## TVSC approves contracts

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board held a meeting on August 29 to adopt the budget for 1986 and consider contracts for the school year.

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A hearing was held on August 12 for the budget, and Thursday night the budget and tax rate was adopted for 1986.

The bus drivers salaries were approved for the 1985-86 year. Bus drivers will receive \$30.70 per day. \$3.35 per hour or \$7.70 minimum was set for the bus drivers for extra-curricular trips. Substitute drivers will receive \$25.00 per day. First year bus drivers will be started at \$26.25 a day.

A contract was accepted and signed by the board and teachers association for the next two years. The contract was reported to have been approved overwhelmingly by the teachers. The salaries started out with a B.S. and B.A. degree earning \$15,310 up to 10 years with \$20,898. The Masters salaries started at \$15,976 and went up to 17 vears experience at \$27,305. Other changes were added to the accumulated sick leave and next year one more day will be added. Insurance was increased by \$10,000 for each teacher for life insurance. A single teacher will have all insurance paid but \$1. Family insurance will be 80% paid by the corporation.

## Akron Town water report

The Akron Town requested the firm of Philip L. Schnelker, Inc., Consulting engineers from Fort Wayne to make a study of the towns water and sewage system. The following were the reasons and immediate improvements which the firm felt necessary.

All new mains should be designed and constructed if practical in a loop to maintain the pressure and capacity of the main and eliminate the problem of stagnant water associated with dead end mains. A dead end main is one that does not run water to a residence or is used in any way to move water, which can lead to potential health hazards from the water standing. By eliminating these areas pressure should increase to existing users, and fire hydrants will be more reliable because of the greater pressure needed to fight fires. This would in turn decrease insurance for fire protection ratings. Another reason hydrants might be low in pressure is due to the size of the mains feeding it or the main might be totally closed.

To eliminate these problems it was suggested that

the following be done.

\*Connection of the existing dead end main at the intersection of Rochester Street and S.R. 14 (S.R. 14 and S.R. 114) to the existing main one-half block north of the intersection utilizing a 6" diameter main.

\*Connect the dead end main at the intersection of Rochester Street and Cherry Street to the existing main one-half block north of this intersection with a diameter main.

\*Connect the dead end main at the intersection of Rochester Street and Slaybaugh Street to the existing main one-half block north of this intersection with a 6" diameter main.

\*Connect the dead end main at the intersection of Rochester Street and West Street to the existing main one block south of this intersection at the intersection of West Street and Orchard Street with a 6" diameter main.

\*Connect the dead end main south of the Front Street and Oak Street intersection to the existing main Sonoco Drive.

\*Construct a new 8" diameter main from the well immediate site (Treatment Facility Site) needed.

north to the north property line of the site, thence east to S.R. #14 connecting this new main to the existing mains in Northwook Drive and S.R. 14. Also construct an 8" diameter main west from the well site along the north property line of the site to Maple Street to Mishawaka Street (S.R. #19) and south Mishawaka Street to Walnut Sreet.

\*Connect the existing 4" main at the intersection of Walnut Street Whittenberger Street to the existing 4" main at Rochester Street and Noyer Street with an 8" main.

\*Connect the two dead end mains on Johnson Street south of Rural Street together with a 4" diameter main.


\*Connect the dead end main on Rochester Street in front of the Town Hall to the existing 8" diameter main on Mishawaka Street.

\*Replace an average of 6 existing hydrants a year for nine years with units having a steamer connection and auxiliary shut-off valve.

With school back in session children are no longer sleeping late in the morning and having a leisurely breakfast before heading out to play. Now it is back to the last minute rush before jumping on a bike or racing to the bus. Maybe a donut, a glass of juice or nothing at all is eaten. Does it matter if a child goes to school without breakfast? There is no really simple answer to that question from a scientific standpoint. Studies have shown that some children do not perform well on certain tests if they have not had breakfast. Other research seems to indicate that eating breakfast has little if any effect at all on test scores or behavior patterns.

The major reason for promoting breakfast is that by establishing breakfast as one meal of the day, we are developing a positive behavior pattern for our children. They have fasted all night and their bodies will now be called upon to use energy and other nutrients once again. A breakfast can prevent them from turning to other less nutritious energy morning sources in the hours. If they have had a piece of toast or a bowl of cereal and a glass of milk, they will be less interested in grabbing a soft drink or candy bar between morning classes.

