Sparks Fly At T.V.S.C. Meeting

The regular session of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation became extremely heated Monday night when ten interested spectators from Akron appeared to complain about the school system, 4-H, and teachers' salaries. All board members were present and were able to approve contracts for Franklin Lee Bynum to teach biology and chemistry; Kathryn Louise McMann to teach home ec at Beaver Dam; Rhoda Barkman to teach home ec at Akron; and Dale Allen Beaver of Huntington to teach music at Akron before the sparks started flying. Beaver's contracts is for \$5650 with \$1000 for a summer contract. Also executed were contracts to Rochester Building Service and Romine Electric for repair work.

President Ed Bucher asked those present if there was any other item of business other than 4-H which needed discussing and Bill Merley, Akron, asked why five teachers had quit the Akron school system. He said he had heard they would not work under the present conditions. Superintendent Forbes inquired what these conditions might be, and Merley quoted one of the teachers as saying the teachers were not able to use their own judgement in class and were told what to do.

Another incident cited which brought considerable discussion concerned the incident of some students not getting the proper credits on their report cards. It was alleged that when the mistakes were found one teacher referred to another as "stupid."

Forbes said he had heard of the incident but his version of it varied considerably.

By now the discussion was extremely heated. Verl Rager asked Forbes why Akron was losing its better teachers. Forbes replied to this by saying there is always a turnover in personnel and that T.V.S.C. actually had a smaller turnover than surrounding corporations. President Bucher joined in to say that T.V.S.C. is presently looking for one teacher while he understood Whitko was looking for 27 and Manchester needed 19 new teachers.

Verl Rager asked about the coach's salary as compared to the music teacher's salary as he felt since the band had 85 members last year and there was a large chorus the music program actually benefited more students than the 20 or so who played basketball. Forbes replied to this that he needed to be prepared to answer questions like that

but didn't happen to have easy access to the teacher contracts. He stated the coach's salary was higher than that of the new music teacher.

By now the discussion was red hot and board members joined in. They said all teachers in question had been offered contracts and that some had signed and then "jumped" the contracts. They felt this was improper although customary. They said they had heard on the street that two of the teachers were going to quit two weeks before they did. The board said they felt if the teachers had grievances they should bring them to the board rather than telling everyone else about them. Bucher said that the job of Forbes was to listen to the complaints of the teachers and parents. Bucher encouraged those with complaints to contact Supt. Forbes.

Some of the Akron delegation felt the school system was slipping badly under consolidation. Forbes denied this, saying he felt the program was better than ever with the addition of Spanish and with the acquisition of more science equipment.

The lack of an agriculture class at Akron was brought up, and the board stated there were not enough interested students in the Akron school to warrant its being included in the curriculum. Forbes said if they could get ten or twelve freshman and sophomore or junior and senior boys to take the class it would be offered. It was the opinion of Forbes that the freshmen were required to take math, history, science, and English which gave them four solids. Ag would make the 5th solid and some might wish to take music. Forbes went on to say that taking more than five solids is usually not permitted.

Steve Hartzler, Akron, said he would rather his boy learn about agriculture at home and concentrate on other subjects of school.

Mary Irene Rager, Akron, asked Forbes if it was normal for a school to have almost a complete turnover in staff as the Akron high school has had in two years. Forbes replied to this that the public must realize that if they are to retain and acquire master teachers that the pay scale must be higher. He stated that the surrounding corporations have a much higher salary schedule for other than beginning teachers than does T.V.S.C.

P.M.A. Proposes Marketing Changes

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has issued recommended decisions to revise the Chicago and South Bend milk marketing orders as proposed by Pure Milk Association to improve dairy farmer income and marketing conditions.

This was reported today by A. L. McWilliams, general manager of PMA, who stated that the steps before the orders take effect are the issuance of final decision and calling of referendums of producers on each market.

The major changes recommended by the department in Chicago milk marketing order No. 30 are as follows:

1. Provide for two classifications of milk instead of the present three.

Class I milk will include milk, skim milk, buttermilk, yogurt, flavored milk, flavored milk drinks, fluid cream and sour cream products labeled Grade A.

