

summer season draws to a close, the Indiana State Police Department encourages motorists who are planning at trip during the Labor Day travel period to allow plenty of time due to the high volume of vehicles and possible construction projects which might cause a delay. State Police will take part in many traffic safety programs

during this travel time. Roadblocks wil Roadblocks will be conducted throughout the state with the Sellersburg District taking part in a total District project which means every

officer from the District will make a special effort towards removing drunk drivers from the roadways. Other projects which will occur during Labor Day travel will be: Operation C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort); D.U.I.E.P. (Driving Under the Influence Enforcement Project); Operation Buckle Down; and, Project 55 (Marion County only). 

Gene Hughes Family Man - EMT Factory Worker - Athletic Trainer

Serving as a volunteer trainer for the Tippecanoe Valley High School athletics program has been a unique experience for Gene Hughes. He became involved when his sons played football in junior high, taking care of injuries and keeping stats during the games. Eight years ago, he was asked to join the high school program. Coach Phillips used to say he was the leading groundgainer for the year.

Hughes began training as an EMT in 1974 and became Mentone's first certified EMT in January of 1976. He said at first when he was asked to tape the boys up and send them back out on the field, he wouldn't do it. It went against everything he had been taught. EMT's tape people to immobilize them until further treatment is available.

However, after working with Dr. Krizmanich, Physical Therapist Tom Johnson, and the Indiana Athletic Trainers Association, he learned when it is ok to tape them and let them play and the proper methods to use.

Hughes works with the football, wrestling, and basketball programs as well as the conference track meets and the girls sectional meets. Last year, he covered four games a week but has limited it to three this year.

with the EMS, taking a little time out for my family, and covering the games, there's just not enough time to do all I would like to do," said Hughes.

Working closely with the players over the years, Hughes has learned to know their pain tolerance, to know which ones make a big deal over minor scrapes and when to listen to a player who says he is hurt. He said the most rewarding aspect is knowing that the players trust him.

"They really listen to me. And so do the coaches," said Hughes. "If I say a player can't go back out, the coaches don't send him out, even when it puts the game in jeopardy. Sometimes the hardest ones to deal with in that case are the players. They are disappointed at being pulled out of a game and they grumble a bit, but they have learned to trust my judgment."

Hughes said the most serious injuries usually happen in football. Wrestlers and basketball players get banged around a lot but their injuries aren't usually serious, however, there are exceptions.

Two years ago, Hughes faced a difficult case when a wrestler from Tippecanoe Valley broke his neck during a tournament at Rochester. The boy was scared and screaming but Hughes was able to convince him to remain still until he could apply traction. A neurosurgeon on the case later commended Hughes for his actions, saying if the boy had been allowed to move his arm, he could have ended up a quadriplegic or worse.

"Sometimes I make a wrong call," said Hughes, "but it is almost always on the side of caution. I have sent kids to the hospital thinking they may have a broken bone and it turned out they didn't. But, I play it safe for their sake. If I don't think they can safely re-enter the game, I don't let them play."

Gene and Bea Hughes have been married for 27 years and have 4 children. Their oldest son Joe, 26, lives near Claypool with his wife, Angie. Mark, 25, lives with his wife, Shawnee, and their two year old son Derek in Mentone. Daughter Teresa, 24, lives at home and Rebecca, 21, is a senior at Indiana University.

For their 25th wedding anniversary, Hughes received a 1965 Mustang.

"When Bea and I were first married, we had a '64 1/2 Mustang coupe," he recalls. "As our family grew, we had to sell it. She says this one's mine; I say it's ours. Everyone should get

a 25 year old car for their 25th anniversary.'

Hughes, a computer operator, has worked at Donnelley for 28 years. He is on call for the EMS about 60 hours every three weeks. In his spare time, he enjoys golfing; playing the piano, something he has done since he was six years old; watching sports, listening to music, reading, and swimming

"We have a pool in our back yard," said Hughes, "But I haven't had time to use it much this summer. Both days that the weather was nice. I have gone."

