DID YOU KNOW? | Property Taxes To Raise

This announcement was made today by Walter T. Horn, ex-ecutive secretary of the Indiana Taxpayers Association. The total to be collected this year is \$609,-108,486, or more than 100 per cent increase over the total of \$292,998,771 levied for collection in 1955. This year's in 1964 is \$38,373,918. increase

Making the outlook for proporty tapayers even more gloomy is Mr. Horn's observation a t bills pending before sent session of the Indiana General Assembly call for ine essed spending, increased borowing and higher limits in property tax rates. Making the out-look even more dark, are the proposils to reduce the valuation pase and the elimination of cerin state distributions of local texing units. A combination of hese factors could cause property tax rates to climb to n astronomical heights. The estimated average property tax ate now stands at \$6.80 in all ime high. The property tax inrease is even more significant when consideration is given to 69,712,222, collected by the sales and use tax; \$244,871,300 coleeted for adjusted gross income xes, and corporate net income x collections amounting to \$1,-73 348. The total taxes from here three sources is \$316,256,-870 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964.

Local governmental officials sought expenditures that would have raised \$668,876,287 for this year. Local agencies eliminated \$35,676,363 and the State Board of Tax Commissioners made fur-ther reductions of \$24,091,438.

However. more revenue from new sources seems to have been consider as merely more govern-mental money to spend and the plight of the property taxpayer becomes steady more critical We may well inquire whether a critical. ceiling on property taxes must be established by law. Persuation has accomplished little and greater firmness in the matter of producing governmental revenue may have to be damanded.'

"We can only say, as we have so many times before, that the people who pay these excessive property taxes are the people who could demand and obtain relief if they were willing to be sufficiently militant when the local budgets are approved and lecal budgets are approved and the rates for the following year made known. There is still the battle of the people against governmental extravagance and trey can win it, eventually, if they will stand together—when the governmental spenders reach for another tax helping."

Over 260 Fulton County farmers signed up for the 1965 Feed Grain Program in the first three weeks of the seven week period at the Fulton County ASCS office in Rochester. This is a good beginning, they say, that bids well for a larger participation than last year.

The present sign-up as in former years, is for 1965 only. Included this year for the first time is the privelege to substiand corn acreages wheat so reducing the inconvenience of part fields for cropping purposes. This substitution provision is limited to the 655 wheat producers was indicated their intentions to participate in the wneat diversion program during last falls 1965 wheat crop signup, but because it is optional, it goes not prohibit other producers from participating whether they have excess wheat producers acreage or grew none at all.

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
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BUT, MOM! WHY DO I HAVE TO PRACTIC E TODAY?




