## Tuesday's election draws full slate

Although some neighboring towns have no contests slated this fall, Mentone will have a full slate of candidates for each party in Tuesday's town election.

Jim Tibbets, Republican, the incumbent clerk-treasurer, will be challenged by Dean Myers, Democrat, in seeking his second four-year term. The clerk-treasurer's responsibilities include keeping financial records for the corporation, making a secretary's report of the meetings,

and issuing and collecting water bills. The salary is set at \$1200.

Regardless of the outcome of the election, the town board will have at least two new members on it as present board members Jim Gates and Loren Tridle, both Republicans, did not enter the campaign. Bill Rathbun, present Republican board member, Jim Whetstone and Kenneth Bush comprise the Republican town board slate. They will be opposed by Gerald Romine, Dick Webb, and Frank

Hardesty, Democrats. Town board members each receive \$150 per year.

## Mentone High To Have Veteran Cage Squad

Mentone coach Glenn Petty this year finds himself with plenty of experience plus a little more height, and the outlook is very promising for the Mentone High School in the 1967-68 Kosiuko Athletic Conference cage campaign.

This will be the third season for Petty as coach of the Mentone Bulldogs, who last year lost only two players through graduation from their team which compiled an 11-10 record. Gone through graduation are Dan Romine and Tom Whetstone, who combined to score a total of 238 points.

There will be eight returning lettermen this year and among them the team's leading scorer, Rex Bowser, a senior standing 6-0, who tallied 345 for the Bulldogs. Other returning lettermen are: senior Lee Ritchey, 5-11, the team's second leading scorer last year, tallying 276 points; junior Dennis Meyer, 6-2, who netted 250 points; senior Max Hubart, 5-10; senior Stan Shand, 5-9; senior Mike Whetstone, 6-2; and junior Don Acton, 6-3.

Newcomers to the squad this year are: Randy Dickey, junior, 6-2; Duane Gates, junior, 5-10; Sal Murcia, junior, 5-10; Ernie Welborn, junior, 6-2; Tim Holschaw, 6-4 senior and son of the new Mentone principal, Ernest Holschaw.

The Bulldogs for the second year in a row meet East Chicago Roosevelt, as well as Northfield, Concord and Fairfield and seven other tough teams that complete the Kosiuko Athletic Conference.

Presently a senior at Bethel College in Mashawaka, Hiatt is studying for a B.S. degree in elementary education.

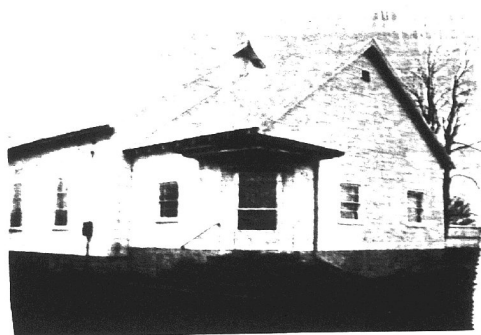
His talk Wednesday night will describe a 1964 trip he made as a member of an archeological expedition to Biblical lands. The group un-

covered a tomb nearly 3400 years old in Dothan where Joseph was dropped into the pit by his brothers. He spent four months with the expedition, which was headed by Dr. Joseph Free, Wheaton College, director of the Near East School of Archeology at Jerusalem.

Hiatt directed 25 Arab laborers in the excavation, and more than 3000 objects were removed from the tomb. The tomb, dating from 1400 B.C. to 1200 B.C., was one of the largest tomb finds of the Holy Land.

# PTA Schedules A Count-In

Every child counts, with the PTA. That's the reason the National Congress of Parents and Teachers is planning a special "count-in" of their parents and teachers as schools reopen this fall.

"The PTA believes that every child must be provided with what he needs to grow up healthy, secure, well-educated and useful to his community," says Mrs. Irvin E. Hendryson, of Albuquerque, N. Mex., president of the National PTA.

"To help secure these rights



Every single child counts, with the PTA—a nationwide organization of volunteers concerned for children and for the parents and teachers who nurture and

for all children," she declares, "the PTA counts on every citizen to work at expanding the opportunities of all America's children."

