He also re-ceived instruction in the methods of teaching modern medicine, improved agricultural practices, techniques of local, government, communications, and basic commerce to native villagers.

Special training was given in infiltrating hostile territory to train, equip and advise guerril-las in combating the enemy. Pvt. Drochner received his A. A. degree in 1964 from Wright Junior College.

water. This is known as chemicalization,

This is known as chemicalization, or water conditioning, since flu-orides are not used as drugs, not used for treatment and are not a medicine or a medication. Chemical conditioning of the water with fluoride simply reduces dental caries in the teeth of in-fants and children up to and in-cluding eight years of age. The early beneficial effect of fluorida-tion lasts for a lifetime. Reduction of caries incidence amounting to 50 percent are usual when persons from natural fluoride areas are compared with those

areas are compared with those from nonfluoride areas. Similar reductions have been reported in persons who drink artificially flu-oridated water.
