## Lakeland Civic Music Conducting Drive

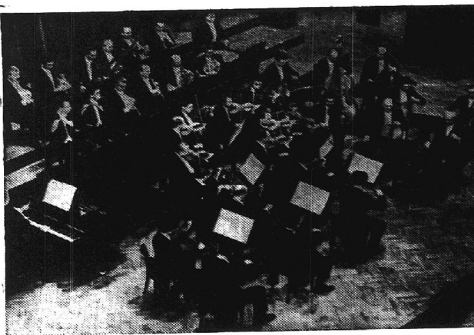
Lakeland Civic Music is again conducting its annual Membership Campaign during the days of March 1-10.

Indiana property taxes will be higher again this year.

This announcement was made today by Walter T. Horn, executive secretary of the Indiana Taxpayers Association. The total to be collected this year is \$609,108,486, or more than 100 per cent increase over the total of \$292,998,771 levied for collection in 1955. This year's increase over 1964 is \$38,373,918.

Making the outlook for property taxpayers even more gloomy is Mr. Horn's observation that bills pending before the next session of the Indiana General Assembly call for increased spending, increased borrowing and higher limits in property tax rates. Making the outlook even more dark, are the proposals to reduce the valuation base and the elimination of certain state distributions of local taxing units. A combination of these factors could cause the property tax rates to climb to astronomical heights. The estimated average property tax rate now stands at \$6.80 in all time high. The property tax increase is even more significant when consideration is given to \$9,712,222, collected by the sales and use tax; \$244,871,300 collected for adjusted gross income taxes, and corporate net income tax collections amounting to \$1,733,348. The total taxes from these three sources is \$316,256,870 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964.

Local governmental officials sought expenditures that would have raised \$668,876,287 for this year. Local agencies eliminated \$35,676,363 and the State Board of Tax Commissioners made further reductions of \$24,091,438.

The highest property tax rate in Indiana is found in Calumet township of East Gary. It is a 19.25 per cent. The lowest in Indiana is \$1.80 in Dearborn county's Lawrenceburg township.

where a large concentration of wealth makes a low property tax rate possible.

Eleven counties decreased their property taxes. They are Clay, Clinton, Crawford, Dekalb, Lawrence, Martin, Ohio Posey, Tipton, Vermillion and Washington. The largest decrease was \$251,343 in Tipton county, Dekalb ranking second with a reduction of \$147,168. Marion county's property tax for this year will be an increase of \$5,131,831 and Lake county's increase amounts to \$4,130,169.

"Two years ago," Mr. Horn said, "the Indiana General Assembly was expected to do something for the relief of property taxpayers and did enact legislation to that end. However, more revenue from new sources seems to have been considered as merely more governmental money to spend and the plight of the property taxpayer becomes steadily more critical. We may well inquire whether a ceiling on property taxes must be established by law. Persuasion has accomplished little and greater firmness in the matter of producing governmental revenue may have to be demanded."

"We can only say, as we have so many times before, that the people who pay these excessive property taxes are the people who could demand and obtain relief if they were willing to be sufficiently militant when the local budgets are approved and the rates for the following year made known. There is still the battle of the people against governmental extravagance and they can win it, eventually, if they will stand together when the governmental spenders reach for another tax helping."

Don't be surprised if the children have a word for it. It's super - call - fragil - listle - ex - pl - all - docious. That's a word to be used when no other word will do.

The source of all this nonsense and magic is Mary Poppins, a governess full of surprises, who's the heroine of a new Walt Disney movie. One job of children's book and game planners is guessing ahead of time what children will like and laugh at. "Mary Poppins is a sure favorite," says Bob Hamersden of Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin, who previewed the movie many months ago.

The new film combines live action and animation. Julie Andrews and Dick Van Dyke play their parts with a light touch, treating make-believe as an ordinary part of a child's day.

From the time Mary blows in with her umbrella on the west wind to meet Michael, 6, and Jane, 8, life at the Banks household in London is never quite the same. The children step into a chalk drawing for a colorful adventure, enjoy a race on merry-go-round horses, join a dance of chimney sweeps, and look at their life from fresh angles.

Whitman has long worked closely with Disney Studios, to bring out special play materials based on children's favorite characters. To fill the demand by Mary fans, there'll be Mary Poppins coloring books and paint books, story books and puzzles by Whitman at local game centers, so that children can relive such hours long after they've left the theatre.

On Mary's magic tape measure, which gives blunt character readings, Mary Poppins is "practically perfect." Most children are likely to agree.

