

# Vaccinate Hogs For Cholera

A recent epidemic of hog cholera in northwestern Iowa and western Illinois points out that such an outbreak could appear next in Indiana swine, says Dr. T. M. Curtin, Purdue University extension veterinarian.

Several times the disease appeared to be checked, only to break out in an adjacent area. However, it appears to have been stopped before reaching Indiana.

Many Indiana farmers failed to vaccinate their herds recently because hog cholera losses have not been serious. As a result, the state now has a large population of susceptible swine in which the disease could gain a foothold.

Veterinarians estimate that less than 35 per cent of Indiana's swine has protection. Control on an area or sectional basis requires more than 60 per cent immunization.

Dr. Curtin urges hog raisers to protect their herds against cholera. Only vaccination can prevent this disease, he emphasizes.

### LIBRARIAN'S **ANNUAL REPORT**

Because patrons have asked questions about the organization and administration of the library, in this last month of the year I am submitting to the public this report of the operations of the Mentone Public Library.

The library serves and is supported by the towns of Mentone and Etna Green, and by Harrison. Franklin and Etna townships. In addition, at the present time the library is giving limit ed contract service to the Burket school and Franklin school

The library is governed by a board of five members who serve without pay. Three members are appointed by the judge and two by the town board, each for a term of four years.

The library board must pass the yearly budget, approve all bills, and sign vouchers for all money paid out. In addition, the board hires a librarian and decides all matters of library policy

The librarian is required to have two years of college training, an additional semester of library science and a librarian's certificate issued by the State of Indiana

Although the budget is published each year, it is not itemized. I here submit an itemized statement of the library budget for 1960 which was passed by the library board, approved by the State Board of Tax Commissioners, is on file at the library and may be examined by any taxpayer as required by law.

Salaries: librarian \$130 per month, assistants \$96 per month which is divided among the assistants according to the time worked by each at an hourly rate of 75c per hour. Allowance for janitorial work \$200 per

Trial fuel allowance to be adjusted when the actual expense of firing the new furnace is known, \$400 per year.

Allowance for lights \$100 and water \$17 per year. Telephone \$100 per year.

The operation of the library is under the supervision of the State Library. The budget each year must be published and approved by the State Board of Tax Commissioners. The financial records of the library are examined regularly by a representative of the State Board of Accounts and all expenses for each year must come within the amounts published in the yearly budget.

# Storage Of **Farm Machinery**

Changes in the weather are as hard on farm machinery as the work it does.

Different moisture and temperature levels during "off season" storage leave moisture deposits in bearings, fuel tanks, and on crop or soil working parts of machines. This moisture causes rust and shortens the life of bearings and moving parts.

C. L. Hill, Purdue University agricultural engineer, says most Indiana farmers recognize this problem. Many of them use plastic sheets to combat the harmful effects of weather. The sheets need not be new-they can be used plastic from last season's bunker silo, corn crib or hay stack.

Use of this plastic as a moisture barrier makes good sense, says Hill. And so does its use to cover machinery inside a shed.

Farmers should read and heed instructions of the manufacturer of an engine to be stored unused over the winter.

### ADJUST FOR WINTER HAZARDS

Disregard for nature's traffic laws may be more deadly than a violation of man-made laws, says F. R. Willsey, Purdue University farm safety specialist. This is especially true when nature's wintertime laws are in force.

Most accidents do not occur during heavy snowfalls when traffic is slowed almost to a standstill and many persons stay at home, he adds. Such things as slush, light freezing isolated slick spots, muddy spray on the windshield drizzle, and fogged windows are likely to lead to a rash of accidents.

know and obey the natural laws that apply to safe driving. When special winter hazards are involved, stopping distances increase and visibility often decreases.

Willsey says much of the problem could be solved if we would adjust our speed to the conditions. Pumping the brakes when attempting to stop on snow, ice or wet pavement advises.

