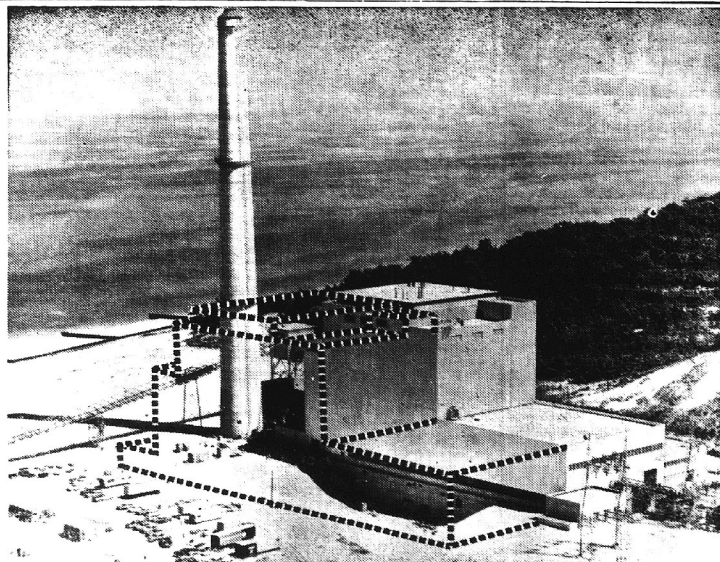

NEW UNIT --- Dotted lines point out space to be occupied by NIPSCO's new generating unit with a net capacity of 350,000 kilowatts planned for the utility's Bailly Station on the shores of Lake Michigan. The new unit --- largest in northern Indiana --- will be installed next to an existing 183,000 kilowatt unit at the station. Construction will begin next summer and the unit is scheduled to "go on the line" in July, 1968. The station is designed to house a total of seven units and have an ultimate power capacity of 1-1/4 million kilowatts.

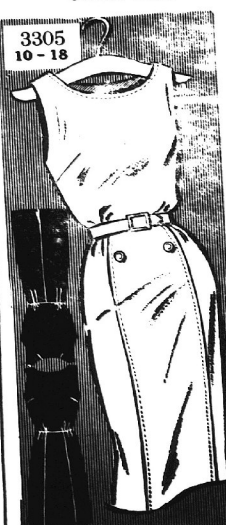

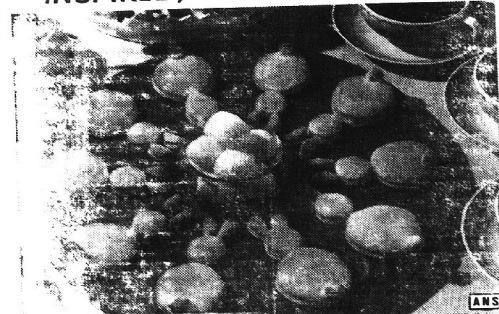

INSPIRED, Hot Glazed Biscuits



THESE delicious little bunny-inspired biscuits, hot from the oven, offer a surprise treat no matter when they're served the year around. Made with cake flour and glazed with orange juice, these excellent biscuits are perfect for a child's party, an afternoon tea (or coffee) or for just making breakfast a gay special occasion.

ORANGE BISCUIT INSPIRATION

2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
3/4 teaspoon salt
5 tablespoons shortening
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup milk
4 tablespoons granulated sugar
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
1/4 teaspoon (about) orange juice

Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening. Add orange rind and blend. Add milk and stir with fork until soft dough is formed (about 20 strokes). Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 20 turns. Pat or roll lightly 1/4 inch thick.

Cut the following circles for each bunny; one 2-inch circle for body; one 1-inch for head; and two 3/4-inch for ears. Arrange on ungreased baking sheet to form bunnies, placing each 1-inch circle above the 2-inch body circle, moistening edges of circles with milk where they meet. Pinch edges of each 3/4-inch circle to make ears and mount on head. With leftover dough, form small balls and place at lower edge of each body circle for tail.

Prepare a thin glaze by combining sugar and orange juice. Brush lightly over the bunnies. Bake in hot oven (450°F.) 8 to 10 minutes, or until done. Serve hot. Makes about 10 bunnies.

Crop From 1776 To Today

Corn was a major crop when the American colonists, tired of "a long train of abuses and usurpations," agreed to a Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776. A gift from the Indians to our early pioneers, the corn plant provided food for man and animal and came to be so highly valued that in some instances was used as legal currency.

