Sonneborn Wins Kimber Award

A recent article in the Indiana University Alumni Magazine at Bloomington, states:

The Kimber Genetics Award, the highest prize in the science of heredity, was presented to Prof. Tracy M. Sonneborn at the National Academy of Sciences in Washington, D. C.

Prof. Sonneborn is the second famous IU geneticist to win the award. Prof. Hermann J. Muller received it in the first year of its presentation, 1955. Muller won the Nobel prize in medicine in 1946.

The award to Dr. Sonneborn is in recognition of his contributions to understanding of the ba-

sic mechanisms of heredity thru his research on the one-celled animal, paramecium.

Meaning Of Soil Conservation Stamp

The soil conservation postage stamp, issued on August 26, 1959, commemorates more than a quarter of a century of intensive work to protect and improve our most valuable natural resource—the soil. Formally released at Rapid City, S. Dakota, at the fourteenth annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America, it is the world's first commemorative soil conservation stamp.

Issue of the stamp is a tribute to farmers and ranchers who have put to use such soil and water conservation measures as those shown in the stamp design—terracing, strip-cropping, pasture improvement, pond construction, tree planting.

It is a tribute to the Nation's soil conservation districts—locally organized by landowners

to marshal all possible effort toward stopping erosion and building up the productivity of the soil.

It is a salute to State and Federal scientists and technicians who have carried on research, found better ways of protecting the land, and helped landowners carry out conservation plans. It is an expression of gratitude to those carrying on other programs—such as education, credit, and cost-sharing—that have helped farmers and ranchers install conservation im-

provements more rapidly.

The silhouette of a city in the background is a reminder of the common concern of city people and farmers for the care of the land—our primary source of food, shelter, clothing, and wild-life.

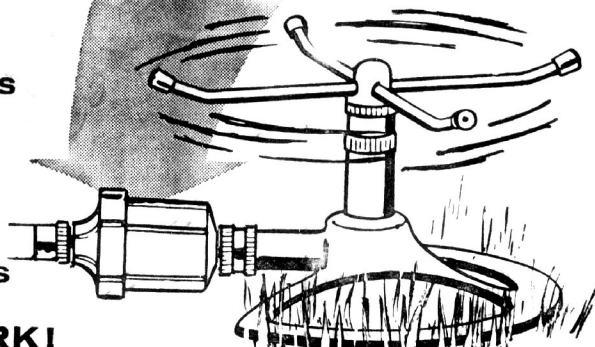

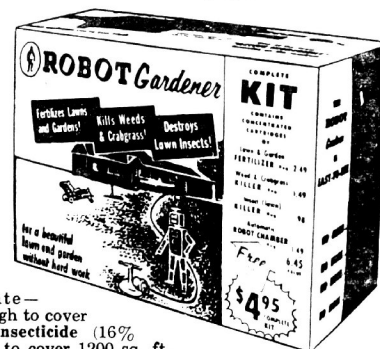

Funds for soil and water conservation practices for 1959 are still available under the Agricultural Conservation program, according to D. E. Frantz, county agent.

The fall months are a good time to do some types of conservation work according to the County Agent. Grass waterways should be constructed in early September in order to become established before winter. The ACP payments will equal about half the cost of seeding waterways.

Farmers are advised to contact the County ASC office for details and to apply for conservation cost share payments.

