Surviving with the wife are a daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Romine, Mentone, and son, Donald, Wilmette, Ill., and three grandchildren.

The Rev. Francis Rogers officiated at the services for Mr. Smith which were held in the King-Reed Memorial Home. Burial was in the Mentone cemetery.

ARMED FORCES DAY SET AT BUNKER HILL A.F.B.


The 3305 Bomb Wing and Bunker Hill Air Force Base, Peru, Ind. will host the public Saturday, May 16, when annual Armed Forces Day observances are held held on base. Gates to this Strategic Air Command installation will open at 10:30 a.m.

B-58 "Hustler" supersonic bombers, KC-135 "Stratotanker" airtel refueling aircraft, T-33 "Shooting Star" trainers, C-123 "Provider" cargo carriers and U-3A utility aircraft - all based here - will be on static display until 3 p.m. Fighter aircraft have been requested from other bases and will be on display if military commitments allow.

Air Force equipment such as survival gear, aircraft components, personal flying equipment, generators and turbines, will also be displayed and demonstrated. Sandwiches, soft drinks and other snacks will be available at food stands stationed within the display area.

Highlighting the day's events will be continuous entertainment from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m. as the Culver Military Academy's Black Horse Troop Lancers display their horsemanship, the Murat Shrine Drill Team and Drum and Bugle Corps from Indianapolis demonstrate precision maneuvers and the Logansport Shrine Club's "Third Wheel Patrol" - a group of 28 three-wheeled motor scooters perform.

The group included Kimber Farms Associates from their European Division, Agresca, S. A., Brussels, Belgium, managed by Authur C. Kimber; Big Dutchman representatives; feed companies; and the press, accompanied the group.

Pate, Northeast Regional Manager, Kimberchiks, Fremont, California; Messrs. Charles Manwaring, Gen Mgr.; Richard Manwaring, Sales Manager; Frank Manwaring, Production Manager; Jim Manwaring, Production; Sales and Field Servicemen Earl Stouder and Harold Geyer, all from Manwaring Leghorn Farms, Mentone, Indiana.

Before the luncheon a tour was made of the Manwaring Hatchery, breeding operation, and started pulled farms. Following the luncheon inspection was made of a completely automated Big Dutchman equipped 15,000 capacity cage house on the Donald Shireman farm in Warshaw, Indiana housing Kimber birds. The group then continued on to Chicago, stopping briefly to see a couple more large poultry operations.

New Teachers

Hired By T.V.S.C.

At the Monday night school board meeting three new teacher contracts were approved. They were Duane Smith to teach art and English at Talma, Wayne Cumberland to teach at Akron, and Calvin Eikhenour to teach chemistry at Akron.

Teacher assignments also came under discussion as did the repair contracts for the Akron school.

The board decided to purchase library and home economics equipment for the Akron school and to take bids for furnishing gas, oil, and coal for the corporation.

A panel representing each of the five townships in the corporation was present to discuss funds for the 4-H program. The 4-H program would like an appropriation of \$25 per member, or roughly \$10,000 for the corporation, to support 4-H. To date the board has taken no action on their requests. Pay of the leaders ranges from nothing in Seward township to \$1200 per year in Franklin township. Board member Creighton stated that he was highly in favor of 4-H, having himself been a member, but he felt that \$100 was sufficient pay for a leader. He pointed out the school board members receive \$100 per year for their work in directing the activities of the corporation and stated he felt the 4-H leaders should be paid accordingly.

PSYCHIATRY

PSYCHIATRY is a medical science concerned with more than treatment of the mentally ill. Health is a positive condition of well-being as well as an absence of disease.

One of the aims of psychiatry is to point out to the individual the way to the fullest possible life.

Psychiatrists do not treat dementia praecox, melancholia, psychoneurosis and poor behavior patterns, rather, they treat individuals who are suffering from these disturbances.

The family doctor, familiar as he is with the family history, is frequently able to prevent mild mental disorders.

Mental illness is now accepted as a disease like any physical ailment, and there is professional concern with the prevention of mental illness and the preservation of good health.