Since the day John Hancock signed his name to the historic document declaring that "all men are created equal," corn has grown alongside and helped sustain a busy young nation of manifest destiny. And as Americans take stock of their Independence Day heritage once again, corn will play its faithful role, a role more varied today than ever before.

There will be corn-on-the-cob, of course, and corn bread and muffins. But corn also will be part of the traditional bursts of color and noise. Fireworks contain corn starch and dextrin as filler and binder.

Are you celebrating the Fourth with a picnic in the country? Straws, plates and other paper

tableware all need corn starch in their manufacture as stiffener and sizing. Corn starch, syrup, dextrose and oil are ingredients in hundreds of food products, including jelly, pretzels, candy, ice cream, frankfurters, marshmallows, soft drinks, margarine and bakery products.

In one form or another corn is used in sports clothes, charcoal briquettes, portable radio batteries, road maps, and even your automobile engine. In short, corn is as helpful today as it was when it sustained the colonists.

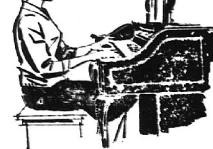

Notes From Your County Agent

Jack M. Hart

County Extension Agent, Youth

County agents are some what hard to find during June. It is the month of many 4-H activities and also a time for vacations. The State 4-H Roundup, the Kiwanis Junior Leadership Conference, the County 4-H Camp and several townships local tours are scheduled for the month. June is also the last month of the fiscal year so all vacation time this is accrued must be either used or lost, so the county agent did use some. We took in the big Fair and since all the noted columnists are writing about it, why shouldn't we.

Agriculture is not represented at the Worlds Fair. It is a big show of big businesses complicated electronics, antimated history and a look at gadgets of tomorrow. The food business gets a smile of recognition from the exotic eating places and the long lines at the moderate priced ones. National exhibits show either their never industrial accomplishments or their older customs or both and you can get the idea that many countries are only a step away from a great industrial revolution, if their food production could just support it.

We stopped in at the County Agents Office in Nassau County on Long Island to visit a friend. Within a 25 mile radius from their office there are more than one half times as many people as in the state of Indiana. They have a staff of 44 persons and not a farm in the county.

The big show in the agriculture and food business is not at the Fair. It is in the early morning traffic on the express ways, railroads and waterfront. Literally thousands of trucks and carloads of food must come in every single day. We saw Maine potatoes by the tons coming in through the rolling, wooded hills in Connecticut and tankers of milk from Pennsylvania by the convoy.

Eggs and poultry from the Midwest and South, vegetables from the coastal sand areas, beef and pork from the corn belt and lambs from Texas make up a daily parade and it never stops. It is an endless belt of production, processing transporting and consuming that we have developed to such a high state of abundance and efficiency that

most people do not even recognize that is there.

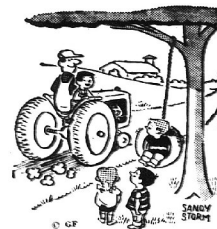
People stand in line for hours at the Fair to spend a few minutes with some Disney created characters of plastic and rubber and electronic controls that could stand up and speak, smile and sit down. There are many places when they stand that long to wait their portion of food. This may have been agricultures contribution to the Fair.

Two groups visited Kosciusko County last week. On Wednesday there were about 75 hatcherymen from Germany here under the auspices of Heisdorf and Nelson Hatcheries. Paul Sales and Bob Barnett were the tour leaders while here and they visited the H and N facilities near Atwood and Creighton Bros. They also wanted to see a family sized livestock farm and visited Mr. and Mrs. Everett Tom, Jr. north of Leesburg and also saw the new hen house of Bill Webster's south of Clunette.

A group of County Agents from 14 states were in Thursday. They looked over the duck production and processing at Maple Leaf and also visited Creighton's to see their marketing procedures. They were guests of Don Wentzel, Miles Igo and Terry Tucker at a roast duck dinner at Petro's in the evening.

PNEUMONIA

PNEUMONIA was known to Hippocrates, more than 2,000 years ago, but its cause was not established until late in the nineteenth century. Until about 25 years ago, pneumonia claimed approximately one quarter of its victims. It was the sulfonamide drugs, developed in the late 1930's, that lowered the fatality rate to about 10 percent.

Today, with the use of penicillin and other antimicrobial drugs, 95 percent of pneumococcal pneumonia cases recover. Untreated pneumonia of this type is fatal in from 20 to 40 percent of cases.

