

A newspaper can be used for artwork by the children.

A youngster can take a large sheet of today's paper, cover it with a thin coat of wallpaper paste or home-made paste, then bend and twist it into an unusual shape. When dry, it may look like a porcupine, or a bird, or duck. He can paint it with poster paint, add toothpicks or yarn or cotton or buttons for eyes or other trimmings. He has an original decoration for his room.

"Paper is inexpensive and always available," according to a book on Paper Art from Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin. The book, to be found at the creative art racks of variety stores, has many ideas for children. And children think of more.

Some like to use newspapers for "op art" greeting cards and invitations. They cut out letters and paste them up to say "Happy Birthday" or "You're My Valentine" or "Picnic Sunday." Colored construction paper, cut and folded into card shape, can be used for pasting up the letters. Shapes — a cake, a heart, a basket — can be cut out of newsprint and pasted up.

Younger children like to braid and weave paper; fringe it, make it into fans or pinwheels or hats, or fold and cut designs — good diversion for a rainy day.

Household papers have their uses. A big brown paper bag is a costume when decorated with crayons. Shirt cardboard can be cut into stencils. Magazines yield pictures to be pasted in scrapbooks.

The child who plays with paper develops his own ideas about its textures and possibilities. He'll also enjoy using colored construction paper, tracing paper, sketch pads. All help him at art, from coverall age to college years.

Shrub Mulches

Lafayette, Ind. Shrub mulches can keep weeds down and retain moisture, but the problem is deciding which mulch material to use.

Stone mulches, which are becoming increasingly popular in the midwest, enhance the beauty of shrubs, allow little weed growth, offer good drainage and are relatively permanent.

Instead of stone, according to Purdue university extension horticulturists, you can apply organic mulches of peat moss, corn cobs or sawdust. They can do a good job of keeping weeds down and retaining moisture for your shrubs, but they are subject to decomposition and erosion.

Corn cobs and sawdust usually won't look as nice as peat moss or gravel and can rob the soil of nitrogen. In addition, organic mulches will permit a few weeds to grow on top.

The horticulturists say all mulches can be applied now, but a good weed cleanup should precede application. Be sure to apply enough material to make an effective mulch. Four inches deep is a good average.

There is a wide variety of stone-type material available for mulches. You could use anything from pea gravel to stones of golf ball size. Crushed limestone is available in several sizes, but should be washed.

Indoor Plants

Outdoors

Lafayette, Ind. Your house plant could probably spend the summer outside and like it. But Purdue university extension horticulturists recommend you make the move carefully.

Remove dead leaves from your plant, trim where necessary and put the plant outdoors in semi-shade. Usually, the north side of the house is a good area.

Most house plants, the horticulturists say, can benefit from a move outdoors, except for African violets and others with hairy leaves.

Dig a hole, put gravel or cinders in the bottom and set the whole pot and plant in the ground so the top of the pot is at the original soil line. It's a good idea to pack the area around the pot with peat moss.

The horticulturists caution against taking plants out of the pot when you set them outdoors since root systems will become too extensive and hard to handle by fall.

For the first two or three days a potted plant is outside, it might be a good idea to provide extra shade if the sun is hot. During the summer, you'll need to water the plant occasionally. In addition, every few weeks you should lift the pot and cut off any roots that have grown out of the bottom.

Picnic Without

Picnic Beetles

Lafayette, Ind. Picnickers can do without picnic beetles!

One way to keep these pests away from backyard picnics, is to feed them first. Bait the area one or two hours before meal time. Put melon rinds or cut tomatoes on disposable foil pans and spray with one percent dichlorvos (DDVP). Fix at least four pans. Then place the bait pans in a circle about 20 feet from the picnic area.

Most of the beetles in the area will be attracted to the pans and killed before they can be a nuisance.

For other methods of control see the Indiana Cooperative Extension Service publication "Picnic Beetles," E-39. Single copies are free to Indiana residents at county Extension offices.

The young set will take to the lime greens, bright pinks, light blues to match their skirts — coordinating shoe-hose-dress colors.

Colors and textures may be matching or contrasting combinations, says Mrs. Billie Jean Ellsworth. Extension clothing specialist at Purdue university. Sometimes contrasts are bold — such as navy blue with neon green. Sometimes they are more subtle — brown kneed with white. But the newest look is the one-color look — from tip to toe.

While skirts are short, stockings need to be long. Panty hose are a solution to the "showing garter" problem. Another solution is the new "hip-let" — stockings that rise hip high and hook around the hips with a self belt.

