## Grace College Choir Will Be Heard Here Sunday



Donald E. Ogden, professor of music and chairman of the division of fine arts of the college, organized the choir and has been its director since its formation in 1953. He holds the B.A. and M.A. degrees in sacred music from Bob Jones University, where he also taught from 1948-50, and has received the M.M. degree in choral conducting from Indiana University and the B.D. degree from Grace Theological Seminary.

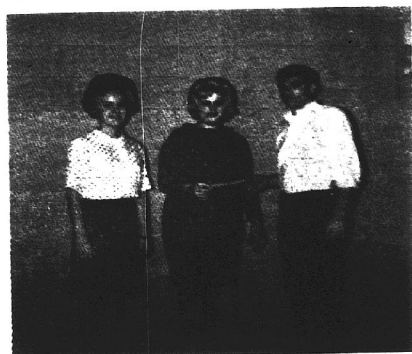
Now in its twelfth year of touring, the choir this spring will sing in Indiana, Southern California, Colorado, Wyoming, and Ohio. This spring marks the group's second trip to California, the first having been in 1957.

Open to all college students by audition, this year's touring choir is comprised of twelve men and twenty-one women, including ten seniors, ten juniors, eight sophomores, and five freshmen. Accompanist for the choir is Maxine Peugh, a freshman from Harrah, Washington.

Grace College, a four-year coeducational liberal arts college located at Winona Lake, is affiliated with the National Fellowship of Brethren Churches. Founded in 1948 and expanded to a four-year curriculum in 1954, the college this spring has 446 students. Grace Theological Seminary, a graduate school of theology on the same campus, has 158 students this semester.

Miss Yvonne Rathfon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Rathfon of R. R. #2, Rochester, is a sophomore in Grace College this year. A member of the Mentone Baptist Church, she sings soprano with the choir and travels regularly on weekends with the Messengers of Grace development team.

### Tickets Costly

Writing from London, columnist Granville Wilson reports on what is happening to magazines and newspapers in welfare-state-ridden Great Britain. He says that although Britain's economic freeze is only six months old, some small newspapers and magazines have ceased publication. He goes on to say, "...if the freeze continues for another 12 months it will hit Britain's press so hard that the restriction of choice will make a mockery of democratic freedom to read minority opinion. If that happens, financial stringency will have achieved what Nazi Germany's bombers failed to accomplish during six years of war."

A free press is the lifeblood of a cultured civilized society. Without it, in Milton's famous words, "We can grow ignorant again, brutish, formal, and slavish."

Britain is farther along the road of inflation and welfarism than the United States. But, the penalty of setting security as the highest goal of life is becoming apparent in both countries. The crushing burden of the welfare programs and profitless prosperity gradually squeeze the quality of life to the point where anything that does not contribute to our material comfort becomes "nonessential."

Newspapers and a free press are expendable, when living becomes a race for a free meal ticket.

## You Want Money?

In reply to your request for money. I wish to inform you that the present condition of my bank account makes it almost impossible. My shattered financial condition is due to Federal laws, State laws, County laws, Cooperation laws, Municipal laws, Mother-in-laws and Outlaws. 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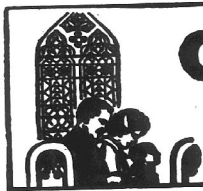

## Sewage needs, stream pollution debated at Town Board meeting

Mentone has until 1972 to provide some kind of stream pollution control, said H. A. Humes and John Slayter, members of the Indiana State Board of Health, Monday night at a meeting of the Mentone Town Board.

Humes and Slayter answered a variety of questions presented them in regard to the role Mentone plays in local stream pollution and added that Mentone and other cities without sewage control systems account for three per cent of the state's population. They related that tests were made last July 14 by the State Board of Health. Ten samplings were taken from Meredith Ditch and Big and Little Yellow Creeks to record the degree of pollution.

These findings were disputed by Dr. D. J. VanGilder who showed a map of the creeks and ditches which he had made and using the Health Board's statistics he pointed out that the streams showed a greater pollution before they reached Men-

tone than after they left the town. Saying he did not oppose pollution control, he said he felt the town should not be pressured into moving too quickly and asked what the penalties for failure to comply were. Eventually, he was told, the town would be taken to court for a trial.

## 4-H Enrollment Ends In March

vate contributions is accounted through the county 4-H Fund. The largest contributor to the county 4-H programs is the Kosciusko County Fair Association with about \$7,000 in direct expenditures for premiums, judges, and exhibit expenses.

