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**Train Demolishes
Tombaugh Auto**

Wayne Tombaugh certainly can consider himself a fortunate individual to be alive, after he saw what happened to his car about five o'clock Wednesday afternoon, when it was hit by a fast freight train at the Nickle Plate crossing on Main street.

Mr. Tombaugh just left his work at the Mentone Lumber Company and started north across the track when he saw the train coming from the east. He evidently attempted to stop, slid onto the track and killed his auto engine. When it failed to start he left the car just a couple of seconds before the car was hit. It was completely demolished and burst into flames immediately after coming to rest on the northwest edge of the crossing.

The train braked to a halt after hitting the 1957 Chevrolet, and remained at the crossing for over an hour.

One unit of the four-engine diesel was put out of commission by the impact.

**EDWARD STALDINE
DIES TODAY**

Edward Staldine, aged 69 years, one month and 12 days, died at his home Wednesday of an apparent heart attack. He was a resident of the Talma community for the past 29 years. He had been ill for the past two days and in ill health for several years.

Mr. Staldine was born in Smith County, Kansas, October 23, 1891, to F. Leonard and Dora Staldine. He lived in Kansas for 25 years before moving to Chicago for 15 years and then to Talma. He married Anna Vanderiet, Feb. 26, 1916, in Kansas. She survives.

Mr. Staldine, a retired real-estate agent, was a member of the Methodist church and the Masonic lodge.

Surviving beside his wife, are a son, Leonard, of 20440 Miller Road, South Bend, and a daughter, Mrs. Frederick (Joyce) Morgan, of Route 5, Rochester.

Last rites will be conducted at the Reed Funeral Home on Friday, December 9, at 2:30 p.m.

Burial will be in the Mentone cemetery.

**TRUSTEES MOVE TO
CONSOLIDATE UNITS**

Five trustees, their advisory board members, and Attorney George Stevens of Plymouth, met at the school Monday night and signed a resolution pleading for the consolidation of five township schools into one unit, called Koston Consolidated Schools. Henry and Newcastle townships in Fulton county and Harrison, Seward and Franklin townships in Kosciusko county hope to establish a unit which will have high schools at Akron and Mentone and grade schools at Burket, Beaver Dam, Talma, Akron and Mentone.

A legal resolution is published in the area newspapers, setting forth the plans of the five groups. It is being done under regulations set forth in a 1947 statute, and the plans are to obtain state approval of the school unit. Just what the outcome may be is problematical in view of the wording of the School Reorganization Act of 1959, which states, in part:

"From and after the effective date of this act, no consolidation or reorganization of school corporations, by means of or procedures under existing laws of this state in effect on the effective date of this act, shall become effective until and unless such consolidation or reorganization is approved by the State Commission * * *

BE PRACTICAL IN GIVING

"In a nation where millions
are 'well fed' but undernour-
ished," the Indiana Farm Bureau
president urges Christmas giv-
ers to be practical. "Give meat
to the family that has every-
thing. The director of the kit-
chen will probably appreciate
it more than she would an elec-
tric toothbrush or a mink cov-
ered can opener," he joked.

The Indiana Farm Bureau is
conducting its second "Give-
Meat-for-Christmas program,"
and its popularity is already es-
tablished, according to those
who have been connected with
it.

Five hundred gift certificates,
each good for five dollars worth
of meat, have been distributed
among county leaders. The coun-
ty organizations purchase the
certificates and resell them. The

grocery or supermarket, where
the meat is purchased, may re-
deem the certificates by sending
them to the Indiana Farm Bur-
eau of this city. Car bumper
strips are being displayed to
publicize the program, planned
by the commodity department
of the farm organization.

In 1959 large gains occurred
in the number of domestic en-
planed passengers and passen-
ger-miles. Enplaned passengers
numbered nearly 55 million, 14
per cent more than the 48 mil-
lion flown in 1958. Passenger-
miles flown exceeded 29 billion
—more than 15 per cent over
the previous year's count.

