The court ruled against the demurrer filed by the defendants stating that the plaintiffs did have a right to file suit in court against the school reorganization committee and clerk.





Ordinance Number 163

AN ORDINANCE REGULAT ING THE STANDING OR PARK-ING OF MOTOR VEHICLES OR OTHER VEHICLES UPON STREETS OR OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN MENTONE, INDI-ANA, AND PROVIDING PEN-ALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF, PROVIDING FOR PROCEDURE OF ENFORCE-MENT.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana, as follows: Section 1. Restricted Parking

Two Hour Limit. It shall be unlawful for any person to park, or leave stand-

(a) On both sides of that portion of Main Street lying between Morgan Street and Tucker Street.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana, shall cause areas heretofore designated in the town to be marked with suitable signs to be erected in conformity with the provisions of Section 1, which signs shall bear the legend "Two Hour Parking.

Section 3.

Any person violating any pro vision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall forfeit and pay a fine in an amount not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars, said forfeitures or fines to be assessed as designated in the following schedule:

(a) A fine of Fifty (\$.50) cents for each violation of this ordinance if said fine is paid within twelve (12) hours of the violation; or, (b) A fine of One (\$1.00) Dollar for each violation of this ordinance if said fine is not paid within twenty-four (24) hours of the violation; or,

(c) A fine not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars upon con-

viction of non-payment or evasion of traffic citations issued and not paid for more than thirty (30) days following said violation. Section 4.

The fines assessed under Section 3. of this ordinance shall be paid to the Clerk-Treasurer of the Town of Mentone, Indiana, and shall be by him paid into the general fund of said town. Section 5.

The persons violating this ordinance shall pay said fines to the Clerk-Treasurer or to the Marshall of the Town of Mentone, Indiana, who shall receipt therefore, or in default of said payment, the Town of Mentone, Indiana, may by any officer thereof file its complaint against said violator to recover the fines provided for herein before any Justice of the Peace in Kosciusko County, Indiana.

Section 6.

Ordinance Number 160 ordained by the Town Board of Mentone, Indiana, on June 4, 1962, is hereby repealed, and all other ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 7.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

Tractor Drivers Killed Often


Of the 75 persons killed on Indiana highways in the last six years in accidents involving farm tractors, 50 of them were driving tractors, points out F. R. Willsey, Purdue University farm safety specialist. An analysis of Indiana State

An analysis of Indiana State Police accident records shows further that 10 of the victims were "extra riders" on tractors. 10 more were occupants of motor cars involved in tractor collisions and the remainder were riding on farm wagons pulled by tractors.

A closer examination of the 50 tractor operator fatalities reveals a "pattern of death according to the age of the driver". He compared the accidents involving the 15 youngest with the 15 oldest tractor drivers.

Fourteen of the youngest drivers died when their tractors overturned. Most of these accident occurred when the drivers lost control and their tractors overturned into roadside ditches or when the fast moving tractor failed to negotiate a sharp turn. Only one of the younger drivers was involved in a collision with another vehicle.

With older drivers the situation was reversed. Thirteen of them died in collisions with other vehicles; one was killed when he fell from a tractou and the other man was killed when his tractor overturned.

Mr. Frantz has asked me to use this space this week to report on the 4-H program that was conducted in Kosciusko County this year. I am happy to do this as the grain show, held last week, concluded the County 4-H activities for the year, and a very successful year I might add. The 4-H enrollment was not as high as last year by some 25 members, but our completion record was higher and that is important in this program. During 1962 we enrolled

ages of 10 and 21 in 2,550 projects. There were 1.025 members who completed their work. Many people believe that 4-H is program for rural boys and girls but our figures show that it is a program for all youngsters wherever they may live. In Kosciusko County there were 381 boys and girls enrolled with 590 of them from farm homes 414 from rural non-farm homes and 109 from urban homes (only Warsaw can be classified as urban). The ages of these young people varied too. There were 579 between 10 and 12 years. 394 between 13 and 15 years, and 140 of them 16 years and over.