Parent-teacher associations (PTAs), organized in the 50 states, the District of Columbia and schools for American dependents overseas, begin enrolling new members with the first PTA meeting of the school term and usually concentrate on membership enrollment during October.

This year, they will give particular attention to reaching parents in low-income areas.

One of the many valuable services any PTA provides, Mrs. Hendryson believes, is "the opportunity for parents and teachers to know each other in a social situation. They are the people most important in a child's world, and the child can't help benefiting from their friendly collaboration."

"In poor areas, especially," she notes, "this friendly relation between home and school is of particular value because it's where children most need help."

PTA's can work to improve educational opportunity, to protect dependent or delinquent children, to improve health care and to provide the leadership for vibrant community programs that will serve all children. Mrs. Hendryson points out.

Because every child counts with the PTA, its activities cover all the varied needs of children—for kindergartens, adequately financed schools, well-trained teachers, along with the proper nourishment, good health and favorable emotional climate in which to learn from them.

"We need many members to cover such wide-ranging programs," says Mrs. Hendryson. "So our task this fall is to persuade every parent and every teacher that he too counts, with the PTA."

As PTA's start their "count-ins" this fall, Mrs. Hendryson is urging them to demonstrate that "PTA is where the action is."

She has suggested, for example, that local units take the lead in sponsoring "cultural happenings" for youngsters. Some branches of the National PTA, she notes, have developed automobiles, comparable to the popular bookmobiles, which bring traveling exhibits of painting and sculpture to school children in remote areas. Other PTA's regularly sponsor musical concerts or provide tickets for theatrical productions to children who would not otherwise attend them.

"With something as simple as a folk festival," says the PTA's national president, "we can do much to enrich the lives of children."

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## NROTC Test Date Set

COLLEGE OPPORTUNITY...

The test date for the 22nd annual national competitive NROTC examination has been set as 9 December 1967. Parents and high school officials should remind eligible high school seniors and graduates to submit their applications before 17 November 1967.

The Regular NROTC Program offers an outstanding opportunity for a young man to gain a regular commission while

studying at one of the 52 NROTC colleges and universities. The Navy furnishes tuition, fees, books, and uniforms, plus a subsistence allowance of \$50 per month to NROTC Midshipmen. Each summer NROTC Midshipmen go on interesting and rewarding at-sea training periods. After completing his college course and all military requirements, an NROTC Midshipman is commissioned as a regular officer in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the operating forces.

The program is available to male high school seniors and graduates who will have reached their 17th but not 21st birthday by 1 July 1968. Those who make a qualifying score on the Navy College Aptitude Test will be interviewed and given thorough medical examinations early in 1968. Approximately 1,700 young men from those remaining in competition will thus be selected to attend college next September to prepare for their Naval service.

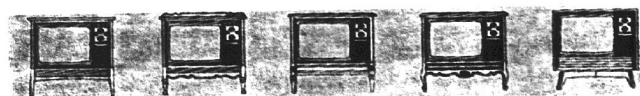

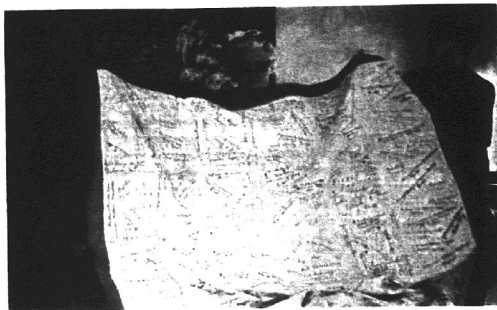

## Rock Urges Airport Expansion

BLOOMINGTON—Lieutenant Governor Robert L. Rock said Saturday that Indiana must take bold steps to initiate a state airport development program in the 1969 General Assembly, or suffer the effects of lost economic development opportunity to adjacent states.

"Every surrounding state—Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, and Kentucky—have state funded airport programs to help their hard-pressed local communities," Lieutenant Governor Rock told the "99's," a women's flying organization, in a Bloomington speech.

