Dave Vallow Is Oldest Pilot



Dave Vallow, shown with his wife, was presented a trophy for being the oldest pilot present at Saturday's Fly-In at the Mentone Airport. Chick Herendeen, left, airport owner, made the presentation on behalf of the Mentone Chamber of Commerce and the Mentone Flying Club. Vallow, 67, learned to fly in France at the close of World War I. He soloed at Orley Field on November 22, 1918 after having had two hours and ten minutes of instruction in a Voisin airplane with a Belgian instructor.

Vallow remarked that learning to fly cost him \$1,000 and then hastened to add that he had paid the Belgian pilot two cartons of American cigarettes in return for the lessons. American cigarettes were then selling in France for \$500 per carton although they cost him only a few cents.

Remaining to help build Orley Field, which was then only one kilometer or five eighths of a mile square and surrounded by a stone wall, Vallow planned to fly the Atlantic on his return. Strategic plans had been made, but, unfortunately, Gen. Pershing learned of the plan and squelched it. "Otherwise," Vallow quipped, "I would have been the first man to cross the Atlantic."

Returning to this country, Vallow maintained his interest in aviation. He was a stunt pilot for many years and personally knew Eddie Rickenbacker, Frank Luke, and many of the other greats in aviation. Currently manager of the Knox airport, he does all the maintenance work on

the Mentone Flying Club's planes as well as many others in northern Indiana and Illinois.

The youngest licensed pilot present was Jim Bob Ewen, 24, Rochester. Charles Carter, Pulaski, Wisconsin, who learned to fly at the Mentone airport, received a trophy for having come the greatest distance. The Knox Flying Club won the fourth trophy for having the most members present.

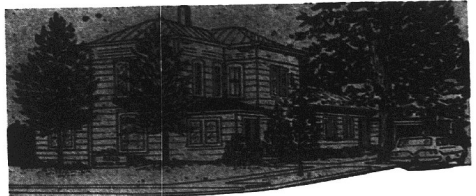

School bd. adopts budget, sets \$3.96 rate

In a special meeting Wednesday night, members of the Tippecanoe Valley school board adopted a budget for the 1968 school year totaling \$1,210,521.00, an increase of \$130,355.00 over last year. A tax rate of \$3.96 was set. This includes an operating account of \$3.14 and a cumulative building fund of .82.

A special meeting will be held August 31 to hear any remonstrances against the tax levy. Further protests may be lodged when the State Board of Accounts meets to hear the budget. Last year's proposed levy of \$3.75 was cut by the state board to \$3.50.

The increase in this year's budget was necessitated primarily by a raise in the tuition fund. More teachers with advanced degrees, teacher raises, the

speech and hearing program, and teachers for the eight new classrooms were given as reasons for this increase.

In addition to these factors,

the county wide school tax of 25¢ in Fulton county and 28¢ in Kosciusko county has been dropped, thereby adding to the school tax.

Social Security Handbook Available

Why should a man with a wife and young children concern himself with anything that seems far away as social security?

A new booklet, "Social Security Information for Young Families," specifically designed to answer this question is now available, social security district manager, Mr. Charles E. Burke announced today.

"Social Security is not just a retirement program, and it is not just for old people," Mr. Burke said. This new booklet gives the young worker important information about the survivors and disability protection that he and his family have now.

Nine out of ten families in Indiana have social security protection which can amount to over \$75,000 in benefits if the breadwinner in the family should die, Mr. Burke pointed out.

Disability insurance is the other social security program of particular importance to the young worker. After just five years of work under social security, the worker and his family are eligible to receive monthly benefit payment if he should become severely disabled and the condition is expected to last a year or longer.

Carnival Cakes Have Swiss Origin

Native to Switzerland is the carnival cake, sometimes called scrambled pancakes. They get the name wrinkled or scrambled from the way they look due to the way they are fried. The cakes are very thin rounds of dough which are fried in deep fat in a pan that is too small for the cakes. As it is fried, the edges of the cakes curl up and give the attractive curled appearance.

| 2 cups sifted flour | 1 teaspoon kirsch (optional) |
| 1/4 cup corn starch | 1/4 teaspoon salt |
| 2 tablespoons milk | 3 eggs |
| 2 tablespoons light cream | 1 quart corn oil, for frying |
| 1 tablespoon margarine, melted | Confectioners sugar |

Sift flour and corn starch together. Combine milk, cream, margarine, kirsch, salt and eggs; beat well with rotary beater. Stir in flour mixture, mixing until dough forms. Knead on floured board or cloth until dough is smooth and elastic, about 5 minutes. Cover; let rest in warm place 30 minutes.

