

His father, Allen "Chick" Herendeen of Mentone, will accompany him to Russia.

James Bond has nothing on Bob Herendeen.

This August the Santa Monica aviator will fly over Russia in broad daylight. But the Russians aren't worried about him taking air pictures of missile installations.

Herendeen will be careening crazily over Moscow in the World Aerobatic Contest in the open, wind-blown cockpit of his tiny Pitts Special bi-plane.

Title Try

He'll be less concerned about matters of SMERSH than SMASH!

The competition takes place August 7-13 and Herendeen and three other Americans will be attempting to wrest the world aerobatic title from the Iron Curtain countries. Czechoslovakia's government - supported fliers presently hold the title in a competition that has been active only since 1960 after a hiatus in the sport created by World War II.

Herendeen is a Trans World

Airlines captain. One of his American teammates is Hal Krier, a professional aerobatic pilot from Wichita, Kansas. The other two team members are less likely prospects.

Charles Hillard is the owner of a Fort Worth, Texas, auto rental firm and Art Scholl of Colton is a college professor.

Herendeen, 38, a former U.S. Air Force fighter pilot in the Korean conflict, bought the Pitts Special in 1964. Last year he took third place in national competition at Reno and earned a place on the U.S. team.

The plane is powered by an 180 horse power Lycoming engine and can cavort at speeds between 80 and 180 miles per hour.

Herendeen spends his free time practicing over Corona. Like freestyle skating and gymnastics, the aerobatic competition demands specific maneuvers and judges award points on their execution.

The U.S. team members—unlike their Communist country counterparts—have personal investments in their planes.

Fortunately, Lockheed Aircraft Co. has volunteered the use of a C-130 Hercules turboprop transport for the aircraft and most of the pilots and ground crew.

The C-130 will be on a sales demonstration tour of Europe and will fly the men and machines back after the competition.

Roann Remembers July 13-16

This Conestoga wagon will carry the pioneer family to its home in the wilderness in the pageant, ROANN REMEMBERS.

"Wagons West! At last the signal. With a crack of the whip impatient drivers urge their teams forward. White tops shudder and burdened axles groan through their grease. As the lumbering wagons move, the family cow, tied to the endgate, is jerked from her contented cud-chewing. Excited dogs chase each other around and under the wagons with yelps of anticipation as anxious mothers hastily round up scattered youngsters and stow them on top of family gear beneath the broad-hooped canvas cover.

"It could be any year in the 1840's, and the great adventure is about to begin again for another band of migrants starting the long trek westward. To take them safely across the vast stretches of plains and prairie country, through unknown river gorges, and rocky mountain passes, they entrust their lives to the ability of their leaders, the providence of God, and the security of their wagons. . . . the wagon is to be home, and fortress, and where needed, a boat." (Indiana Historical Bureau leaflet, "The Conestoga Wagon.")

The top of the covering was 24 feet long; at the tips, it was 11 feet from the ground. The covering was to keep out dust, and rain and sun.

The wagon bottom tipped or sloped toward the center to guarantee that the load inside would not shift position on steep grades, up or down.

Every wagon was equipped with a tool box hanging on the outside, a water bucket, and a feed box holding food for the horses or oxen. A lazy board pulled out like a shelf on the left side between the wheels. The driver often stood or sat on the lazy board while driving. He could operate the brake from

there.

Often the driver rode on the "high wheel horse, that is the animal next to the wagon pole on the left side. While seated there it was easier to keep to the right when meeting other vehicles, and it is thought that from the Conestoga wagoners we got the universal American custom of keeping to the right.

The expression, "I'll be there with bells on," seems to have originated in wagoning days. Each horse sported a set of small musical bells made of brass or mounted on a wooden or metal arched frame. In some areas it was the custom for the unlucky wagoner who had to have help to get his wagon out of the mud, or pulled up a steep grade, to surrender his bells to the good samaritan who aided him.

"In traveling through villages and pike towns the sound of the Conestoga bells brought people to doorways and windows to admire the horses and wagons as they passed. A wagon with six horses stretched out to a length of sixty feet.

"Eventually the Conestoga moved westward, drawn by oxen instead of horses, and became the prairie schooner, the wheels of which rolled across the continent to the Pacific, where it reached its journey's end." (from E. V. Mitchell, IT'S AN OLD PENNSYLVANIA CUSTOM, reprinted by Public Library of Fort Wayne "Wagoners and canalliers joined in petitioning against the railroad. But inventiveness and ingenuity were speeding up the movements of men and material. The wagoners lamented:

"Now all ye jolly wagoners who have got good wives Go home to your farms, and there spend your lives.

When your corn is all cribbed, and your small grain is sowed, You'll have nothing to do but curse the railroad."

The wagon appearing above is the same one which was used in the 1953 Roann pageant. It has a different team and a different owner in 1966. The owner of the wagon and ox team is Mr. Vance D. Swickard of Toronto, Ohio. He and his wagon will be available in Indiana for other celebrations.

The new Home will provide facilities for 78 residents including a 26 bed hospital unit. The Home is designed to eventually accommodate 175 residents as additional units are added to the building.


