School board hires driver, lets bus bids at year-end meeting

Mrs. Robert (Marjorie) Hoffman became the first full-time woman school bus driver in the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation when her contract was approved by members of the Tippecanoe Valley school board Tuesday night. Mrs. Hoffman will replace Mr. Cunningham on the Beaver Dam route.

The board authorized Superintendent Robert Forbes to negotiate a contract with Mrs. Jody Harman to become full-time secretary in the superintendent's office. She had been working part-time in the office. Mrs. Martha Thompson, secretary for the past four and one half years, is retiring.

Bus bids were let to South End Motors in the amount of \$9375 for three 60-passenger busses, and Kerlin Motors, bidding on Thomas bodies, received the body bid for \$11,882.02.

In other board action, the contract of Nancy Bouse, Silver Lake, was approved. A student at Purdue University, she will graduate this summer and will assume her teaching duties in the fall.



Habitat 67—A City's Suburbia



One of the most revolutionary results of Expo 67—Canada's International Exhibition opening April 28th—will be a permanent housing complex to remain in Harbor City, Montreal, after the fair's six-month run comes to an end.

Designed by 28-year-old architect Moshe Safdie, "Habitat 67" appears to be a modern adaptation of the Hanging Gardens of Babylon. The apartments, ranging from one to four bedrooms, will be arranged in a "free floating" form, allowing each living unit complete separation from all others.

The purpose of Habitat 67 is to solve the problem of over-urbanization and resulting lack of family identity. Every home in the complex will have its own automatically watered and fertilized garden, formed by the roof of the unit beneath. Units will be connected by vertical roads and pedestrian walks. Actually, Habitat 67 will be a com-

plex of individual houses joined into one structure suitable for a city.

Construction of this dramatic new concept in building design is also revolutionary. All work is done on the ground—from the casting and curing of the basic concrete modular units to the finishing of kitchens, bathrooms, windows and electrical wiring. The completed unit is then lifted into position by crane.

When the fair opens, a total of 158 homes will already be in place, 36 of them completely furnished and ready for visitors. Eventually, it is envisioned, there will be 900 living units in Habitat 67, available for Montreal residents.

A Tribute To Dennis R. Jones

The folk of this community who knew Dennis R. Jones of Palmyra, Wisconsin were saddened to hear of his recent death. Dennis was a native son of this area and one that we can be justly proud to claim. Part of his high school days were spent at Mentone. His early life wasn't an easy one but with determination and courage he built a life of which to be proud. Much of the success, he so richly deserved, was brought about by a loving and inspirational wife.

He was born at Burket on July 25, 1894, the son of Alvin E. and Ella Hisey Jones. He married Eva C. Smith June 2, 1921 at Janesville, Wis., and the couple had lived in Palmyra since their marriage. He served in the Army in World War I and was a graduate of South Bend, Indiana Business College.

"Denny", as he was familiarly known, was long active in community affairs as evidenced by the many organizations in which he participated. He was a past member of the local school board, a member of the Kiwanis club, Whitewater Country Club, Palmyra Masonic Lodge 68 F & AM, Scottish Rites Bodies of the Valley of Madison, Zor Shrine at Madison, and Rob Morris Chapter No. 10, O.E.S. He was also a member of the Palmyra Methodist church and served as a member of the financial committee of the official board of the church; and a member of Thomas-Holcomb Post 304, American Legion.

The high standard he held in his profession as a funeral director is evident from the prominent role Mr. Jones played in the state and national funeral directors associations. In 1942-1943, he served as president of the state association and has held a number of offices in connection therewith. In 1939 he

served as secretary of the South Central Funeral Directors Association and in 1940 as president of that association. In 1938 he was a delegate to the convention of the National Association of Funeral Directors in New York City.

BLOOD TRANSFUSIONS

The first blood transfusion done on a human being was performed in France almost 300 years ago.

Although this patient suffered no ill effects from the transfusion, subsequent cases were frequently followed by disaster and the practice was forbidden.

It was not until 1900 that medical researchers found that there were various types of blood and that blood of one group caused the red cells of another group to dissolve.

Human blood is divided into four types, classified as O, A, B or AB. These types can be mixed together in certain ways only and this knowledge has made blood transfusions safe. A transfusion is given when the blood volume in the body has been reduced by hemorrhage or shock. When needed, transfusion is used to restore the quality of the blood, such as in cases of anemia or other blood diseases.

Blood type tests are now used in police laboratories to supplement fingerprints, dental records and other forms of identification. And they may be used to determine the guilt or innocence of a man accused of murder, by showing whether or not blood stains on his person were of the victim's type.



NIPSCO Announces Nuclear Plant

HAMMOND, Indiana—Northern Indiana Public Service Company will apply to the United States Atomic Energy Commission for a permit to build an 800,000 kilowatt nuclear power plant in Porter County, Indiana, Dean H. Mitchell, NIPSCO chairman and chief executive officer, announced today.