TO NOMINATE ASC CANDIDATES

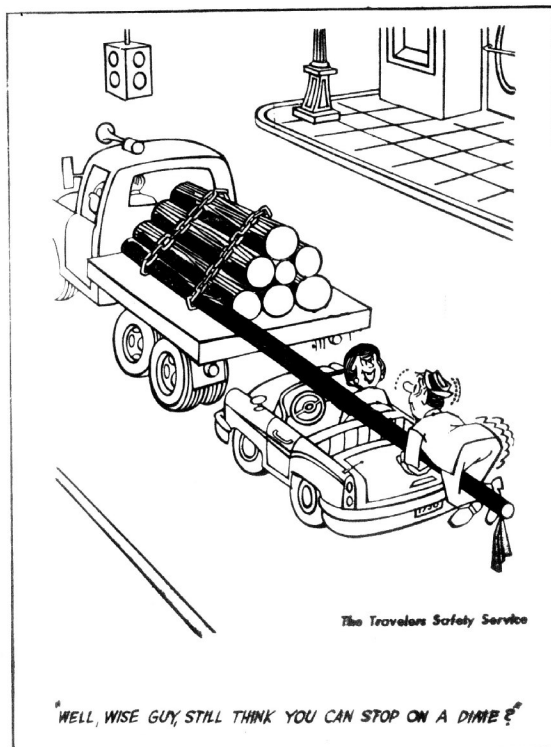

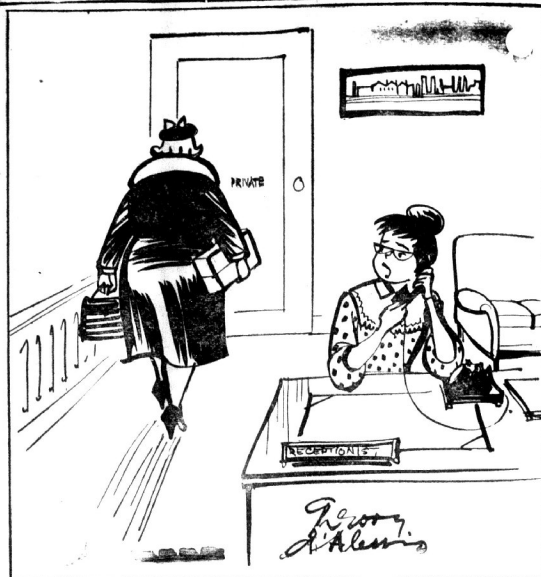

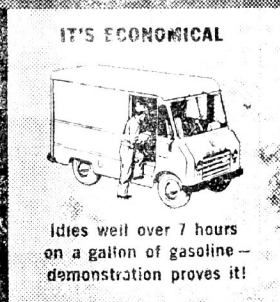

Havens For Hay Fever Victims

It's about that time of year again—the time all hay fever sufferers dread.

The arrival of the month of August usually means that the hay fever season is just around the corner. Once again, areas which are free of ragweed pollen in the air will be escape havens for the sneeze brigade.

The Chicago Motor Club's touring department advises that the best relief areas for the hay fever victim are in the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, California, the southern tip of Florida, and Minnesota, Michigan, Maine and the wooded areas of northern New Hampshire.

O. C. Durham, retired secretary of the American Academy of Allergy, devised the pollen index for use in determining the length and severity of the hay fever season. A high index number in an area indicates a long season and a high pollen count.

An area with an index count below 1 provides the best relief, while 1 to 5 is considered good, and 5 to 10 is fair. Anything over the 10 mark means nothing but woe for the hay fever brigade.

Hay fever victims no doubt were overjoyed to see Alaska join the Union. The new state has a pollen count of zero in its major cities — Fairbanks, Juneau and Nome.

The heaviest concentration of pollen is in the central states. However, only western Oregon and the Puget Sound region are completely free of ragweed and other related sneeze-makers. For the most part, wooded, mountain, and seashore areas offer

the best relief from the pollen plight.

The club's touring department points out that although ragweed pollen distribution in most areas is confined to August and September, weeds still are active along the Gulf Coast.

In central Florida, near Tampa, the hay fever season lasts from June to November. The southern tip of Texas, in the Brownsville area, also has a prolonged hay fever season.

Low pollen count areas, all with index readings under 1, recommended by the motor club as excellent retreats for the hay fever sufferer include West Yel-

lowstone and Yellowstone National Park, Wyo.; Reno, Nev.; Seattle and Spokane, Wash.; Portland, Ore.; Sun Valley, Idaho; San Francisco, Calif.; Isle Royale, Mich., and Miami Beach, Fla.

When taking that hay fever holiday, the motor club warns victims that they are apt to tire more easily while driving. Those subject to this allergy should switch drivers as frequently as possible while taking long motor trips during the hay fever season.

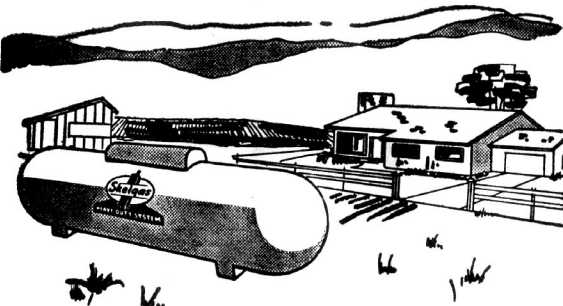

FARM DOGS VALUABLE

Farm dogs are valuable assets to the farming operation and should have the best possible care, says Dr. T. M. Curtin, extension veterinarian at Purdue University. If a dog is to become and remain an asset, it must be trained and healthy.

Training requires time, patience and understanding. A dog is like a person because every day that it lives and works, it learns for itself. It will watch the owner day after day and soon will begin to help in several ways. At this time, patience is essential and can mean the difference between a poor, mediocre, or good assistant to its owner. An untrained, or poorly trained dog, has little value on a farm, and under most circumstances is a liability rather than an asset.

Dogs should be trained not to roam because a "tramp" can carry diseases home to his owner's livestock. They can be spreaders of TGE, leptospirosis, brucellosis, rabies, ringworm, and other diseases of livestock and humans. Dr. Curtin says that dogs which remain at home have little chance to carry and introduce disease.