Treatment for mental illness calls for a scientific attitude reinforced by medical experience. The psychiatrist, who has spent many years of study in this particular field, is equipped to diagnose and prescribe treatment for the patient.

Dr. Keller Speaks To Talma Class

Purdue University Professor Dr. M. Wiles Keller visited Talma Junior high School recently to speak to the eighth grade math classes. Dr. Keller emphasized the importance of mathematics to most of the academic disciplines. He pointed out the many vocational opportunities in the mathematics field offering both challenge and salaries. This was part of a program sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Sixty-six F.H.A. girls, one advisor, and two mothers recently went to Indianapolis.

First we visited the Soldiers and Sailors Monument which is located in Monument Circle, the hub of Indianapolis, and is the third highest shaft in America - 284 1/2 feet. Built as a memorial to Indiana's armed forces of all wars prior to World War I, four epochs in the state of Indiana are commemorated by its bronze statues. These are the periods of the Revolutions, represented by the statue of George Rogers Clark, the war with Mexico, by a statue of Governor James Whitcomb; the War of 1812 and the Battle of Tippecanoe, by a statue of William Henry Harri-

sen; and the war for the Union, by Indiana's war governor, Oliver P. Morton. The basement houses a museum. An observation platform at the top is reached by an elevator and gives the visitors a bird's eye view of the city.

We then went to James Whitcomb Riley's home at 528 Lockerbey Street, the home of the beloved "Hoosier Poet". This Victorian home is maintained in its original state by the Riley Memorial Association as a public shrine.

Our last venture was President Harrison's Memorial Home at 1230 North Delaware Street. It was built in 1872 by the 23rd president of the United States and is restored as a shrine by Arthur Jordan Foundation. It contains beautiful and historic "Gay-Nineties" period furnishings.

We all enjoyed this trip and

learned more about Indiana's history.





T.V.S.C. Ponders 4-H Club Payments

by Robert Forbes

The School Board of Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation has, for some time, been pondering the problem of salaries for 4-H leaders. The various Townships have had a variety of different ways for paying their leaders. Some Townships had not paid anything for 4-H leaders, while others had paid as high as \$1200. a year.

The questions that have bothered the Board are as follows:

1. Is the salary of 4-H leaders the responsibility of the School Corporation?

a. There is a divided opinion among the people. Some want the School Corporation to finance it - others are strongly opposed to the School Corporation financing 4-H.

2. Another question to the Board is - If the School Corporation is to finance 4-H what is the proper amount and how is it decided? The 4-H leaders have asked for an Appropriation which might be as high as \$10,000. a year which could average \$2,000. a Township.

To ascertain what other School Corporations are doing, the Administrative Office has made a check of a few neighboring School Corporations. The following is the information received:

1. North Miami - \$200.00 per Township (1 man and 1 woman.)
2. Caston - leaders per Township (1 man and 2 women at \$110.00 per person).
3. Triton - Taken care of by Vocational Agriculture Teacher and Home Economics Teacher.

4. Culver - Each Township has its own budget. (Note: This was also suggested by Tippecanoe Valley School Board.)
5. Whitko - None
6. Lakeland - Token payments of \$100.00 to \$200.00 per leader.

T.V.S.C. Special Appropriation Explained

In this week's paper it will be noted there is a Notice to Taxpayers of Additional Appropriation for \$35,000.00. At first glance this would appear to be an indication that the Board was intending to spend \$35,000.00 more than they had appropriated last July. Actually, \$20,650.00 of this amount is merely a change from one appropriation fund to a different appropriation fund.

This can be done when a School Board finds it has more appropriation in one or more accounts than is needed and has under-estimated the need for appropriations in another account. Also a small working balance is usually carried in such cases.