Even on dry roads it pays to helps, as does turning the front wheels in the direction of the skid when the car starts to slide sideways.

People going from heavily traveled highways where snow and ice have been worn away must adjust when they reach country roads that often remain slick much longer.



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



terioration. were made for cropland, pasture land, woodland, and other land.

In a previous meeting, estimates were made as to major land use changes that will take place in the county between 1959 and 1975.

Figures for this inventory were obtained by making a physical soil survey of two percent of the county. The 160 tracts that were surveyed were scattered over the entire county to give a representative sample. The information was then projected to give acreage figures for the entire county.

The committee arrived at the following conclusions in comparing 1959 figures with 1975 estimates. Cropland will decrease from 251,000 acres to 236,000. Pasture land will decrease from 17,000 in 1959 to 15,000 acres in 1975. Woodland will decrease from 34.000 acres to 20,000 acres. Other land—which is land in farmsteads, idle areas, and rural housing developments-will increase from 18,000 to 19,000 acres. About 30,000 acres will go out of the above mentioned categories and into housing developments, industrial sites, roads, and recreational areas.

Of the 236,000 cropland acreage it was estimated that 80,000 needed treatment-either drainage or erosion control. The lo-cal inventory was made as a part of the State and National Conservation Needs Inventory carried out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.



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# Schools Face Revolutionary Changes Friendly Neighbors

(As Printed in the Indianapolis Star)

By David G. Watson

More than two-thirds of Indiana's nearly 1,000 public school systems are scheduled for oblivion.

They will go within the next decade, and more likely within the next four years one of the state's key education researchers estimates.

Most authorities agree that it will be the most revolutionary development in school administration in the last 100 years. They also regard it as one of the most desirable.

The Indiana General Assembly agrees. Early this year it tricts. Supervision was vested in passed the law which made the district trustees. revolution possible. It is called the School Corporation Reorganization Act.

With this tool provided by the legislature, weak school systems may be merged with the strong, the rich with the poor, and the districts may be better divided and arranged for the convenience of pupils, their teachers and those who foot the bills-the taxpayers.

As envisioned by leaders in education, small high schools should be able to broaden courses of study; teachers concentrate on subjects for which are trained, and new schools should be easier to pay

"There is considerable resistance to the proposition of reorganizing school corporations,' said David D. Davis, Chairman of the State Commission. "There are many factors which contribute to this resistance."

"In some communities the attitude boils down to this: 'I went to school here; we have done well and there is no reason why tion. our children should not do as well as we have.

In some districts parents oppose a merged school system because they might lose a school band; a basketball team might lose its identity; a rich community might balk at sharing its wealth with a poor neigh-

Some communities exist only mal scientists.

because they have grown up around a school. People in them fear consolidation as the first step in a decline through loss

of identity with the school. These differences are minor only to those not faced with the task of resolving them.

When the state's Constitution was adopted in 1816, the need was for schools in settled areas and within walking distance for the pupils.

As a result, the area school system was established and the management of schools set up on the basis of attendance dis-

The system was not manda-It was not invoked in tory. many sections of the state and thousands of children were left without a chance for schooling.

There was no change until 1852, following adoption of the second Constitution in 1851. With a constitution mandate to provide a uniform system of public schools available to all, state authorities abolished the district system as an administrative unit and replaced it with the township unit. Cities and towns also were being authorized to set up schools independent of the townships.

Township school boards operated the township schools for seven years, but in 1859 the powers of the boards were shifted to civil township trustees.

In the following 100 years the Legislature passed a few laws allowing consolidations and creation of township school boards. But the law passed this year is the first to provide for a systo school here; my parents went tematic, comprehensive reorganization of all school administra-





### **October Hog** Slaughter Record

October commercial slaughter of hogs in Indiana was the largest since slaughter rec ords began in 1947, state-federal agricultural statisticians at Purdue University report. And the liveweight of these hogs also set a record.