Since the bulk of the mem-bership is in the younger age group, it follows that of the larger portion of the membership is in the first, second, and third year. Our records show 302 first year, 256 second year, 181 third year, 117 fourth year, 79 fifth year, and 178 members with six or more years of club membership.

It seems that almost every girl is interested in foods as 585 girls enrolled this year and probably the next most popular would be crafts with 252 boys and girls enrolled. Other popular projects were personality improvement 152, swine 139, junior leadership 121, photography 118, electric 106, home furnishing 96, wildlife 79, beef cattle 69, dairy 62, horse and pony There are 37 different 62 projects available to the 4-H members in this county and those listed above are only a few of them. 

Set Conduct Policy For Tri-Twp. Students

Members of the Tri-Township School Board have established a it was announced recently by Superintendent Leonard Hewitt.

Schools in the Tri-Township system are Etna Green, Bourbon, and Tippecanoe.

The statement is as follows: Citizenship and participating in contests and other school activities-It is the belief of the Board of School Trustees that students should meet certain citizenship requirements to be able to participate and re-present their school in the various contests, conventions, festivals, meetings; or serve as an officer of any such club or organization. It is further the belief that the privilege to participate in such contests and activities is an honor; such honor to be given to those who have met high standards of achievement and citizenship. Citizen-ship will be considered in school and out of school as defined. In school—The principal or

school administration may refuse the honor or recognition of students who do not come up to the recognized requirements for a good citizen. Any teacher or coach may refuse membership in a sponsored organization or contest, etc., if a student does not meet citizenship requirements.

Out of school-Students shall automatically be refused the privilege of participation in any of the contests, organizations, etc.; as recited above. Students shall be considered as a "Special Student" in that he privileged to attend class only.

The refusal to permit a student to participate in an activity or contest, as discussed, shall automatically go into effect immediately at point of displinary action or charges are preferred by civil law enforcement agencies. Such action shall last as follows:

If action is dismissed, student shall be reinstated if he qualifies other wise.

If convicted or placed upon probation, he shall not be eligible for participation until the beginning of the first term following expiration date of pro-bation or conviction. The stu-dent shall come before the board at such time, requesting re-instatement. It will be at the discretion of the board to deny or approve.

Any policy above listed in no way abridges the right of school administrator to suspend or expel a student from school.

Sell Clean Eggs

Selling dirty eggs—often dis-counted as much as 20 cents a policy for conduct of students, dozen-can be avoided, says David Jackson, Purdue University extension poultry specialist.

Jackson points out that more than 99 per cent of all eggs are clean before they contact the nest. Therefore, it is the poultryman's responsibility to see that

the eggs stay clean. Eggs can be kept clean if management practices are followed. Since eggs are laid in dirty nests will be soiled, the nesting

material must be kept clean. The job can be made easier by keeping fresh nesting material handy in a bag or some other container. Chopped straw, shavings, sawdust, ground cobs and diatomacteous earth have been used satisfactorily. Baled straw is not as desirable, for hens tend to scratch it out of their nests and it packs down too tightly.

Darkening the nests helps keep the eggs cleaner as does the use of plenty of nests. One nest or one square foot of nesting space should be allowed for each four or five layers.

Frequent gathering—three to also help insure dry litter, and five times daily, mostly in the morning—will aid in keeping eggs clean. Eggs left in the trol egg cleanliness are removal trol egg cleanliness are removal nests for a long period of time may become broken and smeared, or walked on by hens with dirty feet.

Another help in keeping eggs clean is a deep, dry litter on the house floor—an aid in keeping the hens' feet clean. Welded wire under the roosts to keep the hens out of their droppings, and feeders placed over the dropping pits along with nonspill water fountains should be used. Adequate ventilation will

of broody hens to a "break-up" pen, keeping hens confined to the house and allowing ample floor space per hen depending upon the kind of housing and management used.