On August 19, 1963, Newcastle Township was annexed to the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation and the School Board had already prepared a budget for the 1964 calendar year in July, prior to the annexation of Newcastle Township. In studying the building and the facilities at the Talma Bldg the School Board has reached a decision that the facilities and equipment need to be repaired and improved in order that the students going to the Talma Junior High may have comparable facilities with the students in the rest of the Corporation, and this was not determined prior to the time that the budget was made. Consequently, the School Board has made arrangements to do considerable repair work on the Talma Building and plan to purchase considerable equipment above what they had anticipated last July. In order to do this the School Board has run this Special Appropriation of which \$20,650.00 is transferred from other accounts and \$14,350.00 is the appropriation of uncommitted balances of the Special School Fund.

It was felt that explaining to the taxpayers and citizens the reasons why this Special Appropriation was necessary and the funds from which the transferrals were made would help the people to understand the problem which exists and also the steps that must of necessity be taken.

Notes From Your County Agent

I ran across a most interesting article written by a Mr. Julius Duscha, a newspaperman on the staff of the Washington Post. I'd like to quote from it because it analyzes business and politics about as well as anything I have seen recently.

Concerning the farm bloc he states that there are many more disagreements among farm politicians that there were in the 1930's but that when a show-down really comes there is much solidarity. Year after in farm legislation the key votes come from big city congressmen, but the farm bloc congressmen have rarely returned the favor when subsidy programs of interest to the big cities comes up. This would be the mass transportation bills, the urban renewal and things like that. Mr. Duscha makes the observation, however, that in 1963 both senators from Georgia, and the southern vote is the strength of farm legislation, voted for the urban and transportation bills. He thinks this is an indication of what will happen more and more.

The newspaperman regards the military-industrial complex as the least understood aspect of the growing relationship between the government and private business. By using the Tennessee Valley authority as a comparison, it is noted that the entire TVA cost the government about 2 billion dollars. This expenditure has been subjected to more scrutiny, investigations, attacks and questions than all the post war defense contracts. The 2 billion dollars spent on TVA would run our present defense establishment just 14 days, according to Mr. Duscha.

He has a few remarks, too, about the banking industry and how they are a bit upset at the efforts of the new Comptroller of Currency to put a little competition into the business. This is being done by chartering new banks where charters were unavailable before and encouraging branch banks into areas of long held monopolies by country banking families.

The newsmen concludes by

saying that most of us that say we would like to go back to the good old days are referring to times that never were. If it were possible, we wouldn't go because there are too many pressures taking us the other way. We ought to be practical enough to remember that economic interests have always sought to influence congresses, presidents and kings. The first piece of legislation passed by the first Congress was a tariff bill. This wasn't politics, this economics. It hasn't changed much since.

This article was a paper given at an agricultural seminar in

Iowa State University last summer. The author recently published a book called "The Taxpayers Hayride". I had never heard of the fellow before but for a person who professes to know nothing about politics or economics, he analyzes both pretty well.

Remove mulch from rose bushes gradually over a couple of weeks, recommend Purdue University horticulturists. Then remove dead wood. Cut back one inch into the green wood, and in addition, remove weak undesirable branches.







Useful Workshop Ideas


Campfire Tripod

When collapsed, this pipe tripod for campfire cooking takes very little space in a car trunk. It is set up quickly by inserting the legs into holes in the retaining disk. Three lengths of welded chain hanging from the disk hold the soup pot where the chain attaches to rings or eyebolts spaced equidistantly. Three other lengths of the same chain are attached with eyebolts to the legs 15 to 18 in. below the disk. These limit leg spread and provide rigidity.



Hanging Charcoal Grill

Suspended with welded chain from overhead supports, this charcoal grill for porch or patio is always at hand. It is tucked up out of the way with S-hooks when not in use. It consists of a rectangular flat-iron frame of which the ends are overlapped and riveted together. Eyebolts near the corners engage the chain. Steel rods with threaded ends are installed crosswise at the center to hold a charcoal pan about 12 by 18 in. in size. "Counter space" is provided at each end by galvanized sheet metal bolted to the frame. The sheet metal is bent upward and is doubled here to support the grill which may be an old refrigerator or oven shelf.



Reading Or Cheerleading Which Is Most Important? ?