"The status of airport development in Indiana has been described to me as desperately behind the needs and demands of attention at the state level."

Lieutenant Governor Rock said there is ample testimony from local officials, corporation executives, and others who work in industrial development that airport facilities frequently make the difference between gaining or losing an industrial plant. The Lieutenant Governor said air transportation also is playing an increasing role in bringing new tourists to Indiana resorts, citing the new commuter air service just established between Indianapolis and French Lick. He also stated that landing strips established at our new reservoir sites will be most helpful in furthering Indiana's tourist boom.

"I have asked Mr. Charley W. Kirk, my Executive Director of

the Indiana Department of Commerce, to present to a legislative study committee on economic development a specific request that legislation be drafted to establish the state airport development program," Lieutenant Governor Rock said.

"Careful planning must go into this development," he said. "Perhaps we should stress county-wide airports or even regional airports to strengthen the financial base that will support the air facilities."

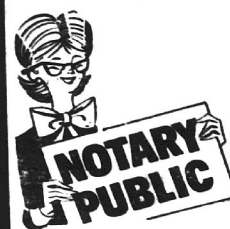

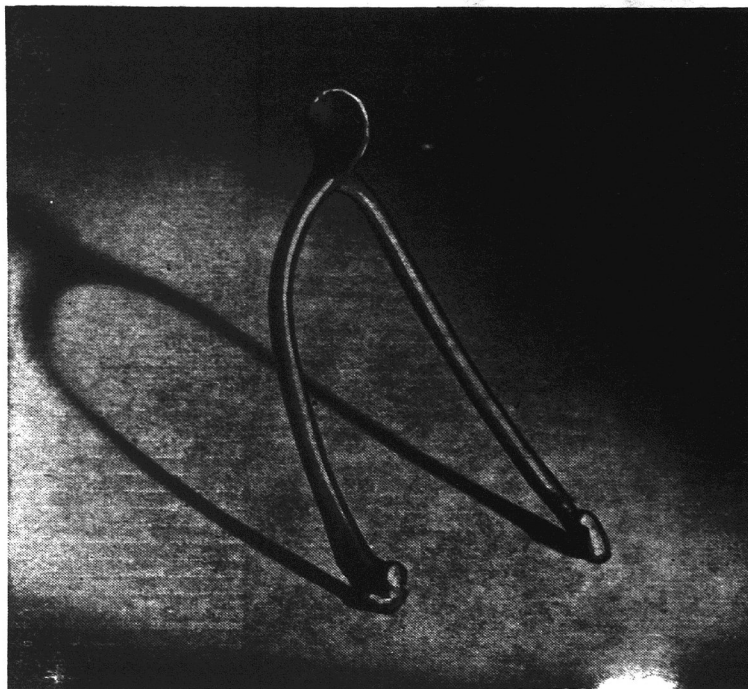

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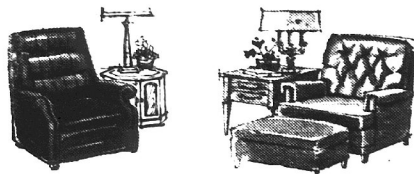

## C of C Issues Progress Report On Airport Improvement Project

Rain, snow, and bad weather have held up the resurfacing of the runway at the Mentone Airport. The Mentone Chamber of Commerce project for 1967 has been to financially support the improvement of the Mentone Airport Runway, as the present runway is inadequate for year-round use. ## War Mothers Remember Local

### Servicemen, Ask Help This Year

One of the busiest groups in town is the War Mothers unit. These ladies meet monthly, and each member is responsible for taking her turn at mailing two boxes to area servicemen each month. In addition, the group mails boxes at Easter time (they report ten mailed this year) and donates to all ten veterans hospitals in the state.

Christmas time is the busiest time of all for these ladies, and they pack and mail boxes to each local serviceman who is stationed overseas. Included in their boxes, which weigh at least five pounds each, are homemade cookies and candy, canned shoe string potatoes, canned meat, raisins, Kool-Aid, and other items that are ready to eat.

