Ruth Huffer's Essay Is 3rd In State DAR Essay Contest

Mrs. Ray Linn, Mentone, of the Anthony Nigo Chapter, D.A.R., and Mrs. Robert Knepper, Etna Green, of the Tippecanoe River Chapter, D.A.R., attended the DAR Council Meeting held March 29 at the Sheraton-Lincoln Hotel in Indianapolis.

The Anthony Nigo Chapter was proud to learn that one of the 1967 American Essay Winners was Ruth Huffer of Talma Junior High, who placed third in the state in the 8th Grade competition. Mrs. Linn accepted the certificate on behalf of Mrs. C. G. Carter, chapter historian, who was unable to attend.

It was reported that 55,839 inches of publicity were carried in Indiana papers during the year, as well as 810 photographs. All the DAR chapters are deeply appreciative of the cooperation by newspapers, which enabled them to set this record of 7,000 press inches over all previous amounts.

Other reports advised that 248 Good Citizenship Medals were given in the state. The Paul Revere Chapter of Muncie, as a conservation project, planted 69,000 trees. The largest gain in membership, of chapters under fifty, was by the William Tuff's Chapter of Elkhart. Maj. Hugh Dinwiddie Chapter, Knightstown, presented flags to all of the DAR sponsored Indian schools. The 97 chapters in the state reported 100% participation in the Good Citizens project, with 400 pins being presented. All chapters also cooperated in the first color

REHABILITATION

REHABILITATION in the home is gaining favor. Some hospitals have instituted what is termed a Home Care program.

At first glance, the orderly, well-equipped hospital ward would seem to be more suitable for the care of rehabilitation patients than would be the average home environment. However, the clutter and seeming disorder in a home that houses a family may work to the advantage of the patient.

The weak and sometimes dizzy member of the family can get from bedroom to kitchen by leaning on familiar furniture and he often becomes ambulant more quickly in his home environment.

In the hospital he is usually confined to bed where someone is at hand to feed him, bathe him and administer to his every need. But many elderly patients find these hospital routines disquieting, and disorientation and confusion frequently result. This hazard is avoided by the home care rehabilitation program.

Members of the household taking part in a rehabilitation program can aid in helping the patient to walk and stretch his limbs and encourage him to use his own initiative.

The cost of caring for a rehabilitative patient at home is a fraction of the cost of what it would be in a hospital.

Fire Ruins Stove

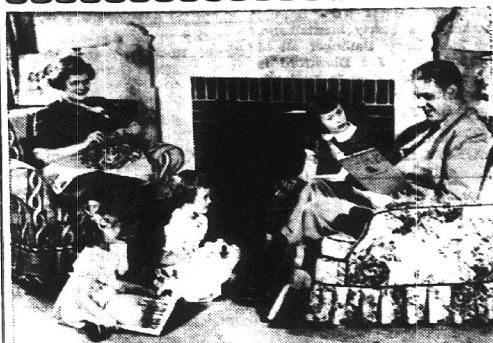

The Merrimac vs the Monitor

Ruth Hoffer, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hoffer, Crystal Lake, and a student at Talmia Jr. High School, recently entered the essay contest sponsored by the Anthony Nigo Chapter DAR with her essay, "The Merrimac versus the Monitor." It was entered in state competition where it placed third. It is with pleasure that we reprint Miss Hoffer's essay here.

One August day in 1861, during the Civil War, a letter was sent to President Lincoln. It was written by a man in New York. This man was John Ericsson, a marine engineer, and an inventor. He was an emigrant to the United States from Sweden. When the letter went unanswered, Mr. Ericsson wrote another letter, this time to the Navy Department, repeating the letter that he had written to President Lincoln. This letter also went unanswered. This made Mr. Ericsson very angry, because he had heard rumors that the Confederates were building a new kind of ship. Their warship, the *Merrimac*, was supposed to be so strong that it would be able to destroy any ship in the Union navy.

Somehow, other Northerners who felt the same way as Mr. Ericsson, found out that Ericsson had written a letter and they started circulating the news that he wanted to build a Northern warship.

