Erwin To Seek Joint Senate Seat



William W. Erwin, former Indiana Young Republican chairprominent Bourbon and man farmer, filed his candidacy today for the GOP comination for state senator representing Kosciusko nd Marshall counties.

A lifelong resident of the Bourbon community, and a lea-der in agricultural and civic affairs, Erwin in 1958 was selected by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce as the nation's outstanding young farmer.

Having participated in a num-ber of policy-making councils on agriculture, Erwin courrently is a member of the county, district, Adand national Field Crops visory Committees for the farm Bureau, a member of the Purdue Farm Policy Study group and on the board of directors of Foundation for American Agriculture.

As a member of President Eisenhower's committee on Pro gram and Progress, from which came the book "Decisions for a Better America," Erwin took part formulating Republican party goals for the next 20 years. He also served as Eisenhower's personal farm representative in the campaign and is a past farm chairman for the GOP state central committee. A veteran of service of World

War II, he belongs to the Ameri-can Legion, Masonic Lodge, Bourbon Methodist Church. He is a graduate of the University of Illinois

Erwin and his wife June are the parents of three children: Hope 14, Lewis 12, and James 8.

PCA 30 Years Old



Here is a good question: "If you don't enjoy what you have, how could you be happier with more?

The following Rules of This Establishment were handed to us by a friend and were reprinted in the Merchandising News and as they were found in Views, an 1878 Carriage Shop.

"Employees working here shall dust the furniture, clean their desk and sweep the floor daily. All windows shall be cleaned once a week.

Each employee shall bring his own bucket of water and scuttle of coal for the day's work.

Lamps shall be trimmed and chimneys cleaned daily. Working hours shall be 7 a.m.

to 8 p.m. every evening, but the Sabbath. On the Sabbath everyone is expected to be in the Lord's House. Employees are expected to

trim their own pen nibs to suit themselves.

It is expected that each employee shall participate in the activities of the church and con-tribute liberally to the Lord's work

All employees must show themselves worthy of their hire. All employees are expected to be in bed by 10 p.m. Except: each male employee may be given one evening a week for courting purposes and two evenings a week in the Lord's house.

After an employee has been with our firm for five (5) years. he shall receive an added payment of 5¢ per day; providing the firm has prospered in a manner to make it possible.

It is the bounded duty of each employee to put away at least 10% of his wages for his declining years, so that he will not become a burden upon the charity this betters. Any employee who is shaven in public parlors, of his frequently visits pool rooms or uses tobacco, shall be brought before the management to give easons why he should be continued in employment."

Twenty-five students at Men tone High School plan to take the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, Gaylord Toll, principal, announced today.

The test will be administered at the school at 9:00 a.m., Tuesday March 10, All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1965 should take the test at that time

The qualifying test is a threehour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, associations, unions, trusts, and individnals

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends up-on the extent of sponsor participation. In 1963, 1528 Merit Scholarships were awarded; 951 were provided by 179 sponsors and 577 by the Merit Corpora-tion. There are 4118 Merit Scholars attending 425 colleges in the current academic year.

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many high schools to help students make decisions to nep students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 14,000 Semifinalists, the highest scores in each state, will be named early next fall. Names of Semifinalists are published in booklet which is distributed to all colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Further, their names and test scores are sent to the colleges they express an interest in attending as their first and sec-ond choices. The order of perference is not shown.

An additional 35,000 students selected on a national basis, receive letters of commendation for their high performance on the are consireded for special awards qualifying test. These students are considered for special awards made through the Merit Corpora-tion, and their names and test

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Each Semifinalist will be ask ed to take a second examination Those who repeat their high performance will become Fina list in the Merit Program. Win ners of Merit Scharships will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of school records recommendations, and scores, extracurricular activities leadership ability, and accom-plishments outside the classroom Each Finalist is awarded a Certificate of Merit attesting to his

Th based on financial need. minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$1500. The average stipend awarded to freshman Merit Scholars in 1963 was \$796 annually, or \$3184 for the four years of college. Each scholarship constitutes a form of educational insurance, since the stipend may be increased at any time if the student's financial situation changes during the four-years term of the scholarship.

Supplementary grants are usu ally made to the colleges that the scholars attend.







Talma Has Science Visitor

On Friday 21, 1964, Dr. Lawrence Strong, form Earlham College visited the science classes at Talms. His discussion was on liquid oxygen.

He told us that the boiling point of liquid ovygen is about 300 degrees below zero F. It keeps this low temperature by boiling, and when you put an object in it, the oxygen boils very rapidly until the object is as cold the liquid oxygen. as

When he put some liquid oxygen in a test tube and put a stopper in the opening it produced a force that blew the stopper across the room. It was caught by our principal, Mr. Janet Gordon

Dr. Strong put a piece of rubber tubing in the liquid oxygen until it was cold. When he brought it out and pulled it, the hose shattered in many pieces.

