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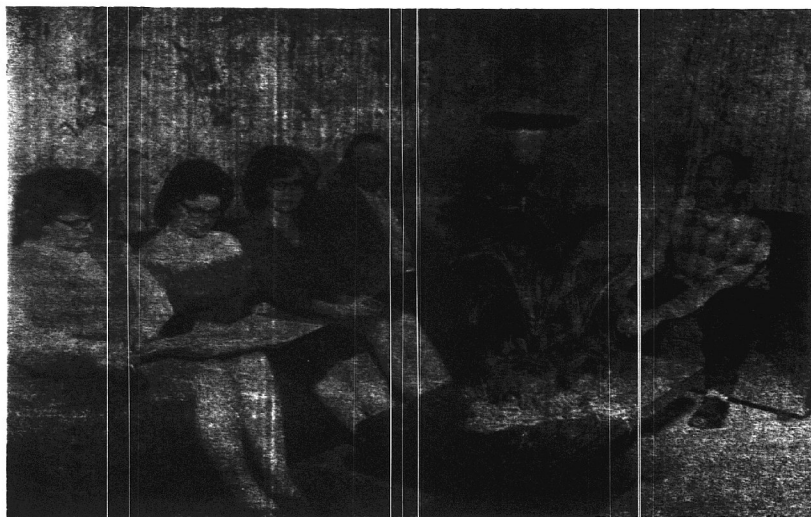

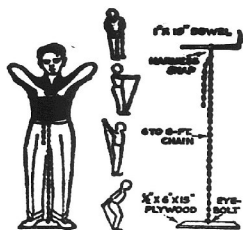
Secure Gate Latch

When a gate latch can't be adjusted due to excessive clearance, this chain latch will hold the gate shut securely. The chain goes around both post and gate frame. One end is anchored by a screw driven through a hole in the lower part of a 6-in. length of angle iron (1/4" by 1 1/2" size), or the end link may be welded to this. A link at the other end engages a slot in the top of the angle iron, the slot being slightly wider than the link thickness. The angle iron may be placed either on the outside of the post as shown or on the inside.



Isometric Exerciser

This simple exerciser is based on the principle of isometric connections—muscles of muscles against an immovable object. With it you can build up muscular strength without overdoing as each pose is maintained for only 2 seconds. A 6 to 8-ft. length of small size welded chain is attached to a foot-board. A handgrip is fitted with a harness strap for connection to links that provide different chain lengths. After determining which links are used they may be marked with plastic tape to facilitate making quick changes.



NEW CIVIL SERVICE APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE

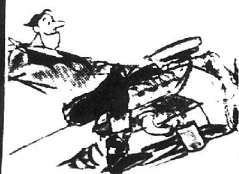

Tornadoes Rip State; Local Area Spared

Death dealing tornadoes ripped through a four state area including Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Ohio Sunday afternoon and evening leaving in their wake millions of dollars worth of damage and over 200 dead. Indiana suffered the heaviest list of fatalities with the count well over 150 and still rising as more bodies have been located.

The local area was spared from the ravages of the storm although relatives of local persons and a Newcastle township man, Paul Perkins, died as a result of the storms. A former teacher, George Green, was killed in his car near Kokomo.

Power shortages were felt locally with parts of Fulton county being without electricity until Monday morning. Power was restored at that time but was limited to emergency use by industries. Factories in Akron and Mentone as well as Rochester and other neighboring towns did not operate Monday

and Tuesday in an attempt at conserving the electrical power, that they had the lines for.

Local utilities have stressed that they had the lines for transmission of power but that they simply did not have enough power available due to feeder stations and lines being knocked out.

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Forbes Unhappy With Legislative Ruling

Robert Forbes, Superintendent of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation, this week took issue with laws which have been made by the past Indiana Legislature in announcing the salary schedule for the 1955-56 year.

So irritated at the legislature was Forbes that he even threatened to ignore one state resolution—a teacher's "rest period", saying the law lacked any provision for punishment if it is not followed. He stated further that he wants the legislature to take the blame for this actions and not the school board.

Forbes also described an exaggeration increased teachers' salaries except in the south and in bigger cities, personal and sick leave for teachers, and a new bus law which he says may result in eliminating some bus drivers presently employed. He concluded by saying that the full impact of the law will not be felt for several years.