A dog must be healthy to do good work. Table scraps alone

are inadequate for the growth and maintenance of a working farm dog. Sick dogs should be taken to a veterinarian.

To follow the treatments advised by well-meaning friends and neighbors can result in the loss of a valuable farm hand. Veterinarians should also be consulted about vaccinations, worming and diet. Every precaution should be taken to insure the usefulness of the most inexpensive labor on modern farms, Dr. Curtin adds.

Mulching of Home Gardens

By doing a good job of mulching, vacationing home gardeners can forget the weeds, says W. B. Ward, Purdue University extension horticulturist. Mulch also prevents soil puddling, saves

soil moisture, helps keep soil temperatures uniform and releases plant nutrients when it decomposes.

Ward says hay and straw mulches should be three to four inches deep for best results. If sawdust or shavings are used, a two-inch mulch is deep enough. Lawn clippings can be used for mulching too, but, Ward advises avoiding those containing many weed seeds.

Sometimes materials, such as

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straw and sawdust, are low in nitrogen and may cause nitrogen deficiencies in the soil. Mulch then competes with plants for available soil nitrogen. To remedy this, suggests Ward, add some nitrogen fertilizer.

The horticulturist recommends a half pound of ammon-

ium sulfate or one-third pound of ammonium nitrate per 100 square feet of mulched area. When straight nitrogen fertilizers aren't available, use a lb. of 10-10-10 or similar analysis fertilizer.

Use Weed Killer With Care

Weed killers have saved Indiana farmers thousands of dollars in costs in weeding crops, but if many of these herbicides are improperly used, they can cause much damage to horticultural crops growing in the same area.

The hormone type weed killers, 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T, are the principal offenders, according to G. F. Warren, Purdue University research horticulturist.

Few people realize that nearly all horticultural plants can be damaged at some stage in their life cycle by 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T drift or vapor. Some crops are injured more easily than others, Warren notes. Tomatoes, melons, redbuds and grapes are extremely sensitive and most others are easily injured by very small concentrations of 2,4-D.

Farmers using herbicides should do everything possible to confine the tiny spray particles to the sprayed area, the horticulturist cautions. Increasing the amount of water applied per acre, increasing the nozzle diameter to obtain larger particle size, reducing the pressure and not spraying when winds are blowing toward susceptible crops are practices to observe when using herbicides.

Selecting the right form of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T also will help to reduce the damage. The am-

ine or low volatile forms should be used in place of the more volatile ester forms. Recently several new herbicides have appeared that can be used near horticultural crops with little hazard, Warren says.

Well Grown Pullets A 1959 Must

A sturdy, well developed, ready-to-lay pullet can be grown only by doing correctly a lot of things, reminds Joe W. Sicer, Purdue University extension poultryman. He also points out it is especially important this year that pullets be grown well if profits are to be expected; egg prices this fall and winter may run from two to five cents below those of a year ago.

Make certain the pullets are not crowded, advises Sicer. If more than 150 pullets are expected to roost in a 10 by 12 foot brooder house or more than

125 in an 8 by 10 foot shelter, then additional roosting space should be provided alongside. Poles placed on top of saw horses will relieve the congestion, bring greater comfort to the birds and, during the summer, cause no ill effects through lack of a roof.

Pullets raised in confinement should have at least two square feet of floor space per bird for Leghorns or three for heavy breeds. When space is limited, the litter often becomes caked, good ventilation is difficult, there is not enough room for exercise and cannibalism is more likely to develop.

On range, the important consideration is that a good sod be maintained. If the ground becomes bare, there are too many pullets for the type of pasture grass, the kind of soil and the weather.

There should be at least four 6-foot feed troughs per 100 birds and one waterer capable of supplying at least a day's require-

ment of cool water. Feeders and waterers should be moved frequently so that the sod will not be killed around them and to prevent muddy conditions.

Frequent inspections should be made for the presence of lice and mites and prompt eradication measures taken if found. Pullets should be given no access to accumulated droppings under the shelter floors nor to

areas ranged over by last year's chickens.

By all means, cautions Sicer, do not let the pullets and older chickens run together. That is an invitation to disease.