Hughes said the thing he enjoys most is simply spending time with his wife and family.

Robinson's Racing Pigs at Plymouth Blueberry Festival

The most popular variety attraction at fairs and festivals in North America is Pig Racing. Robinson's Racing Pigs will be featured at this year's Marshall County Blueberry Festival in Plymouth at the Festival Grounds from September 5 through Sest. 7

Robinson's Racing Pigs is the oldest and largest operator of touring pig races operating out of their winter quarters in Hillsborough County, south of Plant City. No pun intended, but Robinson's race Picnic hams.

"The unique thing about pig racing is that it puts pigs in a different perspective," said owner Carlota Robinson. "People see pigs, in their minds eye lounging in a barnyard; little do they realize that a pig can do a 100 meter dash in eleven seconds while the fastest football player in the National Football League, Washington Redskins Comerback Darrell Green requires 10.08 seconds to cover the same distance and Olympic athlete Florence Griffith Joyner requires 10.49 seconds for a like sprint."

"Pigs are people animals, they love it when a crowd of people cheer them onto victory and they are extremely competitive. Horses need riders to guide them around the track, dogs need a mechanical rabbit, but pigs just need an Oreo cookie in their tray at the end of the 150 foot oval track." (The losers get crumbs, by the way).

Lt. Gov. and Commissioner of Agriculture Frank O'Bannon, at the Indiana soybean producers' exhibit at the State Fair Thursday, said that "the soybean crop could break the record this year." O'Bannon and Governor Evan Bayh were on hand to select the winners for the \$500 Grocery-Shopping Spree contest sponsored by the Indiana Soybean Development Council and the Indiana Soybean Growers Association.

"Hopefully," O'Bannon said, "there won't be an early frost. According to the people at Purdue, the crop is rated 70% good and 7% excellent. Last year at this time it was only 14% good and excellent combined."

In spite of the frost, wind, and hail, O'Bannon said that this

In spite of the frost, wind, and hail, O'Bannon said that this year's crop was likely to exceed last year's record crop.
O'Bannon went on to draw the winners' names from the contest asked entrants at some 78 Indiana County Fairs to name the only item in a display of 40 food items that did not contain soybeans or soybean products. Of the over 25,000 participants, more than 5000 guessed the right answer, which was the Gerber Turkey Vegetable baby food.
O'Bannon drew three winners' names. They were Thelma Sweany of Austin, Indiana; Margaret Miller of Freedom, Indiana; and Rex Gentis of Bluffton, Indiana.
Each winner will get to send \$500 on a greecey shopping.

Mentone needs EMT's

Gene Hughes, Mentone resident and president of the 4 Way Ambulance Emergency Service, said they are in desperate need of people willing to take the training and become certified as EMT's.

"My biggest fear is that we will have to close down the ambulance service," said Hughes. "Our workload is nearly impossible. We now have only nine certified EMT's trying to provide 24 hour coverage." provide 24 hour coverage.

The 4 Way Ambulance Emergency Service covers the towns of Mentone, Burket, Palestine, Atwood and Talma and the townships of Harrison, Franklin, Seward and Newcastle.

"With such a small staff, you get a lot of burn-out," said Hughes. "We are on call for 12 hours, five consecutive days every three weeks. We have had to omit having a regular crew on weekends and rely on the Multi-Township Emergency Santice for coversed during that time."

on weekends and rely on the Multi-Township Emergency Service for coverage during that time."

There are classes starting at Koscuisko Community Hospital in Warsaw on Saturday, Sept. 12 and at Woodlawn Hospital in Rochester on Tuesday, Sept. 8. For more information about these classes, contact Kay Church at KCH, Kim Higgins at Woodlawn, or call Gene Hughes in Mentone.

Hughes said the 4 Way Ambulance Emergency Service will pay for the classes. It takes approximately 8 months to complete

pay for the classes. It takes approximately 8 months to complete the classes and become a certified EMT.

