are tied by a ribbon of red tape that rigidly binds them to Indianapolis. They didn't randomly select the new starting time at the high school--it was selected for them by the new rules and regulations from the State. If we ignore the State rulings, TVSC will lose State funding and accreditation, and then we'd need a new building to hold all the angry patrons we'd have.

So where is the possibility for a compromise? It would appear to be a no-win situation, but parent Martha Utter may have offered the germ of a solution, and Superintendent Baxter Paige agreed to explore the idea. So far, so good.

Since the biggest problem is in the Akron area, why not consider adding an extra route or two? It's true that the corporation would end up with three or four buses that were not filled to capacity, but apparently the taxpayers won't mind the extra \$30,000 or so in salaries and fuel it would cost to keep the buses on the road.

The only other alternative the parents keep mentioning (double bus routes) would cost the corporation a small fortune and provide no guarantees that the time for children on the buses would be cut.

If everyone would just remember that the board members aren't the enemy, it would also help to ease tensions. They've remained calm and respectful in the face of angry parents, and I think they deserve a pat on the back. Anger won't help solve the problem, everybody -- it only breeds more anger and contempt, and no one wants that.

So let's remain calm, give the school board trustees a chance to do their jobs, and remember my favorite word. Compromise.




## Silver Lake plans computer lease

Town board members John Teeter, Robert Hoehn and Lloyd Moore of Silver Lake have agreed to lease a computer and copier for the local town hall.

The town presently has neither a computer nor copier, but will soon receive them on lease agreement with an option to buy from Allen Business Machines Company Inc., Fort Wayne. The town can lease the equipment for five or six years and then continue to buy the items, or can quit the leasing arrangement if a new board decides against having them. The town will pay monthly installments of about \$152 a month, a discount from the normal fee. The original price for both items is \$6,400.

The copier will be in Clerk-Treasurer's Billie Risner's office at the town hall and can be used by local residents. The cost for each copy will be 15 cents, and Mrs. Risner will run off copies upon request during her working hours all day Monday and Tuesday and a half-day Wednesday



The last days in a terminally ill patient's life present the nurse with one of the greatest, most difficult challenges in her nursing career, according to nurses Claire Hoffman, Gladys Lipman, and Ella Thompson in their book, "Simplified Nursing."


The nurse, in fact, may well be the person who gives the last comforting services to the dying patient and be a source of great comfort to his family as well.

She knows and recognizes the needs of the patient and learns to anticipate his requirements for comfort (i.e., a change of position, etc.). She is also alert to sense a patient's wish to talk to the clergyman or particular family members.

aspirin. Make sure your child takes the aspirin with enough water to prevent upsetting his stomach. Aspirin is a systemic drug; it relieves pain only after it has entered the bloodstream. So make sure it gets all the way down with plenty of water. Never place the tablet on the painful tooth or on the gum or let it dissolve in his mouth and ask him to swish it around the aching tooth. The aspirin can irritate the tissue seriously. Never crush aspirin and place it between the cheek and the gum. Aspirin and related compounds are a common source of burns of the oral caylity. White lesions can develop where the medication touches the cheek or gum. The tissues will become painful and the white cauterized areas may be removed leaving a

new compact, economical models, buyers should look through data from consumer research publications and automotive magazines before shopping.

Questioning friends on various aspects of their new cars and on the after-purchase service by local dealerships is one way to learn about design or operation problems that surface only after the car has been used for several weeks or months.

Pearson offers the following tips for new car-shoppers: 1. Discuss the car you are

considering with a trusted mechanic

2. Obtain reports on the con sumer complaint records of local automobile dealers you're thinking of doing business with. The Better Business Bureau can usually supply these.

3. When shopping, get written price quotations from the dealers, including the price of each option you may want, and the price of the car without the options. 4. Take into consideration not

only the price of the car, but after-purchase services as well.

5. Decide how you are going to finance the automobile before a final purchase decision. Check with credit unions, banks, saving and loan companies and dealers to find out interest rates, and down pay-ment requirements. Most loans are paid back over a 36 to 48 month period.

6. The trade-in value of your old car may vary with each dealer. Before you trade in your car, check with a "blue book" or similar manual which can be obtained from a bank or loan agency to check the value of your trade-in, before you get a dealer's estimate.







rusher with 58 yards. Defense players Steve Barnhart had 18 tackle points, while Chris Paris had 16 and Corey Smith had 14 tackle points.


