The School Board of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation, Mentone, Indiana, will receive until 3:00 P.M. (CST) on April 20, 1964, in the office of the Superintendent at Mentone, Indiana, sealed bids for the renovation of the Akron High School at Akron, Indiana, at which time and place all bids will be publicly opened and read aloud.

Proposals will be received separately on the work as set out under the various contracts in the specifications. Combination bids will be accepted on all or any portion of the work, however, if a bid is not designated a combination bid, the Board will consider each bid separately.

Mr. Charles E. Burke, Manager of the South Bend Social Security office stated that this report is necessary if a beneficiary exceeded \$1200 in 1963 regardless of the fact that he earned the money before he applied and received his social security benefit. Failure to file a timely re-

port before April 15, 1964, may result in a penalty according to Mr. Burke.

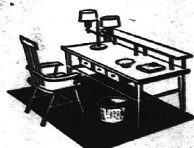

Split a piece of golden corn bread made with corn muffin mix into three layers. Then put thin ham slices between layers and top the triple-decker treat with peppery whipped mustard sauce. Serve with spring's fresh asparagus.

HAM TRIPLE-DECKERS

Makes 8 servings

Corn Bread:
One 12-oz. pkg. (2 cups) Flako Corn Muffin Mix
1 egg
2/3 cup milk
Mustard Sauce:
3 egg yolks
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon water
3 tablespoons white vinegar

2 tablespoons prepared mustard
1/2 teaspoon onion salt
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup whipping cream, whipped
16 very thin cooked ham slices
Melted butter or margarine

Heat oven to hot (400°F.). Prepare mix according to package directions using egg and milk. Bake as corn bread in 8-inch square pan.

While corn bread is baking, prepare sauce. For sauce, beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar, water, vinegar, mustard, onion salt and garlic salt. Cook in top of double boiler over hot water until thick. Remove from heat; stir in butter. When mixture cools, fold in whipped cream.

To assemble sandwiches, cut corn bread into 8 pieces. Split each piece horizontally to make 3 layers; place ham slices between layers. Fasten each sandwich together with a toothpick. Brush tops with melted butter. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in preheated oven (400°F.) about 6 minutes. Top with mustard sauce.

Testing Program For Tippecanoe Valley Schools

The purpose of all testing is to furnish accurate and dependable information about important characteristics of the school and its students. Specifically, tests are used to identify gifted and especially talented students, students in need of special educational assistance, to improve instruction and learning, to improve the curriculum and evaluate impartially the educational program.

Intelligence tests are used to measure educational potential rather than actual achievement. Intelligence test results are to be used as a measure of pupil learning potentiality in every situation in which a decision has to be made concerning the school career of the child. There will be four different tests administered to the students in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation to measure their academic potential.

The achievement tests are to be used to measure the specific outcome of instruction. The standard achievement test is a measure of achievement to fit the typical curriculum in the country as a whole and is not a measure of specific instruction in any one community. While the standard achievement battery does not take the place of locally made tests, it supplements them and provides a desirable basis for comparison of local performance with national norms.

In the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation, the testing program has been set up for the kindergarten through the twelfth grade. This was cooperatively done by the administrative office, elementary principals and guidance counselors.

In the Kindergarten, the Lee-Clark Reading Readiness Test will be given in late spring to determine the child's readiness to do first grade work. The Lorge-Thorndike Intelligence Test will be given during the second semester of the first grade. Metropolitan Achievement Test will be administered to students in grades two through six. Tests will be administered to measure important knowledge skills and understandings commonly accepted as desirable outcomes of the major branches of the elementary curriculum. In the fourth grade, the California Mental Maturity Test will be given as a second measure of academic ability.

The test administered to the junior high students will be the School and College Ability Test

(SCAT) and the Sequential Test of Educational Progress (STEP). The SCAT will be given to the seventh grade in the spring, and this test is the third measure of academic potential. The STEP will be given in the spring of the eighth grade and is a measure of educational growth in the areas of mathematics, science, social studies, reading, writing and listening.