"Many people don't sign up because they think they can't handle the negative aspects of the job. In reality, you are so busy just doing the job, that those things don't bother you so much at the time. The relief on peoples' faces when we pull up at the scene is so great that it makes the rest tolerable."

Hughes was the first certified EMT in Mentone. He took


in 1974 but couldn't take the certification exams until late 1975 and received his certification in January of 1976. At that time, 108 hours were required for certification, now it takes

130 to 140 hours and the requirements are more all the time.

By March of 1993, the service will upgrade the EMT-D level.

This level will allow them to use a defibulator, maintain IV's, and use an intubation type airway.

Hughes said they often stop between here and Warsaw now to hook up with the Multi-Township Emergency Service because

they are paramedics and can start IV's and perform other life-saving measures that EMT's aren't trained for. "We have a real good working relationship with those guys,"

said Hughes The service does not receive any tax dollars but relies on people paying their bills and donations. Hughes said donations

are always welcomed but the desperate need is for manpower. "We absolutely, positively have to have people...not in six months, but today!" said Hughes.

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

"What I like most about weaving rugs is taking things that would have been thrown away and turning them into something that is useful for a long time," says Fulton County resident

Martha Wagoner.

Martha's rugs are useful and they last a long time but the thing that attracts most of her customers is their beauty. Vibrant, multi-hued throw rugs evolve from old, tom strips of clothing under her experienced hands.

Martha began recycling old clothes into rugs, placemats, tote bags, runners, and clothes-pin bags before most people had

bags, runners, and clothes-pin bags before filost people had heard about recycling.

In 1948, Martha and her husband Claude moved to Talma, a small community in Fulton County, IN. During the winter Martha didn't have enough to do so Claude bought her a loom.

They paid \$10 for it and the instruction books and Martha taught

She has used different kinds of looms over the years but right now she prefers a two harness loom.

"I sold my four harness loom because it was a lot more work to thread and took a lot of time," she said. "The four harness looms have six pedals to push to keep your pattern and if you lose it, it is a lot harder to fix than on a two harness. They do

make a thicker, stiffer rug but they are just a lot more work."

Martha creates different patterns by changing the threads around when she sets up her warp. Using a different color thread on the loom can make two rugs look entirely different even though you used the same material for both.

"I would rather make rugs than placemats," said Martha. "I can make a 54" rug in the same time as it takes me to make four placemats but the placemats are more tedious to make. I used to make six to eight rugs a day but now I usually just make about four. I guess I'm slowing down a little bit."

Martha creates many of the patterns she uses herself by experimenting and gets others from books. She said some people

have trouble reading pattern books but she has always found it easy to do.

Martha has 25 to 30 regular customers, some dating back to 1975. She also gets a lot of new customers because someone has shown them one of her rugs. Most of her regulars bring sacks of material for her to turn into rugs. Many people bring old clothes to her just to get rid of them. These are used to make the rugs Martha sells to new customers.

Recently, a lady brought two grocery bags of socks. Out of these, Martha created five beautiful and colorful rugs.

Another customer told her she still has the placemats Martha made for her ten years ago. They are used regularly and washed every two weeks.

"I spend a lot of time alone at my loom but I enjoy it," said Martha. "I get acquainted with the nicest people by selling rugs so it balances out."

Martha also raises a garden every year as well as a half acre of sweet com to sell. She has her chickens to tend to and does her

sweet corn to sell. She has her chickens to tend to and does her own yard work. Since her husband Claude died five years ago, she doesn't raise cows but admits she misses it.

"All my married life, I got up at 5:00 in the morning to milk the cows. I still wake up at 5:00 and feel like I should be doing something," said Martha.

Martha will train others who want to learn to weave rugs if they ask. She has taught six or seven people and enjoys passing along her skills. She says the best way to learn weaving is "just do it".



Willis Bowen didn't intend to begin a second career when he bought a pair of chairs at an auction in the 1940's, but that's how it worked out. One of the chairs, an oak rocker, needed its now it worked out. One of the chairs, an oak rocker, needed its seat recaned. "So I ordered some cane and an instruction booklet and did it myself," the Akron resident says. At 88, the retired teacher and school principal is still caning. He estimates he has recaned over 250 chairs. "Last year, I did more chairs than ever," he says. "I caned 33 chairs in '91."

he says. "I caned 33 chairs in '91."

