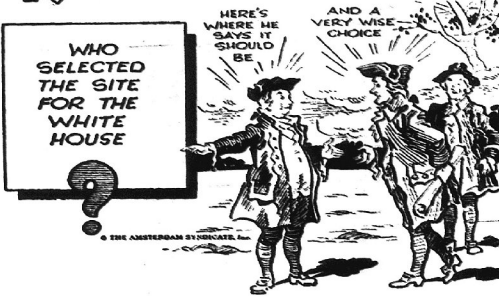

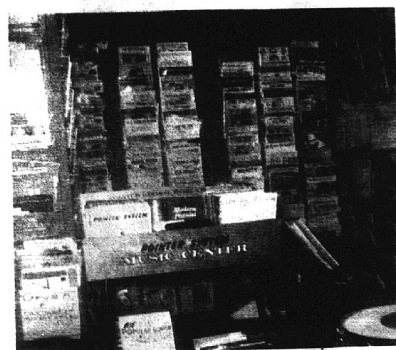

## T.V.S.C. Discusses Finances; Hires New Bus Driver

The board of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation met Monday evening for its regular monthly business meeting with one resident of the corporation present to register a complaint about non-payment of bill. This brought a discussion by the board and Superintendent Forbes concerning the lack of money now available in the special fund to pay outstanding obligations. Forbes said that as soon as the December disbursement is received all the checks will be mailed. It was reported that the special fund, from which these bills must be allowed, is now without funds.

The reason for the lack of funds was explained by Forbes and the board as being due to lack of money received from the state and a possible overspending on the repair of the school buildings. Board president Bucher reported the state has not come through with its part of the funds, and Forbes further stated that the state was 60 to 90 days behind in payments. W. K. Gast, board member, said the state had promised \$25 per pupil but had only paid half of this or a loss in revenue of \$23,500. An extra \$6,000 bus repair had to be paid which had not been anticipated and put the fund in very short financial standing.

The board said that the financial report is somewhat misleading in that the corporation does have funds, but that they are not in the special fund from which they must come to pay the obligations which are due.

Discussion was held concerning the Akron P.T.O. group's desire to sponsor an exchange student. The board favored such a project but said that they could not allow free tuition. This would have to be done by a sponsoring group. It was reported that the Kiwanis Club in Warsaw sponsors the exchange student and pays the expenses.

It was reported that board member Eldon Cumberland and Superintendent Forbes will at-

tend a meeting of the Indiana School Board Association at Elkhart on Tuesday night.

A report was read from the Warsaw school system which showed 51 students from the Atwood area being transferred to Warsaw. In all, there are 59 students who live in the Tippecanoe Valley area who have transferred to Warsaw.

Dick Gross was hired as a bus driver.

Nellie M. Riner, 81, mother of the late Kenneth A. Riner, died at 1:00 p.m. at her home Sunday, Dec. 6. She had been in poor health the last two years.

## Jake McClone Heart Victim

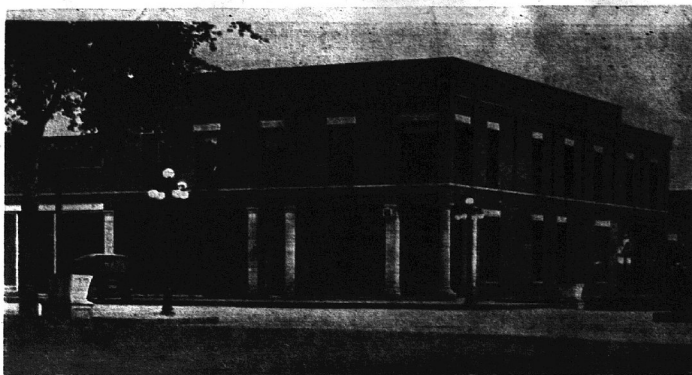

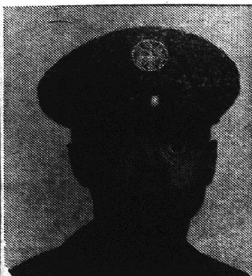

## The Upper Room

Thursday, December 10, 1964

Read Isaiah 60:19-20, II Peter 1:16-21

The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined. (Isaiah 9:2)

I never fully knew what darkness was until I became an infantry chaplain in jungle combat. The night was impenetrable, and every darker shadow seemed to be a skulking foe. Some in our port platoon would sing, "I hate to see that evenin' sun go down." Watching the sun go down, we never knew whether we should live to see it rise.