Toe-to-waist coverage also creates a smooth line without garter bulges for pants outfits. Mini-pants suits look better with knee-socks, though. And textured knee-socks will be popular into fall.

Texture is important this season for stockings, too. In addition to traditional sheers, stockings are knitted, crocheted, elasticized or plasticized. Opaque, bulky and fish-net or open mesh stockings are correct for daytime. Shimmery nylons are the current vogue for evening.



Lafayette, Ind. A giant poultry operation in Kosciusko county - Creightons Brothers near Warsaw - is a highlight of this year's Indiana State Farm Management Tour, July 18-19.

This farm will be visited at 3 p.m. Tuesday, July 18.

Creightons, a partnership which began in 1925 when brothers Hobart and Russell formed the firm, now involves a 2,700-acre location and a labor force of about 70 men.

The operation has an egg production capacity of up to quarter of million hens, a brooding capacity of half a million pullets twice a year, a breeder flock of 25,000 hens and a hatchery capacity of 325,000 eggs.

In addition, the Creightons can raise up to 100,000 turkeys a year, feed 500 hogs and handle 250 stocker cattle. A feed mill on the farm has a 100-ton-a-day capacity.

The farm's cropping program includes 1,100 acres of corn, 200 acres of soybeans and 1,400 acres of hay, pasture and diversion acres. Crops manager, Ed Creighton, has been irrigating corn since the 1950's and 450 acres will be irrigated this year.

There is a storage capacity for 250,000 bushels of corn, and about half a million bushels of

corn are processed into feed annually. Production from the Creightons' corn crop is consumed in the time it takes to harvest.

In addition to owned production, Creightons Brothers has a close working relationship with 14 associated egg producers with a 300,000-layer total capacity.

John Frederick is manager of the Creighton enterprise and all operations are divided into eight areas, each with a supervisor: C:op production, feed and grain, hatchery, pullet production, laying hens, turkeys, egg processing and sales.

Visitors at the Farm Management Tour can choose between the Creightons and the outstanding dairy operation near Twelve Mile, the Rudicek farm, for the first stops on the tour.

A 6:30 p.m. banquet at the Honeywell Center in Wabash will emphasize a program on agricultural outlook. Landley Finch of the Continental Illinois Bank of Chicago is featured speaker.

Several farms will be visited on the tour the next day, July 19. Tickets for the banquet and a luncheon to be held July 19 at the Wabash County Fairgrounds at Wabash are available from county Extension agents or by writing to David Bache, Agricultural Economics Department, Krannert Building, Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, 47907. The banquet is \$3.50 and the lunch is \$1.50.



Farm Equipment Markings Explained

INDIANAPOLIS - July 14, 1967 -- Arch Kinzer, farm program chairman of the Indiana Petroleum Council, commented today that since President Johnson had proclaimed the week of July 23-29 as "Farm Safety week" this is a good time for Hoosier farmers to become aware of the provisions of a bill passed during the last session of the General Assembly. He was referring to S.B. 45 which pertains to slow moving vehicles on public highways.

Explaining the application of the law Kinzer said, "Most farm equipment that is moved over the public roads will come under this act since the wording applies to any vehicle 'whether pulled, towed, self-propelled or animal-drawn,' not operated at a speed in excess of 25 miles per hour."

"These pieces of equipment," he continued, "will be required to display a uniform triangular slow moving vehicle emblem."

Kinzer pointed out that the law is also very specific about the location of this emblem. He quoted the act as stating that this emblem is to be "mounted as near as practicable to the center of mass and at an approximate height of not less than three (3) nor more than five (5) feet from level ground or pavement surface."

Kinzer also pointed out that when such equipment is operated on the highways at times when the state law requires the use of lights this law requires "a red or amber flashing lamp mounted at a height as low as practicable but no more than eight (8) feet from level ground or pavement surface so as to be visible from a distance of not less than five hundred (500)

feet to the rear."

"This law will be in full force on January 1, 1968," Kinzer said. "All pieces of equipment should be properly marked on or before that date. Failure to comply," he warned, "is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars."

Kinzer explained that under the present "flag law" many farmers display the red flag above the tractor or power unit only. However, S.B. 45 may mean that the new, uniform emblem should be on each piece of equipment.

Kinzer emphasized that now is the time to place the emblems or lights on farm machinery. The coming harvest season will mean shorter daylight hours and increased highway travel for equipment.



Selective Service Questions Answered

The most frequently asked of the Selective Service System concerns the requirements for a II-S classification as an undergraduate student, Colonel Robert K. Custer, State Director of the Indiana Selective Service System, stated today. These questions along with appropriate answers are set out below and the printing of these will be in the public interest.