Editorial Notes from the Hoosier School Board Journal

Dr. Olesan of the NEA Project on Instruction has asked the above question of teachers, school administrators, school board members, and school patrons in all parts of the nation. Of course, when the question is phrased in this manner, the answer which will come forth is obvious. However, actual practices in some situations do not always indicate that "we practice what we preach."

One of the challenges which the local school board must meet in establishing priorities. What area is of most lasting importance: where should we place our "chips"? Local tradition and values will have an influence upon the decisions which the school board makes, but the school board acting at the local level for the state has the responsibility to rise above local vested interests and seek to develop a quality educational program which will contribute to all pupils becoming contributing members in our society.

With the approach of budget making time school boards and school administrators again have an opportunity to demonstrate what they believe to be important in the schools. Is it fair to place a teacher in the classroom and not supply that teacher with adequate supplies and equipment to do a quality job of teaching? What farmer, filling station operator, business man, doctor, or attorney would be content to do his job with the same materials which were in use ten, twenty, or fifty years ago? In fact, there is a strong possibility that very few people would patronize this person who attempted to perform his responsibility with inadequate resources.

The days of the teacher on one end of the log imparting the wisdom of the ages to the pupil on the other end of the log are as outdated as the "Model T". If the teacher is to do a quality job in the classroom of the 1960's, he must be supplied with more than an adopted textbook and a set of outdated reference books. When one thinks that the pupils in today's schools will spend many of their most productive years in the twenty-first century, the challenges which face the schools become even more staggering. If teachers are to do their job well, every effort should be made to supply them with sufficient supplies and equipment so that pupils can begin to recognize the explosive nature of knowledge which makes it increasingly evident

His children attend school in the Tippecanoe Valley School district.





Useful Workshop Ideas

Dual-Purpose Yard Swing


Kiddies enjoy thrilling rides on this substantial swing and they too are safely held in the extra seat which attaches or detaches instantly. Coarse welded chain of suitable size to the hardwood seat with 3/8-in. eyebolts opened slightly to admit the chain. Uprights of the baby seat extend above the tot's arm reach. Locate the screweyes so they slip through links when the seat sets firmly on the swing board. Harness snaps lock screweyes to chain. The strap prevents the baby from sliding out. Wood "anchors" held the posts firmly in sandy soil. Treat underground parts with wood preservative. Caulking compound on the half-lap joints before assembling. Spikes them watertight.



Outdoor Nameplates and Signs

For an attractive outdoor nameplate, stain a piece of redwood dark brown, then make deep V-cuts to form the lettering on both sides. Apply two coats of white or yellow paint to the lettering and when this is dry cover the wood with two coats of spar varnish. Suspend the nameplate between two pipes suitably spaced and driven into holes bored in a rustic post. The chain attaches to screweyes on the nameplate and eyebolts through the pipe.

A roadside sign can be similarly suspended with lengths of small chain. Where the listing of produce varies use a framed easel-like board protected against rain by removable transparent plastic panels held by turnbuckles.



DECREASE OF COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

THERE are few communicable diseases that greatly threaten life and health in the United States today.

A communicable disease is a disease capable of being transmitted from one person to another. It is spread from an infected person or an animal or from a carrier of the germs, and transmission may be direct or indirect.

The reduction in communicable diseases has been due to improved sanitation, better living standards, protective immunization, and more successful treatment, when the disease does occur, through the use of new drugs.

The number of whooping cough cases in recent years has been only a fraction of what it was ten years ago; within this ten year period diphtheria cases have dropped from 3,000 to less than 500.

The incidence of poliomyelitis has been reduced from nearly 58,000 cases in 1953 to less than 900 in 1962; the reduction in paralytic polio cases has not been so pronounced, although with the new vaccines the conquest of this disease is anticipated.

Measles has not shown any appreciable decrease lately, but recently developed vaccines are expected to change this picture.

Veneral diseases, infectious hepatitis, streptococcal sore throat and scarlet fever are still with us as serious problems.

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
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PARSON JONES SPEAKS