But the long night ended, we would see light in the east. How glorious was that transition from darkness to light! It reminded us of words in Genesis, "God said, Let there be light; and there was light." How reassuring it was to know that the longest night would end with the rising sun!

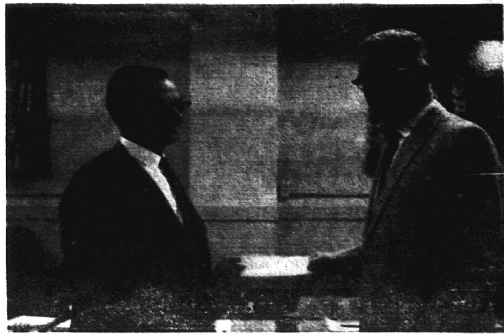
## Santa Is Coming

## 4-H Agricultural Awards Winner

McCroskey, 20, of Route 6, Rochester, was one of six national winners in the National 4-H Agricultural Awards Program sponsored by International Harvester.

CHICAGO — Don McCroskey, 20, of Route 6, Rochester, Ind., has been named one of six national winners in the 4-H Agricultural Awards Program. He was awarded an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and a scholarship.

The national winner is preparing himself for a career in the field of veterinary science and medicine at Purdue University where he is a junior. He gained his 4-H agricultural experience on the 185-acre Fulton county farm of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald McCroskey.

At the close of his 11-year career in 4-H, the winner looked back on a rewarding experience that began with three lambs from his father's flock. That same year his father bought ten registered Suffolk ewes and gave Don a 60 percent interest in the flock. With this beginning, and his love for animals, he was able to buy more sheep and livestock and

save enough money from profits to pay for college expenses.

McCroskey has carried 12 different projects over the years, with sheep always the major activity. He has raised a total of 276 sheep, taken part in 72 judging events and prepared 65 exhibits in this project. Among his other projects have been beef, dairy, tractor, forestry, swine, horse, corn, soybeans, electricity, woodworking and junior leadership. He has completed 46 projects in all, given 164 demonstrations on the local and county level, judged 477 animals at fairs, for which he has won 12 medals and 9 trophies.

In addition to sheep, he has raised 82 hogs, 14 beef animals, seven dairy cows and ten horses. Most of these animals have been sold and the profit used to pay for college. McCroskey's work in the agricultural program was supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

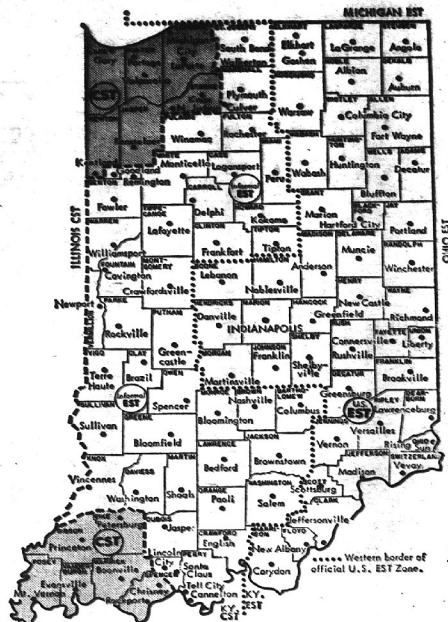

read Matthew 2:11-23

Then opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh. (Matthew 2:11, RSV)

At Christmas time last year I was standing in line at the post office waiting to mail some packages. In front of me was a very lovely elderly lady with a large package.

Wrapping Christmas packages may be considered an ordeal or it may be thought of as an occasion for including our love in every package wrapped. When the wise men prepared their gifts, surely they must have included love for the Christ child, for they travelled many miles to find Him.

