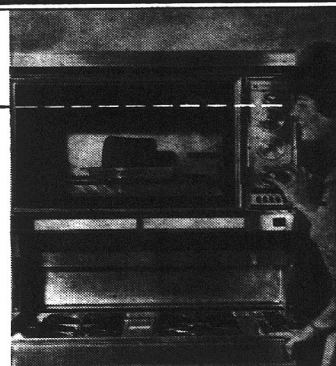

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## Rural Peace Corp Volunteers Are Needed

Rural youth, farmers and retired farmers are especially needed to serve as Peace Corps agricultural volunteers this summer, according to Donald E. Frantz, County Extension Agent. Applications for service and additional information are available at the County Extension Office in Warsaw.

Sixteen developing nations have requested Peace Corps agricultural volunteers for summer assignments. These requests have more than doubled this year.

The countries requesting volunteers are Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Columbia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guinea, Honduras, India, Morocco, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Peru and Venezuela.

Summer training programs for agricultural volunteers begin in June, Frantz says.

Rural young people with 4-H or FFA backgrounds are needed to help develop youth clubs while volunteers with practical farming experiences will work directly with farmers in villages encouraging improved farming methods.

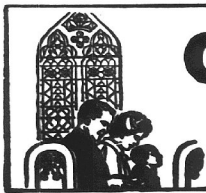

When your children search for colored eggs this Easter, they'll be renewing a custom far older than Christianity.

Eggs represent the new life that returns to earth every spring — around the time of Easter. The custom of exchanging eggs as part of the celebration began in ancient times. The ancient Persians often dyed eggs in the colors of spring and gave them to their friends as gifts. Some early peoples believed that the earth had hatched from a giant egg.

World Book Encyclopedia says the early Christians of Asia and other eastern lands exchanged eggs at Easter. They colored the eggs red.

Elaborate decorations became the rule in some eastern European lands. The Ukrainians are famous for their beautifully decorated Easter eggs. Each village makes its own design — fir trees, horses, priests' robes, flowers, bell towers, crosses, chapels, etc. Residents of Czechoslovakia, Poland, Lithuania, and other lands also are known for their highly decorated Easter eggs.

In England, friends often exchanged eggs at Easter, although nowadays these usually are chocolate eggs. The Irish break the long Lenten fast by eating eggs at dawn on Easter.

Germans color eggs green on "Green Thursday"—the Thursday before Easter—and carry the eggs all day for good luck. On Easter Monday the young people have an egg-rolling contest.

In Italy, a priest blesses the eggs on Easter. The eggs occupy the center of the breakfast table, with other dishes arranged around them.

In The Netherlands, children go from door to door during Holy Week, collecting Easter eggs. Young and old alike play games involving eggs on Easter Monday.

In Greece, World Book notes, people tap red eggs together as a greeting when they meet on Easter. The first person says, "Christ is risen," and the second replies, "He is truly risen."

In Bugaria, on Easter Saturday, people exchange eggs and baked almond cakes. In Hungary, boys sprinkle girls with water on Easter Monday and receive Easter eggs in reward.

Customs vary from land to land, but colored eggs have associated with springtime since the dawn of history.

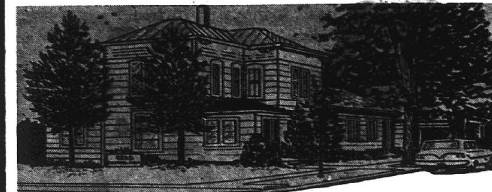

## Purdue Sets Rules For Tornado Safety

Lafayette, Ind. Tornado activity in Indiana usually reaches a peak in April or May, but most of the severe tornadoes

have occurred in March.

However, no tornadoes were but the most severe tornadoes reported in March last year; in Indiana history struck on April 11, Palm Sunday. One hundred forty Hoosiers were killed.

L. A. Schaal, Weather Bureau state climatologist at Purdue University, says much of the Weather Bureau data indicates that the frequency of tornadoes in Indiana has been increasing in recent years. A record 48 tornadoes were recorded last year. Only eight were recorded in 1964.

Last year's tornado, reports, Schaal says, show that an amazing number of people escaped death by hurrying to their basements. In homes, a basement corner toward the tornado usually offers the greatest safety.

In a house with no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the house, he says. Keep some windows open—usually the east side is best, but stay away from the windows.

