C of C plans decorating contest, future fund raising events

A Christmas lighting and decorating contest was discussed by members of the Mentone Chamber of Commerce at Monday night's dinner meeting of the group. Prize monies in the amounts of \$15, \$10, and \$5 will be given to the first three winners in the home decorating contest, and \$15 will be presented to the best commercial display.

Other plans made by the group included a chicken fry to be held January 27, the proceeds of which will go to the Airport Improvement Fund. Committees for the affair, which will feature deep-fried chicken, both in carry-outs and meals, were announced. It was noted that members and wives of members of the Mentone Flying Club would assist in serving.

A financial report was given, and a report on the progress of the runway project was given, noting that the bad weather had hampered work there. It is hoped, the group said, that the preliminary work can yet be done this winter with the final paving being completed in the spring.

Town Board

Discusses Zoning

Members of the Mentone Town Board met Monday evening. Included in the evening's discussion was the topic of county zoning. No decision was reached concerning the matter.

The board allowed \$83 for the bill incurred in the recent November election since the amount had not been budgeted prior to the election.

Millard Laughlin, owner and operator of the M and R Egg Co., protested the high figure on his water bill and asked for a check of his meter. The board agreed to look into the matter.

Another meeting will be held by the present board before the new board is sworn in on New Year's Day 1968. The meeting will probably be held on Dec. 26, and all bills owed the town are to be presented at this meeting.

Also planned is the annual scholarship basketball contest featuring members of the Chamber of Commerce and the Mentone faculty. This game will be played in March, and all funds raised will be placed in

the scholarship fund. The Chamber of Commerce has issued scholarships to deserving graduates of Mentone High School for a number of years.

Joseph Baker, Forest Miner, and Darrell King were named to the nominating committee and will select candidates for the board of directors to be chosen in March.

Lawn Mower Sales And Service Opens Here

Melvin Jordan, Sr. announced this week he will open a new lawn mower sales and service in Mentone. Located in the former lumber company building on the west side of Road 19, Jordan will also do mechanical work on cars and small engines. The name of the business will be Jordan and Sons.

Jordan purchased the building, which he recently remodeled by adding a partial glass front and doors, from Solar Nitrogen and Chemical Co., Inc., Lima, Ohio. Jordan and his wife and children are Mentone residents.

New Red Cross

Building Is Opened

A special ribbon cutting ceremony for the new American Red Cross headquarters at 501 No. Lake St., Warsaw, was held Sunday afternoon.

Present for the program were Paul A. Oberly, chapter headquarters benefactor, past Red Cross chapter chairmen, present chairmen, Warsaw Mayor and Mrs. Paul Johnson, County Commissioners Harvey Anglin, Fred Gilliland, and Ray Fervada, Joe Ettinger, and several other board members and interested persons.

Mr. Oberly made the new office facilities possible and will

permit the Red Cross to rent an upstairs apartment. Upon his death, ownership of the building will pass to the Red Cross. In the event he dies before Jan. 1, 1970, the Red Cross will pay \$2,000 to the state.

It was noted that the Red Cross has expended \$2100 from

ARC funds to renovate the building and would appreciate public assistance and contributions.

A special invitation was issued to clubs desiring to meet in the new building. If the club requests it, a program about the Red Cross can be provided.

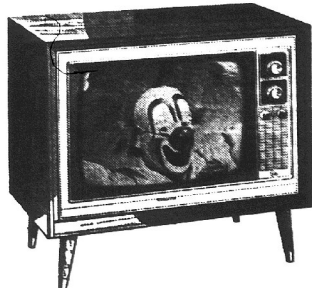

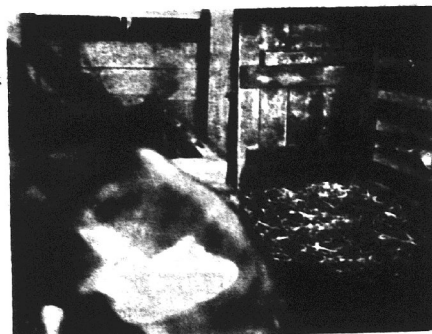
Mrs. Judy McFadden and Mrs. Kitty Alvey spent Tuesday in Ft. Wayne shopping.

If you haven't yet caught up with a copy of the gem of an editorial written by Alan McIntosh in the Rock County Herald, Luverne, Minnesota, and reprinted in the Baking Industry Magazine of August 26, 1967, read on. Should you utter a fervent "AMEN!" after reading it...you are not alone.

I Am A Tired American

I am a tired American. I am tired of being the ugly American. I'm tired of having the world panhandlers use my country as a whipping boy 365 days a year.

I am tired of having American embassies and information centers stoned, burned and sacked by mobs operating under orders from dictators who preach peace and breed conflict.

I am a tired American - weary of being lectured by General DeGaulle (who never won a battle) who poses as a second Jehovah in righteousness and wisdom.

