Mr. Phil N. Eskew, Commissioner of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, will speak at the Mentone High School All Sports Dinner on Monday, May 8, 1967. The dinner is being held at 7:00 in the Mentone School Gymnasium, all interested students, parents and patrons are invited to attend. The dinner is to be a carry in type dinner with meat, coffee, milk, and rolls being furnished by the Burket, Mentone, Talma P.T.A. Those attending should bring some food and their own table service.

The dinner is in honor of all athletes who have participated in interschool sports and also honors all cheerleaders.

Mr. Eskew was born and reared in southern Indiana. His study in the fields of education and law at several Indiana colleges and universities has earned for him B. S. and M. S. degrees and an honorary L. L. D. degree.

His experience includes working at many trades while getting his education, teaching positions and serving as coach, athletic official, dean of boys, principal and superintendent of schools in various sections of Indiana. He worked as public relations director with Minneapolis-Honeywell at Wabash for several years.

He is a member of Masons, Scottish Rite, Shrine, Elks, past president of Rotary, teacher and trustee of the Methodist Church, Phi Delta Kappa professional education fraternity and Indiana High School Athletic Council. At present, he is the Commissioner of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

Russell Borton Is Heart Victim

Russell L. (Pete) Borton, 56, died unexpectedly of a heart attack at his home Sunday morning. A former Mentone town marshal, he was an employee of the Northern Indiana Co-operative Hardware.

The son of John L. and Alice Jefferies Borton, he was born Dec. 5, 1911 in Mentone. He was a veteran of World War II and a member of the Mentone American Legion.

Surviving are a sister, Mrs. Clyde (Delta) Yazel, Etna Green; an uncle, Linus Borton, Mentone; and two nephews, Harold (Mike) Yazel and Rex (Arkie) Yazel, both of Mentone.

Funeral services for Mr. Borton were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the King Memorial Home with Rev. Howard O. Adelman officiating. Burial was in the Mentone cemetery.

He has spoken to over one-half million people in more than 2,000 audiences, many of them return engagements. He has appeared at many industrial conventions, service clubs, commencements, church groups, women's clubs, farm organizations, educational institutes athletic banquets and chamber of commerce meetings throughout

the Middle West.

He has a homespun Hoosier philosophy that holds his audience's attention completely. He combines fun, horse-sense and entertainment until he is one of Indiana's most popular and sought after speakers. Although his talks are highly entertaining, he never fails to leave some wholesome philosophy for his listeners.

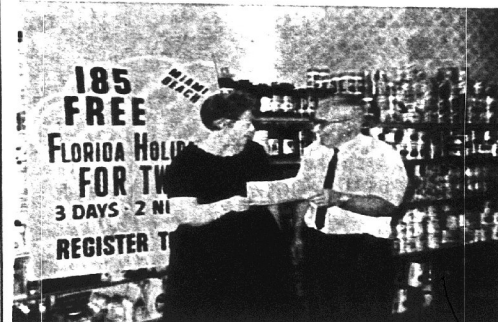
Trustee Urges Assessment Be Completed

Marvin White

Dies Of Viet Injuries

Pfc Marvin R. White, 20, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest White, R. 5, Rochester, died Saturday morning in a Vietnam hospital of hand grenade wounds he had suffered in combat on April 24.

White was a friend of James R. Utter, R. 5, Rochester, who was killed in Viet action April 15. The two families live half a mile apart in Newcastle township.

A lifelong resident of the Talma area, White was born Dec. 23, 1946 to Ernest and Alice Miller White. He attended the Talma schools and worked at Midwest Spring Co. in Mentone before entering the Army April 20, 1966. He received his basic training at Ft. Knox, Ky. and was stationed at Ft. Polk, La. before being sent to Vietnam six months ago.

White is survived by his parents; a brother, Keith, R. 5, Rochester; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller, R. 1, Logansport; four aunts; an uncle; and a niece.

The Foster and Good funeral home will be in charge of the arrangements. The body is expected to arrive here within a week.