Then he put a hollow football in the liquid oxygen. When he took it out and threw it against the wall, instead of bouncing back, it shattered to pieces. I enjoyed his experiment very much.

Stanley Shand Dr. Strong used for one experishaped like a hollow dumbell. The bulb at one end had a cup-shaped depression to hold a liquid, while the other was round. Inside the round end was

a small quantity of water. Dr. Strong poured liquid oxygen into the cup-shaped depression. The water in the round end soon froze. It froze because when it evaporates, it carries the heat with it and causes the water to cool down. The liquid oxygen cooled the vapor and condensed as frost on the cup-shaped bulb

When a living animal is to be frozen you must freeze it vey quickly so that ice crystals will not puncture the body cells. If these cells are punctured the animal will die. Liquid oxygen is so cold that it will freeze the animal very quickly.

Dr. Strong demonstrated this with a live goldfish. Taking it from the bowl and putting it into the liquid oxygen. It froze almost instantly. Quickly he brought the fish out and put it back into the bowl. In about 10 seconds the fish came back to life. This proves that living animals can be frozen by liquid oxygen.

Brent Flens Oxygen supports combustion. To show this, Dr. Strong had hydrogen and oxygen in a bottle. He ignited it with a pop the bunsenburner. The two elements combined with a great noise. If you combine hydrogen and oxygen you get water. Peggy Rensb

TROSTBITE time is here again. The parts of the body most sus-ceptible to frostilite are the toes and fingers; these extremilies are farthest from the central heating department of the body. When blood circulation is decreased, as it is by cold, the extremilies are the first to be affected. However there are other factors tribute to frostbite: duration of the presence of a strong wind, frost-bile may occur in temperatures that otherwise would not be harm-tal. ful. Dry cold is tolerated by humans better than moist cold. Wearers of wet clothing, shoes or gloves are particularly susceptible to the efparticularly susceptil fect of cold weather.

Signs of frostbite are dead white ss of the skin, coldness and mbness of the flesh. Victims ould be taken indoors and the ness umh should be taken indoors and the frozen parts warmed rapidly in warm water or in a warm blanket. The frostbitten area should not be rubbed, as the tissues while in that condition are easily torn or bruised bruised.

1964-65 Dairy **Support Prices** Set

Dairy support prices for the 1964-65 marketing year have set at national averages of \$3.15 per bundredweight for manufacturingmilk and 58 cent per pound of butterfat, Melvin R. Myers Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (Fulton County) Committee, said today. These prices reflect 75 percent of the parity prices for the two commodities. Comparable prices for 1963-64 - also at 75 percent of parity — were \$3.14 and 58.1 cents.

Dairy support prices are mandatory between 75 and 90 per-cent of parity, the Chairman explained. The law requires that the Secretary of Agriculture set, within this range, the level "necssary in order to assure an ade-quate supply."

Milk production in the 1963-64 marketing year has averaged a-bout 1 percent less than a year earlier, and consumption of milk its products has increased slightly. While purchases of dairy products were moderately smaller than in 1962-63, they have been large in the 1963-64 marketing year. 

Vines should be pruned every year from the time they are four years old for the best production Here's how

Cut back all the old canes to the main trunk of the vine. The older canes will be darker in olor and heavier than last year's growth. Choose four or five of the newer canes and cut them each has eight to back so that ten buds. Tie them to a support. With this type of pruning, summer pruning won't be necesary. Sap flowing from the cut area during the spring arm the plant.

To get grape vines started buy vear-old vines. New vines can be planted as soon as wea permits. Set them eight their feet apart in rows which or ten feet apart. Set the vine about two inches deeper thar they were in the nursery row. Niagara is the leading white grape in Indiana and the Conord is the most popular grape of ali.

Grapes are gaining in 'popularity and are good from the standpoint of adaptability. They be grown on a backyard an can be grown on a backyard fence and require little space. Vines will live for many years and even, old neglected ones can be easily rejuvenated to yield well.



Good For A Loaf Of Bread

EDITOR'S NOTE: A six sided brass token was recenty found by Ralph Ward which brought back fond memories to all who remembered C. E. Turner, a baker in Mentone 65 years ago. Earl R. Shinn has recalled here or us many of the memories as sociated with the old brass token. The token can be seen in the window of the MENTONE NEWS office.