NOTICE OF RESOLUTION OF CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters, taxpayers and other interested parties of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, that on the 5th day of December, 1960, the Trustees and Advisory Boards of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, at a Joint Meeting adopted a Joint Resolution declaring their intention to consolidate their respective School Corporations. That said Resolution is in the following words and figures, to-wit:

Resolution

BE IT RESOLVED by the Boards of Trustees of the School Corporations, they being the Township Trustee and the Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, that they do hereby declare it to be their intention to consolidate the Elementary Schools and the High Schools of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, and to furnish consolidated school facilities for the children of school age of such Corporations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that they do hereby adopt this Joint Resolution to consolidate their respective School Corporations pursuant to Chapter 123 of the 1947 Acts of the Indiana State Legislature as amended by the Acts of 1949 Indiana State Legislature and pursuant to statute, the said School Trustees do hereby set out the following information concerning the said proposed consolidation and do hereby resolve as follows:

1. That the name of the proposed new School District shall be Koston Consolidated Schools.

2. That the number of members of the School Board shall be five (5), all of whom shall be appointed, and the method of appointment shall be as follows:

(b) The Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(b) The Advisory Board of

Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(c) The Advisory Board of Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(d) The Advisory Board of Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(e) The Advisory Board of Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

3. That the Consolidated School shall be under the direction of a Superintendent selected by the Board.

4. That all five (5) members shall be residents of the area comprising the Consolidated School Corporation, and of the area from which they shall receive their appointment. Each member must be a resident voter of such territory or unit for a period of not less than five (5) years prior to the time of his or her appointment and at the time of appointment shall be a freeholder of the territory or unit from which he or she is appointed. If such member moves from the territorial limits of the unit from which he or she is appointed, it will automatically create a vacancy which will be filled for the unexpired term by the Board making the original appointment.

5. Each member, after the first members have been appointed, as hereinafter set out, shall be appointed for a term of four (4) years. Any member may succeed himself in office, but it is specifically limited to one succession, to the end that no member shall serve for more than two (2) successive terms.

6. The first members shall be appointed upon the following basis, to-wit:

(a) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of four (4) years.

(b) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year.

(c) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of two (2) years.

(d) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of three (3) years.

(e) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of four (4) years.

7. Those members of the

Board to be first appointed shall take office on the first day of August, 1961. They shall be appointed within ten (10) days after the consolidation becomes effective, as a result of this Resolution and the provisions of the Statute. Thereafter, all appointments to be so made for the full four-year term shall be made by the respective appointing bodies sometime in the month prior to the August first when they shall start their term of office. Vacancies occurring during the term of the incumbent's appointment shall be filled as soon as possible after the vacancy occurs.

8. The names of the present School Corporations which are to be merged together as a Consolidated School Corporation as a result of this Resolution are as follows:

(a) Harrison Township School of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(b) Newcastle Township Schools of Fulton County, Indiana.

(c) Franklin Township School of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(d) Seward Township School of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(e) Henry Township Schools of Fulton County, Indiana.

You, and each of you, are further notified that the statutes of the State of Indiana under which said proposed consolidation is being considered, provides that on or before the sixth day following the last publication of such notice of intention to consolidate, fifty legal voters, residing in any of such School Corporations, may petition the School Trustees of their respective School Corporation for an election to determine whether or not the majority of the voters of such School Corporation are in favor of such consolidation. In the event such a petition or petitions might be filed, the Trustees in each of such School Corporations in which such protest petition is filed, shall call an election of the voters of such School Corporation, for the purpose of determining whether a majority of the legal voters of such Corporation are in favor of consolidating such School Corporations. If a petition is filed in more than one of such corporations, the election shall be held on the same day.

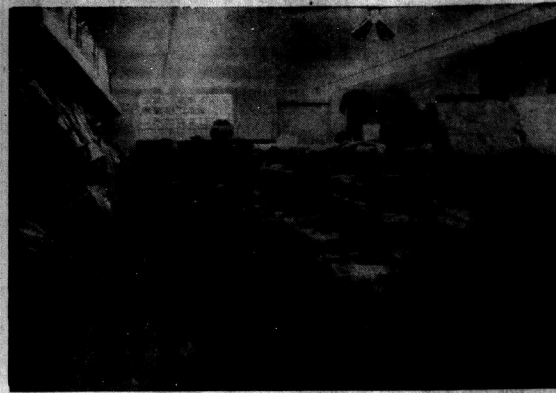
COOPERS COMPLETE MORE REMODELING AT THEIR STORE HERE

There is never any charge for this blood or its derivatives, regardless of where the person might be hospitalized. In hospitals which do not participate in the Red Cross program and it's patient is charged for the blood, the use of a simple Red Cross form can be used for a refund.

There may be charges made for administering the blood and cooperating hospitals are charged a service fee to help defray a portion of the cost of containers, etc amounting to a total of \$6.81.

In 1959 domestic scheduled U. S. air carrier mail and cargo ton-miles showed substantial gains. Mail ton-miles totaled nearly 119 million, a significant increase over the 106 million shown for the previous year.

All plans, decorations and entertainment were in charge of a special committee: Fern Beson, Thelma Eaton, Frances Olson and Marie Deaton.