THE WORKING GIRL


IN THE EARLY 1900'S THE TAILORED SUIT, THE PERENNIAL FAVORITE ATTIRE OF THE WORKING GIRL, HAD NOT YET BECOME POPULAR. DRESSES WERE WORN FAR MORE OFTEN. CONSIDERED ESPECIALLY SMART WAS THE DRESS THAT WAS DRAPED AND CROSSED IN THE FRONT.



IN 1926 THE VOGUE FOR ENSEMBLES BECAME SO STRONG THAT EVEN SUITS ADOPTED THE "TOTAL LOOK". THE SHORT SKIRTS, HAD DRESSY OVER-BLOUSES WITH JACKETS LINED TO MATCH THE BLOUSE.

THE WORKING GIRL IN 1937 WAS PROVIDED AN EXCITING NEW LOOK WHEN SCHIAPARELLI BECAME THE FIRST DESIGNER TO USE PADDING ON THE SHOULDERS OF WOMEN'S SUITS. SHE BORROWED THE IDEA FROM THE LONDON GUARDSMAN'S UNIFORM WHICH IN TURN HAD BEEN TAKEN FROM THE 15TH CENTURY MAN'S COSTUME WHEN THESE FAMOUS PUFFS WERE PADDING FOR ARMOR.

TODAY, WHEN BUYING WOMEN'S OR CHILDREN'S APPAREL LOOK FOR THIS LABEL THE SYMBOL OF DECENCY, FAIR LABOR STANDARDS AND THE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE.



SANTA PAULA, CALIF., CHRONICLE: "Constant efforts have to be made to protect freedom of the press and people. This year a milestone was reached in the passage by Congress, and the President's signing, of the federal open records law... From now on the burden of defending secrecy in federal affairs will be on those who would withhold information. The reporter has the right to question and inspect government records... The press of America is the guardian of freedom. Those who exercise the Freedom of the Press in the public must be ever worthy of the trust given to them."

FINDLAY, OHIO, REPUBLICAN-COURIER: "Businessmen predict widespread unemployment on farms and higher prices for food, hotel rooms and various merchandise as a result of the higher federal minimum wage law... This was the lead paragraph of a news article which appeared... in the New York Times. The situation to which it referred was not unexpected. A warning was sounded prior to enactment of this legislation that this would be the case. But the warning went unheeded."

WALTHAM, MASS., NEWS-TRIBUNE: "The current struggle between school administrators and boys with long hair is not new to American education. According to B. B. Chapman of the Florida State University History Department, back in 1901 the Office of Indian Affairs began a campaign to make young Indian males stop the 'objectionable and immoral' practice of wearing long hair. The Indians resisted, and it wasn't until they became more assimilated into American culture that they voluntarily gave up their long hair, says Chapman."

LA PLATA, MD., TIMES-CRESCENT: "In answer to labor's demands the government is constantly imposing greater burdens on business management. Doesn't the government have an obligation to compensate for these increased burdens by providing incentives to those whose industry, ingenuity and capital investments provide the jobs, without which the economy would grind to a complete stop?... cooling off, as the theorists put it, let it be by less government spending and... not by taking away incentives..."

MILLINGTON, TENN., STAR: "Almost daily the charge is made that Americans are losing one more freedom. Freedom of the press is being dangerously tampered with, from high places where secrecy is preferred, and where an idea is created that people are not smart enough to know the whole truth. There is little question that many freedoms have gone by the board—such as freedom from taxation without representation, which covers many areas today of federal spending."

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, MINN., JOURNAL: "One of the disturbing facts about the increasing death toll in traffic accidents throughout the country

is the fact that rural deaths are gaining, while city deaths decline. That is true in the bigger states. It indicates that education and law enforcement are having their effect in urban centers but not widely enough implanted in rural areas. Also, perhaps, that the effect of expressways is to encourage speed on country roads, where access is unprotected."

CRESWELL, ORE., CHRONICLE: "The only question remaining in our minds is: will there be a 'war on poverty' to support the taxpayers after they support the rest of federal government's poverty fiasco?"

Combine milk and poppy seeds. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs and lemon rind. Blend flour mixture into creamed mixture alternately with milk and poppy seeds, beating well after each addition. Turn into 8 1/2 x 4 1/2-inch greased loaf pan. Bake in preheated 350° oven, 1 hour and 10 minutes, or until golden brown. Cool on wire rack 5 minutes before removing from pan.