This Christmas should also remind us of how much love God wrapped up in His gift to the world in the person of His Son. PRAYER. 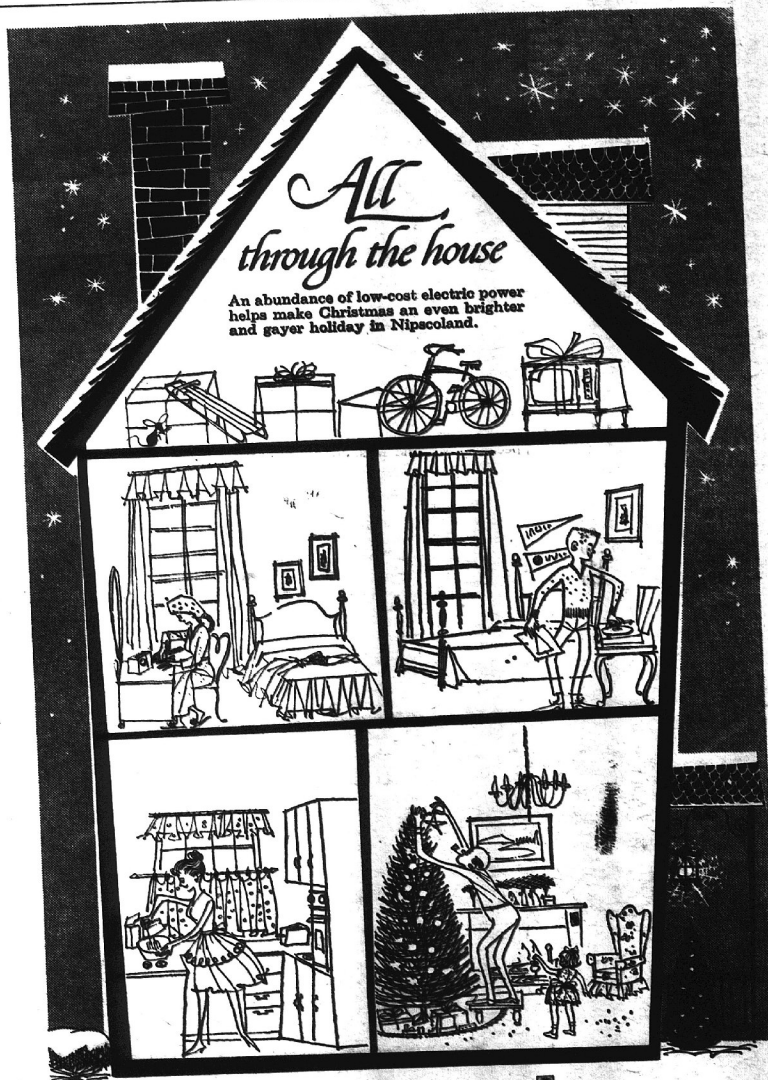

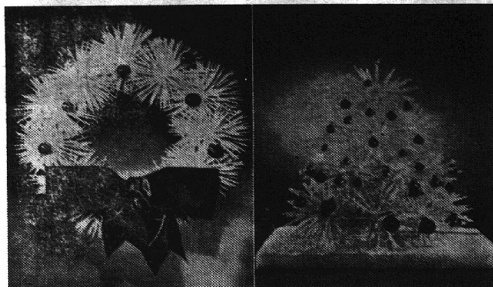

## Pot Plant Is Popular Gift

The poinsettia is the traditional Christmas plant, yet an upsurge in the popularity of indoor gardening has brought a number of flowering plants into the gift picture. Flowering plants in porous clay pots that preserve their health and beauty will highlight many a gift list this season.

Among the popular pot plants is the Jerusalem cherry. Its round, red fruit is especially appropriate for the holiday season. It needs bright light and likes a cool temperature no higher than 55 degrees at night for best results, although it does admirably even with a 65 degree night temperature. If the plant is allowed to wilt or if cooking gas fumes fill the air, the fruit will drop.

### Cyclamen

The cyclamen is a handsome plant even when not in bloom, but the blossoms are breathtaking—like Venetian glass exquisitely formed in the shape of butterflies that are white, red, pink, lavender, rose, maroon. This needs a cool 55 degree night temperature too. Water is safer from the base of the clay pot so the crown is not over-moistened, thus inviting rot.