By using the results of the aforementioned tests, it is hoped the students may be able to make a wise choice of high school curriculum.

In the fall of the freshman year the Differential Aptitude Test (DAT) will be administered to provide satisfactory information for academic placement, general intelligence and aptitude in the areas of verbal, numerical, abstract, space, mechanical, clerical and language skills.

In the sophomore year the advanced level of the STEP and SCAT will be administered as a further evidence of identifying those students who plan to continue their education. Also, during the sophomore year, students will be given the Kuder Vocational Preference Inventory to identify occupational interest fields. This should provide assistance for all students in selecting occupational areas.

During the second semester of the junior year the final mental ability test will be given, in the form of the Otis Mental Ability Test.

The previously mentioned tests will be administered to all pupils in each grade level without charge to students.

Opportunity will be given for college bound students to take the Preliminary Scholarship Qualifying Test in the junior year. In the senior year, those students who plan to attend college may take the Scholastic Aptitude Test and Achievement Tests of the College Entrance Examination Board or the test provided by the American College Testing program. These tests taken by college-bound students must be paid for by the student who is taking the test.

Most colleges now require all entering students to take either the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board or the test administered by the American College Testing program. All students planning to attend college should consult the college catalog of the college or university which they plan to attend to see which test or tests are required for admission to the college of their choice.

Attends Conference

Sunday, Mr. Raymond Cooper, Coopers Department Store attended a conference of the Men And Boys Apparel Club at the Marrott Hotel in Indianapolis. The conference is a market where manufacturers and representatives of men and boy's clothing companies display their merchandise.

During the breakfast hour a representative from Dupont talked on Men's Style Trends. He disclosed the results of a National Survey, that had been taken for the past year, on the likes and dislikes of college and business men in the ages of 18 through 34.

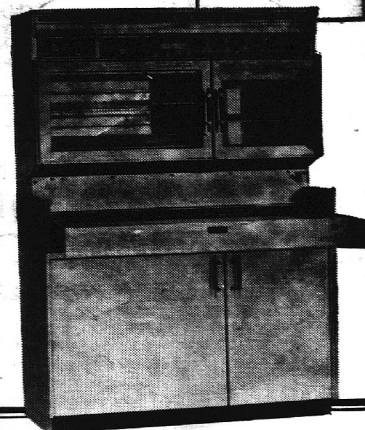

Notes From Your County Agent

Since 1862 it has been the policy of this nation of reporting all phases of agriculture production. The U. S. department of agriculture was organized during the administration of Abraham Lincoln and their first job was in developing a reporting system.

Since that time it has become highly a refined procedure and several times a year reports are made on crops and livestock production. By this method all the channels of agricultural trade can be ready.

The most recent publication lists the agricultural income in Indiana by counties. Kosciusko is rated in second place, Jasper County is first. We are not particularly pleased with these figures because we are in second place only because of the fact that Jasper receives about a million dollars more in governmental payments. Using agricultural production alone, Kosciusko ranks first.

The total income for the year 1962 is listed at \$26,669.00 in this county, mostly from livestock products. The livestock income is listed at 19 million dollars with the sale of corn, soybeans, wheat and other crops bringing in the balance. Elkhart County is second in livestock income at a little over 16 million.

The income from poultry products and hogs are the main sources here with percentages of 23 and 21 respectively. We are not satisfied with the poultry figures and have planned for the chief statistician to meet with some of the leaders of the poultry industry here to revise the reporting procedure. It is a difficult, rapidly changing figure and it is important to the egg buyers and processors.

The total agricultural income of Kosciusko County has been rising at the rate of about one million dollars a year for the past decade.

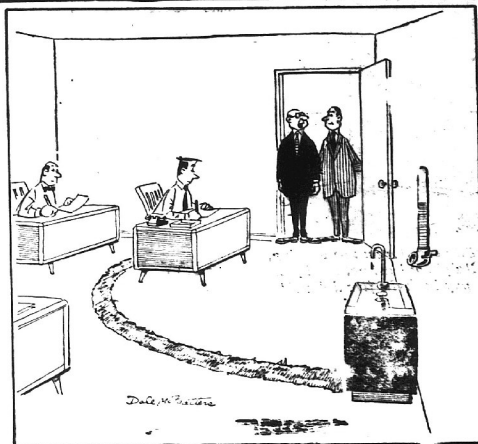

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Kitchen cabinet chaos? Believe you are a superman manager and code your shelves to make a place for everything. It first follows these three steps.