In late September, Mr. Cornelius Scranton Bushnell called on Mr. Ericsson. Mr. Bushnell, being a close friend of Gideon Wells, the Secretary of the Navy, thought he might be able

to have some influence on the matter. When Mr. Bushnell left, he was carrying a model of the ship that Ericsson wanted to design and build.

A few days later, Bushnell took the model of the ship to the White House. When showed the model, President Lincoln was very impressed. The next day, the model was shown to the Navy Departments' Committee on Ironclads. The committee was undecided on whether to consider using Ericsson's model or to forget it. The committee asked President Lincoln's advice and he said, "It strikes me that there is something in it."

President Lincoln's statement settled the matter and John Ericsson was told to start the construction of the *Monitor*. He was asked by the Navy Department to finish it as soon as possible. The *Monitor* was desperately needed to fight the South's Ironclad, the *Merrimac*.

In February, a Negro woman went to Secretary Wells with some important news. She had a letter written by a mechanic who had helped to rebuild the *Merrimac*. The letter contained information such as the ship's size, speed, and thickness of the armor. Many other details were mentioned in the letter. These details would help Ericsson know how he would have to build his ship so that that it would be able to beat the *Merrimac* in battle.

The *Merrimac* was first seen just off Hampton Roads at noon on March 8, 1862. She attacked three of the Union ships, the *Congress*, the *Cumberland*, and ran the *Minnesota* aground. This first victory for the *Merrimac* cost the Union army the loss of many lives. Now the reason for building the *Monitor* was even more important.

When news of this battle reached Washington, things were in an uproar. The Union's ship, the *Monitor*, had been launched on January 30, 1862, and had sailed up to Hampton Roads just as the *Merrimac* was leaving.

The *Monitor* was very heavily armed and looked capable of defeating the *Merrimac* if they ever met in battle.

On the same day as the attack on Hampton Roads, the *Monitor* and the *Merrimac* met in battle. The two ships battled for four hours, but neither of the ships could do any real damage to the other one. It seemed as though they were equal. The battle was ended when the *Merrimac* retreated to a safe spot in the Elizabeth River. The *Monitor* did not force a continuation of the battle, so it was considered a draw.

The *Merrimac* did not destroy any more Northern warships, but she successfully guarded the James River.

Because she was not used very much, the *Merrimac* was abandoned by her men on May 10, 1862.

The North continued in the manufacturing of ironclads, many of which followed the *Monitor*.

Many other small naval battles were fought during the rest of the Civil War. In most of these, the North was victorious, because the South did not have the fine factories to build a good quality of ship that would be strong and invincible.

We come to the conclusion that the *Monitor* and the *Merrimac* have revolutionized the naval battles. The ships from then on were built sturdier and larger.

This is just another form of progress in our country.

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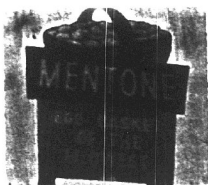

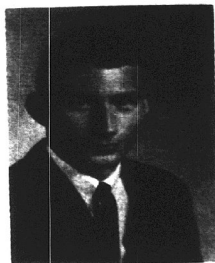

In order to attend Kindergarten next year a child must be five years of age on or before August 1, 1967.

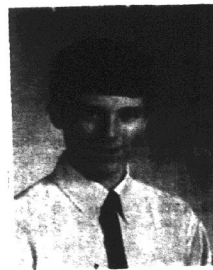

TVSC salary schedule is set

A new teachers' pay scale was recently established by members of the Tippecanoe Valley school board which calls for a base salary of \$6,000 for first year teachers holding a B.S. degree. Increments of \$150 per year will be added until the top pay at the end of twelve years is \$7800. Teachers with the B.S. degree and a year of advance

schooling will begin at a base of \$6100 which will increments yearly until a top level of \$9400 is reached after twenty years. Beginning teachers with masters degrees will have a base salary of \$6400 to a top of \$9700 after twenty years. Teachers holding the EdS degree will begin at \$6700 and advance to a top of \$9900 in twenty years. Non-degree teachers will receive \$5600 per year with no increments.

The recent legislature raised beginning salaries \$700 for teachers with the B.S. degree and \$1400 for teachers with a masters degree.

Members of the school board met in public session Monday night and discussed routine business matters. Some teachers' contracts were negotiated, but a complete list of teachers will not be available until all contracts are returned to the superintendent's office. As soon as the contracts have been completed, a list of teachers will be published.