In open country without an underground shelter, Schaal suggests moving away from the tornado's path at a right angle. Most tornadoes in Indiana travel from west to east, southwest to northeast, or northwest to southeast.

In an open field, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch. Most roads are slightly elevated from the general level of the terrain, so a car is a good target for grating winds. Don't stay in the car if it's not possible to drive away from the tornado, get out and take refuge in a ditch or culvert.

In the city, seek inside shelter. In the absence of sturdy below-ground shelter go to the interior of a steel frame or reinforced concrete building. Hallways are good in these buildings if located in the interior and away from windows.

Schaal says in schools, persons should go to a storm shelter or an underground excavation of available. If there is no storm shelter, but the building is of reinforced concrete construction, stay inside but away from windows.

Whenever possible, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly supported roofs.

Weather Bureau tornado forecasts this year will use two terms. A "Tornado Watch" will be used to alert the public to the possibility that tornadoes may develop over a certain area. A "Tornado Warning" will be issued if a tornado has been seen or its presence detected by radar. This warning will indicate where the tornado was discovered, the area to which it is expected to move and the time periods during which the tornado will move through the area warned.

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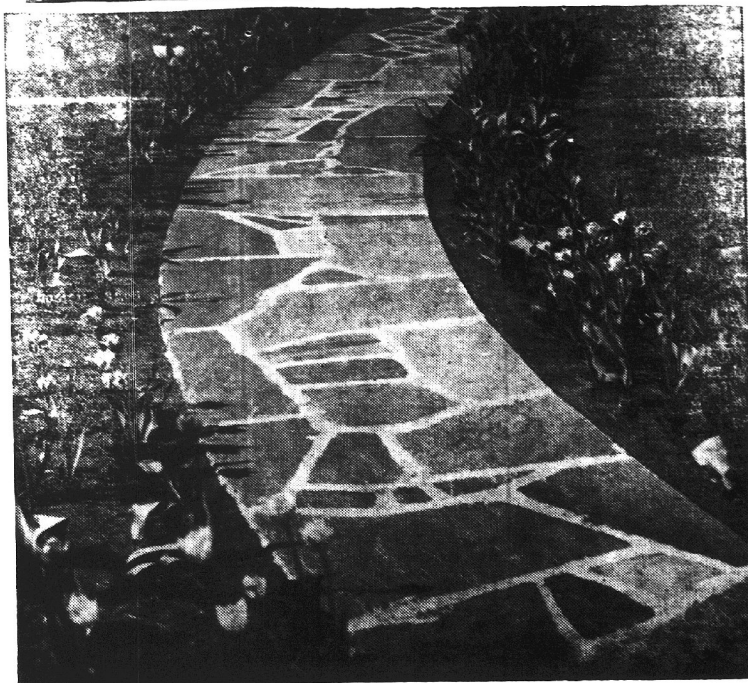

## Four County Clinic To Move

A new location in Warsaw for the Four County Mental Health Clinic was announced today by Lawrence J. Castaldi, President of the board of directors of the clinic. Castaldi also said that services of the clinic have been expended to include Huntington County, in addition to the present four counties being served - Kosciusko, Marshall, Wabash, and Whitley.

After April 18 the clinic will be located in the south wing of the Murphy Medical Professional Building at 422 South Buffalo Street. This building will provide much more adequate facilities, including eight private offices, a double waiting room, a play room for children and a group therapy room.

The board has been discussing securing larger quarters for several months and a building had been offered in Wabash County.

The clinic has been housed in a residence at 315 West Center Street in Warsaw for the past four years.

The Four County Mental Health Clinic, Inc., was founded in May, 1960, by a group of citizens representing the Mental Health Associations of Kosciusko, Marshall, Wabash, and Whitley Counties. Prior to that time much hard work had been done by private citizens, Chamber of Commerce, service clubs and public officials in the state. On March 1, 1961, the doors were first opened for service in a building on East Winona Avenue and later moved to West Center Street.

Nineteen referrals were received on the first day the clinic was open. During 1965 the clinic had 546 patients with

339 being new admissions. Interviews during the year with patients concerning the patients totaled 5,258.

With the addition of a county the board of directors consists of 25 unpaid citizens, five from each of the five counties.