*If you don't sift and in absence of other directions, spoon flour directly from container into a one-cup dry measure, level off, then remove two tablespoons according to USDA recommendations.

NOTE: If self-rising flour is used, omit baking powder and salt.

Faithful to the original mood, it takes Heidi off to boarding school and brings her back to her home village and the hut on the mountain. Peter the goat-boy is there, Clara comes to visit from Frankfurt, the Alm-Uncle pursues his familiar ways, and there are new adventures and new friends as Heidi chooses her way of life.

The second Heidi book, part of the classics and fiction line of Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wis., is a welcome addition to the bookshelf of any little girl.

Any young reader lucky enough to visit Switzerland can still see the birthplace of Heidi's creator, Frau Spyri, on a green hill beyond Zurich. The author, like the little girl she created, was content to spend a lifetime in a beloved country of snow-capped peaks.

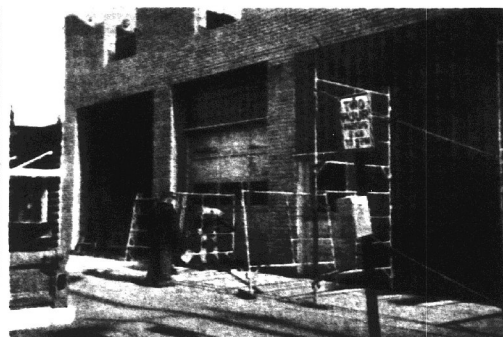
Mr. Bush, who has spent many hours working with the band and chorus, will preside and direct the program.

Boys League Work Is Begun

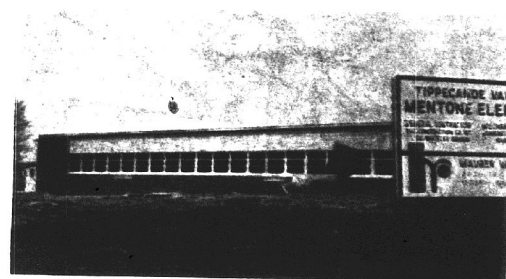

State Police Requirements Change

Indiana State Police officials, in conjunction with the opening of a trooper recruiting campaign this week, announced several important changes in candidate requirements.

Any man, regardless of where he resides in the United States, is now eligible to join the ranks of the Indiana State Police if he can meet the necessary requirements. Prior to this time, only Hoosiers could apply.

The maximum age limit, which was 29, has been increased. Candidates must be at least 21 years old, but not yet 34, on the opening date of, the next recruit school which begins September 18.

The maximum height requirement has also been increased from 6 feet 5 to 6 feet 7 inches. Minimum height is 5 feet 9 inches.

Applicants must possess a valid driving license. If there are any license restrictions noted, each will be judged individually. Prior to this time, applicants with license restrictions were automatically rejected.

In addition to these requirements, candidates must be U.S. citizens, possess an accredited high school diploma, be willing to serve any place in Indiana and must refrain from any manner of political activity except voting.

The starting salary for Hoosier troopers is \$525. After one year

of service, the pay is increased to \$575 with a maximum trooper salary of \$720 after six years. Uniform, ordnance and automotive equipment is furnished and the Department also provides a generous pension and benefit program.

The deadline for applications for the September recruit school is June 16. Indiana residents may obtain applications at any State Police Post. Non-residents may obtain applications at any Indiana State Police Post or by writing to "Superintendent, Indiana State Police Department, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204."

Volunteer Red Cross Workers Begin Volunteer Training

Specifically, its Congressional charter imposes on the ARC the duties to act as the medium of voluntary relief and communication between the American people and their armed forces, and to carry on a system of national and international relief to prevent and mitigate suffering caused by disasters.

"Inevitably, it is in the field of international action, in service to the suffering millions of prisoners, of sick, of disabled, of the hungry and destitute, that the Red Cross fulfills most completely the deepest needs of our age."