1

statisticians The 452,000 hogs were killed in Oc-Their liveweight totaled 108,028,000 pounds, eight percent more than the September total and 12 percent above that of October, 1958.

Liveweight of all commercially slaughtered livestock during October totaled 163,416,000 lbs. five percent higher than September and four percent above Octtober. Their liveweight totaled

Liveweight of the 52,000 cattle killed was 52,052,000 lbs., one percent below the September total and seven percent below October, 1958. The 7,000 calves killed had a total liveweight of 1,498,000 pounds, 8 percent below September and 49 percent below October of last year.

The 20,200 sheep and lambs slaughtered had a total live-weight of 1,838,000 pounds, 18 percent higher than September percent higher than September and 15 percent more than the October, 1958, total.

Commercial slaughter includes that of packing plants and local butchers, but excludes farm slaughter. Totals indicate the marketings of livestock by farmers and the availability of

National October production of red meat in commercial plants totaled 2,403 million lbs., seven percent above September output and four percent higher than production in October,





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### 210 Bushels Corn Per Acre

J. Herbert Roadruck, White county farmer living near Brookston, last week became the first five-time winner of the senior division of the Indiana Five-acre Corn Growing contest with a 1959 official yield of 210 bushels an acre.

Roadruck's previous pionships came in 1957, 1953, 1951 and 1950.

The 1958 winner was Karl Moser, Montgomery county, who had a yield of 226 bushels an acre

The contest is sponsored by the Purdue University agricultural extension service and the Indiana Crop Improvement Association. Nearly 3,800 farmers participated in the 1959 contest, according to Gilbert P. Walker, Purdue extension agronomist.

Indiana's record corn crop this year averaged an estimated

64 bushels an acre.
Roadruck's 210-bushel yield gave him his seventh membership in the exclusive "200 Bushel club," according to Walker. Total membership in the club is now 21.

The remainder of the "high ten" are Robert Hopf, Dubois county, 194 bushels; Harold Milburn, Benton co., 193; Wayne, Milburn, Benton county, 192;

Desco Newton, Daviess county, 192; Gwen Rudolph, Pike county, 191; Harry McKowen, Madison county, 190; Maurice Bosstick, Clay county, 186; Melvin Peters, Jackson county, 185; and W. R. Orr, Tipton county, 185.

Roadruck's winning yield was grown on a Brookston silt loam field, planted to corn the fifth consecutive year.

The field was plowed last November after an application of 300 pounds 45 percent urea, 400 pounds 47 percent superphosphate and 400 pounds of 60 per-cent muriate of potash per acre. It was disced and harrowed twice.

Corn was drilled May 21 in 40-inch rows with grains seven inches apart, making a population of about 23,000 plants per acre. It was side dressed with 230 pounds of nitrogen in anhydrous ammonia per acre.

At planting time the corn was sprayed for weed control. It was cultivated once with a rotary hoe and twice with a cultivator. For insect control it was sprayed with a five percent DDT.

Of the contest, Walker observed that "there were fewer very high yields this year than in 1958 as a result of moisture deficiency in some areas and extensive leaf blight damage in the southern half of the state."





#### GREETINGS FROM FAR-AWAY JAPAN

QM Subsistence Supply Div. U. S. Army Japan Depot Comp. APO 343, San Francisco, Calif. Greetings for Christmas 1959:

Some of you will be surprised at the above address. Others know that I left Indianapolis for Japan on October 10, 1959. I was transferred from the Army Hospital at Fort Benjamin Harrison to the Subsistence Supply Division of Quartermaster in Japan.

Miss Beulah Murphy, a librarian going to Korea, and I traveled together all the way from Indiana to Japan. We came by train to San Francisco and by Military Air Transport across the Pacific Ocean with brief stops at Hickman Field in Hawaii and Wake Island. We arrived at Tachikawa Air Base in Japan on October 16, 1959.