Serving from Kosciusko County are Castaldi, Dr. John E. Arford, Mrs. Cecil Armstrong, Carl Burt, and Judge Gene B. Lee.

Dr. Frank D. Hogle is medical director of the clinic.

The medallion, designed by Mr. Warner Williams of Culver, is manufactured by the Medallic Art Company and is being distributed by member banks of the Indiana Bankers Association. The design is, in part, original - the reverse side features the seal of the state of Indiana but an original design on the obverse side shows a pioneer cabin denoting early statehood against a skyline representing industry - progress over 150 years. Across the top is written STATE OF INDIANA, at the sides 1816 and 1966, SESQUICENTENNIAL at the bottom and showing four tulips at the sides representing the official tree of the state of Indiana.

The medallions, cast in bronze and silver, are available in four issue of three sizes - a silver 2 1/2" retailing for \$25.00, a silver 1 3/4" for \$10.00, a bronze 2 1/2" for \$4.00, and a small 1 1/4" bronze for \$1.00.

The silver, being registered, will be limited in supply; the bronze will be unlimited. There will be a total of 2,000 large and 10,000 small silver medallions struck; banks and their branches will, at their option, receive two large and ten of the small silver each.

I gotta sign off now and run my wife downtown - I'm domesticated.

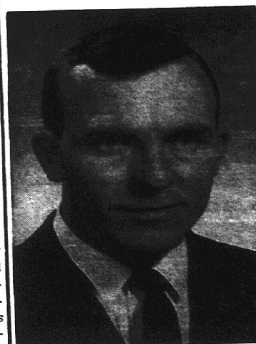

## Purdue Lists Marketing Guides

Lafayette, Ind. Hog prices are expected to strengthen only moderately from late March levels into summer, says Purdue University agricultural economists. The hog-corn feed ratio, they predict, should continue favorable well into 1967.

Cattle prices are also expected to strengthen moderately into the summer. Feed cattle prices are expected to fluctuate near late March levels for the next several weeks.

The economists say corn prices are likely to fluctuate near the \$1.20 a bushel level for the next two or three months. Price is expected to be 10-15 cents a bushel higher in corn deficit areas.

Soybean prices could work slightly lower in the next few months and became sensitive to 1966 crop prospects. This could happen without some strengthening in foreign demand, which is not expected now.

Prices for Indiana Grade A Large eggs in the second quarter of this year will probably average three to five cents higher than last year's average of 27 cents.

A 1966 turkey crop of 113 to 115 million birds, eight to 10 per cent above last year, is expected. Prices at the farm during the main marketing season are expected to average about one cent below last year.

Indiana milk prices are expected to decline seasonally for the next several months.

## Livestock Disease Outbreak

Lafayette, Ind. Aujeszky's Disease, sometimes called "mad itch," has been diagnosed in several types of domestic animals in Carroll and Cass counties, report Purdue University extension veterinarians. Most of the cases involved hogs, but several cats have also died from the disease.

This disease, caused by a virus, is believed to be spread by contact with affected animals. In addition to swine and cats, dogs and cattle may also be affected. Persons on whose farms the disease has been found are requested to confine their dogs and cats.

Signs of the disease vary from a rapid death with no apparent illness to nervous symptoms involving twitching, convulsions, apparent blindness, and, in some cases, severe itching. Death losses range from nearly 100 per cent in baby pigs to five to 10 per cent in older hogs and perhaps none in mature swine.

The veterinarians recommend that animal owners observe their animals closely. If nervous symptoms appear, or sudden deaths occur without apparent cause, owners should get in touch with veterinarian as soon as possible.

## School Board Opens Bids, Approves Resolution Honoring Mike Flohr

Representatives of several companies were present at the Monday night meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley school board, and bids were submitted for new bus bodies and chassis.

Companies bidding on the bodies and their bids were Imperial (Blue Bird body) \$3475.-95 for the 54 passenger and \$3596.00 for the 60 passenger; Merriman Co. (Carpenter body) bid three bids on each size body, the difference being in the type of windshield, and their bids were \$3335.60, \$3435.60, \$3,580.-60 for the 54 passenger bodies and \$3480.60, \$3580.60, and \$3680.60 for the 60 passenger bodies; and Kerlin Motors (Thomas body) \$3668.40 and \$3278.25.

