TVSC board to ask \$3.75 tax rate, hearing set

Board members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation met in a special meeting last Thursday night to discuss the budget for the 1967 calendar year and agreed to advertise for a total rate of \$3.75. Superintendent Forbes had originally asked the board to advertise a rate of \$3.98 which would have been the same rate as was advertised one year ago; however, the final budget as advertised in this week's Mentone News, was \$47,-

500 less than originally requested with a decrease of 23¢ from the original request.

Four of the board members voted to approve the budget for advertisement but Gale Creighton voted "no", explaining that he would not vote for this budget because it did not include appropriations for transfers which he felt were necessary and appropriate for the corporation at this time. He was referring to the Atwood students who are

presently being transferred out of the corporation.

Asked for a report about the assessed valuation of Harrison Township which dropped \$413,650, Forbes replied that he had been concerned about this item and had checked with Noble Blocker, county auditor, and Ray Eckert, Harrison township trustee, and had been informed that two companies, Kayline Trailer and Michiana Equipment, were largely responsible for the drop. The drop in these two companies' valuation was due to the new laws which give tax breaks to trucking companies, railroads and other utilities. The superintendent pointed out to the board that the advertised rate for 1967 would raise by taxation over \$60,000 less than the advertised rate

of 1966.

Discussion was held with reference to the building program, and it was pointed out that it would be necessary to appropriate funds to carry on the additions to the Mentone School and the Akron Grade School. An advertisement for a special appropriation in the amount of \$380,000 from the Cumulative Building Fund was approved by the board and also appears in this week's issue of the Mentone News. The only dissenting vote cast on this motion was by Gale Creighton. The hearings for both the budget and special appropriation will be held by the school board in the superintendent's office on August 25 as prescribed by law.

Other business transacted by the board included a financial report by Forbes, a report on the bus repairs presently being done, the approval of a bus driver contract and the re-hiring of Gordon Kauffman as shop teacher at Mentone to replace Mr. Fisher who resigned.

Assessments in Kosciusko County Up \$1,255,340

Total Valuations in County \$112,020,460; Town Values Down

The assessed valuation of property in Kosciusko County has increased \$1,255,340 this year, to a total of \$112,020,460, according to figures compiled in the county auditor's office. Last year the valuation was \$110,765,340. Town valuations decreased \$943,500 and townships increased \$2,198,840, an indication of the trend of business and residential construction beyond corporation limits. Railroad and utilities assessments were down \$457,590, or \$11,991,570. Valuation of the various taxing units were:

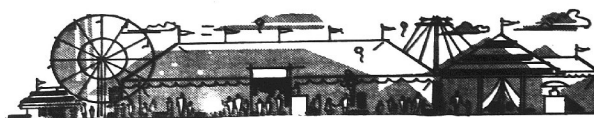

A Guest Editorial

Mentone Missing the Boat - (Airplane)?

An interesting article appeared in last week's Mentone News listing various festivals which are held in many small towns throughout Indiana each summer. The one thing these have in common is the fact that each is centered around the theme of something unique to its particular town. For instance, Tell City- "Schweizer Fest", Corydon- "Rockathon Trading Weekend", and Peru, the Circus City- "Circus Days."

Mentone has tried starting its own little festival, and what has the town taken on which to base it's theme? Nothing. (Chickens are hardly unique to this one community.) Yet Mentone has the potential for what could probably be one of the most interesting themes in the state- The heritage of Lawrence Bell.

In this age of flight, it was a great honor for this town to be so well remembered by a man as famous, successful, and great as Lawrence Bell. He thought enough of his home town, Mentone, to leave funds for a school library, to leave funds which were used in the Public Library, and to leave to this town his priceless collection of personal mementos. Some more of it is in the Bell Memorial High

School Library, taking up space badly needed for classrooms. The rest is stored away in a generous citizen's house.