Another argument for having breakfast is that a parent has some control over what is offered. Food choices made at school or on the way home from school can be influenced by advertising and the food habits of other students. By serving a nutritious breakfast a parent has some reassurance that their child's daily vitamin, mineral, protein and calorie needs will be met.

If mornings are hurried, breakfast may seem to be an impossible task. A meal before school does not have to be elaborate to make it nutritious. A bowl of cereal, milk, fruit and toast is fine. There is nothing about what should be eaten at breakfast. It might be best to emphasize the bread, cereal, fruit and vegetable foods since these are the ones most often neglected by young people during the rest of the day. If your son or daughter would eat a fruit salad for breakfast (perhaps leftover from dinner) that would be excellent. Do not limit yourself to thinking about traditional breakfast foods

If mornings are not real busy, breakfast can also be a time for leisurely communication between parent and child. While this is not often the case, it may be the only meal where some people can sit down together and visit.

A breakfast in the morning for your student can send them off to school without being hungry. This gives them a good start on meeting their daily nutritional needs and may help them to deal more effectively with their schoolwork.



**Protecting Primary Teeth** 

By the time your child is five or six, all of his primary teeth will have formed. Then the process begins of acquiring the permanent teeth that can last a lifetime with good dental care.

As the primary teeth gradually loosen and fall out, they are soon replaced with permanent teeth. But what about a primary tooth that is lost well ahead of its time, long before the permanent tooth is ready to replace it? This can be caused by accident or disease or decay.

If that space remains vacant for a long time, the teeth on either side of it will try to fill the space. This will throw them out of line and may cause the permanent teeth to come in crooked.

To protect your child's permanent teeth, any primary tooth lost ahead of time should be replaced by a space maintainer until the permanent tooth is ready to erupt. If this should happen to your child, see your dentist for treatment.



Output of the paper industry in Brazil, stimulated by wartime curtailment of imports, increased from approximately \$26,000,000 in 1938 to around \$70,000,000 in 1943. Parana pine and other Brazilian fibrous plants and local waste materials are being utilized extensively in the expansion of paper production. A new paper mill is designed to produce 40,000 tons of newsprint and 40,000 tons of chemical wood pulp annually, contributing to a further increase in Brazil's rising self-sufficiency in paper products.

Dry wood is essentially about 70 per cent cellulose and 30 percent lignin and very small amounts of interest and organic substances. The various species differ from each other mainly in how these two substances, cellulose and lignin, are distributed and arranged.

### **OVERDENTURES**

There is a new way to make dentures which vastly improves the retention of dental plates and has become a boon to denture wearers. Hopeless teeth are no longer extracted. Instead, root canal treatment is performed, then the teeth are cut down to the level of the gumline. The roots of the teeth remain imbedded in the jawbone and the presence of these roots prevents the bone under the gums from shrinking. This preserves the ridges and gives good

retention and support for the dentures.

Another method is to cement metal studs on top of the embedded roots. The studs protrude about ¼ inch. Corresponding snaps are fastened to the denture. All the individual needs to do is to snap the denture onto the studs and there are no more worries about slipping dentures.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP

Bell Memorial Public Library's Board of Trustees has denied Franklin Township's bid for library service. Of the seven-member board six voted against the measure and one, a Franklin Township resident, abstained. I would like to explain the reasoning behind this decision.

For years residents of Franklin and Seward Townships enjoyed library service from Bell Library as well as representation on Bell's Board of Trustees. During that time residents of those townships paid only a small portion of the tax rate the people of Mentone and Harrison Township paid. A couple of years ago Bell's Board invited the townships to become a part of the library's tax base. The invitation, if accepted, would have lowered the library's rate by spreading the tax levy over a broader area, and since the two townships were already paying between four and eight cents for library service, and the state would have paid twenty percent of the remainder, the tax increase to the township residents would have been negligible. (Since these monies would have not come from the trustee's budget, fire fighting, recreation, and other funds would not have been affected.) The invitation was not accepted and library service ceased for residents of those two townships.