Divide into 16 equal parts. Roll out two parts to 3-inch circles on floured board, keeping other portions of dough covered. Sprinkle one circle generously with flour; place second circle on top. Roll out to thin circle, then carefully separate two pieces, over back of hand if necessary. Stretch, if needed, to form 7-inch circles. Dust off excess flour and place circles between two layers of clean cloth. Continue rolling until all 16 pieces of dough are 7-inch circles; keep covered.

Then heat corn oil in deep skillet or large heavy saucepan to 375° F. (Oil must be at least 1 inch deep, but should not fill more than 1/2 full). Drop two dough circles into hot oil, one at a time, and fry turning once, until light brown on both sides (about 2 minutes). Remove both cakes together; drain on paper towels in low temperature oven to keep warm, if desired. Continue cooking until all cakes have been cooked. Dust with confectioners sugar before serving. Makes 8 cakes.

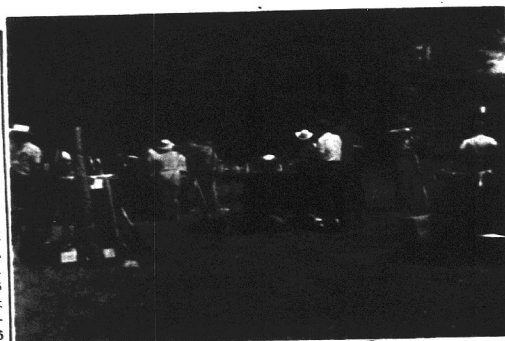

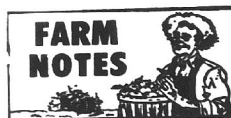

Well sir, I've gotta close for now. If all this talk sounds silly to you its just because I'm be-

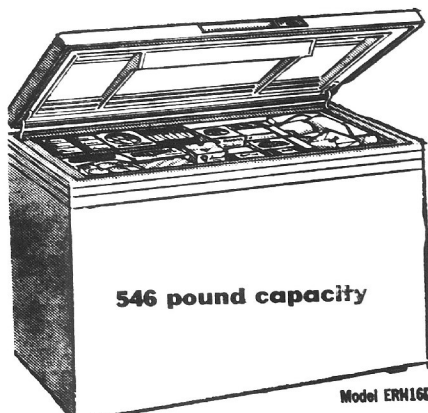

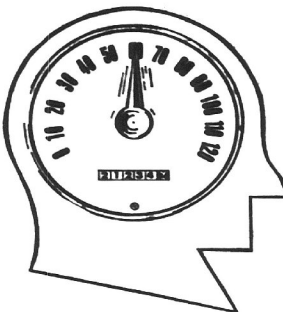

Purdue Man On Review Committee

WASHINGTON—Richard Tombaugh, Director of Financial Aids at Purdue University, has accepted appointment to the program review committee for the Nurse Training Act of 1964.

His appointment, along with that of Mrs. Alice Mickelwait of Seattle, brings this group to a full complement of 25 experts in health and health-related fields. The chairman is Dr. William Robert Willard, dean of the University of Kentucky's Medical School.

The program review committee will consider how well the 1964 act has functioned in upgrading nursing education and increasing the number of nurses.

By Nov. 1 the committee will

submit a report to Health, and Education and Welfare Secretary John W. Gardner advising whether the aid given students and schools of nursing should be expanded, modified or extended beyond the present authorization which ends June 30, 1969.

Set Rules For

Motorcycle Owners

The following rules were set by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana for motorcycle owners.

SECTION 1. No resident person shall drive or operate a motorcycle on the public streets or highways of this state until said driver or operator shall have secured a regular operator's license from the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of this state.

SEC. 2. In addition to all other laws and regulations applicable to the driving and operation of motorcycles on the public streets and highways, the following shall also apply:

(a) Not more than one passenger in addition to the operator shall be carried by a motorcycle having only two wheels in contact with the ground or pavement, and no passengers shall be carried in addition to the driver or operator except upon a firmly attached and regular seat designed for passenger use.

(b) No passenger shall be carried on a motorcycle in a position that interferes with the operation or control of the motorcycle or the view of the operator.

(c) No person operating a motorcycle shall carry any packages, bundles, or other articles which prevent the operator from keeping both hands on the handle bars.

(d) No person shall drive, operate or ride as a passenger on any motorcycle having only two wheels in contact with the ground or pavement in any position other than astride the seat or saddle provided.

(e) Headlamps shall be illuminated at all times when a motorcycle is in operation.