"A young person today, dissatisfied with school and anxious to get out and work for the money he wants, is heading down a dead-end street if he pursues his dreams without a high school diploma. He finds out too late that the job he longed for will be at best a dull, dirty one with little opportunity for advancement. Or, the jobless rate of 13 per cent for school dropouts suddenly becomes very real to him as he discovers that he doesn't have the ticket he needs to get through the employers' doors...For many of these young people, there is still time. They can go back and finish high school. For others, it is too late. The education they get now charts the course not only for their individual lives but for the welfare of our country in the coming decades."

JACKSON, MO., POST & CASH-BOOK: "It's not a pretty scene to come upon, shattered glass, twisted metal, oozing oil and gasoline, means of pain and the flowing of a man's life-blood don't give you a comfortable feeling. How can drivers be made to realize that a bit more caution, a bit more kindness, a bit more courtesy and a lot more decency would put an end to many of these scenes."

LITCHFIELD, MINN., REVIEW: "Another example of the government's inconsistency can be noted at the Tennessee Valley Hydroelectric plant where because of greater costs of operation the government is boosting power rates 7 to 9 per cent...Private business feels the increase in operation (costs) just as much as the government. One would think and expect the government to set an example of holding the line rather than hiking it up and at the same time denying private business the same privilege."

FHA Announces New Housing Loan

Harry Welland, FHA Supervisor, announced today an expanded Rural Housing Program of the Farmers Home Administration. In addition to the regular 33-year 5% loans for families in towns of less than 5500 and in rural areas to purchase or build homes, the FHA is now providing a "Special 502" loan for improvements or enlargements of existing homes. These loans are limited to \$35,000 with a monthly repayment of \$18.25 and closing of \$10.00. The usual eligibility requirements will apply, including inability to secure credit elsewhere at reasonable terms. The local FHA Office is in Room 1, Spohn Building, Goshen.

Should Your Child Go Christmas Shopping?

Lafayette, Ind. At what age should you let your child begin to shop for Christmas gifts?

Selecting a few simple presents can be fun for a child as young as four to six years old if the trip is carefully planned and the choices limited, according to Mrs. Elaine Dolch, of Purdue University's family life-child development department.

Plan to shop when the stores aren't crowded and when you have time to let the youngster make unhurried decisions. Leave the other children at home with Daddy or a sitter so that you can concentrate on choosing gifts.

A young child needs a lot of guidance in making selections for holiday gift-giving. Limit the shopping to a few simple choices such as "Let's get

Grandmother a pot holder or a tea towel...which of these two pot holders do you think she'd prefer?"

Your youngster may enjoy a "secret" trip with Daddy to a nearby store to buy a box of note paper for Mother.

Part of the fun of gift-giving is wrapping. If your time is limited, buy a couple of gifts yourself and let the child choose one for that someone special and wrap it himself. Just provide a large piece of colorful wrapping paper or a paper bag and stickers and let the little artist use his imagination.

Well, Mr. Publisher, I gotta close, cause I'm getting a creak in my neck from looking both ways and a upset stomach from what I'm seeing.

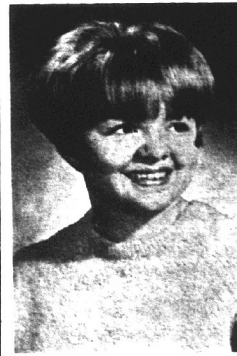

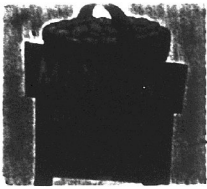

"What is best?" is board topic

Item No. 7 on an otherwise routine agenda of the Tippecanoe Valley School board's Monday night meeting read: Review of building costs, interest costs, discussion of future building policy. It evoked more discussion than review although some of the statements made by board members were pretty much a review of what they have been saying for the past six years. Superintendent Forbes pointed out that interest rates were high and that bond issues were not selling well. The discussion turned, as it usually does, to whether the corporation will settle for one high school or whether two schools should be kept. Gale Creighton, long an advocate of a centralized high school, was backed in his position by David Burkett, new board member from Newcastle township. Burkett was given copies of the Purdue survey and other reference material to acquaint him with past action and policy.

The discussion pointed out that the Beaver Dam and Talma schools had been remodeled for a five-year period and that Beaver Dam was now in its fifth year of use whereas Talma was now in its fourth year. It was also noted that more room is needed at Talma.

Suggestions in the past have always included closing the Beaver Dam and Talma schools but have wavered between the advisability of two schools versus one. The advocates of one school maintain that nothing stronger than emotion prevents one school being built while the two school advocates note that the cost of building one high school in the country would be high since sewage and water facilities would have to be constructed that would not be necessary in a corporate area. Also, it is noted, fire and police protection would not be adequate in a country school. These objections, therefore, always bring the discussion to where such a school would be located, and someone always points out that neither Akron nor Mentone would like to see a school built in the other's town. At this point discussion bogs down as it did Monday night and as it has for six years, until the meeting is either adjourned or someone notes that he no longer has time to devote to such a discussion and the group breaks up.

Some board members noted they had been receiving calls

asking them "not to rock the boat." This prompted discussion concerning what "rocking the boat" meant and whether the man on the street should be allowed to determine an issue of this kind.