## VOLUNTARY CAMPSITE CERTIFICATION BILL PASSED IN SENATE

A bill to encourage development of private campsites to help meet the need for public recreation facilities has been passed by the Indiana State Senate.

The bill, authored by William W. Erwin, Republican, Etna Green, provides for inspection and certification by the Department of Natural Resources for campsites when requested by the owner. A certified campsite would be permitted to display a special medallion that indicates to tourists that the campsite has been inspected and meets specified standards for health and safety.

"I have been discouraged," said Senator Erwin commenting on the bill, "with the tendency of people today to automatically assume that the needs of the State or the Nation must be met by the action of government. I would much prefer to see government create a climate whereby the private sector of the economy is encouraged to engage in an enterprise that will help to meet the needs of society."

"Here, in public outdoor recreational facilities, we have a definite need. The growth of population and the increasing popularity of outdoor camping is creating a demand for public campsites. It has been noted by the Volmer Report that the need for outdoor recreational facilities in Indiana will triple by 1975."

"The State is not keeping up with this growing need. The Department of Natural Resources estimates that to do so would require the government to purchase about 25,000 acres of land every two years. So far, this biennium, only about 10,000 acres have been purchased and during the balance of the period it is expected that only about 5,000 more will be acquired. This means we are achieving only about half the projected need."

"If we can help to meet this need by encouraging private enterprise to put suitable land into use as public campsites, we have accomplished two things. First, we are providing for a public need, and second, we are doing it at minimum cost to the taxpayer and with minimum encroachment by the government."

The bill was passed by the

Senate on February 18, 1967. It provides for certification on a voluntary basis. Campsites that have been inspected and certified will be listed by the Department of Natural Resources in material issued to tourists who request information.

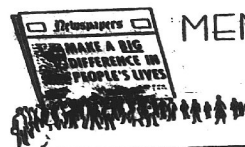

## We Get Letters . . .

March 6, 1967  
The Republican House has worked diligently and passed a Budget Bill that would have given property tax relief in the amount of 140 million dollars. The Democratic Senate raised the budget by almost 100 million dollars and this action would indicate that they do not want tax relief. This position of the Democratic Senate has caused the session to run beyond the regular 61 days. The Republican Party does not plan to leave this session without providing some property tax relief.

"Bill stripping"—the practice of substituting one legislative bill for another—has seldom been practiced more blatantly than in the present session of the Indiana General Assembly. There have been the usual gentleman's agreements for substitutions (bill stripping) but there have also been an unusual number of outright thefts.

The motivations for most of the stripping have been for special interest reasons rather than for legislation that is beneficial for all residents of Indiana.

Among the maneuvers was a Senate Democratic move to strip a Mental Health Bill and put in Lieutenant Governor Rock's Tourism Bill. This type of political maneuvering is very disturbing to us in the House of Representatives.

Each and every voter should attend a session of the General Assembly and see for themselves what is involved in making our laws. I am sure that after this experience, voters would give more serious thought and not request that so many bills be introduced. The 95th General Assembly has been with 1,500 bills for consideration in this session; this is the most in the history of Indiana.

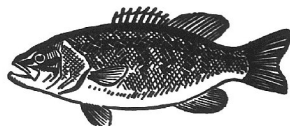

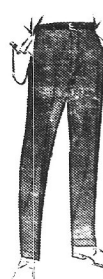

# Protect Your Children Against Measles, Says The AMA

CHICAGO—Now is the time to have your children immunized against measles if they have not already received this protection, says the American Medical Association.

Many parents are surprised to learn how dangerous this common childhood disease really is. An estimated 250 American children died from measles in 1966. More than 150 suffered measles encephalitis, sometimes called sleeping sickness, or brain fever. Encephalitis frequently leaves children with permanent disabilities, including mental retardation, deafness, and blindness.

Future tragedies can be prevented, because safe and effective measles vaccines are now available. In the past four years, these vaccines have helped cut the measles death rate in half.

It's possible that measles could be eradicated in the near future if more parents protected their children with immunization.