Mentone could publicize itself as the Home of Lawrence Bell. The July festival could be known as Lawrence Bell Days. A small museum could be built to house the collection he left, and a small fee charged for admission to finance it. Handled right, it could become nationally known. The Mentone Flying Club is an active organization, and could be an aid to this venture. The fact that two Mentone area men, Bob Herendeen and Lewis Meredith, became very successful professional pilots could be worked into the history of this flying town. Bob Herendeen's growing reputation as a stunt pilot would add even more to it.

Any Mentone resident visiting Bell Aircraft at Buffalo, New York is treated as a special guest. Possibly Bell Aircraft would be willing to help in some way.

Plant Physical Check-Up Will Be Held At Co-op

Growers in this area may have their crop plants given an "annual physical check-up". The annual ORTHO Crop Health Center, sponsored by Northern Indiana Co-Op has been scheduled to be held on Wednesday, August 17, 1966 at Mentone. Max Maichele, ORTHO Agronomist, will conduct the clinic between the hours of 8:30 A.M.-3:30 P.M. so that growers may have their crop plants given a free tissue test.

Growers are invited to attend the Crop Health Center and bring three freshly cut plants of corn. The ORTHO Agronomist will make on-the-spot tests for nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

Growers are invited to bring three freshly cut plants from a single area they want tested. The entire plant with leaves attached should be brought to the clinic. The ORTHO Agronomist suggests that corn plants should be in the early tasseling stage.

There will be no charge for testing three plants.

Tissue tests can indicate how well the fertility program is meeting the needs of the crop. Chemical tests have been developed which indicate the level of



nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium in plant tissues. Using these tests, the ORTHO Agronomist can determine which, if any, nutrient is most limiting yields. By adjusting his fertilization program, based on the results of the tissue tests, a grower can provide a more balanced diet for his crop. By nual physical check-up". The providing nutrients that may be limiting yields, growers can achieve greater yield and profit potentials.

Grain stored in commercial warehouses will be eligible for price support only if the warehouse has a Uniform Grain Storage Agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This reminder was issued this week by local conservation officials who remind farmers who plan to store wheat and other grain in a commercial warehouse that they should make sure that the elevator or warehouse has signed the agreement with the Commodity Credit Corp.

Wheat farmers were reminded this week that no diversion program will be in effect for the 1967 wheat crop. Wheat Program participants will be able to qualify for domestic marketing certificates and price-support loans. The county chairman said that it is particularly important for farmers with small wheat allotments to remember that diversion payments are no longer available. Many of these farmers have been diverting all or a part of their wheat allotment acres for payment in recent years; however, no income can be derived from the Wheat Program in 1967 unless the crop is planted.

Bishop Opposes School Prayer Amendment

Rev. Richard C. 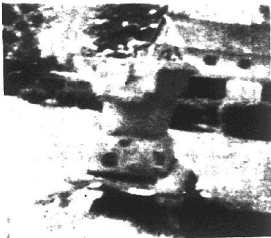

Mentone Lions Will Sponsor Horse Show

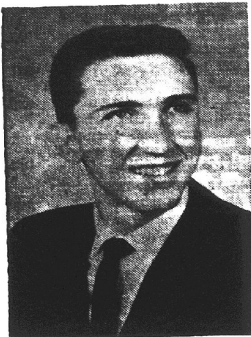

Some Risk Involved With Silage From Drought Stricken Corn Fields

There is some risk in feeding corn silage or green chopped corn from fields that have been drought stricken. On certain occasions, a high nitrate level will occur in these fields but with proper precautions the risk need not be too great, according to Don Frantz, County Extension Agent.

It is probably advisable to let the ears mature to the dent stage. This will increase whatever value is present and will reduce the level of nitrates in the stalks and leaves. The danger of highest nitrate levels appear to be following a rain permitting the plants to start growth again but should decline fairly rapidly to a normal amount.

Corn silage has caused no trouble in the county in past years. The nitrates of the plants will be reduced as the plants ensile. They will be removed in the form of nitrogen dioxide gas. This is very dangerous to persons working around the silo but it usually subsides in 10 to 14 days.

In feeding questionable forage

crops, it is advisable to start slowly and observe the livestock carefully. It is also important to be sure that the Vitamin A level is adequate.