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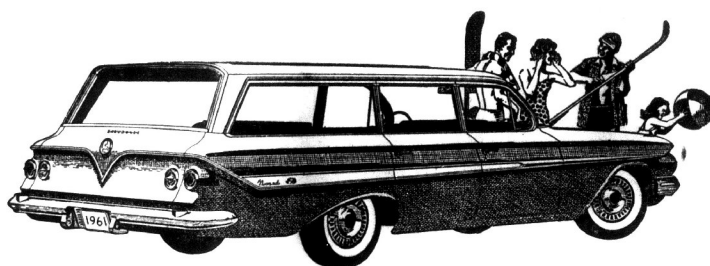

MARKETING GUIDES FOR FARMERS

Purdue University agricultural economists forecast a gradual increase in soybean prices to peak in late spring or summer. This rise will be enough to justify holding beans now in storage, they add.

A record corn crop, much of it with relatively high moisture content, has depressed prices to new lows for the post war period. "If you need corn and have storage facilities, buy now," they advise.

However, corn prices will improve after completion of the harvest and likely equal the usual seasonal variation of about 20 cents a bushel.

Hog prices for the next 60 to 90 days are expected to be steady to lower. Larger marketings may drop January-February prices slightly below November, 1960, levels.

Further strength in the fed cattle market should continue at least into midwinter. But fall purchased weighty feeder cattle should be pushed toward a midwinter market.

Income from the turkey crop being marketed will be the best since 1956, while increases in both heavy and light breed pro-

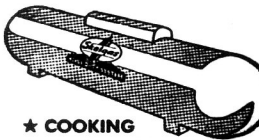

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1961 Spring Barrow Show

Judges from four states will pick champion hogs in the 12th annual Hoosier Spring Barrow Show, Feb. 14-18, in Indianapolis. Hogs will be judged on foot Tuesday, Feb. 14, in the Swine barn at the Indiana State Fair grounds. Then the show will recess until Saturday, Feb. 18, when carcasses will be exhibited at the Hygrade Food Products plant, West Washington St., Indianapolis.

One of the grand champion judges, W. H. Bruner, Ohio State University, will coordinate judging of both the on foot and carcass classes. Assisting in judging live hogs will be L. F. Tribble, University of Missouri, and R. H. Gummer, University of Wisconsin.

R. W. Bray, University of Wisconsin, and J. R. Stouffer, Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., will assist Bruner in judging the carcass classes.

Swine producers from all over Indiana will vie for the approximately \$5,000 in prizes. Preskin ribbons as well as cash prizes will be awarded in 10 places for pens of three and truckload classes.

Nitrogen For Lawns

Purdue University agronomist W. H. Daniel and Dr. N. R. Goetze, Oregon State University, reported to the American Society of Agronomy meeting in Chicago last week that four pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. of lawn per year is sufficient for irrigated Merion bluegrass.

Under test conditions 16 to 20 pounds of nitrogen caused no visual damage in their trials. They compared soluble, natural organic and urea formaldehyde types of nitrogen fertilizers both in greenhouse and field experiments for four years with annual applications of 4, 8, 16 and 20 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. ft. of turf.

While the soluble and organic materials gave more total turf quality, the urea forms provided more uniform turf.

This study points out that a choice between these three classes of nitrogen fertilizer depends

upon the relative labor cost of more numerous applications of the soluble or organic materials versus the increased cost of an additional amount of nitrogen in the ureaform formulations.

Sharon Kerkhoff 16-year-old Tippecanoe county farm girl, won the junior division of the 1960 Indiana Five-Acre Corn Growing contest with a yield of 242 bushels an acre. This is one bushel more than the previous high, set in 1954. She is the first girl to win in the 47-year history of the event.

Miss Kerkhoff lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Kerkhoff, on a 400-acre farm east of Romney. She is a junior in southwestern high school. The new junior title holder has been a 4-H club member seven years and the 5-acre corn plot was one of her 1960 projects.

Her yield topped that of the senior division winner, J. Herbert Roadruck, White county farmer who produced 231 bushels an acre. It also brought her membership in the exclusive 200 Bushel Club. Her father was runner-up in the senior division with a yield of 216 bushels an acre.

Soil Losses In Corn Stubble

Shredding corn stalks in the fall after corn picking may cut winter soil loss in half, according to Purdue University and USDA agronomists.