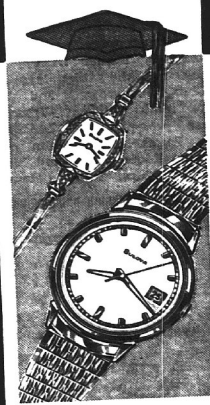

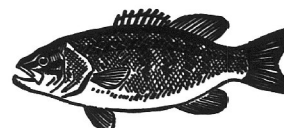

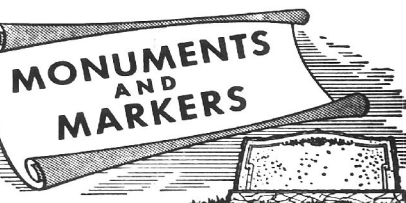

Boating Tips...



PORPOISING

This rhythmic up-and-down motion of the bow usually occurs at or near top speed. Porpoising can be eliminated quite simply in most cases, according to the Mercury outboard boating authorities.

First, try moving weights forward, a bit at a time, to see if this helps. Moving the gas tank or anchor, or changing seating positions, may do the job. Next, try experimenting with different motor tilt positions. Sometimes porpoising is caused by deformation of the hull bottom. That portion of the hull on which the boat planes should be a straight line when viewed from the side.

Internal stiffeners can sometimes be installed to straighten out bulges, hooks or warps.

He listed the following reasons for teachers not returning: two were pregnant, one was deceased, one contract not renewed because of necessity for change in assignment, two had requested leave for further degree, eight resigned to get advanced degrees, because of other jobs, moved away or because of personal reasons, and one resigned because of inability to split between two schools.

A list of the teachers who have been hired to date appears elsewhere in this paper.

The Four School Audio-Visual Program will be disbanded, it was announced by Forbes, and the Tippecanoe Valley system, a member of the four school group, will be forced to inaugurate another type of audio program. He announced that the Whitko corporation had asked the Tippecanoe Valley corporation to join in their program, and the board voted to accept. Owen Fry, the Whitko audio-visual director, will divide his time between the two corporations with Whitko paying three-fifths of the expense and TVSC paying two-fifths. Each corporation will be able to borrow films from the other under this arrangement, making a saving for both.

In further board action, members approved a contract for Robert Huffman, a business education teacher, and hired Carl Dick to begin janitorial duties at Talma in July.

Forbes reported that work was progressing nicely on the additions to the schools at Men-

tone and Akron and said he could foresee no problems arising as far as occupancy by September 5 was concerned. A financial report was given

by Forbes, and the board handled other routine business.

A tentative school calendar was released and appears elsewhere in this paper.

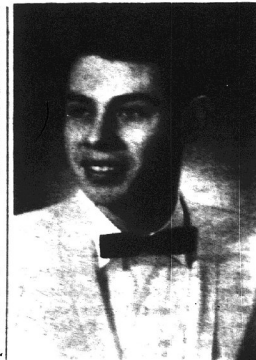

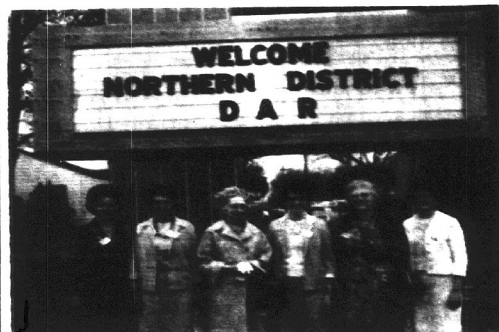

The tendency heretofore has been to portray Red China as the principal factor in the bolstering of the North Vietnamese government. But the evidence is coming out now that Russia has become in the last two years the mainstay of the North Vietnamese. The Red Chinese are continuing to supply light weapons, ammunition and rice, all of which is a big help to the guerrilla forces. The Russians, however, are providing the real sinews of the war."

The slate of officers for the coming year, as presented by the nominating committee, were voted into office and will be installed at the June meeting.

The program for the evening consisted of a report on the 1967 Continental Congress given by Mrs. Smalley. Keynote speaker at the opening session was Dr. Norman Vincent Peale.

A resume' of the D.A.R. Resolutions passed was given. Congressman Louis C. Wyman introduced a bill in the House of Representatives which calls for a fine of \$1,000.00 and one year imprisonment for anyone convicted of burning, mutilating or otherwise desecrating of American flag, bill HR 8768, as urged by one of the D.A.R. Resolutions.