1. Clean the cabinets one by one. Take everything out and organize contents on a large table: soups, juices, fruits, vegetables, baby foods, bottled and canned beverages, spices and herbs and whatever other staples you like to keep on hand.

2. Meantime, while the cabinets are still empty, dust them thoroughly, then wash shelves with a cellulose sponge dampened with a pine oil cleaner and warm water. This treatment will clean, disinfect and deodorize all at once. Dry shelves with paper towels.

3. Line shelves with washable plastic shelf paper. The next step is the big one—coding your own galley for the shipshape look.

4. Code your shelves in either of two ways: Color-code by taping magic tape at the front of each shelf as you open the cabinet door.

For example, a swatch of red tape means soups on that section of the shelf, blue tape signals baby food. Another way of labeling shelves is to write the contents on transparent tape. Obviously, most-used foods should be on the easy-to-get-at shelves, inventory and unexpected company supplies can be stored in less accessible spaces if you're short of room. Be an optimist and encourage the family to put everything in its place.

Efficient arrangement of food supplies helps make writing the family shopping list an easier job, storage after shopping is organized for you and—if you train the family well—the "where-is-it?" questions will be kept at a minimum. Don't forget a pine oil cleaner—disinfectant when you make out that shopping list. From closet shelves to kitchen corners you can keep the shipshape look with a triple-duty pine oil product.

Appliances of stainless steel are durable, good travelers and easy to care for — soap or detergent and hot water, plus a stainless steel scouring sponge, if needed. When you're on the move you may often find yourself in a poorly equipped temporary kitchen which you can transform in a twinkling with versatile portable appliances.

3. Pack for a pretty table. Here, too, you can be convenient and beautiful at the same time. Good stainless steel flatware, now made in heirloom patterns, survives the mobile years — and the settled ones to follow. Pack it — and repack it, it will never tarnish, is easy to care for, and will look just as good if you want to pass it on to your daughter.

4. Pack for a slim pocket-book. The first years probably will be budget years. So take along a practical trousseau of linens, sheets and tablecloths you can launder yourself with the help of a communal or apartment house do-it-yourself laundry.

5. Pack for a purpose. You'll know in general what kind of a life you'll be leading at first — so pack for it. If your bridegroom is in the service and you can go with him, your life will be impromptu and informal. Take along serving dishes for one-dish meal parties. If your husband's on his way up the business-career ladder, entertaining — even on the move — may have to be a little more lavish. Certain items, however — like stainless steel serving dishes — are adaptable to either an informal supper or a candle-light dinner.

These are just five hints for the new bride who is packing up her household for the first time — and probably not the last.

Cherry desserts are one of the special treats enjoyed during the coming months. Perky in both flavor and color, cherries add a cheerful mealtime accent.

Favorite cherry cookies well suited to any occasion are Cherry Winks. These corn flake crumb-coated drop cookies include maraschino cherries, dates and nuts. Silvers of cherries also garnish the cookies brightly. Serve Cherry Winks with puddings or ice cream.

CHERRY WINKS

2 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup soft butter or margarine
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
1 cup chopped nutsmeats
1 cup finely cut, pitted dates
1/3 cup finely cut maraschino cherries
2 1/2 cups Corn Flakes or
2/3 cup packaged Corn Flake
Crumbs
12 maraschino cherries, cut in
quarters

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Blend butter and sugar; add eggs and beat well. Stir in milk and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients together with nutsmeats, dates and cut cherries; mix well. If using Corn Flakes, crush into fine crumbs. Shape dough into balls, using 1 level tablespoon dough for each. 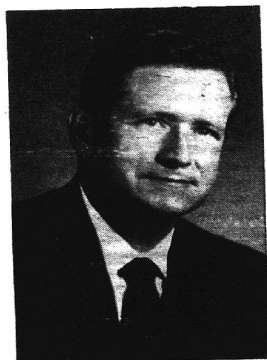

Rather than suggest an expensive gift beyond the child's means, you could suggest a gift especially made for you by your child, or family activities you especially enjoy with your children.