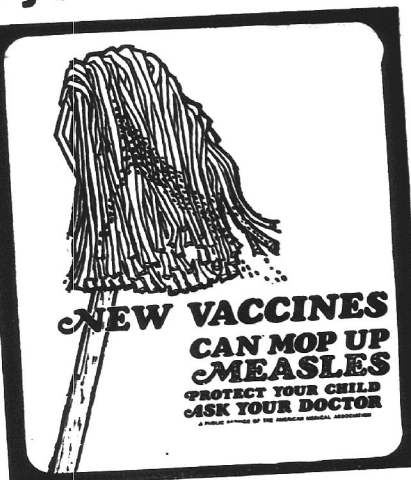
The AMA recommends that every infant be vaccinated when he is about one year old. All children over this age who have not been vaccinated and who have not had measles, should be immunized now.

It is especially important that children in nurseries, kindergartens, and the first two grades of elementary school receive measles immunization. These young-

sters have the highest risk of infection.

Measles immunization is safe, inexpensive, and easily performed. See your doctor for his recommendations.

If enough children are protected by immunization, measles will disappear. It's time to get rid of this familiar, but often dangerous, and sometimes deadly childhood disease.

The senior class invited the senator to appear at their commencement program.

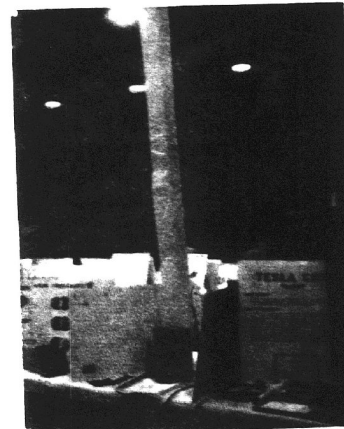

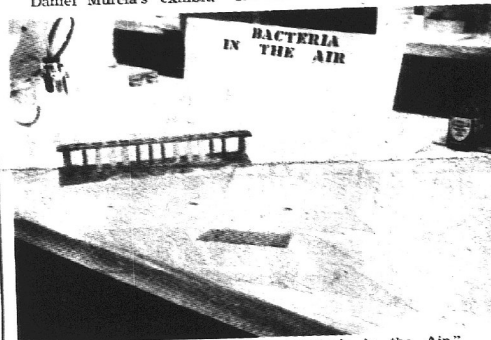

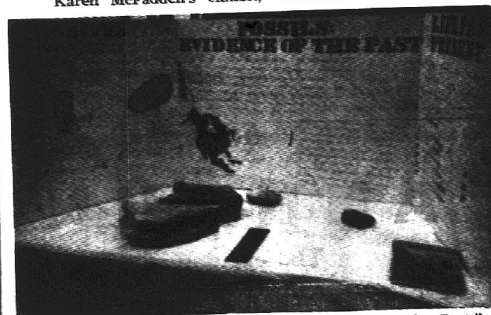

## Waldo Adams Presents Genealogy Lesson At Anthony Nigo DAR meeting

Mr. Waldo Adams of near Akron was the featured speaker at the March meeting of the Anthony Nigo Chapter, D.A.R., held at the home of Mrs. Paul Shireman. A well known genealogist, Mr. Adams spoke on lineage research in "Search of Ancestors". Mr. Adams, a teacher at the Rochester Schools, has been active in several county Historical Societies, in Elkhart County, Fulton County, and presently in Kosciusko County. Mr. Adams said he has worked on the lineage of his ancestors for forty years, and told of many interesting and amusing incidents in his personal research which has taken him many

times to Pennsylvania and Ohio. In a period of 200 years, Mr. Adams pointed out, one may be related to 1,024 families. Some of the practical tips given when one wishes to prove a new line included the following. The easiest way is to start by talking to the oldest member of the family, and check to see if anyone has prepared a family history. County courthouses are a wealth of information, with birth and death records at the Board of Health Library, census records, deeds can be located at the Recorder's Office, the Clerk's Office houses marriage and probate records, and tax records come under the jurisdiction of the Treasurer's Office.

One of the recommended papers is the Hoosier Genealogist which is sent by the Indiana Historical Society to its members. The Fort Wayne Library was recommended for its marvelous records center as one of the best in this area. Cemetery records have been compiled by some counties, but if not in the library of the county seat it may be necessary to find these records at Indianapolis. One will continually discover new sources, but Mr. Adams urged everyone to use a standardized form for recording all information gathered in a systematic manner.

## Give Your Garden A Southern Touch

Lafayette, Ind. Give your vegetable garden a Southern flavor this spring.

Collards, kale, mustard greens or okra can be fun to try, and easy to grow.

Purdue University extension horticulturists explain that collards resemble cabbage, but they do not form a tight head. The central stalk can easily grow waist-high after a full season of picking the cabbage-like leaves from the bottom.