Highlights of the President General's report to Continental Congress were given, including a gain of 2,000 new members. The expenditure to refurbish Constitution Hall was reported in the amount of \$420,000.

The entire Congress congratulates attractive Joan Ellen Reynolds of Alhambra, California on winning the new NSDAR American History Scholarship of \$8,000.

Mrs. Smalley concluded her report by announcing the new D.A.R. theme is "Progress is the Activity of Today and the Assurance of Tomorrow" - Emerson.

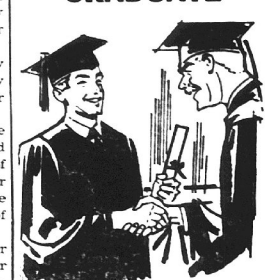

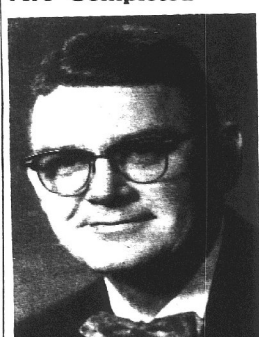

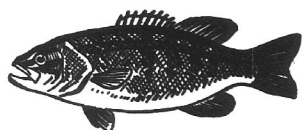

Youngsters Can't Work On Farms During School Hours

Young people can work on farms after school, on weekends, and during vacations, but when school's in, work's out—for youths under 16, that is.

That's a reminder directed at farmers and growers, parents, and youths, from Earl F. Halverson of the U. S. Department of Labor, Chicago, Regional Director. Halverson of the Department's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions, said that the Fair Labor Standards Act prohibits youths under 16 from working during school

hours in a district where school is in session.

The law applies to both local and migrant youths and to all farmers whose crops go directly or in directly into interstate commerce—which means, of course, most farmers. It doesn't apply to youths working for their parents on their farms.

Even though it's legal for youths over 16 to do farm work during school hours, Halverson urged all youths to stay in school and graduate.

"A youth who doesn't finish school is selling himself and his eventual family short," he said. "For in today's economy, unskilled jobs are fast disappearing and are, for the most part, unrewarding. The young person who sticks it out and graduates will reap much larger earnings over his lifetime than the youth who doesn't," he emphasized.

Halverson also reminded farmers that the minimum wage provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act may apply to some of them for the first time this year. Growers who use a lot of labor probably will have to pay at least \$1.00 an hour this year, he pointed out. The nearest Wage and Hour office will be happy to answer any questions, he said.

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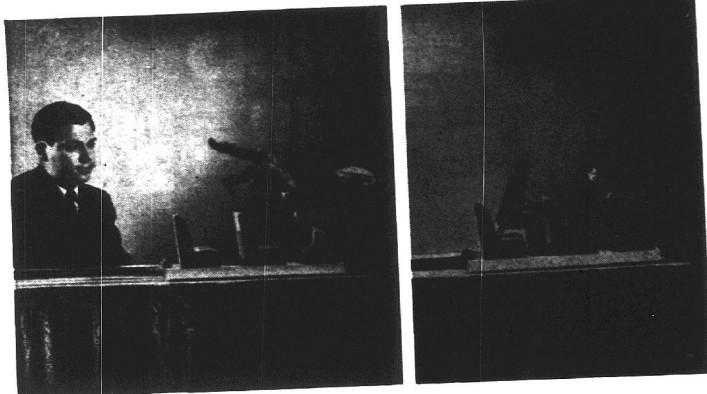

67 MHS seniors graduate

Sixty-seven Mentone seniors received diplomas last night and heard Senator Birch Bayh salute their generation as one of accomplishment. Contrasting the 3% of the young population that receives the adverse publicity with the rest of the young people who have made the 4-minute mile a common thing, who have assaulted space and seen communication by satellite, who have the opportunity to serve mankind through the Peace Corps, he said the qualifications of today's young men who seek appointment to the military academies are so high the choice is extremely difficult. He commended today's girls as also being extremely accomplished.