Forbes and the board have announced salary schedule ranges from \$4,800 to \$8,000 for teachers with 20 years of experience and

holding three degrees.

Superintendent Forbes issued the following statement:

"The school board met with the salary committee of which Paul Rush was chairman, and the members present were Ernest Decrait, Dana Hartong, Billie Davis, Mrs. Dwight Bechtol and Philip Pratt. The salary schedule was considered to be reasonable in view of the salary schedule passed by the state."

Forbes said the top salary for a teacher with five years of training as adopted by the board will be \$8,000, whereas the state minimum salary schedule calls for \$3,600. However, it was explained that this could be done because the \$8,600 amount does not take effect until Jan. 1, 1966.

SMALL PAY RAISE

The superintendent reported that he had given a brief review on legislation to all teachers of the corporation as he had done with the school board. He reported that the extra support to be received by the school corporation has been greatly exaggerated and that although there would be a small increase in the income of teachers, the larger

part of the increases will go to southern Indiana and the larger cities.

NO KINDERGARTEN AID

The superintendent asserted that the corporation, because of its assessed valuation, would not receive any kindergarten aid under the new law and again this would go to southern Indiana and the big cities with less assessed valuation behind each child. He reported there would probably be a decrease in the tuition support of about \$4 inasmuch as the state has now run in the red \$17,500,000 and \$15,000,000 of this would be in tuition support and \$2,500,000 in transportation.

MORE EXPENSE

It was also reported that there would be considerable more expense to the corporation because of various laws that were passed by this legislature. Forbes said the law giving two days personal leave for each teacher that was passed by the legislature would cost the corporation more than \$4,000 for substitutes, and that no funds were provided by the legislature and it was really not anticipated at the time the corporation budget was made.

The superintendent also reported that the new law transferring sick leave from one corporation by the legislature would cost some money as would the increased salary schedule. He also anticipated that the recodification of the bus laws would cost extra money but did not estimate how much.

REST PERIOD

It was also reported to the school board that the legislature by unanimous vote had requested school boards to grant one hour at noon for rest, relaxation and reflection for teachers.

Forbes said that to do this would cause Tippecanoe Valley School Corp. to put 2,000 children on the bus a half-hour earlier in the mornings because the lunch period at the high schools now is one-half hour and the school day is as short as is legally possible.

"SILLY"

He stated that it would be necessary to hire teacher's aids to abide by the desire of the legislature and give the teachers this hour for rest, relaxation and reflection. The superintendent said that he had talked to many of the teachers and most of those that he contacted agreed that his was a rather silly thing for the legislature to do.

He continued inasmuch as there was no punishment in the resolution which the legislature passed, he felt that it would be unwise to make any effort at this time to abide by this resolution.

2,000 ON BUS

Forbes added even though the legislature threatened to make it a mandated law next year he would like for the legislature to take the blame for putting 2,000 youngsters on a bus a half-hour earlier instead of having the superintendent and the school board take the blame.

WHIPPING BOYS

Some comment was made with reference to the laws and rules, and regulations that were being made at Indianapolis which require expenditures without any funds forthcoming. The opinion was expressed that many times

or regulation with reference to schools and to the expenditures of any money they desire. The superintendent called this the most far reaching bill that had ever been passed by the legislature in his time and that the full impact of this law also will not be felt for several years.

Hoosier Tornadoes Have Violent History



Until the series of shattering tornadoes Sunday afternoon which left over one hundred persons dead and millions of dollars damage in its wake, a total of 208 Hoosiers had lost their lives in 20th century tor-

nades, according to a bulletin from the Purdue University Agricultural Information Department.

The most recent killer tornado prior to Sunday's, was near Beck's Mill in Washington coun-

ty on March 19, 1963 at which time two persons were killed. The tornado which ripped through Posey, Gibson and Pike counties on March 18, 1925 killed seventy persons, the most killed in any tornado until Sunday.

L. A. Schaal, Weather Bureau state climatologist at Purdue University, has conducted a study of frequency and effect of Tornadoes. He describes a tornado as a funnel cloud which touches the ground, leaving evidence that winds were rotating at a high velocity.

