School Board adopts budget

The Tippecanoe Valley School Board adopted both the 1992 budget and the Capital Projects Fund at a special noon meeting Thursday, August 30.

Due to the absence of board president Fred McSherry, the meeting was conducted by vice president Joe Crill with all other board members present.

board members present. Based on taxable property with a net assessed valuation of \$69,615,020., the budget's rate is \$4.78. It is made up of five separate funds-general, debt service, capital projects. transportation and pre-school special education. The general fund includes instruction, adult education and administration and totals \$7,419,706. Debt service is \$866,000;

transportation \$761,650; and pre-school special ed \$12,450, of which \$4,150 is budgeted to pay for the 1991 program. This is due to the fact that the program was not included in the 1991 budget, but state legislation requires immediate implementation.

budget, but state legislation requires infinediate inpredication. The Capital Projects Fund totals \$2,216,142 with \$395,000 for education specifications development, \$172,475 for building acquisition, construction and improvement, \$172,475 for building purchase of equipment, \$300,000 for other facilities acquisition and development; and \$21,650 for maintenance of equipment. It the development, and s21,655 for maintenance of equipments was the portion of this fund that would be used for architects fee if a combined middle school were built that drew public criticism during last week's budget hearings. 

Lake City Bank

A branch of Lake City Bank, headquartered in Warsaw, has served the Mentone community's savings investment and lending needs for over seven years.

Originally a Warsaw institution, Lake City was founded in 1872 by James McMurray. It is the third oldest bank in Indiana. Charlie Smith, familiar to local football fans as Tippecanoe Valley's former football coach, was the Mentone Branch's first Office Manager when it opened in January, 1984.

Those were exciting days for Mentone people. Aghast at losing their winning football coach, they were also fascinated to think of him as the new banker in town.

Another exciting aspect of the new bank was its location. It was housed on land formerly owned by the North Central Co-op. was housed on land formerly owned by the North Central Co-op, in an old laundromat building. A thorough renovation and tacclifting brightened up the Main and Morgan streets corner. But, the "piece de resistance" was Mentone's big egg, which came to them with the building. A curiosity to travelers through town, as well as a source of pride for Mentone residents since its erection many years earlier, bank officials had the egg repainted, superimposing a full egg basket over a map of Indiana, and landscaped attractively. The tender loving care lavished on Mentone's unique egg transformed it into a spot of beauty, commanding even more attention than it had previously. In 1986, Charlie Smith was transferred to Warsaw, where he

In 1986, Charlie Smith was transferred to Warsaw, where he now holds the position of Assistant Vice President of Commencial Loans. The new manager was Phil See, also a former coach, who held the job until a year ago, when he returned to coaching. Upon Coach See's resignation, Karen Francis, who had been

with The Mentone Branch since its opening, and had been chosen to manage the new branch opening in Akron, was promoted instead to Office Manager/Customer Service Representative in Mentone. Karen says she was pleased to be able to stay in Mentone. She already had good business relations in the community, and, although she is aware a few customers. especially older men, find it hard to trust a women bank manager, most people have been very accepting of her.

Ever expanding for the past several years, Lake City's Mentone Branch was its seventh. With the nearly completed acquisition of branches in Argos and Bremen, they now have eighteen branches in a seven county area.

eignicen branches in a seven county area. Since its opening, Lake City's Mentone Branch has continued to grow. To date they have opened 2,083 deposit accounts here. Karen attributes the bank's success in part to their friendly employees. They have an in-service program for employees every two seeks to help them become acquainted and to keep them current on new banking regulations.

Lake City Bank and Mentone's Farmer's State Bank are unique in being the only independently owned banks in Kosciusko County. Karen says, "We have branched out into smaller towns because we are locally owned. We have no far away parent company upon whom we have to depend to make awa, parent company upon whom we nave to depend to make banking decisions for people who would be strangers to them-people we know. Also, our customers don't have to wait long for answers to questions. We don't have to go through a three-day process, through a parent city bank, to retrieve a check if a customer needs it."

For these reasons, Karen believes Lake City Bank will remain in Mentone as an independent bank for years to come. Most people trust us," she says. Our staff is trained to know our products and to help customers by being able to answer questions.

Karen, active in sports in high school, graduated from Tippecanoe Valley in 1983. She was a member of the tennis

team, volleyball manager, football secretary, in Sunshine Society and in OEC.

