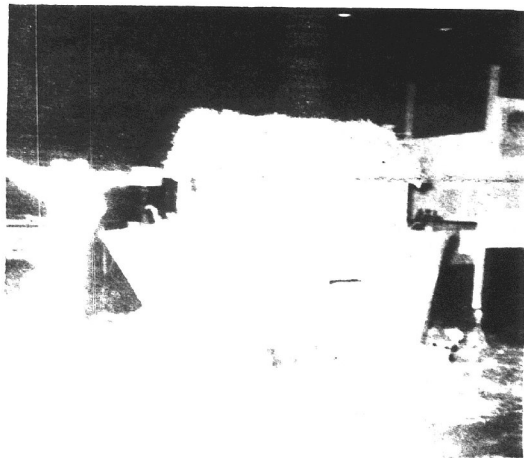
Car-Truck Crash Here

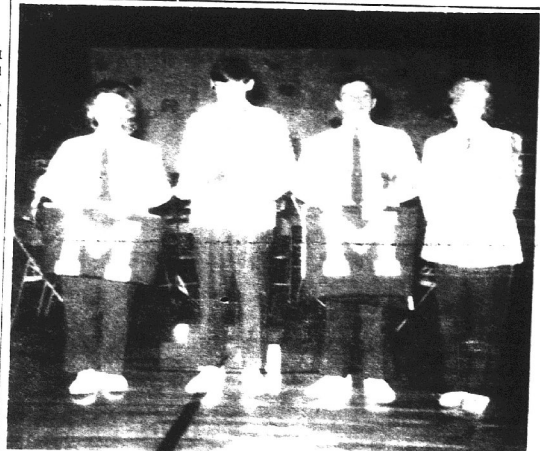

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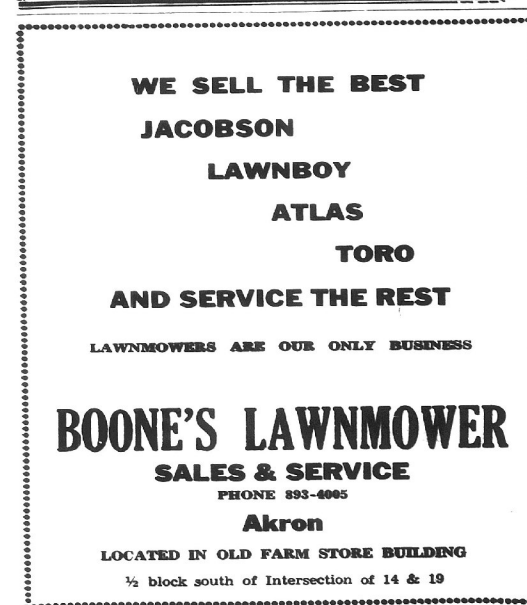
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A Column of News By And For All Girl Scouts Of The Mentone Community

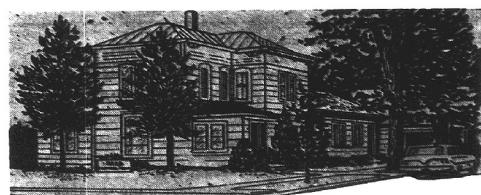

He gave, as well as his loyalty, much financial backing to General George Rogers Clark and was therefore exiled from the diocese by the Bishop of Detroit. His request for repayment was never realized, and he died in Kaskaskia in 1804.

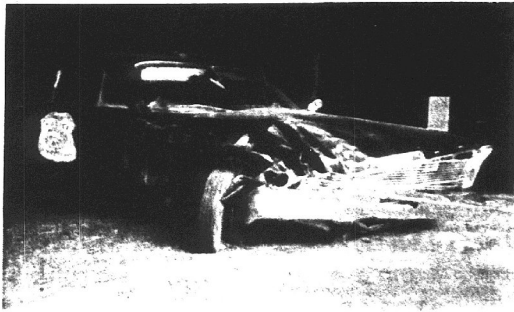

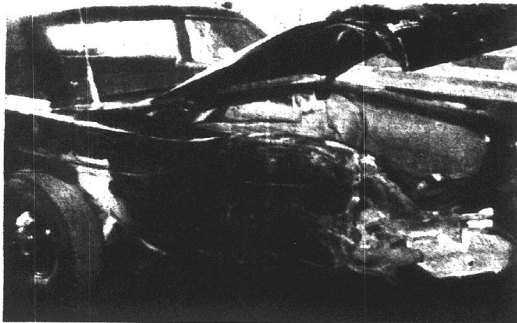

County Extension

Hay crops going in silo in a form called Haylage will have the least amount of loss when ensiled at about 60 to 65 percent moisture according to Don Frantz, County Extension Agent. Losses from fermentation and losses from leaf shattering will be at a minimum when at this level.