Azaleas are popular. There are both tender kinds that must be brought indoors each winter, and hardy kinds that can be plunged—clay pot and all—out in the garden permanently next spring. The tender kinds are like miniature trees in shape. The hardy ones branch out closer to the ground like shrubs. Your nursery, garden center, or florist can tell you whether the one you select is hardy or not.

### Lasting Beauty

Primroses have blossoms that look like pastel Christmas candles. Select plants with lots of buds so you will have a profusion of bloom over many weeks. New buds will continue to develop if plants are watered and fed regularly and if temperature in the room is below 65 degrees at night.

The Christmas pepper is handled much the same as the Jerusalem cherry. Among smaller plants, kalanchoe and African violets are tops for Christmas. A white flowering African violet in a red clay pot, dressed up with a bright red bow seems ideally suited for Christmas. And the kalanchoe's brilliant orange-red blossoms sparkle like tree lights. Both plants are good long-term investment for any gardener.

## Holiday Stains Need Attention

Removing Christmas stains from fabrics—such as ink, candle wax, glue or chocolate—calls for prompt action.

Carbon tetrachloride is best to remove ballpoint ink. Soak garment in warm soap or detergent suds, wash and rinse in clear water. If discoloration remains on white or bleached material, use a mild bleach and launder again.

Scrape excess candle wax off garment with a table knife. Place stained spot between white blotters and press with hot iron. Then rub gently with turpentine and wash in warm suds.

For glue stain, soak fabric in warm suds until dissolved; launder in fresh warm suds.

For chocolate or cocoa stain, wash in hot suds. Treat remaining stain with weak solution of household bleach or hydrogen peroxide and launder again in hot suds.





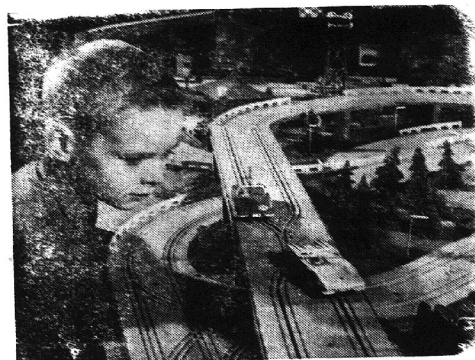
### Gift Buying Service Does Complete Job

#### Choice of Tree Differs From East To West

In New England and the Northeast, balsam fir and white spruce are the most popular Christmas trees, while Pennsylvanians often prefer Scotch pine, spruce and red pine.

In the South, red cedar and the scarce but beautiful holly tree are often used, as well as pine.

In the West, cedars and Arizona cypress are favorites, and on the West Coast a wide variety of trees, Douglas fir, blue spruce, Englemann spruce and other locally grown trees are all popular.

#### IN JAPAN

Christmas is observed widely in Japan despite the fact that fewer than one per cent of the country's population is Christian. Each year, Tokyo's streets are bright with holiday decorations, and "White Christmas" is almost as popular as it is in America.

#### Yule Greenery Once Prohibited

Love, the poets say, is like the wild rose briar and friendship like the holly tree.

The similarity of love and wild rose briar may need proving but history records the use of holly as a symbol of goodwill and friendship even before the Christian era.


Holly wreaths, sprays and twigs were used, too, in various rites throughout much of Europe in those early days. And large quantities of the shiny green foliage and red berries were brought indoors to brighten the scene during drab winter days. But even before the Romans set foot on English shores, the druids were using holly in their own pagan rites.

Due to this pagan association, early Christian leaders opposed use of holly during the Christmas season. In fact, Christians were forbidden to decorate their homes with Christmas greenery during the mid-December Saturnalian revelries of the Roman Empire. Eventually, however, holly decorations became so well established and so popular they were given Christmas acceptance.

#### HOLIDAY FIREWORKS

In the United States, fireworks are associated with the celebration of the Fourth of July. Our neighbors to the South use fireworks to celebrate the birthday of Christ.

In some sections of the Americas, particularly on Christmas Eve, fireworks are as traditional as going to church or setting down to a family feast.

### Know-How Preserves Beauty C Plants

You don't really have to have a green thumb to have "luck" with house plants. You just need to remember that such plants need sufficient light and sufficient humidity.