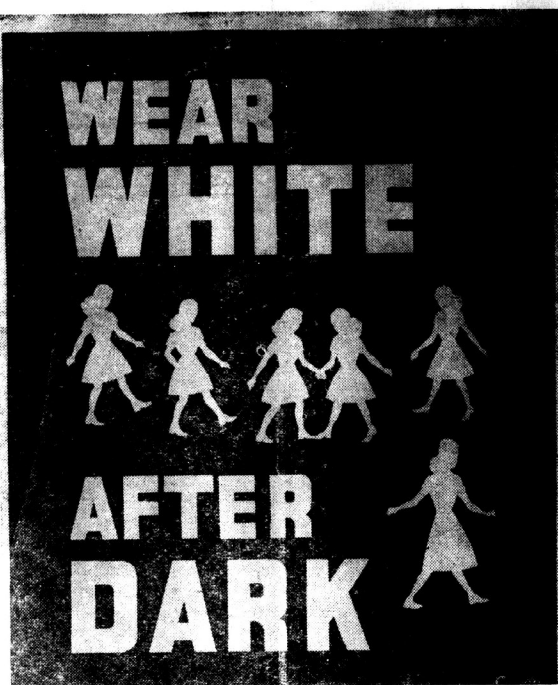

Keep Roses Safe From Pests

No fight is more continuing for the flower fancier than the battle against rose pests. From the time the first green leaves peep through until the last rose of summer has faded, some of the most persistent pests of nature continuously attack roses.

Rose experts at the Purdue University agricultural experiment station have experimentally pursued black spot and the various rose feeding insects for the past several years. From this research E. R. Honeywell, Purdue horticulturist, concludes that the adage—an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure—still applies. An infection can be halted much more easily than it can be eliminated after it has developed. Application of an effective pesticide must begin early and must continue at regular intervals.

Rose growers argue the comparative value of a dust or a

spray. Either form works, says Honeywell, if properly and timely applied.

Malathion and diazinon gave good control of thrips, slugs and aphids, although during the past two years these materials have not fazed the two-spotted spider mite. Dieldrin and DDT will control thrips and slugs and because they are long lasting, do a better job of holding down Japanese beetles and rose chaffer than malathion or diazinon do.

The newer chemical, Sevin, effectively controls most insects that attack roses, but does not control mites. If mites are a problem, such miticides as Kelthane, chlorobenzilate and aramite are potent against them.

Keep roses growing vigorously for better recovery from injury by pests. A soil mulch holds in moisture during dry spells, provides better soil structure, and may keep black spot spores from splashing onto rose leaves during heavy rains.

Extension Circular 427, "Roses" is available, free to Indiana residents, at county extension offices, or the agricultural publications office, Purdue.

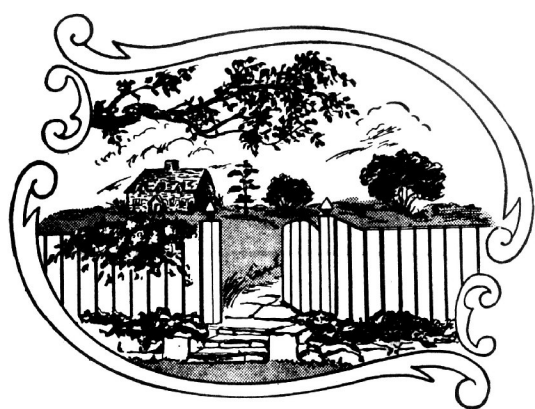

Corn Earworm Prevalent

Reports reaching Purdue University's entomology department indicate prevalence of earworm in home garden sweet corn.

Dave Matthew, Purdue extension entomologist, points out that this destructive insect can so severely damage the crop that it is unfit for home use and is unmarketable if grown commercially.

Garden plots can be sprayed with hand equipment, such as a two or three-gallon compressed air sprayer. Matthew explains that the opening in the nozzle should be small enough to produce a fine spray and held three or four inches from the silks so they will be completely covered.

An effective control agent is a 25 percent DDT emulsion to which a light mineral oil is added. Six teaspoonfuls of DDT and four-fifths pint of mineral oil with water added will make a gallon of the spray. This will cover a plot about 17 x 100 ft.

For best results, the insecticide should be applied when one fourth of the corn silks appear and twice again at three

day intervals.

Details of control treatments are contained in mimeo, E-31, "Corn Earworm Control," available to Indiana residents without charge at county extension agents' offices or by writing the agricultural publications office, Purdue.

Permanent pastures are basic to a cow and calf enterprise, according to Purdue University animal scientists. They can be improved by good management, application of lime, manure and fertilizers.

Purdue University poultry scientists recommend culling of young pullets that are behind the rest of the flock in body development. They should be marketed as soon as noticed.

First step in farm pond planning is selection of a suitable location, say Purdue University agricultural engineers. Before construction begins have spillways and dam designed and surveyed with an engineering level. Hire a contractor with adequate equipment to build the pond to proper specifications.