My chief duty here is to write the menus for the Armed Forces in Japan and Korea. The two sergeants and three Japanese girls in the office have been very helpful and congenial. The girls speak and understand English very well so we have had no difficulty in communications.

There is a beautiful view from my desk. Trees and shrubs border a green field, which was formerly a parade ground, above these and in the distance are the mountains. Sometimes I almost forget to write menus when I look at this beautiful and restful scene.

I live at Camp Zama, but work at Depot Complex which is nine miles away. Several people from Zama ride the Army bus to Depot Complex. Since the roads are narrow and crowded with pedestrians and many types of vehicles, I am content to ride the Army bus and let the driver be responsible for getting through the traffic.

I had planned to bring my
Ford to Japan but was not given
enough time before Port Call
to drive it to San Francisco.
Civilians are permitted to ride
in Army and Navy buses. Japanese electric trains run frequently and on time. Since I do not

have an automobile I am learning how to get around on buses and trains. It is essential to learn how to pronounce Sobudaimae, the train station near Camp Zama. The first week-end I was here I went to Tokyo to meet Miss Murphy at the Imperial Hotel. On Sunday we toured Kamakura, the temple Here we saw the Great Buddha which is 42 feet high and 87 feet around; it was cast from bronze in the 13th century. Last Saturday I went with one of the teachers to Yokosuka via Army bus and electric train. So I am seeing some of this part of Japan even though the Ford is not here to drive.

My house was rented furnished to a couple with a teenage daughter. They signed a two-year lease, the length of the time I shall be in Japan.

June 20, 1959, Mother was moved by ambulance from my house to my brother's home in Urbana, Illinois. At that time it was hoped that Mother would be able to return to my house in September. But Mother's condition became worse, that is more senile and incontinent, so on August 20, 1959, the doctor advised taking her to a nursing home. She is at the Uenord Nursing Home, 618 West Church Street, Champaign, Illinois. Most of the time Mother is rational; she would appreciate letters from relatives and friends. If Mother's condition becomes gency leave via Military Air critical I can go home on emer-Transport.

I hope the next two years in Japan will be interesting and pleasant as the past two weeks have been.

Broadcasting phosphate and potash on the basis of soil tests saves farmers time because at planting time less fertilizer will be needed in the row, Purdue University agronomists assert.


Purdue University agricultural engineers suggest that now is a good time to get infra-red lamp units ready for the coming pig farrowing season. They recommend repairing defective cords, wiping dust from bulbs and replacing metal, rubber or plastic sockets with porcelain units.

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

## Schools Face Revolutionary Changes the state had only four reorganized, or consolidated districts,

(Continued from last week) CUTBACK TO 300 SCHOOL SYSTEMS SEEN IN 4 YEARS

Indiana has 970 separate school systems with a total enrollment of 881,621 pupils in grades one through twelve.

Within the next four years the enrollment may climb, but 670 to 720 school systems will disappear.

"I'm foolish for doing this. said Dr. Clarence A Pound of Purdue University, but I will I think we make this estimate. will have only 250 to 300 school systems actually in operation within the next four years.

Pound, a Purdue authority or public school administration said he expects the reduction because of the big reor, and/a tion and consolidation move ment authorized by the 1959 General Assembly. He also bases his estimate on consolida tion surveys he has made in the

County committees through out the state are now working on master plans for the over haul of local school administra tion where needed. They will submit the plans to state officials for approval.

Most approved reorganizations

will involve consolidations of schools or merger of school districts.

While the reorganization movement is considered one of the milestones in the last cenof Indiana public school education, consolidation is not new in the state. But it is just now gaining acceptance.

We are beginning to get the idea across," Pound said. new idea in education requires a generation to simmer down and become accepted. We have done better with consolidation II has taken only about 12 years

One stimulus to acceptance the obsolescence of school mildings. Before the war we lidn't have money to build hem. Then the war came and we had the money, but no ma-terials," he said.