The newly designated Class II will include ice cream, cottage cheese, butter, nonfat dry milk, cheese, eggnog and other manufactured products not designated as Class I.

2. Simplify the methods used in accounting for the utilization of milk by adopting a skim milk and butterfat basis of accounting in place of the milk equivalent of butterfat method.

3. Change the point of pricing producer milk from the 55- to 70-mile zone (distance from Chicago city hall) to the marketing area (all of Cook and Du Page counties and parts of Lake, Kane and Will counties—an area which includes approximately 6 million consumers). This change would make the price quotations for producers more comparable with other markets.

As part of the amendments reclassifying milk, changing methods of accounting, and adjusting the point of pricing, the department recommended that the Class I price be increased 10 cents per cwt., as proposed by Pure Milk Association.

4. Revise the provisions for qualifying dairy plants to participate in the marketwide pool.

Distributing (bottling) plants will be required to have a 30 percent Class I utilization with 10 percent of such sales in the Chicago Order 30 marketing area.

Supply plants (those which

ship to bottling plants) must ship at least 30 percent of their receipts to distributing plants in the months of July through December. If they meet this requirement they will receive automatic pool status for January through June.

5. Limit the location differential price on Class I milk to 110 percent of Class I sales. Location differentials recognize that the value of fluid milk varies according to distance from market.

6. Delete three townships of Lake county, Ind., from the Chicago order and include them in the newly designated Northwestern Indiana Marketing Order area (formerly South Bend, La Porte and Elkhart.)

A proposal supported by various producer organizations to increase producer prices by eliminating the supply-demand adjuster in the order was not included in the department's recommendations.

When put into effect, the department's recommendations for revising the Chicago milk market order would apply to approximately 17,000 producers who supply milk to 154 handlers and dairy plants on that market.

The department of agriculture's recommended decision for the South Bend Order 31 market redesignates the marketing area to the Northwestern Indiana Marketing Area and includes Elkhart, Kosciusko, Lake, La Porte, Marshall, Porter, St. Joseph and Starke counties.

Under the recommended revised order for this part of Indiana the Class I price would be established at a level of 20 cents per cwt, above the Chicago marketing area price.

The area covered by the recommended Northwestern Indiana Marketing Order includes about 1,500 dairy farmers who supply 26 handlers of milk.

Farm-Orama Planned

Farm Orama field work was completed early this spring, so the dates for the farm demonstration show were officially set for September 24, 25 and 26. This is one week earlier than last year for the annual show as it commences its sixth consecutive year in Ohio.

New features are added this year at the New Knoxville location in Auglaize County, with a Tri-State Tractor Pulling Contest scheduled for the first day. A National Quarter Horse Show will start the second day, with the State Plowing Matches and Sheep Dog Trials commencing later in the day and finishing their contests the last day of the show.

Other attractions include demonstrations with the new narrow row corn pickers, stalk chopping, ensilage cutting, silo filling, tiling demonstrations, minimum tillage demonstrations, corn drying, mowing, raking, and baling with a new French baler.

Wagons will again be available for the "foot weary" to cover tours of dairy, swine, beef, and poultry farms. They will also stop at Brookside Laboratories in New Knoxville for guided tours of their modern soil testing facilities.

The ladies will again have a new model home to inspect for new ideas, along with several cooking and sewing demonstrations. They may also take a chartered bus ride along with their husbands to the New Idea factory at Coldwater or to the Hoge Lumber mill in New Knoxville.

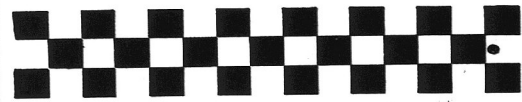

EDITOR'S VIEWPOINT

4-H support and the school situation are two of the most discussed topics at the moment, and, as in most questions, there is more than one side. I have been able to talk to school board members, 4-H supporters, non-supporters as well as teachers, students and parents. The array of misinformation and misunderstanding is amazing.