The stepped up war in Vietnam has increased the number of local men now in service, and the group estimates they have at least 30 boxes to mail. 30 x 5 equals at least 150 pounds of packages to be mailed, and the necessary postage is astronomical. The War Mothers have never asked for assistance before, but this year they are

seeking persons who would like to assist in paying the cost of postage for these packages. Anyone desiring to donate should contact any War Mother immediately as the boxes must be mailed soon in order to reach their destination by Christmas.

## Utter is cited for heroism

Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Utter, who live near Talma, received heroism medals presented posthumously to their son, Army Specialist Fourth Class James R. Utter, who was killed in ground action in Vietnam last April 15, in special ceremonies conducted Monday at Purdue University.

Utter, 21, was cited for meritorious achievement in ground operation against hostile forces and for heroism in ground combat. He was granted two Bronze Star medals and the Purple Heart decoration for wounds received in combat.

He was a member of the Ninth Infantry Division and had served in Vietnam since early last December. He would have been discharged this month.

His bronze stars, one of the highest decorations the Army grants its soldiers, came as the result of patrol action that resulted in his death. His heroic response to enemy fire is detailed by the Army in the following description that accompanied the medals:

"Specialist Four Utter dis-

tinguished himself by valorous actions while on a reconnaissance patrol with his unit near the town of An Nhut Tan, Vietnam, on April 15, 1967.

"As the patrol was traversing a section of paddy they were ambushed by a large Viet Cong force. During the first 15 minutes of the ambush, the hostile fire was so intense that movement was virtually impossible. The friendly force was pinned behind a dike that ran parallel to the paddy.

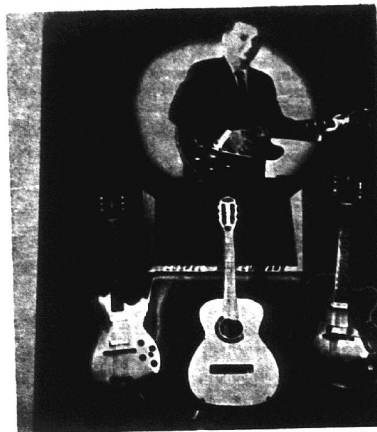
"Specialist Utter, heedless of the danger to himself, rose repeatedly to return enemy fire. The enemy fixed his position, due to the amount of fire he was providing for his fellow soldiers. However, he continued to suppress the enemy for five more minutes until he was finally hit and mortally wounded.

"Specialist Four Utter's courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the Ninth Infantry Division and the United States Army."

## Time To Buy Children's Winter Boots

Lafayette, Ind., If your children have outgrown last year's overshoes, top this week's shopping list with "new boots for the kids."

This shopping chore will be easier if you take the children shopping with you, suggests Mrs. Billie Ellsworth, Purdue University Extension clothing and textiles specialist. This added effort will save later frustration.

The children can try on the boots to be sure they are large enough to put on and take off easily. Allow for a change in shoe size during the winter but don't buy boots so large that they slip up and down on the feet.

Have the children fasten and unfasten the boots to make sure that little fingers can manage the closings. Buckles are usually best. Snaps sometimes pull loose while zippers are heavy and often difficult to zip and unzip.

Look for a boot lining material which will dry quickly. Acrylic or cotton pile lining will be better on this score than wool.

If one pair of boots is all that the budget will allow, overshoes are a better choice than shoe boots, according to Mrs. Ellsworth. When your child

wears shoe boots to school, he will need to carry shoes. Shoe boots become too warm in the classroom, especially if made of vinyl which is not porous.

Leather shoe boots are impractical for children because leather is merely water-resistant, not water-proof. The leather boots are also expensive and can't be passed down to the next child since leather forms to the shape of the foot.

