



Fact is, some of these folks who claim the church is dragging its feet in dealing with every day problems has already left the church. I saw where the thing could lead to a mass mig-ration, like the birds flying South in the winter—only it don't look like these people-birds

e coming back. After considering this thing from the religious side I tackled it from the political side. I come to the conclusion that I oughta preach on the race situation. Last Sunday I done just that. I tried to make it broad enough to hit everybody without being personel enough to rile anybody. Something went wrong.

This is the prediction of Herbert O. Bultemeier, social security district manager, who estimates the odds at seven to one that your married name will

nitain six or more letters.

He supports his estimate by random samplings of a million names selected from men and women who have been issued social security cards at one time

or another.
"Don't let the possibility of a new and difficult name worry you." Bultemeier says. "Most of us are in the same boat. Stop over sometime and take a look at my morning mail or answer telephone a few times."

Rather, he said, he concerned about the fact that unless your social security card is changed to your new name, you may be in for a pack of trouble when the time comes to collect your social security.

It's a simple process to change your name. You don't need a marriage license, a birth certificate or anything else. Just bring your old card to any social security office and your records can be changed on the spot. If you lost your card, it will take a little longer.

If you're too busy to come in person, your post office has the necessary form which you can mail to the social security office.

Heart Association Issues New Statement On Diet And Heart Disease

An eight-point program of dietary control has been recommended to the American people June 5th by the American Heart Association as a possible means of lowering the risk of heart attacks.

Saying that diet is one of the more important factors contributing to heart attack risk, the Association called on the public to:

- * Eat less animal (saturated)
 fat:
- * Substitue vegetable oils and other polyunsaturated fats for animal fats whenever possible;
- * Eat less food rich in cholesterol
- * If overweight, reduce caloric intake:

Other recommendations emphasized that is is important to: * Apply these dietary princi-

- * Apply these dietary principles early in life;
 * Make sound food habits "a
- family affair";

 * Seek professional advice if needed to avoid nutritional deficiencies when changing
- * Adhere consistently to the altered dietary patterns.

The Association's action came as its Board of Directors authorized for publication a statement, "Diet and Heart Disease." The new statement replaces one issued in January 1961. If differs from the older statement in calling for "substitution wherever possible" rather than "reasonable substitution" of polyunsaturated for saturated fats and in recommending, for the first time, reduced intake of cholesterol-rich foods.

Scientific evidence has been growing, the statement says, that "appropriate dietary control may contribute to he retardation or prevention of coronary heart discuse" the basic of most attacks.

For example:

Studies of population groups in the U.S. and elsewhere have shown a relationship between the level of cholesterol and other fats in the blood and the incidence of coronary heart disease. Population with low blood fat levels

have a lower incidence of coronary heart disease than populations with higher levels.

* A relationship has been demonstrated between the diet habitually eaten and the concentration of cholesterol and

other fats in the blood.

* In most person (but not all)
the level of cholesterol and other
fats in the blood can be decreased and maintained "at a lower
level by conscientious and longterm adherence to a suitable
diet."

The recommendation that overweight people cut their caloric intake is based on an indirect rather than a direct relationship between obesity and coronary disease. Obesity aggravates two conditions — hypertension and diabetes — which have been indentified as coronary risk factors. Therefore, the statement says "it is reasonable to strongly recommended control of weight as

After removing the leaves, chop out most of the plants to leave narrow rows eight to 10 inches wide. Go into these remaining rows and thin so there a plant about every inches.

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

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
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