Chassis bids were received from Bahney Chevrolet, Akron; W & W Truck Sales, Warsaw; Hammel Chrysler-Plymouth, Rochester; So. End Motors, Akron; and Kerlin Motor Co., Silver Lake. The Bahney bid included transportation to Mentone from the body company and was \$3118.27 for the 54 passenger bus and \$3315.36 for the 60 passenger bus. The bid also allowed for a discount if more than one bus was purchased. None of the other bids allowed for a discount for multiple purchase. The W & W Truck Sales bid for International truck was \$3370 and \$3540. Hammel, bidding GMC trucks, bid \$3227 and \$3347.90, with the transportation rate dependent upon the point of origin for the body. So. End Motors and Kerlin Motors both bid Ford trucks. So. End Motors bid \$3363.09 and \$3423.09 with the transportation to be figured at 10¢ per mile. Owner Ralph Shewman defended this bid by saying that it was not fair to the board, the taxpayers, or the bidders to not know the location of the body company at the time they were bidding. Kerlin bid \$3211.25 and \$3278.25.

All bids were taken under advisement by the board to be checked against the specification sheets. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids and in particular the bids of bidders who fail to comply with the specifications of the state of Indiana and with the TVSC specifications and to waive any irregularities in bids submitted in connection with the purchase of any of the equipment specified.

Further board action included the approval of a special resolution in honor of Mike Flohr. The complete resolution may be found on another page of this week's paper. The board also granted a four day leave of ab-

sence to Wayne Cumberland, Flohr's teacher, so that he could accompany the boy to Dallas, Texas to the International Science Fair.

Two teachers, Diane Nellans and Pauline Buck, submitted their resignations. Leave of absence was granted Mrs. Jean Kerlin and Mrs. Carolyn England.

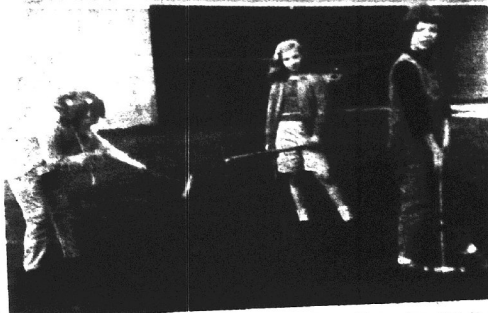

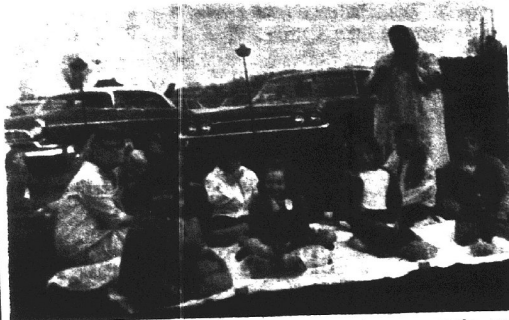

## Editor's Viewpoint

### THE DOOR IS EITHER OPEN, OR THE DOOR IS SHUT

What makes good reporters so hard-nosed about open meetings?

Few sights are more distressing to public officials than the reporter who comes into a public meeting, takes out pad and pencil, and takes voluminous notes—particularly notes about "controversial" matters. If the discussion gets particularly hot and heavy, the chairman may exercise a great deal of ingenuity and force to terminate the discussion.

He may say, "We want this off the record." The reporter, if he is a good one and has been properly trained, will then stand up and remind the chairman that there is no magic spigot which—during a public meeting—can turn public information off and on. He may say that his newspaper doesn't recognize the validity of the phrase "off the record" when uttered by officials at public meetings.

The chairman may decide to "go into executive session." Again, the cantankerous reporter will rise to object, reminding the chairman that an executive session cannot be regarded as a haven of safety for any and all controversial discussion and that he intends to sit in on the meeting to use his own good judgement about printing what goes on.

The inventive chairman may move for a "study session," "brainstorming session," or a "committee of the whole" to consider the matter later, in private. The tax-paid attorney may even come up with a legal opinion that such committee meetings are not technically "public meetings," that no formal action is to be taken, and therefore the press and the public can be excluded. But again, the reporter shows up at the door, declaring that where public business is being discussed, he has a right to be with his pad and pencil.