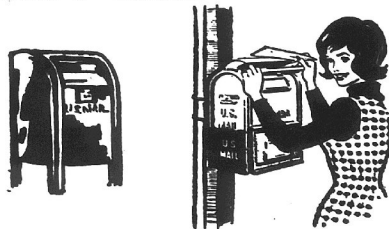

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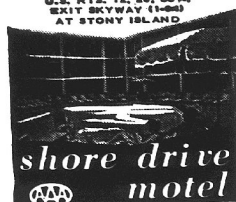

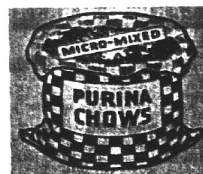

Shepherd entered the Army last February and completed basic training at Fort Bragg, N. C. He was last stationed at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

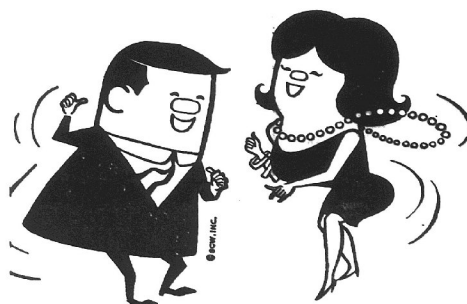

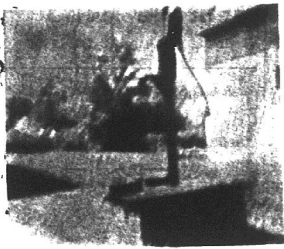

Farmers Urged To Plan Ahead For ACP

Farmers are urged to plan now for 1967 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices by getting their soils tested now. Clem Good, Chairman of the Fulton ASC County Committee said today.

Soil tests will be required for all ACP pasture seeding practices approved under a new, more liberal cost-sharing policy, Good stated.

Under the Agricultural Conservation Program the government shares costs with farmers for the establishment of stands of grasses and legumes for protection against wind and water erosion. One of the basis needs of a good ground cover is the proper application of fertilizer and limestone, he said.

Farmers know and use soil tests for corn, wheat and other crops, but sometimes apply only minimum minerals to pasture seeding. The Federal Government feels that in going further to cost-share for added land treatment, the establishment of good stands is insured.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation ASC County Office is located at 513 Main St. in Rochester, Ind. Farmers are invited to contact that office for information, and soil testing supplies.

TVSC Building Program Continues After Complaints Are Heard

A hearing concerning the proposed TVSC tax rate of \$3.75 and the request for \$380,000 additional appropriation to continue the building program at the Akron and Mentone schools was conducted Thursday night in the superintendent's office.

No objections were heard concerning the proposed tax rate, but the request for additional appropriations brought a barrage of diverse comments and criticisms. William A. Ettinger, Mentone, was the first to speak. He stated that he did not oppose the idea of building because he felt that additional classroom facilities were needed. He said, however, that he did feel it would be wrong to add to the Mentone school due to the varied age levels in attendance and suggested a separate elementary building be constructed in the area of the present garage on the Mentone school grounds. He suggested the board might save time and money by utilizing the plans for the Burket Elementary School for this building and suggested that it be completed as soon as was economically feasible.

Superintendent Forbes and board member Gail Creighton questioned Ettinger concerning this proposal, and Ettinger read a two page request for reconsideration which he had previously prepared. He asked that his comments be recorded as protests to the special appropriation, saying that although he was a "lazy citizen" for being so late with his protest, he felt the board had previously been in no mood to discuss another course of action. He further commented that he felt the Mentone building would never be adaptable as an elementary school building in the event a centralized high school were built.

Board members O. L. McFadden and Creighton agreed that Mr. Ettinger had had little previous time in which to register a complaint, but Forbes said that the original plans was adopted last November 15. Richard Dickerhoff, a resident of Franklin township, agreed that little protest time had been allowed residents of the corporation and stated that a local electrician had informed him the Mentone wiring was a mess. He therefore questioned the advisability of adding more to the present load at that building. Forbes challenged that statement and a similar one made by Ettinger in regard to the heating system. He (Forbes) stated that both the boiler and the electrical system were in excellent condition.