The library's Board cannot in good conscience grant a request for service when it means that part of its patrons will be taxed a full share while others will pay only a small fraction of the rate. It has been argued that not all the townships residents avail themselves of the library's services; but then again, not all residents of Mentone or Harrison Township are library users.

The Board's decision was a difficult one in light of the fact that it would again deny library service to so many. We felt however, that we would be grossly remiss in allowing a 'special" rate for some while others are paying a fair share.

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board held it's regular meeting on Monday Sept. 9, 1985 at the administration building. Among decisions made were approval of claims and payroll, the cumulative building fund, attendance reports, salaries for administrators and noncertified personnel.

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The attendance was reported for the schools in the corporation as follows: Akron, 646; Mentone, 622; Burket, 148; TVHS, 595. Baxter Paige stated that the official school record of students would be determined on Friday. Presently there are 2,033 for a total in the corporation. At the present time there are nine teachers for the first grade and eight for the second grade in the corporation. An extra teacher may be needed if the enrollment stays up for the official count for Primetime. The corporation as a whole may have to be used as an average for Primetime since 18 students are the maximum allowed in each class. The total attendance for the corporation is only down by

six students.

A group of concerned parents were present at the board meeting to make the board aware that the Akron fifth grade is in two classes with the numbers in each class being 32 and 33 students. The parents asked that their children be given the same consideration as other grades. Board President Fred McSherry stated that the situation would be taken under advisement and checked into.

The second advertisement of the cumulative building was approved and fund signed by the board. It will now be sent on to the State Board of Tax Commissioners.

John Hill was given permission to purchase an industrial video tape player for the closed circuit system in the high school. The player will be purchased with interest money from the high school and the amount used will be \$574.07.

The board will allow John Hill to serve as a member of the North Central Association evaluation team for

Angola High School on January 14-17, 1986.

Salaries were approved for non-certified personnel and administrators. The super-intendent with 25 years of experience will receive a regular salary of \$49,000, other administrators with a PhD and 11 to 14 years experience receive \$34,500 -\$42,000. Other's with Masters receive \$25,000 -\$34,200 with none less than six years of experience. Valley

Tippecanoe Valley Classroom Teachers Association President Betty Martens thanked the board for their help in negotiating teacher contracts. Because of the boards interest the situation was resolved faster. Updated blueprints were presented by Fanning Howey Associated Inc. for the board to review. The final prints will be presented on October 15. The three projects will include all three grade school sties. At Akron the front of the old high school will be demolished leaving the gym with remodeling to make it more efficient. A corridor will be built to connect the buildings,

classrooms will be built on the front of the existing grade school toward S. R. 19. At Mentone classrooms will be built on the northeast side of the building. Burket will get a new milti-purpose room with a library, dining,

kitchen, and reading areas.

School principals reported on activities coming up. Akron - on Sept. 16, Stephen's Puppets will perform, Sept. 19, Open House at 7:00. Mentone -Open House was Sept. 10. Both schools are planning a Valley Bowl (details are being worked out). Burket -Oct. 3-9 Book Fair, and a read a shirt day is being planned. The High School reported the Band will be



"We've already had one case in our service territory where several metallic bal-

loons became caught in a line and caused an outage," said Jim Wilber, Rochester Manager.

Most importantly, metallic batloons shouldn't be extended on string near power lines. "If the batloon contacted a line, the person holding the batloon's string could be seriously injured," Wilber said. "Also, if a batloon becomes tanged in a line, don't try to get it down. "One reason older people receive special consideration is that their medical expenses are higher than those who are younger," Mrs. Merritt said. 

## Methods for pickling

Many families have a tradition of making pickles - those crisp, crunchy, flavorful accompaniments to meals. Cucumbers are the most common items pickled, but beets, onions, zucchini, cabbage and green peppers are also popular.

For successful pickling, three things are necessary: quality ingredients, a tested recipe and time to follow the process correctly.