There's no doubt about it: Newspapers cause problems for public officials. It's been that way even since the English cause problems for public officials. It's been that way ever since the English newspaper publisher, John Wilkes, 1771 won his battle for the right of printers to carry full proceedings of the House of Commons. It was cantankerous printers in the Colonies, such as Benjamin Harris and James Franklin, who went ahead and printed the truth, insisting that they had a right to do this without previous "clearing" by government censors. Indeed, the American Revolution was largely brought about by talented and outspoken printers and pamphleters.

Where does the cantankerous reporter get the idea he has a right to cover public meetings? It comes straight out of the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution, guaranteeing a free press, and from the essential nature of our political system. In many states, it also comes from "open meeting" and "open record" statutes, although some newspapermen regard such statutes as unnecessary because of the First Amendment's guarantee of free speech and press. It also comes from our common law—the body of un-

written traditions which form the wellspring for our written laws. Editors know that the easiest way—at least on the local level—to open up "secret" meetings is simply to report that secret meetings occurred, perhaps with appropriate editorial comment.

Mr. Dorrell greatly stressed that every taxpayer in Indiana should be concerned with the gross unfairness of our present school financing system.

## HOMAGE TO JOHANNES

Today isn't Johannes Gutenberg's birthday as far as we know, but it could be. With lawyers asking us to observe Law Day, pickle manufacturers making us aware of National Pickle Week, and merchants promoting Christmas buying throughout the whole year, we ask you now to pause briefly to think of Johannes Gutenberg, the father of modern printing.

Gutenberg wasn't a trouble-maker on purpose. He was an aristocrat and master craftsman. But it happened that he invented the type-mold, making movable type possible, and this opened up a real Pandora's box of problems which have bothered civilization ever since. For movable type vastly simplified the printing and dissemination of ideas.

Feudalism had already started to crumble in Gutenberg's time, but it was the hammer-blows of ideas that brought the walls tumbling down. It was ideas printed on paper which proved valuable to trouble-makers everywhere. Voltaire, a trouble-maker par excellence, helped speed the French Revolution with thousands of pamphlets. English printers, in the late 17th and 18th centuries, spread ideas which liberalized their country. Orney men in the American colonies, such as Tom Paine, spread the gospel of liberty with news-sheets and pamphlets. Ideas printed on paper brought men new ways of thinking of themselves and their futures. Ideas made men dissatisfied with their lot, making them demand change.

The world hasn't been the same men in large numbers started to read about public affairs. Government officials everywhere have never been altogether happy with men who print their ideas on paper and distribute these pieces of paper for other men to read. The air has always been full with gossip, rumor and chatter. But thoughts on paper stay there. They can be read over and over again by many people, and the man who wrote the thoughts can be held to account for what he wrote. Printing is the thinking man's medium; print, the ideal way to put over complex ideas.

Bertrand Russell said in "Why Men Fight": "Thought is subversive and revolutionary, destructive and terrible; thought is merciless to privilege, established institutions and comfortable habits; thought is anarchic and lawless, indifferent to authority, careless of the well-tried wisdom of the ages."

We're in the business, and so is every newspaper, of putting thoughts down on paper. Nobody has put a laurel wreath on our editorial brow lately, nor given us a testimonial dinner. There are unquestionably some good citizens of our community who would stand in the street and cheer if our walls came tumbling down. That's par for the course.

We'll lay the blame to Johannes, and recommend that each year on this day we all stop to think what a happy, peaceful, controlled, feudal place this might be, if the man from Mainz hadn't started experimenting with that type-mold.

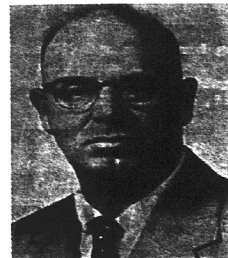

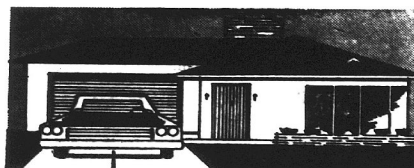

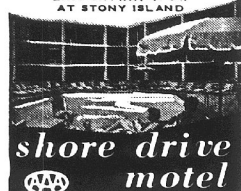

## County Agent's Notes

Chemical dealers are reporting that the two principle materials used for soil insect control in corn, Aldrin and Heptachlor, have been exhausted, according to Don Frantz, County Agent.