Kale, on the other hand, is a low growing plant. It is dark green and doesn't form a tight head.

Mustard greens are in the same family with kale and collards, but boast a distinctive

taste all their own. They are vigorous and low growing, resembling spinach, but on a much larger scale.

Okra, a member of the cotton family, boasts bright flowers and is an extremely fast growing plant. Just a few days following appearance of flowers, the fruit is ready to pick. It will then continue to flower and bear fruit all season long.

## Workers Should Be Able To Earn While Receiving Social Security: Hartke

The Indiana Senator has offered such legislation in three previous Congressional sessions. He has twice succeeded in getting the earnings limit raised, most recently to the present ceiling of \$1,500. President Johnson has proposed to the Congress that the earnings test limitation be raised to \$1,680.

"Fewer than 30 per cent of American employees are covered by any type of private pension plan, and in most cases these are minimal," Senator Hartke said. "One way of realizing the extreme deprivation of the elderly is to compare their incomes with those of even the poorest of the working population. In June 1966, the average single retired worker on Social Security received monthly benefits of \$82 or \$984 a year; the average retired couple got \$144 a month of \$1,728 per year.

"When the \$1.40 an hour federal minimum wage took effect this year, the fulltime earnings of a worker at the minimum became \$2,800. As low as this is, it is nearly three times the average Social Security benefit of single retired workers and more than 60 per cent higher than that of a retired couple."

The Mentone community in the past has over-subscribed the quota many times. However, several donors had an unfortunate experience two years ago which resulted in hematomas and sore arms and may have discouraged their donations. The regional blood center following this and like experiences, changed the type of container and needle used to draw blood. The "dry needle" which is now used does not come in contact with the preservative solution. This was felt to be a contributing factor to the hematoma incidence which is now almost nil.

Hopefully, another year when Mentone and surrounding area again sponsor the blood mobile visit, those donors who had the unfortunate experience will again be active in the life saving blood program.

The entire Mentone area, Burket, Beaver Dam, Etina Green, etc., are to be commended for their combined efforts in providing donors food and facilities, with many serving as volunteers during the visit.

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

## Tornado Watch-Tornado Warning

Lafayette, Ind. Tornado watch—tornado warning...what's the difference?

Tornado watch is the first official alert from the Weather Bureau, explains Dick Willsey, Extension safety specialist at Purdue University.

The watch means weather conditions are favorable for a tornado to develop, but one has not been sighted.

Listen to radio or television stations for further bulletins on weather conditions, areas affected and the period of time during which tornado probabilities are high.

Tornado warning is the official term used when a tornado has been sighted. This means a tornado has been seen in an area and it is time to take shelter

precautions.

Take shelter in a tornado cellar, underground excavation or the southwest corner of a basement, advises Willsey. If your home does not have a basement, take shelter in the center part of the house—in a hallway, small room or closet. Get under a table for protection from falling debris.

Open windows on the east or northeast side of your home if you have time. However, do not take shelter near windows because of danger from breaking glass.

## Loose Soil For Plants

Lafayette, Ind. Soil for house plants and planters needs to be exceptionally loose.

While soil is of major concern for gardens and lawns, it be-

comes an even more complicated and important factor when it is confined in a pot or planter.

Don Scheer, Purdue University extension horticulturist, says a well-drained soil outdoors is not necessarily a well-drained planter soil. The drainage outside can be determined by the depth of the water table. But since this depth is usually several feet, the factor doesn't come into play.

Once soil is confined in a pot or planter, Scheer says, the water table is confined to the bottom of the pot, even though there are holes in the bottom. In other words, planting in a container one-foot deep is like planting outside with a water

table only one foot from the surface.

It's necessary, then, that the soil have large "air sacs" for water drainage. This permits oxygen, which is essential for plant growth, to become available to the root system too.

The general rule is add about one-half rough sphagnum peat moss to garden top soil and make sure there are drainage holes in the bottom of the planter or pot. If you can over water your soil, it's not loose enough, Scheer says.

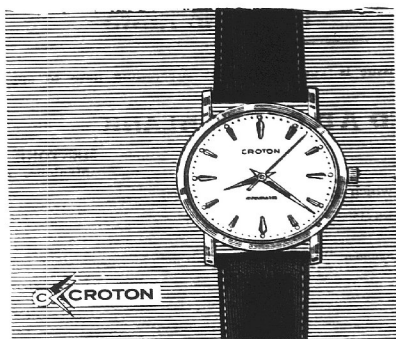
