Ask Forbes' Resignation

Monday night's school board meeting was unique in a number of ways. Often no one is present at the meetings other than members of the board and members of the press. This Monday night, however, the superintendent's office could not hold the crowd and the meeting was held in the Mentone High School gymnasium. It is estimated there were 300 persons present at the meeting who heard Henry Smith, a spokesman for a group of taxpayers, ask the board to request the resignation of Superintendent Robert Forbes.

The request for Forbes' resignation came after the meeting had been in session for two and one half hours, during which time complaints were heard regarding the cost of doors at the Beaver Dam school, charges were notified that the public was uninformed about board actions and policies, the study hall clerk system was rapped, issue was made of the fact that the lowest bid had not always been accepted, the cost of the Akron home ec room discussed, accusations of price hikes made, and the press charged with misquotation.

Lengthy discussion was held over improvements surrounding a door at Beaver Dam Jr. High two years ago. The cost of each item was given and discussion was held concerning the danger of trembles in a new piece of 6 x 8 lumber used for a heading.

The theme of the complaints was largely alleged mishandling and overspending of corporation funds by the superintendent and the school board. The meeting, however, was orderly and tempers were kept under control.

Mrs. Maurice Sayger, R. R. 1, Akron voiced a complaint concerning the use of study hall clerks instead of teachers in the study hall as had previously been done. The board explained they had hired clerks in an attempt to save money. Mrs. Sayger felt strongly, however, that a trained teacher should be in each study hall to assist students with assignments and in view of this feeling she said she has written to the state superintendent of public instruction asking an investigation. Mrs. Sayger voiced serious protest with the operation of the Akron school and its merits in preparing a student for college.

A discussion on the foreign language being taught was held and satisfaction expressed that a language program had been begun.

The board admitted to a possible error in the placing of contracts for fuel oil and insurance, because in both instances higher bids were accepted. They stressed, however, that it does not always pay to accept the lowest bids such as the coal bids which

would have purchased coal which would have clinkered in the furnaces.

School bus drivers and their responsibilities were discussed after the question of whether they had contracts or not was raised. It was answered that the drivers do not have contracts, but are on a continual basis.

Several questions were then asked concerning the duties of the superintendent, how much he could spend without board authorization (up to \$2,000), the number of his office, staff his salary (12,200 per year), the assistant's salary (approx. \$9,600 with \$6,800 of it coming from state), and why he didn't live within the corporation. One man asked Forbes if he really thought he was worth \$12,200 per year.

The topic then turned back to costs, most particularly the cost of the remodeling of Akron High School. Forbes estimated this cost to be \$75,000 and stated various improvements made in the school and why additional work was necessary to repair ermine damage and water damage.

In discussing the Talma school remodeling, one of the contractors was accused of having said he had made the easiest \$500 of his life on a deal with the corporation.

Smith then asked Forbes' resignation, charging him with too high spending. The board vowed continued support and faith with Forbes and refused to make the request. They did not reply when asked if they could ask his resignation if a petition bearing the signatures of 90% of the taxpayers were presented to them.

This prompted a discussion of Forbes' contract which was renewed this year. This fact brought protest from some members of the audience who cited teachers in the past who had wanted such contract extensions.

This also prompted criticism of a member of the Akron faculty and the desire to see the person removed from his position.

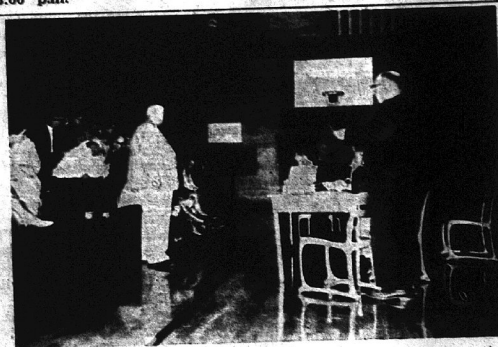
Criticism was leveled at the spending of so much money on remodeling the schools in the corporation when it was the hope of some to someday see a combined high school. Gerald Clinker requested that the money be put toward building a good school and expressed fear that soon no other team would want to play basketball with either Akron or Mentone due to lack of enrollment and facilities.

Lamoin Hand said, in rebuttal, that building two high schools would only double the expense and no saving would result. He cited extra transportation, hiring of more teachers, and the fact that many students would be lost in school with a 3,000 enrollment.

Phil Parker, Akron, however, pointed out Dr. Koneck's report

which suggests the optimum size for a school should be one which does not graduate less than 100 students and whose total high school enrollment is between 500 and 600. To operate between 500 and 600. To operate at economy, he stated, each teacher should teach 30 students per class. He also said smaller classes are less economical and that maintenance on one building would be cheaper. He urged the corporation to strive for the optimum size.

The cumulative building fund was discussed by all and it was pointed out by the board that under the present fund the corporation would have accumulated \$1,000,000 by 1970 which would have many thousands of dollars in interest. The money in the fund is presently drawing interest. It could be used, if desired, to pay for remodeling of existing schools. The board also stated that planning should begin in 1967 if a new school is desired.

Some further discussion ensued concerning costs and board obligations and the meeting was adjourned. Time 12:25.

The board then went to the superintendent's office to conclude official board business which consisted of approval of claims and signing checks. Some discussion was held concerning the value of the evening's meeting and the meeting adjourned. Time 1:30 a.m.

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Guest Speaker At Baptist Church

During the present quarter the adult Sunday School classes at the First Baptist Church have been engaged in a study entitled "Examining Current Beliefs." During the trip Mr. Snider was able to speak with the man-on-the-street and observe first hand the conditions in the communist countries and why they are presently facing such great difficulties in agriculture.