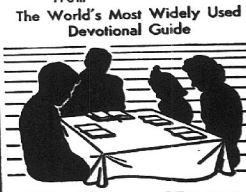

## Tippecanoe Has Blue And Gold Banquet

Over 260 Fulton County farmers signed up for the 1965 Feed Grain Program in the first three weeks of the seven week period at the Fulton County ASCS office in Rochester. This is a good beginning, they say, that bids well for a larger participation than last year.

The present sign-up as in former years, is for 1965 only. Included this year for the first time is the privilege to substitute wheat and corn acreages, so reducing the inconvenience of part fields for cropping purposes. This substitution provision is limited to the 655 wheat producers who indicated their intentions to participate in the wheat diversion program during last fall's 1965 wheat crop sign-up, but because it is optional, it does not prohibit other corn producers from participating whether they have excess wheat acreage or grew none at all.

Purpose of the Feed Grain Program, County Committee members, Melvin R. Myers Jr., Clement Good and Dale Ladson explained, is to reduce the surplus production of corn, grain sorghum and barley. The latter two are seldom grown in this county but are popular crops in other areas and states.

The committee explains that farmers who sign up agree to reduce the average number of feed grain crops (corn in this area) which were in production on the farm before the beginning of the current program in the fields which they had been growing this grain. This acreage is diverted to a conserving crop from which no harvest can be taken. For this action payments are made by the government according to the rated production ability of the farm.

Sign-up will go on daily from 7:45 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. Monday thru Fridays in the office at 513 Main Street. The office will also be open on the following Saturday, March 13 and 20th for the convenience of producers who are unable to get to our office thru the week. Sign-up ends March 26, 1965.

## Odds And Ends

A few years ago I read a column by a noted writer who had just donated his eyes to research. He wrote that he and his wife had both made pledges that as soon as they died their eyes would be used for research or for corneal replants. Personally, I thought he was some kind of nut or crackpot, and the whole idea was appalling.

Yesterday, I signed a pledge card donating my two eyes to the Indiana Lions Eye Bank.

What brought about the change in thinking? I don't really know. Maybe it was the blind college professor I once worked for or the friend who suddenly lost the sight in one eye last week or maybe I just finally realized they wouldn't do me much good after I was dead. At any rate, they are pledged to the Lions for use in research or for corneal replants.

Personally, I'm hoping they go to some person who has been deprived of sight for a number of years and who would give anything for the sight of falling

leaves, a baby's face, the face of a loved one, or the weekly newspaper. Actually, one person will not get both of them. My matched set would be divided with two people each receiving one. This system helps eliminate the possibility of the eyes not being right for one person but possibly helping another.

It is estimated that of the 400,000 blind persons in the United States, 20,000 could be helped by corneal transplant surgery. It is also estimated that only 1,000 corneal transplant operations are performed by all Eye Bank each

year. The number of transplants is limited by the number of donor eyes received.

The eyes used for research are needed for teaching and training medical personnel in the field of eye surgery and eye diseases.

An interesting fact is that anyone can donate his eyes - even the blind. Age is no factor. How do I feel after signing the pledge card? Just fine, never better. In fact, now I'm wondering if there are any more banks who would like anything else. There's not much sense in

taking everything with you when someone left behind might be able to live a more normal life.

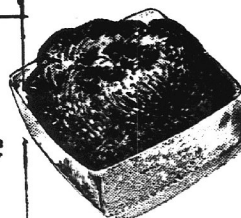

And he Peter broke down and wept. —Mark 14:72 (RSV)

This must have been the moment of bitterest heartbreak in Peter's life—the pain of grief over the betrayal of love. The cock's crow brought back his conscience. He had sinned, but he quickly repented, as is manifested by his bitter weeping.

The changing of a sinful life begins in repentance. It is the starting point. Repentance makes way for God's entry into a person's life. Man's extremity, a awareness of his sinful condition, is God's first real opportunity. Peter's tears had washed away his pride, self-trust, self-sufficiency, and self-regard. Only humility and shame were left. This made possible an utter dependence on God, which is the beginning of sonship.

This story is told not to pillory Peter as a coward. It points to the grace of Christ's forgiveness by which Peter was finally restored and given great responsibility in the redemptive plan of Christ.

PRAYER: O Lord, our great Redeemer, quicken our conscience, and make us aware of our sins. Grant us true penitence. Bless us with restoration, and commission us to Thy service. In Thy name we ask, and pray as Thou hast taught us, "Our Father who art in heaven.... Amen."