The rest of the meeting was routine with the exception of board approval to purchase a

bookkeeping machine for the superintendent's office. A contract in the amount of \$6,863.20 was let to the Burroughs Corporation for this machine, which will be installed within a few weeks and which is supposed to upgrade the bookkeeping system as well as bring it current with state regulations.

School Christmas Program Is Set

Plans have been completed for the December 19 school Christmas program to be held at 7:30 p.m. in the Mentone gym. Entitled "Christmas Comes to our School," the musical play was written by Lois Myers Emig.

Participating will be first, third, and fifth grade students from Mentone and Burket as well as the high school combined groups and Triple Trio. The Mellodears and Boys Barbershop Quartet will also sing. Nancy Campbell will be the

narrator. Accompanying the singers will be Mrs. Reed, Becky Hunter and Luanna Sarber.

The PTA sponsored program will close with "Silent Night" being sung by the Triple Trio and Mellodears and with a visit from Santa Claus.

Baptist Church Plans Program

A special musical program will be presented at the First Baptist Church Sunday evening, December 17, at 7:30 p.m. Providing the music will be a junior choir, a junior high ensemble, the senior high youth choir and the adult choir.

A thumb made so painful by the removal of a large and very old wart that any motion made it throbbed sidled me for the week-end and even now hinders my typing for I must strike the space bar with my left thumb, which is contrary to all I was taught, and it slows the writing process greatly.

Still, the fact that I could not wave the hand about or immerse it in a pail of hot water to scrub woodwork or use the no longer existing nail as a scratcher-scraper in household chores much less risk jarring it by spanking the boys or grip enough with it to sew or write Christmas cards limited many of my planned activities. But what another world was revealed as I struggled to cook and wash dishes with one hand. Todd could, and did, help make a salad; it was he who popped the corn for guests and he who tied the accumulation of papers. Doug could, with some urging, take long naps and could have fun reading to himself if read to first.

What a glorious week-end of indulgent reading. Not a thing was read because it was "a must" or because I thought it would broaden my education but much was read for the simple fun of reading. A condensed version of *A Harem In The House* by Graham Porter was followed by a pseudo-intellectual report of the people who did and didn't attend Truman Capote's party and by part of yet another article about Jacqueline Kennedy before disgust turned me to a series of articles advocating the "new morality" that impressed me more by their complete lack of morality. Reading *Rosemary's Baby* by Ira Levin was followed by an in-depth report of a socialite's death after she joined the hippie and witch world of Greenwich Village. The horrors of the dope described therein reminded me of incidents described in David Wilkerson's book, *The Little People*, and I would recommend the book to any of you who want to read the story of the little people who are affected by dope—the children of addicts. The book is small but it is good reading, and it would make a good Christmas present.

I even took time to learn who Marshall McLuhan is and to read some of his writings. Like Kilroy, his name pops into almost every periodical, and I felt left out until I read an article or two of his. Now I feel more confused than left out but will attempt to re-read him some day when the thumb keeps quieter and when everyone is asleep, else his modern world of communication may never reach my inner mind.

Reading Mark Twain's "The Notorious Jumping Frog of Calaveras County" aloud to the boys was both a struggle and a joy with nine-year old Todd leaning like a solid rock on my good left hand and with three-year old Doug, our own jumping frog, turning cartwheels through the living room, but it was fun for all of us and in turn led them to discover more of their own books. Doug even switched from his favorite

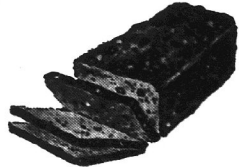
"Little Red Hen" to "Lucinda the Donkey" and "Mr. Punney-moon's Train." You do have to credit that little red hen for her industry, however, and wish some Great Society leaders had studied her more earnestly when they were three. Todd, as usual, alternated his reading between the life of Thomas A. Edison, his hero, and the Sears catalog. It's had to keep from daydreaming when you are nine and want to be a "rocket engineer" with a PhD from Purdue but you still like Matchbox toys and racing bikes.

I relearned the merits and demerits of reading Pearl S. Buck and read a short story of hers and began, for the second time, her book *My Several Worlds*. At least we can admire a person's writing if we sometimes question the approach and can savor the well chosen words that sometimes turn into elaborate, elongated sentences.

Ah, there is so much more to be read, so much to savor like a short article in *Good Housekeep-*

ing and some, such as future J. Kennedy articles, to disregard, that I will be sorry to be done with an excuse for so much reading and so little other activity. But it will be good to regain the use of that thumb. It hurts.

Northern Indiana Co-op receivership hearing set today

Stockholders of the Northern Indiana Co-Operation Association met at the Town Hall Monday night to discuss the financial structure of the local co-operative and voted unanimously to go ahead with receivership proceedings begun recently.

A hearing on the petition of receivership will be held this afternoon.

Kermit Zent, president of the board of directors, conducted the meeting and told the 124 stockholders present that the feed mill operation was obsolete and was losing money. He noted that the hardware and filling

station were in good financial shape.

The receivership petition was filed by Eugene Sarber, Dr. O. L. McFadden, Frank Nellans, and Ernest Harrold, directors.

