



Now in its twelfth year of touring, the choir this spring will sing in Indiana, Southern California, Colorado, Wyoming, ar.d Ohio. This spring marks the group's second trip to California, the first having been in 1957.

Open to all college students by audition, this year's touring choir is comprised of twelve men and twenty-one women, including ten seniors, ten juniors, eight sophomores, and five freshmen. Accompanist for the choir is Maxine Peugh, a freshman from Harrah, Washington.

Grace College, a coeducational liberal four-year arts college located at Winona Lake, is affiliated with the National Fellowship of Brethren Churches. Founded in 1948 and expanded to a four-year curriculum in 1954, the college this spring has 446 students. Grace Theological Seminary, a grad-uate school of theology on the same campus, has 158 students this semester.

VOLUNTARY CAMPSITE CERTIFICATION BILL

PASSED IN SENATE

A bill to encourage development of private campsites to help meet the need for public help meet recreation facilities has been passed by the Indiana State Senate.

The bill, authored by William W. Erwin, Republican, Etna Green, provides for inspection and certification by the Department of Natural Resources for campsites when requested by the owner. A certified campsite would be permitted to display a special medallion that indicates to tourists that the campsite has been inspected and meets specified standards for health

and safety. "I have been discouraged," said Senator Erwin commenting on the bill, "with the tendency on the bill. of people today to automatically assume that the needs of the State or the Nation must be met by the action of govern-ment. I would much prefer to see government create a climate whereby the private sector of the economy is encouraged to engage in an enterprise that will help to meet the needs of society.

"Here, in public outdoor re-creational facilities, we have a definite need. The growth of population and the increasing popularity of outdoor camping is creating a damand for public campsites. It has been noted by the Volmer Report that the need for outdoor recreational facilities in Indiana will triple by 1975

"The State is not keeping up the this growing need. The with this growing need. Department of Natural Resources estimates that to do so would require the government to purchase about 25,000 acres of land every two years. So far, this biennium, only about 10,000 acres have been purchased and during the balance of the pe-riod it is expected that only a-bout 5,000 more will be acquired. This means we achieving only about half the projected need.

"If we can help to meet this need by encouraging private enterprise to put suitable land into use as public campsites, we have accomplished two things First, we are providing for a public need, and second, we are doing it at minimum cost to the t.xpayer and with minimum encroachment by the govern-


Incomplete Forms **Slow Medicare**

Reimbursement

About 20% of the medicare claims for reimbursement of doctor bills were not paid as soon they could have been be-cause of improperly completed claims, according to Herbert O. Bultemeier, district manager of the Social Security Administration.

Reports from Mutual Medical Insurance, Inc., the carrier which handles medicare claims in Indiana, indicate that the most frequent reason for delay of payments has been missing and incorrect medicare identifi-cation numbers. Missing signatures and addresses are two more problems that have caused delays in processing these payment forms for medicare beneficiaries

The general rule is add about one-half rough sphagnum peat moss to garden top soil and moss to garden top soll and make sure there are drainage holes in the bottom of the planter or pot. If you can over water your soil, it's not loose enough, Scheer says.