Q. What requirements must I meet to qualify for a II-S classification as an undergraduate college student?

A. You must file a written request with your local board for deferment as an undergraduate college student. Additionally, you must provide your local board each year with convincing evidence that you are continuing to pursue satisfactorily a full-time course of instruction at a college, university or similar institution of learning.

Q. How does the Selective Service System define the phrase "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction" when the deferment of undergraduate college students is being considered?

A. To be considered as "satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction", an undergraduate student who is taking a four-year course should earn 25% of the credits required

for his baccalaureate degree at the end of his first academic year, 50% at the end of his second academic year, and 75% at the end of his third academic year. In the case of a baccalaureate degree for which 5 years of study are prescribed by the institution, a student should earn 20% each year of the total credits required for the degree.

Q. What is meant by a "student's academic year"?

A. In determining eligibility for classification in Class II-S (college student), a student's academic year shall include the 12-month period following the beginning of his course of study.

Chickens, airplanes share honors in Mentone

Chickens and airplanes share equal billing in Mentone, long known as the "Egg Basket of the Midwest," and in this week's issue of the MENTONE NEWS.

Saturday's Park-A-Rama day will pay homage to both the chicken and the airplane. Fried chicken will be served from 11:30 a.m. until evening. A fly-in, the first to be held in connection with the annual Park-A-Rama event, will be held throughout the day with members of the Mentone Flying Club, Inc. providing shuttle services to and from the airport.

Chicken and airplanes have shared equal billing for much of Mentone's 85 years. Art Manwaring established Manwaring Leghorn Farms, Inc., a gigantic industry hatching four million baby chickens a year, in 1911, a year after the late Lawrence Bell, hailed as one of aviation's

pioneers, was born in Mentone. Features on Mentone's chicken industry, including tours of Manwaring Leghorn Farms, Inc.,

Kralis Brothers Poultry Co., Inc., and the M & R Egg Company, highlight this week's issue of the MENTONE NEWS.

Holcslaw is named Mentone principal





The air age beckons Mentone

The airport is home base for the thirty members of the Mentone Flying Club and their three modern Cessnas in addition to Herendeen's own plane. Also housed at the airport are seven other planes. The facilities have been enlarged as needed over the years with the last addition being completed only a few weeks ago.

Herendeen recently checked the activity at his airport and found that one week saw 218

take-offs and lands being completed. Saturday's fly-in is expected to far exceed any previous record set at the airport.

Herendeen added other planes and an instructor after building his first airport, but since the beginning of the Mentone Flying Club, Inc. ten years ago has not employed an instructor and now keeps only his own plane.

Other officers are Jim Bob Ewen, vice president, and Bill Etinger, secretary-treasurer. Herendeen is flight officer. Harrison Crabill, Rochester, is instructor for the club. Herendeen's son, Bob, learned to fly at the local airport and is now a captain for TWA. As a hobby he flies a Pitts Special stunt plane. The two Herendeens flew to Russia last year where Bob participated in international stunt competition.







Manwarings hatch 4,000,000 chicks yearly



Frank Manwaring is shown running the de-beaking machine, a precision machine that neatly and swiftly de-beaks the newly hatched chicks. Baby chicks may also be de-combed or have their wings clipped at this stage. The latter processes help the birds to earlier maturity and tend to make them quieter.

Four million Kimberchiks a year are hatched under carefully controlled and supervised conditions at Mentone's Manwaring Legion Farms, Inc. A family owned business since its founding in 1911 by the late A. C. Manwaring, the company has grown steadily with the community. It is presently operated by two great-nephews of the founder, Charles and Richard Manwaring, and Charles' two sons, Frank and James.

The Manwaring operation is a completely self-sustaining busi-

ness. Grain for the 46,000 breeder hens is grown on the farm and processed into feed at the firm's feed mixing plant.

Breeder hens are housed in Manwaring's modern hen houses and careful records are kept on each. Eggs from the houses are taken daily to the main hatchery where they begin the cycle that culminates in another batch of newly hatched Kimberchiks. Manwarings have the franchise for Northern Indiana and western Michigan for the California based Kimber Farms.

Once the eggs are taken to the hatchery they are run through a washer that sanitizes them and are then taken into a large cooler. From the cooler they go to the grader where vacuum lifters place them on the sorting tables, and they move across the candler onto the scales and then into cases to be taken back to the cooler.