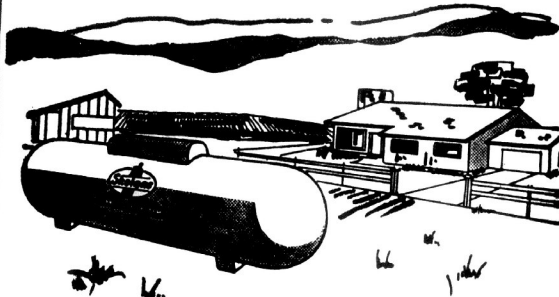

**Conservation
Dept. Alarmed**

Conservation Clubs and sportsmen of northern Indiana are becoming alarmed by land purchase encroachments by private organizations within the boundaries of the Tri-County Fish and Game Area. The boundaries of the area have been established since 1953 by the Indiana Department of Conservation, but the purchase of all the area has not been accomplished due to conditions and situations that only time will solve. The area is being purchased with funds derived from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses and when completed will be one of the choicest hunting and fishing spots in north eastern Indiana. The area will serve hundreds of sportsmen and conservationists.

Private individuals or organizations jumping in ahead of the Indiana Department of Conservation's acquisition program with fabulous offers per acre to acquire the land will hinder and defeat the purpose of the land use by the sportsmen of the State of Indiana. State agencies are not able to compete with the exorbitant prices being paid for land within the boundaries of the area set by the Indiana Department of Conservation. Certain sections of the area are to be used for experimental purposes in fish management and upland management, the result of which will be of great benefit to sportsmen and the entire conservation program. This type of study and research however, cannot be carried on if any part of the area is privately owned. Thus, the program and conservation and the hundreds of sportsmen in this section of the state will be blocked and the thousands of dollars already spent on the area will be of little value.

The section of land in question, bordering Shock Lake, has been set aside for fish research. To complete these studies, the land area around the lake must be owned by the Indiana Department of Conservation to insure complete management of the project. The state can exercise the right of eminent domain if necessary. This could result in long drawn out negotiations with the conservationists and sportsmen suffering as the result. The question amounts to just this, is it better to develop the area in question as a housing development, for the benefit of a few, or develop it for the benefit of thousands of Indiana sportsmen who are footing the bill to purchase the area.

Pasture Renovation

Dual wheat is the best winter
grain for seeding renovated pas-
ture in August. Says Lester H.
Smith, Purdue University ex-
tension agronomist.

Dual is Hessian Fly resistant
and very leafy. It stools vig-
orously in the spring, providing
more pasture.

Alfalfa grass seedings
made in the Dual wheat should
be band seeded. This means
placing part of the fertilizer
in bands directly beneath the
seeds. Phosphate applied by
this method is particularly ef-
fective in stimulating develop-
ment of young seedlings on low
phosphate soils, Smith explains.

When fertilizer requirements
are large (400 to 600 pounds
per acre), about 200 pounds
should be "band seeded" and
the remainder broadcast and
disced into the soil prior to
seeding.

Smith says that on light color-
ed soils the use of 10 to 20 lbs.
of nitrogen per acre in the
mixed fertilizer, banded near
the seed, will hasten seedling
establishment.

After a crop has been remov-
ed from the renovated pasture,
the stand should be topdressed
with phosphate and potash to
maintain yields at a high level.
A 3 ton crop of alfalfa - grass
forage will remove about 40 lbs.
of phosphate and 130 pounds of
potash an acre annually.

If the forage is removed for
hay or silage all of this phos-
phate and potash should be
replaced to maintain yields at
that level.

If the crop is used for pas-
ture, where some manure is re-
turned to the land, the potash
maintenance may be reduced to
about half of that which
would have been removed by a
hay crop.

Smith says an average main-
tenance fertilizer recommenda-
tion would be the equivalent
of 250 pounds of 0-20-20 top-
dressed per acre annually. The
fertilizer may be applied at the
time of year most convenient for
the farm operator.

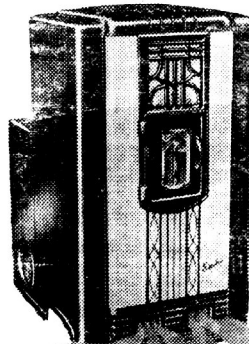

Sow Comfort

Lafayette, Ind.—When farrowing in hot weather, sows need special attention, Purdue University swine specialist Richard Hollandbeck says.

Sows cannot be expected to farrow large, healthy litters in hot weather unless some cooling device is used.

A Clay county farmer has converted an open tool shed for summer farrowing. This gives ample air circulation. On hot days he also uses a water sprinkling system to further cool the area. One sprayer nozzle per bent is located at the open South side of the building.

Sows are fed twice daily on a concrete slab in a shaded area.

Hollandbeck said pigs farrowed by the sows are healthy and vigorous. The farmer reported pig losses have been almost negative since the barn was placed in use.

Specialists pointed out that various water cooling systems can be adapted to meet individual farm needs. Similar systems can be used to cool market hogs.