The Northern Indiana Co-op Association was organized in 1930 by a group of farmers to buy feed co-operatively. The firm constructed the hardware building in 1937, and during the '30's was active in helping Mentone become known as the Eggbasket of the Midwest as train car loads of eggs left the local station for eastern markets. The filling station was

added to the holdings in 1942.

Interest in the co-operative was most active during the 1950's when waiting lists were long with names of people desiring to purchase stock. Little interest in the stock issue has been noted for some time, it was pointed out.

Ed Fenker is the present manager of the Co-Op, having assumed duties here three months ago, replacing Everett Rathfon who had been serving as active manager since the resignation of Gerald Ballenger earlier in the year.

The future of the local operation will not be certain until the receiver is appointed today.

Basketball Enthusiasm High At Talma

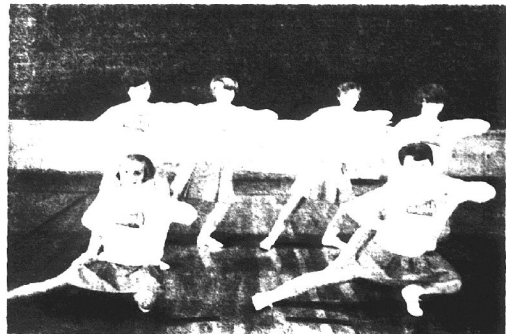

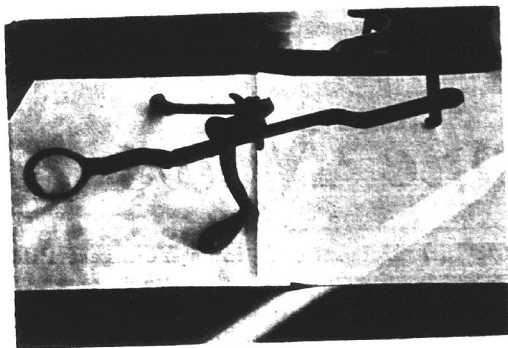
To me, this could be the

Watch Out For Unsafe Toys!

For preschool youngsters, the Christmas morning discovery of new toys from Santa is the high point of the holiday. But too often the fun and excitement are marred by the tragedy of accidents caused by unsafe toys. From the anxious moment of a cut finger to fatalities, the hazards of unsuitable toys take their holiday toll.

While no parent, grandparent, friend or relative who plays Santa Claus for a preschool child would knowingly give a toy not safe for play in the before-kindergarten world, they can be misled by the appeals of novelty, price, "cuteness," or color.

Making Christmas toys safe for preschoolers is a year-round job for Playskool Research, which recommends the following guidelines for a safe, happy holiday for youngsters:

—Be sure all paint used on toys for children is non-toxic. Because youngsters "taste" everything, this is particularly important.

—Check the material of which a playtool is made. The toy which breaks easily and unexpectedly into jagged or small pieces is a hazard for preschoolers. Wood and soft, strong plastic are especially acceptable for the preschoolers' toys.

—Toys with small parts easily removed by eager little fingers — buttons, eyes of stuffed animals, small beads, or wires — are not for the younger preschool set.

—Sharp edges or corners, protruding nails, splinters in wood are safety hazards which can be avoided by checking the toy thoroughly before buying.

—Electric toys are not recommended for younger preschool children and, in addition, they tend to stifle the creative and imaginative challenges of "learning while playing."

—From the toddler stage, children should be taught to put their toys away. Providing a special place—toy box, shelves, or cupboard—encourages habits of neatness and safety.

Christmas is a happy time, particularly when the enthusiasm and delight of the season are shared with youngsters. Giving special attention to toy safety can help assure the happiest of holidays.

Homemaking Hints

After a party, treat carpeting and upholstery stains immediately, says Purdue University extension home management specialists, even though you're tempted to wait until morning. After the spots have penetrated the fiber and dried, you may find them almost impossible to remove.

Plan in advance where you'll put wet coats and boots in case you have an uninvited Hoosier snowstorm for your holiday party, remind Purdue University extension home management specialists.

If you are using a metal Christmas tree this year, place a spot or flood lamp near the tree to highlight it. Christmas tree lights on such trees are a safety hazard, warn Purdue

Place ash trays in conspicuous spots if you are giving a party, suggests Purdue University's extension home furnishings specialists. If you still find a burn in the carpeting, clip the blackened or hardened fiber to camouflage the damage.

Skid Control Is Urged

Skidding, the cause of more than 100,000 automobile accidents each year, can be controlled.

So says Liberty Mutual Insurance Companies, a firm which has established the nation's only skid control school at its research center in Hopkinton, Massachusetts.

The insurance firm points out that most of the skidding accidents occur during the winter months when the roads are slicked with ice, snow, slush, or rain.

Liberty Mutual engineers, who say there are six basic skids, list four steps to take when a car begins to skid: take the foot off the brakes, take the foot off the gas pedal, counter-steer and de-clutch.

The six skids are:

1. Front-wheel lock, when the

car's front tires slip on ice or oil slick, causing the driver to lose steering control.