Mother might answer, "For Mother's Day, I would like a whole day of working and playing together—without arguments or unpleasant scenes. A day the whole family does kind and thoughtful things for each other."

This way of honoring mother emphasizes the true spirit of Mother's Day, expressing love in an affectionate mother-child relationship.

Gifts, as tokens of affection, need not be large or expensive, Mrs. Dolch feels. Mothers have a special appreciation of gifts crafted lovingly and laboriously by small hands. They also have high regard for frivolous gifts purchased from a small allowance. They are especially fond of gifts of labor, such as a day free of cooking meals, or a week free of ironing and dish washing. These

gifts often mean more than purchased gifts. Whatever the gift, or even without a gift, let the day be one of family sharing and affection, Mrs. Dolch emphasizes.

Brighten Up With Paint

Lafayette, Ind. Brighten your home's interior with a fresh coat of paint, recommends Ezelle Johnson, Purdue University home furnishings specialist.

Since walls are really a background for your furniture, she recommends selecting a wall color that is harmonious with your furnishings. You might choose the background color of a favorite picture of figured on your furniture.

Choose a color enjoyed by all members of the family for the living areas. Then let each individual us his favorite color in his bedroom.

A pale color on the wall increases the amount of light in the room. It also makes a small room look more spacious. Stronger colors may be used in larger rooms.

When selecting a color for your walls, remember that color in small areas looks lighter than the same color in large areas. Thus, the color on the sample chip will look darker on your walls.

The specialist cautions against using too many colors, especially in a small room. Too many

colors may give a cluttered appearance.

Sometimes you can see the same color throughout the living area to create a feeling of spaciousness. Change the accent colors to set off special furniture groupings.

Cleaning The Bathroom

Lafayette, Ind. Cleaning and sanitizing often go hand in hand, especially when safeguarding the health of the family.

But sometimes homemakers neglect sanitizing the bathroom the place where infections are frequently spread.

Designed for the cleanliness and health of the family, this room may present special cleaning problems.

Purdue University's new Extension Mimeo HE-450, "Cleaning the Bathroom," recommends several methods you might use for effective cleaning.

It discusses problems that range from built-up soap scum, water spots, iron stains to mildew. It offers methods of prevention and care.

The publication suggests special cleaners for tubs, lavatories, shower stalls and curtains, toilet bowls and floor surfaces—including two recipes for scouring powders that will not set iron stains nor damage porcelain.

No matter which bowl cleaner you use, do not mix a bowl cleaner with other chemicals, the

publication warns. Mixing acid and alkaline bowl cleaners and bleach produces poisonous gases.