It seems that state wide there is no set pattern in regard to the payment of 4-H leaders. Some communities pay leaders nothing while others receive considerable compensation. Those close to 4-H feel the amount of time and work involved deserves payment. Others feel 4-H is no longer the program it was meant to be. They cite the fact that some parents spent considerable sums of money to assure their children winning at the county fair while others cannot afford this. Some feel that "horse and dog" projects head the list while more worthwhile projects are on the decline. Some feel that too much school time is spent with 4-H as students are taken out of school for judging contests, etc. They feel 4-H should be separate from school. Others to whom I have talked feel that some of these trips offer more practical education than the student would have received if at school during that time. County 4-H officials have at time scheduled events during school time which has caused considerable trouble locally. School officials feel their rights and authority are being invaded while 4-Hers and parents feel the school is not co-operating with the community.

Quite a stir has been created by the resignations of 5 Akron teachers and the Akron 4th of July committee's statement that they have been unable to obtain a commitment from the Akron band to participate in the 4th of July celebration. Other area bands (including Mentone) have promised to be present.

That Akron is losing some good teachers is a fact. Their accomplishments prove this. On talking to teachers, parents, and school board members I find three almost entirely different ideas or reasons for this. Why, I ask, has there been such a breakdown in our communicating with each other as to allow this. This is not a situation that has arisen overnight.

Our school system is a major part of our community. Can we

offer our children the training they need to work and live in any community if we are unable to talk our problems over and reach satisfactory solutions without the open hostility that is now present?

There are no simple "face saving" solutions. Neither school officials, board members, teachers or parents can honestly claim to be entirely right.

We are all human. We all speak the same language. Therefore, there is no excuse for our not being able to discuss and solve our problems without becoming emotional and hostile toward each other. There is no better time for ALL of us to set aside our emotions and rationally discuss our problems with an open mind toward making our schools and communities the best possible. The answers will not come all at once, but we had better start trying to find them right now.

came up for discussion and Bucher asked for comments. Most of the audience felt that the case had been presented so many times before that nothing they could say would change the opinion of the board.

Kathryn Hartzler offered one suggestion: If the farm children could not get agriculture in school that the board support the 4-H program. Another mother challenged the board with the accusation that the summer program, which the board supports, benefited only the children in town and was not for the rural children. She wanted the board to support 4-H as a summer program for rural children.

Gail Creighton, board member, said he had been quoted as being against supporting 4-H. He went on to say he had been a 4-H member, and he thinks 4-H is a fine program. He said he had received considerable support in his stand although the people who had backed him had not appeared at the meeting. He listed seven reasons 4-H should not receive school financing. Among the seven reasons he stated that he felt a leader must feel very strongly about 4-H if he were to do good work. If they received pay for this sooner or later they would begin to compare the work they had put forth for the amount of money received with other leaders. This would lead to slacking off on the job, and the 4-H members would be the losers.

Whit Gast, board member, said he had contacted a 4-H official at Purdue who said payment to leaders hurt the program much more than it helped it.

Paul McFarland asked Creighton if he would accept the leader's job for next year. Creighton replied, "No." He qualified this by saying that like everyone else he had to devote a certain amount of time to earning a living, a certain amount of time to his family, that, not intending to boast, he did a lot of church work, which, added to the time connected with his board position, left no further extra time.

Ralph Davis, board member, made a motion and it was seconded by Whit Gast that each township be allotted \$300 for use for 4-H leaders or leader. This amount is not to exceed \$1500 for the corporation, and this would be added to the tax rate for payment in 1965. A roll call vote on this showed Davis, Gast, Bucher and Cumberland voting "Yes". Cumberland questioned whether the amount was high enough. Creighton voted against the plan.

At the conclusion of the voting Mrs. Mary Irene Rager said she would like to see all summer programs discontinued with the exception of driver education which does receive school credits.

The remainder of the business meeting was used to discuss the specifications for equipment and furniture to be purchased by the corporation which will go along with the repair jobs at Akron and Talma.

The meeting adjourned at 1:30 a.m.