2. Rear-wheel lock, when the driver slams on the brakes on slippery pavement, causing the car to make a 180-degree turn with the rear end of the car whipping around to the "front."

3. All-wheel lock, when brakes are jammed too hard, causing all four wheels to lose traction with the road. The car slides unpredictably in any direction.

When this occurs, the car can be slowed down by "stabbing" the brakes, repeatedly hitting them quickly until the front end of the car goes down and releasing the brakes until the hood rises.

4. Power skid, when the car is accelerated too fast for road conditions, causing the rear wheels to spin quickly while the car "fishtails" back and forth.

5. Spinouts, caused by entering a turn too fast and the rear end of the car breaks loose and whips the car off the road.

6. Hydroplaning, the front tires at high speed literally riding atop a thin film of water, with no tire contact with the road. Sudden wind gusts caused by passing vehicles could push the car right off the road.

Liberty Mutual says it hopes skid control training will one day be part of driving training programs throughout the country.

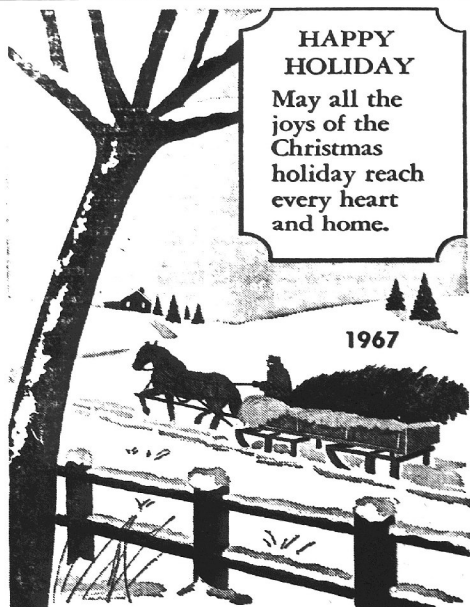

1. Sports Critique.

3. Collections.

A few thoughts for people who do collect things—any things. If you don't have pictures of the items in your collection, why not take them? It's easy to do with any camera. If the things you collect are valuable, fragile or cumbersome, they're not easily shared with fellow hobbyists. But with pictures you can exchange collections by mail, illustrate hobby magazines, show off your prizes wherever you travel, all while the originals are safely at home. When it comes time to sell or

buy, you can exchange pictures, not samples.

4. Christmas Cards.

Just keep the negatives on file and then, along about the following September, take the selected picture negative to a commercial photographer. Most photographers have a contact printing setup and will be able to produce attractive personalized Christmas cards of your choice—a good value.

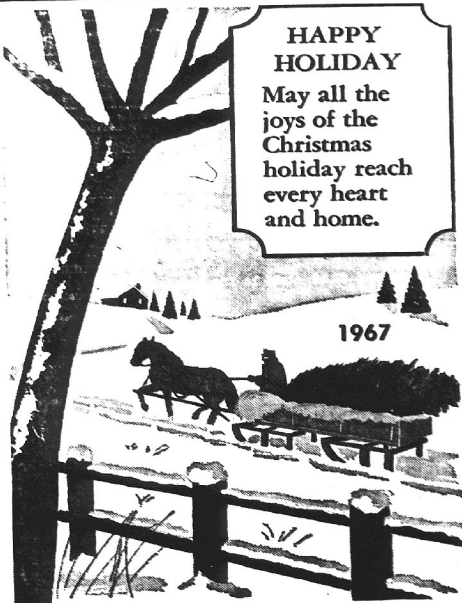

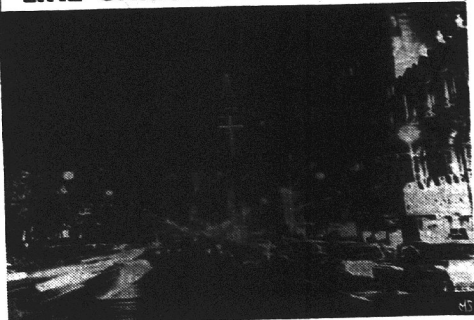

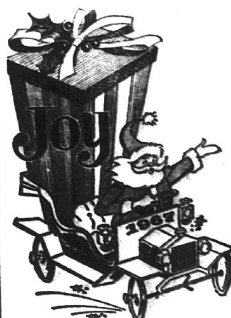

San Francisco Had First Christmas Tree

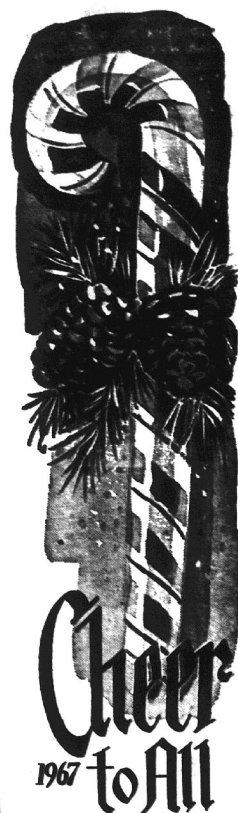

Have Yourself A Safe Holiday

Since Christmas is traditionally a season of joy and happiness, special consideration should be given to the "do" and "don't" safety rules we should observe year-round. Don't get carefree and increase the possibility of an unhappy accident.