Use high quality ingredients. Choose cucumbers that are fairly uniform in size and use within 24 hours after picking. Always remove the blossom ends and never buy cucumbers for pickling that have been waxed, as in supermarket displays. Use commercially made vinegar with 4-6 percent acidity. White vinegar can be chosen for light-colored foods, while cider vinegar gives a fruit flavor and darker color. Pure granulated salt is the best for making pickles. Do not use table salt. Although pure, the additives in it to keep it free-running in damp weather make the pickling liquids cloudy; the iodine in iodized salt darkens the pickles. Water is an important aspect of pickling because the minerals in hard water have a negative effect on quality pickles. If you don't have soft water, make it soft by boiling it for 15 minutes and letting it stand for 24 hours. The scum that usually forms should be

## Speaker from India

boiled water carefully, without disturbing the sediment, and add a tablespoon of vinegar per gallon before using in the recipe.

There are two methods of pickling; brined or fermented pickles and the fresh pack. Brined or fermented vegetables must remain in salt brine for about six weeks when the desired color, texture and flavor develop. This method doesn't always give good results in Indiana's humid, unpredictable weather.

The fresh pack is a faster method. Here, the cucumbers are brined for only several hours or overnight before the other ingredients are added. In order to let the flavor develop, let the processed cucumbers remain in the jar for four to five weeks before eating.

Whichever method you choose, finish processing with a hot water bath to destroy the enzymes causing spoilage and inactivate the other enzymes affecting color, flavor or texture. Done correctly, this will not make the pickles soft. If the recipe calls for refrigerating the final product, then the hot water bath may not be needed.







## Deadline for wheat insurance in Indiana

The deadline to apply for insurance on wheat in Indiana is September 30, according to Harlan Stull. However, because a number of major changes have been made in the insurance program since last year, Stull suggests that farmers interested in considering insurance should obtain information about the coverage available and the cost as early as possible.

Under the new actual production history policies being written for the first time this fall, farmers who have verifiable production records are eligible for yield guarantees based on their own experience. Adequate time should be allowed, Stull says, to compile and arrange for ASCS verification of the necessary records.

## Cover crops this fall

With fall approaching fast, now is the time to be thinking about applying a cover crop to that corn or soybean field. There are many different types of cover crops and different ways of seeding

Winter rve and wheat are two that are easy to establish and provide excellent cover. The seed is readily available and relatively inexpensive. Rye is more tolerant than wheat to herbicide carry over.

Legumes are another possibility, but do not provide cover as rapidly. They do supply nitrogen that can be used by a corn crop the next spring.

Soils in the Akron area are particularly susceptible to wind and water erosion.

There are various ways to seed a cover crop. The advantages to aerially seeding is you can get the seed on early while the crop is still growing. This will provide adequate growth to protect the soil over winter. By seeding a cover crop conventionally (discing and seeding with a drill) you can get by with less seed and probably have better germination, but there will be less cover there to protect the soil over winter.

Cover crops can be seeded anytime between now and September 30th.

The cost of seeding a cover crop conventionally is about \$8-10 an acre using discing and drill at custom

rates. To aerially seed it costs \$5-\$6.00 an acre. These cost are for application only and do not include the cost of the seed.

The Fulton County Soil and Water Conservation District will be sowing some cover crop demonstration plots throughout the county. These plots will compare various types of legumes and small grains. They will he located on the Paul Bowen farm north of the Ft. Wavne road on Highway 19 north of Akron, the Dave Stangle farm at the junction of highway 17 and 75 north, the James Fritts farm at the junction of Highway 14 and 300 west and the Bud Lease farm at junction of Highway 17 and 950 south.

Cost share is available for seeding cover crops through the Fulton County ASCS office. For further information on cover crops contact the Soil Conservation Service at 223-3220, 513 Main St., ASCS at 223-3398 or Cooperative Extension Service at 223-3397.




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

The Akron Town Board met on September 17 for their regular board meeting at the town office. Board members present were Jack Miller and Dick Drudge. Jerry Hudson was called back to his place of business on an emergency.

Akron clean up days will be on a Wednesday, Thursday and Friday October 16,17 and 18. On October 16 precinct one will be done. Precinct one is the are of town that is West of Sr. 19. On October 17 precinct two will be done. This precinct consists of Akron East of SR. 19 and North of 14. Precinct Three will be done on Oc tober 18. Precinct three 19 and South of 14. On cleanup days town employees are to pick up any trash, including appliances and furniture, that are taken to the curb. The town will pay all dumping fees.