Pneumonia of the pneumococcal type is an acute bacterial infection of the lungs, and comes on suddenly with chills, fever, chest pain, cough and bloody sputum.

While pneumonia occurs in apparently normal healthy people, there are a large number of predisposing factors likely to have an effect on the outcome of the disease and its recurrence. These underlying conditions include anemia and congestive heart failure and they need to be identified and treated.

Treatment of pneumonia usually comprises three procedures: antibiotic therapy, supportive measures and treatment of complications. Complications are estimated to occur in 20 percent of cases and commonly include pleurisy and empyema.

Fewer people with pneumonia are now being admitted to hospitals as most patients with this disease can now be treated effectively at home.

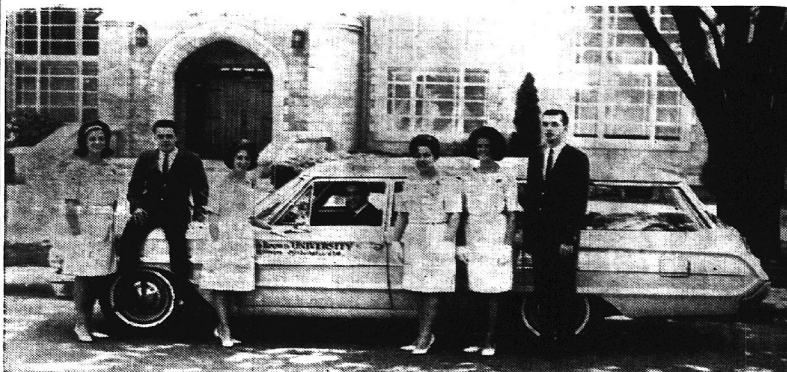

County 72nd In State Voting

Kosciusko county ranked 72nd among Indiana counties in the percentage of registered voters who cast ballots in the May 5 primary election, according to a survey just completed by the Indiana State Chamber of Commerce.

The unofficial survey, compiled from reports of county clerks, local chamber of commerce and from newspaper accounts, showed 2,608 Democratic ballots cast in the county and 5,538 Republican ballots, for a total of 8,146 or 37.01 per cent of the registered voters. There are 22,009 registered voters.

Talma School Wired Without Lights, To Be Re-Wired With Lights

At the Monday night meeting of the Tippecanoe Valley School board it was brought out that the wiring done by Romine Electric at Talma had left some of the rooms without lighting fixtures. While this was perfectly legal according to one of the deductive alternates included in the electrical contract, it did leave some of the rooms in the dark. This situation is to be remedied at once and additional wiring will be installed to include lighting fixtures.

Other business undertaken by the board included the approving of claims and a financial report given by Superintendent Robert Forbes.

Further business involved insurance quotations with Walburn Insurance Agency, Mentone, getting the insurance contract for the school busses. Vernon Cumberland of the Akron Insurance Agency and a representative from his company were present to discuss an insurance policy that would update the corporation. Under their plan all the insurance would be covered under one policy whereas there are currently 25 separate policies. The insurance could be divided among the various agents of the corporation under this plan.

Baskets for use at Talma school were purchased. The students used baskets in place of lockers at Talma.

The need of a custodian for the Burket school was discussed and the board will take applications at once for this position.

Purchase orders were presented and two board members questioned the amount being spent for magazine subscriptions. It was pointed out by Forbes that the corporation must spend \$2.75 per pupil on books and magazines. The two board members still felt too much was being spent on magazines.

The possibility of purchasing

new tables and chairs for the Talma school was discussed, but no action was taken.

Three new bus drivers were hired and other contracts for drivers were approved.

Forbes asked the board members to give him ideas on the needs of the schools to be included in the budget which is being prepared for the 1965 school year. In regard to this, the board asked how much additional money they would need to have to be able to hire a larger number of teachers with masters degrees. They plan to include additional funds in the new budget so that the teaching level of the schools can be raised.

PSORIASIS

PSORIASIS (pronounced so-rye-ah-sis) is a skin disease that affects an estimated three million people in the United States.

It is characterized by the formation of scaly red patches on the skin, these patches are more or less covered with silvery-gray scales. At least 75% of all cases of psoriasis involve the scalp, knees, elbows and back.

The average age of onset is in the second decade, although sometimes it will remain unnoticed for long periods as it has a tendency to occur on the covered areas of the body.

Factors such as injury, overweight, alcohol indulgence and emotional stress tend to increase the severity of this condition.