Bayh challenged the seniors to remember three important thoughts: 1. It is important to never underestimate the value of learning. A high school diploma is worth \$186,000, and each year of additional education adds to the potential earning power of the individual. He said two out of three welfare recipients who are heads of their families have less than an eighth grade education. 2. To have confidence. Tomorrow holds what you want it to hold; the government doesn't determine what we will do; we determine it ourselves. 3. Remember how fortunate you are to be born in the USA. It's not out of date or unpatriotic. Thank God every morning for having had the opportunity. He said two out of three of the world's 18-year olds have never known what it is not to be hungry. They never learn to read or write and do not live to reach their 40th birthdays.

He challenged the seniors to do as the past generations have done—serving in the armed forces, the Peace Corps and other similar groups, work in government and professional and business life. By making a community better, a state is made better and this in turn makes the country better.

He closed by reversing Edmund Burke's statement: Americans have the right to govern themselves. All that is necessary for evil to prevail in

the world is for enough good men to do nothing. Bayh said it should say: All that is necessary for good to prevail in the world is for enough good men to do something.

Bayh was introduced by Denny Romine, president of the Student Council. Members of the band and chorus provided musical numbers for the event. Miss Diana Sarber presented the salutatory address and Daniel Murcia presented the valedictory address.

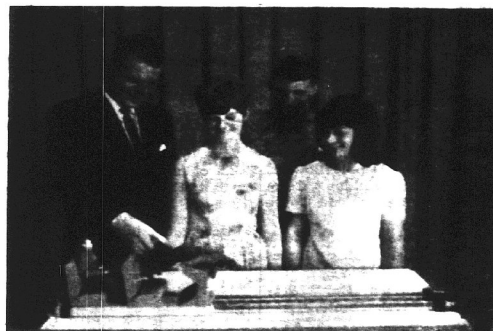
Atwood Phone Numbers To Be Changed

General Telephone today announced that the numbers of most of its Atwood customers will be changed October 15 when a new central office switching center is placed in service.

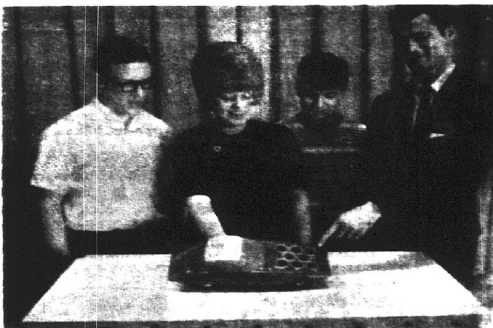
G. W. Marsh, district manager, said the number change will be required by the new facilities and customers who are affected will be notified in advance.