In a paper presented at the American Society of Agronomy meetings at Chicago last week, J. V. Mannering and L. D. Meyer discussed the effects of three methods of cornstalk residue management on runoff and erosion. Their trials were conducted on a Warsaw loam soil with a 4 to 4 1/2 percent slope and a Russell silt loam with 3 to 3 1/2 percent slope.

The scientists experimented with cornstalks as left by a combine (check), cornstalks shredded only, and cornstalks shredded and disked once. They simulated rainstorms at a constant intensity of 2.4 inches per hour for 1 hour on each of two successive days with the USDA Purdue rainulator.

Infiltration, runoff, soil content of the runoff and total soil loss were determined for both soil types. In both cases, soil losses from the shredded treatment were less than one-half the losses from the check treatment. Runoff from both treatments was very similar and therefore the reduced soil loss resulted from the lower soil content of the runoff. Soil losses from the shredded-disked treatment were intermediate between the check and shredded treatments.

Cull dairy heifers on the basis of ancestral production as well as their general appearance, suggest Purdue University dairy scientists.

A Plea For Cooperation

(A copy of an open letter sent to all leading farm machinery manufacturers by John C. Raber, president of Indiana Farmers Union, on Dec. 6.)

Dear Sir:

The trade journals have indicated that despite recent reversals in the sale of farm machinery you intend to sustain or augment your advertising program in 1961.

This is as it should be but may I suggest that you do a thorough job of defining your problem before you invest your money. Your market, American farmer, is struggling to stay alive. The concept of individual capitalism in our rural areas is being choked to death by misunderstanding and abuse.

The family farmer, who is the backbone of your business, is desperately in need of your product. He wants to buy, but first he needs your assistance to get a fair and equitable return for his labor and investment. We have a new President who wants to assist the farmer, not in a "give away" program but in a program of supply management that will insure a fair return for the farmer but he must first have the will of the people.

The effects of the farm problem have already been allowed to spread. Fifty one of the nation's one hundred and fifty major markets in America have already been classified in the disaster area in unemployment. Much of the unemployment is originating in rural areas and little towns that survive on the farmers' income. They in turn are not buying from the industrial areas where the warehouses are filling up with manufactured goods that are not selling.

Your advertising money could be of great assistance to sell your goods and at the same time inform the public of the problem that is facing the farmer. Your assistance in this way will

help our new President in establishing an atmosphere of understanding that would allow our government the wherewithall to pass legislation which would save individual capitalism on the American farm and return to you a financially strong prospect for your goods and services.

231 Bushels Corn Per Acre

J. Herbert Roadruck, White county farmer living near Brookston, December 8 became the first six-time winner of the senior division of the 1960 division of the 1960 Indiana Five-Acre Corn Growing contest with an official yield of 231 bushels an acre.

Roadruck's previous championships came in 1959, 1957, 1953, 1951 and 1950. His 1959 winning yield was 210 bushels an acre.

The contest is sponsored by the Purdue University agricultural extension service and the Indiana Crop Improvement Association. Nearly 2,100 farmers participated in this year's contest, according to Gilbert P. Walker, Purdue extension agronomist.

Indiana's record corn crop this year averaged an estimated 66 bushels an acre.

Roadruck's 231-bushel yield gave him his fifth membership in the exclusive 200 Bushel Club Membership in the club now totals 36, Walker said.

NOTICE OF RESOLUTION OF CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters, taxpayers and other interested parties of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, that on the 5th day of December, 1960, the Trustees and Advisory Boards of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, at a Joint Meeting adopted a Joint Resolution declaring their intention to consolidate their respective School Corporations. That said Resolution is in the following words and figures, to-wit:

Resolution

BE IT RESOLVED by the Boards of Trustees of the School Corporations, they being the Township Trustee and the Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, that they do hereby declare it to be their intention to consolidate the Elementary Schools and the High Schools of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, and to furnish consolidated school facilities for the children of school age of such Corporations.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that they do hereby adopt this Joint Resolution to consolidate their respective School Corporations pursuant to Chapter 123 of the 1947 Acts of the Indiana State Legislature as amended by the Acts of 1949 Indiana State Legislature and pursuant to statute, the said School Trustees do hereby set out the following information concerning the said proposed consolidation and do hereby resolve as follows:

1. That the name of the proposed new School District shall be Koston Consolidated Schools.

2. That the number of members of the School Board shall be five (5), all of whom shall be appointed, and the method of appointment shall be as follows:

(b) The Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(b) The Advisory Board of

Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(c) The Advisory Board of Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(d) The Advisory Board of Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

(e) The Advisory Board of Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall appoint one (1) member.