After some mild discussion, the board took no action on Ettinger's proposal and heard protests from other local residents. Harold Miller, Akron, stated he wanted to go on record as being opposed to the spending on school additions, feeling that it was just a stop-gap procedure instead of an answer to the solution.

Gerald Clinker, Akron, asked how long the state would allow the corporation to operate with two schools, stating that the Warsaw superintendent had told him he would not have released the Kosciusko county group had he known no building program would follow. Forbes replied that the corporation was double the required number of students now.

Al Price, also of Akron, stated that the Akron rooms could always be used and that he felt the corporation had a commitment to the children to properly house them. He stated he approved the additional appropriation.

Clinker and Miller stated that the Beaver Dam repairs were made on a short-range basis but each stated that Forbes had told them that the Beaver Dam School would be used for 20 years. Forbes hotly denied this statement, and Clinker retorted that he would stake his own integrity against Forbes' any time. At this point, Eldon Cumberland, board president, angrily brought the meeting to order and threatened to clear the room if any more discussion of personalities arose. This concluded the protests on additional appropriations, and the board voted to adopt the special resolution.

The board unofficially set 1970 as a target date to have new high school facilities. The unofficial pool was taken at an executive session of the board and was reported at Thursday night's meeting by Forbes.

Three members of the Beaver Dam 4-H advisory board, Loren Cumberland, Orval Swick, and Merl Harrold, appeared and asked the board's permission to use a school bus to transport 4-H youngsters to the state fair. Much discussion resulted and Forbes, who has previously denied every request made by the group, reiterated his position that the penalty of a ten-day jail sentence or a \$50 fine would fall on the board. The penalty is outlined for all use of school busses for other than school groups. Harrold pointed out that the 4-H boys and girls were all of school age, and Dickerhoff

Editorial

As a crow flies, 199 square miles would require extra provision to make the whole trip. However, crows don't fly the routes that school busses meander, and although no school bus in this corporation (which comprises 199 square miles) ever covers the whole area, some of the students must ride 42 miles a day. It is no wonder that their parents are seeking steps to shorten their daily travels as are the Atwood parents who protest having to send their children to Talma.

We have long felt that the corporation was oversize and that it could easily be two corporations—not a north and south campus or one sprawling high school with a hand full of far flung elementary and junior high schools—but two separate corporations. The superintendent of schools told several taxpayers at Thursday night's board meeting that the corporation had twice the required number of pupils. Certainly, it has more than its share of miles to be covered by youngsters, many of whom ride over an hour to school and many of whom get on the bus in the dark.

Two corporations with two complete school systems could be operated more efficiently than the one school system we now have. Anyone who has ever

attended a school board meeting or who has tried to make a protest has surely noticed that no records are ever available. "They are filed away somewhere."

Not only could two corporations more easily attune themselves to the needs of their residents, but the boards of the corporations could keep in better touch with all the residents of their respective corporations. A representative from Atwood can understand the problems of his community and can sympathize with the problems of the Millark community as well as a representative from Burket can sympathize with the needs of the residents living along the Tippecanoe River. However, neither can feel the same need that the other feels and that their represented people would like them to feel. In short, two corporations could be handled on a much more personal basis, with each resident feeling more a part of the whole rather than a minute cog in the wheel.

Dividing the corporation would prevent the administration's work load from becoming so stifling. Granted that LBJ's programs have quadrupled the load of paper work that must be completed, much time is spent searching for laws. The local administration recently quoted from the new set of Burns Statutes which grace the superintendent's office, as they should, that the 4-H cannot have the school busses for any purpose whatsoever because 4-H is not specifically set out in the list of groups who may use the busses.