The determination of moisture is difficult and some practical guide lines are given that can help in estimating the moisture.

In compressing a hand full of chopped silage at 75 percent, the ball of silage will hold its shape and plant juices will run freely. At 70 percent the ball will hold its shape with but a small amount of plant juice will appear.

At 60 percent, the ball will fall apart slowly and there is no free moisture apparent and below 60 percent the ball of silage will fall apart rapidly.

Field losses will be nearly doubled when haylage is handled as a moisture level below 50 percent. There is also an increased hazard due to poor packing in the silo with additional possibility of mold and in extreme cases there may be a fire risk from combustion.

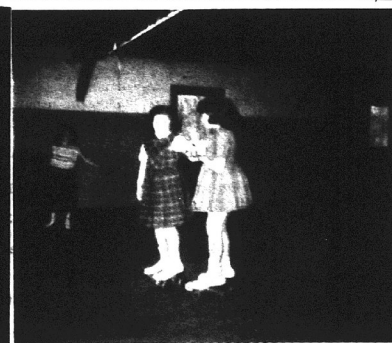
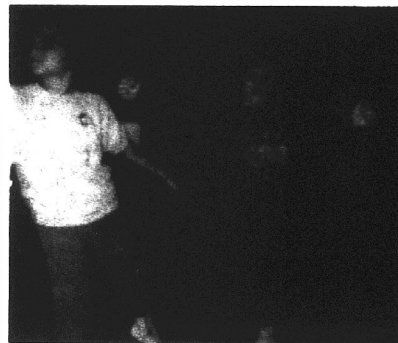

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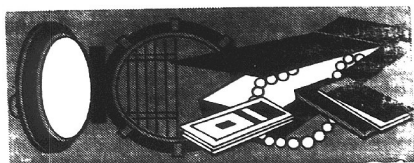

ORDINANCE NUMBER 171
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ABANDONMENT OF VEHICLES, RESTRICTING THE DISPOSITION OF KEPT OR KEPT OR NON-OPERATING OR DISCARDED VEHICLES ON STREETS OR PRIVATE PROPERTY, PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDING OF CERTAIN VEHICLES; AND IMPOSING PENALTIES.

WHEREAS, in the Town of Mentone vehicles are or may be in the future be abandoned in the streets and other places within the Town; and, WHEREAS, there are or may be in the future be dismantled, partially dismantled, wrecked, junked, non-operating or discarded vehicles left about the Town other than in junk yards or other appropriate places; and,

WHEREAS, such conditions tend to impede traffic in the streets or interfere with the enjoyment and reduce the value of private property; invite plundering; create fire hazards and other safety and health hazards to children as well as adults; interfere with the comfort and well-being of the community; and, extend, and aggravate urban blight; and,

WHEREAS, adequate protection of the public health, safety, and welfare requires that such conditions be regulated, abated, or prohibited;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF MENTONE, INDIANA: Section 1. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of this Ordinance:

(1) "Person" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(2) "Vehicle" shall mean a machine propelled by power other than human power designed to travel along the ground by use of wheels, tracks, runners, slides and similar devices, or by other means of propulsion, and shall include, without limitation, automobile, truck, trailer, motorcycle, tractor, bus, and wagon.

(3) "Street or highway" shall mean the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel.

(4) "Property" shall mean any real property within the Town which is not a street or highway.

Section 2. Abandonment of Vehicles. No person shall abandon any vehicle within the Town and no person shall have any vehicle at any place within the Town for a time and under such circumstances as to cause such vehicle reasonably to appear to have been abandoned.

Section 3. Leaving of Wrecked, Non-Operating Vehicle. No person shall leave any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, or junked vehicle on any street or highway within the Town.