First, decorate wisely. Do not use cotton, paper or any flammable material when you trim the family tree. Do not place electric trains or other electric powered devices around the tree. Metallic tinsel falling across the track could create a short circuit and cause the train transformer to burn.

Be sure that all toys are of non-flammable materials. Some imported toys are made of nitro-cellulose (which looks like celluloid or plastic) and this material burns with surprising ferocity.

Choose only electrical toys and tree lighting sets which are laboratory approved.

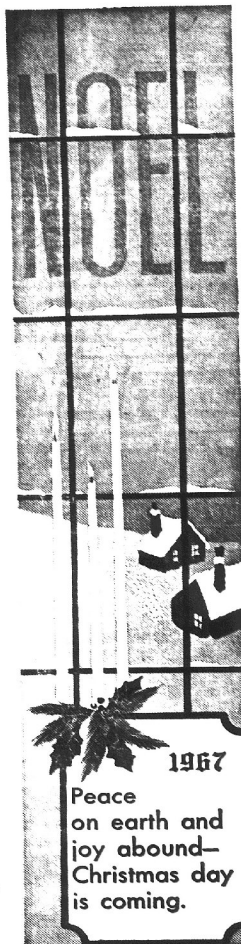
Visit your frame shop, department, gift, or variety store for frames to fit your photos. You may even want frames larger than your photos to give the picture a wide border of wrapping paper.

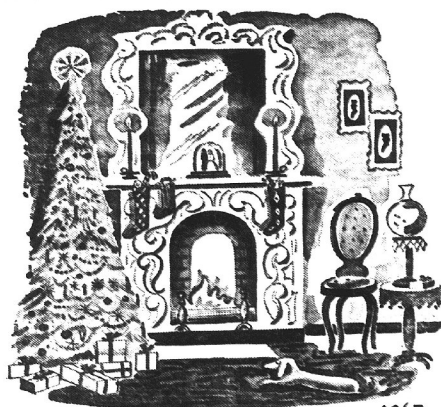

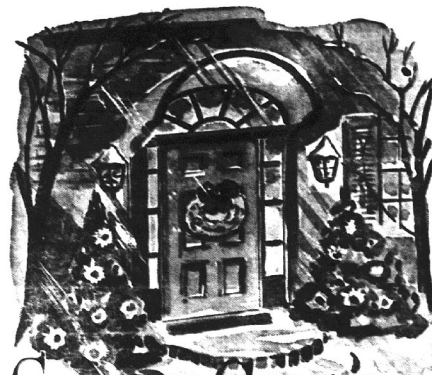

They used the juice of the berry for red dye. Eventually the cranberry was to become a tradition as part of the Christmas menu.

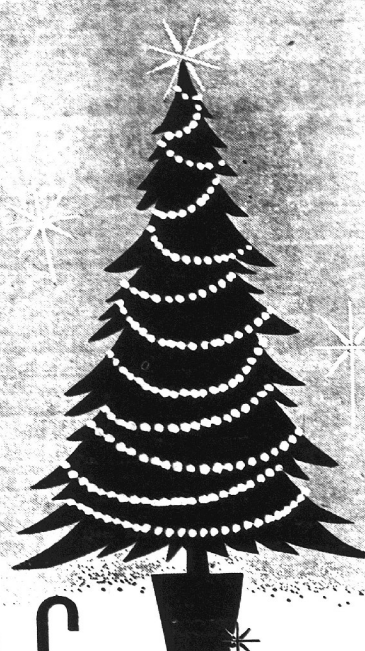

Grits Souffle

Here's a hot treat for cold winter, a recipe for a luscious grits souffle. Combine 1½ cups cold cooked enriched white hominy grits, ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ cup hot milk, and beat until blended. Beat 4 egg yolks until they are thick and lemon-colored, and add them to the grits mixture. Fold in 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten. Then fold in 1 cup grated Cheddar cheese. Pour the mixture into a 1-quart casserole set into a shallow baking pan. Pour hot water around the casserole to a depth of 1 inch. Bake in pre-heated moderate (350° F.) for 55 to 60 minutes. Serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.

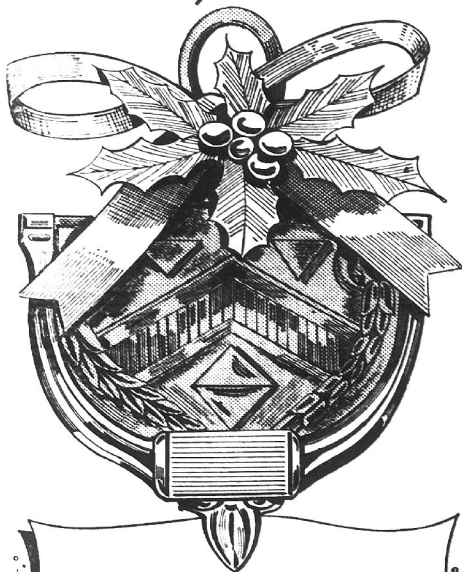

Secrets To Giving Successful Holiday Party

Lafayette, Ind. Do you look on holiday party-giving with anticipation or dread? A successful party depends partly on your attitude. The gesture of fellow-

ship and goodwill is more important than a spotless house.