3. That the Consolidated School shall be under the direction of a Superintendent selected by the Board.

4. That all five (5) members shall be residents of the area comprising the Consolidated School Corporation, and of the area from which they shall receive their appointment. Each member must be a resident voter of such territory or unit for a period of not less than five (5) years prior to the time of his or her appointment and at the time of appointment shall be a freeholder of the territory or unit from which he or she is appointed. If such member moves from the territorial limits of the unit from which he or she is appointed, it will automatically create a vacancy which will be filled for the unexpired term by the Board making the original appointment.

5. Each member, after the first members have been appointed, as hereinafter set out, shall be appointed for a term of four (4) years. Any member may succeed himself in office, but it is specifically limited to one succession, to the end that no member shall serve for more than two (2) successive terms.

6. The first members shall be appointed upon the following basis, to-wit:

(a) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Harrison Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of four (4) years.

(b) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Newcastle Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year.

(c) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Franklin Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of two (2) years.

(d) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Seward Township, Kosciusko County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of three (3) years.

(e) The member to be appointed by the Advisory Board of Henry Township, Fulton County, Indiana, shall be appointed for a period of four (4) years.

7. Those members of the

Board to be first appointed shall take office on the first day of August, 1961. They shall be appointed within ten (10) days after the consolidation becomes effective, as a result of this Resolution and the provisions of the Statute. Thereafter, all appointments to be so made for the full four-year term shall be made by the respective appointing bodies sometime in the month prior to the August first when they shall start their tenure of office. Vacancies occurring during the term of the incumbent's appointment shall be filled as soon as possible after the vacancy occurs.

8. The names of the present School Corporations which are to be merged together as a Consolidated School Corporation as a result of this Resolution are as follows:

(a) Harrison Township Schools of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(b) Newcastle Township Schools of Fulton County, Indiana.

(c) Franklin Township Schools of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(d) Seward Township Schools of Kosciusko County, Indiana.

(e) Henry Township Schools of Fulton County, Indiana.

You, and each of you, are further notified that the statute of the State of Indiana under which said proposed consolidation is being considered, provides that on or before the sixth day following the last publication of such notice of intention to consolidate, fifty legal voters, residing in any of such School Corporations, may petition the School Trustees of their respective School Corporation for an election to determine whether or not the majority of the voters of such School Corporation are in favor of such consolidation.

In the event such a petition or petitions might be filed, the Trustees in each of such School Corporations in which such protest petition is filed, shall call an election of the voters of such School Corporation, for the purpose of determining whether a majority of the legal voters of such Corporation are in favor of consolidating such School Corporations. If a petition is filed in more than one of such corporations, the election shall be held on the same day.

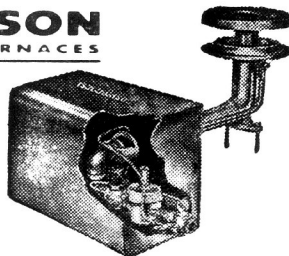

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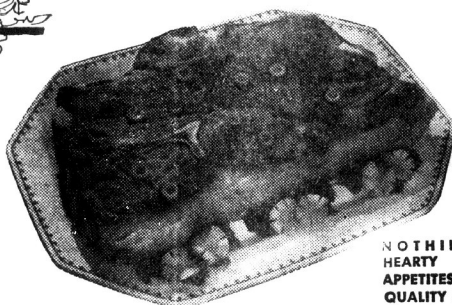

Here is my favorite candy recipe. It is simple, but very good, we think.

Mexican Pecan Candy

2 cups sugar (granulated)
1/4 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 tablespoon butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups pecans (halves)

33 Litters Are Certified

The Indiana Swine Evaluation Station designated 33 litters nominated, according to Dick Hollandbeck and Jim Foster, Purdue University extension swine specialists. This was 29 percent of the animals nominated.

Twenty-three Indiana owners of the litters received Indiana Certified Meat Litter certificates. Since the Station was established at Purdue four years ago as an "outstanding cooperative effort" to upgrade the quality of swine breeding stock, 167 farmers from 62 counties have nominated litters.

The 1960 spring season certifications by breeds and the grand totals of certifications:

Yorkshire, 12-47; Hampshire, 12-43; Landrace, 3-21; Berkshire, 5-7; Chester White, 0-6; Poland China, 1-4; Spotted Poland China, 0-3; and Duroc, 0-2.

Five Indiana Certified Meat Sires have been named.

Livestock Needs Ice-Free Water

Unless livestock has ice-free water available at all times, the animals can't be expected to make economical and rapid gains during the cold winter months ahead.