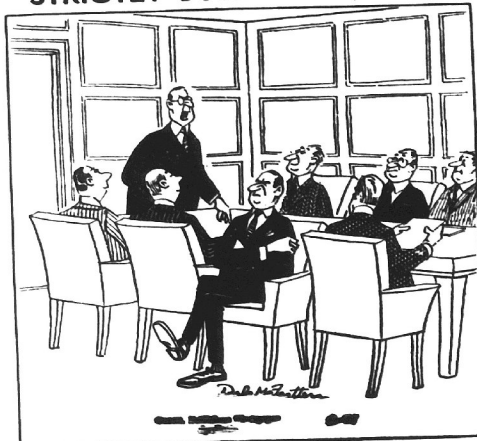

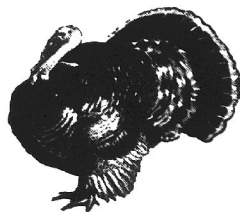

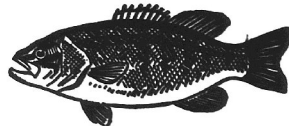

## New Hospital Group Formed In Warsaw, Planning Non-Profit County Hospital

Articles of incorporation have been filed for a citizens group which has been organized to plan and build a modern new hospital facility to serve Kosciusko County.

Known as Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc., the organization is a non-profit corporation created by leading citizens of Kosciusko County communities. The goals of the organization is to provide the latest available medical facilities for county residents, including eventual construction of a new general-acute hospital.

Members of the group stress that their goal is a voluntary, non-profit hospital with an independent board of directors, elected by members of the corporation. The hospital as proposed will receive no tax support from the state or any local government.

Impetus for the new hospital movement came as a result of a hospital facility survey made in Warsaw by the firm of Herman Smith, nationally recognized hospital planning consultants with headquarters in Chicago. The Kosciusko County Area Health Facilities Planning Council engaged the Herman Smith organization to make an in-depth study of the medical facilities available in the county.

The survey also showed that Kosciusko County has a below average number of doctors for a county its size; and that about 50 percent of the county residents requiring hospitalization are currently using facilities in other counties. Establishment of the new hospital will attract more doctors to the area while providing adequate medical facilities for all county residents.

The Board of Directors of Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc., has held numerous meetings with various hospital planning consultants, officials from the State Board of Health, directors of other hospitals and various medical authorities. These comprehensive discussions of current and future hospital needs all point to the necessity of immediate action if Kosciusko County's medical needs are to be adequately met today and in the future.

Every effort is being made by Kosciusko Community Hospital, Inc. to further analyze all medical resources in the county so that they can be incorporated into the overall plan to provide the best facilities for the most people to the lowest cost.

Once the new hospital is under construction the Board of Directors will employ a qualified and experienced hospital administrator who will be responsible for day to day management of the completed hospital while the Board will continue to represent the community as a whole in establishing the overall policies of the hospital. Doctors practicing at the hospital will participate with the administrator and board members in a Joint Conference Committee that will establish the medical procedures to be followed within the hospital.

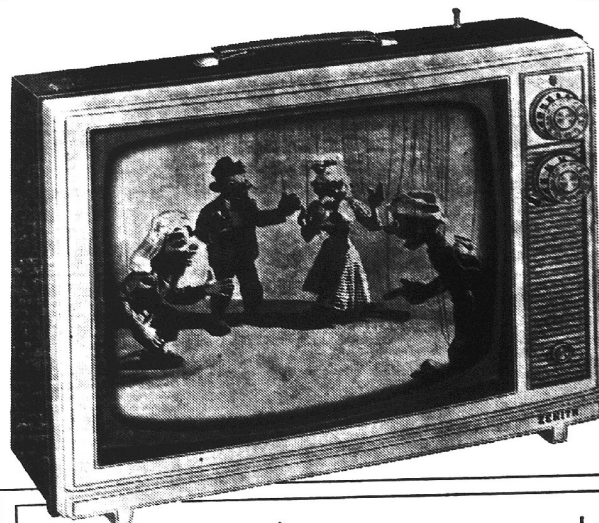

## Farm Leader

### Deplores

#### "Left-overs"

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., November 13--The president of the Indiana Farm Bureau today called for far-reaching tax reforms which would shift a large portion of the costs of local schools and local government from property taxes to the income and sales taxes.