There have been a variety of treatments advanced. Therapy is directed toward inhibiting the abnormal multiplication or increase in the number of cells of the skin. Treatment depends on the stage of the disease and whether it is acute or chronic.

The time-honored use of tar and ultra-violet light has been accepted as beneficial, although it is inconvenient and is usually limited to patients who are hospitalized.

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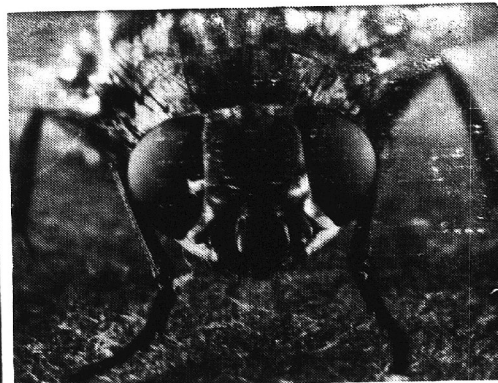

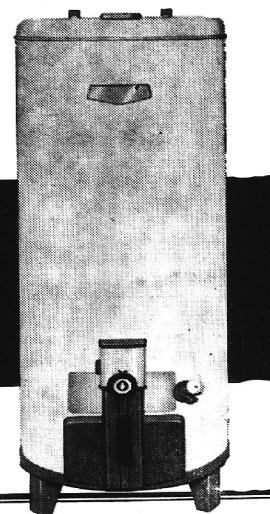

She will give helps on make up, clothing, modeling, for dress review and for a more charming and gracious 4-H girl. A small fee will be charged to help defray expenses.

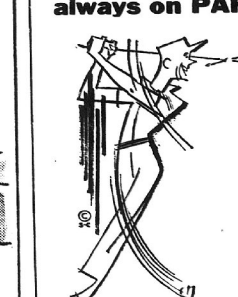

Gasoline, Oil Contracts Awarded By Corporation

Standard Oil Co. of Mentone and Akron will supply gasoline and fuel oil for the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation. The company bid 21.6 cents per gallon to supply 60,000 gallons, more or less of gasoline for the school buses. It also agreed to furnish pumps and underground tanks or buy existing equipment from present owners. School superintendent Robert Forbes also said the company would give a 1% discount if the bills were paid within ten days of billing.

Fuel oil for the Burket school was bid at 9.93 cents per gallon and it is thought 20,000 gallons will be used.

Others bidding were Utter Oil Co., Mentone, 20.48 cents per gallon on gasoline an 10.15 cents per gallon for fuel oil; Igo Oil Co., Mentone, gasoline 21.9 cents per gallon, fuel oil 10.25 cents per gallon; and Kosciusko Farm Bureau Co-Op, Warsaw, gasoline 21.39 cents per gallon.

A bid of \$14 per ton for coal for the Akron and Beaver Dam schools submitted by Richard Harlan, Harlan Coal Co. of Akron, was rejected by the board who stated they had advertised for bids for supplying coal to five schools.

Tree Limbs Are Not Trash

suitable for shopping centers, stadium parking, airports and large industrial parking lots.

The Spira-Park System utilizes two or more continuous spiral parking surfaces, providing a one-way driving lane with angle parking on both sides of the lane. At least one spiral takes upward traffic, and at least one carries downward traffic.

The capacity can be tailored to needs: with three loops, 460 cars can be accommodated, with seven loops, around 1,060 is the capacity. Spira-Park can be adapted to a variety of specific requirements: integration of spirals, multiple entrances or exits from several levels, or interlacing of the spirals may be provided. Notes From Your County Agent

As soon as the Fair is over we should get down to some serious thinking about soil testing. Our fertilized bill in this county is pretty high. We spend hundreds of thousands of dollars each year and while anyone persons share of that may not be too big, it still is a sizeable operating expense.

It is my opinion that an awful lot of this expenditure is based on guess work. Certainly the estimates are based on qualified, experienced judgement but at the same time, a little testing would be a big help in making these judgements.

We think that soil testing should be, whenever possible, a laboratory test. We have pretty well quit using hand kits not because they are not good, but because a laboratory can do it better. We really need to test for two things, one is the amount of plant food present and the other is how much will it take to correct it. We also think that the fall months are the best time to do soil testing. There are several reasons for this. One simple reason is that we can drive around over hay and stubble fields and not have to walk. Another reason is that the laboratories are not so busy and they can give better service than in the spring when everybody else has samples in and want theirs done right away. A third good reason is that we have more time to decide on a fertility program and to field spread bulk fertilizer if we need it. There is also a little more time to dicker on the price.