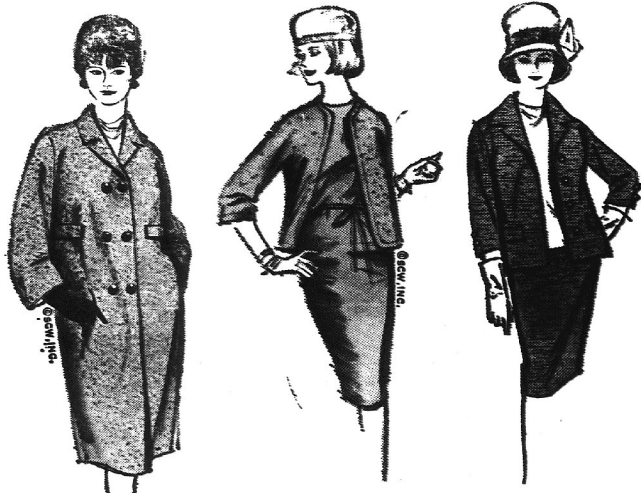

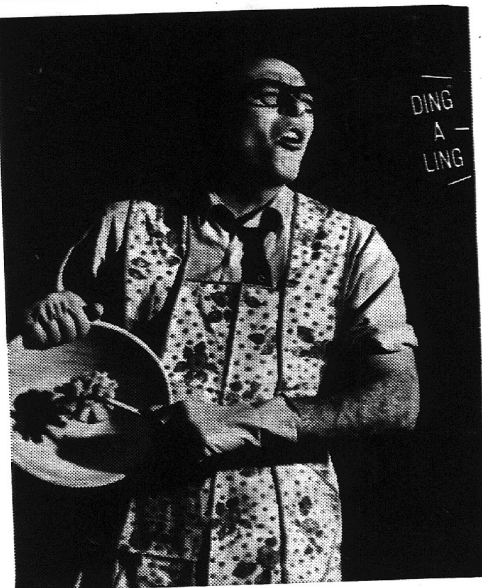

"Breakfast" Flake May Cut Feed Costs

Flaked whole-grain rations which look very much like breakfast cereal appear a good bet to shave cattle feeding costs.

Three things now make flaked feed a real possibility for both farm and ranch feeders, according to Farm Journal magazine:

1. More efficient gains. In Colorado State tests, cattle on a ration of steamed and flaked grains needed 5% to 10% less feed to produce a pound of gain than did cattle fed a cracked grain ration.

2. Custom steam-flaking. More local elevators are adding equipment to make the steam-flaked ration.

3. Smaller feedlot units. Several manufacturers are coming out with smaller units that are practical for individual cattle feeders.

In the Colorado State tests it took about 2 lbs. less grain per day for cattle on flaked rations.

The Colorado State tests also indicated it was the flaking—not the cooking—that increased feed efficiency.

New Swill Swigger System Feeds Porkers

Development of an automated, liquid feeding system for hogs has jazzed up old-fashioned swill feeding. Farmers who are using it say it enables them to produce animals with better carcass quality in less space. Also that it increases feed efficiency while almost eliminating waste.

The system consists of a specially engineered blender, gasoline-type rubber hoses, and slotted metal feeders. The blender is a vat in which electrically powered paddles are rotated to mix the feed with water. The mixture is then pumped through the hoses and dispensed in much the same way gasoline is put into your automobile.

New Forage Crops Give Big Yields

A whole new generation of forage crops promises to do for grasses and legumes what hybrid seed has done for corn, Farm Journal magazine reports.

Some of these new introductions are hybrids; others are carefully controlled crosses. All are heavy yielders. They respond well to fertilization; come back rapidly after cutting to make three or more crops a season, and they make excellent green-chop, hay, haylage and silage.

Hybrid grain sorghum was introduced in the late 1940's. Later came hybrid Sudan grass. Hybrid alfalfa seed soon will be available.

The new hybrid forages will give a potent new thrust to Farmstead Feeding—the trend toward confining livestock at the farmstead the year around, rather than turning them out to graze. The new forages simply produce more feed than the grazing animals can harvest efficiently.

The dual-purpose feeders are built to provide the individual feed slots (for up to 30 animals, 15 to a side) and to serve as pen dividers. The feeder and trough are metal; the feeder is galvanized and the trough is porcelainized enamel. The amount of feed pumped into the trough is regulated by the length of time allotted to each delivery. Every hog has an equal chance to consume his fair share.

The system requires more labor than automated dry feeding set-up, but some say the added attention to the hogs is beneficial in the long run.

Costs of installation runs higher per square foot than that of an automated dry feeding system, but costs per pig end up about the same—\$35 per pig for a complete installation, or about \$17.50 for a conversion unit.

The Farm Quarterly (Spring issue) says that one university swine research specialist, while agreeing that the feed saving afforded by liquid feeding is a definite factor in its favor at the same time has his reservations as to some of the other claims made on behalf of the system.

Backers of the system say lack of objective research is hurting liquid feeding. One feeder, well experienced with the system, says liquid feeding helps cut stomach ulcers, bloody scours and feed waste.