In an address to nearly 2,000 farmers attending the 49th convention of the farm organization which he heads, George Doup, Columbus, called the so-called property tax relief allocated by the recent Legislature "insignificant," like the "left-overs" children received from the threshers' dinner.

"It is quite likely that at the time of this next session of the General Assembly, there won't be any left-overs," the farm leader warned.

Insisting that some other way of meeting this problem must be found, Doup pointed out that reforms can be made either by changing local tax laws so that a share of these revenues can be generated and spent locally, or by the state assuming a much heavier responsibility in financing local schools and local government.

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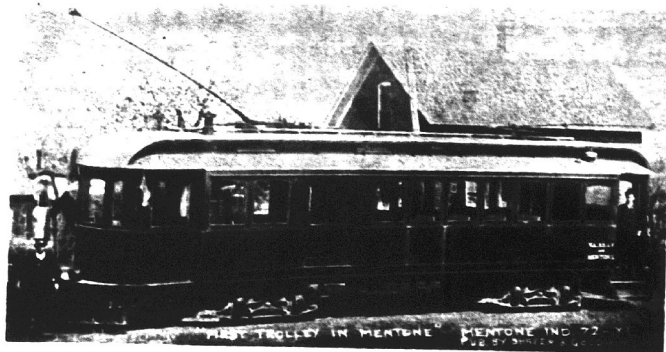

## Student group petitions school board

A group of students at the Mentone school was represented by Pam Abbey, Becky Hunter, and Janice Hoffer at Monday night's school board meeting in presenting a petition opposing action that damages the gym floor. Specifically, they objected to the gym being used for square dancing, saying they felt the cowboy boots worn by some of the dancers seriously marred the floor's surface. The petition presented by Miss Abbey bore the signatures of 216 Mentone students.

Board members and the school superintendent, Robert Forbes, discussed the matter with the group, explaining that an application of the proper dance powder not only permitted shoes to be worn without marring the floor but also acted as a cleaning agent that was actually beneficial to the floor. They also refuted the charge that it had cost \$400 to have the floor resurfaced following last year's holiday dance. No repair work other than the annual re-sealing was necessary, they said, and the cost of this was estimated to be approximately \$90. The work is done each summer by the school custodians.

Frank Hardesty and Jerry Secrist, members of the Mentone Scramblers, were present and agreed with the girls that it would be wise to have the board members inspect the gym floor both before and after this year's holiday dance, which is set for December 29. If the board feels after this inspection, that the floor has been damaged, there will be no more dances.

Bids for school buses were opened, and, subject to further study of specifications, the board agreed to purchase two buses. Successful bidders were Bahney Chevrolet, Akron, who bid \$3,993.85 for one chassis or \$7,957.70 for two, delivered to Mentone, and Kerlin Ford, Silver Lake, bidding on Thomas bodies at \$4,197.50 for one or \$8,315.00 for two. Other body bidders were Carpenter, Superior, Wayne, and Blue Bird. Other chassis bidders were Kerlin Ford, Myer Motors, Liberty Mills, and Fred McKown, Inc.,

A used 48 passenger bus, known as bus No. 12, was auctioned, and Robert Forbes, representing Marion Acton's church group, bought it for \$220.

Other board business included a financial report by the superintendent and approval of claims and payroll. A lengthy discussion was held concerning the purchase of a bookkeeping machine, and the matter will receive further discussion although it is thought the corporation will be forced to buy one in light of recent legislation requiring a different bookkeeping system for school corporations.

Mrs. Mary Ann Reed, who is the elementary music teacher, has resigned, it was announced, and a new teacher will be hired to replace her.

David Burkett, the newest board member, who was sworn in at this meeting, asked why lunch and milk fees in the Akron and Mentone schools were not the same, citing a 5¢ difference between the two schools. He also questioned the use of worn out text books in the elementary grades, and both matters were taken under consideration by the superintendent.

The next business meeting of the group will be held on Monday, December 11.