(f) All motor vehicles, including motorcycles, are entitled to the full use of a traffic lane and no vehicle shall be driven or operated in such a manner so as to deprive any other vehicle of the full use of a traffic lane provided that motorcycles may, with the consent of both drivers, be operated not more than two abreast in a single traffic lane.

(g) All other traffic regulations adopted before or after the effective date of this act and all rights and duties incurred therefrom which apply to motor vehicle drivers or operators generally, shall apply to the drivers and operators of motorcycles except those which expressly do not apply or which by their nature can have no application.

SEC. 3. At all times when a motorcycle is being driven or operated on the public streets or highways at this state, the driver and passengers shall:

(a) Wear protective headgear meeting the minimum standards set by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles.

(b) Shall have protective glasses, goggles or transparent face shields in their possession.

SEC. 4. No motorcycles shall be operated on the public streets or highways by a resident of this state which:

(a) Is equipped with handlebars that raise more than fifteen inches above the level of the driver's seat or saddle, when occupied;

(b) Is not equipped with brakes in good working order on both front and rear wheels;

(c) It not equipped with foot rests or pegs for both operators and passenger; and

(d) Is not equipped with lamps and reflectors meeting the standards of the United States Department of Commerce, as amended.

SEC. 5. No person shall rent, lease, or furnish a motorcycle to any person for use on the public streets and highways who is not regularly licensed to operate a motor vehicle, by the state, if a resident, and by the state of which he is a resident, if a non-resident.

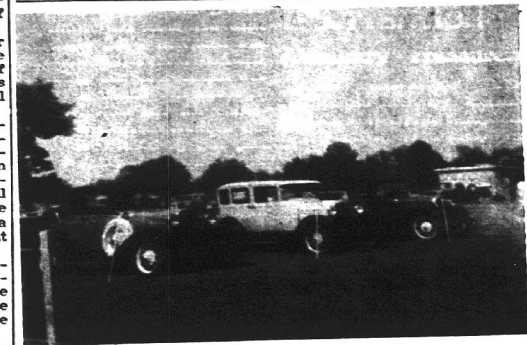
(a) It shall be unlawful for a person to whom a motorcycle is rented, leased or furnished to

rent, sublease or otherwise authorize the use of the motorcycle on the streets and highways to any person who is not licensed to operate a vehicle in this state.

(b) It shall be unlawful to rent, lease, or furnish any motorcycle that is not in safe operating condition.

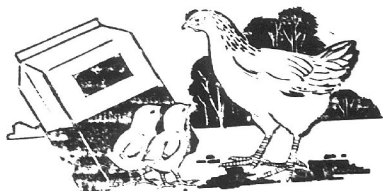

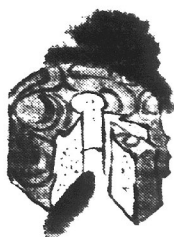

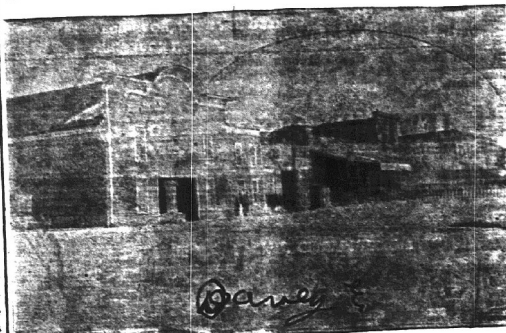

Expressway Driving Tips

Lafayette, Ind. Keep vacation trips accident free by following some expressway driving tips, suggests Dick Wilsley, Extension safety specialist at Purdue University.

Take time to plan your trip carefully, marking expressway entrances and exits on your map. When driving, watch for the exit before the one you want so you can get into the turn-off lane well in advance.

If you miss your exit, don't stop or slow down—go on to the next exit. Decrease speed rapidly once you're in the deceleration lane, but not when leaving the expressway.

Don't cause a rear-end crash by following too closely. Remember, under good conditions,

it takes 23 car lengths to stop a car going 60 miles an hour. Avoid driving fatigue by taking frequent rest stops and coffee breaks. Above all, start rested, plan a reasonable schedule and stick to it.

Have your car in top running order before you start traveling. But if your car should break down on an expressway, pull off the road onto the right hand shoulder, raise your hood, tie a white handkerchief to your radio aerial or door handle and wait for help from police or a service car. If your car is equipped with emergency flashers use them—but not your turn signals. At night, turn on the inside overhead light. Never walk for help or hitchhike.