A six sided token or chip, plain on one side, the other stamped C. E. TURNER, GOOD FOR ONE LOAF OF BREAD MENTONE, IND.-what pleasant memories has been recalled by this token. The heavenly aroma of freshly baked bread still ho from th oven, was the spesmell intriguing to a husky growing boy on a clear, frosty morning. Occasionally this odo would be so irresistable that a group of boys, of which I was would pool their resource until we had a nickel to buy one these delicious loaves of hot pread at the bakery.

It might be of interest to know that six of the brass tokens could be purchased for a quarter, entitling the customer to six large oaves of bread. Of course, as this was about 65 years ago there has been quite a change in prices and times.

This bake shop was located behind the building now owned and occupied by Vincent Goodman, and was operated by Edward Turner in connection with a restaurant. Ed or Eddie, as he was familarly known, was very versatile and was an outstand-ing citizen who contributed ing citizen much to the community. His speciality was the cornet. He was also band leader and director. Along with this he was a good bexer, 100 yd. sprinter, but like many others, age crept up like and slowed him to the point that when he sprinted it was up and down in the same place.

Eddie missed no busine no business op-shipped bread cortunity. He duily in large rattan baskets to towns located on the Nickel Plate Railroad. This no doubt explains the finding of the bread token in an old thread cabinet, originally belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Elick, who at one time resided in Packertown.

Mr. Turner died some vears go at Warsaw, Ind., aged in his middle eighties, ending a lifetime that in part was some of the history of Mentone in "the good old days."

This prevention includes: Proper disposal of dead pigs, proper isolation of all additions to the swine herd and keeping visitors, both human and animal, out of hog houses.

get started and grow quickly Many new lawns are sown on subsoil excavated from the building site and plant food avail-able is often low in this subsoil. Add 20 pounds of fertilizer such as 10-6-4 per 1,000 square feet before the grass is sown. Mix it well into the soil-

The surface of the soil should be kept moist for three weeks after seeding. Moisture is necessary for seed germination.

It important to use grasse adapted to local growing conditions. Bluegrass or bluegrass mixtures are best for sunny areas but use special mixtures fo shady areas.

After sowing, rake the seed in lightly, then roll the lawn. Mulch if desired.

When you purchase lawn grass seed, let the pre cent of bluegrass be your key to quailty, the horticulturists say. Never buy a lawn grass mixture containing less then bluegrass. per cent Better still, get 50 per cent bluegrass or more in every mixture used Apply dormant sprays now to

Many scale insects are small, resemble the bark itself and are difficult to see. The San Jose scale, for example, is the size of a pinhead and the ovster shell scale only slightly larger. Both may be serious pests.

The maple bladder gall is an example of a plant gall that can be prevented by a dormant spray. It attacks foliage of young soft maples and causes le ves to be with green overed or red warts".

The entomologists say dorm ant sprays are best applied just before buds break and leaves start to emerge. Use a dormant suray oil at the rate of one quart in six gallons of water Thorough coverage is essential.





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BAPTIST CHURCH Mis nary-Plane Project with S & H Green Stamps

The Senior Training Union of church starting a collec-of S & H Green Stamps to help purchase a "CESSNA 180" to be used by Rev. "Hank" Scheltema, missionary-pilot in the Amazon Villey of Brazil.

Rev. Scheltema, wife, and four children work among the civilized Brazilians, but he stated that, "In the Amazon Valley, which is nearly the size of the U.S., exciuding Alaska, there are many savage tribes living deep in the jungle which have never been seen by white men. Not only unevangelized and uncivilized, but they are primitive and some are cannabalistic."

The work of this dedicated young missionary-pilot is most interesting. During his first term of servce he had a small plane which enabled him to reach many new points for preaching along the longest runway in the world-the Amazon River and its tributaries. With the plane, three widely separated mission stations can be reached for preaching on Sunday By foot, along narrow snake-infested paths, throug through dense jungles, it would take days to reach even one of the stations. Not only valuable time, thus money, has been saved, but physical as well as spiritual lives have been saved.

Missionaries, their families and natives have been rescued from danger and even death Moving pictures films showed examples; a stranded boat in the middle of the Amazon River, and a poison-snake-hitten native -sure death if the plane had not been available to fly the man to medical care. Missionaries can save much time getting to stations, supplies can their be flown in much faster. Many more villages can be reached, some which are pleading for missionaries.

The task of buying the plane is an immense one, with \$15,000 yet to go by the end of April. Rev. Scheltema feels so strongly the need of a larger one that he has made arrangements to get parts with S & H Green Stamps. For example 12 books of stamps will buy an airplane battery. Anyone wishing to help could donate S & H Green Stamps, which will be sent by the Senior Training Union Group to Rev. Scheltema around the middle of April. The Scheltemas' plan to leave in a few months for the work they love as their furlough is nearly over.