The Chicago Motor Club points out that driving in traffic and reading a map just do not mix. Motorists on trips should plan their routes in advance. A good driver always anticipates a change of direction. Last second stopping or turning may result in an accident.

Seed Rye After Mid-August

Lafayette, Ind.—Seeding of rye as a cover crop in corn fields should start in mid-August to prevent rust infection, says L. H. Smith, Purdue University extension agronomist.

Hessian fly resistant Dual wheat, which also can be used as fall pasture and cover crop, should not be seeded until later in the month. Neither rye nor Dual wheat should be sowed if there is inadequate moisture in the soil.

Smith says little evidence is available to show increase in the yield of a crop that follows rye sown in standing corn and turned under the next spring. Rye, however, does have pasture and winter cover crop value. But for pasture Dual wheat is superior.

Seedings in tall corn are usually made by plane or special tractor row seeders at the rate of 1.5 to 2 bushels of grain per acre. With these methods, seed is covered only by rains and stands may be spotty.

Stands and growth will be better where corn stands erect enough to permit row seedlings with tools that cultivate and cover in the same operation. Direct fertilization also is possible.

Safe Summer Driving

Unless the rainfall that accompanies a summer electrical storm is so severe as to limit driver visibility, there is no

need for a motorist caught driving in the midst of such a storm to stop his car, according to Matthew C. Sielski, director of the Chicago Motor Club's safety and traffic engineering department.

"Even if you are forced to pull over and wait the storm out, one of the safest places to be is right in your car," he pointed out.

Sielski said that since rubber tires insulate a car and keep the current from becoming grounded, there is little danger that lightning can harm the passengers. "Of course, if there is a sturdy building nearby, it is much better to seek shelter there," he added.

If you do decide to pull over and wait out the storm in your car, Sielski offered the following safety tips:

—Don't park under a tree or pole which, if struck by lightning, may fall on top of the car.

—Try, if possible, to avoid parking under overhead power lines strung along the roadside. During severe storm many of these wires are downed.

—Park on high land where water won't accumulate.

—Although you are safe when you remain in your car, it is

impossible to tell whether a downed wire is "live" or "dead." To be on the safe side, simply sit tight and wait, but avoid touching any metal parts inside your car.

—If you have to summon help use a wooden or plastic object to depress your car's horn button or ring.

Farmers interested in latest swine nutrition experimental findings should plan to attend Purdue University's Swine Day, Aug. 28, at the University's livestock farm, three miles north of West Lafayette. Tours of experiments will start at 8 a.m.

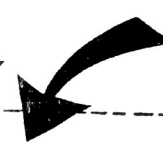
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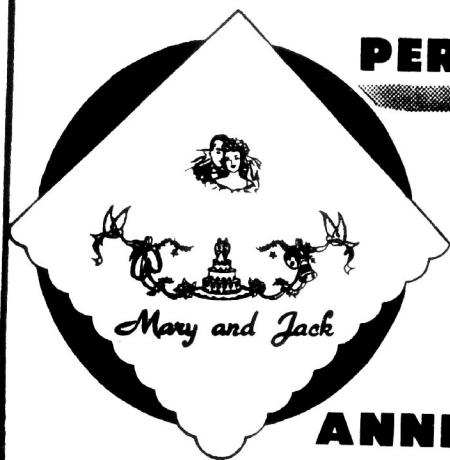

Seed Alfalfa Soon

Lafayette, Ind.—Deadline for seeding alfalfa in northern Indiana is mid-August, with late August being the final date in southern Indiana, reminds Lester H. Smith, Purdue University extension agronomist.

Select a good certified variety of seed, he suggests. Vernal and Ranger are the top long rotation varieties for all of Indiana. Buffalo does best in southern Indiana. Atlantic is out in front for a short rotation variety, although it lacks the wilt resistance of the other three varieties. Vernal is outstanding for its winter hardiness and ability to withstand heaving.

Apply limestone and fertilizer according to soil test; without a soil test use 300 pounds of 0-20-20 or equivalent on loams and silt soils. Sandy soils need 200 or more pounds of 0-10-30 or equivalent per acre. These soils need a fertilizer containing boron, as do soils in southern Indiana.

Band seeding is the best way to get the August seeding off to a fast start. With the fertilizer directly beneath the seeds they take off "right now" and are better able to compete with weeds and develop a strong root system for winter survival. On soils low in fertility a little nitrogen helps to get the seedlings off to a fast start. This is especially true if the alfalfa is seeded in a winter grain such as Dual wheat.

On rolling land, Smith suggests preparing the seed bed on the contour to reduce erosion.