Every hog man with an opinion on the advantages versus the disadvantages of the automated liquid feeding system seems to have his own proof. The magazine reports their findings for interested hog raisers to mull over for consideration.

CONTROL OF BLEEDING

WHEN a person is bleeding very badly, people standing by instinctively feel compelled to "do something." Unfortunately too few people are familiar with what to do for a wounded person and the "something" they do may do the victim more harm than good.

The victim should not be moved from one place to another by an unskilled first aider.

The most serious type of bleeding is that from an artery. The blood flows from the wound in regular spurts and is bright red. Unless this type of bleeding is quickly stopped the victim will bleed to death.

Bleeding from a cut vein is also dangerous. In this type of injury the blood is darker in color than arterial blood and usually wells out of the wound in a steady flow.

In any case of severe bleeding the patient should be eased into an inert position, lying down, and pressure should be applied to certain veins and arteries.

If the person giving first aid is not familiar with these pressure points he should try to stop the bleeding by pressing a pad or cloth directly on the wound itself.

Tourniquets are often used to halt bleeding in arms or legs, but inexperience applied they can do further harm by crushing tissues and nerves and by cutting off the blood supply completely.

Direct pressure will often halt bleeding or at least minimize it until the arrival of a physician.

Plant Early Potatoes Now

Lafayette, Ind. Early potatoes should be planted by the end of April in central Indiana and earlier in southern areas, remind Purdue University extension horticulturist. Later varieties can be planted in May.

Cobbler is an excellent early variety, the horticulturists say. It has a white skin, deep eyes and matures in 90 days. Plant Katahdin for mid-season. It matures in 105 days, has white skin and shallow eyes. Kennebec is good for a late crop. Later crops are best for winter storage.

Deep, loose soils are best for potatoes, but avoid heavy clays, the horticulturists says. Add two to three pounds of general fertilizer such as 12-12-12 per square foot before you prepare the soil.

Use certified seed potatoes for best results. Cut them into one to two-ounce pieces the day before planting and make sure each piece has at least one good eye. Storing pieces in a tight container for 24 hours helps the cuts heal before planting. Half a peck of seed potatoes will plant a 100 foot row and should yield two to three bushels.

Place seed pieces eight to 10 inches apart in the row and space

rows 24 to 36 inches apart. Set potatoes in a trench four to six inches deep and gradually fill in with soil during the season.

After foliage appears, control weeds, diseases and insects and water as necessary.

Control Cutworm

Lafayette, Ind. Cutworms are among the earliest of spring pests, points out Glen Lehker, Purdue University extension entomologist.

They overwinter as partly grown worms and are ready to resume feeding with the coming of spring weather. Some cutworms sever plants at the ground level while others work entirely beneath the soil surface.

Among plants most susceptible to cutworm damage are newly set tomatoes, cabbage and peppers, young corn and flowers of many kinds.

Garden plots can be freed of cutworms as well as other soil pests by treating the soil with dieltrin before anything is planted. Scatter 1.5 pounds of five per cent dieltrin granules over each 1,000 square feet of plowed or shaded ground and work it into the top three or four inches of soil.

Plants growing on untreated soil can be protected by dusting both the young plants and the soil about them with five per cent DDT or by using one of the all-purpose garden sprays or dusts. Vegetables should not be treated with DDT after edible parts begin to form.

The old-time method of wrapping several thicknesses of paper around the stems of plants at the time they are set is still an effective prevention, Lehker says.

Wheat Program Clarified

USDA Officials today issued a clarifying statement concerning some provisions of the new 1964 Wheat Program. When the Certificate Program was announced some producers thought the provisions of price support were being changed after the crop was planted. The statement issued today is made to correct this misunderstanding.

Every wheat producer who was eligible for a price-support loan on his 1964 wheat crop before the passage of the new Legislation is still eligible for the new higher loan rate based on a National Average of \$1.30 per bushel — up from the approximately \$1.25 a bushel National Average before the new program was available.

The Details of clarification are:

1. Wheat produced on any farm on which the wheat acreage is within the farm allotment is eligible for a price-support loan or purchase. Eligibility of wheat for the price-support loan is determined on the basis of the wheat acreage on each individual farm and not on the basis of any other farms in which the producer has an interest.