A sale of surplus items owned by the town will be held on October 12. Items will be at the town office on display and sealed bids will be accepted until 10 a.m. on the 12th. A partial listing of the items will be in the next weeks issue of the NEWS.

The call forwarding program was checked into by Kraig Smith. He reported that GTE did not provide the service, and Rochester Telephone would run a separate line from Rochester to Akron for a cost of \$450 per month and \$1,000 for the installation. It has been reported that a 911 emergency number will be installed in the county next year. The board turned down the call forwarding program because of the expense.



ON HIDING PARTIAL CLASPS

The basic design of the removable partial is a framework of metal with metal clasps that grip the supporting teeth and hold the appliance in the mouth. There is generally scrylic over areas (the area of missing teeth) to support the replacement the The

Most of the esthetic problems with a removable partial have to do with the clasps or hooks that hold it in place. Patients feel that the illusion of naturalness is defeated by the hooks that immediately

The simplest way of overcoming this is to alter the design of the partial. Retention and stability may still be obtained with smaller, thinner clasps. Clasps can be further hidden by placing them as far back on the tooth as possible. This is a very delicate procedure, however, because if the clasp is reduced too much, it loses its function. A partial that doesn't stay in the mouth is valueless, no matter how esthetic it is. However, dentistry has come a long way in combining function with pleasing appearance in the area of dentures

### Mentone Reading Club dinner

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President Carol Hurst introduced Charles Craig from the Speakers Bureau of General Telephone Co. who talked on "Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Your Telephone but Didn't Know Who to Ask". Mr. Craig showed a slide and audio program relative to inflation and deregulation and how they have affected the telephone industry, followed by a talk on access charges, measured local service, and long distance carriers, and answered questions from members. Access charges is a new

system for pricing telephone service. Access is the ability to communicate with anyone via the telephone network. and the phone company has to install and maintain phone lines, cable and equipment between switching centers and the customer. The cost in the past has been in part your basic local service rate, with a larger share being paid by people who make long distance calls. Since the FCC decision to deregulate the nation's telecommunications industry, there is much competition in the industry. Mr. Craig said it is not really a rate increase, but access charges will recover part of the costs of local service now subsidized by long distance rates. The new charges may result in a higher total monthly phone bill for some customers, and frequent long distance users may see little change or even a decrease in their bills. Eventually competition will determine long distance rates.

Measured service is the method of pricing calls depending on how much one uses the phone for local service. Due to the competition that resulted from deregulation, the flat rate system can no longer be used totally for local service. The options are a higher flat rate, government control, or measured service, which most companies feel will be the best alternative. The price for measured service will depend upon the number of calls placed; duration of calls; distance; and time of day. Discounts will be given for off peak hours. Tests conducted in Illinois and Indiana show approximately 60" of the people will save money with the new system. General Telephone has not yet determined whether local calling will be priced entirely

by measured service as they are still studying the options, and one may have the choice of a flat rate and measured service, or a higher ceiling rate and unlimited local calling.

There were many questions concerning the selection of a long distance carrier, and Mr. Craig said although such cities as Fort Wayne and Elkhart will be making this decision in 1986, a town such as Mentone may not have to make this decision for another 4 to 5 years. Before that time people would receive much information to help them make an informed decision; however Mr. Craig stressed that it is up to the people to make this decision. rather than let the decision be made for them.





The four trees are a red-fruited crab apple, propagated on dwarfing rootstock, and planted in 1982. The full row on trellis consists of trees trained in a diagonal ornamental pattern, called a "Belgian Fence". Last year, the Bureau printed more than 17 billion "Flag Over the Supreme Court" coil and booklet stamps and another nine hillion stamps, in sheet versions, of an assortment of single and multiple color definitive and commemorative issues in denominations of from 1¢ to \$5.00.

The variety and quantity of stamps produced by the Bureau is necessary to meet the Postal Service's demands for postage stamps and collectibles. Keeping pace with that demand requires modern, high-speed presses with a high degree of reliability. It is, in fact, a rare occurence for a significant error in stamp printing to avoid detection by the Bureau's electronic and human quality control system.