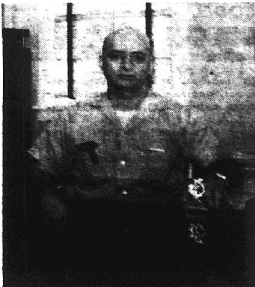

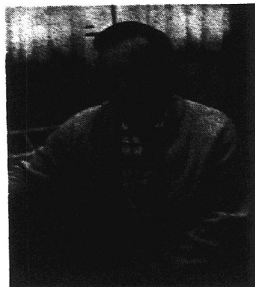
Business Men Honored By FFA

The King-Reed Memorial Home was in charge of the rites with the Rev. Ernil Norman, officiating. Burial was in the Palestine cemetery.

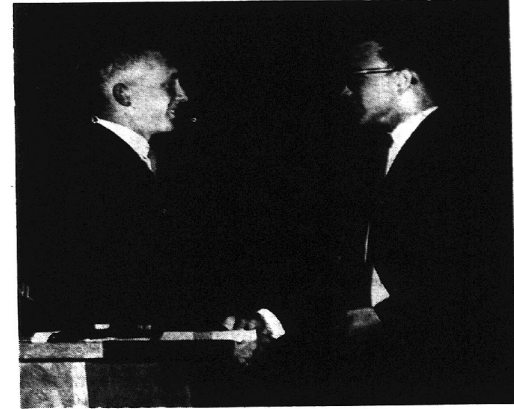
MRS. KOONTZ PRESENTED HOMEMAKING AWARD

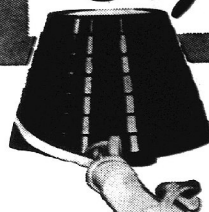

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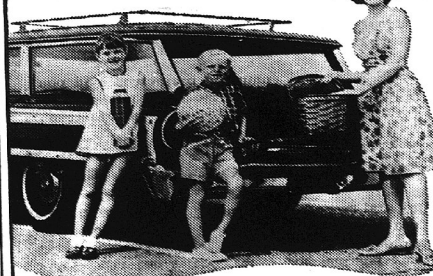

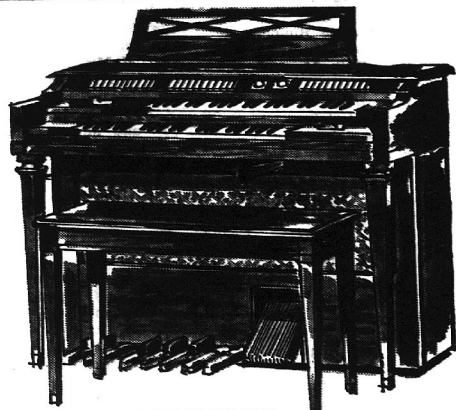
Beaver Dam 4-H Club Meeting

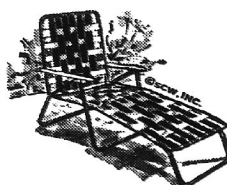

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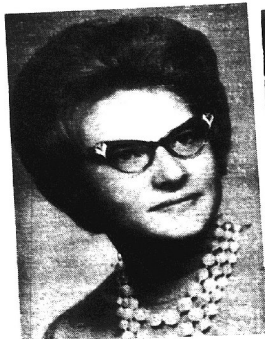

Forbes Defends TVSC School System

A report to the School Board regarding curriculum advances in quantity and quality by Robert Forbes, Superintendent of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation.

On occasion, because of the comment of some individuals, it may become necessary for the School Board to defend the school as far as advanced quality and quality of the curriculum may be.

AKRON HIGH SCHOOL

In the Akron High School there have been added several courses for the benefit of the boys and girls. In the academic area we are now in our second year of Spanish and plans are to proceed to the third year of Spanish next year, no modern foreign language has existed before consolidation. In the area of guidance at Akron prior to consolidation there had been no formal guidance program with no qualified guidance director. At the present time we do have a fully qualified guidance director and a complete testing program has been inaugurated by the Board and our guidance program meets the high State qualifications. Even though there may be some one occasionally that comments that they don't care anything about Spanish or any foreign language, however as the Board knows both modern foreign language and guidance are requirements of the State in order to continue with your commission in your High School. Also, we have added to the High School Remedial Reading for students that have not had proper training in that area. We have also added a course in Occupations. This compliments our guidance program. We have expanded the shop curriculum and the business education curriculum to include Business, Law, Salesmanship, General Business and Shorthand. These were not given prior to the consolidation. We have also included Speech in the program where this was not done before. Along with the quantity of program which has provided at the Akron High School, we would also like to point out a few items with reference to quality, which the Board has brought into being since consolidation. First we would take the Business Department at the Akron High School. At the time of consolidation there were no electric typewriters, there were no comptometers, there were no adding machines, there were no calculators, there was no dictation equipment and the furniture was broken and not stable enough to even hold a machine. Since that time the Board has purchased new furniture (tables and chairs) for the typing room. They have also procured a number of electric adding machines, a number of electric typewriters, comptometers and calculators. Also the