Section 4. Disposition of Wrecked or Discarded Vehicles. No person in charge or control of any property within the Town, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or discarded vehicle to remain on such property longer than 48 hours; and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the Town for a longer time than 24 hours; except that this Ordinance shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building; a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful and manner, when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise; or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the Town.

Section 5. Impounding. The Town Marshal, or any person designated by him, is hereby authorized to remove or have removed any vehicle left at any place within the Town which reasonably appears to be in violation of this Ordinance or lost, stolen, or unclaimed. Such vehicle shall be impounded until lawfully claimed or disposed of in accordance with state law.

Section 6. Penalties. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not exceeding \$100.00, or be imprisoned in jail for a period not exceeding 30 days, or be both so fined and imprisoned. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder.

Section 7. Separability Clause. The Board of Trustees declares and intends that each section and provision of this Chapter shall be separable from and independent of any provision thereof that may be found invalid, if possible to be carried out without the invalid, and that it will have so ordained, regardless of such elimination of any such provision so found invalid.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana.

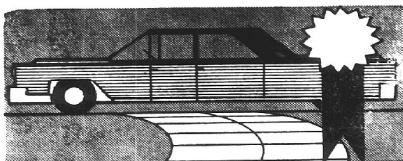

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LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NUMBER 171
AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING ABANDONMENT OF VEHICLES, RESTRICTING THE DISPOSITION OR KEEPING OF WRECKED, NON-OPERATING OR DISCARDED VEHICLES ON STREETS OR PRIVATE PROPERTY; PROVIDING FOR IMPOUNDING OF CERTAIN VEHICLES; AND IMPOSING PENALTIES

WHEREAS, in the Town of Mentone vehicles are or may in the future be abandoned in the streets and other places within the Town; and, WHEREAS, there are or may in the future be dismantled, wrecked, junked, non-operating or discarded vehicles left about the Town other than in junk yards or other appropriate places; and,

WHEREAS, such conditions tend to impede traffic in the streets or interfere with the enjoyment of and reduce the value of private property; invite plundering; create fire hazards and other safety and health hazards to children as well as adults; interfere with the comfort and well-being of the public; and create, extend and aggravate urban blight; and,

WHEREAS, adequate protection of the public health, safety, and welfare requires that such conditions be regulated, abated, or prohibited;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF MENTONE, INDIANA:

Section 1. Definitions. The following definitions of every word and interpretation and enforcement of this Ordinance:

(1) "Person" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind.

(2) "Vehicle" shall mean a machine propelled by power other than human power designed to travel on the ground by use of wheels, treads, runners, or slides and transport persons or property or pull machinery and shall include, without limitation, automobile, truck, trailer, motorcycle, tractor, buggy and wagon.

(3) "Street or highway" shall mean the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel.

(4) "Property" shall mean any real property within the Town which is not a street or highway.

Section 2. Abandonment of Vehicles. No person shall abandon any vehicle within the Town and no person shall have any vehicle at any place within the Town for such time and under such circumstances as to cause such vehicle reasonably to appear to have been abandoned.

Section 3. Leaving of Wrecked, Non-Operating Vehicle on Street. No person shall leave any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, or junked vehicle on any street or highway within the Town.

Section 4. Disposition of Wrecked or Discarded Vehicles. No person in charge or control of any property within the Town, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or discarded vehicle to remain on such property longer than 48 hours; and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the Town for a longer time than 24 hours; except that this Ordinance shall not apply with respect to a vehicle in an enclosed building; a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise; or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the Town.

Section 5. Impounding. The Town Marshal, or any person designated by him, is hereby authorized to remove or have removed any vehicle left at any place within the Town which reasonably appears to be in violation of this Ordinance or lost, stolen, or unclaimed. Such vehicle shall be impounded until lawfully claimed or disposed of in accordance with state law.

Section 6. Penalties. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not exceeding \$100.00, or be imprisoned in jail for a period not exceeding 30 days, or be both so fined and imprisoned. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder.

Section 7. Separability Clause. The Board of Trustees declares and intends that each section and provision of this Chapter shall be separable from and independent of any provision thereof that may be found invalid, if possible to be carried out without the latter, and that it would have so ordained, regardless of such elimination of any such provision so found invalid.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mentone, Indiana.