Too many farmers take for granted the livestock water supply, points out Bruce McKenzie, Purdue University extension agricultural engineer. On many farms, however, the water supply is the weakest link in the entire livestock production program, he adds.

Automatic, heated waterers provide the best means for clean, fresh ice-free water. With pressure water systems, plastic pipe and underground wiring, automatic fountains can be placed in every feed lot on the farm, he asserts.

Operating costs for automatic waterers are small — especially when the savings in labor are

considered. McKenzie estimates that the cost of electricity to run an automatic watering system for 50-125 hogs would be less than \$10 a year.

Electrical suppliers or local equipment dealers will help farmers design a system to meet their individual needs.

WINNER OF SOYBEAN CONTEST

W. R. Orr, Route 3, Tipton, last week won the 1960 Indiana Soybean Five-Acre Yield contest. The 42-year-old Tipton county corn-hog farmer checked 60 bushels per acre on his best five from a 40-acre field.

Runner-up in this year's contest was John H. Wykoff, Porter county, with a yield of 57.5 bushels per acre. The 1959 state winner was Floyd Duncan Jr., Lake county, with a yield of 61.9 bushels per acre.

The estimated 1960 average soybean yield for Indiana is 27 bushels per acre.

Orr planted Harosoy, the most widely grown variety in Indiana, in 38-inch rows May 28. The field was in corn last year. He applied 80 pounds of 8-32-0 fertilizer in the row at planting time. Orr rotary hoed the field once, cultivated it three times and hand hoed weeds that cultivation didn't kill.

Mr. and Mrs. Orr and their two children, Sherry, 16, and Mike, 14, live on a 300-acre farm. Orr said the 40-acre bean field grossed him \$100 an acre.

Orr's yield is the sixth of 60 or more bushels in the 21-year history of the contest. Winners in the first five years of the competition were all under 50 bushels, according to Gilbert P. Walker, Purdue University extension agronomist. The contest is sponsored by Purdue's extension service and the Indiana Crop Improvement Association. One hundred seventy-three farmers had their yields checked this year under supervision of their county agricultural agents.

Tractor Talk

QUICK CHECK WILL REVEAL CONDITION OF PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SYSTEMS

If you have a tractor in which the starter turns over but the engine won't start, and you find that there is a very weak spark or no spark at all at the spark plugs, here's a quick check you

can make to determine whether the trouble is in the secondary or the primary system.

Remove the coil (center) high tension lead from the distributor cap tower, and, holding it approximately 3-16 inch from the cylinder head, observe the spark as the engine turns over.

If the spark is good, chances are the trouble is in the distributor cap, the rotor or the spark plug cables. If the spark is weak, or there's no spark at all, the trouble probably is in

the primary circuit or in the cable between the distributor cap and coil, or in the coil itself.

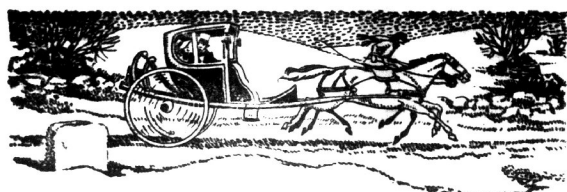

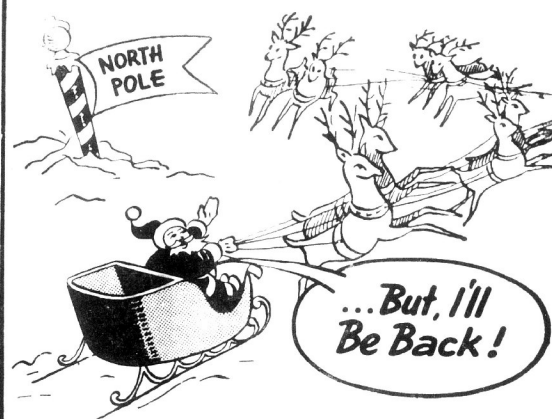

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Dairy Research at Normandy Farm

Purdue University scientists have instituted a research study of the protein content of milk at Normandy Farm near New Augusta. Mr. and Mrs. Herman C. Krannert of Indianapolis have leased the farm and its widely known Guernsey herd to Purdue.

The Krannerts also gave \$200,000 from a trust fund they established to finance all costs of the dairy research. Dr. Frederick L. Hovde, Purdue's president, last week announced the lease and gift, describing them

as "of inestimable value to the dairy business of the state."

Dr. Fred N. Andrews, head of Purdue's dairy department and who directs management of the farm, explained the protein content study in this statement:

"During the past half century, especially since the perfection of the Babcock test for milk fat, dairy cattle have been selected largely on the basis of butterfat production.