Some township school systems have recognized the advantage of joining forces to pool resources for construction. But the movement has been spotty.

The pattern has shaped up in this manner.

There were 1,062 school sys tems in the peak year, 1955 although there were only 1,033

In 1933 there was only one

consolidation and before 1947 Pound said. Since then there have been 154, and within the last year there have been 29.

All told there have been reorganization or consolidations in 79 counties, leaving only 13 counties without some sort of merger. In 1948 only two school orporations asked for surveys and recommendations on possible consolidations. In the 1958-53 school year, 30 requests for surveys were made to Purdue alone. Surveys also are made y Indiana University and the state teachers' colleges.

"It seems to me this indicates a recognition of the need on the part of the people," Pound "In recent years there said. has been a great concern about the quality of education and we an well ask the question, how good an education can a small school system provide?"

Pound said national surveys show that a school system must have 1500 pupils in grades 1 through 12 to provide an adequate, well-rounded education.

He pointed out that counties without reorganization or consolidations generally are the more wealthy ones with the highest amount of assessed property valuation backing up each child in school.

However, this does not always follow. Marion County has five metropolitan school systems within its townships.

The state average of assessed valuation behind each pupil is \$7,935, Pound said. It runs as low as \$500.

Counties without consolidation or reorganization to date, Benton, \$17,600; Boone, \$8,800; and their valuations, include Huntington, \$9,500; Jasper, \$9,-200; Jennings, \$3,600; Johnson \$6,000; Lawrence, \$5,000; Perry, \$3.700; Pike, \$6,300; Rush, \$10,-700; Vermillion, \$6,300; White, \$10,500; Crawford, \$3,000.

The 1959 reorganization law is broad in scope. It will allow reorganization of township schools into a metropolitan school district, merger of township and city schools, township with township schools and the merger of schools in one county with those of another. It also permits creation of county wide systems in which no city or town operates a school.

There now are three county school systems in Indiana, including Floyd, Brown and Ohio Counties. Brown was organized in 1949 and Floyd and Ohio in 1956.

There are ten school systems composed of school units merged across county lines. These in-clude Clay-Parke, Carroll-Clinton, Elkhart-Kosciusko, Fulton-

Cass, Miami-Grant, Putnam-Owen, Dearborn-Ripley, Starke-Pulaski. Steuben-Dekalb and Franklin-Union.

Many township trustees, sincere in accepting their responsibilities for providing good education have provided the leadership necessary in reorganizing and merging school systems, Pound said, despite the resistance displayed by some of their colleagues.

An example, he said, is Wabash county, where five trustees proposed a merger based on recommendations contained in a Purdue University survey.

A new school corporation was formed, taking over administration from the offices of the trustees. The trustees, however, are serving together as an inter-im board of school commissioners until an election replaces them in the spring.

Under the direction of a superintendent, the combined resources of each township can now be thrown behind all the schools and long range, orderly plans for uniform development can be made.



### Winter Driving Tips Given

Skidding is a common occurence when driving on snow and ice, and to help ease the dangers the Chicago Motor Club issued the following tips on how to recover from a skid:

1--Keep yourself under control. A person who cannot control himself in an emergency may have more trouble than others.

2—Avoid braking. Slamming on the brakes in a skid locks the wheels, causes loss of traction and increases the skid.

3-Steer in the direction the rear end is skidding. As the car begins to straighten, straighten the front wheels as well.

4—Avoid oversteering. Turning the steering wheel too far whips the rear end into a skid in the opposite direction.

5-Keep the clutch engaged, or the selector lever at D. Holding the car in gear helps reduce speed and produces maximum control.

6.—Avoid lifting your foot from the accelerator suddenly. Some expert drivers even accelerate moderately to get out of a skid.

Matthew C. Sielski, director of the Motor Club's Safety and Traffic Engineering Department said that ordinary stopping distances are often doubled and tripled on slippery winter streets. He urged motorists to hold down speed when driving on ice or snow.