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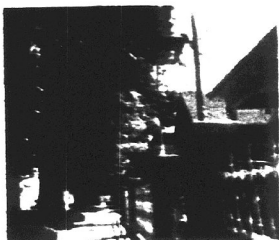

Lt. Peters Urges Care In Boat Towing

The month of June marks the beginning of the summer vacation season. Lieutenant Richard Peters, Commanding Officer of the Legionier District of the Indiana State Police stated that this will mean an increase in the number of boat trailers that will be towed on highways in and around the lake areas.

Lieutenant Peters suggested the following precautions be used when towing a boat trailer on the highways this summer:

1. OBSERVE SPEED LIMITS. He suggests that you check with the states you will travel through for speed limits of vehicles pulling boat trailers.
2. SWING WIDE WHEN PASSING AND MAKE SURE THAT THE ROAD AHEAD IS CLEAR OF ON-COMING TRAFFIC. At crossings, make extra wide turns to clear high curbs after signaling to warn other drivers. Use an outside rear-view mirror since the boat's bulk may take inside types impractical.
3. GIVE YOURSELF PLENTY OF ROOM TO BRAKE TO A SMOOTH STOP WHEN TOWING A TRAILER. The extra momentum caused by the weight of a loaded boat and trailer means that you need more distance. Travel a little slower than you normally would—and try braking a few times at various speeds to see how much distance it takes to get stopped...always signal to warn the driver behind you when slowing or turning.
4. CHECK TAILLIGHTS, TRAILER HITCH SAFETY, CHAINS, TIRES, AND CARGO IN BOAT FREQUENTLY WHILE TRAVELING ON THE HIGHWAY.
5. WHEN THE SPEED OF YOUR VEHICLE AND BOAT TRAILER IMPEDE THE NORMAL FLOW OF TRAFFIC, PULL OFF ON TO THE SHOULDER OF THE ROAD AND LET THE FASTER TRAFFIC PASS.

Using these simple rules as guide lines when towing a boat and trailer will make a safer, happier summer for all users of the highway.

COUNTY COW POPULATION DROPS, PRODUCTION UP

Directors of the Kosciusko County Dairy Association were told that milk production has increased nearly 17 percent in the county in the past five years according to a report given by Don Frantz, County Extension Agent. Census figures just released indicate the increased volume despite a reduction of nearly one-third in the number of dairy herds and one-sixth in the number of dairy cows in the county.

The 1965 census indicates there are now 537 farms with dairy cattle compared to 852 in the previous census. Milk sales however increased from 54 million pounds to 63 million pounds during the five year period.

Charles Smoker, testing supervisor, reported that nearly 1100 cattle are presently on electronic data processed testing procedures.

Myron Metzger, association chairman, announced changes in the dairy exhibit at the county fair. Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey and Jersey Breeds will be shown Friday, August 5th and Holsteins will show Saturday, August 6th.

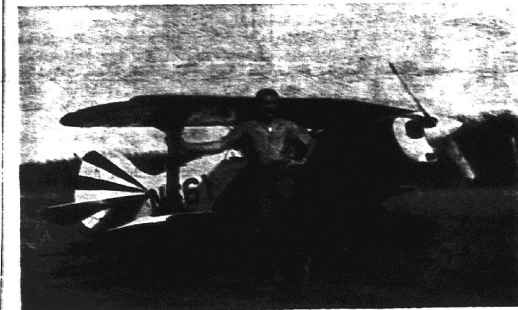

School board votes \$380,000 building program, honors outgoing board members

Members of the Tippecanoe Valley School Board met in regular session Monday night and transacted a variety of business to wind up the term of office for Whitney Gast and Ed Bucher, outgoing board members.

It was noted that Bahney Chevrolet Sales and South End Motors will furnish the driver training cars for Akron and Mentone at no charge beginning July 1. There had previously been a charge for this service.

Eldon Cumberland, on behalf of the board and Forbes, presented a plaque to Ed Bucher, the retiring board president, in honor of his years of work on the board. The gavel which had been used by Bucher at the meetings during his tenure was mounted on an attractive walnut and brass plaque. Ralph Davis, on behalf of the board and Forbes, presented a plaque to Whitney Gast, also an outgoing board member. Both men gave brief words of appreciation.