Fertility levels are at their lowest point in the late summer at the time when plants are making the biggest demand. It is a good time to take a look at the gauge when the tank is the lowest.

The history of soil testing is like the pattern of most good farm practices. They are publicized first by the experiment stations and the extension service. Then after they come into common practice they move into the hands of commercial enterprises. Most of the testing work being done now is being done by fertilizer representatives. Right along with this is a large amount of plant tissue testing and while this is a good indication, don't be snowed under by it. You can prove a lot of things that may be

so with one of these.

Plants can show starvation in the midst of plenty if some of the soil conditions are not right. We can test a corn stalk and find it low in potash if the roots have been pruned off by insects. We can find nitrogen starvation in poorly drained soil and we can find other deficiencies if there are stalk diseases. This can occur in fields where the fertility is right up to snuff. We can also get different reactions in different parts of the same plant. Many chemical companies have equipped all their field men with these tissue kits and they can be helpful. They can also be used to make a good sale.

Probably no farm supply has benefited farmers in general as much as fertilizer. Also no operating cost has been held to as small an increase per unit. This does not mean that every dollar spent will return the maximum if not used wisely. We really learned to use fertilizer when corn was over two dollars, times have changed somewhat.

DON'T let Santa Claus bring an accident to your house. Childrens toys should not be potential harm bringers.

Parents should protect their children by giving them toys suitable to their ages, for instance infants should not be given toys that are small enough to be put in the mouth and swallowed.

There are many fascinating toys that do not have sharp points or dangerous working or moving parts.

Ophthalmologists who deal with injuries and diseases of the eye are only too familiar with the injuries caused by air rifles, bow and arrow sets and spring rubber cap pistols.

An injury from a missile-throwing toy, be it a rifle or a sling shot, can prove serious, as can the arrow with a metal tip. Parents should assist in minimizing the hazards of a dangerous toy by demonstrating how it should be handled. For instance a target can be set up from which it is impossible for the missile to ricochet.

Playthings for aggressive activity excite the child, and therefore their proper use should be understood, and parental supervision during the time the child takes to familiarize himself with his new acquisition can help make your Christmas a safe and happy one.

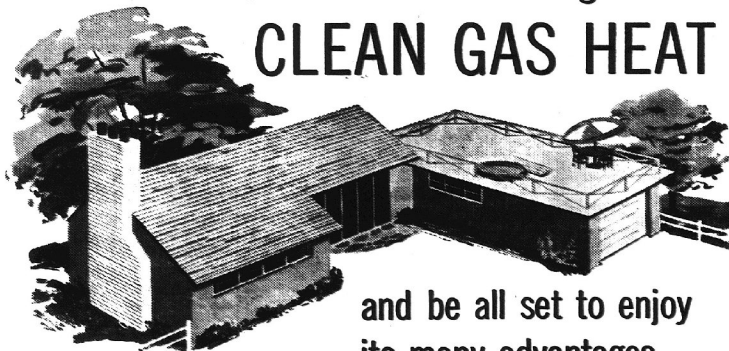

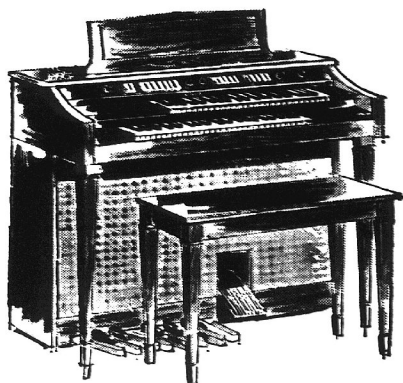

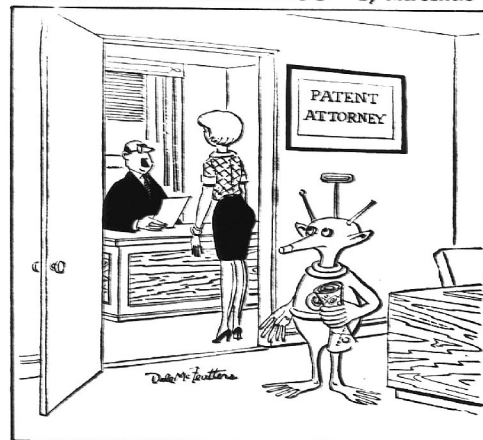