Bowen says it takes him four to five hours of steady work to weave each chair bottom. At the 25 cents per hole he charges, he says, "If I make \$1.50 or \$2 an hour, I'm doing pretty well. I'm sure not doing it to make a living. I like to do it. It helps pass the time, especially now that I'm alone." His wife, Mary, passed away two years ago. "And I think it keeps the arthritis in my fingers from getting any worse."

His projects have included footstools and large office chairs.

His projects have included footstools and large office chairs and he replaces woven rush seats as well as cane. He never uses prewoven cane, so if a chair has a bead and groove fitting, he will drill appropriate size holes around the opening and then weave a new seat. Each chair requires two sets of horizontal cane, two sets of vertical and one set diagonally from each corner. The cane splits are soaked in water to make them more pliable before they are woven. The cane comes in various widths and the size used is determined by the proportions of the chair. Bowen orders his rush and cane from New York.

'People often ask me how I get it woven so tight, but that's

not the problem. It tightens up as you weave in the strips because they must go over and under each other. It gets tighter all the time. The real trick is to start loose enough," he says.

Reflecting on his life, Bowen says, "In my time I've lived through a good many changes. A lot of them have been for the better, but some haven't. I remember the first automobile I ever saw and the first radio and T.V. Now my daughter thinks I ought

to get a computer. Raised on a farm southwest of Akron, Bowen still recalls the first airplane he ever saw. "I remember it so well. I went to school in a little one room school house, the Staten School, out west of town, about where Steve Hartzler's house is now. We heard a report that there was going to be an airplane going from someplace out east to Chicago, following the Erie Railroad. We didn't know just for sure when it was coming. I was eight or nine years old and I'd never even seen a picture of an airplane. I had no idea what the thing would look like. One day Wilbur Harter, who lived the first house east of the school house and always rode his bicycle home for lunch, came pedaling back just as fast as he could come and said his mother had just heard on the telephone that the airplane had just passed Huntington. So we all went and stood up on the hill and watched the plane fly over. I can still see that just as well as if it happened yesterday.

It looked like a big dragonfly to me."

After graduating from Akron High School, Bowen's first teaching job was at Talma. Then he taught high school at Akron for twelve years. During those years he completed his masters degree and obtained his principal's license. He then served as a received at schools in Howard Country for two years. principal at schools in Howard County for two years, Kewanna for four years, and Gilead for four years. After 25 years in the education field, he quit. "We moved to a farm north of town, and I decided I'd quit teaching and farm." But after two years, he applied for a teaching job at Rochester, where his wife was teach-

"I guess I was just like an old firehorse. I just got the feeling to go back to teaching," he says. He continued to teach math and physics for 15 years before retiring in 1968. However, he continued to substitute for another three or four vears.

Geometry was Mr. Bowen's favorite course to teach. "The longer I taught geometry, the better I liked it," he says. "When I took geometry in high school, though, if some-body would have told me I was going to be a geometry teacher, I'd have told them they were crazy," he laughs. "Even though its not too practical for a lot of people, it teaches them to think and rea-

Bowen frequently attends the Senior Citizens Breakfast, held every two weeks at the United Methodist Church. "Most of the 'older' people there are students of mine from the 30's," he says with amusement

Since suffering a broken hip two years ago, Bowen has had to give up fishing as a hobby, but he still enjoys gardening. He raises tomatoes, cabbage, green beans and other vegeta-bles behind his home near the park. He is also a big Chicago Cubs fan, seldom missing a game on radio or T.V.

A highlight of his retirement has been the vacation trip he has been the vacation trip he took last September with his daughter Jane, to visit her son in Arizona. "We toured the area for five days before going on to Prescott to visit my grandson. I really enjoyed seeing the Grand Canyon and Grand Canyon Can especially Hoover Dam. Of course, it was being built in the 30's when I was teaching physics at Akron. And to get out there and see it and ride the elevator down in the thing, I'll tell you that was really something. I also got to see Miss Kitty's Salon, where they filmed 'Gunsmoke'."