Chlordane has been recommended as a substitute material and can be satisfactorily used in problem fields although the cost will be higher. Rates should be used that do not exceed label recommendations.

Corn producers who have supplies of Aldrin and Heptachlor materials on hand should use it in fields where the corn will be matured and harvested as gain. It is not recommended that these materials be used on corn to be produced for silage for dairy cattle.

## SESQUICENTENNIAL SCRAPBOOK

In the long pull Indian will kill more whites (as well as other shades of mankind) than all the thousands of "redmen" destroyed by our ancestors, for among other things introduced to the world by them was tobacco. How many men have died and will die as a consequence of taking on this Indian discovery will never be known.

White men have been using the weed and its products for about four hundred years, but Indians had known about its joys and sorrows for countless centuries before this.

Indians smoked several varieties of tobacco and mixed it, often, with other leaves and substances. Among these were Jimson leaves, poplar bark, dried birchwood, dogwood, sumac, sweet willow, dried laurel, bearberry and manzanita leaves, to name a few. Perhaps some of our future smokers will be from among these mentioned, for after all, the Indians used this stuff long, long before white men knew of it.

Interestingly, there are many kinds of tobacco plants in North America and the type we smoke today (*Nicotiana tabacum*) was introduced by English colonists to Virginia, and was a product of South America.

Nicotine seems to be derived from Jean Nicot, a French ambassador to Portugal, who dabbled in a little of the leaf and sent some to Catherine de Medici, or so the story goes. Indians first blended tobacco and it is known that they used different mixtures for different ceremonies. That they should do so is really understandable for although they knew about curing to a degree, the true weed was mighty strong and no one could smoke it straight.

But it was venerated by ancient Indians above most everything else. They used it in all ceremonies, scattered it in camp fires, burnt it in sacrificial rites, blew smoke toward the cardinal points, scattered it in the winds, fastened tobacco leaves in water to insure fishing luck, applied it to wounds, internal, external and mental and took it with them to their graves. They smoked it in pipes, they smoked it in cigars and

they rolled cigarettes filling leaves with other substances in the roll. And when white men discovered these things they took tobacco to the rest of the world and it was used by the most learned doctors to cure everything from carbuncles to stomach-aches. Whites used it for more things than Indians did, heating leaves and applying them to affected parts, rolling little pills and sticking them in body cavities, making syrups and ointments and inserting tobacco juice in open wounds. They even advocated using the ashes from pipes as a dentifrice.

When we think of Indians smoking, we automatically think of a calumet and a peace treaty and conjure up all sorts of ideas about red men and white men sitting around a camp fire, passing a long-stemmed pipe that looked like a tomahawk about the circle, solemnly inhaling and waiting and burying hatches and all these things. They happened, but infrequently.

Tobacco to Indians was mainly smoking and they indulged in it just like other men did and do and will. The Indians of the midwest seemed to have liked pipes best as they could whip up an emergency pipe from damp clay in very short order if they left their equipment back at camp, often used community pipes which had several stems, so that a little party could sit around a common bowl and puff away.

Indians had tobacco brands so potent they could produce states of intoxication, ecstasy or even delirium. They are known to have smoked cigars in reverse, when buddies met. This system consisted of one fellow putting the lighted end of a cigar in his mouth and blowing smoke into the lungs of his pal on the other end of the stogie. White men have much to learn about smoking, but we must remember that we are just beginning to know about it. The fellows that got chased out of this region had been experimenting with it and its uses far longer than American, P. Lorillard, R. J. Reynolds, and all the others put together.

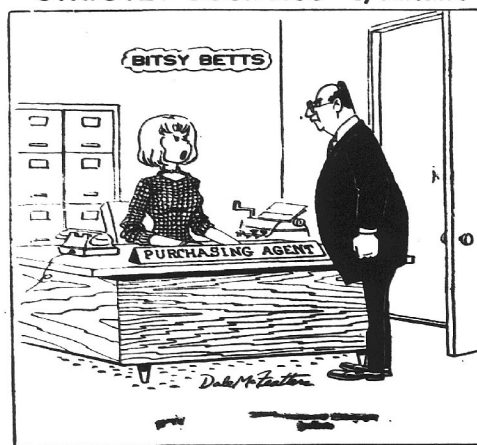