2. Eligibility for marketing certificates and diversion payments based is on meeting the minimum conservation and diversion provisions of the program on the participating farm and keeping within the wheat allotment on all farms in which the producer has an interest. Marketing certificates will have a value of \$.70 a bushel for the part of the crop used for domestic food and \$.25 a bushel for the part for export. These certificate values are in addition to the price-support loan for those wheat producers who participate in the certificate part of the program.

Tippecanoe Valley Teachers Receive Training

Special training in methods of teaching home nursing is being conducted in the Warsaw Home Economics Department by Margery Wilcox, State Nursing Service Representative. This course is sponsored by the Kosciusko Red Cross Chapter and is especially designed for registered nurses, teachers, and others with comparable teaching ability.

Mrs. Opal Carpenter and Mrs. Virginia Leininger, home economics teachers at Mentone and Akron, are participating and receiving this instruction. Home nursing instruction offers people the opportunity to learn how to make the best use of time, energy and material, how to carry out the doctors orders when caring for the sick at home, how to comply with public health regulations, and how to apply what they have learned in an emergency situation. The course includes those procedures thought to be most frequently needed when providing long-time care for an ill person in the home or when caring for the sick and injured in shelters or other emergency areas. It consists of eight 2-hour sessions.

She especially pointed out cleanliness to the fingernails, since so many

germs can be carried through dirt under fingernails. Mrs. Deere suggested that if the child was in need of booster or immunization shots to have them done now and not wait until the last minute before school. The eyes and ears of the child will be checked in the first grade but T.B. tests are now given in kindergarten. A high school student was given a T.B. test to show the mothers how it is done now. Several booklets were passed out on school and immunization shots. Then the children were brought down to the cafeteria and coffee, milk and cookies were enjoyed by all.

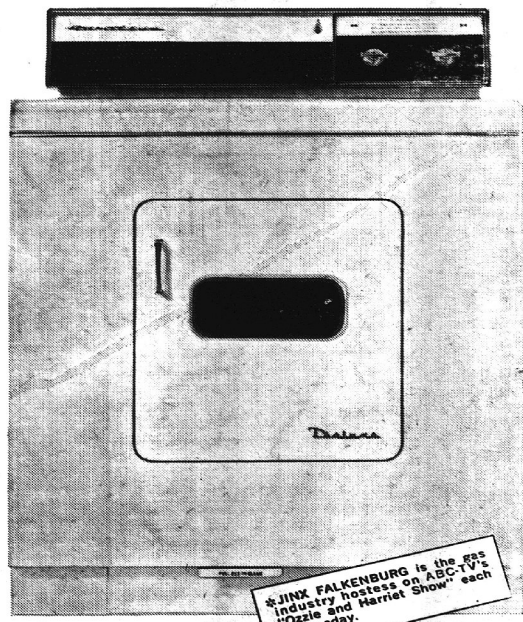

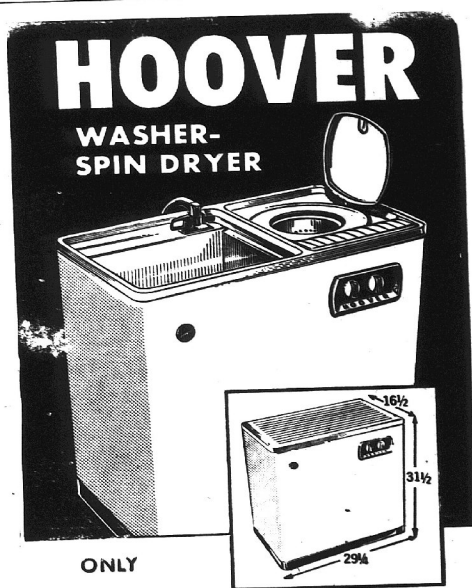

Production of eggs in Indiana under tight contract arrangement, which now involves about 10 to 12 percent of the state's laying hens, is expected to increase substantially in the next few years according to a report by Bob Williams, an economist at Purdue.

