New buds will continue to develop if plants are watered and fed regu-larly and if temperature in the room is below 65 degrees at night. The Christmas pepper is han-died much the same as the Jeru-salem cherry. Among smaller plants, falanchoe and African vio-lets are tops for Christmas. An white flowering African violet in a red clay pot, dressed up with a bright red bow seems ideally suited for Christmas. And the kalanchoe's brilliant orange-red blossoms sparkle like tree lights. Both plants are good long-term investment for any gardener.