"The changing food habits of Americans today have necessitated a new look at the value of milk. The protein quality of milk is outstanding as far as humans and animals are concerned.

"Milk is one of the most perfect sources of protein for hu-

man consumption and in these days when consumers are especially calorie-conscious, it seems more appropriate to emphasize the capacity of cattle to produce milk of high protein quality rather than merely high butterfat content.

"One of the principal objectives of the dairy cattle breeding program which will be carried out at the Normandy Farm will be the selection of these outstanding Guernsey cattle for both total milk production and total protein production.

"This study will be carried out under the direction of one of our dairy cattle breeding specialists, Dr. Truman G. Martin."

One of the most important ob-

jectives at Normandy Farm will be to produce crops which have the greatest quantity of nutrients per acre and the availability of these nutrients for dairy cattle, according to Andrews.

This research will be carried out jointly by a team of Purdue scientists trained in agronomy, animal nutrition and dairy cattle management. Purdue staff members involved in this phase of the research will be D. L. Hill, N. S. Lundquist, B. W. Crowl, Merle Teel and E. A. Gannon.

Third major objective will be high level maintenance of herd health. Drs. R. C. Herschler and R. L. Morter of Purdue's new school of veterinary science and medicine will direct a research program on maintaining dairy cattle health.

The Krannerts retain ownership of their properties in Pike township, Marion county, and will continue to reside on their estate. This gives them close

contact with the experimental work in which they are vitally interested.

Lisa Can Ride Her 'Goldilocks' Again Because of Help From March of Dimes

A magnificent fairyland of a special kind, in which leg aches are still known but not felt so often as before, has just opened for four-year-old Lisa Sliker, of Leicester, N. Y.

"My doctors," the blue-eyed and auburn-haired Lisa tells everyone today, "have made my leg almost all well again. Now I can sit on my horsie, Goldilocks, and I can walk to the barn on my crutches and see my kittens and the pigs."

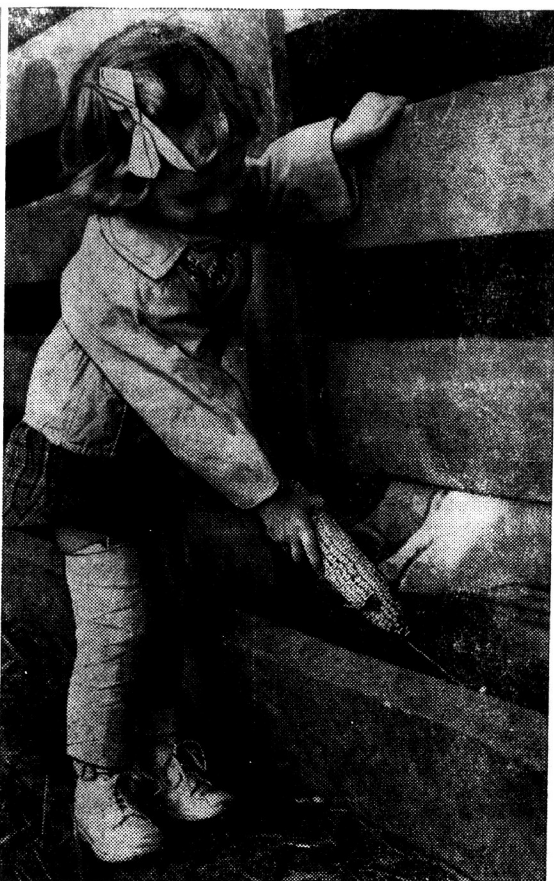
The new lease on life accorded little Lisa is due in great measure to the treatment she continues to receive each month at the arthritis clinical study center at University of Rochester-Strong Memorial Hospital, established with public contributions to the March of Dimes. Stricken three years ago with baffling rheumatoid arthritis in her right leg, the attractive child wore a cast for many months but now no longer wears it at night—although she goes to sleep hugging "my old leg" like a doll.

Lisa is one of 30,000 youngsters in the United States who are afflicted by rheumatoid arthritis which interferes with bone growth and may cause deformity. In addition to the study center visited by Lisa at Rochester, March of Dimes funds have made possible the opening of additional arthritis study centers in New York City, Dallas and San Francisco.

Mrs. Sliker recounts:

"My husband and I were scared witless when Lisa's stumbling was diagnosed as provoked by rheumatoid arthritis, which somehow sounded like something that might strike your great-grandfather. But not strike down the beautiful, merry and innocent little baby with whom God had blessed us.