Generally it is advisable to seed grass with the alfalfa, he adds. The grass will help cut losses from winter heaving, and the alfalfa-grass mixture usually will yield more than alfalfa alone.

Courtesy on the highways, says the Chicago Motor Club, goes a long way toward reducing accidents. One way to practice road courtesy is to be the first to dim your headlights when approaching another car at night. Also, remember to dim your lights when following another car.

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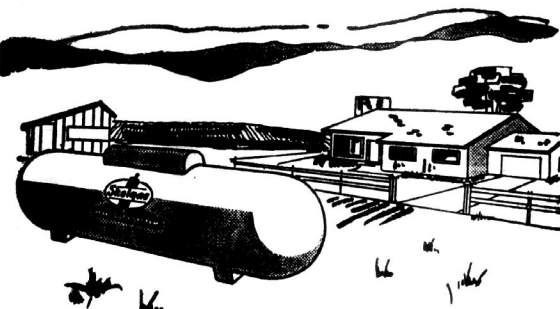

Slight to moderate tremors continued through the night, but we did manage to go to bed and get to sleep about 2:30 a. m., only to be awakened a few minutes later to prepare to evacuate the valley when the Hebgen dam on the Madison river was reported crashed.

There are plenty of nearby hills for safety from the water, but our airplane was tied down in the valley. At daybreak we had it in the air and took it to higher ground.

A quake, with all its disaster, always has its quota of amusing or unusual events. Clocks that hadn't run for years started working—and some that were running stopped. The brother-in-law's pup was found leaning against the wall with all four feet braced and a bunch of tame ducks nearly went crazy when the little pond of water they were on moved out from under them.

Hebgen lake basin was tilted—one side raised several feet while the other side fell, leaving cottages on one side high up the hillside while on the other they were in the water.

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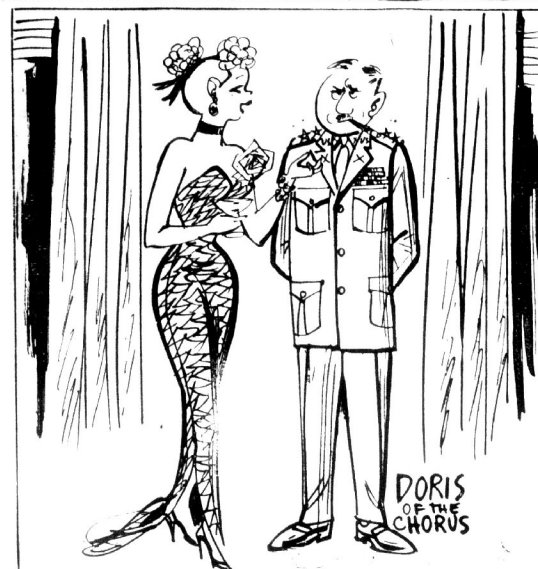

GOOD TIME TO KILL CRABGRASS

For all people August is watermelon time. For some lawn-owners its' crabgrass killing time, also, according to Dr. W. H. Daniel, turf specialist at Purdue University.

For killing growing crabgrass the most used chemical is methyl arsonate, either as di-sodium (DSMA) or amine (AMA) compounds. Some use is made of phenyl mercury acetate (PMA), but its use is declining.

Either DSMA or AMA is available in three forms for consumer convenience. Many who have lawn sprayers will prefer the liquid (16 percent or 25 percent) for ease of measuring, while others may prefer dissolving powders (50 percent - 70 percent). Some may prefer the dry formulations for use in fertilizer spreaders. The latter costs more per unit area treated.

With either combination, two applications five to seven days apart are required. Also, the soil should be moist and grass actively growing for selective results. If wanting to kill broad-leaf weeds (buckhorn, dandelion, etc.) then include 2,4-D in first spray - (avoid drift). Fertilizing to encourage good grass growth is a part of good management each fall.

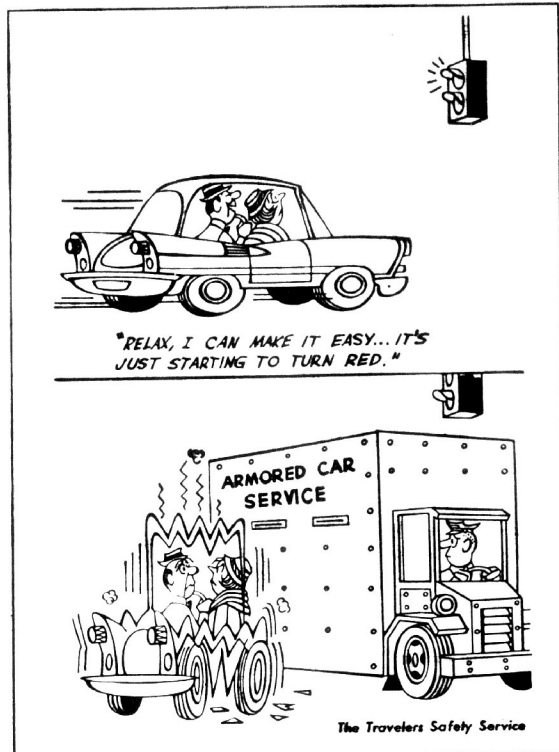

Cover Crops Help Vegetable Gardens

Planting a winter cover crop in your vegetable garden this fall can save you time, hard work and added expense next year, says W. B. Ward, Purdue University extension horticulturist.