As a local banker, she had been active in the Mentone

As a rocal ounker, she had been active in the Mentonie Chamber of Commerce, worked with Junior Achievement, Leukemia Society and is currently Southern Communities Leader for Kosciusko County United Way. She plays on the Lake City Bank Women's Golf Team and coed volleyball team. She and husband, Jerry, keep two horses for placement siding.

coed volleyball team. She and husband, Jerry, keep two norses for pleasure riding. Karen likes her job very much and says banking has it lighter moments. She laughs about the day, early in her banking career, when she set the time-locks on the vault wrong. "The next day it was impossible to open the vault and Charlie had to go to Warsaw to get money, money orders and cashiers checks to operate the bank. I vowed never to set the locks myself again," eba laughs she laughs

About Mentone, Karen says, "The poultry industry has made a big difference in making Mentone and keeping it going. But, we need more industry. There's always room for more growth. And Mentone residents need to patronize the businesses that are here if they expect to keep them here.

The Egg Festival, growing every year, not only raises funds, provides fun excitement, and an air of festivity for the populace, but also presents an opportunity for school clubs, church groups and our many other non-profit organizations to raise money for their projects.

their projects. Some benefactors of the chamber's money raising efforts in recent years have been: Mentone Firemen, EMT's, Bell Museum and Mentzer Park. The proceeds of the fair stand for the past two years bought \$7000 worth of Christmas decorations for Main Street. Since the Kiwanis disbanded, the chamber has assumed their project of buying hams for Helping Hands to distribute to the needy at Christmas and Easter. Each fall the chamber sponsors the Halloween celebration at the shcool, the Christmas open house and Santa Claus downtown. Later we sponsor, the Mentone-Burket Basketball Game. 
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

"I think it would be a little premature to list things I'd like to change. I want to give everything an opportunity to work," says Tippecanoe Valley's new high school principal Charles Mills. "Things were working here before I came, and although I may have some slightly different views on some subjects, I don't want to fix things that aren't broken. Tippecanoe Valley has about 200 more students and some additional programs than Central Noble and I'm looking forward to the challenges!" Although he has only been with the Valley school system a few weeks, Charlie Mills is not really new to this area. He was

raised on a farm near Roam, only about 18 miles from the high school, and his mother, Lucille Mills, still lives there. He attended school in Roann through 11th grade and then graduated, in 1963, from the consolidated Northfield High School.

After graduating from Huntington College in 1967, Mills began teaching summer school biology at Central Noble, near Albion, and remained with that school corporation for 24 years. During that time he taught U.S. History, sociology and other social studies courses including his favorites, government and economics economics.

In 1972, he became curriculum director in addition to his teaching duties, and about ten years ago was named assistant principal. In 1988, Mills was promoted to principal, but since a new assistant principal was not named, he continued those duties as well as teaching two government classes.

Even though this is the first change in school systems Mills has had in his education career, he has no regrets about leaving

has had in his education career, he has no regrets about leaving Central Noble. "I learned a great deal and the corporation was very good to me," he says. "I still have many friends there, but I felt the time had come for me to make a professional move." Mills and his wife, Sharon, who is a pre-school teacher, have been married 25 years. They have three children. Their 23 year old son, Jeff, recently graduated from Ball State and is now an insurance adjuster in Evansville. 

I expect to be involved and active as far as going to the extracurricular activities as much as possible. I'm very much in touch with the community and people.

people. In Albion, Mills was an active member of Toastmasters International, working his way up to Competent Toastmaster, and was very involved with the Junior Achievement organization. In 1988, he won a Foellinger Foundation Award and a fellowship to Colorado Springs for excellence in economic

education associated with Jr. Achievement. "I'm really very proud of that!" he says. "I really appreciate that I was selected from a very large number of economic teachers in Northern Indiana for this award."

Indiana for this award." Mills and his family also attend the Marion Christian Chapel. When he's able to find the spare time, Mills enjoys fishing and he keeps a couple of bee hives. "I'm an outdoor oriented person," he explains. Traveling is another pastime he enjoys, especially in the eastern and southern parts of the U.S. Summing up his philosophy on education, Mills says, "I believe the learning process is a life long activity. I feel we are all students to some degree throughout life and teachers especially should model this philosophy. This thought leads me to the following two personal beliefs: As good as we are, we can always be better. Programs do not improve until people improve." improve

Mills feels an administrator must serve as a role model. "My goals as a high school principal are to maintain a strong curriculum and teaching staff with high expectations. I want to

work with people. I don't want to be 'the boss' although I know I have to do that sometimes. I believe a good administrator must be competent, cooperative, in control, exhibit good communication skills and be caring," he says adding, "I try!" I know the concerns of small communities when they feel a loss of identity. I haven't really been here long enough to hear all the pros and cons of the local situation," Mills says cautiously. But he does feel that in general there are certain advantages to a single middle school. At the high school level, there are so many social activities. Certainly, if the students can be brought together before reaching that degree, it will be a more cohesive group (as ninth graders) than it would be otherwise. I think it makes a more efficient operation. I really feel with the proximity of the communities (Akron and Mentone) and the fact that the

communities (Akron and Mentone) and the fact that the elementary schools will always be maintained there, I really don't feel they will lose their identity." Mills approves of Valley's new policy of administering random drug tests to athletes. "Athletes and people involved in other extracurricular activities serve as representatives of the school. Sports are a privilege, not a requirement." He also added. "I wouldn't even have a problem with the staff and administration be involved with the testing, as far as that's concerned." concerned.