The new Retirement Home will be constructed by the Church of the Brethren of Indiana on a 25 acre site three-fourths of a mile north of Manchester College on East Street extended.





Pay your premiums promptly after you receive your notice. Those who receive social security, rail road retirement, or civil service benefits will have them deducted from their benefit checks.





A documentary describing life behind the walls of the Indiana State Prison will be broadcast on Radio Station WOWO, Thursday, July 14, 9:30 p.m. Produced by the WOWO Public Affairs Department, the half-hour documentary program, "Behind the Iron Gate," will describe ways in which prison officials are rehabilitating inmates at the prison and plans for the future as outlined by the recently-appointed Indiana Department of Correction Commissioner, Bernard Dolnick. The record hop will be part of the day-long program of activity which marks the annual Parkarama Day.





'CLAMMING UP' IS NOT REALLY QUIET

WHISTLES, SQUEALS and barks at the bottom of the sea make it as noisy as a busy office, reports the Commerce Department. Even clams contribute to the din. Many oysters and clams are capable of producing various clicking-rasping sounds with parts of their shell-covered bodies. Fish are apt to make hydrodynamic sounds like the boom of an explosion when they move through the water. The babble below is a problem for researchers whose job it is to sort out and identify the sounds.

ARCHAEOLOGISTS are finding increasing evidence that highly developed cultures of the new world — the Incas of Peru, the Maya of Central America, the Aztecs of Mexico and more modest developments in the U.S. — evolved from a common culture base they are beginning to call the "Pan-American Formative." Decorated ceramics discovered in Latin America and Mexico by Dr. James A. Ford, of Florida State Museum, show remarkable resemblance in design motifs to early ceramics found on the U.S. Gulf Coast.

MERCURY, which freezes at a temperature of -38 degrees F., is inadequate for thermometers used to measure temperatures in the super-cold field of cryogenics. Ice would even be considered hot when compared to cryogenics temperatures, according to National Cylinder Gas, Chicago. Liquid nitrogen, for example, has a temperature of -320 degrees F., says the company.

CITRUS RED MITES, destructive pests that plague California citrus crops, are being killed in field tests by the U.S. Department of Agriculture by artificially infecting them with a virus disease. In these preliminary tests, scientists spread the disease by spraying mites with water containing ground-up infected mites, and by introducing live infected mites into healthy populations.

EARTH and the other planets may have started their existence with a rich endowment of chemically produced organic material from which life could develop. Scientists from the University of Chicago and Argonne National Laboratory believe that the complex organic substances occurring in some meteorites may have been created naturally and spontaneously at the time the Earth was formed in the swirling clouds of gas and dust.

Q—After taking the Red Cross Home Nursing Course are you eligible to become nurses aid?

A—NO. The Red Cross Home Nursing course is designed to teach the homemaker to recognize illness, make a patient comfortable in bed, give a bed bath, give medicines according to a doctor's orders, make a bed occupied by a sick person, conserve your own energy and time, be ready to serve your community and family in time of an emergency and many, many other skills in taking care of your own family in time of illness and also to keep your family healthy. This course is not a course in which persons are taught to become nurses or aids. It is specifically for the homemaker and person who are interested in learning the above skills. The Home Nursing instructors are in the process of gathering information from the public at this time to determine when a Home Nursing class will be taught. If you would like to take this worthwhile course please call the office, 223-5685 or Mrs. Gates Thompson, 223-6634.

Q—I have been reading a lot about a Medical Self-Help program. Does Red Cross teach this course?

A—The American Red Cross has been requested by the U.S. Public Health Service and the office of the Civil Defense to assist in presenting emergency survival information to the general public. As yet this course has not been organized in this county but representatives from Fulton County Chapter of American Red Cross are attending classes in Marshall County to assist them with future organization into your office on business when it is offered the Fulton County residence. Watch for further information in this news paper.

Q—Why is it that the Red Cross office is not open in the afternoons? Those of us that work have to take time off that can be called in case of an illness.

A—It is always inconvenient for some people no matter what hours an office is open. The Fulton County Chapter office operates on a part time basis. The office is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. until 11:00 A.M. (except legal holidays). Listed in the telephone directory is a number assist in procuring these letters emergency help in needed. Also if anyone desires an appointment, I will be glad to make any arrangements that are necessary for you to complete your business. Either write the office at 110 1/2 E. 8th St. Rochester, or call either 223-5685 or 832-4487 to make an appointment.

Q—My son who is in service, is badly needed at home. What can I do to get a discharge for him?

A—The serviceman himself will have to apply to his commanding officer or chaplain for a hardship discharge. He should present to him letters from family doctors, minister, any business men that know of the hardship in the home. The local Red Cross chapter will be glad to assist in procuring these letters but the serviceman himself should present them when he makes application for a hardship

discharge. The decision for discharge is entirely in the hands of the Commanding officer.

PICKING AND EATING WILD MUSHROOMS IS 'GARDEN ROULETTE'

PEOPLE who pick and eat wild mushrooms are playing a deadly "garden variety" of "Russian Roulette," warns the American Medical Association. Only a true expert can determine whether a wild mushroom is safe or poisonous, and even experts are sometimes fooled by varieties that look alike. The AMA says people who enjoy eating mushrooms should stick to commercially grown varieties.