Independent poultrymen are in an increasing competitive disadvantage as integrated organizations gain more bargaining power. By purchasing supplies in large quantities and selling quality eggs in quantity the integrated organizations gain more bargaining power. Willingness to relinquish certain management decisions is difficult for the independent producer. Those who decide to make contract arrangements are primarily attracted for reasons of financing and stabilized income.

Bob also reports that a recent survey indicated 48 Indiana firms were offering contractual packages to 740 producers. Only six firms extended contracts for 50,000 layers or more, but these firms accounted for 68 per cent of all layers under contract. Most firms were contracting less than 20,000 layers each.

The survey revealed that contracting firms felt an average of 43 per cent of all eggs produced in Indiana in 1966 would be produced under contract. This would mean roughly 4.7 million layers.

Essentially, the economist says a typical tight contract is likely to be characterized by these provisions:

Housing, labor, utilities and some type of egg holding facilities furnished by the producer.
Feed, pullets, medication and supervisory assistance provided by the contractor.

Payment to producer made on basis of number of eggs producer, with an added incentive for feeding efficiency and possibly some type of profit sharing arrangement.

Agreement for periodic visits to the layer operation by contractor.

The Old Mentzer Pond

This was written from the recollections of a very tough young kid, the kind that would almost pass out every Sunday morning when his mother would insist he wear shoes to Sunday School. The same mother insisting that he wash his feet every night before going to bed. For this purpose a strong home-made lye soap was used that found every cut and scratch.

Mentzer's Pond was located just across the north boundary fence which now encloses the school play ground. In times of high water the eastern end of the pond was on land now owned by Dean Nellans. A few dead elm trees still mark the eastern lim-

its. The west end extended to the street that leads to Nellans Dressing Plant.

The name Mentzer's Pond came from a Mr. William Mentzer who built a house near the pond on a lot which was a part of Bowman's Addition to the town of Mentone.

In good freezing weather the pond became the center of almost all the out-door social activities. After dark, large bon-fires were lighted, furnishing light and comfort to those who were cold, or wished to visit. This light flooded the ice, snow, and skaters with a deep red glow making a beautiful picture, (you guessed right, Johnny, there were no hot dogs in those days.)

Games were played on the ice,

especially hocky or shinney as we called it. A tin can being used for a puck and clubs were searched for in cut-over timber tracts, where stumps had sent up a second growth, these second growths always had a desirable crook on the stump end which was exactly what we were looking for in a good shinny club. High jumping on skates was practiced and worked at every opportunity our barrier being fence three rails high that crossed the pond at the east end. Certainly, we had casualties, but tough young kids never gave this angle a thought.

Mentzer's Pond contributed another product to our pleasure and rather often to our pain. This was the finest clumps of red willow shrubs, the stalks being bright red in color, long, pliant, and tough, making very efficient switches. What was exactly the use we made of them? The kids choose their opponents, keeping in mind age, height, and weight. Switches were cut of equal length, diameter, and suppleness. The rules of the game were very simple, gloves or mittens must be worn, no blow struck above the waist, the contest to continue until one or possibly both contestants had enough. This account no doubt sounds rather brutal and heathenish, but the kids went for it, and as true as I sit writing this I have seen three duels in progress at once.

The pond was useful for many other purposes, such as providing frog legs, which were roasted over a small fire and seasoned with salt which came from a Bull Durham or Duke's Mixture tobacco sack. Most every boy carried a supply of salt in this manner. Snakes and turtles were also, plentiful, supplying excitement and thrills.

All things must come to an end and Mentzer's Pond who no exception. Some one conceived the idea of ditching and draining the pond to make available more tillable from land. This was done and Mentzer's Pond went down a tile ditch.

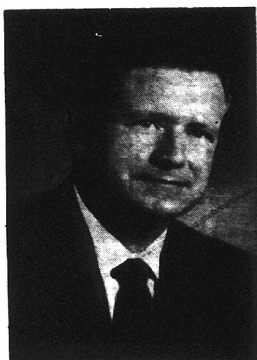