In order to help their children become better students Mills encourages parents to "take time to communicate with their kids. Ask questions and show an interest. Kids will show an interest in things if their parents are interested. But it has to start at an

Mills is very pleased with the warm welcome he has received Mills is very pleased with the community. "People and is looking forward to working with the community. "People have been very friendly!" he says. "I feel like we're oft to a very good start!"

Who's Who in Mentone

Frank and Mildred, "Mid," Meredith, retired farmers, have many happy memories of the years

Frank and Mildred, Mild. Metediati, terreduct families, nave their own dance band. Frank, who was born on the Merediath farm, three miles southwest of Mentone, started playing the trumpet at age six. "My mother played the piano and taught music," he says. "She started teaching me and I took up the trumpet really quick." "I was always in the school orchestra at Talma," Frank remembers. "They always had good

"I was always in the school orchestra at latina, "Frank femenhoets. They always had good orchestras at Talma in those days." Frank's first teacher, after his mother, was Harry Broshur, of Summit Chapel. "He led a community band in Mentone many years ago. I played in his band two years." Other jobs followed. When he was sixteen, Frank applied to Charlie Beigh for his Argos Band. Charlie invited him to rehearsal and after hearing him play, immediately hired him. Then Kenny Bernard of Argos formed a dance band with Frank on trumpet. From there, Frank went to Trib Biddinger's band. "I started out playing for \$3.00 a night," he remembers. "When I

went to Trib Biddinger's band. "I started out playing for \$3.00 a night," he remembers. "When I got up to \$10.00, I thought I was rich." Mildred, a native of Akron, started playing at three years of age. Since her family owned no piano, she would set her music book on the back of a chair and "play" on the chair seat. The neighbors made fun of her, but her mother solved that by simply moving her chair where they couldn't see her. The trustee came to her rescue. When he would hear the jingling bells on her tricycle as she started downtown to see her father at work (which she wasn't supposed to do) he would take her to his home to play his piano. Before she started to school, Mid's grandparents bought a player piano and she picked up music from that. Finally, when she was nine, her parents got a piano. After that she had a few lessons, but, "I don't think they did much good. I never could read music as fast as I played it." Mid played piano and organ for the Methodist Church for seven years. Following graduation from Akron High School, Mid studied music two and a half years at Manchester College. "But then the Depression hit and many public schools eliminated their music teachers, so I left college."

Mid didn't leave music though. She gave piano lessons to as many as 25 students and she formed her own six-piece band. She has two saxes, one trumpet player, one drummer and a singer, with herself on piano or organ.

A friend arranged a blind date for Frank and Mid, and "it came to marriage from that" in 1934. Although, as a married couple, they were busy farmers on Frank's childhood farm home, for three

Although, as a married couple, they were busy farmers on Frank's childhood faith finite, for three years they continued playing in separate bands. But, that "got to be too hectic." So, together, they joined Tiny Williams' Band of Wabash. One of the area's most popular band leaders, they recall Tiny, who stood 6'11" and weighed 595 pounds, as a comedian as well as a musician. One night, in the LaFontaine Hotel, someone bet him a dollar he couldn't jump up and kick out an overhead lightbulb. "He won the bet," they laugh. Frank and Mid played with Tiny Williams' band eight years, until his tragic death. Then, having discovered son Jim, 12 years old, was a natural drummer, they formed "Jimmy Meredith and His Band," a group that would continue playing all over Indiana for 39 years. "We imitated the big bands," says Frank. "And we saw them all." Jan Garber, Henry Busse, Clyde McCoy, Glenn Miller, Wayne King, Fletcher Henderson, Duke Ellington and Cab Calloway were just.

Were just a few of their mentor bands. "Hot Lips" and "Sugar Blues" were two of the songs they remember. Mid says, "'Stardust' was always my favorite." But for the most part, they don't recall the titles. "We just played the songs," Frank says. "I don't know now how we did it. It just came naturally." It was a real triumph of spirit when daughter Mitzi, who suffered polio at age six, joined the band as a dancer. She and partner, Brook Black (Brook on roller skates) augmented the music with the treate floor show: a dancing floor show

One evening, playing at an Akron Junior-Senior Reception, son Jim met Akron senior Orabelle and the rest, as they say, is history. "After a break we couldn't find Jim," Mid laughs. "He was off in a corner with Orabelle." About a year later they were married and Orabelle joined the band permanently as a singer.