An elevator transports the cooled eggs to the upstairs hatchery where another vacuum lifter places them in incubator trays. The loaded incubator trays are placed on specially constructed "buggies" and taken to the incubators, each of which has a capacity of 65,000 eggs. Each incubator is filled with 1/4

of its capacity. By the time the machine is filled, the oldest eggs are 18 days old and are ready to be transferred to the Buckeye separate hatchers in another room. For 18 days the eggs have been kept under carefully controlled heat and moisture conditions and have been automatically turned each hour, much as a mother hen would turn her eggs. The 18-day old eggs are moved into larger trays and three days later--it requires 21 days for a hatch--the eggs hatch and the baby chicks are placed in boxes, the trays and incubators are scrubbed and sanitized and the process continues its flow.

The newly hatched chicks are sexed by a team of Japanese workers who specialize in that type of work and are either prepared for shipment in one of the firm's four modern delivery trucks or are housed. Manwarings sell both day-old and ready-to-lay pullets. They average 100,000 ready-to-lay pullets a month.

Sometimes the baby chicks are de-beaked with a motorized de-beaker and sometimes they have their wings and combs



Breaking eggs is their business

Separate the whites from 12 eggs, the recipe reads. Like most housewives, I laboriously crack the egg on the edge of the cupboard of mixing bowl and proceed to slash it over myself as I carefully pour it back and forth from the two shells. With luck and ten or fifteen minutes time, I may have the dozen eggs separated and will surely have myself and the kitchen a mess.

That method of breaking eggs and separating them is pretty old-fashioned I learned Friday as I toured the M & R Egg Company with owner Millard Laughlin. There, eggs are broken on a gigantic scale with thirteen employees breaking a thousand cases of eggs a week. Not only are the eggs broken but they are separated, pasteurized and frozen. They have a machine that can break twenty cases of eggs an hour, separating them as it goes. That's as many eggs as eight women working at top speed could break without separating them!

All of the eggs, whether separated or only broken, are filtered and stored in a bulk tank before being pasteurized. Laughlin explained that egg whites are pasturized at 137° while egg yolks and whole eggs are pasturized at 142°. The whites will set if pasturized at higher temperatures. The temperature is held steady for three and a half minutes and then is reduced to 40° as the eggs come from the pasteurization room. They are filtered again and packed in 30 pound cans for freezing. Bakeries, cooky and noodle makers are the largest users of the eggs. Each has different specifications for the type of egg he wants, and he receives what he orders, whether it be eggs with light or dark yolks, thin for cookies or thicker for noodles. The eggs retain their shape after being frozen, even after they are thawed and must therefore be conditioned before they frozen. "In other words," Laughlin said, "we don't just take an egg and freeze it. It has to be conditioned according to the use it

will later be put to." Once processed and frozen, however, the eggs will keep indefinitely.

From start to finish, from the preparation room through the breaking room and into the pasteurization room, the eggs are handled by gleaming stainless steel machines, operated by cheerful operators who deftly control the machines and watch for yolks in the whites.

The egg breaking and separating machine was leased from Seymour Foods of Topeka, Kansas who also have patents in Canada, Australia, the Netherlands, and Great Britain. The machine will be used five years and will then be recalled by the company for destruction. To date, they make no machines to be sold. The machine has enabled the local plant to increase its volume to 45,000 pounds of liquid eggs per week from the former 25,000 pound capacity. A larger freezer will be built within the next few weeks to handle the increased production.

Laughlin, who has been in business for himself for eight years, estimates the crew spends four hours a day in clean-up. The machines must be spotless for the eggs to pass rigid board of health requirements.

I know, after watching the machines separate the eggs so easily, that I'm going to hate myself for my awkwardness the next time a recipe says, "Separate the whites..."







The end of the road for 20,000 chickens a day is Kralis

Brothers Poultry Co., Inc. located northeast of Mentone. The local concern, employing one



hundred and thirty people, dresses 100,000 chickens a week.



It's the beginning of the end for these chickens as Kralis workers attach them to the first of a series of endless conveyors.



Rubber fingers pluck the chickens as they wend their way around the assembly line. Workers check the chickens and pluck feathers missed by the machine.



Already stripped of their feathers by rubber pickers, these chickens move through another line where workers complete the cleaning task.

In operation locally since 1950, the firm has its general offices at Gary and has been in business forty seven years. The local branch is currently involved in a remodeling program which will see the office space enlarged. New dressing plant equipment was installed a few weeks ago.

Chickens are trucked into the plant where workers hang them on a continuous moving line that takes them into the slaughter and picking rooms. Soon stripped of their feathers, they move to the evisceration room and then into the cleaning room and packaging room. By the