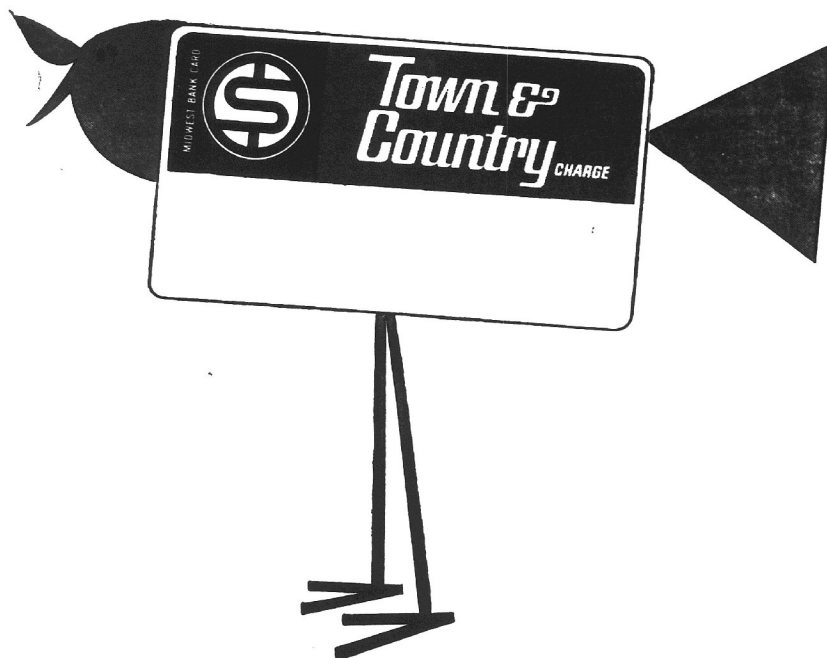

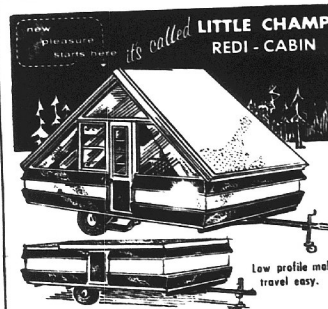

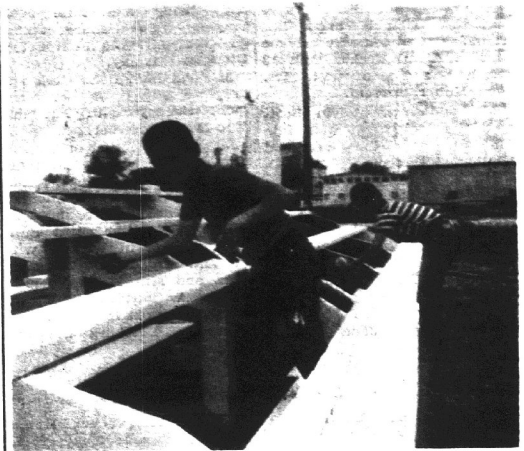

Vacation Reading Club Starts At The Bell Memorial Public Library

The 1967 Summer Reading Club will open June 5th and last until July 29th. All children who will be in grades two to five may join simply by going to the library and signing the Register.

The children then choose books to read at home. Parents must send slips listing the books the child has read unless the parent is present to report for the child. After the child has earned 4 points, he will receive a Wild Horse Roundup Ranch Card. For each additional 8 points he will receive a horse sticker for his ranch. There are 12 stickers for each card. When the child has filled his card, he will have 100 points and his name will be placed on the Honor Roll. For each 25 points after that, he receives a star after his name on the Honor Roll.

Donnelley, the son of one of Australia's largest hatchery owners, has been in the United States for the past two and one half months, having arrived via the Fiji Islands and Hawaii where he visited various hatcheries. He visited Holland, Michigan before coming to Mentone where he visited Manwaring Leghorn Farms last week and is visiting Creighton Brothers this week. Upon leaving Indiana he will go to Arkansas. In all, he estimates he has received almost thirty invitations from hatcheries and poultry growers to visit. He said, "Americans have been very friendly. When I came here, I knew no one. Now I have all these invitations to visit."

The tour was arranged by his father, owner of Donnelley Brothers-Druse Proprietaries, Ltd. of Sidney. Feeling Australia's chicken production is five years behind that of the United States, the older Donnelley suggested his son visit the states to learn what their country's chicken industry might hope to expect in the coming years. Young Donnelley expects to spend nine months in the States before spending a month in England and two months returning home via the European continent and Asia.

Contrasting the size of the two countries, he said Australia and the United States, without Alaska, were equal although Australia's population is 12 million compared to the US's 200 million.

Australia, he said, is the only country in the world which does not raise American birds. A government regulation prohibits importing live chickens into the country. Their chickens are little different than ours, he

said, although the production is not as good.

Visiting with Donnelley and Frank Manwaring, it was learned that Manwaring recently hit 110% of their capacity when a mother duck laid and hatched 15 eggs in a bush by the office door.

"That's pretty good," Donnelley said with a twinkle in his eye, and we all agreed.

Judy Sweet, 16, Services Are Held

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at the Rochester Citizens Cemetery for Judith Sweet, 16, Tippecanoe, whose body was found floating in the Tippecanoe river Saturday. The official cause of death has not been listed although no evidence of foul play has been found.

The girl, an eighth grade student at Tippecanoe, disappeared from the school on May 18. Two notes, one found in a Tippecanoe telephone booth and the other in the dead girl's coat, indicated she planned to run away from home, according to the Marshall county sheriff's office. She had evidently taken a change of clothing with her to school. The clothes she was wearing when she left school were found on the river bank near where the body was found about 400 yards west of Tippecanoe school.