If your plants are thin and don't flower properly, they need more light. If plants drop leaves or turn brown, they lack sufficient humidity.

Give your plants the light they need — utilizing incandescent or fluorescent lights if necessary. But, by all means keep plants away from radiators and other sources of dry heat.

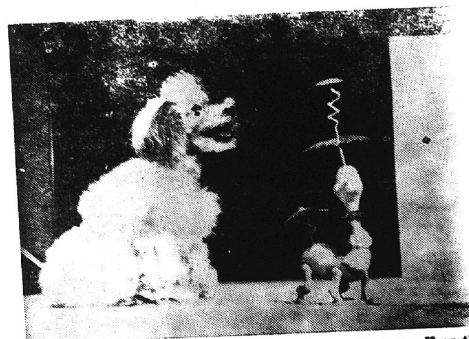

## New Joy To Young Hearts

You can bring happiness this Christmas to children in hospitals, orphanages and in the families of the unemployed by refurbishing the toys your own children have outgrown or no longer enjoy. In many communities, civic and fraternal groups have organized programs for this purpose.

The easiest way to make old toys in basically good condition look like new again is with colorful quality enamels, and here are some tips to help you do the job.

First and most important of all be sure you use only suitable enamels, particularly those that contain less than 1 per cent of lead. While most enamels meant for interior use contain no harmful ingredients, be sure to tell your paint dealer that you will be painting toys. He will sell you the right product. Under no circumstances use outside paint on toys or children's furniture.

### Kids Like Color

Bear in mind that children prefer strong, bold colors, the primaries; red, yellow and blue, the bright secondaries; orange, green, purple. It takes a more sophisticated taste to enjoy pastel and less lively darker shades. They also like the shininess of gloss enamel.

Wash the toy with detergent to remove finger marks and other soil. If old finish is glossy, it should be dulled with sandpaper, so new finish will adhere better. Any cracks or holes should be filled with water putty or plastic wood which should be permitted to dry before sanding smooth.

### Easy To Use

For small articles, you'll find self-spraying enamels in aerosol cans easiest and most practical to use. If more than one color is to be applied, protect the already painted areas with masking tape.

### CHRISTMAS SEALS

Einar Holbech noticed the idea to his fellow workers and they thought it would be a good help in defraying the cost of fighting tuberculosis. The idea was sold to King Christian, who approved, and the image of Queen Louise appeared on the first seals in 1904.

A Danish-born American, Philip Riis sold the idea to the American public in a 1907 magazine article and a Red Cross campaign. Miss Emily Bissell, started the first American sales in 1908.

## Scientist Not Satisfied With Native Holly

Of all the traditional, always-the-same symbols of Christmas, you might think that holly is most unchangeable.

But a plant breeder at Rutgers University's College of Agriculture says "no."—there's room for improvement in holly. He's not out to change the symbolism of holly, whatever that may be, but only the plant itself.

Dr. Elwin R. Orton is talking about American holly—*ilex opaca*—that grows best in New Jersey and the East, not English holly. Most of the English holly available at Christmas comes from the Pacific Northwest.

### Variations

But there are tremendous variations within the American species in color, glossiness of leaves, bearing habits of berries and other characteristics. And it lives through cold winters that can kill the less hardy English holly.

Dr. Orton's holly-breeding project began with selection of male and female plants with characteristics that might improve the species, then cross-pollination according to time-tested methods.

Harvesting the berries was easy enough. But each berry contains four seeds with extremely hard coats. Normally, in wild state, a holly seed takes as long as three years to germinate.

### Still Takes Time

Successful experiments compressed this time to 14 months, yet it's still two and a quarter years from time of planting the seed until the new plant is 15 inches high and big enough for results to be seen. Complicating this situation is the fact that some plants don't begin to show desirable characteristics—put their best foot forward—until after four or five years.

New sorts will be worth waiting for, but meanwhile, Dr. Orton suggests, enjoy whatever kind of holly you can get, American or English. Even a sprig in the plum pudding helps preserve the tradition.


The Womens - Missionary Society Church met at the home of Mrs. William Blackford Wednesday for a pot-luck dinner at noon.