Bowen's other daughter, Sharon Miller, lives next door to him and checks in on him frequently. He says his health is still fairly good considering his age and laughs, "Well, I guess I'm optimistic, I traded for a new car last fall!"

Today, when so many young people are turning to the more lucrative jobs offered in industry, it is refreshing to find that

lucrative jobs offered in industry, it is refreshing to find that some of them believe farming is still the ideal life.

Rick Hurley is one of these people. Hurley, 22, a member of Tippecanoe Valley High School's Class of '88, has been employed by North Central Co-op in Burket for about a year as an applicator. Driving around to farms and spreading fertilizer on the fields keeps him working outside most of the time.

"One of the best things about my job or any kind of farming is getting to work outside," said Hurley. "I like it a lot better than being cooped up in a factory."

being cooped up in a factory."

Phil Runkle is the manager of the Burket branch of North
Central Co-op and employees five people. They sell seed, dry
and liquid fertilizer, and ammonia for side dressing fields.

During the winter, Hurley works on maintenance to keep the equipment in shape. A lot of work goes into getting ready for the season which usually begins about the end of April, depending on the weather.

To some people, farming isn't very exciting because you do

the same things day after day. You spend a lot of time working alone, but I like that part of it," said Hurley.

Things weren't dull on May 12 when Hurley arrived at work to find the elevator on fire. He helped move chemicals out of the burning building until the firemen stopped them because the fire was getting too close.

Next came a trip to the hospital for decontamination, an experience Hurley said he wouldn't like to repeat.

"The bad part was getting hosed down with ice cold water," said Hurley. "I didn't know what to expect when we went. They had to send our clothes off to a lab for testing. We just stood

around at the hospital for a long time."

Hurley said the day after the fire was business as usual at the elevator. They were hurt more on dry fertilizer than liquid and were kept busy hauling it from Roann. A construction team was hired to level the burnt building and haul off the debris. Rebuild-

ing is expected to start soon.

"I knew right after I got out of high school that I wanted to work in something farm related," said Hurley. "I think farming teaches you a lot more than working in a factory. Mechanics, chemicals, and the weather are a few of the most important than the started by exceptibility forming."

chemicals, and the weather are a few of the flost important things you have to learn about to be successful in farming. Hurley lives in Sevastopol and hopes to continue in farming and someday own a farm of his own. The knowledge he acquires working for others will help prepare him for that time. He enjoys hunting, shooting pool and playing his guitar in his spare time.

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

As a physical education teacher at Akron School, Mr. Ruppel decided students needed a way to stay physically fit and have fun at the same time.

In his program, each student starts with a grade of S+ and they maintain it as long as they participate, try, and do the best they can that day. If they receive at least 5 S+'s in a six week's period, they will receive an S+ on their report card.

Students have a chance to earn more than one + a day. They can do this by improving in an area or game, being chosen student of the day, improving on their time in the President's Physical Fitness, or passing in the 85% range of the President's Physical Fitness test.

Students lower their grade by breaking a school rule, not participating, not cooperating, or showning bad sportsmanship.

Before lowering the grade, Ruppel gives the student two warnings. On the third warning for the day, he lowers the grade from and S+ to an S. The fourth time a student must be corrected in class, their grade moves to an S- and they must sit out part of the class time. If it should come to a fifth warning, the student will receive a double S- for the day and sit out the next class. They will also have to write a report or sentences while receiving their grade of U for that next class.

For each minus earned, a student will nees to earn two pluses to earase it. For each U, they will need to earn four pluses

If a student can't participate because of absence, a note from the parents, a doctor's note, or a note from the office; they will receive a grade of S for the day. If they write a short report on a

sport or sporting activity, their grade will be moved up to an S+.