Board has purchased dictating and recording equipment where prior to consolidation there was absolutely none.

In the quality in the guidance program, the Board purchased IQ Tests, Personality Tests, Preference Tests, and all other tests necessary to a first class guidance program. The Board has also purchased Home Economics equipment, Shop equipment, and they have recently approved specifications for drafting tables and stools to be added another year to the Akron High School. They have accepted bids on \$11,000.00 worth of Home Economics equipment in the past few weeks. The Board has willingly supplied the school with materials necessary for Remedial Reading.

They have added new equipment to the Art Department in the way of a Kiln where none was present before. The Board has approved several thousand dollars worth of science materials including chemistry materials, biology materials, and physics materials.

I would be the first to admit that much still needs to be done particularly in increasing the quality of instructional apparatus in the schools but for someone to make the statement or even repeat the statement that the High School is poorer than it was, shows a complete lack of knowledge and respect for the work that the Board has done.

MENTONE HIGH SCHOOL

Mentone High School has also made considerable advance, not only in quantity of curriculum but also in quality. The morale of the personnel at the Mentone School is high. They are now teaching five solids wherein, prior to this year, all teachers had been assigned six solids and this move in itself enhanced the quality of the school a considerable amount. Mentone School has also advanced in the modern foreign language field with Spanish I and Spanish II which are required by the State if a person is to continue their commission. A Guidance program has also been expanded in approximately the same quality and quantity as the Akron High School. The Business Education department has also advanced by the adding of new dictation equipment, new duplicating equipment, new electric typewriters, new electric adding machines and other business machines. The Art Department has also received a new and bigger Kiln. The new Remedial Reading Department has received a quantity of materials which

was necessary for good operation. The principal reports that the Speech Department, which is new in the Mentone School, has been excellent. The Science Department at Mentone has received several thousand dollars worth of equipment to aid the department which had existed. Again there is still room for improvement in the Mentone Schools, however, I am

sure that any person in the know could truthfully say that there has been considerable advance in the Mentone High School.

With reference to the Libraries in the two schools, Mentone does have the best Library and this was true prior to the Consolidation.

However, the Board has continued to supply the Mentone Library with considerable material. The Akron High School Library had practically nothing prior to consolidation and still is not in very good shape. There still needs to be much more material added in the very near future.

Improvements have not been alone in the High Schools. I think it is well recognized by people in the know that there has been considerable improvement by separating the Jr. High students from the High Schools. The Jr. High students spend some time in exploratory typing. The Mentone Jr. High had never had any shop prior to the time they went to Beaver Dam and at the present time they are enjoying the use of new drafting tables at the Talma School along with their shop program. The curriculum for the Jr. High is pretty well set by the State requirements and Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation is meeting those requirements and continually pressing for quality in the program in the Jr. Highs. In the grade schools prior to consolidation the Mentone Grade School had from 42 to 45 in a classroom and these were split classrooms. We have continually worked at this problem until we believe that we have a number of students that will be in each room in the neighborhood of 32. There is still a few split rooms but this can never be completely avoided even in the bigger city systems. The Grade School at Akron is slightly over-crowded, however, we have departmentalized the school giving a little more time to the upper grades where the over-load exists. Burket School has also been departmentalized in the upper grades and teachers report that it is the best grade school that they have ever had.

to help us raise money for the trip.

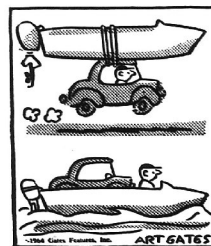
