

6 TIPS FOR SAFER WINTER DRIVING

By Prof. A. H. Easton

Director, Motor Vehicle Research Laboratory
University of Wisconsin

1. Get the "feel" of the road. Accelerate carefully at low speed and away from other traffic to see if the wheels spin, then brake to see if they skid. Reduce speed accordingly, steer gently and smoothly, use gas and brake pedals sparingly.

2. Increase your following distance. It takes three to twelve times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry pavement, so lengthen your following distance to suit road and weather conditions.

3. "Pump" your brakes to slow or stop—don't jam them on. Proper pumping technique is to apply and release the brake pedal rapidly once or twice a second. This intermittent pumping action keeps the wheels rolling and helps maintain steering control.

4. Have good tires with good treads. Good tire treads are always superior to smooth treads on slippery pavements. Even better for snow are snow tires, which provide half again as much pulling power as regular tires.

5. Always carry rein- forced tire chains in the trunk of your car and use them for severe snow and ice conditions. They provide four to five times as much traction on snow or ice as regular tires.

6. Keep your wind- shield and win- dows clear at all times. Replace streaking wiper blades that may have been baked dry by summer sun. Be sure that your wind- shield washer solution contains adequate anti- freeze.



Halleck Biography Published



FIRST COPY of a newly-published biography of Rep. Charles A. Halleck is presented by the veteran Hoosier Congressman to Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who wrote a foreword to the book. Author is Dr. Henry Scheele of Purdue University. Presentation was made recently at General Eisenhower's headquarters on the campus of Gettysburg College.

General Eisenhower broke precedent in agreeing to Dr. Scheele's request that he write a foreword.

"It has been my rule since entering public life to avoid writing prefatory remarks for or an endorsement of another person's publication," General Eisenhower writes in the foreword to the book, **Charlie Halleck**.

"Here," the former President continues, "I deliberately and happily break that rule. I do so out of an abiding personal affection, a high respect, and a deep sense of obligation to the able, hard-working and loyal Charles A. Halleck whose counsel and leadership in his field I found indispensable throughout my service in the presidency. I salute him as one of the finest men I have known in the top councils of government."

"Charles A. Halleck has been an exemplary public servant. He has been a foremost patriot. He has demonstrated many times not only political courage but a high order of selflessness in service to our nation. He has been faithful to friends, a hard-hitting but fair partisan, a dynamic and effective leader, and always a respected advocate of his views."

The new book also carries an introduction by Senate Republican Leader Everett McKinley Dirksen.

Hints on Health (Indiana State Medical Ass'n)

FOOD AND YOUR CHILD

The appetite of a child is variable. To force a child to eat against his will is ordinarily a mistake. Your child will not starve or do himself any harm by missing a meal or two. Just the opposite, in fact something is more likely to happen to the child forced to eat when he does not want food.

There are many reasons that a child may suffer from a lack of appetite; there may be oncoming sickness; the food offered may have been causing a disagreeable reaction; or the child may be too tired or too excited to eat.

It can also mean that the child is experimenting with his power to impose his own will rather than obeying his mother, or that he is trying to attract attention by refusing to eat.

Practically all children will try the last two tricks at some time or other. The best way to handle such a situation is quite simple, the moment the child refuses the food, remove it quickly and say nothing further. If you are determined not to be overwhelmed by this small show of independence your child will soon tire of this performance.

A normal child will eat when he gets hungry—so do not worry that something will happen to Junior or that he will waste away if he misses a meal or two.







For many years, the Philippine peso has been considered the most stable currency in the Orient.

Every two certificates are backed by one United States dollar, and there is the added protection of a Commonwealth exchange stabilization fund.

The Philippine peso historically was regarded as a "junior United States dollar" in accordance with laws dating back to the acquisition of the Philippine islands by this nation in 1898. (The Philippines became independent in 1946.)

However, Philippine currency underwent a crisis during World War II. A number of drastic changes occurred, points out Neil Shafer, associate numismatic editor at Whitman Publishing Company, Racine, Wis. Shafer — one of the nation's leading experts on Philippine paper money — says millions of pesos were burned during World War II to avoid capture by the Japanese.



To replace the destroyed currency, many local Philippine provinces issued their own money. Japanese currency also was in circulation, but the Filipinos preferred their own, even though being caught with it was a sure death sentence.

Much of the emergency World War II money vanished after hostilities ceased and did not come to light until recent discovery of a Philippine Guerrilla currency hoard. This cache was compiled by a rich Filipino who speculated heavily in currency during the war.

"Discovery of the Guerrilla hoard stimulated collector interest in Philippine paper money because issues virtually impossible to obtain became available," continues Shafer. "And while there are some counterfeit notes circulating, any doubt as to authenticity can be readily resolved by a reputable numismatic dealer."

Regular Philippine paper money is listed, priced and described in *A Guide Book of Philippine Paper Money*, written by Shafer and published by Whitman. A special volume on wartime Guerrilla currency is being planned.

"A collection of Philippine paper money offers interest and challenge," concludes Shafer, "and is sure to increase in value, making it a good investment."

Surprise was registered at the special meeting of the trustees of the Tippecanoe Valley School Corporation Monday night when bids for the proposed additions to the Akron Grade School and Mentone School were opened. Previous guesses had placed the amount of construction as high as \$380,000, but the combined total of the low bids was revealed to be \$252,500. The bids were referred to the architects, Maurer, Van Ryn, Ogden, and Natali of So. Bend, for further study, and upon their recommendations the local school board will meet soon to let the bids. Each bid was made with a number of alternates, and due to the lowness of the com-

bined bids some of these alternates probably will be accepted, bringing the combined total of the two additions above the combined total of the two additions above the \$252,000 figure.