More money for eggs can be the result if these simple practices are followed.





This colorless, odorless, tasteless gas can become a sneaky killer in cold weather as even small doses of the lethal gas may cause an accident by slowing down driver reaction. The motor club points out that one part of carbon monoxide in 700 parts of air can be fatal; one part of carbon monoxide in 1,700 parts of air can cause nausea.

Warning symptoms of carbon monoxide are nausea, drowsi-ness, headache, delayed braking reaction, faulty coordination, and poor vision. When there reactions are noted, car occupants immediately should inhale deep breaths of fresh air.

Carbon monoxide is produced by imperfectly burned motor fuel. An excess may be produced by faulty engine adjustment, but even the best adjusted engines may leak enough carbon monoxide to be fatal. Chief danger points are faulty gaskets, de-fective exhaust systems, and clogged exhaust pipes.

To avoid being overcome by carbon monoxide, they recommend the following precautions:

Never run a motor in a closed garage or other unventilated enclosure. Open all garage doors before starting the engine.

Always keep one car window at least partially open to assure some air circulation.

Shut off the motor if you are sitting in a parked car for more than a few minutes.

Check all points of the exhaust system for leaks and stoppages.

Remember, you car's exhaust pipe may become clogged by backing into a snow bank.



Winterize Your Lawn Mower

If you spend a little time now preparing your power lawn mower, you will save money by increasing its engine life and save yourself starting headaches next spring.

Purdue University turf specialists say proper winterizing Board of Trustees of the Town of the mower doubles the en. of Mentone, Indiana, as follows: gine life. They recommend eith- Section 1. Restricted Parking er taking the mower to the shop for the job or winterizing it yourself. It is a profitable move either way, since chances are your power mower is your most costly yard and garden equipment.

First, remove the spark plug. Then put a teaspoon of oil in the spark plug well. Turn the machine on its side and remove all the dried grass and dirt; paint where needed to reduce rust.

Rotate the fly wheel with the starter pulley to make the piston move slowly up and down and coat the cylinder walls with oil.

TIPPECANOE VALLEY SCHOOL **BOARD PROGRESS REVIEWED**

We are continuing an articleC writen by Mr. Forbes in which cluded the sanding and finishhe states his views of the progress made by the school board whose terms will expire Dec. 31.

By Robert Forbes, Supt.

1. Early in the School year the School Board established a Kindergarten for the Burket School where none had existed before. This equalized educational opportunity for the stu-dents on this level.

2. Realizing that there was improvement needed in the Shop Departments, particularly for the Junior High, immediate action was taken to see that the necessary equipment and supplies for the Junior High Shops were obtained so that these boys could have adequate train ing in that respect.

3. Early the School Board expressed the desire that the teachers should have the instructional supplies which were necessary and which they would use to do a more satisfactory job for the benefit of the students. The board Budgeted funds and set up procedures for the acquisition of these supplies. All teachers on every level in the school system have been given adequate instructional materials as requested.

4. The School Board gave considerable attention to necessary repairs in the entire School Corporation, a few of which in-

ing of the gym floor at Burket. a new roof for the gym and at-tached buildings at Burket, and repair of the unsatisfactory entrance to the Burket Junior High building. Also repair of the Akron Building, in particular the doors and the hardware for these doors at Beaver Dam School was authorized by the School Board. 

The county is quite proud of the dairy herds of Sherman Deaton and Bud Watkins. They were gold medal winners at the recent state Dairy Association Annual Meeting. Their herd av-erage on butter fat production was 611 pounds. While we do get the figures on these records and I am not sure but I think this is among the five high DHIA herds in the state this year.