Schaal has found that the most severe tornadoes strike Indiana in March, as indicated by the higher incidence of fatalities. Spring brings the most frequent occurrence of tornadoes and only once has death been caused by a tornado in the last six months of the year. Two-thirds of all the tornadoes were first sighted between the hours of 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Counties with the highest number of tornadoes between 1916 and 1965 were Delaware, 17; Marion and Allen, 16; Gibson, 15; Posey and St. Joseph, 14; Lake, Porter, LaPorte, Elkhart and Boone, 13; Grant and Madison, 12; Vanderburg, Pike, Knox, Randolph, Tippecanoe and Marshall, 11; Huntington, Perke and Vigo, 10.

Indiana ranks 14th among the 50 states in the number of tornadoes, 11th in the number of days on which tornadoes occurred and 12th in the number of deaths caused by them.

Two counties, neighbors, Dearborn and Ohio, reported no tornadoes during the 49-year period.

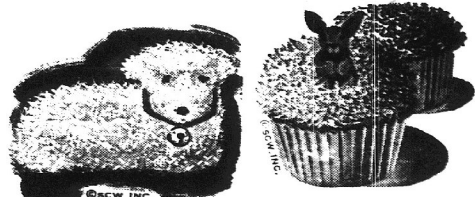

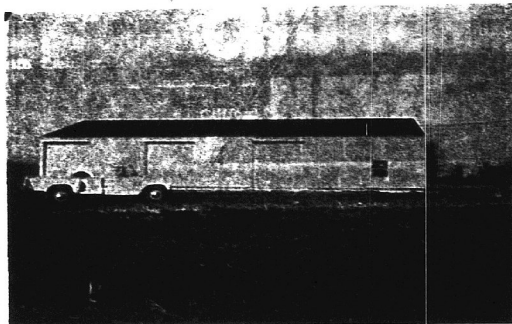

Pre-Enrollment, Orientation Planned

FIRST GRADE PRE-ENROLLMENT

Principals Oliver England at Burket and Gaylord Toll at Mentone have today announced the date of the first grade (1965-66) pre-enrollment for their respective schools. Both schools will hold their pre-enrollments on Thursday, April 29, with the Mentone area students assembling at 9:00 a.m. and the Burket area students meeting at 1:00 p.m.

A parent is asked to accompany each child. Another adult may accompany the child if it is not possible for a parent to attend. Parents are also asked to bring information in regard to the child's health such as childhood diseases, inoculations, etc. In addition the parent should bring a birth certificate for the child if the child has not been enrolled in kindergarten. Students must be six years of age on or before October 1, 1965, to enter grade one next year.

Kindergarten will not meet in either the Burket or the Mentone Schools on April 29.

Loans Available For Disaster Area

Merle H. Tiede, deputy director of the Federal Housing Administration in Indianapolis, Indiana, announced today that special terms will be offered to victims in the disaster area so declared by President Johnson on April 15, 1965. No down payment is required, Mr. Tiede said, of disaster victims seeking loans up to \$12,000 to replace homes lost or seriously damaged by tornadoes.

Under a special provision of the present National Housing Act, FHA mortgage insurance, is available, up to the \$12,000 ceiling with no down payment but subject, however, to the borrower's credit reputation. Such loans, made by banks or other lenders approved by FHA, may be repaid in equal monthly installments with repayment periods extending for as long as thirty years.

Mr. Tiede also pointed out that loans for repairs and renovation are also available to homeowners faced with the necessity of repairing disaster damage. These loans, in amounts as high as \$3,500 are repayable in equal monthly installments for a term as long as five years. The money is advanced by FHA approved banks and is insured by FHA.

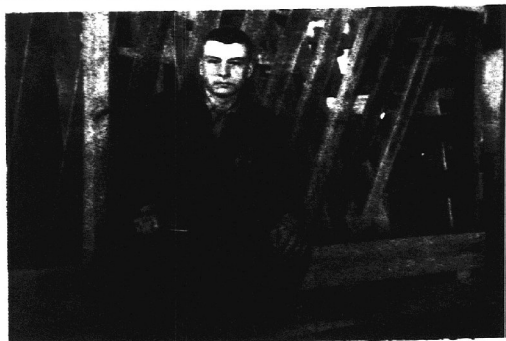

Mike is a freshman this year and is taking swine and soybeans for his vocational agriculture projects. He is also active in the local F.F.A. chapter activities.