Selective Service Answers Questions

Q. In regard to college student deferments, is a junior college considered an institution of higher learning?

A. Yes, if the credits given by the junior college are acceptable toward the granting of a baccalaureate degree by a college, university, or similar institution of learning.

Q. What are the limitations, if any, on how long a person can be deferred as an undergraduate college student? A registrant can be deferred in Class II-S as an undergraduate college student until he satisfies the requirement for his baccalaureate degree if completed within the normal and specified time, fails to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction, or becomes 24 years of age, whichever occurs first.

Q. Will registrants who become fathers after the new selective service law became effective be deferred in Class III-A?

A. Every case is considered on an individual basis hence an

all-inclusive answer cannot be given.

The only change made in eligibility requirements for deferment as a father (Class III-A) under the Military Selective Service Act of 1967, as compared with the former Universal Military Training and Service Act, is the addition of a restriction that registrants who are classified in Class III-S after the new selective service law went into effect (June 30, 1967) shall not be eligible for classification in Class III-A as fathers but may qualify on the basis of hardship to dependents.

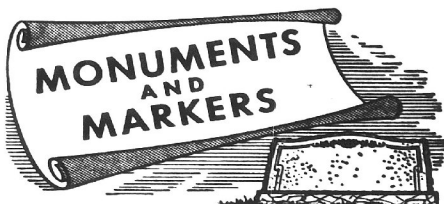

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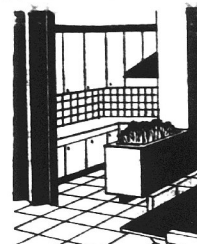

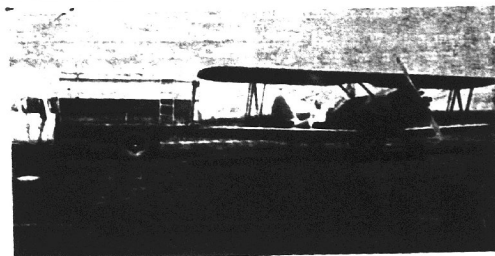

Rye Seeding Is Done By Plane

Local farmers planted rye Monday. Nearly everyone in town watched. Some complained. The rest of us enjoyed watching the operation. For the benefit of those who didn't see or hear the seeding operation, we hasten to add that it was done by airplane. Mike Ballee, a former Rochester resident, flew the Stearman plane, a massive bi-wing with a 450 hp engine. The huge engine is needed to enable the plane to make rapid ascent when nearing trees and light lines. The plane has a capacity of 1000 pounds of seed and can plant as many as 1000 acres of rye each day.

Ballee was accompanied to Mentone by an assistant who rode in the grain bin of the plane. He is based at Rusk Aviation, Kankakee, Ill.

Tippecanoe Home Economics Club Tours Plymouth

The Tippecanoe Home Economics club members enjoyed an outing by visiting several places of interest in the Plymouth area.

They were first taken on a tour of the new buildings of the Del Electric, Inc., electrical contractors for this region. Then dinner was enjoyed at the Schori Restaurant.

In the afternoon, the group visited the Bomarko, Inc. plant north of Plymouth where they make waxed paper, both laminated and the single sheets. Little does one realize when using waxed paper, the complicated process through which the paper has gone. According to our guide, Mr. Harvey Larson, the company is four years old and now employs on an average of eighty people. A special wax is used on the paper and the machinery through which it goes, enables one to separate it easily. About eight thousand gallons per week is used. The big rolls of paper weigh from twelve hundred to sixteen hundred pounds. It is taken through paper cutters, which cut it into exact pieces. The cutoff paper they discard amounts to five thousand pounds a day.

The next place of interest was the Plymouth Airport. Here the group was guided on a tour by Mr. Russell Repp, who showed pictures of people who were interested in flying and the long row of "shirt tails" of the men and women, who had made their first solo flight. Even though the group didn't fly, they were given the opportunity of sitting in the \$700,000 jet, wondering how they would feel flying five hundred sixty five miles an hour through the air on the deeply upholstered seats. The gas is carried in the wings as well as the back of the jet, which is capable of starting almost straight up.

On the fields there were sev-

eral planes that were used in teaching people to fly. A pilot must pass three tests, a flight test, a written test, and an oral test before getting his license.

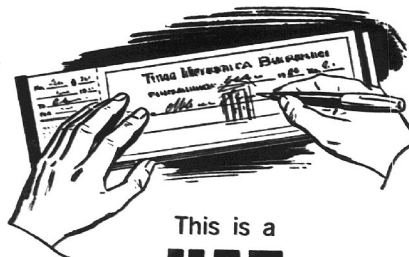