Participating schools were Akron Elementary School, Akron High School, Beaver Dam Junior High School, Burket School, Mentone School and Talma Junior High School.

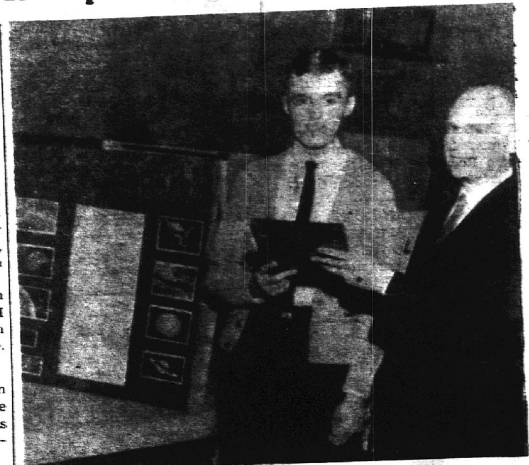
There were 286 entrants in all divisions, with division II having 170 entries, 75 of which were from the sixth grade. There were 27 judges.

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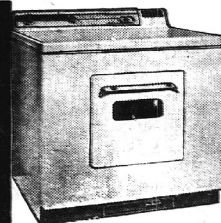
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## Odds And Ends

It is suggested that anyone desiring such a log contact the Department of Conservation at Indianapolis, MEIrose 3-6518. They also recommend you be prepared to go to the expense of heavy moving equipment, blisters and sore muscles, because one thing is certain, the log will not come willingly.

The department could only think of one possible use—they suggested some club make a 300 year old gavel of the tree. That would make a lot of calls to order.

The house is obviously out even though the tree might make a good hat rack. The barn? I suppose we could hang empty feed sacks and baler twine on the branches, but nails and beams make cheaper and less bulky holders than the poor old tree.

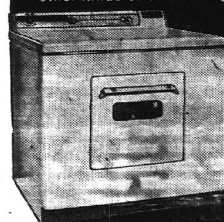

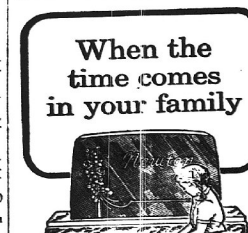

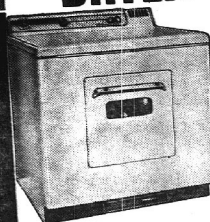

The vaccine will have little or no side effects on the system other than to protect against polio. Protection begins in two or

three weeks after the vaccine is given. Anyone from two months of age on should receive this protection. The two feedings of vaccine will be permanent for those over six years old. Previous polio injections will not interfere with the oral vaccines. The best part about this vaccine is that it protects against all types of polio and only two feedings are necessary instead of

three.

There will be a free will offering taken to help defray the 50c per inoculation cost to the Medical Association. The cost of a feeding at a doctors office would be almost \$5.00. This is the best bargain for health that anyone can receive. Various organizations in the community are donating their time to make this possible.

The Mentone Lions Club is

sponsoring the vaccination program and has asked many other area clubs to help them to furnish personnel to operate the clinic. 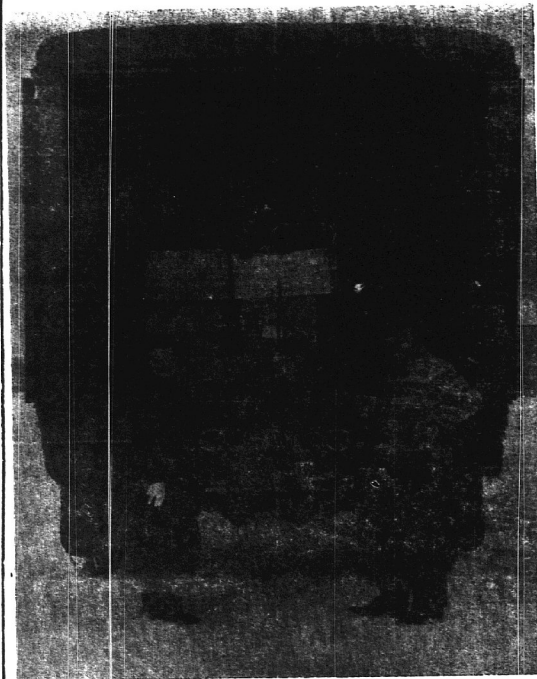