But, let's face the fact that a little sprucing up of the house helps put the hostess at ease. Getting the house ready for a party is easier if you plan ahead, suggests Elkin Minter, Purdue University extension home management specialists. For example, if the draperies need cleaning, don't expect one-day service from your dry cleaners just before Christmas.

Do you need to wash the sofa slipcover before the party? Don't wait until the last minute—giving yourself time for adjustments in case the fabric shrinks or a seam pulls loose as you replace the cover.

If you have taken care of the essential housecleaning chores well in advance, you can give the house a light "once over" the day before the party—let the children take care of the last minute pick-up.

Then, instead of worrying about the house-sparkling chores you aren't able to finish, just dim the lights and place lighted candles in the dark corners. Candles do more than add to the festive atmosphere. They also disguise chipping paint and spots on the carpet.

Slow Moving Vehicle Law Goes In Effect

Indiana State Police Superintendent Robert A. O'Neal today issued a reminder that on January 1, 1968, a new traffic law affecting the operation of slow moving vehicles will become effective.

The law, which will apply only to vehicles which do not, under ordinary circumstances, travel on the highways in excess of 25 miles per hour, requires the display of a triangular slow moving vehicle emblem visible from the rear. The emblem must be mounted as near as is practicable to the center of the rear of the vehicle at an approximately height of from 3 to 5 feet from the ground. In addition to the slow moving vehicle emblem, all vehicles which do not ordinarily travel in excess of 25 miles per hour must display a red or amber flashing light showing to the rear when using the highways at night. This flashing light is to be mounted as low as practicable but not higher than 8 feet from ground level. Double-faced flashing lamps are permissible provided they display only amber to the front.

Standards and specifications for the design, materials and mounting of the slow moving vehicle emblem are to be published by the Office of Traffic Safety after January 1, 1968. "Floyd Kline, Sr., Director of the Office of Traffic Safety, has assured us that any emblem bearing S.A.E. or A.S.A.E. approval will qualify under the new specifications," Superintendent O'Neal stated.

"As our highway become increasingly more crowded, laws such as this one become an absolute necessity," he said. "We hope that the motoring public will come acquainted with the hazards that the slow moving vehicle emblem and the flashing

light represents and adjust their driving habits accordingly."

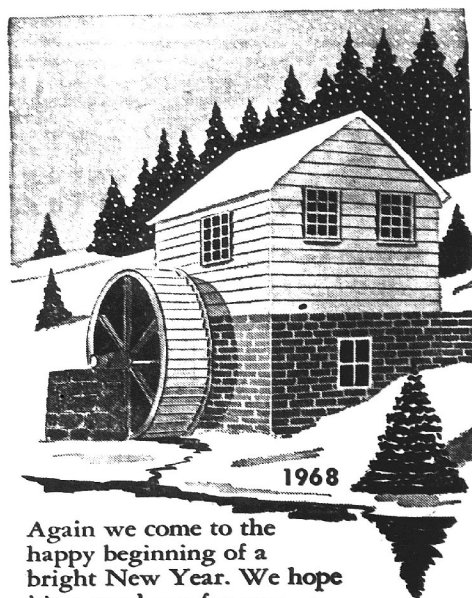

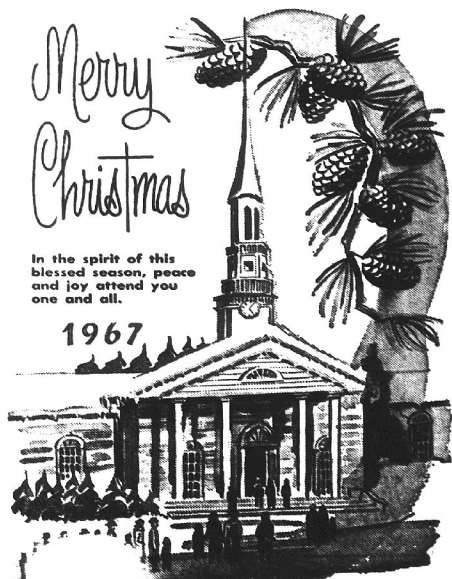

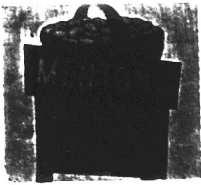

Nellans' duties will include taking charge of and selling the assets of the firm, paying debts and obligations and winding up the affairs of the Co-op as provided by law.