Despite generally falling crop prices since the early 1950's fertilizer usage has continued to expand in Indiana. Higher crop yields continue to offer the greatest opportunity for reducing per bushel or per ton

production costs on most Indiana farms. Liberal applications of fertiliner are usually necessary to attain and to maintain high Agent in Indiana yield levels. But fertilizer alone won't do the job. To make ad ditional fertilizer profitable fertilizing must be accompanied by a host of good management practices

Fertilizer has increased in costs less than most crop production items during the past 10 to 20 years. Even so, one should consider the possibility of further reducing costs by taking advantage of practices such as use of higher analyses fertilizer and discounts for cash bulk, quantity and early pur chase.

In deciding how much fertilizer is profitable, a farmer must take into account the expected yield response, crop prices, fertilizer costs and other additional costs incurred because of higher yields. Available capital, willingness to assume risk of residual carryover, and rental arrangements should also influence rates of application.

Farmers must carefully con sider the concept of diminishnig sider the concept of diministring returns when deciding how much fertilizer to use. Maxi-mum yield is nearly always not the most profitable yield. Farmers must consider availability of capital and alternative invest-ment opportunities to make wise

decisions on fertilizer use. Use of liberal amounts of commercial nitrogen has revo lutionized crop production on many Indiana farms. Application of the optimal amount of nitrogen is often highly profitable. Applying more than is really needed can be quite costly. Unlike nitrogen, phosphate doesn't leach out of the soil in

large quantities. Many farmers have been raising soil phosphate levels during the past 10 to 20 years by applying more than maintenance applications. Some soils are naturally higher in phosphate than are others. Thus, deciding how much phosphate one can profitably apply on the next crop, it is extremely important to know how much is already available in the soil. The same is true of potash, for amounts available in Indiana soils also vary widely.

There has been trouble with Newcastle's disease in poultry flocks around all fall. Most of the cases have been north the county, but we have had some too. The County Poultry Association and the extension office made some recommendations to all flock owners about a month ago and they still should be followed.

Christmas Tree Grades

Christmas trees can be harvested and sold on the basis of federally standardized grades, Thus growers of quality trees can increase their incomes, points out E. J. Lott, Purdue University extension forester.

U.S. grade standards were developed at the request of state national Christmas tree and associations. They have been re vised for 1962. Grading is voluntary and inspection will be provided for a moderate fee by the Department of Agriculture. Grades will include U. S. premium, U.S. No. 1 (or U.S. Choice), and U.S. No. 2 (or U.S. standard) Trees that cannot qualify will be listed as culls.

Previously many growers sold their trees in random lots just as a whole field was harvested. Dealers could not pay too high for such lots since at times they contained as much as 30 per cent culls. Grading will make it possible for growers to com-

mand a better price for batches of high quality trees and will protect dealers from taking a loss on cull trees mixed in with better ones. Grading should also be advantageous to the consumer since it will encourage better quality tree production.

Also, in harvesting, growers can select trees that will bring better prices and leave the others for later harvest either for the Christmas trade or other purposes





Delicate evergreens, such as Japanese Holly, Leatherleaf Vi-burnum, Boxwood and Daphne, should be protected from direct winter sunshine. With direct sun, which they are likely to get if they are on the south or west sides of your house, the evergreens may freeze and thaw rather quickly. This results in tissue rupturing. Sunshine also speeds evaporation and drying out.



Drafts, rather than low temperatures, influence milk production. Most dairymen can prevent cold winds and drafts by constructing wind break fences from rough lumber on the west and north sides of feed lots, say Purdue University extension dairymen.

Take inventory of your winter supply of hay and silage, advise University extension Purdue dairymen. Sell low producing cows and feed high producers producing at a maximum.



PREVENT WINTER DRIVING WOES

The National Safety Council says: You must see a hazard to avoid it. A clear windshield and good vision are both vital. Check wiper blades for deterioration. Dead, baked-out rubber smears. Arms should have one ounce of pressure for each inch of blade length. Otherwise blades smear instead of wiping clean.