Other business discussed by the board included the sale of three used school buses, the impending purchase of three new buses, and a request for use of a school bus by the Beaver Dam 4-H club.

A public sale of the three used buses will be held at the December 5 school board meeting, and bids will be let at that time for the three new buses.

The request for use of the school bus was granted after considerable discussion, during which Gail Creighton asked to be quoted as being bitterly opposed to the idea. He voted against the motion, but it was carried 3-1. Mickey Eaton, the fifth board member, was not present at the meeting.

It is believed the fire was caused by spontaneous combustion.


Dairy Nutrition Short Course Is Planned

A Dairy Nutrition Short Course has been announced by Don Frantz, County Extension Agent. The dates for the three meetings are November 29, December 6, and December 13.




Mr. Aughinbaugh is a man of many facets. He is a writer of technical papers and magazine articles, a composer of music and a poet. He is also an international public speaker.



New P.O. Regulations Listed For Viet-Bound Mail

Postmaster Kenneth Romine today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725 -- The Dulski Military Mail Act -- which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San

Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail.)

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Mailers are also reminded that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, through they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, should be sent no later than December 10.

The deadline for Christmas packages weighing more than 5 pounds going to Viet Nam and other overseas military post offices by surface means was November 10.

The First Thanksgiving Proclamation

BY THE PRESIDENT of the United States of America.

"A proclamation.
"WHEREAS it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the Providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and,

"WHEREAS both Houses of Congress have by their joint committee requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public Thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by according them in opportunity to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness;

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be, that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and favorable interposition of His Providence, which we experienced in the course and confusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union and plenty, which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which He hath been pleased to confer upon us.

"And, also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the Great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually, to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just and constitutional laws; discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed, to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us) and to bless them with good government, peace and concord. To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us, and generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

"Given under my hand at the City of New York the third day of October in the year of Our Lord 1789.

The previous stipends of \$5 for a short trip, \$10 for a half day trip, and \$20 for a full day trip were raised to \$7.50, \$12.50, and \$25 by a unanimous vote of the board.

It was noted that Orville Burkett will move from the corporation and will no longer be able to drive a bus, and possible replacements for him were discussed.

It was also noted that the next meeting will be held December 5 in the superintendent's office. Three used busses will be sold at this meeting and bids for three new busses will be opened.



New Trap Leads Mice To Watery Grave

An automatic trap which catches up to 15 mice at one setting is now available from the Hub States Chemical and Equipment Company, 2002 North Illinois Street, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The trap, which winds like an alarm clock, literally kicks the mice into a compartment as the curious creatures trip a sensitive spring lever. No bait is needed, and with the use of a special coil attachment and a jar filled with water, the mice actually dispose of themselves, once again by curiosity. With no other way out of the trap, the mouse enters the coil tube, follows it into the jar and drowns. The trapper never touches the rodents, and disposal is quite simple, especially with the drowning attachment.

The traps have proven successful on farms, in food plants, around homes, anywhere mice cause problems, according to Hub States.

They are constructed of heavy-gauge galvanized metal and durable working parts for years.



How Would You Like Your Thanksgiving Dinner In A Tube?

How would you like your
Thanksgiving dinner piped
through a tube at the mere
touch of a button? You could
have all you want, in the form
of a commercial liquid formula
that is 20 percent protein, 30
percent fat and 50 percent car-
bohydrates.

That would be taking the
thanks out of Thanksgiving, you
say? We're not surprised.

It was no fun, either, for a
group of those subjects being
treated by such a feeding device
at St. Luke's Hospital in New
York. When food was offered to
them in this form over a long
period, their intake dropped
from as low as 53 calories to
332 per day. (A fair range for a
reducing diet is 1200-1800.)
Weight loss was marked in these
cases.

No one is suggesting that
feeding machines will ever
take the place of roast turkey
and all the trimmings, or that
they should. The experiment
does, however, point to the
secret ingredient in every
would-be dieters' weight prob-
lem, the Indiana Heart Associa-
tion notes.

You guessed it: Food. The bet-
ter it looks, smells and tastes,
the more you are tempted to eat
and over eat. It figures. If a
heaping plate loaded with stuff-
ed turkey basking in a bath of
rich gravy, cuddling up to a
mound of candied sweets and
surrounded by hot buttered
biscuits, isn't there, you aren't
going to eat it. But let a well-
meaning wife or hostess mount
such a production for your bene-
fit, and you are helpless.

Once a year won't hurt you,
of course. It is the long-running
repeat performances, three
times a day, every day, that add
menacing pounds to the other

burdens we carry.

While the Indiana Heart As-
sociation doesn't suggest taking
the meal away from the man,
it does propose taking some of
the calories away from the
meal. This requires forethought,
some knowledge of caloric and
nutritional values, and a few
cooking tricks. The results can
be just as palatable as the fat-
tening feast described above.

Let's take that Thanksgiving
menu, for a starter. Turkey is
fine for a main course (duck or

goose are too fat.) But try bast-
ing it with consomme instead of
fat. And use fat free bouillon to
moisten the stuffing.

Try acorn or butternut squash
instead of candied sweet pota-
toes. Baked with a light glaze
of brown sugar and cinnamon,
they are in the holiday spirit at
half the price in calories.

Mushrooms, which are low in
calories, can add glamour as well
as savor to a main course. Toss
the salad with lemon juice or
low calorie dressings spiked with
herbs. And for the secret tough
to top off the feast, there is a
variety of fruit or whipped
gelatin desserts to take the place
of rich pie or pastry.