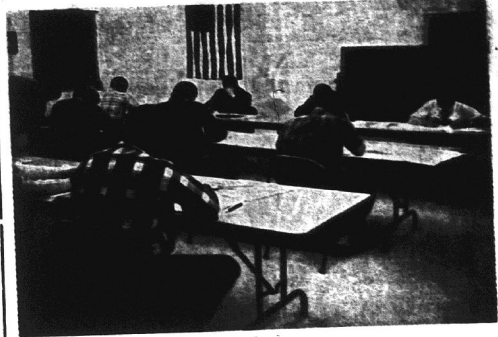

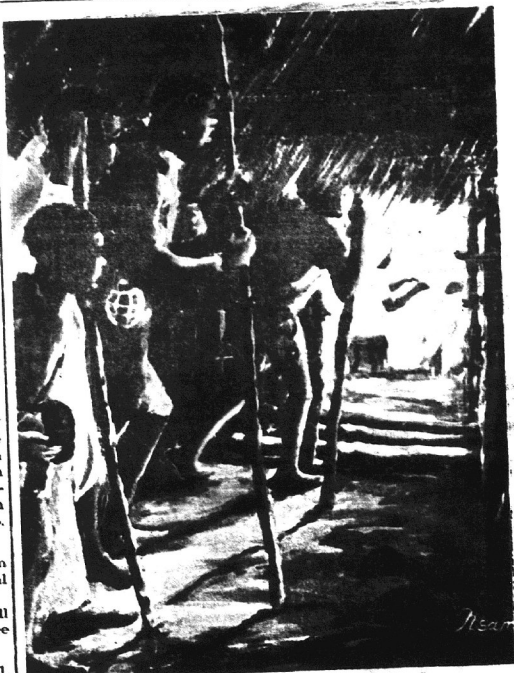
Mentone won the B-team game 49-37, paced by Sal Murcia.

I know one preacher that done a full operation on his congregation and they had to

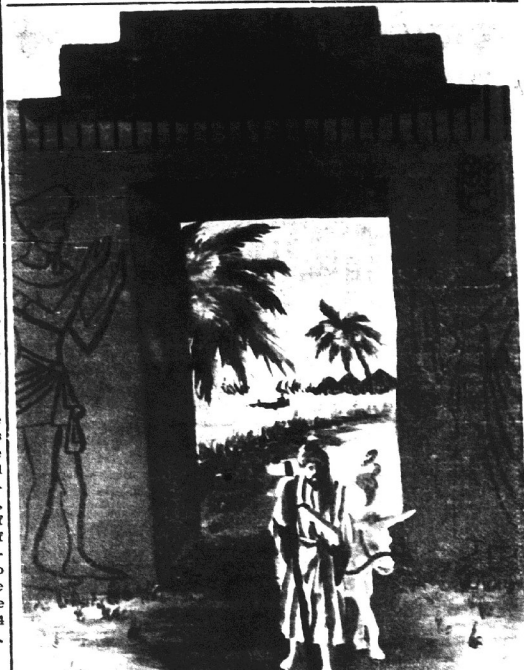
put a padlock on the thing cause everybody stopped coming. I don't know whether he could have saved the carcass by a few minor cuts or not, but I suspect he could.

"Wear White After Dark" is the theme of the December school safety poster being distributed by the Chicago Motor Club to more than 45,000 grade-school classrooms in Illinois and Indiana. This safety message, says the motor club, is a good one for adults, too. Pedestrian accident rates soar after sunset when two things happen. Drivers, of course, cannot see pedestrians nearly as well; and pedestrians have difficulty realizing that they can see a car far in advance of its driver seeing them. Your best defense at night always is to assume that the driver cannot see you and to act accordingly--and wear white or at least light-colored clothing. A white coat, for example, is visible to a driver hundreds of feet farther away than a black or dark-colored coat.

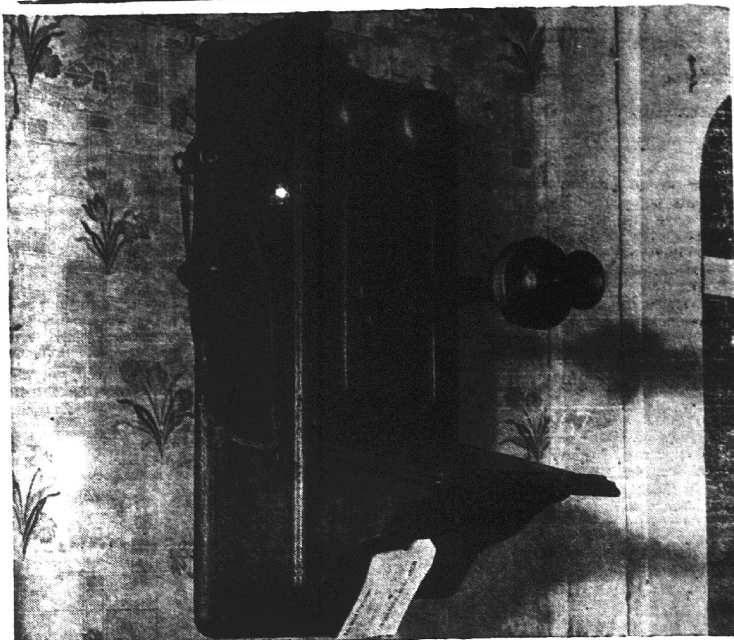