One exciting night the Meredith's remember occurred in North Webster. Someone rushed into the hall shouting there had been a murder. A woman's body had been discovered across the street

the hall shouting there had been a murder. A woman's body had been discovered across the street from where they were playing. "We never had nay trouble getting bookings," Frank remembers. "We could always go back and play again. Everything always went smoothly. We never had a dime's worth of trouble." As time went on, the Merediths didn't care for the changing trends in popular music. "And we were getting old," Frank says. "It was getting harder to carry the organ up and down stairs." So, booked full for two years ahead, they decided, after fulfilling those commitments, they would quit. "I was very sad about quitting," Mid remembers. That was fourteen years ago. Since then, Frank no longer plays at all, but Mid says, "I still play here at home. Mitzi had retired from dancing before her marriage and Jim and Orabelle didn't care to continue the band without his parents. So, one of the area's most popular dance bands ever became a part of local history. Today, Frank and Mid reside on Franklin Street in Mentone, in the same stately brick house his parents retired to when he took over the farm. Jim and Orabelle took over the farmily farm, and daughter, Mitzi Savage, lives in Rochester. They have five grandchildren. Only one of their younger generation, Mitzi's daughter, Lisa McMillan, has followed in their footsteps. Lisa, an excellent singer, is a music teacher in the Rochester schools. Frank and Mid are concerned for the future of Mentone, and have high hopes for the success of the new town board members, yet to be elected.



jobs." At 32, Jerry is now president of Tinkey Oil, a wholesale distributor, and owner of the J.D.P. Corporation, which has convenience stores in Leesburg, South Whitley, Warsaw, Akron and plans to open two more. He employs a total of 45 people. In addition, Jerry is a wholesale distributor for carburetion equipment that converts vehicles to propane. He ships this enument to seven states.

Open 24 hours a day, the Akron Mini Mart offers a large selection of grocery, dairy and household items and features a hot and cold deli with baked goods and a homemade special each day. All the food is prepared in a full kitchen located in the downstairs portion of the building. "We have a good lunch crowd," Jerry says. "Our fish and chicken have been very crowd," Jerry says. "Our fish and chicken have been very popular." The delicious, fresh, homemade cinnamon rolls have also gone over very well with the breakfast crowd. Six bright, clean, modern booths are available for those who wish to dine in the mini-mart and all foods can be packaged for carry-out. The

store also offers catering to the local factories. On Sundays the mini mart serves a "more-than-you-can-eat" breakfast buffet, complete with French toast, scrambled eggs and biscuits and gravy. Within the next couple weeks they will

"Of all my stores, I have the least problems with this one L have a great group working for me here. Especially the one. I have a great group working for me here. Especially the young kids, they are very responsible. Akron seems to be a very close community. The people all know each other and they work together very well.

Since taking over the business on May 13, 1991, Jerry has been trying to become a part of the community. "I'm not one to come into a community and take away," he says. "I also want to give back. I do my banking locally and I frequent the other businesses in town. Hopefully, we can help stir business in Akron, not take away. If another merchant has a strong business in a certain area, say pizza, I'll shy away from that. I want to get along with everyone," he adds.

After living in Wisconsin for several years, Jerry is enjoying After fiving in wisconsin for sector for both years of a physical being back in Indiana. The only thing he regrets is not getting to spend as much time with his children as he would like. His nine year old daughter and seven year old son still live in Wisconsin, but visit Jerry frequently at his home near Pike Lake in the Warsaw area. During this four-week period, the rats are fed identical nutritionally balanced diets with the exception of the control rat receiving milk and the experimental rat receiving a sweetened beverage. Each week the rats are weighed and measured, allowing



The Tippecanoe Valley FFA Organization has recently been involved in area Soils Judging Contests. Members on the team are Jennifer Lukens, daughter of Lincoln and Cathie Lukens; Josh Parker, son of Lynn and Diana Parker; Ryan Ladson, son of Dale and Lois Ladson; Mike Jones, son of Glen and Chris Jones; Charmae Vogel, daughter of Ned and Charlene Vogel; and Jamie Wallace, son of Jim and Linda Keirn.

Soils Judging is the individual evaluation of soil according to "agricultural sites", those used for crop production and "homesites", those used to build homes on. In each category the teenagers determine the slope of the soil, the landform, flood hazard possibilities, colors of the soil, texture of the topsoil and subsoil, and the depth of limiting layers. Then the two different categories break down into further details. The agriculture sites then evaluate tillage systems, whether the area can be used as "prime farm ground", water management practices, chemical "prime farm ground", water management practices, chemical and fertility practices, forage management, and forest management. The homesite considers the overall sewer and septic systems, general site improvements, foundation improvements, and septic absorption practices. For the Tri-County contest held on September 17, the TV team placed 7th of the 13 teams that participated from Kosciusko County alone. 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