"It was a terrifying experience for us to watch Lisa lying motionless in her crib, pain in her eyes and face but holding back the tears. Her right knee was swollen to unbelievable size. But now that she is much better and some day may walk again unassisted by crutches, we pray that, like Lisa, others

may be helped by the March of Dimes."

Mrs. Sliker is a volunteer worker in her county during the March of Dimes, collecting funds for The National Foundation's expanded program which includes significant birth defects together with arthritis and continued work in polio.

"My farmer husband helps me call on neighbors during January," Mrs. Sliker adds. "The snows are mountainous at that time of year in our neck of the woods, but we both feel that helping the March of Dimes is the least we can do in return for the help given our Lisa."

Less Livestock Slaughtered

Liveweight of commercially slaughtered livestock in Indiana during October totaled 157,338,000 pounds, according to state-federal agricultural statisticians at Purdue University. This was two per cent below the September output and four per cent smaller than October, 1959.

Total liveweight of the 59,000 cattle slaughtered in October was 58,174,000 pounds—one per cent smaller than the September total, but 12 per cent more than the October, 1959, figure. The 10,900 calves slaughtered weighed 2,562,000 pounds live, one per cent larger than September and 71 per cent above the October of last year figure.

Liveweight of the 396,000 hogs slaughtered totaled 95,040,000 pounds, about three per cent smaller than the September weight and 12 per cent smaller than the figure for October in 1959.

The 16,100 sheep and lambs slaughtered had a total liveweight of 1,562,000 pounds, eight per cent smaller than the September slaughter weight and 15 per cent below the October, 1959, total.

Commercial slaughter includes that of packing plants and local butchers, but excludes farm slaughter. Totals indicate the marketing of livestock by farmers and the availability of red meat.

Farm Science Days Jan. 18

A day long session of an agricultural pesticide conference, science in dairy and beef production and a morning program for parents of current and prospective students at Purdue University will feature the third day, Wednesday, Jan. 18, of Farm Science Days at Purdue.

Dr. F. N. Andrews, head of Purdue's dairy department, and entomologists G. E. Gould, R. T. Everly, R. C. Dobson, W. D. Fitzwater and M. C. Wilson will speak at the morning session of the pesticide conference. This conference will conclude that afternoon with talks by botany and plant pathologists E. G. Sharville and O. C. Lee, and entomologists D. L. Matthew and G. E. Lecker. The program will emphasize insect and disease controls.

"Science in Dairy Production" will feature talks in the morning by Drs. T. M. Curtin and F. A. Hall, Purdue extension veterinarians, and talks in the afternoon by Andrews and S. M.

Gregory, extension dairyman.

Dale Engler, Ramsey Ranch, El Dorado, Kan., and E. F. Taylor, Kansas State College, will talk about beef calves and cows at the morning session on beef production. During the afternoon beef feedlot practices will be presented by cattlemen Guy Wilson, Kokomo; Robert Hedde, Camden, and Don Harris, Clinton. T. W. Perry, Purdue animal scientist; M. R. Teel, Purdue agronomist, and M. P. Mitchell, Purdue agricultural economist, will discuss aspects of haylage that afternoon.

Parents of Purdue students and prospective Purdue students will have an opportunity Wednesday morning to hear Dr. Earl L. Butz, Purdue's dean of agriculture; V. C. Freeman, associate dean of Purdue's school of agriculture, and D. C. Pfendler, assistant dean, discuss professional opportunities in agriculture and conduct a question and answer session.

A special session for parents of women students and prospective women students will be held. At this session "Opportunities for Women Students at Purdue" will be presented by a panel composed of Beulah Gillaspie, head of the Purdue school of home economics, and staff members Margaret Beeman, Barbara Cook and Helen Hazelton.

Dr. Carey M. Parrott of Milford spoke to members of the Kosciusko County Poultry Association at Warsaw, Dec. 20, on the topic of "Laboratory Procedures for Disease Control." Dr. Parrott and his associates have established one of the very few private poultry diagnostic laboratories in the nation. It is being used for the purpose of early detection and diagnosis of poultry diseases.

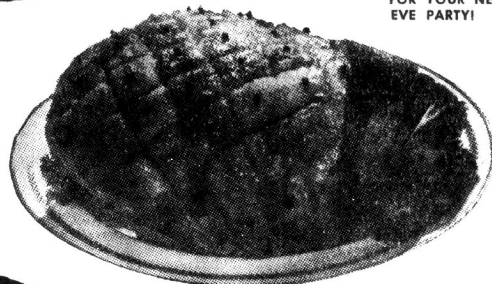