After having been missing for some time, the girl's sister, Coleen, had written a letter pleading with her sister to return home. The letter, published in last week's Mentone News, obviously was never received.

Surviving are her parents, James Edward and Ann Lynch Sweet; two sisters, Ruby and Coleen, and a brother, James, all at home.

Ernest Honegger Dies In Crash

Ernest Honegger, 69, Plymouth, the father of Mrs. Everett (Joan) Welborn, Mentone, was pronounced dead at the scene of a tractor-car crash north of Mentone Friday night. The accident occurred on County Road 100 South.

County Coroner Dr. Joe Bill Musnier said Mr. Honegger died of a torn left lung and massive bleeding from a severe puncture wound to the left hip when he was pinned beneath the overturned tractor.

The tractor was struck by a car driven by Amera Cook, 24, Ft. Wayne, who was admitted to Murphy Medical Center with a fractured right arm and bruises to her forehead. She told investigating officers that she was eastbound on the county road at approximately 50 miles per hour and as she started to slow for a bridge she saw the headlights of an oncoming vehicle but was unable to determine what type of vehicle it was. Officers said her car struck the left rear wheel of the westbound tractor, causing it to spin into the ditch and upset on the victim. Officers said the tractor's headlights were located high on the hood and close together, making it difficult for an approaching driver to determine the size and type of vehicle.

Damages of \$1,000 were estimated to the tractor and \$1800 to the car.

ODDS and ENDS

Indiana is a land of beauty at any time, but in the spring she is even more lovely as the trees don their summer green and the flowers burst into bloom. This spring, as cold and wet as it has been, has been welcomed and we hope it will decide to stay with us long enough to enjoy a

few balmy days before summer's heat arrives.

Along with the spring flowers, the dandelions, lawnmowing, and elusive mushrooms, spring has brought us stacks of mail concerning the beauties of our great state.

Union County (that's in the Connersville area) writes that their Covered Bridge Days will be held Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of Memorial Day week-end, and the members of that county's historical society invite shutterbugs and artists to visit the Dunlapville Covered Bridge.

Reading their letter, we learned that the United States was the only country in the world to build covered bridges. Indiana built 600 covered bridges between 1834 and 1923, and although most of them have been demolished, the remaining ones stand as monuments to the engineering skill of hard labor.

The Dunlapville Bridge is on the site of a proposed reservoir, and the committee hopes to raise enough funds from this festival to save the bridge and move it to a new site for the enjoyment of tourists who come to visit the new reservoir. Union county is located 15 miles south of U.S. 40 on Indiana 27 and 44 in east-central Indiana. Visitors can

follow signs marking the way to the bridge from Liberty.

On Monday, May 15, Senator Vance Hartke introduced a bill into the Senate calling for a Wabash River Scenic Parkway. His bill would authorize the Secretary of the Interior in consultation with the Secretary of Transportation to survey and select a right-of-way for a board meandering roadway which would begin at Ft. Wayne and wend its way to the "toe" of Indiana where the Wabash meets the Ohio and Tradedwater Rivers in Kentucky.

Beginning in Ft. Wayne, the visitor would see the restoration of Canal Street and the home of Capt. William Wells, the site of Chief Little Turtle's death. Proceeding on, the visitors would see the Salamonie and Mississinewa Reservoirs, the Frances Slocum cemetery, the site of Deaf Man's Village, Paradise Springs, the Tippecanoe Battlefield where Wm. Henry Harrison made the famous statement, "Tippecanoe and Tyler too," and Turkey Run State Park. In Terre Haute visitors could visit the home of Paul Dresser, author of the song, "On the Banks of the Wabash Far Away," and the Eugene Debs home.

Following the Harrison Trail from Terre Haute to Vincennes, the first capital of the Northwest Territory, visitors would continue toward the "toe" of Indiana where the restoration of the Rappite House is built at New Harmon. The Rappites sought to establish a socialist settlement at New Harmony which failed although many of the buildings remain.

Whether we tour the covered bridge or just go mushroom hunting again and if the proposed parkway never becomes a reality, we can still admire the great beauty of our historic state and work together with our neighbors to make its beauty lasting and enduring.