The sticky subject of a building program for the Tippecanoe Valley schools again presented itself. The board had voted several months ago to make additions to the Akron Grade School and the Mentone school in an attempt to alleviate the crowded conditions in both schools. The firm of Maurer, VanRyan, Ogden and Natali of South Bend has been engaged to draw up a set of preliminary plans, and these plans were presented to the board Monday night. The Maurer firm set an estimate of \$380,000 for the total building program, a figure which does not include the furniture for the rooms.

After some discussion, the board voted 3-2 to accept the plans and to continue with the proposed additions. Creighton and Bucher voted against the additions as they have done on previous occasions. Creighton has strongly favored building a new centralized high school and wants both Beaver Dam and Talma junior high schools closed. He stated that his primary interest was a good education for the children and that he felt this was best done by having an outstanding faculty.

Cumberland challenged Creighton to present a long range plan, saying he had heard nothing from Creighton except a rebuff for the ideas presented. Creighton denied this and said he had no comment to make on the charge.

Bucher interjected at this point, saying that he felt the corporation was sorely lacking

in a long range plan and would not talk against Creighton and Cumberland. He said he felt the need of something else, feeling a centralized high school would solve part of the problem but not all of it. He said he was not against the additions because the corporation needed them, but he didn't feel that everyone around this corporation was wrong and that this was the only right corporation.

He said he felt the board was just prolonging the decision for one school which would have to be made in five years.

Some discussion continued with Forbes pointing out that there was much good to be said for either side, the one favoring a centralized school or the one favoring the building of two new schools.

Creighton reiterated that the faculty was of the prime, important, on last page

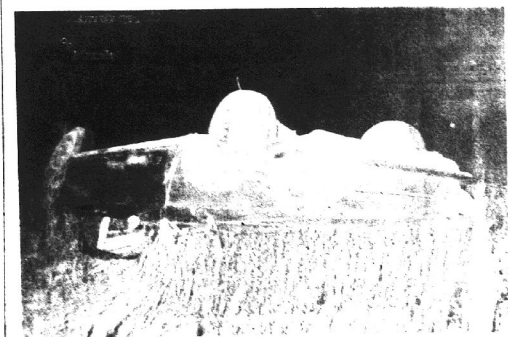

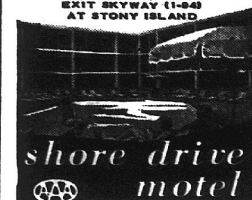

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War, Love, and Time Payments Fill Viet Paper

David Kruger, husband of the former Marilyn Fenimore, has returned to the United States following a tour of duty in Viet Nam. While he was there he became an avid reader of the Saigon Daily News and sent some of the papers to his wife who shared them with us.

We think we have problems putting out two papers a week but what a lot more trouble they must have putting out a daily paper in an alien language. An advertisement says that they accept translations from Vietnamese, Chinese, French, English, German, Italian, and Cambodian, but it soon becomes apparent that much becomes lost in translation. For instance, an advertisement for Ruby air conditioned restaurant, reads: Did you esquire ever dream of fluttering to enjoy in a certain spot. Herewith, we will soon present you the Ruby air conditioned restaurant. Features of the restaurant included "charming welcome, tranquil condition, warmest service, luxurious furnishings."

The war is acknowledged on all pages but life goes on the same on the same pages. Front page advertisements appear in all issues for the local dance halls and night clubs. Other advertising urged the servicemen to send home a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica for Christmas or to buy a car for only \$58.13 per month.

"Dear Abby" is a featured column in the paper along with news of world wide import such as a first glimpse of Zak Starr, Ringo's child.

Advertisements work both ways, with the Vietnamese making suggestions for ways for the Americans to spend money and with an ad which read, "Vietnamese speaking American willing to act as English teacher for landlords, taxi drivers, bar girls and taxi drivers."

We know that it is frequently hard to editorialize even when some situation clearly calls for it. The Saigon Daily News encounters the same problem. An editorial titled "Cheap Houses"

by Ton That Thien read: Author's Note: I have made a number of suggestions on how to secure cheap houses for the poor. Alas, there were so many cuts in my article and, believe it or not, even corrections to it, that I have decided to withhold publication of it. If the poor do not get cheap houses quickly, I hope they will not blame me for not having defended them." There then followed 11 inches of white space which had obviously been left for his editorial.