Sometimes, if they can do part of an activity or be a referee, umpire, or scorekeeper, they will also receive an S+ for the day. Awards will be given to a student of the six weeks in each

class section. A student may only receive this award once during the school year.

The class section earning the most S+'s on a percentage basis will receive a treat and/or a free choice P.E. day. The student in each section with the most S+'s at the end of the year will receive a special treat.

Students earning less than S for six weeks will not be allowed to participate with their class in the event their class wins in the 6 week award. These students will be required to write a report for that class period.

Raising veal calves is an operation that requires being in the barn at 3:15 in the morning seven days a week, says Jon Schaeffer. He spends about three to five hours in the morning and three or four hours in the afternoon mixing milk, feeding the calves, checking them individually with a clipboard and a chart

and medicating calves as necessary.

Jon was involved in FFA at DeKalb High School. After graduation, he attended the School of Agriculture at Purdue and received his Bachelor's degree in 1984. During high school and college he spent several summers working with his uncle on a dairy farm in Minnesota.

Shortly before his marriage to Sandy, Jon went into business raising veal calves with Sandy's father, Forst Dunnuck. He leased a building from Dunnuck and began buying baby calves from 80-100 lbs., feeding them on a liquid diet for 4 or 5 months and selling them to packers at a weight of 400-450 lbs. In April of 1992, Jon decided not to renew his lease.

"There comes a time when you feel like the risk is just too eat," he said. "The veal market has diminished quite a bit. I think the economy is the biggest factor. Veal is a luxury item and when people have to watch their money, they give up the luxuries. Expansion is another factor. A lot of people have put

up veal barns in the last ten years."

Jon said the animal rights issue has probably had an impact also, but he doesn't think that has affected the market as much as it might in the future.

ough he discontinued his own operation, Jon continues to work in Dunnuck's veal barns, doing essentially the same chores

as before.
"I don't do quite as much in the bams as I did," said Jon. "And of course, Forst also handles the paperwork now, too. The bookkeeping is a big part of it."

They operate two veal barns, each housing 424 head. Each calf is given individual attention every day. In the past, they employed more outside help but with the need to cut corners, Forst and Jon now handle most of the work themselves, using solve organical employees to fill in the case. only occasional employees to fill in the gaps.

The Schaeffers also have a 120 acre farm where they grow soybeans, com, wheat, alfalfa, and have 20 acres of pasture. Right now, they have 26 Holstein heifers and about a dozen Holstein steers, finishing for beef.

"It has always been my goal to have a farm," said Jon. "The good years we had in the veal business made that possible."

Jon does his own farm work with the exception of the

combining and spraying.

"It's a small enough farm, we can't justify the cost of

combines so we hire that out," he said.

Jon received his real estate license in May of 1992 and started working with ERA Friends & Associates. He hopes to work mainly with farm and rural properties in the lower Kosciusko

"I am enthusiastic about this area because I think it is a great place to live," said Jon.

Jon said there is a trend for farms to get larger all the time and the number of farms to diminish.

"I think that has been true in this country almost since it started. The farming lifestyle that people enjoyed fifty years ago doesn't exist anymore. But the farming life is still attractive to people. More and more, people are wanting to move to the rural areas and buy a few acres for their own enjoyment."

Jon's goal is to eventually become a farm appraiser. Sandy is an art teacher at Rochester Middle School and gives piano lessons after school. Though she grew up helping in the veal barns and was able to do all the chores involved, she said now her involvement in farming is limited because of her

"My main jobs here are feeding the cats and dogs, taking care of the garden and helping with the yard," she said.

Jon feels that education is essential for today's farmers.

"I think farming was quite a bit easier before but the old methods wouldn't work today. You have to evaluate costs and approach a crop or a livestock program with a plan instead of just winging it. You can really get into trouble that way."

Jon took a wide range of courses at Purdue in animal science, agronomy, and economics. He said the time in college also allowed him to grow up and approach farming with a more mature attitude.

"Whatever other goals we may have, they are all geared toward maintaining our farm," said Jon. "This is the kind of lifestyle we both want.