Prof Snider states that one of the most challenging experiences which came to him was the visit to the divided city of Berlin. He was able to spend almost an entire day in East Berlin, visiting in a morning church service and eating dinner in the home of one of the couples of the congregation.

All adult and senior high classes will assemble in the main auditorium at 9:30 for the lecture by Mr. Snider. Professor Snider will also be speaking in the Morning Service at the 10:30 hour. He has chosen as his topic for the second hour "The Greatest Robbery In History." This message will also deal with communism.

These are crucial days. These messages are timely and will provide you with much useful information for understanding some of the contemporary affairs as well as encourage you to do your part in preserving our spiritual and historical heritage.

The first Baptist Church of Mentone is located at Broadway at Harrison. The church pastor, Howard O. Addleman states that the public is welcome at all services.

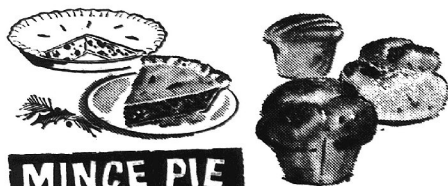

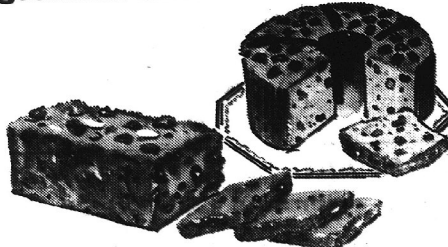

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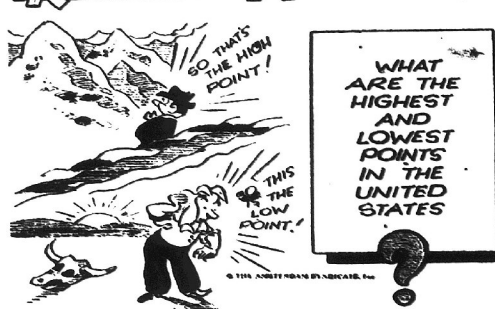

The advertising which is introducing the 1965 autos has never been equalled in volume. However, the methods have been proven. More than ever the printed page is being used to illustrate new models. Again national companies are putting increased emphasis on advertising in local media.

Ten years ago when some automotive firms experimented with concentration of advertising in metropolitan media a drastic decline in sales followed. Near-disaster taught the industry that advertising could not be divorced from the local dealer. A trend back to local newspaper adver-

tising followed.

One company which introduced new models in more than three thousand newspapers, covering the communities of all its local dealers, was once a chief exponent centralized advertising.

A company official explained that no other medium could show the "exciting new styling of 1965" to so many people so effectively as the local newspaper. In this respect, the selling of automobiles is no different from other retail selling. And in either case prosperity in the local community may be created through newspaper advertising.

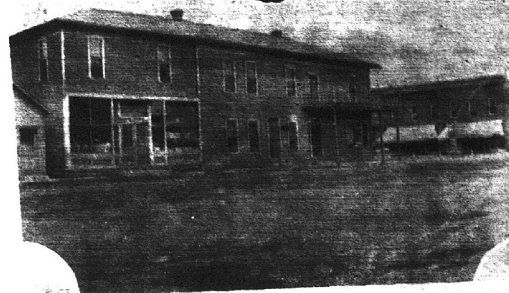
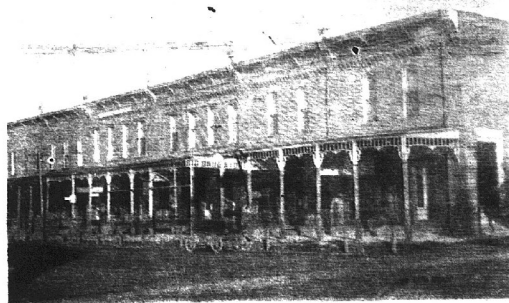
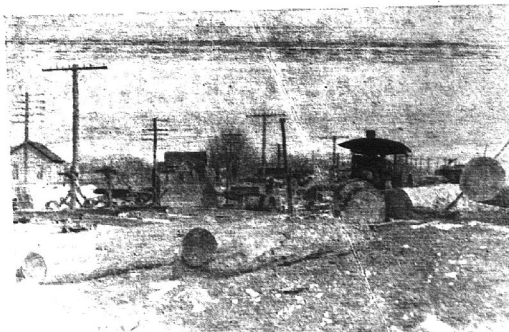

Homemaker Test To Be Given

A program which has attracted a total enrollment of more than three and a half million girls during the past decade will find senior girls in high school here taking a knowledge and attitude examination on home making Tuesday, December 1.

They are among a half million girls in more than 14,000 of the nation's high schools who are participating in the 1965 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

At stake are awards ranging from attractive pins to \$110,000 in scholarships. The program is the only national scholarship competition exclusively for high school senior girls.

The local winner will be the girl who scores highest in the 50-minute test. She will receive an award pin and her paper will be eligible for state competition. The highest ranking Homemaker of Tomorrow in each state then will receive a \$1,500 scholarship. Her school will be presented a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica Inc. Each state runner-up will receive a \$500 scholarship.

Next spring, State Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow, each with a school advisor, will be guests on an expense-paid educational tour to Colonial Williamsburg, Va.; Washington, D. C.; and New York City. The trip will culminate with the naming of the 1965 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Her scholarship will be raised to \$5,000 with national runners-up receiving scholarships, respectively, raised to \$4,000 \$3,000 and \$2,000.

Judging for national honors is on the basis of original test scores of state winners plus personal observation and interviews during the tour.

General Mills, Inc., launched the Betty Crocker Search in the 1954-55 school year to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than a million dollars in scholarships has been awarded. The examination each year is prepared by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also is in charge of scoring papers and judging.