CLAIMS of commercial cloud seeders that seeding can increase rainfall have been confirmed by a University of Chicago scientist. However, says Roscoe E. Braham Jr., the local rainfall increases could possibly be at the expense of rain decreases in nearby areas. He bases his statements on the findings of a six-year study of cloud seeding over part of Missouri.

ANIMAL FOSSILS at least 720 million years old have been discovered by a Dartmouth College geological team in the Canadian Arctic. The fossils, older than any heretofore known to paleontologists, are expected to help clear up part of the mystery of how advanced forms of life evolved. In addition to finding the fossilized remains of a small, clamlike creatures called brachiopods, the geologists discovered fossilized tracks and trails made by burrowing wormlike animals and small tubes and spines of an as yet unknown species.

SYSTEMS ENGINEERING, the space-age science that ties men and machines together to do high complex jobs, has been added to the curriculum of Georgia Tech.

RIPENESS of fresh fruits and vegetables can now be determined rapidly and accurately by a new meter, according to the Department of Agriculture. The instrument, called a difference meter, also reveals hidden internal defects. The meter measures the amount of light penetrating food items. Unlike the "pinch" test utilized by millions of shoppers, the meter does not damage samples.

INDIANAPOLIS — Indiana's calendar of events for August is headed by the internationally famous "Circus City Festival" at Peru Aug. 10-13 and the "Schweizer Fest", the colorful Swiss Festival at Tell City along the Ohio River Aug. 15-20, reports the Tourist Division of the Indiana Department of Commerce.

Peru's circus history dates back to the 1920's when many of the major circuses wintered there and the town became known as the "Circus Capital of the World."

About 100 of Peru's youthful citizens turn into circus performers, young clowns take over the town, and visitors get the feeling of old-time Circus Days. Amateurs though they are, these Peruvians practice from earliest childhood for their yearly performances under the "Big Top" at 8 o'clock each night of the festival and at a 2 p.m. Saturday matinee. The big Circus Parade takes place at 10 a.m. Saturday morning, Aug. 13, and Peru's museums feature athenetic circus displays of days gone by. A bus tour will leave Indianapolis at 8 a.m. Aug. 13 for a day in the circus town.

Tell City is named for the

Swiss legendary hero and liberator, William Tell, and the annual Swiss celebration begins with the crowning of a "Schweizer Fest" King and Queen on Aug. 15, for a week of fun and frolic, with lively entertainment in the Musik Halle; a Brau Garten for grown-ups and teenagers; cool, cool bands; and two Edelweiss Balls on the final night, Saturday, Aug. 20. Amusement rides are on Mozart Street.

But these are only two of the exciting events in the Hoosier State during August. Visitors will find plenty of action at the 28 or so county fairs scheduled for the month.

At Remington, the Fountain Park Chautauqua begins its 72nd season July 30 and continues through Aug. 14, and Rockville will stage on "Old Time Chautauqua" in Beechwood Park Aug. 19-21, starring Herb Sherriner on Saturday night. What is a Chautauqua? In case you're too young to know, it's named after the New York town of after the New York town of Chautauqua and the summer schools and an assembly lasting several days. It was inaugurated there in 1874

for educational and recreational purposes and the program always included lectures, concerts, and a variety of entertainment. And it's the same in Hoosierland.

Indiana's Sesquicentennial Opera, William Kaufmann's "A Hoosier Tale," to be performed by the Indiana University opera Theater July 30 and Aug. 3 in the University Auditorium at Bloomington and on Aug. 6 at Clowes Memorial Hall in Indianapolis, is a story of the tragedy of the Indian tribes and of William Conner, famous white settler.

Tourists will find a Pioneer Threshermen's Convention with the old "machines" in action and on exhibit at Rushville Aug. 3-7; a Historical Parade climaxing a 100-mile trail ride at Indiana's first capital, Corydon, Aug. 13; a "Rockathon Trading Week-end" Aug. 13-14 in Martin State Forest near Shoals when "Rock Hounds" will swap specimens, picnic, and camp; a Village Art Festival in Napanee Aug. 19-21; and a festival of Early Indiana Folk Music in Madison Aug. 28. Most events will have a Sesquicentennial flavor.

The big Indiana State Fair at the Fairgrounds in Indianapolis moves into the spotlight from



CAMP POTTAWATTOMIE by Debbie Cooper

Every summer the Girl Scouts hold their Established Camp at Camp Pottawattomie in Tippecanoe River State Park, near Winamac, Indiana.

Junior Scouts entering the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades and Cadette Scouts entering the seventh and eighth grades live in a "unit home" with 30 girls in a two-week session. Read John 10:14-18

"Look and see if there is any sorrow like my sorrow which was brought upon me." (Lamentations 1:12, RSV)

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

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

He was supervisor of the division of banks and trust companies and division of research and statistics - Department of Financial Institutions.

He became dean and professor of the School of Business Administration of Indiana University, 1935-1937, and became president in 1938. He is now chancellor.

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