The same set of Burns Statutes contains a law known as Burns 49-703, commonly known as a law to require the publication of a complete annual report. The local administration saw fit to overlook this law and published an incomplete report, omitting the names and salaries of the teachers and administrators, an act punishable as a misdemeanor under Burns 49-709, a law which has been in effect since 1927 despite two attempts by school groups to have it removed. However, since the teacher's salaries were read aloud at a public meeting, there must be no objection to anyone's knowing these figures. Rather, the administrative salaries have been secreted from their employers, the taxpayers, by be-

ing discussed in an executive session which further reading would have shown to be a violation of the Hughes Anti-Secrecy Act. Research would have shown them that this was covered by Chapter 307 of the Acts of 1965 which became effective June 1, 1965, section 302 (4) of which states: All meetings of the governing body shall be open to the public to an extent required by, and the governing body shall comply with, Acts 1953, c. 115 (which is the Hughes Anti-Secrecy law).

The board members have their own businesses to operate, and they hire personnel to run the functions of the corporation expecting that all laws will be carefully obeyed and complied with and that good examples will be set for the school children. It would be natural for them to think that if one law could be cited, another could just as easily be cited and they would have no need to question their employee on this matter. Therefore, we again maintain that two corporations, with two separate administrations, would be better equipped to attend to all the laws, not merely one law which could be run out and quoted concerning an organization for which the administrator has a very obvious dislike.

There are many other sound arguments for having two corporations instead of one, and we delve into them next week. In the meantime we welcome all letters and ideas, pro and con, on this subject.

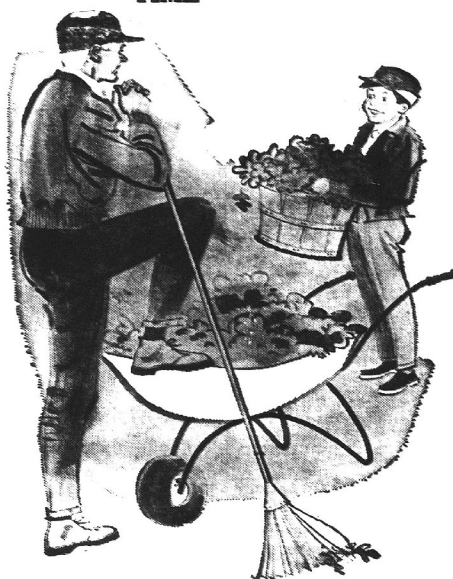

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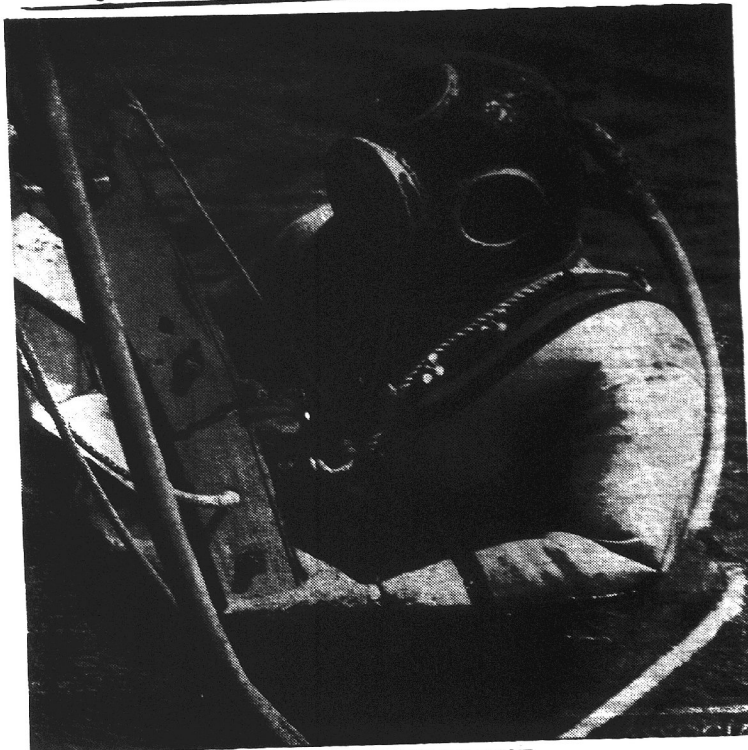