## Pedestrian Is Killed Near Mentone

Mrs. Lawrence (Mary) Hobbs, 56, was struck and killed by a car driven by Paul Blue, 27, Warsaw, late Saturday as she walked along State Road 25 with her husband. The Hobbses, who have lived east of Mentone only three weeks, had started to walk to town to call their daughter after their car ran out of gas and were walking single file at the time of the accident since there was only a ditch along that stretch of the road.

Hobbs, walking in front of his wife, heard a thud but didn't realize for a few minutes that the car had struck his wife. He ran to the Harold Fivecoat residence to summon Mentone Marshall Gene Norton and an ambulance. His description of the car initiated a search for it.

Blue, who had not stopped at the scene of the accident, continued to his Warsaw home and was apprehended approximately 50 minutes later after his wife sought medical aid from the local hospital for him. She said he was "hysterical" and thought he had hit something on State Road 25 near Mentone.

Blue's speed was estimated at 65 miles per hour, and officers said the victim was struck by the right front fender of the car and was thrown approximately 50 feet by the impact. The victim, who was dressed in dark coat and slacks, was dead on arrival at Murphy Medical Center with a compound skull fracture, fractured pelvis and compound fractures of the left arm.

Charges of leaving the scene of a fatal accident were filed against Blue, and he was held in lieu of \$1,000 bond. He was scheduled to be arraigned in Kosciusko Circuit Court Monday afternoon.

Investigating officers set damages to the Blue car at \$200. In addition to Norton, officers investigating the crash were State Trooper G. A. Waikel, Sheriff David Andrews, Deputy

Jerry Johnson, and Warsaw City Patrolman James Tuka.

The daughter of Herbert and Marie Davis Gordon, Mrs. Hobbs was born in Illinois on Aug. 22, 1911. She married Lawrence E. Hobbs on Oct. 3, 1933.

Also surviving are three sons: Glenn E. Anderson, Richard, New Castle, and Terry, at home; five daughters, Mrs. Barbara Elderman, Pendleton, Mrs. Mary Lou Brown, Mrs. Ramona Copeland, Mrs. Peggy Budgley, and Mrs. Sandra Sue Sizelove, all of Anderson; and 18 grandchildren.

Funeral services for Mrs. Hobbs were conducted Tuesday in Elwood, and burial was in the Knox Chapel cemetery at Point Isabel. The King Memorial Home was in charge of local arrangements.

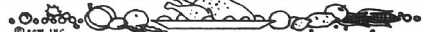

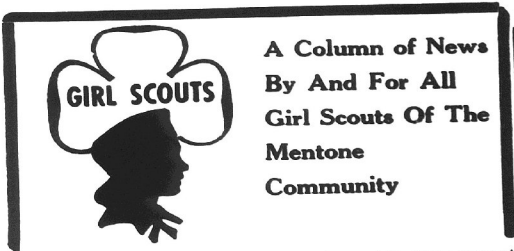

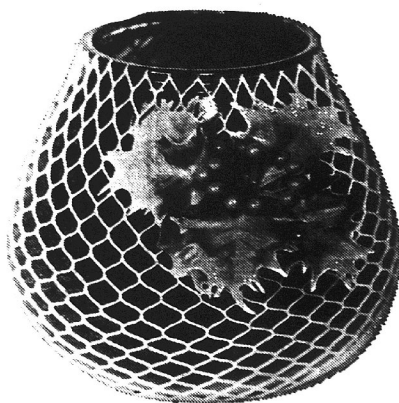

## Hog Farmers Cautioned To Avoid Expanded Production

Hog farmers have been cautioned to guard against increased production next year. Under Secretary of Agriculture John A. Schnitzler passed along the word of caution when he and other USDA officials met recently in Washington, D. C., with a group of hog farmers from across the country.

The Under Secretary reviewed this history of pork supplies and hog prices over the past few years, and pointed out that one old rule seems to hold even with the new and highly skilled hog producers. Lower corn prices still encourage producers to breed more sows -- perhaps too many -- for next year's pork supply.

