



Halverson said that the childlabor provisions of the law apply to local youngsters and children of migratory workers alike. The only exception to the law is the child working ex-clusively for his parents or or guardian on their own farm.

Halverson said that a farmer must observe the law if has reason to believe that he his crops - either in their original form or processed - will eventually cross States lines.

At a special meeting of the board of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation last Thurs- work they had previously done Three firms sent representaon other schools. The Mauer, VanRyan, Ogden, and Natali firm designed the Caston, Argos, and Milford schools. The firm estimated they could have schematic drawings to present

to the board in six weeks. The additions were voted earlier by the board in a split Creighton with Gale decision with Gale Creighton and Ed Bucher opposing the additions. Creighton strongly favors a new consolidated high school and feels that if this is done the cramped conditions of the two grade schools will be alleviated. 