Often working without electrical power and with men setting the type who understood no English, it is easy to understand the many typographical errors which the paper makes. In fact it is commendable that the paper can even be published. Nevertheless, some of the errors are humorous and probably none more so than the mixed up picture captions. Once picture caption said that Lyndon Johnson was shown shaking hands with Chiang Ching-Kuo. The picture showed a bathing suit clad man (not LGJ) with his arm around a bikini clad girl.

The more one loves, the more one bites

Columnists have their chance for a say in Viet Nam too and we quote one of them, Nguyen Van Tao, here: (Spelling by Nguyen Van Tao, also.)

How funny they in the west break off so easily. They are head over ears in love, rush to church, swear their consent, fly on honeymoon, rush back to court for a divorce, she complaining that he shows a hairy back and snores her awake, he that she wears her beauty mask in bed and refuses a kiss. Even more serious grounds such as cruelty or adultery still sound trifling to us here, and divorce is the last thing thought of. A black eye or a bruised cheek now and then is looked upon as rather a spur to sleepy love, since it is a common belief that "the more one loves the more one bites". As for adultery, experienced women take it for granted that the men all have pretensions to don-juanism and should be left to have a try at it before they sally retile down to the wisdom that "be she ever so homely, there's no woman like dear old wife."

In our present times of professed democracy, when women go in for blue jeans and contraceptive pills and when there are increasing cases of men changing into women, beating one's wife looks utterly vulgar and uncivilized. However it was all the fashion with our grand-

fathers and fathers, who, either well-bred or ill-bred, used to beat our grandmothers and mothers black and blue, and that almost every day and often for a mere nothing. You should educate your wife, they argued, since the very instant she crosses your threshold, lest she should soon lead you by the nose. The recurring scene was that of Husband twisting Wife's long hair and punching her as hard as he could. Fortunately enough, Vietnamese males being most fly-weight were little damaging, and as soon as corrected Wife could resume her daily chores, as if nothing had happened.

Of course, at her cries, neighbors would have gathered at the door, witnessing, suggesting and advising, intervening onup at "the psychological moments" when they deemed Husband was overdoing it and that his educational punching was turning murderous. It's everyone's right to teach his wife and give her a good thrashing, but a curtain-lecture would be much more preferable. Somebody might say.

These are wise words, but the chances are that some body would go home and beat his wife all the same for you to mediate and remind him of what he said. And the lesson was to be reciprocated again and again. Yet, nobody divorced nobody. A day living together, and you are bound to each other for eternity; moreover, there are the children, they said.

All that may sound ludicrously old fashioned and uncivilized. Children however are not confined in dreary boarding-houses to be kissed one day by Dad and another day by Mum, until Dad gets another wife and Mum another husband, and forget all about the children they once together made."

And such is life and love in Viet Nam as recorded by the Saigon Daily News. We wish them good luck in their endeavor of publishing a good paper but hope they give up the wife-beating idea!

portance and Davis challenged him on this statement, saying that he thought Creighton had only a new school in mind. Davis said, "What we're doing now is not wasted regardless of how we go in the future."

Creighton returned, "We've signed our last contract."

The plans which were approved included three new classrooms and a nurse's station at the Akron Grade School and five classrooms, a sick room, and a teacher's material center at the Mentone school. The total cost at Mentone was estimated at \$250,000 with the Akron program being estimated at \$130,000.

Resignations were accepted from Gordon Kauffman, shop teacher at Mentone, and Cecil Mason, a social studies teacher. New contracts were granted to Morris Hackworth, a social studies and English teacher; Polly Finney and Marsha Parker, beginning teachers; and Madeline Fisher, an art teacher. Mrs. Finney will replace Mrs. Fisher when she completes her studies teaching which will be done under Mrs. Fisher. Mrs. Parker will also begin teaching at the conclusion of her student teaching.

The board approved bus driver contracts for Charles Eaton, Elgie Vandermark, Wilbur Utter, Kendal Rager, Robert Hoffman, Charles Hammer, Vern Egolf, Alvin Finney, Sylvester Hedington, Gordon Groninger, Larry Hartzler, Ben McCloughan, Frank Cumberland, and Wayne Engle.

The contracts of the other drivers have not yet been received by the board.

Summer remedial contracts for Trella Tombaugh and Dean Rager were approved.