"The record 4.7-billion-bushel corn crop this year and substantially lower prices are tempting producers toward a substantial increase in production next year," the USDA official stated. "We have taken steps through the acreage diversion program to increase feed grain prices for next year, but this will not necessarily temper the potential for expanding livestock expansion this year. I hope all hog growers will consider what a further production expansion now would mean in returns next year."

"With a large prospective supply of other meats, even a 5-percent increase in farrowing next spring would result in substantially lower hog prices in late 1968 and early 1969. Prices could fall to 1963-64 levels if producers plan poorly now for next year's profits."

Judging for national honors is based on original test scores plus personal observation and interviews while the girls are on

tour. The program, launched in 1954 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career, is the only national scholarship competition exclusively for high school senior girls. 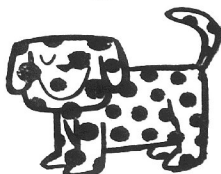

Mrs. Frank Smith, chapter chairman of D.A.R. Schools, then introduced the speaker of the evening, Mrs. Ralph Mason. Mrs. Mason, in company with a group of D.A.R. members, made a tour in October to several schools approved by the D.A.R. She gave a very interesting and informative talk about the various schools.

The National Society of the D.A.R. places much emphasis on the education of our youth, contending that the future of our nation lies in the hands of its young people. Consequently, much time, labor, and finance has been channeled into the Tamassee D.A.R. school at Tamassee, South Carolina, founded in 1919, and the Kate Duncan Smith D.A.R. school at Grant, Alabama, founded in 1924.

In an article written by Mrs. William Henry Sullivan, Jr., President General of the National Society of the D.A.R., she states: "Education for the people of this Country is one of the foundation stones on which the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, has rested from the beginning of its organization in 1890. The foresight of the founding Daughters in making education one of our three principal aims is more apparent, year by year, as the development of our Country progresses."

"The D.A.R. Bylaws require us: 'To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell speech to the American people, to promote as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.'"

"During the past 75 years, the D.A.R. has established a truly enviable record in meeting this responsibility. The Society has built and maintains with D.A.R. funds two modern schools for underprivileged children in the Appalachian area, Tamassee in South Carolina and Kate Duncan Smith in Alabama.

"Seven other schools and colleges are on the approved list. An Approved School means that the school has been endorsed by the Daughters of the American Revolution of the state in which it is located, has been investigated by the National Chairman of this committee, and finally has been approved by the Continental Congress. To qualify, a school or college must be for underprivileged boys and girls who otherwise would not have the opportunity for education, or for Americanization of foreign born students or students of foreign parentage, maintaining high scholastic standards and teaching Patriotic American Principles.

"The Board, at its February 1966 meeting, established an American History Scholarship in the amount of \$8,000 to be awarded over a period of four years at the rate of \$2,000 per year, to a senior high school student who qualifies for said award according to rules set up by the Student Loan and Scholarship Committee. This annual award should contribute greatly toward a better appreciation of our American Heritage and promote patriotism among our young people.

"Emphasis on education has been carried out in the know-

ledge that the future of this Nation lies in the hands of its young people. Only an informed, well educated and alert public can hope to keep America strong and free. The National Society must never relax its efforts to build a better America by fostering, through educational channels, good citizenship in our young people. Good education is the responsibility of all.

"The National Society has been active in youth education for more than sixty years. During this time, it has contributed over \$5,000,000 to its Schools Program. The D.A.R. currently contributes more than \$200,000 annually to this program. This amount is exclusive of Student Loan and other youth activity promotional funds.

"The record of the D.A.R. organization through its educational training has justified its belief that the investments in the D.A.R. Schools were sound investments. The results speak for themselves."

Following the program, the business meeting was conducted by the regent, and the President General's message was read by Mrs. C. G. Carter.

A reprint from the Providence, R.I. Evening Bulletin entitled "Dr. M. Laughlin now criticizes fluoridation" was read by Mrs. Ernest Igo, chapter chairman of National Defense.