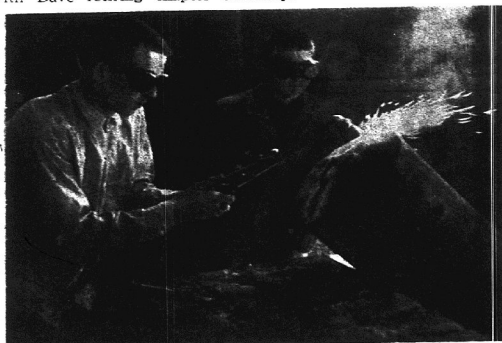

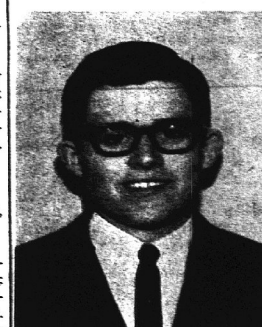

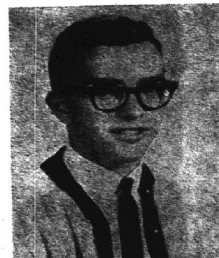

On April 20, 1955, Lawrence D. Bell, then president of Bell Aircraft Corporation, Buffalo, New York, was guest of honor at the dedication of the new Lawrence D. Bell Library in Mentone High School. The Bell Aircraft Corporation Foundation, of which Mr. Bell was also president, had donated \$5000.00 to Mentone School to build a new library. Also a four foot square oil portrait of Mr. Bell, painted by Anthony Sista, famous Buffalo artist, was presented to the library. Mr. Bell announced that a check would be sent annual for the use of the library. Unfortunately, Mr. Bell died of a heart attack on October 20, 1956.

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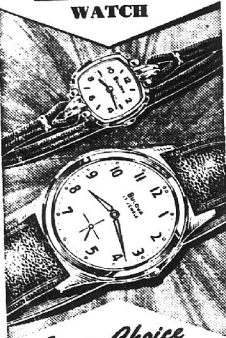
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Horn - Ryman Vows Spoken

Tillage Demonstration April 30

Lafayette, Ind. A day-long tillage demonstration showing five corn planting systems will be held Friday, April 30, at Pinney Purdue Farm, two miles west and one-half mile north of Wamata on the Porter-LaPorte county line road. Rain date is Monday, May 3.

Two strip tillers that eliminate plowing will be demonstrated. These machines use the rototiller principle or prepare a strip, using deep penetrating blades and discs or rolling coulters.

Other minimum tillage methods to be seen will be wheel track planting on plowed soil, use of a field cultivator attached between the tractor and planter to level plowed soil and use of a disc and harrow to prepare a normal seedbed.

Harry Galloway, Purdue University extension agronomist; Don Griffith, Pinney Purdue research leader, and representatives from six farm equipment companies will be on hand to answer questions.

A second field day at Pinney

Purdue will be held July 1, enabling persons to observe progress of the demonstrations through the growing season and a harvest field day will be held early in October to evaluate results.

F.F.A. Members Receive Corn Growing Awards

A. A. Pylant and four F.F.A. members will attend a DeKalb corn awards banquet in North Manchester on May 4, 1965. This banquet is to honor vo-ag students with De Kalb corn projects who have made the best record on a corn growing analysis sheet supplied by DeKalb. The F. F. A. members to attend are Edward Antonides, Dave Kuhn, Herb Haist, and Tony Peters. Besides these boys, one other completed the project.

In contrast to most corn contests which are based on yield checked on a spot basis, the DeKalb project emphasizes costs, fertilizing population and recognition of corn enemies. The yield is computed, but project recognition is not based on top yields, but yield calculation is factor in the top score.

Top student from Mentone on total score was Ed Antonides with a score of 98. He will receive a special wall plaque. Other boys will receive pins and certificates for adequate records.

According to Mr. Pylant, local Vo-Ag Instructor, each Vocational Agriculture student plants a variety of DeKalb corn. He then compares it to another hybrid by keeping records of all field operations and costs.

The DeKalb corn project includes over 1,000 schools in the top corn growing states. It has been in operation for ten years.