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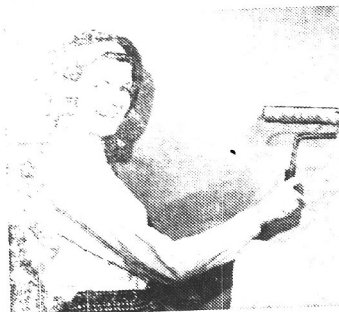

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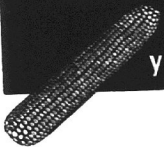
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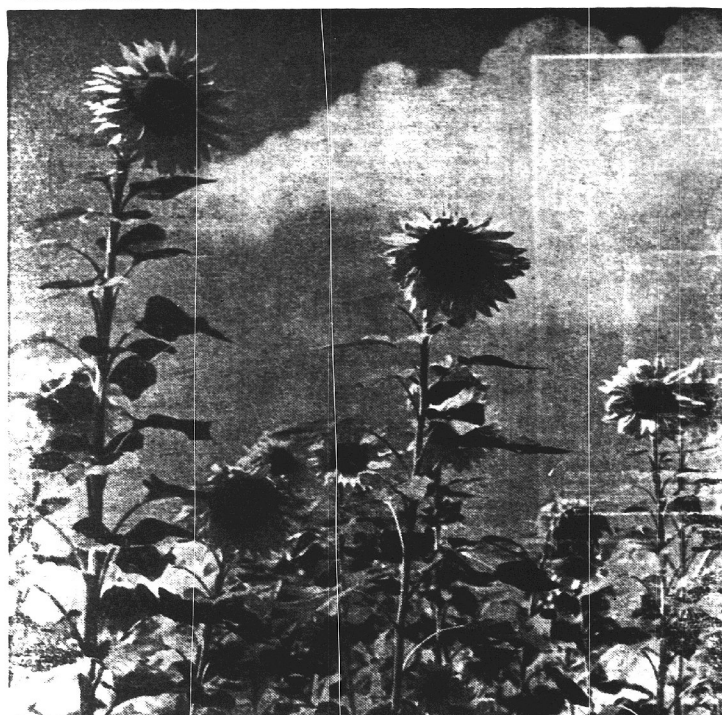

You do not need to be referred by a doctor to receive help. They employ five full time professionals, but still need more help. The ability to pay is based on the amount of income tax paid in the year past. The club donated a \$5.00 check to Dr. Hogle to take back with him to the Mental Health Clinic.

The Merry Mollys answered this questions when fifteen members responded to Roll Call by telling some of the ladies in our community they admire and some of the traits they hope to have when they become old ladies. On all subsequent practice days, the track will be available regularly from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., with the public admitted for the nominal price of 50 cents. Admission on all time trial days, May 13-14 and May 20-21, will be \$2 as the entries compete for starting positions on Race Day behind the Chevrolet Camaro pace car.

Nine prominent grand prix drivers from other nations will be competing against the outstanding members of the American racing fraternity for premier honors. They are Graham Hill of England, Jim Clark and Jackie Stewart of Scotland, Jochen Rindt of Austria, Lucien Bianchi of Belgium, Chris Amon of New Zealand, Lorenzo Bandini of Italy, Dennis Hulme of Australia and Pedro Rodriguez of Mexico. Clark won the 1965 "Indy" event and Hill led the field home last year.

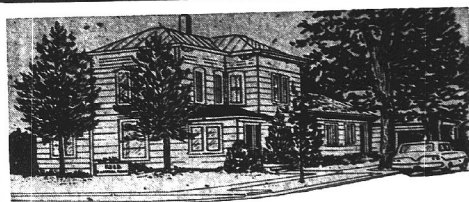

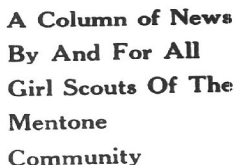

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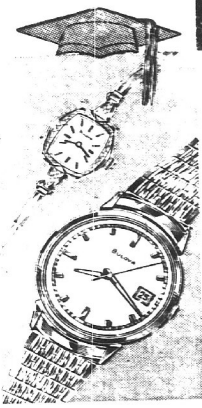