At a press conference in the Calumet Region, the utility executive revealed that NIPSCO's first nuclear generating station, which will begin operation in the fall of 1972, will be the first atomic power plant in the state of Indiana and rank among the largest investor-owned nuclear power units in the world.

The new \$80 million atomic plant will be built at NIPSCO's Bailly Station site on Lake Michigan near Bethlehem Steel's Burns Harbor complex.

Presently situated on the site is a 198,000 kilowatt coal-fired generating unit which became operational in 1962 and a 414,000 kilowatt coal-fired unit under construction with operation set for the summer of 1968.

Mitchell further announced that General Electric Company has been selected to supply the plant's boiling water reactor, including the first fuel core, turbine generator and other major components. GE also will furnish technical direction for plant start-up and initial operation.

General Telephone Builds New Switching Center At Atwood

General Telephone Company has announced that construction of an entire new central office switching center to serve Atwood is nearing completion and will be ready for service in June.

The single story concrete block structure is being erected at the northeast corner of the intersection of the Nappanee and Etna Green roads and will provide 1300 square feet of floor

space. The building will be fire proof and will contain an automatic fire detection system.

Equipment to be installed before June will provide service initially for 200 lines, according to G. W. Marsh, district manager of General Telephone. He said the building will be large enough to accommodate additional equipment to meet future growth.

Financial Report To The School Board

Analyzed by the Superintendent of Schools as of Dec. 31, 1966

The Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation, as of December 31, 1966, had cash in the banks of \$506,241.57 plus Investment of \$184,190.63 making total cash in banks and in Investment of \$690,432.20.

The greatest portion of this \$690,432.20 is Cumulative Building Fund which is \$440,488.61 of which \$250,257.98 is in the banks and \$184,190.63 is in Investments. The remaining \$249,983.59 is the working balance of All Funds of the School Corporation. This is the highest working balance the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation has ever had at the end of the year and this was anticipated at the time this year's budget was made, and because of this our Corporation did not have any tax increase. The fact that we had unspent appropriations for the calendar year of 1966 in the amount of \$74,176.81 accounted for a considerable amount of the increase in working balance although there is about \$8,000.00 encumbered by Purchase Orders where the materials has not been received.

It should also be pointed out to the Board that the unexpended balance of the Capital Outlay account includes the encumbered amount for the additions, and approximately \$80,000.00 of this amount will not be spent, even though it was appropriated, and will revert to the working balance of the Cumulative Building Fund. It is due to the fact that the bids on the additions, even with the added alternates which the Board accepted, was still \$80,000.00 under the estimates

and under the appropriation which had been approved.

Taking all factors into account, the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation is in enviable financial condition at the present time.

GUEST SPEAKER

Mr. Creighton stated he has had the good fortune of visiting many important areas of the globe, including all of the continents. "I have enjoyed the hospitality of homes in Japan, Korea, India, Liberia and many other countries. But certainly I do not pose as a military authority," he said.

"It is well to keep in mind the fact that time does not stand still. We live in a world of great change," he noted. The changes that take place in ways of transportation and communication in our world have a bearing on the problems ahead of us.

Some questions Mr. Creighton discussed briefly were--

What is the danger of war with Russia and China? What about Viet Nam? Why are we there?

Do we owe the world a living? Can we live peaceably in the world?

What does the rest of the world think of us? What are the problems of our youth?

Does the government owe us a living? Is our country going to socialism?

"National defense is frequently thought of primarily as a nation's military strength, but there is more to a nation's defense than armed forces," stated Mr. Creighton. "Good responsible citizens are also needed to build strong national defense."

"Individual responsibility is the key to freedom," he stressed. "Today youth should be encouraged to take advantage of the many opportunities to prepare themselves to live as responsible citizens, which is a way of building for better national defense."

Countries embracing communistic or socialistic forms of government face deterioration of individual respect. Government

ownership discourages initiative on the part of the individual, thus leading to attitudes of irresponsibility. This is happening in Russia where the government is a combination of communistic and socialistic principles. Sweden's socialism is leading the country into highly increased rates of illegitimate children, alcoholism and suicide.

"We need some of the old pioneer spirit that our great-grandfathers had when they settled and had to strive to provide for the needs of their families," emphasized Mr. Creighton. "Their sense of responsibility and self-discipline developed strong character, which we need among our people today."

Mrs. Roy Cox won the door prize, and refreshments were served.





"The measure is just a matter of efficiency and economy in governmental purchasing," said Senator Erwin. "It will stop such practices as the purchasing by state agencies of file cabinets from outside sources that are available from the prison industries at lower prices," he said.

The measure, Senate Bill 24 introduced January 6, would re

quire that before approving purchases of any items costing more than \$75.00, the Department of Administration must certify by voucher that the items are not available from state surplus commodities or state farms and industries stocks.

The bill is co-sponsored by Senator Wilfrid J. Ullrich, Aurora, Indiana.

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