A winter cover crop will greatly reduce the erosion of the soil during the winter and will add organic matter to the soil when it is spaded or plowed under next spring, Ward points out. Adding large amounts of organic matter to a vegetable soil is an important factor in keeping high productivity.

Organic matter will help to increase the water-holding capacity of sandy soils (this reduces the number of times extra water will be needed); it makes heavier soils easier to work (less time spent in cultivating and hoeing); it helps to prevent crusting; and it serves as a valuable source of plant nutrients.

Cover crops should be planted between August 15 and October 10, Ward says. The time of

planting will depend on the vegetables being grown, and the cover crop planted.

Ryegrass and rye can be seeded at the time of the last cultivation in such vegetables as sweet corn, peppers and eggplant. Ryegrass becomes established easily. Ryegrass should not be planted much after Sept. 15. Planting after this date results in very limited growth and does not add much organic matter to the soil. Ryegrass should be planted at the rate of one to two pounds for 1000 square feet.

Rye, as a winter cover crop, should be planted at the rate of three to four pounds per 1000 square feet.

Most grass seeds are small and should be planted one-fourth to one-half inches deep. A firm seedbed is necessary when making a summer or fall seeding.

Unfavorable weather following seeding can cause poor stands, the horticulturist says. If the soil becomes dry after the seed sprouts, vegetable growers with irrigation equipment should apply water.

CHECK DRAIN TILE QUALITY

High quality drain tile is one of the requirements for a durable long lasting tile drainage system.

D. R. Sisson, extension agricultural engineer at Purdue University, says the American Society for Testing Materials (ASTM) has set up specifications

for drain tile. They urge tile users to purchase only tile meeting ASTM standards.

Two classes or grades of tile are recognized. They are: Standard drain tile and extra-quality drain tile.

Landowners must use tile of at least "standard" quality to qualify for government incentive payments on tile drainage through the soil conservation program, Sisson advises.

Standard drain tile, either clay or concrete, has a minimum crushing strength of 800 pounds per linear foot. This quality has a maximum absorption of 13 percent for clay and 10 percent for concrete.

For the extra-quality drain tile the minimum crushing strength is 1100 pounds per linear foot for both clay and concrete, and the maximum absorption is 11 percent for clay and eight percent for concrete.

Sisson says that other require-

ments for the tile are that the tile be sound, having a clear ring when tapped with a light hammer, straight in length and circular in cross-section, reasonably smooth on the inside, and free from blisters, checks and cracks that would decrease strength.

Tile users are reminded by Sisson that a new list of approved tile manufacturers Mimeo AE 476 is available from the agricultural engineering department at Purdue.

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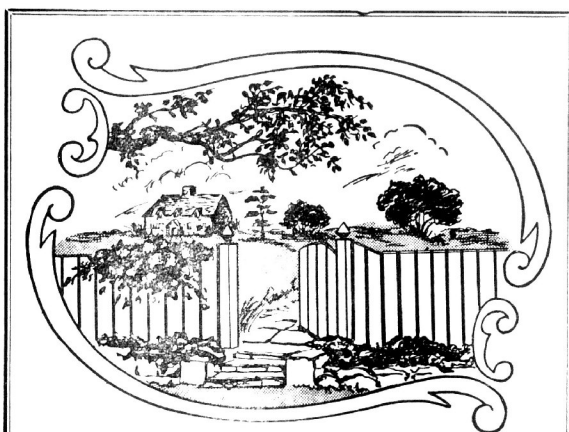

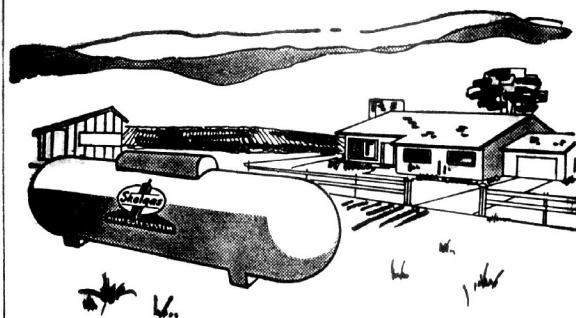
